THIS WEEK'S PREVIEW

The Penn State Nittany Lions (10-4, 5-2 B1G), ranked No. 6 in the NFHCA Coaches Poll, will host Indiana (4-11, 1-6 B1G) in their final Big Ten contest of the regular season. The Nittany Lions and Hoosiers meet on Friday, Oct. 19, at 6 p.m. at the Field Hockey Complex.

Penn State is coming off weekend road trip that saw it split games in the Midwest. Penn State dropped a tough 3-2 game at No. 8 Iowa on Friday before holding on to win at No. 15 Northwestern on Sunday.

The Nittany Lions are being led by a balanced attack featuring six players scoring in double digits. Moira Putsch has 20 points off six goals and eight assists, Anna Simon has 19 off nine and one, Aurelia Meijer has 16 off five and six, Emily Klingler has 15 off seven and one, Alexis Horst has 14 off seven goals and Gini Bramley has 14 off four and six. Keeper Jenny Rizzo has a .769 save percentage, 60 saves and a 1.81 goals against average. The Lion defense is anchored by senior Cori Conley, Simon and middle Katle Dembrowski as well as Madison Hutson.

Indiana is coming off a tough weekend that saw it drop a 4-0 decision to Maryland and 4-0 game to Rutgers, both in Bloomington. The Hoosiers are being led by Kelsey Giese, who has eight points off three goals and two assists. Ciara Girouard has seven off two and three. Indiana keepers Sachi Ananias and Shelby Querry have split time in the cage and combined for a .618 save percentage and a 2.63 goals against average.

Penn State leads the all-time series 19-4. The Nittany Lions won the last meeting, 7-1, last year in Bloomington on 10/22/17.

Next week, The Nittany Lions host Bucknell on Tuesday, Oct. 23, at 6 p.m. in the regular season finale. Penn State then finds out its first round Big Ten opponent and site, a game which will take place on Sunday, Oct. 28, at a site and time to be announced.

BRAMLEY LEADS LIONS TO B1G ROAD WIN AT #15 NORTHWESTERN

Senior Gini Bramley notched a goal and an assist to lead the Penn State Nittany Lions to a 4-3 Big Ten road win at #15 Northwestern on 10/14. Bramley's scoring came in a first half burst that put Penn State up 4-1 at intermission. She then helped stave off a late NU rally as the Lions held on for the 4-3 victory.

BALANCED ATTACK LEADS LIONS TO 3-1 WIN OVER #2 MARYLAND

Penn State put together a complete and balanced team effort in an impressive 3-1 Big Ten win over #2 Maryland on 10/7. The Lions handed the Terrapins their first loss of the year thanks to outstanding performances on both offense and defense. Moira Putsch led the Lions with a goal and an assist while Abby Myers and Anna Simon each scored as well. Cori Conley anchored a superb Penn State defensive effort and goalie Jenny Rizzo had seven saves, giving up a lone goal on a late penalty stroke. Penn State held Maryland to only 13 shots.

LIONS SWEEP B1G AWARDS ON 10/8

The Penn State Nittany Lions swept the Big Ten's weekly honors on Oct. 8 after their 3-1 win over previously unbeaten Maryland. Moira Putsch was named B1G Offensive Player of the Week, Cori Conley was named B1G Defensive Player of the Week and Anna Simon was named B1G Freshman of the Week. For Conley and Simon, it marks the second time this year they have won honors.

LIONS ROLL OVER JAMES MADISON

Penn State used a balanced scoring attack, with eight different players notching goals and the team scoring four goals in each half, to down visiting James Madison 8-2 on 9/30. Senior Aurelia Meijer had two goals while six teammates each had one.

PENN STATE GRABS B1G ROAD WIN OVER #17 RUTGERS

Penn State rode a 2-0 halftime lead to a hard-fought 3-2 road win at #17 Rutgers on 9/28. Anna Simon and Abby Myers each scored goals in the first half while Cassie Kline scored what would be the game-winner in the second. Lion keeper Jenny Rizzo had eight saves to keep Penn State on top.

PUTSCH TIES SCHOOL ASSIST RECORD, LEADS PENN STATE TO 8-0 WIN OVER MSU

Senior Moira Putsch tied a Penn State record with five assists in Penn State's 8-0 win over Michigan State on 9/23. Putsch had a part in seven of Penn State's eight goals, notching two goals to go along with her five assists for nine points.

SIMON, PUTSCH, KLINGLER ALL NOTCH TWO GOALS IN PENN STATE'S SHUTOUT WIN OVER MSU

Freshman Anna Simon scored two goals in Penn State's 8-0 shutout win over Michigan State on 9/23, scoring twice off perfect penalty corners, with assists from Moira Putsch and Madison Morano. LAST MINUTE PENALTY STROKE HANDS MICHIGAN 1-0 WIN OVER LIONS

Michigan was awarded a last minute penalty stroke, effectively handing the Wolverines a 1-0 Big Ten win featuring two top ten squads on 9/21. The late penalty call overshadowed an outstanding effort from Lion keeper Jenny Rizzo, who had six saves in shutting down Michigan the rest of the way.

HORST LEADS PENN STATE TO 4-0 WIN OVER #21 BOSTON UNIVERSITY

Sophomore Alexis Horst scored two goals in Penn State's dominant 4-0 win over #21 Boston University on 9/16, in a game played at the University of Maryland. Horst had two goals while teammates Moira Putsch and Anna Simon each added one. Keeper Jenny Rizzo and the Lion backfield, anchored by Simon, Cori Conley and Lauren Mc-Nally, notched the shutout. Rizzo had five saves.

TWO LATE GOALS LEAD LIONS TO B1G WIN AT #22 OHIO STATE

Penn State used two goals in the game's final ten minutes to post a 3-2 road win at No. 22 Ohio State on 9/4, grabbing a victory in the Big Ten opener for both teams. Alexis Horst scored off a Gini Bramley assist at the 9:52 mark to tie the game and Katie Dembrowski scored unassisted at the 3:44 mark to put the Nittany Lions up for good in Columbus.

#4 DUKE PULLS AWAY FROM PENN STATE LATE

The Penn State Nittany Lions fell victim to a second half rally against No. 4 Duke on 9/9 in a game played at Temple. Penn State got a first half goal from freshman Anna Simon and were tied at the halftime mark before Duke scored three unanswered goals to post the 4-1 win.

MEIJER SOARS IN 8-0 WIN OVER KENT STATE

Senior Aurelia Meijer soared to a career high six points in Penn State's 8-0 shutout victory over Kent State on 9/7 at the Field Hockey Complex. Meijer had two early assists and then notched two unassisted goals in the second half to blow the game open and lead Penn State to the victory. Penn State out shot KSU 27-9 and Jenny Rizzo and Colleen Conway combined for four saves to post Penn State's third shutout in the season's first four games.

LIONSDROP 2-120T GAME TO #6 PRINCETON

Penn State and Princeton battled evenly for over 80 minutes on 9/4 before the Tigers inched out a 2-1 double-overtime victory in State College. Penn State got a goal from Emily Klingler in the second half to tie the game and rode nine Jenny Rizzo saves into extra time before Princeton got the game winner in the second OT.

