Wolverines and Nittany Lions

This will be the 24th meeting between Michigan and Penn State. The Wolverines have a 14-9 advantage in the all-time series, with an 8-3 record at Michigan Stadium and a 6-6 mark at Beaver Stadium.

Michigan vs. Penn State at Michigan Stadium

This will be the 12th game played between the two schools at Michigan Stadium. The Wolverines have compiled an 8-3 record against the Nittany Lions at the Big House, which includes victories in the past three match-ups. U-M defeated PSU, 42-7, during the 2018 season.

Wolverines from Pennsylvania

Michigan has three student-athletes from the state of Pennsylvania: junior offensive lineman Kraig Correll (Easton), freshman running back Gaige Garcia (Catawissa) and senior defensive lineman Donovan Jeter (Beaver Falls).

141st Season of Michigan Football

The 2020 season marks the 141st in Michigan Football history. The Wolverines have an NCAA-leading 964 victories, claimed 42 Big Ten Championships and won 11 national titles since the inception of the program in 1879.

THE TEAM

Series History with Penn State

- This will be the 24th meeting between Michigan and Penn State
- The Wolverines lead the all-time series, 14-9, and have a 2-0 record against the Nittany Lions at Michigan Stadium under coach Jim Harbaugh
- The Wolverines have claimed victory in three of the five games under Harbaugh's leadership
- Michigan has a 6-3 advantage in games decided by seven points or less, and has a 2-1 mark in games decided by three or fewer points

Michigan vs. Penn State at Michigan Stadium

- Michigan has compiled an 8-3 record against the Nittany Lions at Michigan Stadium
- The Wolverines maintained a five-game win streak at home against Penn State between 1998 and 2007
- U-M won the last three games played at Michigan Stadium
- This will be Jim Harbaugh's third game against PSU at the Big House, claiming a 49-10 victory in 2016 and a 42-7 win in 2018

U-M Connections with PSU / State of PA

- U-M's roster features three players from the state of Pennsylvania: OL Kraig Correll (Easton), RB Gaige Garcia (Catawissa) and DL Donovan Jeter (Beaver Falls)
- Michigan cornerbacks coach Mike Zordich was a four-year letterman (1982-85) for the Nittany Lions; earned All-America honors and was co-captain of the 1985 team
- Josh Gattis was the wide receivers coach and passing game coordinator at Penn State under James Franklin from 2014-17
- Don Brown was an assistant at Mansfield University in the state of Pennsylvania (1983)
- Brown was the defensive coordinator at the University of Maryland from 2009-10, overlapping with Penn State head coach James Franklin

U-M Unranked in Top 25 of National Polls

- The Michigan football team enters the Penn State game unranked in the top 25 of the national polls for the third week in a row and first time since the end of the 2017 season
- Michigan finished the 2019 season listed No. 18 (AP) and No. 19 (coaches) in the final polls; 14th in the College Football Playoff rankings
- The Wolverines had been ranked in the national polls for 31 straight games dating back to the start of the 2018 season (2018 through 2020 Indiana game)
- U-M has been ranked for all but 11 contests during Coach Harbaugh's tenure (60 of 71

games); first four games in 2015, four games in 2017 and the Wisconsin, Rutgers and Penn State games this season

- Over the last six seasons (2015-20), Michigan has faced more teams that have finished in the top 15 of the national polls (17) than any other program; the next closest is Penn State and Ohio State with 12 each
- Michigan faced six top 15 ranked opponents during the 2019 season

Schedule Notes

- The eight-game Big Ten schedule is the third version of the 2020 schedule for U-M this fall
- This is the first time in school history that Michigan will play only conference games
- The four home games are the fewest for the Wolverines at Michigan Stadium since a four-game slate in 1940
- Michigan has faced three ranked opponents this fall: #21 Minnesota, #13 Indiana and #13 Wisconsin
- U-M will face four teams listed in the preseason AP ranking: #2 Ohio State, #7 Penn State, #12 Wisconsin and #19 Minnesota
- The Wolverines opened the season with a pair of a trophy games on the line; defeated Minnesota 49-24 to retain the Little Brown Jug (Oct. 24) but lost to Michigan State, 27-24, on Halloween in the Battle for the Paul Bunyan Trophy (Oct. 31)
- Four of U-M's eight opponents won 10-plus games in 2019: Ohio State (13-1), Minnesota (11-2), Penn State (11-2) and Wisconsin (10-4)
- Six of the eight foes played in bowl games last year: Minnesota (Outback), Michigan State (PinStripe), Indiana (Gator), Wisconsin (Rose), Penn State (Cotton) and Ohio State (CFP/Fiesta)
- The combined 2019 record of Michigan's eight opponents is 65-40 (.619)

Michigan in Big Ten Action

- U-M has a 2-3 record in the Big Ten this season, defeating Minnesota and Rutgers while losing to Michigan State, Indiana and Wisconsin
- The Wolverines are 0-2 at home and 2-1 on the road this fall in conference play
- Michigan has a 34-15 mark in Big Ten action under sixth-year head coach Jim Harbaugh
- The Wolverines have a 17-7 record at home in Big Ten play under Harbaugh and have a 17-8 mark on the road
- U-M has compiled a 519-214-18 record all-time in Big Ten action

The Team under Coach Harbaugh

- Michigan has won 10 games in three of Harbaugh's tenure leading the program
- The Wolverines have won 49 games during Coach Harbaugh's six seasons (49-21)
- U-M has scored 282 touchdowns while allowing just 161 to its opponents during that stretch
- The Wolverine defense has listed in the top 12 nationally all five seasons, including four of those years ranking among the top 5
- A total of 63 Wolverines have earned All-Big Ten honors (1st, 2nd or 3rd team) in the past five years, including eight players in 2015, 16 in 2016, nine in 2017 and 15 in both 2018 and 2019

- Five players earned first-team All-America honors: Jake Butt (2015-16), Jourdan Lewis (2015-16), Jabrill Peppers (2016), Maurice Hurst (2017) and Devin Bush (2018)
- Butt and Peppers each collected a pair of national awards during the 2016 season: Butt won the Mackey Award and Senior CLASS Award while Peppers collected the Lott IMPACT Trophy and the Paul Hornung Award
- Additionally, three players have been named finalists for national awards in Harbaugh's five seasons: Jabrill Peppers (Lombardi, 2016/Bednarik, 2016), Jourdan Lewis (Thorpe, 2016) Devin Bush (Butkus, 2017 and 2018/Bronko Nagurski, 2018)

Michigan at Home in the Harbaugh Era

- The Wolverines have compiled a 30-7 home record in six seasons under Jim Harbaugh
- Michigan has an 17-7 mark in Big Ten games at the Big House under Harbaugh's leadership
- The Wolverines have gone undefeated twice; posted a 7-0 mark in 2018 and an 8-0 mark in 2016
- U-M had a 10-game home winning streak snapped against Michigan State in 2017 and a 13-game streak snapped by Ohio State in 2019
- The only setbacks in Big Ten home games came in losses to rivals Michigan State and Ohio State and Wisconsin (2020)
- The Wolverines are a perfect 13-0 in non-conference games under Harbaugh at the Big House, outscoring the opposition by a 521-165 margin in those games

THE OFFENSE

Offensive Production in 2020

- Michigan is averaging 401.2 yards per game of total offense
- The offense is averaging 123.2 yards in the rushing game and is passing the ball for 278.0 yards per contest; U-M is fifth in the conference and 29th nationally in passing offense
- The Wolverines have gained over 450 yards in three games: Rutgers (495), Minnesota (481) and Michigan State (452)
- The offense has turned the ball over five times this season, the fewest of any team in the Big Ten and 24th in the NCAA
- U-M has lost one fumble and thrown four interceptions; the one fumble leads the Big Ten and is ninth nationally
- U-M is converting 35.5 percent of its third down opportunities (23-63)
- The offense ranks 32nd nationally in fewest sacks allowed (1.6 avg.) and is 29th in tackles for loss (4.8 avg.)

