UNIVERSITY PARK, Pa.; October 19, 2021 -- The Penn State Nittany Lions (10-4, 3-2 B1G), ranked No. 7 nationally, take on two Big Ten opponents in conference road games this weekend. The Nittany Lions are at No. 21 Ohio State (7-7, 1-4) on Friday, Oct. 22, at 3 p.m. and at Michigan State (7-5, 0-5) on Sunday, Oct. 24, at 2 p.m. Both games will be Big Ten Network national telecasts.

Penn State is coming off a non-conference road split this weekend. The Lions beat Lafayette 3-1 on Friday before falling 3-2 in overtime at No. 16 Princeton on Sunday. Penn State is 10-4 overall and 3-2 in Big Ten action. Sophia Gladieux leads Penn State with 28 points off 13 goals and two assists. Mackenzie Alessie has 23 points off seven goals and a team-best nine assists while Anna Simon has 22 off 10 and two. Keeper Brie Barraco has 64 saves and a .744 save percentage.

Ohio State is 7-7 overall and 1-4 in Big Ten action after dropping games at Iowa and Northwestern last weekend. Leanne Bough leads OSU with ten points off five goals. The Nittany Lions lead the all-time series 39-14-2 but Ohio State won the last meeting, a 4-3 overtime decision in the Big Ten Tournament in Iowa on April 21, 2021.

Michigan State is 7-5 overall, 0-5 in Big Ten action. The Spartans lost at Indiana and at Northwestern this past weekend. Merel Hanssen leads the Spartans with 17 points off six goals and five assists. Penn State leads the all-time series 35-10, including a 3-0 win in East Lansing on March 21, 2021, in the last meeting.

Penn State hosts Michigan in its regular season finale on Friday, Oct. 29, at 6 p.m. The game will also serve as Senior Day at the Penn State Field Hockey Complex.

PUNCH LEADS PENN STATE IN WIN AT LAFAYETTE

Junior Jemma Punch had a goal and an assist in Penn State's 3-1 win at Lafayette on Oct. 15. The Lions trailed 1-0 heading into the fourth period and exploded for three goals, thank in large part to a Punch assist on the first and the game winning goal less than a minute later.

PENN STATE FALLS 3-2 IN OT AT #16 PRINCETON

Junior Mackenzie Allesie scored with just :06 on the regulation clock to send the game to overtime but the Nittany Lions lost 3-2 in extra time at No. 16 Princeton on Oct. 17. Allesie had a goal and an assist in the contest.

GLADIEUX SCORES THREE GOALS IN HOME WIN OVER BUCKNELL

Sophomore Sophia Gladieux notched three goals in Penn State's 4-1 victory over visiting Bucknell on Oct. 9. Mackenzie Allesie added the fourth as the Lions rolled to the non-conference win.

GLADIEUX'S GOAL LIFTS LIONS TO 2-1 (2OT) WIN OVER #4 NORTHWESTERN; NAMED B1G AoW!

Sophomore Sophia Gladieux scored the game-winner in extra time in Penn State's 2-1 double-overtime win over No. 4 Northwestern at the Penn State Field Hockey Complex on Oct. 3. The goal built on the goal from Mackenzie Allesie during regulation that helped send the game to extra time. Gladieux, who also had two goals two days earlier in a win over Indian, was named Big Ten Offensive Player of the Week for the week ending Oct. 3, for her efforts.

NITTANY LIONS DOWN INDIANA 4-1

Sophia Gladieux scored twice to lead Penn State to a 4-1 win over visiting Indiana on Oct. 1. The Nittany Lions broke open a close game with a fourth-quarter burst to down the Hoosiers.

GLADIEUX SCORES TWICE TO LEAD PSU TO 3-2 OT WIN AT #7 MARYLAND; B1G OFFENSIVE AoW

Sophomore Sophia Gladieux scored twice to lead Penn State to a 3-2 overtime win at #7 Maryland on Sept. 18. Gladieux connected on two backhands in the game, including the winner in overtime. Mackenzie Allesie scored Penn State's other goal and goalie Brie Barraco had seven saves in the win. Gladieux was named the Big Ten Offensive Player of the Week for her efforts.

BARRACO'S SIX SAVES AND A BALANCED ATTACK LEADS LIONS TO 3-0 WIN OVER #19 DELAWARE

Junior goalie Brie Barraco notched six saves to anchor a stingy Penn State defense and picked up her first shutout of the season in a 3-0 win over #19 Delaware on Sept. 12 in State College. Anna Simon, Mackenzie Allesie and Sophia Gladieux each scored in the win.

#16 PENN STATE 3, #8 VIRGINIA 2 (OT) Friday, Aug. 27, 2021 -- Charlottesville, Va.

The Penn State Nittany Lion field hockey team (1-0, 0-0 B1G) opened up the 2021 fall season with a thrilling 3-2 overtime win at No. 8 Virginia (0-1) on Friday afternoon. Goalie Brie Barraco (Allentown, Pa.) was outstanding in the cage, fending off 25 total shots and collecting nine saves while Jemma Punch (McDowall, Australia) scored the game winner in extra time to clinch the win.