SIMON LEADS LIONS TO 4-0 WIN AT TEMPLE; NAMED B1G FRESHMAN OF THE WEEK (9/3)

True freshman Anna Simon scored her first collegiate goals to lead Penn State to a 4-0 win at Temple on 8/31. Simon found the back of the cage twice off penalty corners (assists to Mary Nell Smith and Madison Morano on both) to spark Penn State. The Lions out shot Temple 42-1 in the victory. She was named Big Ten Freshman of the Week for the week ending Sept. 2 for her efforts.

CONLEY, BRAMLEY SPARK LIONS TO 1-0 WIN OVER #7 VIRGINIA

Seniors Cori Conley and Gini Bramley sparked Penn State to an impressive 1-0 win over No. 7 Virginia in the season opener for both teams on 8/26. Conley anchored a strong Penn State defense and classmate Jenny Rizzo notched four saves as Penn State shutout the Cavaliers. The shutout was the ninth of Rizzo's career. Bramley scored the game's lone goal off an assist from Abby Myers as Penn State out shot Virginia 17-9.

CONLEY B1G PLAYER OF THE WEEK (8/27)

Senior Cori Conley as named Big Ten Defensive Player of the Week for the week ending Aug. 26, 2018. Conley anchored a smothering Penn State defense that held a high-powered Virginia offense scoreless and to only nine total shots. Conley's prowess in the middle of Penn State's defense kept the Cavaliers from pressing the Lion cage and lead Penn State to a 1-0 shutout win in the season opener over No. 7 Virginia. Conley played nearly the entire game for a Penn State defense that kept the Cavs scoreless in a national field hockey showdown to start the 2018 season. The victory has Penn State off to a 1-0 start to begin the campaign

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

GAME SUMMARIES

#6 PENN STATE 1, #7 VIRGINIA 0 Sunday, August 26, 2018 -- University Park, Pa.

The Penn State Nittany field hockey team (1-0, 0-0 B1G), ranked No. 6 in the NFHCA Coaches Poll, opened up the 2018 season with a big win at home against No. 7 Virginia. The Nittany Lions rode a strong defense, led by senior Cori Conley (Oak Park, III.), and a lone first period goal to the victory. It took Penn State less than four minutes to get on the board for the first time when Gini Bramley (Elizabethtown, Pa.) took an assist from Abby Myers (Hartland, Wis.) at the 31:24 mark to give the Nittany Lions an early 1-0 lead. Penn State pressured the Cavalier defense throughout the opening period. Virginia's first real offensive pressure of the first half came at the 19:30 mark but Penn State's defense, anchored by Conley, forced the ball out of bounds.

Lion goalie Jenny Rizzo (Hershey, Pa.) picked up her first save at the 13:00 mark to keep the Nittany Lions on top 1-0. Virginia's offense picked up the pace late in the half, pressuring the Lion defense and Rizzo but Penn State held strong, maintaining its 1-0 lead as the clocked moved below the 7:00 mark. With 3:33 left, Emily Klingler (Selinsgrove, Pa.) had a solid shot that allowed Penn State to pick up its first penalty corner of the game. Mary Nell Smith (Dauphin, Pa.) took the corner that led to two solid Penn State shots, but Cavalier goalie Carrera Lucas notched two saves to keep the score close. Maddie Morano (Harmonton, N.J.) had a late shot that Lucas pushed over the cage and the Nittany Lions carried the 1-0 lead into the break. Penn State out shot Virginia 10-3 in the first half with Lucas keeping the Cavaliers in the game with six saves. Lion keeper Rizzo had one save on Virginia's three shots. Penn State had the lone penalty corner of the first half.

Virginia came out aggressive in the second half with Izzy McDonough getting an early shot on goal that Rizzo deftly pushed aside. Virginia continued to pressure Penn State but the Lion defense, with Conley and freshman Anna Simon (Hanau, Germany) anchoring it, held firm to keep Penn State on top. The Nittany Lions found their offense over the next ten minutes, getting three shots from Bramley. Two went wide and Lucas saved another, keeping the game close. Penn State continued to dictate the pace of the game, keeping Virginia on defense as the clock moved below 23:00. Virginia got its first penalty corner at the 22:30 mark, with Amber Ezechiels taking it for the Cavaliers. Conley blocked her first effort and Virginia got a second comer off the block. Ezechiels tock it again, setting up a solid shot by Anzel Vilgon. Rizzo stopped the shot cold with an outstanding block, keeping the Nittany Lions in the lead with 21:20 on the clock. Penn State looked to take advantage of a Virginia green card but the Cavalier defense kept Penn State from mounting a real threat and the clock moved down under 20:00 left with the Nittany Lions hold the sim 1-0 lead.

At the 18:29 mark, Smith took a penalty comer for the Lions but Penn State did not manage a shot off the effort. Penn State kept the ball on the Virginia side of the field, however, working the clock down under 17:00. With 14:50 on the clock, Myers chased down a slow roller that Virginia was letting roll out of bounds. She knocked the ball back into play, forcing a duo of penalty corners taken by Simon. Penn State had its shot blocked on the first, then missed on two shots on the second corner with 13:00 left to play. Penn State picked up its fifth corner of the game with 12:00 left to play, with Lucas notching two more saves to keep Virginia close. Virginia got a penalty corner at the 8:00 mark but Conley blocked the Cav shot and Penn State took over possession seconds later.

Virginia called timeout with 3:39 left and pulled its goalie. The Penn State defense held firm as the clock moved down below 2:00. With the ball on Penn State's side of the field, Virginia looked to work the ball towards the Lion cage but the Penn State midfield, anchored by Cassie Kline (Millersville, Pa.) and Aurelia Meijer (Hattern, Netherlands) kept the Cavs from mounting a serious threat. With the clock ticking down below 1:00, Penn State's defense held off a final Virginia effort, forcing a turnover with :10 to kill the clock and ice the game. Penn State out shot Virginia 17-9 with Cavalier keeper Lucas notching nine saves. Penn State's Rizzo notched her tenth career shutout, tallying four saves in the process. The Lions had five corners to three for Virginia. Klingler and Meijer each had three shots for Penn State while Greta Ell had three for the Cavaliers.

#6 PENN STATE 4, TEMPLE 0 Friday, August 31, 2018 -- Philadelphia, Pa.

The Penn State Nittany field hockey team (2-0, 0-0 B1G), ranked No. 6 in the NFHCA Coaches Poll, took care of home-standing Temple (0-3) in Philadelphia Friday evening. Head coach Char Morett-Curtiss' squad dominated the Owls in a road non-conference game, posting a 4-0 victory to improve to 2-0 on the year. The Nittany Lions offense was the story in a game that was close on the scoreboard but played almost entirely in front of the Temple goal. True freshman Anna Simon (Hanau, Germany) led Penn State with two goals as the Lions broke the game open midway through the second half.

