THIS WEEK'S PREVIEW

UNIVERSITY PARK, Pa.; April 20, 2021 -- The Penn State Nittany Lions (7-6, 5-2 B1G) will meet Ohio State (5-8, 2-5 B1G) in their first game of the 2020-21 Big Ten Field Hockey Tournament. The event runs Tuesday through Saturday, April 20-24, and will be hosted by the University of Iowa in Iowa City..

The winner of the Big Ten Tournament receives the Big Ten's automatic qualifier to the 2020-21 NCAA Field Hockey Championship.

The meeting will be the third straight between the two teams as the squads split two contests last weekend at the Penn State Field Hockey Complex. Penn State won a hard-fought 2-1 victory on Friday afternoon and the Buckeyes turned around and claimed a thrilling 3-2 overtime win on Sunday. Penn State's win on Friday clinched the Big Ten Tournament's No. 2 seed as Penn State posted a 5-2 mark in the conference standings.

The Nittany Lions are being led by freshman Sophia Gladieux, who claimed her second Big Ten Freshman of the Week honor and was named first team All-Big Ten this week. Gladieux has 24 points off 11 goals and two assists. Bree Bednarski checks in with 15 points off four goals and seven assists. Elena Vos anchors the defense and has six assists while Abby Myers leads the midfield and has two assists. Vos and Myers were second team All-Big Ten selections. Goalie Brie Barraco has 63 saves and a .797 save percentage this year.

The Big Ten Tournament begins on Tuesday with Michigan State and Indiana battling at 1 p.m. for the right to face No. 1 seed Michigan on Wednesday at 12 p.m. Maryland and Iowa face off on Wednesday at 2:30 p.m., Penn State and Ohio State at 5 p.m. and Northwestern and Rutgers at 7:30 p.m. The semifinals are set for Thursday at 5 p.m. (Wednesday game 1 and 2 winners) and 7:30 p.m. (Wednesday game 3 and 4 winners). The title game is Saturday at 12 p.m. Every game will air live on the Big Ten Network.

Penn State will serve as one of two host sites for the NCAA tournament. The Penn State Field Hockey Complex will host two games on Friday, April 30 at 12 p.m. and 3 p.m. and two games on Sunday, May 2, at 12 p.m. and 3 p.m.

GLADIEUX FIRST TEAM ALL-BIG; MYERS, VOS SECOND TEAM; SPISAK SPORTSMANSHIP!

Four members of the Penn State field hockey team earned post-season honors with the announcement of the 2020-21 All-Big Ten teams at the conclusion of the regular season. Freshman Sophia Gladieux earned first team All-Big Ten honors in her rookie campaign. Senior Abby Myers and sophomore Elena Vos were named to the second team All-Big Ten squad. Senior Emma Spisak was a Penn State's Sportsmanship Award winner.

SOPHIA GLADIEUX NAMED B1G FRESHMAN OF THE WEEK (4/18)

Sophia Gladieux earned her second Big Ten Freshman of the Week award for the week ending April 17. Gladieux was honored for a five-point weekend against Ohio State. She had a goal in Penn State's 2-1 win on Friday, April 16, and a goal and an assist in Penn State's 3-2 overtime loss on Saturday, April 17.

NITTANY LIONS SPLIT SERIES WITH OHIO STATE; SECURE TOURNEY #2 SEED WITH FRIDAY WIN

Penn State secured the second-seed for the 2020-21 Big Ten Tournament with a 2-1 victory over visiting Ohio State on Friday, April 16. The Nittany Lions capped off a 5-2 conference slate with the win. The next day, Penn State rallied from a two-goal deficit before dropping a 3-2 overtime game to the Buckeyes to end the regular season with a 7-6 overall mark.

DEFENSE LEADS PENN STATE TO TWO SHUTOUT VICTORIES OVER INDIANA

Penn State played stingy defense, led by sophomore Elena Vos, in two shutout victories over Indiana on April 9 and April 11 at the Penn State Field Hockey Complex. The Lion defense and goalie Brie Barraco held firm in 1-0 and 3-0 victories over the visiting Hoosiers. Offensively, Sophia Gladieux had three goals in two games while Vos had two assists.