Penn State got on the scoreboard first in the season's opening game. Midway through the first period, Penn State's offensive pressure led to a penalty corner that ended in a 1-0 Penn State lead. New Nittany Lion Mackenzie Alessie assisted on the corner, setting up Lion captain Anna Simon (Hanau, Germany) for the goal, giving Penn State a 1-0 lead at the 7:03 mark. Penn State's defense, anchored by Meghan Reese (Coopersburg, Pa.) and goalie Brie Barraco (Allentown, Pa.) kept the Cavaliers at length for the opening stanza and Penn State led 1-0 after one. The Nittany Lions continued to hold the lead deep into the second period, but the Cavalier defense stiffened, and Penn State led 1-0 late into the period. Virginia's offense began to break through as the clock moved below the 10:00 mark, forcing a number of penalty corners down the stretch. The home team got on the board for the first time when Amber Ezechiels scored off a penalty corner with 2:39 left in the half, assisted by Meghan Hengerer. The goal tied the game and the 1-1 score held to intermission. Virginia outshot Penn State 12-1 in the first half, six in each period. Penn State keeper Barraco notched three saves, all in the first period. Virginia's Lauren Hausheer had none. Virginia had five penalty corners to one for the Nittany Lions.

Virginia's offense kept the pressure on Penn State for the bulk of the third quarter. Virginia dominated the period on offense, but Barraco held firm in the cage and Penn State maintained its 1-1 deadlock deep into the stanza. The Nittany Lions took a 2-1 lead with just 0:24 left on the clock when Sophia Gladieux (Boyetown, Pa.) scored off an assist from senior Hannah Zemaits (Camp Hill, Pa.) with less than thirty seconds to play, allowing Penn State to lead 2-1 after three periods. Barraco had three saves in the period. Penn State saw its one-goal lead disappear early in the final period. Virginia began the first extra period fast, working the ball downfield and getting off a shot quickly. But Barraco's save off the Noa Tollaksen shot kept the game tied. Alessie followed for Penn State, getting off a quick shot just seconds later, but the effort was blocked as well. Penn State wrapped the game up, however, just 3:58 into extra time when Jemma Punch (McDowall, Australia) took a great pass from Emma Spisak (Boiling Springs, Pa.) who got the assist, and broke away down field. Elena Vos (Grave, The Netherlands) started the break that led to the final goal. Punch ended the game with a goal at the 6:02 mark of overtime to give Penn State a 3-2 victory. Virginia outshot Penn State 25-8 but the Nittany Lions scored on three of their eight shots while Barraco collected nine saves for Penn State. Hausheer had two saves for Virginia. The Cavaliers had an 11-3 edge in penalty corners as well.

The Penn State Nittany Lion field hockey team (3-0, 0-0 B1G), ranked No. 16 in the NFCA Coaches Poll, used a late goal from sophomore Sophia Gladieux (Boyetown, Pa.) to beat No. 20 St. Joseph's (1-2) in the home opener for head coach Char Morett-Curtiss and her squad. The Boyertown native scored her second goal of the game with less than 10:00 to play to spark Penn State to the 3-2 non-conference win in Happy Valley.

The two teams battled to an even draw in the opening period. The Penn State Nittany Lion field hockey team (5-0, 0-0 B1G), ranked No. 9 in the NFCA Coaches Poll, used a furious second half of offense to run away from No. 19 Delaware (2-4) for another impressive non-conference win. The Nittany Lions posted the 3-0 victory at the Penn State Field Hockey Complex to improve their record to 5-0 on the year. The two teams set a fast pace from the opening whistle. Nittany Lion Mackenzie Alessie (Mount Joy, Pa.) was there for the rebound, however, knocking in the unassisted goal at the 3:11 mark to tie the game. Barraco made another diving save on a late corner for Maryland and Elena Vos (Grave, The Netherlands) knocked away the rebound shot to send the game into the second period tied 1-1. The Nittany Lion defense was tested early in the second, fending off a Maryland penalty corner to keep the game tied. Maryland took advantage of a Penn State turnover five minutes into the period to get the ball into the Lion circle. The Lion defense, with Vos and freshman Anouk Knuvers ('s-Hertogenbosch, The Netherlands) on alert, pushed the ball back out towards midfield. Barraco made a great kick save at the 9:00 mark to keep the game tied, Penn State briefly pushed the ball downfield, but Maryland was able to regain possession. The teams traded possession in the midfield for the next couple minutes before the Nittany Lions forced a corner with 6:00 left in the half. Frost made a save on the first Lion corner, and then again on a subsequent one. Barraco made two saves on a Maryland flurry with under 5:00 left to keep Penn State in a 1-1 tie. Penn State moved the ball down field and Gladieux took over as the ball hit the Maryland circle. The Lion sophomore moved to the left of the Terrapin cage and launched a backhand rocket that zipped by Frost to put Penn State up 2-1 with 2:00 left in the half, a lead it would hold into intermission. Maryland outshot Penn State 9-5 and had a 5-3 lead in corners in the half. But Barraco's seven saves, to three for Frost, allowed Penn State to carry the one-goal lead into the break.