Mirroring its season opening win over Virginia, the Nittany Lion offense's constant pressure helped set the tone early on. Penn State collected a total of 13 shots in the opening 15 minutes of play. While not punching through for a score, the Lions forced Temple goalie Chloe Johnson into seven saves with a constant barrage of shots. Four different Nittany Lions had three shots apiece before the first half hit the midway point. Penn State also set up five penalty corners early as well. Penn State's pressure paid off with under ten to play in the half, with Mary Nell Smith (Dauphin, Pa.) taking a penalty corner and setting up true freshman Simon for her first collegiate goal. Simon's goal, with assists from Smith and Madison Morano (Hammonton, N.J.) put Penn State up 1-0 at the 5:07 mark. Penn State nearly added a second goal late when Cori Conley (Oak Park, III.) had a solid shot blocked by Johnson as the period ended.

While Penn State's constant offensive pressure kept the bulk of the action on the Temple side of the field in the opening half, the Nittany Lion defense was once again superb. Anchored by Conley, last week's Big Ten Defensive Player of the Week, and Simon, the Lions held Temple to zero shots, keeping the Owls from putting any pressure on talented Lion goalie Jenny Rizzo (Hershey, Pa.). Penn State out shot Temple 22-0 in the first half, with 13 shots on goal and eight penalty corners. While Rizzo went untested in the first 35:00, Johnson kept the Owls in the game with 12 saves.

The second half began in the manner that the first played out. Penn State kept the ball on the Temple side of the field, taking shot after shot and stringing together a series of corners in the first seven minutes. But Temple's defense, and Johnson in particular, kept the Lions out of the cage and the game close. With just under 15 minutes gone in the second half. Penn State had upped its shots advantage to a gaudy 28-1 with Temple picking up its first shot just over 10 minutes into the second half. With Penn State's pressure piling up on the Owd defense, Temple called time out at the 19:27 mark of the second half. The Nittany Lions piled up eight more shots and seven more corners to that point. Conley, Simon and Lauren McNally (Marmora, N.J.) pushed back any slight Temple efforts to move the ball forward.

Penn State broke the game open with just under 15:00, getting two goals within a minute of each other. Simon notched her second goal of the game, once again off a Smith corner with a second assist from Morano at the 12:40 mark. Senior Emily Klingler (Selinsgrove, Pa.) scored her first goal of the season just over a minute later, scoring unassisted at the 11:23 mark to put Penn State up 3-0. A contest that was close on the scoreboard but not statistically had broken open. Rizzo exited the game with just over 6:00 left as classmate Colleen Conway (Franklin Lakes, N.J.) took over in the cage for the Nittany Lions. Senior Aurelia Meijer (Hattem, Netherlands) scored off a Temple save at the 4:52 mark to give the Nittany Lions a 4-0 lead, getting her first goal of the season.

Meijer's goal was the third for Penn State in a furious final 15:00 as the Lions broke free of the Owls and rolled to its second straight win. Penn State poured on 19 more shots with three finding the back of the cage in the second straight win. Penn State out shot Temple 42-1 with 26 shots on goal. The Lions also had 21 penalty corners to none for Temple. The Lion goalies, led by Rizzo, had no saves as the Owls did not manage a shot on goal. Johnson kept Temple close for 55:00 before Penn State's late offensive burst. The Owl goale had 22 saves. Simon's two goals led Penn State with Smith and Morano each having two assists. Meijer led Penn State with 10 shots, six on goal, with one finding the back of the cage. Senior Moira Putsch (Media, Pa.), last year's leading scorer, returned to action in the game after missing the preseason and season opener with an injury. Putsch played 30 minutes and had three shots.

#5 PENN STATE 1, #6 PRINCETON 2 (2ot) Tuesday, Sept. 4, 2018 -- University Park, Pa.

The Penn State Nittany field hockey team (2-1, 0-0 B1G), ranked No. 5 in the NFHCA Coaches Poll, lost a hard-fought double-overtime thriller to No. 6 Princeton (2-1) in a mid-week injdit game at the Penn State Field Hockey Complex. The Tigers scored with just 2:31 left in the final overtime period to post a thrilling 2-1 (20T) win over the Nittany Lions in yet another early season top ten showdown for Penn State. Princeton struck fast, scoring less than one minute into the game, becoming the first team to score on the Nittany Lions when Sophia Tornetta scored from right in front of the Penn State cage. Penn State's offensive quickly chalked up two penalty corners as the Nittany Lions looked to tie the game, but Princeton stopped both efforts, all within the first six minutes of the game. The Tigers countered with solid offensive pressure for the indidle part of the opening half, keeping action on Penn State's side of the field and pressing the Lion defense.

Lion keeper Jenny Rizzo (Hershey, Pa.) knocked back to shots to keep Penn State within striking distance as the clock moved to the 17:00 mark. Penn State had three early shots midway through the half but none on goal. Tornetta nearly scored again at the 15:29 mark but her effort went off the right post. Penn State nearly tied the game at the 9:45 mark but a Mary Nell Smith (Dauphin, Pa.) shot just missed wide. Rizzo then cleared the cage from a Princeton scramble with 8:00 on the clock to keep the score at 1-0 Princeton. With 3:06 left in the half, Penn State had a penalty corner blocked high and the Tigers carried that lead into the halffitme break. Princeton out shot Penn State 9-3 in the opening 35:00 but Penn State a 4-0 corners edge. Rizzo kept Penn State close with five saves while Princeton's Grace Baylis has no saves as none of Penn State's three shots were on goal.

The Tigers picked up their first two penalty corners of the game early in the second half but could not connect on either. Penn State looked to work the ball down to Princeton's end of the field but the Tiger defense kept Penn State from challenging the goal. But Penn State took advantage of a change of possession in front of the Lion bench to knot the score. Senior Cori Conley (Oak Park, III.) pushed the ball deep into the circle where Madison Morano (Hammonton, N.J.) moved the ball closer to the cage. Senior Emily Klingler (Selinsgrove, Pa.) took control of the ball amidst the Princeton defense and scored unassisted at the 30:02 mark to tie the game at 1-1.



The goal energized the Nittany Lion offense as momentum shifted on the field. Penn State began to pressure the Tigers more consistently and picked up the pace, setting a quicker tempo. Princeton was able to push back against the Lions and forced a couple penalty corners after the clock dipped below 20:00. Penn State held first and the game moved under the 15:00 mark knotted at 1-1 as Rizzo notched her seventh save of the game midway through the second half. Princeton regained momentum as the second half wound down, setting up another set of corners as the clocked moved under 8:00. Rizzo held firm with another save and Penn State pressed to push the ball down to Princeton's side of the field. The Tigers took advantage of a Lion turnover at the 5:00 mark and picked up their ninth corner of the game Princeton took time out at the 4:20 mark, prior to the corner. Penn State held firm on first corner, then a second, and finally a third to keep the score tied 1-1 with 2:25 left to play. Princeton picked up one chance on a corner at the 1:00 mark and, with seconds ticking off the clock, nearly won the game but Rizzo made a great save on the left side of the cage to send the game into overtime.