The 2020 Offense

- U-M returned five starters from 2019: WR Ronnie Bell, RB Zach Charbonnet, TE Nick Eubanks, RB Hassan Haskins and RT Jalen Mayfield
- A total of eight players have carried the ball in a collegiate game: RBs Charbonnet, Haskins, Chris Evans, Christian Turner and Blake Corum; WRs Ronnie Bell, Giles Jackson and A.J. Henning; TE Ben Mason, and QB Joe Milton
- Eight Wolverines have scored rushing touchdowns in their career, combining for 51 touchdowns, led by 15 from Evans and 13 from Charbonnet
- Other returners with rushing scores are: Mason (9), Haskins (8), Milton (3), Corum (2), Jackson, Turner and Ben VanSumeren with one apiece
- Milton and Cade McNamara are the only quarterback on the roster with game experience; Milton has appeared in 13 contests while McNamara has played in three games

- Joe Milton and Cade McNamara are the quarterbacks on the roster that has taken snaps in a collegiate game
- Michigan entered the season as one of 17 FBS programs without a quarterback on the roster that has started a collegiate game
- Milton has reached the end zone through the air and on the ground, accounting for eight total touchdowns (5 passing/3 rushing)
- Milton has thrown four touchdown passes this season, including a season-high three TDs at Indiana, with his only other passing score coming to Giles Jackson against Rutgers in 2019
- Milton reached the end zone three times with his feet, finding paydirt at Ohio State (2018), against Rutgers (2019) and at Minnesota (2020)
- Milton has 148 rushing yards on 47 carries during his career

Joe Milton

- Made first career start at Minnesota, gaining 277 yards of offense with two scores; rushed 8 times for 52 yards and one TD and completed 15-22 passes for 225 yards and one TD
- Played in four games during the 2019 season, passing for 59 yards and rushing for 16 yards; scored a rushing and passing TD
- Completed 3-of-4 passes for 59 yards and one touchdown against Rutgers while rushing for a score; tossed his first career passing TD on a 23-yard pass to Giles Jackson

U-M'S OFFENSE UNDER HARBAUGH

- U-M has gained more than 5,000 yards of total offense in four of Coach Harbaugh's five seasons: 5,147 yards (2015), 5,524 (2016), 5,457 (2018) and 5,220 (2019)
- Two of the three players in school history to pass for more than 3,000 yards in a season have played during Harbaugh's coaching tenure: Jake Rudock (3,017 in 2015) and Shea Patterson (3,061 in 2019); school record is 3,331 yards by John Navarre in 2003
- The offense has generated two of the top five total offensive seasons in school history: 4th in 2016 with 5,524 yards and fifth in 2018 with 5,457 yards
- The Wolverines have posted 2,282 points in 70 games for an average of 32.6 points per contest
- Scored more points in 2016 than any team in the modern era of U-M football and trailed only the Point-a-Minute teams of the early 1900s; tallied the fifth-highest point total (524) in school history during the 2016 season
- Michigan gained more than 2,000 rushing yards in four of the five seasons under Harbaugh: 2,057 yards (2015), 2,768 (2016), 2,310 (2017) and 2,653 (2018); finished with 1,959 yards in 2019
- The red zone offense has converted at just under 90% in six seasons, 262-302 (86.8%); scored 190 TDs in those 262 conversions (72.5% of scores are TDs)
- U-M has ranked in the top 15 nationally in red zone efficiency twice: 13th (2016) and 7th (2015)
- Converted 41.2% percent of third down chances (408-991) in Harbaugh's six seasons, including 40% or better in three of those seasons: 49.4% (2018), 43% (2016) and 49% (2015)
- U-M has scored 155 rushing TDs in six seasons: 9 in 2020, 26 in 2019, 26 in 2018, 26 in 2017, 41 in 2016 and 27 in 2015
- Michigan is a perfect 27-0 under Harbaugh when a player gains 100 yards rushing and is 42-5 when out-rushing the opposition
- U-M is 43-4 under Jim Harbaugh when gaining 125 rushing yards or more in a game
- The Wolverines have lost 37 fumbles in 70 games: six (2015), five (2016), 11 (2017), three (2018), 11 (2019) and 1 (2020)

A REVIEW OF THE 2019 OFFENSE

- U-M scored 38 points or more in four straight games and in five of the final eight contests
- Michigan faced seven of the top 30 total defenses last season, including four of the top 10 scoring defenses: #2 Ohio State, #8 Wisconsin, #12 Iowa, #17 Alabama, #18 Michigan State, #21 Notre Dame, #23 Penn State and #29 Army
- Finished the regular season ranked 19th in the SP+ Rankings, which is a measure of offensive efficiency taking into account pace of play and strength of opponent
- The offense produced 51 TDs in 2019 with a balanced ledger: 26 rushing touchdowns and 25 passing scores
- U-M registered multiple touchdowns in seven games; posted a season-high five passing scores at Indiana, four TDs vs. Michigan State and three TDs, three times
- Michigan scored on the ground in 10 games with multiple rushing touchdowns in eight, including a season-best five rushing touchdowns vs. Rutgers
- The Wolverines had three rushing TDs vs. Army and scored three per contest during a four game stretch against Illinois, Penn State, Notre Dame and Maryland
- Nine players accounted for 26 rushing TDs in 2019, led by Zach Charbonnet (11), Shea Patterson (5) and Hassan Haskins (4)
- 10 different players totaled 25 receiving touchdowns, led by Nico Collins (7) and Donovan Peoples-Jones (6); tight ends Nick Eubanks (4) and Sean McKeon (2) finished third and fourth on the team in receiving scores
- The Wolverines' passing game generated 1,288 yards and 11 TDs in the final four games of the 2019 season (322 yards per game)
- U-M threw for over 300 yards in three straight weeks, gaining a season-high 384 passing yards vs. Michigan State, 366 yards at Indiana and 305 vs. Ohio State
- The passing game produced five receivers with 25 or more receptions
- The offense rushed the ball for 1,959 yards on 495 carries (150.7 avg.)
- The Wolverines ran the ball for 225-plus yards in three games - 233 vs. Middle Tennessee, 295 at Illinois and 303 vs. Notre Dame - and surpassed the 100-yard mark in nine contests
- Michigan had 894 rushing yards in a four-game stretch from Illinois through the Maryland games (223.5 avg.); scored three rushing touchdowns in each of those four contests
- U-M distributed 26 rushing touchdowns between nine different ball carriers
- Michigan reached 5,000 yards of total offense for the fifth straight season under head coach Jim Harbaugh
- The offense produced 400 yards of total offense in seven games, including five of the last eight contests
- U-M fell just short of the 400-yard mark against Ohio State (396), which was the most yards yielded by the Buckeyes all season, and against Alabama in the Citrus Bowl (395)
- The Wolverines had 5,220 yards on 905 offensive plays for a 401.5-yard average per game and an average of 5.8 yards per play
- U-M outscored the opposition by a 191-112 margin in the second half after holding a 211 to 150 edge in points during the first half; also held a 10-7 advantage in overtime
- Four opponent were held scoreless in the second half - Army, Rutgers, Iowa and Indiana - and the Wolverines yielded only 57 points in the fourth quarter on the year

