THIS WEEK'S PREVIEW

UNIVERSITY PARK, Pa.; November 5, 2019 -- The Penn State Nittany Lions (6-11, 4-4 B1G) will serve as hosts for the 2019 Big Ten Field Hockey Tournament this week at the Penn State Field Hockey Complex. The tournament begins with three games on Thursday, Nov. 7, continues with semifinals on Friday, Nov. 8, and concludes with the tournament title game on Sunday, Nov. 10. Penn State earned the #5 seed and will face #4 Michigan (13-5, 5-3 B1G) in the opening round Thursday at 11 a.m.

The tournament's first day begins with the Penn State/Michigan game at 11 a.m., followed by #2 Iowa taking on #7 Ohio State at 2 p.m. and concluding with #3 Northwestern taking on #6 Rutgers at 5 p.m. Friday's semifinals begin at 4 p.m. with #1 Maryland battling the #4/#5 winner. The second semifinal begins at 6:30 p.m. and features the #2/#7 winner facing the #3/#6 victor. The tournament title game is set for 2 p.m. on Sunday.

Penn State is coming off a thrilling 2-1 win over #16 Rutgers on Sunday in a game that secured the #5 seed for Penn State. Abby Myers had a goal and an assist in the win while keeper Brie Barraco had five saves in this contest.

The Nittany Lions are being led by Anna Simon, who has 18 points off eight goals and two assists. Freshmen Jemma Punch and Paityn Wirth each have 13 points. Punch has five goals and three assists while Wirth has four and five. Abby Myers and Grace Wallis each of 10 points off three goals and four assists. Goalie Brie Barraco has 84 saves and a .683 percentage with a 2.26 goals against average.

Michigan is coming off a tough loss to Iowa last weekend. The Wolverines own a 3-1 win over Penn State from October and ended the regular season with a 13-5 overall record, 5-3 in conference play. The Wolverines are being led by Kathy Peterson and Guadalupe Fernandez Lacort. Each athlete has 18 points, Peterson off five and eight and Fernandez Lacort off three and 12. Meg Dowthwaite has 17 off seven and three. Goalie Anna Spieker has 33 saves and a 1.16 goals against average.

The winner of the 2019 Big Ten Tournament receives the conference's automatic bid to the 2019 NCAA Field Hockey Championship. Action begins on Saturday and Sunday, Nov. 16-17, at host sites around the country.

MYERS LEADS PENN STATE TO 2-1 WIN OVER #16 RUTGERS ON SENIOR DAY

The Penn State Nittany Lion field hockey team took care of visiting Rutgers in the regular season finale for both teams Sunday. Abby Myers led the Lion offense in a 2-1 Big Ten victory on Senior Day for Penn State. Myers had a goal in the first period to give Penn State an early lead and then had a diving pass on the game-winning goal (scored by teammate Jemma Punch) late in the fourth period.

WIN AT BUCKNELL GIVES MORETT-CURTISS HER 500TH CAREER WIN AS PENN STATE HEAD COACH

The Penn State Nittany Lion field hockey team shutout Bucknell in a non-conference game in Lewisburg on Wednesday. Tied 0-0 after three periods, Penn State mounted a furious fourth period rally to roll to the 3-0 road win. The victory gave head coach Char Morett-Curtiss her 500th win as mentor at Penn State.

"I am very grateful to Penn State for giving me the opportunity years ago to lead this program," Morett-Curtiss said, reflecting on her 500th win. "I've received great support from every administration here, from the coaches who have coached with me to the players who I've had the honor of coaching. It has been so much fun and I'm thankful to everyone who has been, and is to this day, a part of this program."

BEDNARKSI NOTCHES GOAL VS. OHIO STATE

Junior Bree Bednarski notched a goal in Penn State's 2-1 loss to #22 Ohio State on Oct. 25. The Lion also had a late game-tying goal waved off after review in the tough loss.

LIONS DOWN MICHIGAN ST. FOR B1G ROAD WIN

Penn State used balanced offense and great defense to post an important 3-1 win at Michigan State in Big Ten action on Oct. 18. The Lions got goals from three different players. Madison Morano, Paityn Wirth and Jemma Punch each notched goals in the game while keeper Brie Barraco had a season-high eight saves.