In the first ten-minute, seven on seven, overtime period, neither team could put a shot on goal for the first six minutes. Conley forced a Princeton turnover with 3:30 on the clock but the Lions could not convert and Princeton countered with a late push of its own. Aurelia Meijer (Hattem, Netherlands) regained possession for Penn State and the Lions worked the clock down, forcing a second overtime. Princeton took over after a brief Penn State push and turnover and ended the game at the 7:31 mark when Annabeth Donavan took a pass from Julianna Tornetta and pushed the ball through for a score. The goal in the second overtime gave Princeton a hard-fought 2-1 win. Princeton out shot Penn State 21-1, including the lone shot in overtime that resulted in the game winning goal. Rizzo kept Penn State close with 9 saves (Penn State had one defensive for a total of 10). The Lion offense forced Princeton goalie Grace Baylis into only one save. Princeton also had a 12-5 penalty corner edge.

#5 PENN STATE 8, KENT STATE 0

Friday, Sept. 7, 2018 -- University Park, Pa.

The Penn State Nittany field hockey team (3-1, 0-0 B1G), ranked No. 5 in the NFHCA Coaches Poll, rebounded from a tough Tuesday setback to No. 6 Princeton by taking down visiting Kent State (1-5) on Friday afternoon. The Lions opened up a big lead in the first half and rolled to an 8-0 shutout victory, their third shutout in four games. The Lions rode the strong performance of senior midfield Aurelia Meijer (Hattam, Netherlands) and another strong defensive effort to get back on the winning track. Meijer totaled six points off two goals and an assists. She played a role in four of Penn State's eight goals.

Penn State set a strong early tone, taking possession less than a minute into the game and getting an early shot that sailed high. The initial burst was a sign of the next few minutes as Penn State controlled the ball, mostly in the middle of the field. Any Kent State offensive press was deftly repelled by the Nittany Lion defense. Emily Klingler (Selinsgrove, Pa.) made a solid run down the right side of the field to set up the first penalty corner of the day at the 26:22 mark. Kent State goalie Mary Crumlish notched a save against the first Lion shot and two more were blocked on a second corner. Kent State pushed the ball down towards the Lion cage after the two corners, but the Lion defense, led by Cori Conley (Oak Park, III.), forced a turnover. Penn State responded in fine fashion. The Lion midfield, led by Meijer, moved the ball down field. Meijer sent the ball into the circle and sophomore Alexis Horst (Port Trevorton, Pa.) pushed the ball past Crumlish for the goal at the 24:35 mark to give the Nittany Lions a 1-0 lead. Meijer's stick work to the right of the KSU goal forced a third Lion corner at the 16:30 mark. Anna Simon (Hanau, Germany) appeared to put Penn State up 2-0 on the corner but the goal was disallowed after review and the Lions retained their 1-0 lead at the 16:07 mark.

Kent State took its first shot at the 13:40 mark but Lion goalie Jenny Rizzo (Hershey, Pa.) made the save to keep the Lions up 1-0. Penn State then answered in furious fashion. Meijer once again pushed the ball down field and picked up her second assist of the game with a slick connection to sophomore Abby Myers (Hartland, Wis.), putting Penn State up 2-0 at the 13:21 mark. Less than a minute later, senior Gini Bramley (Elizabethtown, Pa.) notched a solo goal from center circle and the Nittany Lions led 3-0 with 12:44 left in the first half. Kent State could not break through the Penn State defense, with Simon, Conley and Lauren McNally (Marmora, N.J.) holding the Flash to just three shots before a penalty corner as the half expired led to another. Rizzo easily saved the final shot and Penn State carried the 3-0 lead into the halftime break. Penn State out shot Kent State 10-4 and had three corners to one for the Golden Flash. Rizzo had two saves in the opening 35:00 while Crumlish had three for Kent State.

The Lions crushed any hopes for a Kent State comeback quickly in the second half when Meijer scored two solo goals within :30 of each other. Meijer moved quickly down the right side of the circle to score unassisted at the 33:46 mark and then duplicated the same effort, from nearly the same spot, at the 33:14 mark, to give the Nittany Lions a 5-0 lead. The Nittany Lions changed goalies at that point, getting senior Colleen Conway (Franklin Lakes, N.J.) some important minutes in the cage. Kent State had a scoring chance on a penalty corner with 25:00 left to play but Conway notched a nice save and a second shot sailed high. Conway had a second save, using her left foot to push a Kent State shot away at the 23:00 mark to keep the Penn State shutout in play. Penn State made it a half-dozen goals at the 20:49 mark when Emma Spisak (Boiling Springs, Pa.) scored off assists from Klingler and true freshman Meghan Reese (Coopersburg, Pa.).

#5 PENN STATE 1, #4 DUKE 4

Sunday, Sept. 9, 2018 -- Philadelphia, Pa.

The Penn State Nittany field hockey team (3-2, 0-0 B1G), ranked No. 5 in the NFHCA Coaches Poll, fell victim to a strong second half from No. 4 Duke (4-2) in a Sunday morning game played at Temple in Philadelphia. The Lions were outscored by three in the second half and lost a 4-1 neutral site game to the Blue Devils. The game began with Duke pressing Penn State with some early offense, reeling off three shots in the opening minutes that were pushed back by senior goalie Jenny Rizzo (Hershey, Pa.) via two saves as well as a block. Penn State steadily reversed the early flow of the game and moved the ball down to the Duke side of the field, getting a handful of shots of its own that were stopped by Duke goalie Sammi Steele with two saves

The Nittany Lions drew first blood, however, as their offensive pressure lead to a penalty corner at the 19:18 mark that led to the game's first goal. Senior Katie Dembrowksi (Palmyra, Pa.) took the corner, moved the ball right to Madison Morano (Hammonton, N.J.) who stopped it and set up freshman Anna Simon (Hanau, Germany) for the score at the 15:37 mark, Duke would answer shortly after that, however, tying the score at 1-1 when Rose Tynan knocked the ball past Rizzo as it bounced off a Lion defender from outside the circle at the 10:45 mark. The teams battled evenly for the remainder of the opening half and entered the intermission knotted 1-1. The first half was very evenly played. As the game ebbed and flowed neither team could establish overwhelming momentum. Duke ended the opening 35:00 with a slight 7-6 shot edge. Each team had four shots on goal and each keeper had three saves. Penn State had four saves to three for the Blue Devils.

Duke controlled much of the action for the next 15:00-plus minutes, building up a 15-9 shot advantage, including nine total shots on goal. Rizzo kept Penn State close, picking up four more saves in the second half's first 20:00 to up her game total to seven with much of the game yet to play. Rizzo fought off a seventh Duke corner with 11:00 to play and action moved below the 10:00 mark with Penn State still trailing 2-1

The Blue Devils put the game out of reach when Andretta scored off an assist from Lily Posternak as Duke's offensive efforts paid off. Lion senior Moira Putsch (Media, Pa.) had a shot blocked at the 5:41 mark that would have cut the Duke lead to one, but Duke's defense held firm. Penn State began to press on offense, looking for a late rally, but the Blue Devils took advantage of Penn State's all-out push, getting a turnover and ending the game with an unassisted goal from Tynan at the 0:47 mark. The late goal made the final score 4-1 in Duke's favor. "This was tough because we played so well in the first half, connecting as a team, moving the ball," said head coach Char Morett-Curtiss. "But in the second half, we just started watching the game instead of playing as a unit. We were thinking as individuals and you cannot do that against a good team like Duke. We had so many opportunities inside the 25 that we didn't take advantage of and that hurt us." Duke's strong second half led to a 17-11 shot margin at the end of the game, including an 11-4 shot on goal edge. Each team took seven corners. Lion goalie Rizzo had seven saves while Steele had three for the Blue Devils.