PENN STATE FALLS TWICE AT #12 RUTGERS

Penn State lost two hard-fought games to #12 Rutgers on April 2 and 4 in Piscataway. The Nittany Lions lost 3-0 on Friday night and then dropped a close 1-0 game on Sunday to the Scarlet Knights.

NITTANY LIONS GET ROAD SWEEP AT MSU

Penn State travelled to East Lansing, Mich., on March 19 and 21 for two Big Ten road games. The Lions won both games, 5-2 on Friday and 3-0 on Sunday, using an offensive burst by freshman Sophia Gladieux. Gladieux scored four goals in Friday's 5-2 victory, sparking Penn State in a comeback victory (the Lions trailed 2-0 in the third). Two days later, with keeper Brie Barraco pitching her second shutout, Gladieux scored another goal to total five for the weekend.

With Penn State trailing the Spartans 2-0 in the second half of Friday's game, Gladieux rallied Penn State with four second half goals as the Lions won 5-2. Two days later, Gladieux notched her fifth goal of the weekend in Penn State's 3-0 shutout victory over MSU.

BREE BEDNARSKI BIG OFFENSIVE AOW (3/16)

Senior Bree Bednarski was named Big Ten field hockey Offensive Player of the Week for the week ending 3/14/21. Bednarski tallied points in each of Penn State's home games against Maryland this weekend at the Penn State Field Hockey Complex. Bednarski assisted on Penn State's first goal Friday, taking the penalty corner that led to an Anna Simon goal in the team's 3-0 shutout victory over the Terrapins. Two days later, Bednarski kept Penn State in contention in a tough 3-2 loss to Maryland. Bednarski had a goal and an assist in the game.

NITTANY LIONS SPLIT WEEKEND SERIES WITH VISITING MARYLAND

Anna Simon and Sophia Gladieux each had a goal and an assist and Brie Barraco collected seven saves in a 3-0 shutout win over Maryland on Friday, March 12, in the first of two games against the Terrapins. The win counted in the Big Ten standings as well. Two days later, Maryland scored a late goal to walk away with a 3-2 win at the Penn State Field Hockey Complex. Bree Bednarski had a goal and an assist in the contest.

BARRACO GRABS 12 SAVES, LIONS DOWN WILDCATS IN SHOOT OUT

Sophomore goalie Brie Barraco collected 12 saves in Penn State's March 5 win over Northwestern in Virginia Beach. Her outstanding effort in the cage led Penn State to a 2-1 victory in a shoot out. Bree Bednarski scored the Lions' goal in regulation and the team won the shoot out 4-3, with Barraco stopping two Northwestern shots.

PENN STATE DROPS TWO 1-0 GAMES TO IOWA

The Penn State Nittany Lions battled Iowa evenly for the entirety of its season opener on Feb. 28, but dropped a close 1-0 game to the Hawkeyes. While the teams were basically dead-even statistically, Iowa used a fourth quarter goal to secure the victory. A week later, the two teams met again in Virginia Beach and this time Iowa made a second period goal stand, in the game played on March 7.

PENN STATE 0, IOWA 1

Sunday, February 28, 2021 -- Virginia Beach, Va.

The Penn State Nittany Lion field hockey team (0-1, 0-1 B1G) dropped a close game to Iowa (2-0, 2-0 B1G) in the season opener for the Nittany Lions. A fourth period Hawkeye goal was the difference as Iowa won 1-0 over head coach Char Morett-Curtiss' squad in a game played in Virginia Beach, Va.

