LOOKING AHEAD » No. 5 Stanford opens its season on the road when it heads east to play at Penn State on Friday, August 30 (4 p.m. PT) and No. 3 Akron on Monday, September 2 (4 p.m. PT). Friday's contest in University Park, Pa. will be broadcast on BTN+ while ESPN+ will have the top-five showdown on Labor Day.

2018 REWIND » Stanford went 12-4-5 overall in 2018, won its record fifth consecutive conference championship and advanced to the quarterfinal round of the NCAA Tournament for the fourth year in a row. The Cardinal hosted its first quarterfinal at home since 2002 and after battling back from 2-0 down to tie the match against Akron in the 68th minute, Colin Biros scored the winner for the Zips in the 81st to deny Stanford its bid for a fourth consecutive national title. Its active stretch of six consecutive postseason berths is tied for the longest in Stanford history with a six-year run from 1997 to 2002.

HALF DECADE OF DOMINANCE » The nation's most successful collegiate men's soccer program over the last five seasons, Stanford has won three of the last four NCAA titles, five consecutive Pac-12 championships and posted a 77-14-18 (.789) overall record since 2014.

STANFORD-PENN STATE SERIES » Friday will be the second meeting between Stanford and Penn State. The Cardinal opened the season after its first national championship with a scoreless draw against the Nittany Lions at Cagan Stadium on Aug. 26, 2016 in which Cardinal goalkeeper Andrew Epstein was only forced to make one, 94th-minute save.

STANFORD-AKRON SERIES » Stanford is 1-3-1 all-time against the Zips and the two have met in the postseason in three of the previous four years. Akron's 3-2 victory on The Farm last season snapped Stanford's 17-match postseason unbeaten streak and was the program's first tournament defeat in 1,469 days, since losing in the second round to UC Irvine, 1-0, on Nov. 23, 2014. Marcel Zajac's goal in the 15th minute was the first postseason goal Stanford had allowed since Dec. 5, 2015 at Wake Forest and ended the program's NCAA-record tournament shutout streak at 1,428:09. The result was also the Cardinal's first loss under Jeremy Gunn when scoring at least two goals and first since Nov. 11, 2010 when it fell 3-2 at Cal. Stanford had been 69-0-7 when scoring two or more since Gunn arrived in 2012.

BEFORE LAST SEASON » Andrew Epstein saved the 10th Akron penalty kick following a scoreless draw in a 2015 semifinal and Stanford beat Akron, 8-7, in a shootout in Kansas City. The two played in another semifinal in Dec. 2017 in Philadelphia, with the Cardinal winning 2-0 behind goals from Foster Langsdorf (26') and Sam Werner (79'). Before the 2015 semifinal, Akron won a third-round match at home on Nov. 29, 2009, 2-0, behind goals from Teal Burnbury (29') and Anthony Amaipitakwong (37'). The first Stanford/Akron match came on Oct. 2, 1994, a 4-3 win for the Zips at the Reebok/Cardinal Classic on The Farm.

AGAINST RANKED » Stanford is 30-15-8 all-time against ranked opponents under Jeremy Gunn, including 23-3-6 in its last 32.

CHAMPIONSHIP PEDIGREE » Stanford is one of just two programs to win three straight NCAA titles (2015-17). Virginia won four in a row from 1991-94. It is also one of seven to win at least three national championships along with Saint Louis (10), Indiana (8), Virginia (7), San Francisco (4), UCLA (4) and Maryland (4). Stanford went 52-7-10 (.826) during its three-year championship run.

MAKE IT FIVE » Stanford won its fifth consecutive outright conference championship last season, a Pac-12 record, and sixth overall. Its 2018 conference title now sits on the mantle alongside championships from 2017, 2016, 2015, 2014 and 2001. The Cardinal's league record during its five-year run is 37-5-8. Jeremy Gunn is the only coach in league history to win more than two consecutive Pac-12 titles.

GREAT UNDER GUNN » One of four coaches to win NCAA titles in both Division I and Division II, head coach Jeremy Gunn has led a team to the College Cup final four times in the past eight seasons. He and Virginia's Bruce Arena (1991-94) are the only coaches to win three consecutive NCAA men's soccer championships. His teams are 96-29-23 (.726) in his seven seasons on The Farm and he owns a career record of 283-90-54 (.726) in 20 seasons, a mark which makes him the fourth winningest active coach at the Division I level (by percentage). Akron's coach, Jared Embick, is fifth on that list (.711).