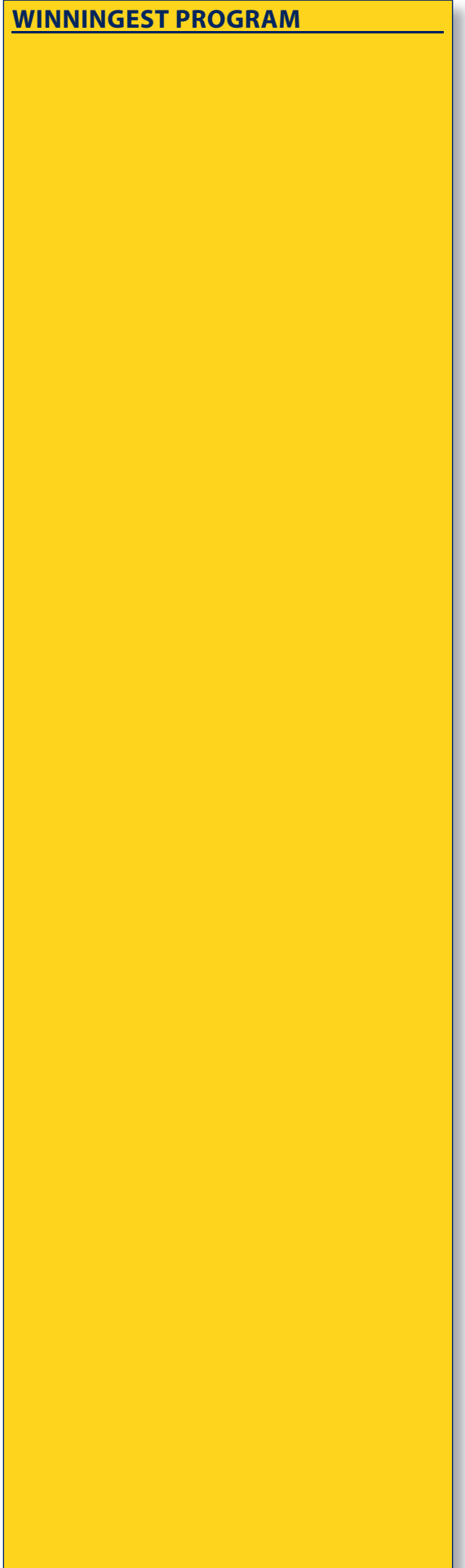

THE DEFENSE

The 2020 Defense

- U-M returned five starters on defense, including three players along the defensive line: Aidan Hutchinson, Carlo Kemp, Kwity Paye, along with LB Cam McGrone and DB Brad Hawkins
- DB Daxton Hill (2) and LB Josh Ross (1) are the only players on the roster with an interception in their career
- Nine different players have recorded a pass breakup in their careers; CBs Vincent Gray and Gemon Green and S Daxton Hill lead the team with eight (8) PBUs each during their careers
- 10 players have collected at least one pass defended in their career: Gray (8), Green (8), Hill (8), Hutchinson (7), Hawkins (4), Josh Ross (3), Hinton (2), McGrone (1), Paye (1), and Jeter (1)
- A total of 15 Wolverine defenders have recorded stops in the opposition's backfield during their career; Kwity Paye (23.5) and Aidan Hutchinson (11.5) head the group
- The 14 players have combined to post 71.5 TFLs over their careers
- U-M's defense returns seven (7) players who have combined for 27.5 career sacks; Kwity Paye (8.5), Aidan Hutchinson (4.5) and Cam McGrone (4.5) lead the way
- Four different players have scooped up an opponent fumble in their career, led by Daxton Hill with two; Donovan Jeter, Kwity Paye and Carlo Kemp have one apiece
- Jeter has the team's lone defensive TD on a 15-yard fumble recovery at Minnesota this year
- Five players have double-digit starts in their career: Carlo Kemp (28), Kwity Paye (19), Aidan Hutchinson (16), Brad Hawkins (15) and Cam McGrone (15)
- DL Kwity Paye (second team, coaches), Aidan Hutchinson (third team, media), Carlo Kemp (third team, coaches), LB Josh Ross (honorable mention, coaches), and DB Brad Hawkins (honorable mention, media) are returning players with All-Big Ten recognition in their careers

Nation's Best Defense under Don Brown

- Don Brown has coached the nation's top defense twice in the past five seasons: 2015 at Boston College (254.3 avg.) and 2016 at Michigan; his defenses have ranked in the top four in four of the past five seasons
- The defense has held the opposition to less than 225 yards of total offense 18 times in 57 games under Brown
- The Wolverines have held 14 opponents under 200 yards of total offense the past five seasons
- U-M led the nation in pass defense during the 2016 and 2017 seasons, finished second in 2018 and was 10th in 2019
- In five seasons, 20 of 29 opponents have been held at or under 14 points at Michigan Stadium; only four teams have scored 28 points or more
- U-M listed in the top four nationally in six defensive categories during the 2016 and 2017 seasons (see chart below)
- The Wolverines have held 15 teams to less than 100 passing yards in a game, second only to Clemson for the most in the country since 2016

- Only 15 teams have exceeded 200 passing yards against U-M under Don Brown; held 42 of 57 opponents under 200 passing yards
- The Wolverines have allowed 9 or fewer completions in a game 17 times in 57 games
- U-M has held 26 of 57 opponents the last four years to under 100 yards rushing; the team has a 25-1 record when holding the opposition to less than 100 rushing yards
- Michigan has registered six or more tackles for loss in all but 18 games under Don Brown
- U-M has recorded at least one sack in 51 of 57 games under Brown
- The defense has batted down or intercepted 238 passes over the past five years (55 in 2016, 53 in 2017, 55 in 2018, 53 in 2019 and 22 in 2020)
- Since 1997, only three Michigan teams have had four or more players record double-digits in tackles for loss: 1999 and Don Brown's defenses in 2016 and 2017
- The sack totals in 2016 (46) and 2017 (42) rank behind only the school record 51 sacks registered during the 2001 season
- That same 2001 defense holds the school record with 123 tackles for loss; second and third on the list are the defenses in 2016 (118.5) and 2017 (114); the defense had 88 TFLs in 2018 and 79 in 2019
- U-M racked up 420 tackles for loss and 165 sacks since Brown's arrival prior to the 2016 season (57 games)
- U-M has recorded double-digit tackles for loss in 19 games since Don Brown became defensive coordinator
- 2016-17 marked the first time since the early 2000s that Michigan's defense has accumulated 100 or more TFLs in back-to-back seasons
- Brown was a finalist for the 2016 Broyles Award, presented to the nation's top assistant coach; was a semifinalist in 2018 and 2019