The teams traded possessions over the first few minutes of the game. Iowa managed to push the ball down into Penn State territory and maintained possession until pushing the ball into the Penn State circle. The Hawkeyes kept the ball down on the Lion side of the field for the next five minutes. But the Nittany Lion defense kept Iowa from any real threat on the cage and the game remained scoreless midway through the first period. Freshman Sophia Gladieux (Boyetown, Pa.) worked midfield possession into the Iowa zone and Penn State set up on offense at the 5:30 mark. Senior Abby Myers (Hartland, Wis.) nearly got off Penn State's first shot of the game with 3:40 left in the period but the Iowa defenders deflected the effort. The first period ended in a scoreless tie.

The start of the second period started with Penn State grabbing early possession and pressing the Hawkeye defense. Meghan Reese (Coopersburg, Pa.) and Grace Wallis (Blue Bell, Pa.) pushed the ball down field early, forcing Iowa's defense to step up and push back on the attack. With Iowa countering Penn State's early pressure, the Nittany Lion defense quickly turned away a brief Hawkeye possession. The Nittany Lions regained possession and moved the ball downfield, picking up the game's first penalty corner at the 9:43 mark. Junior Anna Simon (Hanau, Germany) had her shot off the corner blocked by a Hawkeye defender before the ball reached the goal. Emma Spisak (Boiling Springs, Pa.) worked on offense to keep the ball in front of the Iowa cage but the Hawkeye defense held firm. Penn State picked up its second corner with 6:30 left in the half but could not get off a solid shot. Iowa countered, moved the ball downfield, and picked up its first corner with 3:42 on the clock. Penn State's defense, led by Madison Hutson (Gloucester Point, Va.), forced a wide shot. The first half ended tied 0-0. Neither team had a shot in the first period and Iowa outshot Penn State 3-2 in the second stanza. Both teams had two penalty corners in the second period as well and neither goalie had a first half save.

The two teams traded early possessions in the third with Iowa finally gaining an advantage and pushing the ball into Penn State territory, forcing a penalty corner just 2:30 into the third period. Penn State's defense, with Brie Barraco (Allentown, Pa.) guarding the cage, was equal to the task and the Hawkeye corner was for naught. Iowa kept the pressure on Penn State, however, and the ball remained in or near the Lion circle for the next 3:00-plus. Iowa pushed the ball to within feet of Barraco and the Lion cage with 6:40 left in the period but Penn State's defense was able to push the ball out of its circle. Penn State regained control of the tempo as the clock moved below the 5:00 mark, pushing the ball down to the Iowa side of the field. But the Hawkeyes countered the Penn State press and regain control of the action. A long Hawkeye shot was turned away by Barraco to keep the game scoreless. Iowa had a fast break rolling with under a minute left, but Hutson was deft defensively, stealing the ball from the Hawkeye forward as the third period hit its final seconds.

Penn State's defense was once again called to action as the fourth period began with Iowa gaining control early in the final stanza. Penn State's offense made a push a couple minutes into the period with Spisak taking a long pass from Bree Bednarski (Wyoming, Pa.) and working the ball down to the right of Iowa's cage. The Lions worked to shift momentum, keeping Iowa on defense, but the Hawkeyes quickly regained possession of the ball. Iowa's Ellie Holley worked the ball from midfield down into the Lion circle and pushed the ball past the Penn State defense for the game's first goal at the 8:10 mark of the fourth quarter. Penn State worked furiously to keep control of the ball as it worked to tie the game. Iowa was unable to get the ball out of its own zone as the Nittany Lion offense kept the pressure on. Penn State was able to secure a penalty corner in the final minutes. Penn State's first corner of the period was defended but led to a second. Bednarski worked the ball into Hutson and a penalty stroke was called with just under 2:00 left to play. Hutson's penalty shot was blocked by Iowa keeper Grace McGuire and the Hawkeyes kept their 1-0 lead and secured the early-season victory. Penn State had five shots over the course of the game while Iowa had six. Both keepers Barraco and McGuire had a save a piece and Penn State held a 4-3 penalty corner edge in the game.

The Penn State Nittany Lion field hockey team (1-1, 1-1 B1G) took down Northwestern (2-1, 2-1 B1G) this afternoon in a Big Ten contest. Head coach Char Morett-Curtiss' squad battled over 80:00 and through a shoot out to beat the Wildcats 2-1 in a game played in Virginia Beach, Va.