The third period began with Penn State owning possession early. The Maryland defense was able to withstand early presses by the Lion midfield but eventually, Penn State was able to work the ball into the Terrapin circle. Alessie took a long shot midway into the period and Bree Bednarski (Wyoming, Pa.) forced a corner on a rebound shot. Frost knocked away a hard Simon blast off the corner to keep the score 2-1 in Penn State's favor. Grace Wallis (Blue Bell, Pa.) moved the ball quickly into the circle a couple minutes later, fording another corner with 6:28 left in the third. The corner was denied by another Frost save but Penn State's offense remained in control and carried the one-goal lead into the final period. Maryland forced an early corner in the fourth period, just :25 in. The Terrapins tied the game off the corner set with Nathalie Feichter scoring off the corner set-up with an assist from Riley Donnelly, tying the game at 2-2. The Nittany Lions responded by working the ball down to the Maryland circle and forcing a corner a couple minutes later. Simon's shot was blocked off the play, but Penn State quickly forced another corner. But a defensive save from Belle Bressler kept Penn State from retaking the lead and the clock moved down to the 11:00 mark. The teams traded possession for the bulk of the final 10:00 and the game moved into overtime. The seven-on-seven overtime began with Penn State's Vos defending an early Maryland press and working the ball downfield to Gladieux. Gladieux forced a Maryland green card with a nifty move on the sideline. Jemma Punch (McDowall,



Australia) forced penalty corner at the 8:15 mark in overtime but the Lions could not connect. Penn State maintained possession. Simon worked the ball to the top of the Maryland circle and fed Gladieux, who connected on another hard backhand, finding the back of the cage at the 6:49 mark. Gladieux's second goal of the game gave Penn State the thrilling 3-2 win. Maryland outshot Penn State 15-13 over the course of the game but Penn State owned an 8-6 edge in penalty corners. The Nittany Lion defense stiffened in the second half and Barraco ended the game with seven saves, all in the opening two periods. Frost also had seven for Maryland.

Friday, Sept. 24, 2021 -- Iowa City, Iowa

The Penn State Nittany Lion field hockey team (6-1, 1-1 B1G), ranked No. 6 in the NFHCA Coaches Poll, lost a close game in its Big Ten road opener at No. 2 Iowa (9-0, 2-0 B1G) in Iowa City. Penn State lost 1-0 in the first of two games in Iowa City this weekend (this game counts in the conference standings as it is a regularly scheduled conference game). The teams traded possessions over the course of the first three minutes. Iowa had two possessions go deep into the Penn State side of the field, with both efforts ending with the ball rolling across the end line. Penn State gained control of the ball and worked it downfield into the Iowa circle. Jemma Punch (McDowall, Australia) had a first shot blocked by Iowa keeper Grace McGuire and a rebound shot slide just wide. Mackenzie Allesie (Mount Joy, Pa.) also had an early shot sail wide seconds later. Annika Urbine had a shot blocked at the 6:30 mark in the first half in Iowa's first real press on the cage. Maddy Murphy's shot at the 3:45 mark was just wide for Iowa. A late Ellie Holley shot was saved by Penn State keeper Brie Barraco (Allentown, Pa.) and the game moved to the second period tied 0-0.

Two minutes into the second period, the Lion defense looked to let an Iowa shot from outside the circle go wide but the ball hit the post and darted back into play. The Lion defense, led by Elena Vos (Grave, The Netherlands) pushed the ball out. Iowa kept possession, with Esme Gibson taking a shot that was blocked right in front of the cage with 12:00 left in the half. Meghan Reese (Coopersburg, Pa.) stole an Iowa pass with just under 9:00 left and worked the ball to the right side of the Iowa circle, with Sophia Gladieux (Boyetown, Pa.) looking to pressure the cage. But Iowa's defense held firm, the Hawkeyes pushed the ball down the field and picked up the game's first penalty corner at the 8:15 mark. Penn State stopped the first Iowa corner, but Iowa picked up a quick second. The Hawkeyes connected on the second corner, with Lokke Stribbs scoring off the corner with assist Leah Zellner and Anthe Nijziel at the 7:51 mark. The Hawkeyes kept the pressure on Penn State for the next five minutes and picked up their third corner of the period with 2:58 left in the half. The Penn State defense held, and the Nittany Lions trailed by one at intermission. Iowa outshot Penn State 11-4 in the first half, including a 7-0 edge in the second period. Barraco had two saves for the Lions while McGuire had one for Iowa. Iowa had a 3-0 lead in corners in the first two periods.

The opening minutes of the third period were battled at midfield with each team notching a couple steals. But neither squad pushed the ball into the opposing circle until the 13:25 mark when Iowa had a pass roll through the Lion circle and out of bounds. The Nittany Lion defense worked hard over the next 2:00 to keep Iowa from collapsing in on the Penn State circle. The Hawkeyes got hit for a green card with 11:00 left in the period but Iowa was able to kill the advantage and the clock moved to the 9:00 mark. Gery Schnars (Camp Hill, Pa.) and the Penn State defense stopped a quick Iowa break and Penn State moved the ball down to the Iowa side of the field. But Iowa's defense was up to the task and Iowa regained possession, moved the ball downfield, and grabbed the first corner of the second half with 6:53 on the clock. Meghan Reese deftly defended the corner and started a fast break that ended in the Iowa circle. Allesie and Bree Bednarski (Wyoming, Pa.) moved the ball around in front of the Iowa cage and forced the first Lion corner of the game with 6:22 on the clock. Allesie took the corner, feeding Vos who spotted Anna Simon (Hanau, Germany). Simon's shot was tipped wide, however, with 6:00 left in the quarter. The teams traded cards (green for Iowa, yellow for Penn State) in the final 2:00 of the period and Penn State trailed by one after three.