Stingy Pass Defense for 4 Straight Seasons

- Michigan has been the NCAA's most dominant pass defense the past four seasons
- U-M led the national rankings in pass defense during both the 2016 and 2017 seasons and finished No. 2 nationally (147.8 avg.) behind leader Miami, Fla. (135.6 avg.) in 2018
- The Wolverines ranked 10th in the NCAA in pass defense, allowing 185.5 yards per game during the 2019 season
- U-M became the first program to allow less than 2,000 passing yards in three straight seasons since Miami (Fla.) accomplished the feat during 2001-03 seasons: 1853 in 2016, 1951 in 2017 and 1843 in 2018

- The Wolverines also became the first team since those Hurricane squads to allow less than 50% completion in three straight seasons: 43.6% in 2016, 48.8% in 2017 and 49.4% in 2018
- Michigan has held 15 opponents to 100 passing yards or less over the past five seasons
- U-M allowed just 150.1 yards through the air in 2017, and was the nation's only defense to hold 11 opponents under 200 passing yards
- Michigan led the NCAA by yielding just 142.5 yards per game through the air in 2016; held five opponents to less than 100 passing yards
- Over the past five years, the defense has collected 45 interceptions while allowing just 64 passing touchdowns: 12 TDs, 2 Int. (2020), 16 TDs, 9 Int. (2019), 14 TDs, 11 Int. (2018), 11 TDs, 10 Int. (2017) and 11 TDs, 13 Int. (2016)
- 18 different players have registered at least one pick under Don Brown

DEFENSIVE LINE

- The defensive line returned three of the four starters from 2019: Carlo Kemp, Kwity Paye and Aidan Hutchinson
- Carlo Kemp leads the defensive line with 16 tackles apiece this season
- 11 defensive linemen have contributed stops this fall: Kemp, Hutchinson (15), Taylor Upshaw (14), Paye (12), Chris Hinton (11), Donovan Jeter (8), Julius Welschof (6), Luiji Vilain (4), Gabe Newburg (3), Mazi Smith (2) and Jess Speight (2)
- Paye (4.0), Kemp (3.0), Hinton (2.0), Upshaw (2.0) and Welschof (0.5) have collected the groups stops in the backfield; 5.5 of those 11.5 stops have been sacks
- Hinton (2) and Jeter (1) have the lines only pass breakup this season
- Jeter scored the groups only points on a 15-yard fumble recovery for a TD at Minnesota
- 11 defensive linemen have tallied tackles in their career: Aidan Hutchinson (99), Kwity Paye (96), Carlo Kemp (76), Chris Hinton (21), Taylor Upshaw (16), Luiji Vilain (11), Donovan Jeter (11), Jess Speight (7), Julius Welschof (6), Gabe Newburg (3) and Mazi Smith (2)
- Paye and Hutchinson are the only defensive linemen to lead the team in tackles in a game (both in 2019): Paye posted a career-best 11 stops at Penn State and Hutchinson equaled his career high with 10 stops vs. Ohio State
- The players in the front four have accumulated 51.0 tackles for loss in their careers, including 28.5 in 2019: Paye (16.5), Hutchinson (10.0), Kemp (7.5), Hinton (2.5), Upshaw (2.0), Vilain (1.0) and Welschof (0.5)
- 45 percent (23.0) of those career stops in the backfield have been sacks: Paye (11.5), Hutchinson (4.5), Kemp (4.5), Hinton (1.0), Vilain (1.0) and Welschof (0.5)
- Carlo Kemp (Illinois, 2019), Kwity Paye (Army, 2019) and Donovan Jeter (Minnesota, 2020) have collected the defensive lines fumble recoveries
- The defensive line has batted down 11 passes, led by Hutchinson with seven career breakups

Carlo Kemp

- Two-time captain (2019-20); one of 15 players to be selected captain twice in his career

- Three-time Academic All-Big Ten (2017-19)
- Three-year letterman; has appeared in 45 games along the defensive line
- Leads the Wolverines and the defense with 28 career starts
- Registered 76 tackles, 10.0 tackles for loss, 4.5 sacks and one fumble recovery in his career
- Contributed 16 tackles, 3.0 TFLs and 2.0 sacks this season; tied for the team lead in sacks
- Posted two stops vs. Wisconsin and three tackles at Rutgers; had a sack against the Badgers
- Contributed five tackles vs. Michigan State
- Two of his four stops at Minnesota were tackles for loss, including one sack
- 2019 All-Big Ten third team (coaches)
- Contributed a career-best 40 stops, 4.5 TFLs, 2.0 sacks and one fumble recovery in 12 starts in 2019; missed Citrus Bowl due to injury
- Registered four stops against Ohio State
- Posted a career-best 1.5 sacks and four tackles against Michigan State
- Made four stops against Notre Dame
- Tallied four solo tackles at Illinois, including a career-best two TFLs and one fumble recovery
- Set a career-high with nine tackles vs. Army
- Team's 2018 Most Improved Player on defense
- Contributed 17 tackles, 2.5 tackles for loss and an assisted sack in 2018
- Made first career start and assisted on one tackle vs. Western Michigan in 2018
- Played in all 13 games during the 2017 season, making three tackles
- Played defensive end against Colorado and Rutgers as a true freshman in 2016

Kwity Paye

- 2020 candidate for the Lott IMPACT Trophy, Bednarik Award and Bronko Nagurski Trophy
- Two-time Academic All-Big Ten (2018-19)
- Played in 37 career games with 19 starts at defensive end; posted 96 tackles, 23.5 TFLs, 11.5 sacks, one fumble recovery and one PBU
- Missed the two games due to injury
- Registered five tackles and one TFLs at Indiana
- Tallied three tackles against Michigan State
- Three of his four stops were in the backfield at Minnesota, including back-to-back sacks
- Shared 2019 Richard Katcher Award as team's top defensive lineman with Aidan Hutchinson
- 2019 All-Big Ten: second team (coaches) and third team (media)
- Led the team in TFLs (12.5) and listed second in sacks (6.5) during the 2019 season; contributed a career-high 50 stops and one fumble recovery
- Sixth in Big Ten play in TFLs (1.3 avg.) and tied for 10th in sacks (0.6 avg.)
- 14th in the Big Ten and 62nd nationally in sacks per game (0.54 avg.)
- Tallied 1.5 TFLs and six stops against Ohio State
- Recorded seven tackles at Maryland
- Posted a career-high 10 tackles and an assisted tackle for loss at Penn State
- Tallied 2.5 sacks and four total stops vs. Iowa
- Registered six tackles, 3.5 TFLs and 1.5 sacks against Rutgers; his 3.5 tackles for loss are the most in a game by a defensive lineman in Coach Harbaugh's five years as head coach
- Shared sack and recovered game-ending fumble against Army; had a then career-best seven stops