The Penn State Nittany field hockey team (4-2, 1-0 B1G), ranked No. 6 in the NFHCA Coaches Poll, scored twice in the final ten minutes to beat No. 22 Ohio State (4-3, 0-1 B1G) in the Big Ten opener for both teams. The Nittany Lions posted a 3-2 victory over the Buckeyes in the Friday afternoon contest, played in Columbus, Ohio.

Penn State had an early chance to score at the 31:00 mark with the ball moving around in front of the Buckeye cage. But Ohio State keeper Aaliyah Hernandez pushed the ball away and out of bounds, giving Penn State an early corner. The Buckeyes blocked Penn State's opening corner and then Hernandez notched a save on a shot by Aurelia Meijer (Hattam, Netherlands). The Nittany Lions midfild, anchored by Meijer and senior Cassie Kline (Millersville, Pa.), dominated the early going before Ohio State mounted its first offensive charge with Kelsey Nolan taking the ball down field only to be stopped cold by Lion keeper Jenny Rizzo (Hershey, Pa.). Rizzo notched a quick second save that started a Penn State fast break. Penn State missed on the first shot but Lion senior Emily Klingler (Selinsgrove, Pa.) found the back of the cage on a second shot and Penn State led 1-0 at the 27:49 mark.

Anna Simon (Hanau, Germany) nearly scored on another Penn State corner at the 21:50 mark but Hernandez held firm on two Lion attempts. Ohio State was unable to connect on a slight offensive charge shortly thereafter as the Penn State defense controlled the Penn State backfield. Senior Cori Conley (Oak Park, III.), classmate Lauren McNally (Marmora, N.J.) and Simon anchored the Penn State defense, turning the Buckeyes over, feeding the Penn State midfield and keeping Ohio State from mounting any consistent offensive pressure in the opening 20:00 minutes. Hermandez made solid kick save on a nice Klingler shot at the 15:00 mark to keep the score at 1-0. Ohio State then moved the ball downfield after the save and knotted the game at 1-1 off a Sina Schwinn goal at the 15:35 mark. Penn State had outshot the Buckeyes 8-3 at that point but found itself tied 1-1. Hernandez kept the game tied with a couple more saves off Penn State corners and the game continued tied 1-1 as the clock moved the wards the 10:00 mark. Ohio State was able to control the action for the bulk of the final 10:00 and the first half ended with the game tied 1-1. The Nittany Lions outshot Ohio State 10-3 but Hernandez's five saves kept the game tied. Rizzo had two saves. Penn State had a 5-0 advantage in penalty corners as well.

The second half began in similar fashion as the first with Ohio State controlling possession for the opening minutes. Penn State's Moira Putsch (Media, Pa,) had a chance on a quick breakaway at the 31:20 mark but Hermandez was solid in the cage for the Buckeyes. Ohio State took a 2-1 lead at the 28:25 mark when Kelsey Nolan scored on a rebound. Ohio State got a green card at the 26:18 mark, giving Penn State a 2:00 advantage. The Nittary Lions could not turn the advantage into a goal and action resumed even-up. Gini Bramley (Elizabetthcown, Pa,) nearly tied the score at the 23:200 mark but Ohio State's defense kept the Lions out of the cage and the Lions trailed 2-1 as the clock neared the 20:00 mark. As the game moved below 20:00, Penn State countered a quick Ohio State press, turned the Buckeyes over and then set up a solid possession in the Ohio State backfield. But the Buckeyes answered with good defense, moved the ball down the field and nearly took a two-goal lead before Fizzo was able to push the Buckeyes effort aside and keep Penn State close. Ohio State pulled its goalie after the Dembrowski goal, but Penn State's defense was up to the task. Penn State regained possession and worked the clock down below 2:00. Penn State grabbed possession. The Buckeyes took one last run but Bramley was able to steal the ball and push the ball down to Ohio State's end of the field, effectively killing the clock and securing the 3-2 Lion victory. Penn State outshot Ohio State 16-12, with the Buckeyes hold a slim 9-6 edge in the second half. Rizzo and Hermandez each posted six saves while Penn State had a 6-3 advantage in corners (but took only one in the second half).

The Penn State Nittany field hockey team (5-2, 1-0 B1G), ranked No. 6 in the NFHCA Coaches Poll, shutout No. 21 Boston University (5-3) in a key non-conference match-up between top ranked squads. The Nittany Lions used two goals from sophomore Alexis Horst (Port Trevorton, Pa.) to roll to a 4-0 win in the game played at the University of Maryland on Sunday afternoon. The Nittany Lions picked up their first penalty comer less than five minutes into the game but could not connect to take the early lead. Boston University tried to counter after Penn State's comer but the Lion midfield and defense were able to control possession and keep the Terriers from mounting a push. Boston managed to work the ball down to the Lion circle at the 25:00 mark, but Lion defender Cori Conley (Oak Park, III.) stole the ball, pushed it to midfielder Cassie Kline (Millersville, Pa.) and Penn State worked its way to another corner at the 24:00 mark. The Lion true freshman put Penn State up 2-0 with a sizzling shot from the top of the circle at the 3:59 mark. Horst then picked up a loose ball in front of the BU cage and scored the first of her two goals just over a minute later, giving Penn State a 3-0 lead at the 2:47 mark, a lead Penn State would carry into the halftime break. Penn State outshot Boston 8-4 in the opening 35:00, including a 6-2 on goal edge. The Lions had a 5-2 corner advantage as well. Rizzo had two saves for Penn State while Keegan had three for the Terriers.

The second half began with Penn State pressing BU once again as Putsch controlled the action around the Boston goal early. The Penn State Nittany field hockey team (5-3, 1-1 B1G), ranked No. 6 in the latest NFHCA Coaches Poll, fell victim to a last minute penalty stroke in a home loss to No. 8 Michigan (6-3, 2-0 B1G) in a rematch of last year's Big Ten tournament title game. The Wolverines were awarded the stroke with just 1:53 left in the game and connected to post a hard-fought 1-0 win under the lights at Penn State. Penn State had



a quick early opportunity when a solid shot by Aurelia Meijer (Hattam, Netherlands) sailed just wide less than a minute into the game. The Nittany Lion defense pushed a brief Wolverine effort back shortly after that before regaining possession on the Michigan side of the field. Michigan's Meg Dowthwaite nearly put Michigan on top at the 28:30 mark but freshman back Anna Simon (Hanau, Germany) notched a defensive save to keep the game scoreless. Michigan was able to grab momentum with a series of possessions, taking advantage of a couple Penn State turnovers to control the ball. The clock worked its way down to the 23:00 mark with Michigan and Penn State trading possession in the middle of the field.

The Lions took advantage of a Michigan turnover to push the ball downfield, with Moira Putsch (Media, Pa), forcing the ball into the circle, leading to the first penalty comer of the game at the 20:35 mark. The Lions did not convert on the effort. Penn State's offense found its footing, however, and Putsch worked the ball inside again, forcing a second corner with under 19:00 in the half. But Penn State's pressure proved too much too early for MSU with Putsch scoring unassisted at the 28:17 mark to give the Lions a 2-0 lead.