The Penn State defense had to kill an Iowa player advantage over the first minutes of the final period to keep the game a one-goal affair thanks to the third period's yellow card. The Hawkeyes kept pressure on Penn State and the Iowa offense nearly found the cage with 11:34 to play. But a Holley shot hit the crossbar and the game stayed at 1-0 with 11:30 left on the clock. Penn State got hit with another yellow card with 9:40 left in the game, giving the Hawkeyes the player advantage. The Nittany Lions withstood the Hawkeyes offense over the next minutes, killing the yellow card advantage and keeping the ball on the Iowa side of the field. Freshmen Sophia Mannino (Doylestown, Pa.) and Anouk Knuffers ('s-Hertogenbosch, The Netherlands) helped spark the Penn State defense in the fourth period. Emily Farrell (Wyoming, Pa.) drove the ball towards the Iowa circle as the clock moved to the 3:00 mark and forced a penalty corner. The corner was defended by Iowa, but Penn State kept possession with 2:40 left to play. Penn State tried to force a corner over the next minute, but Iowa's defense kept Penn State from getting off another shot and the Nittany Lions dropped a hard-fought 1-0 game. Iowa outshot Penn State 12-6, with the Lions owning a 2-1 edge in the second half. Barraco had two saves, McGuire had one, all coming in the first period. Iowa had a 4-2 advantage in penalty corners. The shutout was the seventh straight for Iowa. This also marks the fourth straight time Penn State has lost 1-0 to Iowa, including two 1-0 games last season in Virginia Beach and 1-0 overtime loss in the Big Ten Tournament title game in 2019 at Penn State.

The Penn State Nittany Lion field hockey team (6-2, 1-1 B1G), ranked No. 6 in the NFHCA Coaches Poll, lost a non-conference game at No. 2 Iowa (10-0, 2-0 B1G) in Iowa City. Penn State fell 4-0 in the last of two games in Iowa City this weekend (this game does not count in the conference standings. Iowa took an early 1-0 lead, with Ellie Holley scoring from the left side of the Lion circle. Holley's shot moved by Penn State's defense, with a late defensive save effort just missing. Iowa took the 1-0 lead at the 12:00 mark. Five minutes later, the Nittany Lions worked the ball down to the Iowa circle with Sophia Gladieux (Boyetown, Pa.) moving possession towards the Hawkeye cage. The momentum forced a penalty corner at the 6:28 mark for the Nittany Lions. The initial shot off the corner was defended and then Anna Simon (Hanau, Germany) had a solid shot knocked away by Iowa keeper Grace McGuire. A second Nittany Lion corner with 5:00 left in the period was also defended by Iowa. Penn State continued to press the Hawkeye defense, forcing a third corner just two minutes later. But a Gladieux backhand was ruled too high. Iowa quickly moved the ball down into the Lion circle and Penn State keeper Brie Barraco (Allentown, Pa.) made a great save on a quick Iowa shot and the Lions trailed by one after one.

The second period began with the teams working the midfield, battling for control of the ball. Iowa's Maddy Murphy got off a point-blank shot that Barraco saved, but the Hawkeyes picked up a penalty corner off the ensuing scramble. Iowa connected on the corner, with Nikke Freeman scoring at the 11:23 mark to give the Hawkeyes a 2-0 lead. Penn State worked to answer the goal, with Mackenzie Allesie (Mount Joy, Pa.) moving the ball into the Hawkeye circle. But Iowa was able to defend the Penn State effort. Meghan Reese, Allesie and Bree Bednarski (Wyoming, Pa.) controlled the ball in the midfield, working the ball forward to Grace Wallis (Blue Bell, Pa.), but the leading pass sailed out of bounds with 7:00 on the clock. Iowa scored quickly after the Lion effort, with Holley scoring at the 6:48 mark to put the home team up 3-0. With under two minutes left, Barraco and the Lion defense withstood two close Hawkeye shots at the 1:40 mark. A late Jemma Punch (McDowall, Australia) shot slipped just wide of McGuire and the Iowa cage and Penn State trailed 3-0 at the break. Iowa outshot Penn State 7-4 in the first half. McGuire had a 2-1 lead in saves and Penn State owned a 3-1 edge in corners in the opening two quarters.

Gladieux nearly put the Nittany Lions on the board just over 2:00 into the third quarter. But an effort from the left side of the Hawkeye circle was defended by McGuire and Iowa held on to its 3-0 lead. The Nittany Lions controlled the ball for the next two minutes and continued to look for their first goal of the game. Iowa was able to steal the ball at the 10:20 mark and began a fast break down their left side. But Lion sophomore Kelsey Love (State College, Pa.) was able to steal the ball back and Penn State regained possession. The teams spent the last minutes of the third period trading possessions. The Nittany Lions had a late corner defended by Iowa and the score remained 3-0 after three.