MORETT-CURTISS TO BE INDUCTED INTO PHILADELPHIA SPORTS HALL OF FAME

Char Morett-Curtiss, long-time head coach of the Penn State field hockey team and a former All-American as a player for the Nittany Lions, will be inducted into the Philadelphia Sports Hall of Fame as part of the 2019 Inductee Class. The organization announced its new class earlier this summer and the induction ceremony is set for Nov. 7. Morett-Curtiss is being inducted for her local accomplishments in field hockey and lacrosse. The Philadelphia Sports Hall of Fame inducts individuals as both local athletes or as part of the city's professional sports teams. A native of Aldan, Pennsylvania, Morett-Curtiss is a graduate of Lansdowne-Aldan High School and is now a member five Hall of Fames: The Philadelphia Sports Hall of Fame (a 2019 inductee); Delaware County Hall of Fame; Pennsylvania Hall of Fame; USFHA Hall of Fame and the NFHCA Hall of Fame.

Times will be determined at a later date and more information is to follow as the event nears.

The Penn State Nittany field hockey team (0-1, 0-0 B1G), ranked No. 9 in the initial NFCA Coaches Poll, lost to No. 3 Duke (1-0) in the season opener for both teams on Friday. A young Penn State squad battled the veteran Blue Devils tough early before Duke pulled away for the 4-1 non-conference victory.

The Nittany Lions got on the board quickly when sophomore Anna Simon (Hanau, Germany) fed junior Alexis Horst (Port Trevorton, N.J.) for the goal with Horst notching Penn State's first goal of the season. The early goal gave Penn State an early 1-0 lead at the 5:08 mark. The Lion offense stayed on attack and the defense held firm as Penn State led 1-0 after the opening period. Redshirt freshman Brie Barraco (Allentown, Pa.), making her first collegiate start, made the first save of her career early in the second stanza to keep the Nittany Lions on top. Duke found its offense during the second period, forcing Barraco into a couple more saves before Blue Devil Olivia Sahaydak notched a goal at the 24:54 mark to tie the game at 1-1. Duke found the back just minutes later, with Hannah Miller scoring off a Leah Crouse assist at the 27:23 mark to give the Devils a 2-1 lead. The Blue Devils carried that lead into halftime.

Duke outshot Penn State 8-1 in the opening half and had the only penalty corner of the first 30 minutes. Barraco had three saves in the first half while Duke's Sammi Steele had none.

Barraco kept Penn State close in the third period, doubling her save total while Duke stacked up five more shots. The Nittany Lions continued to trail by one throughout the third stanza and were within one goal heading into the final period. The Nittany Lions battled Duke tough throughout the final period, but the Blue Devil offense connected late in the game with Sahaydak notching her second goal of the contest at the 53:00 mark to put Duke up 3-1. Leah Crouse added a late unassisted goal for Duke at the 57:12 mark to close out the game's scoring and give the Devils the 4-1 victory.

"We showed good signs today and we played together throughout the game," said head coach Char Morett-Curtiss. "But we have to do better taking care of the ball. Turnovers and lack of possession really got us in trouble today and against a good team like Duke, it will be costly. Our players gave 100 percent for the entire 60 minutes and that is definitely something we will build on as the season progresses."

Duke outshot Penn State 17-4 while each team had three penalty corners. Barraco finished the game with seven saves and four goals against while Steele had two saves and a goal against.

The Penn State Nittany field hockey team (0-2, 0-0 B1G), ranked No. 9 in the initial NFCA Coaches Poll, fell to No. 11 Virginia (2-0) in a non-conference road game on Sunday. Penn State tied the game late only to see Virginia notch the game-winning goal with just over a minute left as the Nittany Lions lost 2-1 in Charlottesville. The two squads battled evenly through the start of the first period, with Virginia getting the early game's lone shot on goal. The Lion defense held, and the game moved into the latter part of the opening stanza still scoreless. The first period ended in a 0-0 tie with Penn State's defense holding off three Cavalier shots in the first 15:00. Virginia got on the scoreboard first less than two minutes into the second quarter when Anzel Viljoen scored unassisted at the 16:54 mark to give the Cavaliers a 1-0 lead. The Penn State Nittany Lion field hockey team (0-3, 0-0 B1G), ranked No. 9 in the initial NFCA Coaches Poll, lost a tough game at No. 16 Delaware (4-0) in its third straight road game to open the 2019 season. Head coach Char Morett-Curtiss' squad scored first in the game but ended up on the wrong end of a 3-1 score in its third straight road game against a ranked foe.