Northwestern had an early penalty corner that Penn State defended. The Lions got off two close shots on goal that ended in a high save and a wide shot, both coming before the 11:30 mark of the first period. Freshman Sophia Gladieux (Boyetown, Pa.) forced a penalty corner at the 8:01 mark. Elena Vos (Grave, The Netherlands) had her first shot off the corner blocked but the Lions followed up with a second. Madison Hutson (Gloucester Point, Va.) appeared to score off a rebound on the second corner but the goal was waved off by the officials. Northwestern had a player advantage after a Penn State green card but Penn State still controlled the action, with Jemma Punch (McDowall, Australia) getting off a solid shot at the 4:00 mark. Northwestern keeper Annabel Skubisz was able to knock the shot aside. Northwestern picked up a green card, evening the sides, and the first period ended in a scoreless tie.

Penn State looked to control the tempo to start the second period. The Nittany Lions kept the ball down on the Northwestern side of the field for the opening few minutes but could not find the cage as Penn State continued to pressure the Wildcat defense. Northwestern countered Penn State and worked the ball down to the Penn State circle. Sabrina Solomen connected at the 10:47 mark to give Northwestern a 1-0 lead early in the second period despite Penn State's consistent pressure. Grace Wallis (Blue Bell, Pa.) moved the ball down the sideline at the 7:00 mark and Penn State picked up a penalty corner with 6:48 left in the quarter. Emma Spisak's (Boiling Springs, Pa.) shot was blocked away. Northwestern withstood some early Penn State pressure in to start the third period and gained possession three minutes in. The Wildcats picked up a series of penalty corners that the Lion defense was able to withstand, keeping the score close at 1-0. The Nittany Lions pushed the ball down to Northwestern's circle at the 7:30 mark and made the offensive push pay off. Senior Bree Bednarski (Wyoming, Pa.) scored Penn State's first goal of the young season, tying the game at 1-1 with 7:23 on the clock with an assist from Abby Myers (Hartland, Wis.). Northwestern countered by forcing a penalty corner at the 5:28 mark. Vos made a good defensive save on the corner to keep the game tied with under 5:00 to play in the third stanza. Penn State defended two more Northwestern corners later in the period and entered the fourth tied 1-1.

Penn State picked up an early penalty corner to start the fourth period but the Lions shot went high. The Lions had a number of opportunities near the Wildcat circle but the NU defense was able to hamper Penn State just enough to force a turnover as the clock hit 10:00. The Wildcats could not put together a sustained offensive push for the first half of the final period. With 8:30 on the clock, Northwestern moved the ball into the Penn State circle briefly but the Lion defense, anchored by freshman Kelsey Love (State College, Pa.), was equal to the task and the game remained tied 1-1. With just under 7:00, Northwestern set itself in the Lion circle again and Love once more forced an NU turnover and Penn State pushed the ball down the sideline and out of its own territory. Barraco knocked away a high Northwestern shot with 5:20 left to keep the game tied as the Wildcats began to sustain some momentum. Penn State's defense was pressed over four minutes and held its own. The Lions moved into Northwestern territory for a corner at the 3:08 mark but the Lion shot went wide. The Lions kept the ball on NU's side for the final minutes, forcing the Wildcat keeper into a couple saves to send the game into overtime.

Penn State took the opening possession in sudden victory and pressured the Wildcat defense right away. But Northwestern pushed the Lions back, regained possession themselves and looked to move the ball into the Lion circle. With the teams trading bars in the midfield, Northwestern took a hard shot that Barraco knocked aside with 7:22 on the clock. Barraco had another save shortly after that and a subsequent NU shot went just wide with 6:40 left. Meghan Reese (Coopersburg, Pa.) helped Penn State regain possession as the clock hit 5:00. Northwestern took a player advantage on a Nittany Lion green card with just under 5:00 and forced a penalty corner with 4:08 left in overtime. Barraco defended the initial shot and the rebound effort from Northwestern. Penn State killed off the penalty and took possession of the ball as the clock moved to the 2:00 mark. Penn State picked up a penalty corner with 1:11 left. Anna Simon's (Hanau, Germany) shot off the corner was blocked and the game moved to a second overtime.