Iowa began the fourth period by pressing the ball downfield and picking up a penalty corner. Barraco made a save on the first shot off the corner, but Iowa connected on the rebound, getting an Anthe Nijziel goal off the rebound at the 13:36 mark to give the Hawkeyes a 4-0 lead. Minutes later, Barraco made a great save on a Zellner shot with 11:00 to play to keep the home team from getting another goal. Penn State controlled the time of possession over the next ten minutes but could not find the back of the cage as Iowa's defense bent but did not break. The Hawkeyes went on to post the 4-0 win, notching its eighth-straight shutout in the process. The Penn State Nittany Lion field hockey team (7-2, 2-1 B1G), ranked No. 8 in the NFHCA Coaches Poll, used a strong second half to down visiting Indiana (6-5, 0-3 B1G) in a Friday night Big Ten



showdown. Penn State broke open a halftime tie to roll to a 4-1 win in the clash at the Penn State Field Hockey Complex.

The Nittany Lions controlled the ball in the first period, working action into the Indiana circle for the majority of the opening 15:00. But Penn State, which outshot IU 3-0 in the opening stanza, could not find the back of the cage. The Nittany Lions forced the first of three first period corners just under 5:00 into the game. Anna Simon (Hanau, Germany) had a strong shot saved by Indiana keeper Arabella Loveridge. Penn State continued to control the action and midway through the period had a Mackenzie Alessie (Mount Joy, Pa.) shot hit the post at the 7:26 mark, missing out on a chance to take an early lead. Three minutes later, Sophia Gladieux' s (Boyetown, Pa.) shot off a Lion corner was blocked, and the game moved to the second period tied 0-0. Penn State dominated the second period statistically, but it was Indiana that drew first blood in the game. Penn State had another corner defended two minutes into the second period. The Hoosiers then moved the ball downfield, seriously threatening the Penn State cage for the first time and earned their first penalty corner at the 12:20 mark. Indiana connected on the corner, with Kennedy Reardon scoring off assists from Yip van Wonderen and Sydney Keld. The score energized IU and the Hoosiers were able to keep Penn State off the scoreboard deep into the second stanza. But Gladieux would not be denied offensively. With 2:54 left in the half, Gladieux worked the ball in to the right of the Hoosier cage and got off a blazing backhand that sailed to the back of the cage to tie the game at 1-1. Penn State had two late corners, setting up chances to take the lead into halftime, but Loveridge was able to make the saves and the game moved to intermission tied 1-1. Penn State outshot Indiana 8-2 in the first half and posted a 6-1 edge in penalty corners. Loveridge had two saves for Indiana while Penn State keeper Brie Barraco (Allentown, Pa.) had one for the Nittany Lions.

The Nittany Lions came out of halftime with great energy and controlled the ball on offense for the entirety of the third period. Penn State outshot IU 6-0 alone in the third stanza and had four penalty corners. But Indiana's defense bent but did not break as Loveridge notched a couple more saves and the Nittany Lions were unable to score. Despite Penn State controlling the period, the game moved to the fourth quarter tied 1-1. Penn State blew up the fourth quarter. The Nittany Lions continued to press Indiana and with six minutes off the clock, Simon gave Penn State a 2-1 lead, a lead it would not relinquish. Simon scored unassisted off a rebound from a Gladieux shot that Loveridge knocked back into play. The goal came at the 9:03 mark. Five minutes later, Alessie led a textbook fast break downfield, working the ball past two Indiana defenders and finding Gladieux right in front of the IU cage with a nifty pass to her left. Gladieux scored her second goal of the game with the Alessie assist at the 4:38 left to play. Alessie iced the game just a minute later, scoring off a penalty corner with an assist from Bree Bednarski (Wyoming, Pa.) with just 3:25 left to play. The offensive burst in the fourth period allowed the Nittany Lions to roll to a 4-1 win. Penn State outshot Indiana 22-3 over the course of the game and had a 14-2 edge in penalty corners. Loveridge ended the game with eight saves, including four in Penn State's furious fourth quarter. Barraco had one for the Nittany Lions.

The Penn State Nittany Lion field hockey team (8-2, 3-1 B1G), ranked No. 8 in the NFCA Coaches Poll, won a thrilling double-overtime game over No. 4 Northwestern (9-3, 1-2 B1G) in a battle of Big Ten powers. The Nittany Lions outlasted the Wildcats 2-1 (2OT) in the Sunday matinee played at Penn State, picking up an important Big Ten win. The Nittany Lions took an early lead on a Mackenzie Alessie (Mount Joy, Pa.) goal and then won the game when Sophia Gladieux (Boyetown, Pa.) scored in extra time.