The two teams traded possessions early in the first period with each team moving the ball deep into the other's territory to no avail. Barraco blocked a point-blank Maryland Shot at the 8:53 mark in the second period but the Terrapins took the lead off the rebound, with Madison Maguire finding the back of the goal to give the home team a 1-0 lead. The Terrapins added a second goal six minutes later, with Bodil Keus scoring with just 2:28 to play to send Maryland into intermission leading 2-0. Maryland outshot Penn State 7-2 in the first half and had four corners to two for the Nittany Lions. Each goalie (Barraco and Frost) had one save.

The Terrapins controlled the action early in the third, forcing a couple penalty corners just under five minutes in to the second half. Barraco made a nice save on a high shot on the second UM corner and the game continued with Penn State down by two. Maryland added to its lead with a Mayv Clune goal off a penalty corner midway through the third period to give the Terrapins a 3-0 lead. Barraco made a solid kick save on a hard Maryland shot as the third period wound down but Maryland's offensive pressure forced a corner at the 1:08 mark. Penn State's defense kept UM from adding to its lead and the game moved to the fourth period with the Lions trailing by three. The Penn State Nittany Lion field hockey team (0-7, 0-1 B1G) dropped an overtime thriller to California (2-5) in a non-conference game on Thursday night in Lancaster, Pa. Penn State had a two-goal lead earlier in the game, but Cal got the final goal in extra time for the 4-3 victory in a game played at Spooky Nook. The Nittany Lions and Bears battled through an even first period, with Penn State keeping the ball on the Cal side of the field for the first part of the opening stanza. The Penn State Nittany Lion field hockey team (1-7, 0-1 B1G) beat visiting Villanova (3-5) in an intra-state non-conference battle on Sunday. The Nittany Lions scored four goals in each half to post a convincing 8-2 win at the Penn State Field Hockey Complex. Sophomore Anna Simon (Hanau, Germany) scored all three goals in Penn State's 3-1 win in Bloomington. The Penn State Nittany Lion field hockey team (3-8, 2-1 B1G) toppled No. 8 Northwestern (10-5, 3-2 B1G) in a Big Ten battle Friday night at the Penn State Field Hockey Complex. Nittany Lion sophomore Anna Simon (Hanau, Germany) scored the game-winning goal in the second overtime to give Penn State the 3-2 (2OT) victory.

Penn State's defense fought back solid early pressure from Northwestern's offense and then worked the ball down to the Northwestern circle and forced the game's first penalty corner at the 11:34 mark. The Lion shot went wide and action resumed scoreless. Northwestern got its first shot off at the 6:38 mark and Lion goalie Brie Barraco (Allentown, Pa.) knocked it back. The Penn State Nittany Lion field hockey team (3-9, 2-2 B1G) fell victim to a fourth quarter surge by No. 6 Iowa (10-3, 4-1 B1G) in Big Ten action on Sunday at the Penn State Field Hockey Complex. The Hawkeyes scored two fourth period goals to break open a close game and post a 4-1 win over the home-standing Nittany Lions.