U-M'S DEFENSE UNDER HARBAUGH

- Don Brown has led Michigan's defense in five of Coach Harbaugh's six seasons
- Michigan has ranked in the top four nationally in total defense four of the six seasons: No. 4 in 2015, No. 1 in 2016, No. 3 in 2017 and No. 2 in 2018; finished 11th in 2019
- The Wolverines' pass defense has been among the nation's top three in four of the six seasons: No. 3 in 2015, No. 1 in 2016, No. 1 in 2017, No. 2 in 2018; ranked No. 10 in 2019
- U-M led the nation in pass efficiency defense in 2015, finished second in 2016, placed fourth in 2017 and ranked seventh in 2018
- The Wolverines have held 25 of their 70 opponents under Harbaugh to 10 points or less, including five shutouts
- Only 30 teams have managed to score 20 or more points vs. U-M
- U-M has scored 12 defensive touchdowns in six years: 1 in 2015, 3 in 2016, 3 in 2017, 4 in 2018 and 1 in 2020
- The defense has held the opposition to less than 100 rushing yards in 33 of the 70 games
- The Wolverines have posted 496 tackles for loss in 70 games (7.1 avg. per game): 18 in 2020, 79 in 2019, 76 in 2018, 114 in 2017, 121 in 2016 and 88 in 2015
- Quarterbacks have been sacked 198 times (2.83 avg.) in six seasons: 8 in 2020, 36 in 2019, 34 in 2018, 42 in 2017, 46 in 2016 and 32 in 2015
- Michigan led the nation in third down defense in consecutive seasons (2016-17); set a school record in 2016 by allowing the opponent to convert just 21 percent on third down and followed up by allowing the opposition to convert just 26.1 percent of its chances in 2017
- Only eight teams have converted more than six third-down chances against Michigan during Don Brown's tenure: Minnesota (2020), Wisconsin (2020), Rutgers (2020), Ohio State (2017, 2019), Notre Dame (2018), Indiana (2018) and Florida (2018)
- U-M has held 13 opponents with two or less third down conversions over the past six seasons
- Michigan has finished in the top five in three-and-outs forced twice in the past four seasons: first nationally in 2017 (83 in 162 series, 51.2%) and fourth in 2016 (73 in 164 possessions, 44.5%)

A REVIEW OF THE 2019 DEFENSE

- The maize and blue ranked among the top 25 nationally in eight defensive categories, including total defense (11th) and pass defense (10th)
 - Michigan allowed 16 passing touchdowns while yielding 20 rushing scores last fall
 - The defense forced a turnover or punt on 68.6 percent of opponent drives, the seventh highest percentage in the country
 - Only five 2019 offenses reached 300 total yards against the Wolverines
 - U-M limited eight opponents to less than 285 offensive yards: Army (243), Rutgers (152), Iowa (261), Illinois (256), Penn State (283), Notre Dame (180), Maryland (233) and Michigan State (220)
 - Michigan held five of its final 10 opponents to 65 rushing yards or fewer to close out the 2019 season; includes a string of three straight (Rutgers through Illinois); longest streak for a defense in Don Brown's four seasons at U-M
 - Overall, the Wolverines allowed fewer than 70 rushing yards to the opposition six times, which was tied for third-most among Power 5 teams
 - The defense was also effective in limiting big plays; allowed only 10 runs longer than 15 yards across the final 40 quarters of the year
 - U-M allowed just 3.18 yards per rush attempt, the lowest yards per rush since 2006
 - The Wolverines held the Illini to 64 rushing yards on 43 carries; this is the fewest yards allowed by a Michigan defense on 40-plus rushing attempts since 2008
 - The 180 yards of total offense gained by Notre Dame was its lowest since 2016 and its second-lowest yardage total in a decade
 - The Wolverines generated 79 tackles for loss and 36 sacks last season
 - U-M's 25 TFLs in back-to-back games against Iowa and Illinois tied for the most TFLs in back-to-back contests this decade – 2016 vs. Indiana and Ohio State
 - The defense recorded a sack in every game except the Citrus Bowl against Alabama
 - Michigan finished 10th nationally and third in the Big Ten in pass defense, allowing just 185.5 yards per contest
 - Five opponents were held to fewer than 135 passing yards – Army (43 yards), Rutgers (106), Wisconsin (128), Notre Dame (133) and Maryland (104) -- and eight were held under 200 yards
 - The defense accounted for nine interceptions while allowing 16 passing TDs; did not yield a passing TD in four straight games (Army through Iowa) and six contests overall
 - U-M had 53 passes defended on the year: 44 pass breakups and nine interceptions
 - The Wolverines' defense forced 17 turnovers in 2019: nine interceptions and eight fumbles; three additional fumbles were generated on special teams
 - U-M forced multiple turnovers in seven games, including five of the last nine contests
- The Wolverines list eighth in the Big Ten and 40th nationally with 20 total turnovers gained; forced at least one turnover in 10 games

- Played along the defensive line in all 13 games in 2018 and made four starts at defensive end: MSU, Wisconsin, Maryland and Florida

- Played in 29 career games and made 16 starts at defensive end
- Needs one tackle for 100 in his career; registered 99 tackles, 11.5 TFLs, 4.0 sacks, two forced fumbles and seven PBUs
- Injured on the first series and missed the remainder of the game at Indiana; will miss the remainder of the season after having surgery
- Led defensive line in stops in each of the first two games, posting seven tackles against Michigan State and recording eight stops and one PBU at Minnesota
- Shared 2019 Richard Katcher Award as team's top defensive lineman with Kwity Paye
- 2019 All-Big Ten: third team (media) and honorable mention (coaches)
- Surpassed his 2018 tackle total three games into his sophomore year
- Led the defensive line with 68 stops in 2019, including 10.0 TFLs, 4.5 sacks and six PBUs
- Started all 13 games at defensive end in 2019
- Tallied 1.5 TFLs among five stops vs. Alabama
- Matched career high with 10 tackles vs. Ohio State
- Posted seven tackles, one sack and one pass breakup at Indiana
- Tallied three tackles, one sack and a pass breakup at Maryland
- Contributed six tackles, 2.5 TFLs, one sack, one forced fumble and one PBU vs. Iowa; named Big Ten Defensive Player of the Week
- One of his two stops vs. Rutgers was a fourth-and-goal stop that preserved the shutout

- Played in seven contests along the defensive line in 2018, contributing three tackles
- Tallied one solo tackle against Florida in the Chick-fil-A Peach Bowl

- Assisted on one tackle against Maryland
- Saw first action at defensive line vs. WMU

Christopher Hinton

- Made five starts at defensive tackle and appeared in 17 career games
- Contributed 11 tackles, two tackles for loss, one sack and two pass breakups this season
- Two of his four stops were in the backfield at Rutgers, including his first career sack
- Posted three tackles and batted down one pass against both Indiana and Wisconsin
- Starting defensive tackle at Minnesota and against Michigan State; registered one solo tackle against the Spartans
- Appeared in 12 games as a true freshman during the 2019 season
- Made 10 tackles and an assisted TFL in 2019
- Started against Alabama in the Citrus Bowl, contributing one tackle
- Posted a career-best six tackles and an assisted TFL against Ohio State
- Assisted on a tackle vs. Michigan State and posted two assisted stops against Rutgers
- Made career debut vs. Middle Tennessee State
- Father, Chris, is a former NFL All-Pro offensive lineman and his mother, Mya, is a former Northwestern women's basketball standout