Penn State had the first solid offensive press in the game, moving the ball into the Northwestern circle at the 12:00 mark. Senior Hannah Zemaits (Camp Hill, Pa.) had a pass into the circle that the Wildcats were able to defend to halt the early effort. Northwestern's best first opportunity came at the 8:00 mark. But the Nittany Lion defense, anchored by Kelsey Love (State College, Pa.) held firm early. Northwestern was able to control possession for the next few minutes until a Northwestern green card at the 3:42 mark gave Penn State a player advantage. Penn State regained possession and moved the ball down field. Bree Bednarski (Wyoming, Pa.) had a close shot in the final seconds, but Northwestern goalie Annabel Skubisz knocked the shot away. The Wildcat defense kept Penn State off the scoreboard and the game moved to the second stanza tied 0-0. Northwestern forced an early penalty corner less than a minute into the second quarter but did not connect on the play. Penn State quickly moved the ball downfield. Emma Spisak (Boiling Springs, Pa.) and Gladieux worked the left side of the Wildcat circle but could not get the ball close to the cage. Northwestern returned the ball to the Lion circle but Love and freshman Sophia Mannino (Doylestown, Pa.) were able to keep Penn State goalie Brie Barraco (Allentown, Pa.) safe and the Lions regained possession. Spisak stole the ball at the 8:00 mark and fed Brianna O'Donnell (Lansdale, Pa.), forcing Skubisz into a diving save. The Lions continued to pressure NU and picked up their first corner at the 7:23 mark. Gladieux took the corner from Alessie and got off a hard back hand that Skubisz once again knocked away. Another Lion corner a minute later that led to another Gladieux shot and a Wildcat save. Alessie's backhand at the 5:00 mark was also saved by Skubisz. After nearly five minutes of constant Lion pressure, Northwestern was able to move the ball down to the Lion circle and picked up a corner with 3:31 left in the half. Penn State blocked the shot off the corner and regained possession seconds later. The game moved to halftime scoreless. Penn State outshot Northwestern 5-2 in the opening half but Skubisz' s

five saves kept the Lions off the scoreboard. Barraco had one save for Penn State and both teams had two penalty corners.

Northwestern took the ball right down field to start the third period but had a deep pass just miss on the end line and Penn State retook possession. The Lions worked the ball down to the NU circle where Jemma Punch (McDowall, Australia) had a shot knocked away. The Lions continued to pressure Northwestern, but Skubisz and the Wildcat defense kept the game scoreless. Alessie, O'Donnell and Grace Wallis (Blue Bell, Pa.) worked inside the circle, but NU's defense did not break as the clock hit 6:30. Northwestern returned the ball to the Penn State circle and forced a penalty corner at the 6:24 mark. Penn State blocked the Wildcat shot to keep the game tied 0-0. Megan Reese (Coopersburg, Pa.) helped anchor the Penn State midfield as the Lions regained the ball at the 4:40 mark. Northwestern had a close shot blocked by Gery Schnarrs (Camp Hill, Pa.) late in the period. Penn State moved the ball downfield. Schnarrs stole a Northwestern clear at the 0:35 mark and fed Alessie, who dribbled into the circle, twirled once and drilled a shot past Skubisz to put Penn State on the board, scoring with just :24 left in the period and the Lions led 1-0 after three. Penn State worked the ball right back in front of the NU cage to start the fourth period. Zemaits passed the ball in to Spisak who had a close shot knocked away by the Wildcat keeper, Elena Vos (Grave, The Netherlands) and the Lion defense quickly retook possession of the ball, and the Nittany Lions went back on attack. A Nittany Lion green card at the 11:57 mark gave the Wildcats a player advantage. Penn State, however, nearly scored after the card. Punch stole the ball and led a fast break that ended with a Gladieux shot sailing just high at the 10:20 mark. Northwestern forced a corner seconds later, but the shot was high, and action resumed with the Lions holding the one goal lead. With 7:44 left in the game, Wallis forced a corner at the top of the circle, but Alessie's shot off the corner was blocked. Two minutes later, Northwestern forced a penalty corner with 5:42 to play. The Lion defense held, and the Wildcat shot flew wide. Northwestern maintained possession and picked up another corner at the 5:00 mark. Barraco made a solid kick save on the ensuing shot and Penn State maintained its 1-0 lead as the clock moved to 4:30. Northwestern pulled their goalie with just over 3:00 left to play and then Northwestern picked up a corner at the 2:54 mark. The Lion defended the effort and Northwestern picked up another corner with 2:10 to play. A blocked shot off that corner led to another Wildcat corner just seconds later. This time, the Wildcats connected, with Bente Baekers connecting off assists from Ana Medina Garcia and Clara Roth to tie the game at the 1:52 mark. Northwestern maintained possession for the rest of regulation and the game went to overtime tied 1-1. Northwestern had possession to start the first overtime period and kept the ball on the Penn State side of the field. Penn State kept the ball away from the Lion cage, however, and action went back and forth in the midfield as the clock hit 6:00. Vos made a great steal in the Lion circle at the 5:30 mark that led to a fast break for the Lions. After a reset, Alessie had a hard shot knocked away by Skubisz. A Wildcat shot sailed wide at the 4:11 mark. With 1:47 left, Penn State forced a corner on an Alessie pass deep into the zone to Spisak. Penn State had possession at the beginning of the second overtime. But a turnover on the fast break gave the ball back to Northwestern. The two teams traded offensive bursts until the Wildcats forced a penalty corner at the 7:41 mark. Meghan Reese blocked the shot and Simon started a fast break. Northwestern held off the rally and regained the ball, forcing another corner at the 6:34 mark. But the Wildcat shot was high and hit the post. Alessie had a fast back hand saved by the goalie and Gladieux followed with another that Skubisz swatted away. Penn State kept control of the ball and Gladieux forced a corner at the 3:21 mark. Gladieux's shot was knocked away by the goalie, but the Lions picked up another quick corner with 2:47 on the clock. Penn State quickly picked up another corner at 2:38. Wallis took the corner and fed Gladieux who, after a slide to the left, rocketed a backhand past Skubisz for the goal and the 2-1 (2 OT) win. Penn State held a slim 17-15 edge in shots in what was a tightly contested game. Northwestern had 11 corners to seven for the Nittany Lions. #4 PENN STATE 0, #5 RUTGERS 1

Friday, Oct. 8, 2021 -- University Park, Pa.

