Storylines

- Maryland travels to No. 19 Penn State for a ranked Big Ten showdown at Jeffrey Field Tuesday night. Kickoff is set for 6 p.m., and fans can watch the action live on the Big Ten Network with Mike Monaco and Jamie Watson on the call. The Terps are coming off a 2-0 road victory against Ohio State and are unbeaten in eight of their last nine matches.
- Maryland leads the all-time series with Penn State 24-19-0. The Terps have won all five meetings since entering the Big Ten by a combined score of 16-7 and the last eight meetings overall dating back to 2006.
- Maryland's defense has emerged as one of the best in the country this season, ranking 17th in the nation and first in the Big Ten in goals against average (.757). Maryland's back four of **Ben Di Rosa**, **Matt Di Rosa**, **Johannes Bergmann** and **Brett St. Martin**, along with defensive midfielder Nick Richardson are the top-five on the team in minutes played. The Terps have not given up a goal in their last 305 minutes of play dating back to
- Freshman goalkeeper **Niklas Neumann** has emerged as one of the country's best in his first season, ranking sixth in the country and first in the Big Ten in goals against average (.473) and fourth in the country and first in the conference in save percentage (.853).
- The Terps opened up the season with three consecutive clean sheets at home, the first time Maryland has held opponents scoreless at Ludwig Field to open a season for that long in 20 years.
- Sasho Cirovski, one of the most decorated coaches in college soccer history, is now four wins away from 400 at Maryland. Cirovski currently has 422 wins all-time, the sixth-most among active coaches. With 400 wins at Maryland, Cirovski would be one of just six coaches in history with 400 wins at one Division I school.
- Against No. 24 Yale, the Terps used a **Johannes Bergmann** 100th minute overtime winner to defeat the Bulldogs 1-0. Maryland has now won two games in overtime this season after **Brett St. Martin**'s OT winner against them No. 9 St. John's.
- In a matchup of the programs that both made the College Cup last season, the Terps blitzed No. 6 Indiana in the first half with three goals en route to a 3-0 victory. Freshman **David Kovacic**, junior **Eric Matzelevich** and Bergmann all tallied goals.
- For his two goal week, Bergmann was named the Big Ten Co-Offensive Player of the Week. The German scored his first career goal against the Hoosiers before his OT tally against the Bulldogs. Bergmann was also named Big Ten Defensive Player of the Week for his work keeping a pair of clean sheets last week. The senior was sensational leading a backline that held Indiana and Yale, who came in with a combined one loss, to no goals.

Upon his arrival in College Park in 1993, Sasho Cirovski has transformed Maryland into a national soccer power, leading the Terps to the 2018, 2008 and 2005 NCAA titles, nine College Cup appearances, and 15 conference titles, all the while producing numerous top-level professional players. Now in his 27th season at Maryland, the 2018 Top Drawer Soccer National Coach of the Year and 2005 NSCAA National Coach of the Year has instilled his passion for excellence in a soccer program that expects to compete for the national title every season.

During his tenure with the Terps, Maryland has been to the NCAA Tournament 24 times, advancing to the College Cup in nine of those years, including four-straight appearances from 2002-05, culminating in the NCAA title in 2005. The Terps have also captured eight conference tournament titles (1996, 2002, 2008, 2010, 2012, 2013, 2014, 2015 and 2016) and six conference regular season titles (2003, 2005, 2012, 2013, 2014, and 2015) during his stay in College Park.

The 2018 campaign saw Cirovski lead Maryland back to the top of the college soccer world as Maryland captured its fourth national championship and third under Cirovski's leadership. The Terps rebounded from a 4-5-3 start to finish the season on a 9-1-1 tear. Maryland did not give up a goal in the NCAA Tournament becoming the first team in program history to go through a tournament not scored upon. The title made Cirovski the ninth coach to win at least three NCAA Division I Championships.

Cirovski's squad started it's title campaign at home against NC State before ripping off road victories against sixth-seeded Duke and third-seeded Kentucky to advance to the College Cup. The Terps then topped Big Ten rival second-seeded Indiana in the semifinals before beating Akron in the national title match.

The 2017 season saw Cirovski put his name into the college coaching record books once again, becoming just the ninth coach in Division I history to win 400 career matches. The Terps opened up the season with 13 straight games unbeaten (10-0-3) and completed a school record 30-game regular season unbeaten streak that dated back to 2015.