BEASON BACK » Redshirt senior Tanner Beason is back for his fifth and final year on The Farm in 2019 and is on the MAC Hermann Trophy watch list and Top Drawer Soccer Preseason Best XI first team in addition to the Preseason All-Pac-12 team. A central defender by trade, he led the Pac-12 in both goals (6) and points (15) in conference matches, had career-high totals of eight goals and five assists and was a semifinalist for the MAC Hermann Trophy last season. Beason also joined an exclusive list of Stanford first team All-Americans that includes Foster Langsdorf (2017), Tomas Hilliard-Arce (2016, 2017), Jordan Morris (2014, 2015), Brandon Vincent (2014, 2015), Bobby Warshaw (2009), Todd Dunivant (2002), Lee Morrison (2001), Ryan Nelsen (2000) and Jamie Clark (1998).

LEADING THE PAC » Beason was named Pac-12 Player of the Year and Defensive Player of the Year in 2018, becoming the first in conference history to receive both honors. The Pac-12's top defensive honor has been dominated by the Cardinal since it was first instituted in 2014 with Brandon Vincent (2014, 2015) and Tomas Hilliard-Arce (2016, 2017) each winning twice prior to Beason.

FRESHMAN FORWARD » Redshirt sophomore striker Zach Ryan led Stanford with 10 goals to go with three assists in his first season of action in 2018. He was second in the conference in both scoring and points (23) and put in more goals than any Cardinal freshman since Jorge Titingier had 12 in 1980. He's on the Pre-season All-Pac-12 team along with Beason, Logan Panchot and Andrew Thomas.

FIRST YEAR IN GOAL » Another redshirt sophomore, Andrew Thomas had a superb first season in goal for the Cardinal, which finished eighth in the nation in team goals against average (0.625) a year ago. Thomas was ninth individually in that category with a conference-leading 0.626 goals against average and also was third in the country in save percentage (.854), sixth in solo shutouts (11) and 13th in total saves (82). This summer, Thomas was called for a combined preparation camp with players from the United States' Senior and U-23 Men's National Teams from May 26-June 2 in Annapolis, Md. and also participated in a U-23 training camp in Herriman, Utah from June 9-16. An engineering physics major raised in London, he was born in Moscow and holds triple citizenship (United Kingdom, United States, Russia). Thomas is on the Top Drawer Soccer Preseason Best XI second team.

NEW FACES » Stanford welcomes in the nation's third-ranked recruiting class according to Top Drawer Soccer. Among the new faces is Ousseni Bouda, who is on the publication's Preseason Freshman Best XI. The 2018-19 USA TODAY ALL-USA Boys Soccer Player of the Year and 2017-18 Gatorade National Boys Soccer Player of The Year, Bouda is from Burkina Faso and spent four years at the Right to Dream Academy in Ghana before enrolling at Millbrook School in New York. He speaks four languages - French, English, Mossi (Burkina Faso) and Twi (Ghana) - and learned English in three months.

PRESEASON POLLS » In preseason polling, Stanford is No. 5 in the United Soccer Coaches rankings, No. 4 according to Top Drawer Soccer and No. 5 according to College Soccer News. The Cardinal was also the pick in the Pac-12 when the conference announced its preseason coaches poll. Stanford, which collected all five available first-place votes, totaled 25 points. Washington was second with 19 points and followed by Oregon State (17), which picked up the remaining first-place vote. California (13), UCLA (11) and San Diego State (5) rounded out the poll.

STAFF CHANGES » Gunn added Shane Carew and Ben Moane to his coaching staff over the summer, joining fourth-year associate head coach Oige Kennedy. Carew, who had spent the past two seasons as head coach at Cal State Monterey Bay, will serve as an assistant while Moane arrives on The Farm to fill the role of volunteer assistant. He was most recently the head coach of the Boston Bolts' U19 and U17 U.S. Soccer Development Academy teams and served as the organization's Director of Goalkeeping.

DESTINATION STANFORD » In mid-July, Benfica used Cagan Stadium for training during its United States tour. The visit continued a trend of top national sides and clubs utilizing the unparalleled facilities and environment of Stanford for training. AC Milan used Stanford in the summer of 2018, Liverpool came during the summer of 2016 and the USMNT was on campus for camp before the 2014 FIFA World Cup and within the past six years Stanford has also hosted Manchester United, Italian giant Juventus and English side Norwich City.

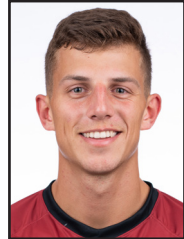