Iowa had the game's first deep offensive push but the Lion defense was able to keep the Hawkeyes out of goal in the opening minutes. Penn State then moved the ball down to the Iowa circle but the Hawkeyes were equal to the task and the game moved below the 11:00 mark of the first period scoreless. Penn State's offense continued to press, forcing the Hawkeyes into defense for the next five minutes. The Lions were unable to break through for a shot on goal and Iowa regained possession. Penn State took the game's first penalty corner at the 4:19 mark but could not convert. Iowa had a point blank shot knocked away by Penn State goalie Brie Barraco (Allentown, Pa.) as the 2:00 mark and the first period ended in a scoreless tie. The teams traded possessions to start the second period. Neither team was able to get off a shot during the first five minutes of the period. Penn State had the period's first shot, but the quick effort looped over the Iowa goal and the game continued past the 7:00 mark tied 0-0. Each team worked for control over the next few minutes but it was the Hawkeyes who found the cage first. Penn State got hit with a green card at the 2:05 mark and the Hawkeyes quickly moved the ball downfield. The fast break ended with Iowa's Maddy Murphy feeding Ciara Smith with a pass that Smith knocked into the cage at with 1:45 left to play in the half. Iowa carried the 1-0 lead into the third period.

Iowa outshot Penn State 4-2 in the first half and Penn State had the opening 30 minutes' only penalty corner. Lion goalie Barraco had two saves while Iowa's Leslie Speight had none.

Penn State came out aggressively in the third period, taking control of possession and quickly moving the ball into the Iowa circle. The Lion push led to a penalty corner that the Lions converted. Alexis Horst (Port Trevorton, Pa.) took the corner and Paityn Wirth (Thompsonstown, Pa.) took a hard shot towards the cage. Lion junior Abby Myers (Hartland, Wis.) redirected the shot past Speight and Penn State tied the game 1-1 less than two minutes into the third quarter. Iowa retook the lead midway through the period, getting a penalty stroke goal from Lokke Stribos at the 6:41 mark to retake the lead, 2-1. Penn State was hit with a 10:00 yellow on the stroke and a subsequent 5:00 yellow a bit later and trailed by one after three periods. Iowa extended its lead less than a minute in to the fourth quarter when Murphy scored off an Ellie Holley assists to give Iowa a 3-1 lead. Penn State responded with a quick possession but Iowa was able to retake control of the ball and move it down to the Lion circle. The Lion defense held off the Hawkeye push and Penn State trailed by two as the clock moved below the 9:00 mark. Iowa picked up another goal on a penalty corner as Anthe Nijziel scored at the 5:28 mark to put the Hawkeyes up 4-1. Iowa's defense was able to withstand a late Lion charge and the Hawkeyes posted the 4-1 victory.

"You cannot waste shots inside the circle against a good defense and Iowa has a strong defense," said head coach Char Morett-Curtiss. "We have to be more skilled when we have possession to eliminate those mistakes." The Hawkeyes owned an 11-6 edge in shots in the game. The two teams combined for only three total penalty corners, Penn State taking two, Iowa one. Lion keeper Barraco had five saves while Speight had one for Iowa.