The 2016 season was one for the record books for the Terps, as the squad posted a program-record 15-game winning streak and also carried a program-record 25-game unbeaten streak through the final game of the year. Maryland which boasted its first undefeated regular season at 16-0-2 - also captured its fifth consecutive tournament crown when

it defeated Wisconsin, 2-1, in the title game in Westfield, Ind. The Terps also captured the regular season title and snagged the top overall seed in the NCAA Tournament. Maryland nearly swept all the Big Ten special honors, as Gordon Wild was named Offensive Player of the Year, Alex Crognale snagged top defensive honors, and Cody Niedermeier was tabbed Big Ten Goalkeeper of the Year while Cirovski earned his first Big Ten Coach of the Year honor since Maryland became a member of the conference in 2014. Maryland also posted two NSCAA First Team All-Americans in Wild and Crognale - the first time two Terrapins earned that honor since 2010. Crognale signed a Homegrown contract with Columbus Crew while fellow senior defender Chris Odoi-Atsem was drafted in the first round by D.C. United. Cirovski was instrumental in helping the Terps make a stellar transition to the Big Ten in 2014, leading Maryland to regular season and tournament championships in its inaugural season in the league and its fourth straight conference tournament title a year later.

Maryland returned to the College Cup for the second straight season in 2013 after capturing ACC regular season and tournament championships for the second consecutive season. The Terps fell to Notre Dame in the national championship game and Patrick Mullins became the first player at Maryland to win two MAC Hermann Trophies.

Maryland put together one of its finest campaigns in 2012, boasting the top winning percentage and scoring offense in the country. The Terps captured the ACC regular season and tournament titles and advanced to the College Cup before bowing out in penalty kicks in the national semifinals. Patrick Mullins was named the MAC Hermann Trophy Winner.

In 2008, the Terps established the 'Gold Standard', capturing the program's third national title and winning more games (23) than any other squad in program history. The team also set program-bests in shutouts (15) and consecutive wins (16) as well as registering a Ludwig Field-record crowd of 6,500 in Maryland's bout with then-No. 1 Wake Forest. The 2008 season marked the first time in the Cirovski-era that the Terps won both the NCAA Tournament and the ACC Tournament. To top it off, Cirovski eclipsed long-time head coach Doyle Royal to become Maryland men's soccer winningest coach in a win against Duke on Sept. 19.

The 2005 championship run did not mark the arrival of the Maryland program, but helped validate its place alongside the nation's elite. In addition to a fourth-straight College Cup appearance, the Terps won the ACC regular season title and

posted a 19-4-2 mark. In addition, Cirovski helped mentor Maryland's first Hermann Trophy winner in Jason Garey, who left Maryland as the school's all-time leader in goals (60) and points (140) and was the third pick in the MLS SuperDraft. Cirovski was named the ACC Coach of the Year for the second time in his career, and was the NSCAA National Coach of the Year for the first time in his career as the Terps brought home their first national title since 1968.

Under Cirovski's guidance, the Terps have brought fans out to Ludwig Field in record numbers. In 2009, the The Terps ranked second nationally in overall attendance and a then program-record crowd of 6,946 watched Maryland trump No. 2 North Carolina. Cirovski's efforts to build a winning team that plays an exciting brand of soccer are only matched by his efforts to build Ludwig Field into one of the top soccer venues in the country.

In addition to his leadership on the sidelines, Cirovski is also a leader as the chairman of the men's soccer NSCAA Division I committee. As chairman, Cirovski was the architect in creating the position of NSCAA Program Director, a major triumph for the sport. This position will be the singular voice of college soccer in dealing with NCAA legislative issues, overseeing College Cups and elevating the significance and status of the sport. He was also vital in brokering the television partnership between Fox Soccer Channel and the NSCAA, guaranteeing a weekly spot for college soccer on television.

Cirovski's wife, the former Shannon Higgins, played collegiate soccer at North Carolina and entered the National Soccer Hall of Fame in the fall of 2002. The couple has three daughters; Hailey, Karli, and Ellie.

The Big Ten men's soccer tournament semifinal and championship games will be played at Ludwig Fied.

The men's tournament will begin on Nov. 9 with the eighth and ninth seed playing in the first-round game at the top-seeded institution, followed by the top-four seeds hosting quarterfinal matches on Nov. 10. The tournament will move to Ludwig Field for the two semifinal games on Friday, Nov. 15 and the championship game on Sunday, Nov. 17.

Maryland hosted the Big Ten Tournament at Ludwig Field in 2014, the program's first season in the league. The Terps captured the title with a 2-1 win over Indiana in the final.

Bin Wins N4A Wilma Rudolph Award

Paul Bin accepted the National Association of Academic and Student-Athlete Development Professionals' (N4A) Wilma Rudolph Student-Athlete Achievement Award in June at the N4A Convention Awards Luncheon. The N4A Wilma Rudolph Student-Athlete Achievement Award honors student-athletes who have overcome great personal, academic, and/or emotional odds to achieve academic success while participating in intercollegiate athletics.

Bin served as an inspiration inside and outside of the University of Maryland community for his battle with mental health and his subsequent advocacy for mental health awareness in sports. The junior forward played a large role on the field in the Terps capturing their fourth national title in program history in 2018, scoring four goals and adding three assists in 21 matches.