Taylor Upshaw

- Played in all five contests and started two games at defensive end
- Third among defensive linemen with 13 tackles and one tackle for loss this season
- Set career high with six stops, one TFL and one forced fumble at Rutgers

- Played defensive end against Michigan State
- Made one solo tackle as reserve defensive end at Minnesota
- Played in six games during the 2019 season, registering two solo tackles
- Posted one tackle against Maryland
- Made first career stop against Notre Dame, playing both defensive line and special teams
- Made career debut against Rutgers, playing snaps along the defensive line
- Father, Regan, played nine seasons in the NFL

Luiji Vilain

- Appeared in 12 career games, including all five this season
- Assisted on a tackle against Wisconsin
- Tied career high with three stops at Indiana
- Played defensive end vs. Minnesota, Michigan State and Rutgers

- Credited with a pair of solo tackles at Indiana

- Assisted on a tackle vs. Michigan State

- Missed the 2017 and 2018 seasons due to injuries sustained during fall camp each fall

- Saw playing time at Minnesota
- Appeared in seven 2019 games along the defensive line and made one start
- Started at defensive tackle against Alabama in the Citrus Bowl
- Posted a career-high five tackles at Indiana
- Co-recipient of the team's 2018 Scout Team Player of the Year on offense
- Made career debut on PAT/FG unit against Nebraska in 2018

Julius Welschhof

- Played in all five games this season; recorded six tackles and an assisted sack
- Made one solo tackle in the Wisconsin and Rutgers games
- Contributed two stops against Michigan State
- Assisted on two tackles, including a shared sack, at Minnesota; those were the first tackles of his career
- Made his career debut along the defensive line vs. Notre Dame in 2019
- Became the first player from Europe (Germany) to sign a Letter of Intent

- The three starting linebackers are among the top five tacklers on the team, with each posting more than 25 stops through four games
- 11 different linebackers have tallied stops in 2020: Josh Ross (41), Michael Barrett (33), Cam McGrone (26), Adam Shibley (17), Ben VanSumeren (7), Anthony Solomon (5), David Ojabo (1), Jaylen Harrell (1), William Mohan (1), Kael Mullings (1) and Nikhai Hill-Green (1)
- The linebacking corps has contributed 8.5 tackles for loss among four players: Barrett (2.0), Shibley (3.0), Ross (1.5) and McGrone (2.0)
- Barrett and Ross have registered the LBs only solo sacks this fall as McGrone contributed a shared sack
- Kael Mullings has the groups only pass breakups this fall
- Ross leads the returning linebackers with 124 career tackles, and is followed closely by McGrone with 92 stops
- U-M has 11 linebackers that have registered tackles in their career: Ross (124), McGrone (92), Barrett (40), Shibley (18), Van Sumeren (7), Solomon (5), Adam Fakh (3), Harrell (1), Ojabo

- (1), Mohan (1), Mullings (1) and Hill-Green (1)
- U-M's middle level of the defense has amassed 24.0 tackles for loss in their career: McGrone (11.5), Ross (6.5), Shibley (3.0) and Barrett (2.0)
- McGrone (4.5), Ross (2.0) and Barrett (1.0) are the only linebackers to register sacks
- The linebacking corps has tallied four career pass breakups: Ross has three PBUs and McGrone has one
- Ross has the groups only interception, corraling his pick and 18-yard return at Minnesota this season

Cam McGrone

- Appeared in 19 career games with 15 starting assignments at middle linebacker
- Started all five games this season
- Fifth on the team with 26 tackles; amassed five or more stops in four of five games this fall
- Injured early in the first half at Rutgers and is expected to miss the remainder of the season
- Posted six tackles and one TFL against Wisconsin after registering six-tackle efforts against Michigan State and Indiana
- Made five tackles, one TFL and an assisted sack at Minnesota

- Michigan made its sixth all-time appearance in the Citrus Bowl, dropping a 35-16 contest to No. 9 Alabama.
- The Wolverines were selected to a bowl game for the 48th time at the conclusion of the 2019 season; lists 11th in the NCAA in appearances and 17th in victories.
- The defense was 10th in the NCAA in pass defense (185.5 avg.) and 11th in total defense (307.2 avg.).

- A team captain, Khaleke Hudson set a career high with 102 tackles on the season, including 3.5 TFLs, two sack and one PBU. He also set the school record with his fifth career punt block against Michigan State.
- Kwity Paye registered a team- and career-best 12.5 tackles while Josh Uche paced the Wolverines with 8.5 sacks.
- Lavert Hill recorded a team-best 13 passes defended in 2019, collecting three interceptions and 10 PBUs.
- Giles Jackson finished 19th in the NCAA with an average of 25.9 yards per kickoff return; had a 97-yard return for a touchdown at Maryland.

Michigan Tops NCAA in Attendance

- The Wolverines have led the nation in attendance 43 of the past 45 seasons; the only years that U-M did not lead the country in attendance was 1997 and 2014
- Michigan led the NCAA in both total attendance and average attendance during the 2019 season; drew 780,215 fans to its seven-game home schedule in 2019 for an average of 111,459 fans per contest
- Michigan has drawn 100,000-plus fans for 293 straight home games at Michigan Stadium; every game since Nov. 8, 1975

College Football's Top TV Draw

- Michigan has played in a NCAA record 540 televised football games, compiling a 352-180-8 record in those contests
- Every single football game since 1995 has been televised, a streak of 309 consecutive broadcasts
- 65 million fans watched Michigan Football during the 2019 season
- The very first televised U-M football game came on Sept. 27, 1947, a 55-0 shutout of rival Michigan State on WWJ TV in Detroit

MICHIGAN IN THE CLASSROOM

- Not only has the U-M program done well on the field, the players have achieved at a high level in the classroom under head coach Jim Harbaugh, posting a perfect APR score in four of his five seasons leading the program

- Michigan was one of seven schools to earn Division I Academic Progress Rate (APR) Public Recognition Award for four straight years (2016-19): Air Force, Duke, Northwestern, Stanford, Vanderbilt and Wisconsin were the others
- For four consecutive years (2016-19), the Wolverines were the only Big Ten institution to earn APR Public Recognition in both football and men's basketball

- 174 student-athletes have earned Academic All-Big Ten honors during Coach Harbaugh's tenure (2015-18): 19 in 2015, 23 in 2016, 48 in 2017, 47 in 2018 and 37 in 2019

- Punter Will Hart, a graduate student working on his master's of management from the Ross School of Business, is the team's nominee for the National Football Foundation and College Football Hall of Fame Scholar-Athlete award

- The Wolverines rank third among all conference institutions in Academic All-Big Ten performers over the last five seasons

- Michigan's record 48 players earning Academic All-Big Ten honors in 2017 was the most of any Big Ten school

- A rookie with the Indianapolis Colts, Jordan Glasgow was a three-time CoSIDA Academic All-District honoree and was on the ballot for academic All-America accolades

- A member of the U.S. Marine corps, linebacker Noah Furbush received the Bo Schembechler Postgraduate Scholarship by the Michigan Chapter of the National Football Foundation and College Football Hall at the conclusion of the 2017 season.