Michigan State called timeout to stem the momentum and managed the ball downfield, picking up its first shots of the game but not finding the back of the cage. Penn State's defense held firm, turned the Spartans over and worked the back to the MSU side of the field. The Nittany Lions forced penalty corner with 24:00 on the clock. The Spartans blocked a solid Lion shot, but Penn State worked its way back into possession and kept action in front of the MSU gaal. The Lions blew the game wide open in a two-minute span, scoring off two penalty corners to take a 4-0 lead. Putsch fed Alexis Horst (Port Trevorton, Pa.) at the 20:46 mark for a goal. She then moved the ball into senior Madison Morano (Hammonton, N.J.), who tapped it to freshman Anna Simon (Hanau, Germany) at the 19:21 mark to give the Lions a four goal lead.

Penn State senior back Lauren McNally (Marmora, N.J.) left the game with an injury at the 13:28 mark after a collision in front of the Penn State circle. The Penn State defense stepped up for McNally, pushing back the Spartans and reclaiming possession. Meijer worked the ball downfield before MSU was able to recover possession and the clock moved below 12:00. The teams battled for control in the midfield for the next five minutes. Penn State's pressure led to a corner at the 6:30 mark, and the Putsch to Morano to Simon connection worked once again, this time with Simon getting the goal with 6:01 left in the half, putting the Nittany Lions up 5-0. The Spartans fought off a couple more Penn State corners as the half wound down and the Nittany Lions carried that lead into the halftime break. The Nittany Lions dominated the opening half statistically as well as on the scoreboard. Penn State outshout Michigan State 16-2 and had eight corners to none for the Spartans. Lion goalie Jenny Rizzo (Hershey, Pa.) did not have any saves as neither of MSU's two shots were on goal thanks to a Lion defense led by McNally, Simon and senior Cori Conley (Oak Park, III.). Arundell had six saves for the Spartans while Jardell had two. Putsch was part of all five of Penn State's first half goals (four assists and a goal).

With senior Colleen Conway (Franklin Lakes, N.J.) in goal for the Nittany Lions to start the second half, Penn State picked up where it left off in the first half, getting two quick penalty corners in the first minutes of the game. Spartan keeper Jardell was able to push back a solid Meijer shot to keep Penn State from scoring in the flurry. Meijer moved the ball downfield as the clock moved under 30:00, sidestepping three Spartan defenders and shooting the ball hard from the top of the circle. Putsch touched the ball as it moved to the goal, and Putsch notched her second goal of the game off the Meijer assist at the 29:10 mark. The Nittany Lions continued to keep the ball on the Spartan side of the field as the second half hit the midway point. Penn State, with senior Katie Dembrowski (Palmyra, Pa.) shifting to the backfield, continued to keep the Spartans from threatening the Lion cage. Meijer moved the ball down the right side of the field and deftly fed the ball inside to senior Gini Bramley (Elizabethtown, Pa.), who scored at the 17:34 mark to put the Lions up 7-0. Penn State nearly scored again shortly after that as senior Abby Myers (Hartland, Wis.) led a fast break that almost led to another Lion goal. But MSU keeper Arundell moved out for a nice block to keep the Lions from connecting on the effort. Penn State dominated the game's final minutes as well, but the Spartan defense kept Penn State from scoring as the clock moved below the 5:00 mark. Michigan State put together its strongest offensive effort at the 5:00 mark, but Conway had a save on one point blank shot and Penn State mounted a nice break that ended with a Klingler goal off a Putsch assist at the 3:40 mark. Penn State closed out the game by pushing back one final Spartan effort on the Lion side of the field and rolled to the 8-0 victory. The Nittany Lions outshot Michigan State 29-5 on the day, including a 14-0 advantage in penalty corners. Rizzo had no saves in her 35:00 stint in the first half while Conway had one in her second half action. Michigan State's Arundell had eight saves while Jardell had four

#7 PENN STATE 3, #17 RUTGERS 2 Friday, Sept. 28, 2018 -- Piscataway, N.J.

The Penn State Nittany field hockey team (7-3, 3-1B1G), ranked No. 7 in the latest NFHCA Coaches Poll, held on for an important Big Ten road win at No. 17 Rutgers (7-3, 1-3 B1G) in a key match-up Friday in Piscataway, N.J. Penn State opened up a 2-0 lead after one half of play and rode that early advantage to a 3-2 win over the Scarlet Knights. Penn State controlled possession for the opening minutes of the game, keeping the action on the Rutgers side off the field and nearly scoring four minutes in but a Nittany Lion shot from Moira Putsch (Media, Pa.) drifted wide of the cage and Rutgers goalie Gianna Glatz. Rutgers countered with a solid offensive run that led to a shot that slide to the right of the goal and Lion keeper Jenny Rizzo (Hershey, Pa.) at the 29:07 mark. Glatz kicked away a Penn State shot a minute later and action continued 0-0. Freshman Meghan Reese (Coopersburg, Pa.) moved the ball across the top of the circle, nearly connecting on a pass at the 23:40 mark, but Rutgers was able to defend and regain possession. Senior Aurelia Meijer (Hattam, Netherlands) just missed on a hard crossing shot, Emily Klingler (Selinsgrove, Pa.) had a point black shot saved by Glatz and the Lions then picked up their first comer at the 21:52 mark.

Glatz made a hard save on a good Meijer shot to keep the game scoreless. Rutgers was unable to put together an offensive push and Penn State once again reset its offense. Mary Nell Smith (Dauphin, Pa.) forced a second Penn State corner with 18:50 on the clock. She then took the corner, fed the ball to senior Madison Morano (Hammonton, N.J.), who tapped it to freshman Anna Simon (Hanau, Germany) who blasted a shot past Glatz to give Penn State a 1-0 lead at the 18:33 mark. Rizzo fought off two

quick Rutgers shots after the reset, keeping Penn State on top as the clock moved below the 17:00 mark. Penn State regained possession and moved the ball downfield where Morano had a shot pushed aside by Clatz.

Penn State continued to dominate the action, with Abby Myers (Hartland, Wis.) picking up Penn State's seventh shot of the half with 15:30 to play in the opening period. Glatz picked up her fourth save with 13:00 left in the half as the Lions built up a 9-3 shot advantage. Rutgers was hit with a green card with 9:00 to play and Penn State found itself with a player advantage for two minutes. Rutgers, however, was able to kill off the penalty and action resumed at the 8:00 mark with the Nittany Lions up 1-0. Senior Cori Conley (Oak, Park, III.) pushed back on a Rutgers press with 6:00 on the clock, Rutgers regrouped and nearly scored seconds later, but Rizzo made a diving stick save to keep Penn State on top at the 5:25 mark. Myers put Penn State up 2-0 with just 0:34 to play in the half, taking a sweet crossing pass from Gini Bramley (Elizabethtown, Pa.) and easily sending 30 minutes and had a 2-0 edge in penalty corners. Rizzo had two saves for Penn State while Glatz had four for the Scarlet Knights.