The Penn State Nittany Lion field hockey team (8-3, 3-2 B1G), ranked No. 4 in the NFCA Coaches Poll, dropped a hard-fought game to No. 5 Rutgers (10-2, 3-1 B1G) in a top-five Big Ten showdown Friday. Head coach Char Morett-Curtiss' squad lost 1-0 to the Scarlet Knights at the Penn State Field Hockey Complex. Rutgers controlled the tempo early in the game, keeping the ball in the Penn State circle for the bulk of the first period as it rolled up a 4-1 edge in shots in the opening 15:00 alone. The Nittany Lion defense, with Gery Schnarrs (Camp Hill, Pa.), Elena Vos (Grave, The Netherlands) and Kelsey Love (State College, Pa.) anchoring it, kept the Knights from threatening the cage though and while Rutgers kept the pressure on Penn State goalie Brie Barraco (Allentown, Pa.) early, Barraco was only forced into one save.

Penn State turned the tables on Rutgers in the second period, however, picking up three shots while holding RU to none. The Nittany Lions began to pressure Rutgers and keeper Gianna Glatz, forcing Glatz into two saves. Pen State's offense also forced three penalty corners, including two late in the period. Anna Simon (Hanau, Germany) had a shot off one corner saved by Glatz while Vos had another on a late corner saved by the Knight keeper. The two teams each had four shots in the opening half while Penn State had a 4-2 edge in penalty corners. Glatz had three saves, Barraco had one for.



Penn State's offense tried to get untracked in the third period. The Nittany Lions matched the Scarlet Knights shot-for-shot with each team picking up five. But Glatz was able to keep Penn State from finding the cage, picking up four more saves in the third period. Barraco had two saves in the period, but Rutgers was able to find the back of the cage. Three minutes into the period, Rutgers picked up a penalty corner, taken by Katie Larmour. Liz Romano's first shot was blocked, and Rachel Houston picked up the rebound, dribbled left and scored unassisted at the 11:50 mark to score the game's lone goal. The Nittany Lions and Knights battled evenly over the game's final 15:00 with Rutgers able to defend a late Lion burst that included four penalty corners in the game's final minute. But the Nittany Lions could not get a shot on cage and Rutgers held on for the close 1-0 victory. Rutgers outshot Penn State 12-11 over the course of the game but the Nittany Lions had a 12-8 edge in penalty corners. Glatz ended the game with eight saves while Barraco had six for Penn State.

The Penn State Nittany Lion field hockey team (9-3, 3-2 B1G), ranked No. 4 in the NFHCA Coaches Poll, pulled away from visiting Bucknell (6-5) for a non-conference win on Saturday. Head coach Char Morett-Curtiss' squad got three goals from sophomore Sophia Gladieux (Boyetown, Pa.) to roll to a 4-1 win at the Penn State Field Hockey Complex. The teams traded early possessions and Bucknell goalie Clara McCormick made a good save on a hard Anna Simon (Hanau, Germany) shot off a corner 3:00 in. Bucknell responded and moved the ball into the Penn State circle. The effort led to Bucknell's first corner with just over 8:00 on the clock. Kayla Kisthardt took the corner, sent the ball to Mackenzie Kile, who set up Mary Kate Stefanowicz for the goal at the 8:01 mark. Penn State nearly tied the game at the 2:00 mark but McCormick stopped an Emma Spisak (Boiling Springs, Pa.) shot and Sophia Gladieux (Boyetown, Pa.) had a backhand sail wide. The Lions trailed 1-0 after one.

Simon had a blistering backhand saved by the BU goalie and the Bison were hit with a green card less than 2:00 into the second quarter. But Penn State did not threaten during the advantage and the clock moved towards 10:00. Gladieux had a shot knocked away on a subsequent Penn State corner. The two teams traded possessions over the next 5:00 and Bucknell continued to hold on to its one goal lead deep into the second period. Mackenzie Allesie (Mount Joy, Pa.) forced a corner with 2:53 on the clock after a nice drive to the left side of the Bucknell circle. Simon drilled a shot at the Bison goalie, who made a save. But Allesie was there for the rebound and knocked the ball past McCormick for the goal, tying the game at 1-1 with 2:46 left in the half. The 1-1 score held to halftime. Penn State outshot Bucknell 13-3 in the first half and had a 3-1 lead in penalty corners. McCormick had six saves for Bucknell while Penn State keeper Brie Barraco (Allentown, Pa.) had one save for the Nittany Lions.