Northwestern had possession to start the second extra period and moved the ball down into the Lion circle. Penn State defended the effort and regained possession, pushing the ball downfield as the clock moved to the 7:51 mark. Myers moved deep into the NU circle only to have the ball roll over the end line. Northwestern countered and Barraco knocked back a point-blank Northwestern shot, keeping the game tied 1-1 at the 6:12 mark. Another Northwestern effort ended in a shot just wide off the Lion cage with 4:27 left as well. Hutson broke up a Northwestern fast break with 3:00 on the clock and Penn State countered. Emma Spisak (Boiling Springs, Pa.) took the ball the length off the field but the Wildcats pushed back on her drive and the clock moved under the 2:00 mark. The final minutes were scoreless as well and the game moved to a shoot out.

Sophia Gladieux (Boyetown, Pa.), Simon and Reese each connected on their shoot out efforts while Barraco had saves on three of Northwestern's five efforts to help Penn State win the shoot out by one and secure the 2-1 victory. Penn State had 18 shots in the game while Northwestern had 24. The Lions had six penalty corners to nine for NU. Barraco gave Penn State a chance to win in the shoot out, totaling 12 saves in the game, including 10 in the second half and overtime periods.

Head coach Char Morett-Curtiss' squad lost 1-0 to the Hawkeyes in a game played in Virginia Beach, Va. Being the second game between the two squads, the result counts overall for the teams but not in the Big Ten standings.

The Nittany Lions controlled the tempo of the game from the opening whistle. series of corners with just over 2:00 left in the period but could not work the ball into the cage. The teams traded possession in the second period with Penn State dominating the action. The pressured Michigan State and keeper Jade Arundell for much of the period but the Spartan keeper was able to keep the Nittany Lions off the board. Freshman Sophia Gladieux (Boyetown, Pa.) had two shots on goal batted away in the first half and the Nittany Lions trailed by one at intermission. The Penn State Nittany Lion field hockey team (4-4, 3-2 B1G) dropped a hard-fought contest at Rutgers (6-3, 4-2 B1G) in a Big Ten road game Friday in New Jersey. The Nittany Lions could not break through a stingy Scarlet Knight defense in a 3-0 loss in Piscataway. In instances where teams are scheduled to play each other twice during this year's Big Ten season, only the first game between the two squads is considered for the Big Ten regular season standings. Given that, today's game counts in both the conference and overall standings.

The two teams traded early possessions with each team pushing the ball into the opposing circle early on. The Scarlet Knights maintained possession midway through the period and picked up the game's first penalty corner at the 6:13 mark. Penn State goalie Brie Barraco (Allentown, Pa.) made a good save on the initial shot off the corner but Rutgers' Clayre Smith knocked in a goal off the rebound to give the Scarlet Knights a 1-0 lead at the 6:06 mark. Penn State led 1-0 at the halftime break. Each team had three shots in the first half and both keepers had two saves. Ohio State had the only corner of the opening 30:00.

Ohio State came out in the third period and put consistent pressure on the Nittany Lions. The Buckeyes reeled off eight shots in the third period alone, thanks in large part to five penalty corners in the third stanza. Nevertheless, it was Penn State that scored the first goal of the third, with Emma Spisak (Boiling Springs, Pa.) taking a great pass from Grace Wallis (Blue Bell, Pa.) just over a minute into the half to give Penn State a 2-0 lead at the 13:58 mark. From that point on in the period, however, Ohio State's attack pressured the Nittany Lions until Delaney Lawler notched a goal with assists from Alessie and Lotte Algra, cutting Penn State's lead to 2-1 with 4:11 on the clock. Barraco continued to face pressure from the Buckeyes and had five saves in the third period alone. Barraco stood tall in the goal over the final 15:00 as well as Ohio State reeled off five more shots, with the sophomore keeper grabbing two more saves. The Nittany Lions were able to maintain the 2-1 lead for the entirety of the final period despite Ohio State winning the ball possession game. The Buckeyes pulled their goalie with just over 3:00 left to play but the Nittany Lions kept the visitors from finding the goal and Penn State held on for a hard-fought 2-1 victory. Ohio State outshot the Nittany Lions 16-6 and had eight penalty corners to none for Penn State. Barraco collected nine saves in the contest while Danson had three for Ohio State.