Rutgers began the second half working to push the ball down to Penn State's side of the field. But the Lion midfield and defense, with Katie Dembrowksi (Palmyra, Pa.) taking the lead, kept the Scarlet Knights from mounting a serious threat through three minutes. Penn State countered a brief Rutgers push, moved the ball downfield, and began pressuring the Knight defense. A slick Meijer move toward the cage forced a Penn State comer at the 31:10 mark. Penn State could not connect on the comer, with Glatz collecting another save for RU. Myers nearly worked the ball fully from left to right to set up another goal, but the Rutgers defense was able to finally regain possession with 28:00 left to play in the game.

Nittany Lion keeper Rizzo saved a solid Rutgers shot at the 26:50 mark, only to have Scarlet Knight Nikki Profita score seconds later with 26:36 to play to cut the Nittany Lion lead in hail, 2-1. The goal energized the Rutgers offense and Rizzo stepped up to push back on two separate Knight efforts in front to the Penn State cage, including a super save a the 23:17 mark. Rizzo's save total increased to five as the clock hit 23:00. Penn State picked up another penalty corner with 20:00 left in the game. Meijer almost scored off a Simon corner but Glatz was able to just deflect the ball wide, keeping the score at 2-1 Penn State. Penn State reeled off two quick shots in the 17th minute but the Lions could not connect. A solid Bramley fast break led to an extended PSU possession and another corner for the Lions at the 15:45 mark. Rutgers was able to clear the ball and out Penn State still led 2-1 with 14:53 to play. A subsequent Lion corner saw a Dembrowski shot hit the post and dribble wide before a crossing shot went out of bounds, giving Rutgers possession with 14:10 on the clock. Putsch intercepted a Rutgers pass, leading to a Nittany Lions possession right in front of the RU cage. Bramley tapped the ball to senior Cassie Kline (Millersville, Pa) who sailed a shot past the Rutgers keeper to put Penn State up 3-1 with 13:35 to play.

Rutgers picked up its first penalty comer with 10:30 to play in the game, but Rizzo made a nice save to keep Penn State up by two. The Nittany Lions then moved action down to the Rutgers side of the field for the next couple minutes and when Rutgers managed to regain possession, the Scarlet Knights took timeout with 8:17 on the clock. Putsch and Myers each almost scored in the seconds after the time out, but Glatz was able to make saves on both to keep it a two-goal game. Rutgers pulled tis keeper at the 5:00 mark but the Lion defense was equal to the task and kept the Scarlet Knights from scoring initially. The Knights picked up a corner with 2:40 on the and Emily Howardt scored on a rebound after a Rizzo save to cut the Lion lead to 3-2 with 2:32 left to play. The Lion defense was able to fend off a late Rutgers push, including a final RU corner with no time on the clock, to walk away with the 3-2 win. Penn State outshot Rutgers 22-12 and had a 6-3 advantage in corners. Nittany Lion goalie Rizzo was big for Penn State, particularly in the second half, collecting eight saves in the close win. Knight keeper Glatz had 12 for RU.

The Penn State Nittany field hockey team (8-3, 3-1 B1G), ranked No. 7 in the latest NFHCA Coaches Poll, dominated visiting James Madison (3-6) in a non-conference contest. Penn State scored early and often in an 8-2 win at the Penn State Field Hockey Complex on Sunday afternoon. Penn State took the game's first shot on a fast break with Cassie Kline (Millersville, Pa.) leading the way. A quick Dukes block stopped

first shot on a fast break with Cassie Kline (Millersville, Pa.) leading the way. A quick Dukes block stopped the early effort, but Penn State continued to control the action. Senior Aurelia Meijer (Hattam, Netherlands) deftly worked the ball deep into the James Madison circle and took a hot shot that sailed past JMU keeper Caitlin Nelson at the 32:49 mark to give Penn State an early 1-0 lead. The Penn State Nittany field hockey team (9-3, 4-1 B1G), ranked No. 7 in the latest NFHCA Coaches Poll, handed No. 2 Maryland (13-1, 4-1 B1G) its first loss of the season in a key Big Ten contest. The Nittany Lions downed the Terrapins 3-1 on Sunday at the Penn State Field Hockey Complex.

Maryland controlled the early action, keeping the ball on the Penn State side of the field for the first five minutes. The Lion defense, anchored by Cori Conley (Oak Park, III.), fought off the Terrapin offense until a penalty corner led to the first shot of the game. The Maryland shot was wide and Penn State moved the ball down to the Maryland side of the field. Penn State could not get the ball past midfield as Iowa's forwards and midfielders forced turnovers that kept the action in front of Rizzo and the Lion cage. Anna Simon (Hanau, Germany) cleared a Hawkeye offensive effort and the Lions were able to move the ball down to the lowa side of the field, but the Hawkeyes regained possession as the clock moved to 18:30. Iowa picked up its first penalty corner with 18:00 left in the opening half. Iowa's shot off the corner was just wide and Penn State kept the game tied with 17:00 left on the clock. Penn State's first solid push of the opening half came off a nice Aurelia Meijer (Hattam, Netherlands) drive that led to a Madison Morano (Hammonton, N.J.) pass that just drifted out of bounds with 15:00 left. The Lions retained possession but a turnover seconds later gave lowa the ball and ended Penn State's first, best offensive series. Iowa responded by moving the ball downfield and picking up its second penalty corner with 12:00 left in the first half. Iowa, with controlled the opening half, got the game's first goal when Maddy Murphy scored off a rebound on the penalty corner with 11:15 to play, giving lowa a 1-0 lead. Iowa kept up the late pressure and forced its third penalty corner with 8:30 on the clock. Rizzo made a great save with 7:20 on the clock to keep the Lions down by just a 1-0 score. Katie Dembrowsk (Palmyra, Pa.) had an outstanding long pass slip just past the stick of teammate Emma Spisak (Boiling Springs, Pa.) with just 5:00, denying Penn State a goal. Iowa carried the 1-0 lead into the halftime break

Penn State came out energized in the second half, immediately taking the ball downfield and picking up its first penalty corner of the game just :30 into the half. Meijer had a first shot blocked high but Penn State picked up a second quick corner. Moira Putsch (Media, Pa.) took the ensuing second corner, fed Morano who tipped it to Simon for a game tying goal with at the 34:50 mark. Penn State continued to press the Hawkeyes, energized after the quick goal. Iowa struggled to regain any offensive flow as Conley and Madison Hutson (Gloucester Point, Va.) and the Lion defense kept the Hawkeyes bottled up and away from the Penn State cage as the clock moved under 25:00. Iowa reset itself on offense and the Hawkeyes picked up their fifth penalty corner (and first of the second half) with 22:30 left in the game. A solid Hawkeye shot slid wide left and lowa called for a review to see if the ball went off a Lion defender. But the call stood and Penn State retained possession with 21:55 left in the game. After the two teams traded possessions, Iowa began to find its footing and retook a 2-1 lead when Murphy scored again off a Lokke Stribos pass at the 17:37 mark. Lion head coach Char Morett-Curtiss took a timeout after the goal, looking to restart a Lion offense that had not shot since scoring a goal just 1:10 into the second half.