The Penn State Nittany Lion field hockey team (4-9, 3-2 B1G) took care of homestanding Michigan State (6-8, 0-5 B1G) in a Big Ten road game in East Lansing. The Nittany Lions led by one at the half and doubled that lead in the second half to roll to a 3-1 victory over the Spartans. Penn State opened the game by taking control of the ball right away and moving the ball down into the Spartan circle and picking up a penalty corner less than a minute into the game. Penn State's hard shot off the corner was blocked by Michigan State goalie Jade Arundell to keep the game scoreless early. Arundell made another save on a Penn State breakaway a minute later and the Spartans took control of the ball. Penn State was able to defend MSU's first venture into the Lion circle 5:00 into the opening period. Arundell made a good save on a nice shot by Meghan Reese (Coopersburg, Pa.) midway through the period to keep the game scoreless. The teams traded possessions in the middle of the field for the last half of the first period. Michigan State got off a close shot in the final minute by Lion keeper Brie Barraco (Allentown, Pa.) made a nice save against the first Spartan shot. The Penn State Nittany Lion field hockey team (6-11, 4-4 B1G) took care of visiting Rutgers (10-7, 4-4 B1G) in the regular season finale for both teams Sunday. Abby Myers (Hartland, Wis.) led the Lion offense in a 2-1 Big Ten victory on Senior Day for Penn State. Penn State controlled the action early, keeping the ball down on the Rutgers side of the field for the first two minutes. Senior Madison Morano (Hammonont, N.J.) stole the ball after the Knights tried to move forward on a fast break and Penn State continued to press the Rutgers defense as the clock moved to the 11:00 mark. Abby Myers (Hartland, Wis.) had a fast break stopped by RU keeper Gianna Glatz and the game continued scoreless with 9:00 on the clock. Rutgers was able to gain possession with 7:00 left but Penn State's defense, anchored by Madison Hutson (Gloucester Point, Va.), held firm with 5:00 left in the opening period. With 2:49 left, Myers pushed the ball into the Rutgers circle and forced the first penalty corner of the game. Myers then knocked in a rebound after the initial corner to score unassisted at the 2:37 mark to give the Nittany Lions a 1-0 lead. Freshman Elena Vos (Grave, The Netherlands) blocked a late Rutgers shot and the Lions led by one after one period. Penn State continued to dominant possession as the second period started. Alexis Horst (Port Trevorton, Pa.) had a close shot saved by Glatz that led to a second Lion corner. Glatz made a save on the Lion shot and Rutgers worked to move the ball down to Penn State's side of the field. Penn State's defense was able to keep the Knights from pushing possession into the circle and the game continued to the 9:00 mark with the Lions leading by one. Penn State continued to frustrate the Knight offense as the second period moved to the final 5:00 of the half. Rutgers made a brief appearance in the Penn State circle with 3:20 in the half, but Anna Simon (Hanau, Germany) and the Lion defense was able to stand firm. Rutgers was able to work the ball into the circle with 2:50 left and pick up its first corner of the opening half. Lion keeper Brie Barraco (Allentown, Pa.) made a nice save to keep Penn State on top. Penn State outshot Rutgers 4-2 in the first half and had two corners to one for the Scarlet Knights. Barraco had one save for the Nittany Lions while Glatz had two for RU.

Rutgers came out looking to set a faster tempo and Penn State immediately got called for a green card. The Lion defense was able to kill off the card with Barraco making a diving save at the 11:20 mark after a scramble in the Lion circle. Rutgers continued to control possession as the clock moved below the 7:30 mark and the Knights picked up a corner with 7:20 on the clock. Penn State blocked the first corner, but RU got a second corner off the shot and Clayre Smith scored off a rebound to tie the game at the 7:05 mark. Penn State called for a review of the goal but the goal was confirmed and action moved on in the third period tied 1-1. Rutgers got hit with a green card with 3:30 to play in the period but was able to keep possession for the bulk of the penalty and the game moved to the fourth period tied 1-1. Vos was able to stop an early fourth period Rutgers fast break and Penn State tried to regain control of possession as the clock moved to the 12:30 mark. Rutgers regained possession and pushed the ball down to the Lion side of the field. With the tie game hitting the 11:03 mark, Rutgers called for a review on a scramble in front of the Lion cage and won the review, getting a penalty corner. Barraco made a high save on the corner and the Nittany Lions regained possession. The teams traded possession as time ticked down



below 6:00 to play. Rutgers' Tayla Parkes moved the ball into the Lion circle with 5:52 left, forcing a penalty corner. Barraco made a save on the first shot and a second Knight shot went wide. Penn State quickly pushed the ball down to the RU circle. Myers made a slick diving pass across the cage to freshman Jemma Punch (McDowall, Australia), who knocked in the goal with 4:28 to play, giving Penn State a 2-1 lead. A minute later, RU's Parkes had a shot hit the Lion post and Penn State continued to lead as the clock moved to the 2:00 mark. Penn State's defense was able to hold off a final Rutgers charge and the Nittany Lions grabbed an impressive 2-1 victory. "This was a game of two halves," said head coach Char Morett-Curtiss. "We really did a good job of dominating the first half but Rutgers controlled the second half. Abby Myers first half goal was outstanding and her effort on the diving pass for Jemma's goal in the fourth was so clutch. It is nice to get a win on Senior Day. I just want to thank this group of seniors for all of their efforts. They mean so much to this program and this week they really did an outstanding job of getting their teammates ready to play and it paid off for us." Rutgers outshot Penn State 11-6, including a 9-2 edge in the second half. The Knights had a 5-2 margin in comers as well. Barraco had five saves to help anchor the Lion defense while Glatz had two for the Scarlet Knights.