PENN STATE 2, OHIO STATE 3

Saturday, April 17, 2021 -- University Park, Pa.

The Penn State Nittany Lion field hockey team (7-6, 5-2 B1G) lost a hard-fought overtime game to visiting Ohio State (5-8, 2-5 B1G) in the regular season finale for both teams. Head coach Char Morett-Curtiss' squad rallied from a two-goal deficit but dropped a 3-2 game in overtime at the Penn State Field Hockey Complex. In instances where teams are scheduled to play each other twice during this year's Big Ten season, only the first game between the two squads is considered for the Big Ten regular season standings. Given that, today's game only counts in the overall standings for each team, not the conference ledger.

The Nittany Lions fell victim to two first half penalty strokes, the first just over two minutes into the game. Ohio State was awarded the penalty stroke at the 12:38 mark, with Mackenzie Alessie connecting on the effort to give the Buckeyes an early 1-0 lead. The Nittany Lions were on defense for the majority of the opening period as Ohio State outshot the home team 7-2 in the opening 15 minutes. Nittany Lion goalie Brie Barraco (Allentown, Pa.) collected four saves in the first period to keep Penn State close. The Buckeyes, continuing a trend started in Friday's game, rolled off five penalty corners in the opening period alone but Barraco's play in the cage kept OSU to just one goal. The second period began much like the first with Ohio State moving the ball into the Penn State circle and just :31 into the stanza picking up yet another penalty stroke. Alessie connected once again with 14:29 on the clock and the Buckeyes led 2-0. The remainder second period was an even affair with the teams trading possessions and opportunities. Penn State got on the board at the 11:45 mark when freshman Sophia Gladieux (Boyertown, Pa.) scored unassisted after a nifty drive through the Buckeye circle, putting the ball past Ohio State goalie Abby Danson to cut the OSU lead to 2-1. Penn State battled Ohio State evenly for the rest of the period, picking up two penalty corners in the process, but Ohio State led by one at halftime. Ohio State outshot Penn State 12-6 in the first half thanks to the opening period's margin. The Buckeyes had an 8-2 edge in corners while Barraco had seven saves to three for Danson.

Penn State came out in the third period and dominated ball possession and tempo, rolling up seven shots to only one for the Buckeyes. Penn State also posted a 4-0 edge in penalty corners and the Nittany Lions kept the ball in the Buckeye circle for much of the period. But Ohio State goalie Danson kept Penn State from tying the game, collecting four saves in the third period to allow the visitors to maintain their one goal lead heading to the fourth period. The fourth period was a back-and-forth affair as Penn State looked for an opportunity to tie the game. With just under four minutes left in the contest, Penn State forced its only corner of the period and this time, the Lions connected. Bree Bednarski (Wyoming, Pa.) knocked in a hard, wide shot from Gladieux, allowing the ball to carrom past Danson to knot the game at 2-2 with just 3:14 left in the contest. The remaining minutes of regulation were scoreless and the game moved to overtime. The Buckeyes, however, stifled Penn State's comeback efforts just 1:13 into the extra stanza when Sarah Charley knocked a high shot into the back of the cage to give OSU the 3-2 victory. Ohio State owned a 17-14 edge in shots and a 9-7 edge in penalty corners over the course of the game. Barraco had eight saves for the Nittany Lions while Danson had six for Ohio State. Each team had a defensive save as well.