Dembrowski fed Putsch with a nice pass but Speight made a good save on a Putsch shot. The Lions picked up a penalty corner, however, but Speight made two saves on shots from Meijer and Dembrowski to keep lowa on top 2-1 as the clock moved to the 15:00 mark. Penn State nearly tied it a minute later but a shot that snuck by Speight but the shot kicked off the post with 14:00 left to play. Penn State kept up the pressure and tied the game at the 13:03 mark when Gini Bramley (Elizabethtown, Pa.) fed Emily Klingler (Selinsgrove, Pa.) who scored to tie the game at 2-2. Iowa turned a counter attack into a free hit with 9:30 left to play. The Hawkeyes nearly scored with 8:40 to play, but Rizzo kicked away an lowa shot to keep the game tied 2-2. Iowa maintained possession and forced Penn State to play defense for the next couple minutes, keeping the Lions on their heels and from mounting any serious offensive threat as the clock moved to the 4:00 mark. Iowa had a series of free shots to the to the right of the Penn State cage and connected with 2:19 left to play when Murphy scored her third goal of the game from right in front of the Lion goal. Penn State tried to move the ball into Iowa territory as the clock moved below 1:30 but the Hawkeye defense held firm. Penn State could not regain possession as time ran out and dropped lost 3-2 in a hard-fought contest. Penn State outshot lowa in the second half but the Hawkeyes still owned a 14-8 shot advantage at game's end. Iowa had a 5-3 penalty corner edge as well. Rizzo ended the game with four saves while Speight had three.

#6 PENN STATE 4, #15 NORTHWESTERN 3 Sunday, Oct. 14, 2018 -- Evanston, III.

The Penn State Nittany field bookey team (10-4, 5-2 B1G), ranked No. 6 in the latest NEHCA Coaches Poll, withstood a late rally to down No. 15 Northwestern (8-8, 3-4 B1G) to wrap up a Big Ten road weekend. Penn State posted a 4-3 victory in Evanston on Sunday, staving off a Northwestern rally after leading 4-1 at halftime. Both teams opened up the game aggressive and Lion goalie Jenny Rizzo (Hershey, Pa.) was peppered with early shots, saving the first few before Wildcat Saar de Breij put Northwestern up with an early goal at the 30:24 mark. The Nittany Lion defense was forced to push back again almost immediately after with Rizzo coming up with a big save to keep the Wildcats from opening up an even bigger lead less than five minutes into the game. Northwestern's offense was on point throughout the early part of the game, keeping the ball on the Penn State side off the field for much of the time. Penn State had a brief possession in the Northwestern circle at the 25:00 mark, but Northwestern was able to regain possession and keep Penn State's offense from finding any rhythm. Northwestern got hit with a green card at the 23:30 mark, giving the Nittany Lions a player advantage for two minutes

Penn State was unable to take advantage with a Moira Putsch (Media, Pa.) shot missing just wide with 21:30 and a Cassie Kline shot blocked by Wildcat keeper Annie Kalfas to kill the penalty. Penn State kept the pressure up, however, and with the teams at even strength, Gini Bramley (Elizabethtown, Pa.) found Putsch, who scored at the 20:22 mark to tie the game at 1-1. Penn State took the lead two minutes later with Bramley notching the solo goal with 18:34 to play in the first half to give the Lions a 2-1 lead. The quick two-goal burst helped Penn State erase a surprising early deficit. Penn State maintained possession for over 10:00 during the middle portion of the first half. With Aurelia Meijer (Hattam, Netherlands) at the midfield and Cori Conley (Oak Park, III.) on defense, Penn State silenced the early Northwestern pressure and allowed Penn State to keep its 2-1 lead as the clock moved to the 11:00 mark. Northwestern worked the ball down to the Penn State side of the field with 9:00 and the Wildcats kept possession for a couple minutes, but a slick Conley steal gave Penn State a chance to move the ball back down to the Wildcat side of the field. The teams traded barbs for the next couple minutes before Penn State picked up a penalty corner with 6:00 left. Anna Simon (Hanau, Germany) had a hard shot blocked and Mary Nell Smith (Dauphin, Pa.) knocked in the rebound to put the Lions up 3-1 with 5:32 left in the half. The Nit-tany Lions peppered Kalfas with a flurry of shots in the final 5:00 and scored a fourth goal on an untimed penalty corner as the half ended with Alexis Horst (Port Trevorton, Pa.) knocking in a rebound to give Penn State a 4-1 lead at the break.

After a slow start, Penn State dominated the bulk of the opening 35:00, outshooting Northwestern 11-3. Penn State had a 3-0 edge in corners. Rizzo had two saves for Penn State while Kalfas has four for the Wildcats.

Penn State controlled the action at the start of the second half, not letting Northwestern regain any momentum and keeping the action set firmly in front of the Wildcat cage for the first four minutes. But Northwestern was able to move the ball down to the Lion side of the field and picked up their first penalty corner with 31:00 left and Maren Seidel scored at the 30:40 mark to cut the Penn State lead to 4-2. Northwestern continued to press on offense after the Seidel goal, keeping Penn State on the defensive as the clock moved below the 25:00 mark. Bramley forced a Wildcat turnover, allowing Penn State to briefly regain possession and move the ball out of the Lion backfield for a bit, but Northwestern reset itself and reset its offense. Conley kept Northwestern from connecting on a deep offensive press with 20:00 on the clock but Northwestern regained possession. Penn State was finally able to regain control and moved the ball down to the Wildcat circle where it picked up a penalty corner with 18:30 left to play in the game. Northwestern defended the corner, but Penn State was able to steadily work its way to another corner at the 16:00 mark. Northwestern blocked a hard Simon shot off the corner but Penn State kept control of the ball, working the clock down to the 15:00 mark. Northwestern then pushed the ball down to the Lion side off the field at the 13:00 mark, picking up a penalty corner. The Lions defended the first corner, Northwestern picked up a subsequent one, and this time the Wildcats scored as Mackenzie Keegan scored off a Charlotte Vaziri assist to cut the Lion lead to 4-3 with 12:13 to play.

Penn State called timeout with a once substantial lead cut to just one. With Northwesterm pressing for a game-tying goal, Penn State's defense held firm for three minutes until Northwestern's offense forced a penalty correr with 8:45 on the clock. Rizzo was able to block a good Northwestern's offense forced a gene Northwestern's of the ball. The Wildcat offense forced a fifth penalty corner at the 7:45 mark. Conley blocked the Northwestern shot with 7:00 left and the Lions took possession of the ball with Madison Morano (Hammonton, N.J.) stealing the ball with 7:00 to play. The Lions turned the ball over, however, and Northwestern once again set up on the Lion side of the field. Rizzo made a fantastic stick save on a crossing pass with 5:30 left. Northwestern pulled its goalie with 2:11 to play as NU frantically tried to the the game up. With the clock ticking below the 1:30 mark, Northwestern got a restart on the right side of the circle. The Lion defense held first as the clock moved below 1:00 to play and continued to stifle the Wildcats for the remaining seconds. Northwestern's last effort was negated with a turnover and Penn State posted a hard-fought 4-3 win. Penn State outshot Northwestern 15-8 for the game, including 10 on goal. The Lions had a slim 6-5 edge in penalty corners as well. Rizzo had three saves while Kalfas had six for the Wildcats.