Penn State struck quickly to open up the third period. The Lions had possession, worked the ball to the right of the Bucknell circle. Gladieux received the ball at the top of the BU circle, then drove to her left and clicked off a hard backhand past McCormick to give the Nittany Lions a 2-1 lead at the 14:31 mark. Gladieux took a great pass from Jemma Punch (McDowall, Australia) in front of the Bison cage and forced a corner at the 7:51 mark but Penn State's corner offense could not connect. But seconds later, Gladieux would connect, taking a pass from Spisak and scoring on another backhand at the 6:01 mark to put Penn State on top 3-1. The two-goal lead for Penn State would carry into the fourth period. The Nittany Lions forced a series of quick corners to open the fourth quarter, but McCormick made a flurry of saves to keep Penn State from finding the back of the cage. Gladieux, however, was undaunted and scored her third straight goal off a nice drive in the Bucknell circle, getting the goal at the 12:07 mark to put the Lions up 4-1. Bucknell forced a penalty corner at the 9:23 mark but Barraco made a save on the play to keep the Bison from scoring. The teams battled back and forth over the next two minutes. Lion Brianna O'Donnell (Lansdale, Pa.) had a nice backhand shot saved by McCormick at the 1:30 mark in Penn State's final offensive press. The Nittany Lions wound down the clock and rolled to the 4-1 win. The Nittany Lions outshot Bucknell 25-4 over the course of the entire game and owned a 6-2 lead in penalty corners. The Penn State Nittany Lion field hockey team (10-3, 3-2 B1G), ranked No. 5 in the NFHCA Coaches Poll, used a fourth quarter burst to grab a road win at Lafayette (10-3) on Friday night. The Nittany Lions scored all their goals in the final period for a 3-1 non-conference victory. The Nittany Lions opened up the game taking control on offense. Sophia Gladieux (Boyetown, Pa.) got off a quick shot just 1:30 into the game, forcing Lafayette keeper Hailey Abbott into an early save. Mackenzie Allesie (Mount Joy, Pa.) and Emma Spisak (Boiling Springs, Pa.) each got off shots on goal in the opening period, but Abbott kept the Lions off the board with three early saves. The Penn State Nittany Lion field hockey team (10-4, 3-2 B1G), ranked No. 5 in the NFHCA Coaches Poll, tied the game late but lost in overtime at No. 16 Princeton (8-5) in New Jersey. Princeton scored in overtime and the Nittany Lions fell 3-2 in overtime in a battle between two top-20 teams. Princeton came out firing on offense and took an early lead. The Tigers picked up a penalty corner less than 5:00 into the contest and turned the corner into a 1-0 lead. Beth Yeager scored at the 10:19 mark off the corner to give the home team the early edge. Princeton continued to press the Lion defense, getting off two more quick shots that Lion keeper Brie Barraco (Allentown, Pa.) made outstanding saves on. Penn State did not get its first shot until the 3:59 mark when Sophia Gladieux (Boyetown, Pa.) fired off a shot that Princeton keeper Isla Okkinga made a save on. Penn State got dinged for a green card late in the opening period, but the Lions were able to kill the penalty and first period ended with the Nittany Lions trailing 1-0. The home team fired off two shots in close to start the second period, with Barraco netting two early saves to keep the game at 1-0. Penn State then pushed the ball downfield where Jemma Punch (McDowall, Australia) had a shot saved by Okkinga. The Lions picked up a penalty corner in the process and tied the game up on the ensuing set. Anna Simon (Hanau, Germany) scored off the corner set, with assists from Elena Vos (Grave, The Netherlands) and Mackenzie Allesie (Mount Joy, Pa.) to tie the game with 12:20 left in the second period. Simon's goal energized the Penn State offense, and the Lions went on attack. Gladieux got off two shots in the next two minutes, but the Tiger defense held. Princeton managed to work the ball into the Penn State circle midway through the second period where it forced a corner with under 8:00 left. Barraco made another save to keep the game tied. The Lion defense withstood three more Princeton shots down the stretch and the game moved to halftime tied 1-1. Princeton outshot Penn State 10-7 in the opening half and had a 3-2 lead in corners. Barraco had five saves for Penn State while Okkinga had two for the Tigers.

Like the game's first two quarters, Princeton had the first offensive opportunity in the third. Sammy Popper fired a shot at the Lion goal just 1:30 into the period but Barraco once again proved too much, picking up her sixth save of the game to keep the Lions knotted at 1-1. Penn State responded



quickly though, forcing a penalty corner a minute later. Simon's shot off the corner set was blocked, however. Princeton picked up a corner of its own at the 10:46 mark but the Lions defended the effort easily. The teams traded shots over the next eight minutes with no scoring. Gladieux had a late shot slide wide with just 1:30 left in the period, which was followed by a green card called on Princeton. The Nittany Lions held a player advantage for the rest of the period and entered the fourth tied 1-1. Princeton began the fourth period with a quick goal to take a 2-1 lead. Grace Schulze scored just 0:59 into the final stanza, with an assist from McCarthy. Penn State quickly worked the ball downfield and forced a corner two minutes later. But Gladieux's shot off the corner play was blocked, and Penn State trailed by one with 12:00 to play. Alessie had a shot saved by Okkinga as the clock hit 10:00 as well. The Nittany Lions maintained possession and picked up a penalty corner with 6:39 left to play. But Okkinga made another save on the ensuing Lion shot and Princeton maintained its 2-1 lead. Sammy Popper took an assist from Hannah Davey with 7:41 left in the extra period and scored the game winner, giving the Tigers a 3-2 overtime win. Penn State outshot Princeton 21-16 overall but the Tigers owned a 12-8 lead in shots on goal. The Nittany Lions had a 7-5 lead in corners as well. Barraco ended the game with nine saves while Okkinga had six for Princeton