Selzer and Jared Davis are team representatives for the Leadership Development Team Ambassador Program, and Davis is the team's Student-Athlete Advisory Committee (SAAC) representative.

Additional service opportunities for players throughout the year include:

- A tradition for more than 25 years, football players and student-athletes in other sports across Michigan Athletics visit patients at **C.S. Mott Children's Hospital** on Thursday nights throughout the year
- The football team makes annual visits to the **Veteran's Hospital** in Ann Arbor, allowing the players a chance to give back to our military and thank them for their service to our country.
- Players partnered with **Wolverine Human Services** and former running back Vincent Smith and his Team Gardens program; played and spoke to the youth participants and helped build gardens at HOOP HOUSE
- The coaches and student-athletes work with the **KIDSPORT** Program to teach youngsters from around the Washtenaw County area about football, complete with youth run drills and demonstrations
- Student-athletes participate in reading programs throughout the Ann Arbor School system and attend and speak at ACT (Athletes for Community Transformation) at Bryant Community Center
- Football players engage with special needs students from across the area at **Victors Day**, an event put together by the T. Wall Foundation
- Pen Pal Program
- Holiday Giving Drive

Community Service Overseas

During its foreign trips, the Michigan football team participated in multiple community service activities

- In Rome, the team engaged in several service-based activities, including an afternoon with refugees at Borghese Gardens. Coach Harbaugh, his family and five players visited the SOS Children's Village, which provides stable homes to orphaned or abandoned children. The contingent provided Michigan apparel, played games and visited with the youth and their surrogate mothers, who dedicate their lives to providing a stable environment for these children.
- The team also interacted with representatives from the Federazione Italiana de American Football (FIDAF), an Italian football team, which included refugee players on its roster. The team met two individuals, Kana Jallow and Saikou Sanneh, and watched a documentary about their journey, struggles and the hard work it took to overcome these difficulties, and how the lessons learned in football apply to their every day life.
- In Paris, the Wolverines spent a morning providing a free instructional clinic to French, German, Hungarian and Italian youth and coaches to help spread the game of football across the globe. After the clinic concluded, a group of players broke off and played two soccer games against refugees from Somalia, Afghanistan, Sudan, Bangladesh, Guinea and Chad.
- Michigan Football partnered with Salomon Kabongo-Kooper and his initiative, Feed the City, where players and staff put together food and boxed meals for Paris' homeless. A group of Michigan players went to the northern part of the city to spend time interacting with refugees while another group spent time preparing food, packaging clothing and delivering the items to the homeless. The players at the refugee camp played soccer, ran races and taught the young people the game of American football.
- In South Africa, the Wolverines united under the banner of sports with youth and college players from the Cape Town area as well as professional players from the Springbok, the country's national rugby team. Michigan players learned the skills necessary to play rugby while teaching the game of football to the youth in attendance. The older rugby players ran a scrimmage to show the Wolverines how a full-field game is played and then put the student-athlete through two instructional sessions featuring rugby drills. The clinic ended with UTC choir singing the national anthems for the United States and South Africa. Captain Ben Bredeson participated in a jersey swap with the organizing rugby clubs and offered a few works of thanks for the opportunity to learn the fame of rugby.

COMMUNITY SERVICE

Senior linebacker Adam Shibley was named to the 2020 Allstate AFCA Good Works team. The 22-person team honors dedicated and hard-working student-athletes for their off-the-field achievements and selfless contributions to their communities.



Shibley is the lone Big Ten student-athlete on the list. He is the third Wolverine to be named to the Good Works Team since its 1992 inception, joining Zoltan Mesko (2009) and Patrick Omameh (2012).

In late 2018, Shibley founded The Uniform Funding Foundation (TUFF), a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization that works to decrease participation costs for youth sports teams and athletes who come from low-income areas by providing customized gear, uniforms and equipment. Beyond providing uniforms, TUFF provides mentorship and motivation for young men and women in low-income areas through 'TUFF Talks' and involvement from its notable list of supporters. Shibley is also active as a member of the Big Ten Anti-Racism and Anti-Hate Coalition, formed this past summer.

To date, TUFF has provided uniforms for nine youth programs and 17 high schools. Nine current NFL players, including six former Wolverines, have participated by Adopting a Team, a form of sponsorship within the organization. Notable football media such as Adam Schefter, Gus Johnson, and Braylon Edwards also are TUFF supporters, as well as former MLB slugger Prince Fielder. In addition to those forms of sponsorship, TUFF has raised more than \$110,000.

Senior running Back Chris Evans has a non-profit organizations that center around the development of young people, both on the football field and in the community.

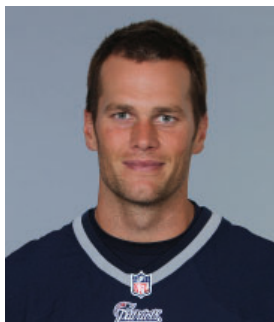

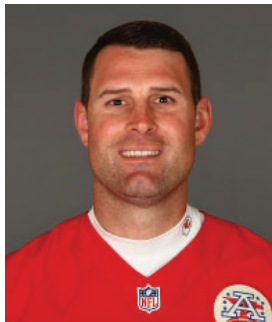

MICHIGAN'S NFL FACTS AND INFORMATION

- Michigan was fifth among all college football programs with 33 players on NFL Rosters at the outset of the season; currently has 34 Wolverines on 53-man active rosters
- During head coach Jim Harbaugh's four seasons, the Wolverines have had 31 players drafted, 36 participate in the NFL Combine and 45 players make NFL rosters
- U-M led all schools with 11 players selected during the 2017 NFL Draft
- The Wolverines had a school record 14 players attend the 2017 NFL Scouting Combine
- All 19 Wolverines that worked out at the school's pro day were signed to 2017 NFL contracts (11 draftees and eight free agents)
- Michigan is the only school to have a player selected in every NFL Draft; 82 consecutive selection meetings with a Wolverine chosen
- Seven Wolverines that were selected in the first round of the NFL Draft are still active in the league: DE Brandon Graham, OT Taylor Lewan, S Jabrill Peppers, DE Taco Charlton, LB Devin Bush, LB Rashaan Gary and OL Cesar Ruiz

Michigan Stadium -- 1927-2019 (92 Years)

The football program is in its 92nd season in the "Big House" in 2019, with a 437-132-15 all-time record at Michigan Stadium. The largest college football stadium in the country, it was completed in 1927 at a cost of \$950,000, initially seating 72,000 fans. Michigan won the first game played at Michigan Stadium, defeating Ohio Wesleyan, 33-0, on Oct. 1, 1927. The stadium was officially dedicated on Oct. 22, 1927, with a 21-0 shutout over Ohio State.

Since that inaugural season, the capacity of Michigan Stadium has been altered 10 times to its present capacity of 107,601. The Wolverines have led the nation in attendance 38 times in the past 40 years, and reestablished the NCAA single-game attendance record at 115,109 fans during the 2013 Notre Dame game.

Michigan has drawn crowds of 100,000-plus for 293 consecutive games; due to the COVID-19 pandemic fans game are being played in front of players' families only. On football Saturdays in Ann Arbor, Michigan Stadium ranks as the fourth-largest "city" in the state of Michigan, surpassing the population of Ann Arbor itself.