Preseason Recognition

Top Drawer Soccer named **William James Herve** the 65th best player in the country entering the 2019 season after Herve's freshman All-American season in 2018. NCAA.com made **Johannes Bergmann** a player to watch in the country after he helped the Terps capture the national title last season with his sterling play at centerback.

Hall of Fame Sash

Sasho Cirovski was inducted into the Washington, D.C., Sports Hall of Fame this summer Cirovski, the winningest coach in Maryland soccer history (387-143-53), has captured three National Championships, most recently the 2018 title. He has led the Terps to 24 postseason berths, including nine appearances in the College Cup, and has recorded 25 consecutive winning seasons. Cirovski is the ninth coach in Division I soccer history to win three national titles and one of just nine coaches to win 400 matches at the Division I level. He is a two-time national coach of the year.

Now entering his 27th season at Maryland, Cirovski has won 15 conference titles and produced 34 All-Americans. Two Maryland players under Cirovski's leadership have won three MAC Hermann Trophy awards for National Player of Year and 10 have been finalists for the award. He has coached nine conference players of the year and 48 first-team all-conference selections.

Forty eight of Cirovski's players have been selected in the MLS Super-Draft, including two No. 1 overall picks, and numerous have gone on to play at the international level, including five players that have been included in World Cup squads.

Maryland for America

Former Maryland standouts have been making their mark at multiple levels in the US Soccer set up.

Zack Steffen and Omar Gonzalez both played for the US Men's National Team in the Gold Cup and had the opportunity to captain the side in the tournament. Steffen was named the 2018 US Soccer Men's Player of the Year. Steffen, who now plays in the Bundisliga, was called up to the USMNT's two matches this week.

Maryland standouts have also made an impact at the U-23 level with Eryk Williamson and Donovan Pines both getting called up to U-23 camps in 2019.

Maryland Made

Maryland head coach **Sasho Cirovski** will be assisted this season by two of his former standout players in **Scott Buete** and **Jake Pace**.

Buete has done nothing but win in his association with Maryland soccer, capturing a combined four conference tournament titles, three conference regular season titles and 10 NCAA Tournament appearances in his 10 seasons as a player and coach with the program. Buete was a three-year captain for Cirovski and the Terps from 2001-2003 and was an NSCAA First Team All-American in 2003 after snagging third team honors in 2002. He led Maryland to two College Cup appearances and an Atlantic Coast Conference tournament title in 2002.

Pace is in his second season as assistant coach after serving as director of soccer operations for the previous four seasons. Between 2012 and 2016 as a player and staff member, Pace played a role in five consecutive conference tournament championship squads (ACC and Big Ten). He finished his career with 13 goals, including a career-high six as a captain his senior year. Pace played in Maryland's College Cup appearances in 2012 and 2013.

The Terps also add volunteer assistant Casey Beyers, a Maryland native who played at Wisconsin. Beyers will take over for Pace as the Terps' goalkeeping coach.

downing Akron in the final, 1-0, on a penalty kick from Amar Sejdic. Sejdic, who captained the side with fellow senior Andrew Samuels, led a talented group of seniors that included fellow MLS draft picks Samuels, Chase Gasper and Dayne St. Clair. Seniors Sebastian Elney and DJ Reeves made key contributions in the attack for the Terps.

Maryland also boasted All-American defender Donovan Pines, who is now a defender for DC United. Pines, Gasper and St. Clair led a defense that did not give up a goal for the final 500 minutes of the season.

Maryland returns five starters for its national title squad: Paul Bin, William James Herve, Johannes Bergmann, Ben Di Rosa and Eli Crognale.

The Champs

Fifty years after its first title and 10 years after its last title, Maryland captured its fourth national championship in program history in 2018. After an uneven start, the Terps ended the season 9-1-1, including five shutouts in the NCAA Tournament to take the title.

The title was the third in the career of head coach Sasho Cirovski after he led the Terps to title in 2005 and 2008. Maryland, which was not ranked at all during the regular season, found itself in the second half of the season and upset three teams with higher seeds in the NCAA Tournament before

The Maryland men's soccer team plays in front of one of the finest atmospheres in college soccer at storied Ludwig Field. The Terps routinely rank among the top-5 in the nation in attendance and led the country with a school record 52,189 patrons entering Ludwig in 2016.

Maryland ranked No. 2 in the country in attendance last season, with an average of 2,922 fans. Heading into the 2019 campaign, over 600,000 fans have filled the stands to take in exciting Terrapin soccer action since the facility opened in 1995.

The Terps set a Ludwig Field record in 2015 when 8,449 fans watched Maryland defeat UCLA in overtime on a perfect College Park night. Maryland's notorious student fan group, The Crew, has established itself as the best college soccer fan section in the country.