Michigan Stadium was the first college-owned football facility with a video scoreboard above both end zones and was also the first stadium to use electronic scoreboards for official time when, in 1930, two were installed.

CAPACITY: 107,601 -- the largest college-owned structures of its kind designed solely for football -- closer to the playing field with no running track -- no posts or other obstructions.

COMPLETION: 1927 --- at a cost in excess of \$950,000 to seat 72,000 spectators. Capacity raised to 84,401 by addition of temporary wooden bleachers until 1949 when permanent steel stands replaced the wooden bleachers, increasing the capacity to 97,239. Seating capacity then raised to 101,001 in 1956, 101,701 in 1973, 102,501 in 1992 and 107,501 in 1998.

FIRST GAME: October 1, 1927 -- Michigan led by Captain Bennie Oosterbaan, defeated Ohio Wesleyan, 33-0. LaVerne (Kip) Taylor, Michigan end, scored first in the stadium on a 28-yard pass from halfback Louis Gilbert.

DEDICATION GAME: October 22, 1927 -- Michigan defeated Ohio State, 21-0.

REDEDICATION GAME: September 4, 2010 -- vs. Connecticut.

ATTENDANCE: Since 1927, 51,312,864 fans have watched the Wolverines play at Michigan Stadium. Stadium attendance record of 115,109 was set on Sept. 7, 2013 against Notre Dame.

FIELD: 360 x 160 feet -- Installed new FieldTurf in 2010. The original FieldTurf surface was installed in 2003, returning Michigan to an artificial surface for the first time since the 1990 season. Installed Prescription Athletic Turf in 1991, giving Michigan its first natural grass field since 1968. Field was also lowered 3-1/2 feet allowing better sightlines for those seated in the lower rows.

100,000-Plus Crowds at Michigan Stadium

The football program has played 293 consecutive home games in front of crowds in excess of 100,000; due to the COVID-19 pandemic fans game are being played in front of players' families only. The last time Michigan did not have 100,000 in attendance in Michigan Stadium was on Oct. 25, 1975 vs. Indiana. A crowd of 93,857 was on hand for the 55-7 Michigan victory. Since then, Michigan has set numerous NCAA attendance marks and the Wolverines have led the nation for 38 of the past 40 seasons in attendance.

Jim Harbaugh has led the University of Michigan football program to three 10-win seasons in his five years in Ann Arbor, becoming one of just four Big Ten coaches to accomplish the feat in the history of the conference.

The J. Ira and Nicki Harris Family Head Football Coach, Harbaugh was named the 20th coach in Michigan football history on Dec. 30, 2014. He became the sixth Michigan football player selected to lead college football's winningest program.

In three of his five seasons as the Michigan head coach, Harbaugh has guided the Wolverines to 10-wins. U-M has appeared in a bowl game in all five seasons, including two New Year's Six Bowls with the 2017 Orange Bowl and 2018 Chick-Fil-A Peach Bowl, and three other bowls played on New Year's Day (2016 Buffalo Wild Wings Bowl; 2018 Outback Bowl; 2020 Vrbo Citrus Bowl).

Eight Wolverines have secured 12 All-America honors under Harbaugh, including consensus honorees Devin Bush, Jake Butt, Maurice Hurst, Jourdan Lewis and Jabrill Peppers.

Additionally, Butt won the Mackey Award as the nation's top tight end in 2016 while Peppers received the Lott IMPACT Trophy, Paul Hornung Award and was a fifth-place finisher in the Heisman Trophy race that same season. Several other athletes have been national award finalists under Harbaugh, including Lewis (Jim Thorpe Award) and Bush (Butkus Award).

At least 20 players from each team Harbaugh has coached at Michigan have earned All-Big Ten recognition, including 24 players with first-team honors (four in 2015, six in 2016, three in 2017, eight in 2018, and three in 2019). In the classroom, Wolverines have totaled 174 academic All-Big Ten honors during his tenure, including a program-record 48 in 2017.

Harbaugh's teams at Michigan have each finished the season ranked in the national polls, including a No. 10 season-ending ranking in 2016,

when the Wolverines came within inches of claiming their first Big Ten East Division Title and a spot in the conference championship game in 2016. U-M has finished the season as a top-15 team three times in Harbaugh's tenure.

Under Harbaugh, Michigan has produced two of the five most-productive offensive seasons in school history. U-M has had a top-12 national defense in all five seasons and a top-three unit on three occasions.

Harbaugh came to Ann Arbor after a four-year run in the NFL with the San Francisco 49ers. He led the franchise to the NFC Championship Game in each of his first three seasons, winning the NFC title in 2012. Harbaugh tallied a 49-22-1 overall record, including 5-3 in the postseason.

Harbaugh led the Niners to a 13-3 regular-season record and the NFC Championship Game in 2011, his first season, earning the AP NFL Coach of the Year award. He followed up with an 11-4-1 regular-season mark in 2012, culminating

with an appearance in Super Bowl XLVII. Harbaugh's 49ers lost a back-and-forth affair, 34-31, to the Baltimore Ravens and his brother, John, in the only matchup of brothers as head coaches in NFL history.

At the collegiate level, Harbaugh spent three years at the University of San Diego (2004-06) and four years at Stanford (2007-10). He turned around a Cardinal program that went 1-11 prior to his arrival, culminating with a 12-1 campaign and FedEx Orange Bowl victory in 2010. In his debut as a head coach, Harbaugh led San Diego to a 29-6 record in three seasons.

He spent the 2002 and 2003 NFL seasons as the Oakland Raiders' quarterbacks coach, assisting the team to Super Bowl XXXVII.

Harbaugh began preparing for a coaching career during his professional playing days, spending eight years as an NCAA-certified unpaid assistant coach for his father, Jack, at Western Kentucky (1994-2001).

As an NFL quarterback, Harbaugh played for five organizations in his 15-year career (1987-2001). He threw for 26,288 yards and 129 touchdowns in 177 games and made 140 career starts. He was the AFC Offensive Player of the Year, the NFL Comeback Player of the Year and a Pro Bowl selection after leading the Indianapolis Colts to the AFC Championship Game in 1995. In 2005, he was inducted into the Colts Ring of Honor.

As a Wolverine, Harbaugh was one of the most efficient passers in NCAA history. In 1985, he led the nation in pass efficiency and finished runner-up the following year. His career pass efficiency rating was the NCAA's top mark for more than 12 years.

In 1986, Harbaugh won the "Chicago Tribune" Big Ten Most Valuable Player award, was a first-team All-American and finished third in Heisman Trophy voting.

The first Michigan quarterback to throw for more than 300 yards in a single game (310 vs. Wisconsin), Harbaugh also eclipsed the 200-yard passing mark 12 times. He led the Wolverines to a 21-3-1 record as a full-time starter during his final two seasons, including a pair of victories against Michigan State and Ohio State. During his college career, he completed 387-of-620 passes for 5,449 yards and 31 touchdowns; all four statistical categories still list among the top 12 in school history.

Harbaugh and his wife, Sarah, have two daughters, Addison and Katherine, and two sons, Jack and John. He also has three adult children, Jay, James Jr., and Grace.
