## THIS WEEK'S PREVIEW

UNIVERSITY PARK, Pa.; April 6, 2021 -- The Penn State Nittany Lions (4-5, 3-w B1G) will look to get back on the winning track when they host Indiana (0-10, 0-7 B1G) Friday, April 9, at 3 p.m. and again on Sunday, April 11, at 11 a.m. (*please note that the 11 a.m. start for Sunday is a recent change).* 

For the 2020-21 Big Ten season, the Big Ten has stated that in cases where teams are scheduled to play each other twice during the year, only the first meeting counts towards the Big Ten regular season standings.

Penn State is coming off a tough 0-2 weekend at No. 12 Rutgers, suffering two shutout losses in Piscataway. The Lions fell 3-0 on Friday and 1-0 on Sunday. The Nittany Lions are 4-5 overall and 3-2 in Big Ten action.

Indiana will enter the game with an 0-10 overall record, 0-7 in the conference. The Hoosiers lost two games in Columbus against Ohio State last weekend. Due to field renovations, the Hoosiers are playing every game away this season.

The Nittany Lions lead the all-time series with Rutgers 23-4. Penn State won the last meeting, a 3-1 in on Oct. 4, 2019, last year in Bloomington.

Penn State is ranked No. 14 in the latest NFHCA Coaches Poll (4/6/21). The Nittany Lions host Ohio State on Friday and Saturday, April 16 and 17. Both games are at 3 p.m. at the Penn State Field Hockey Complex in their next games.

## NOTES

### PENN STATE FALLS TWICE AT #12 RUTGERS

Penn State lost two hard-fought games to #12 Rutgers on April 2 and 4 in Piscataway. The Nittany Lions lost 3-0 on Friday night and then dropped a close 1-0 game on Sunday to the Scarlet Knights.

### NITTANY LIONS GET ROAD SWEEP AT MSU

Penn State travelled to East Lansing, Mich., on March 19 and 21 for two Big Ten road games. The Lions won both games, 5-2 on Friday and 3-0 on Sunday, using an offensive burst by freshman Sophia Gladieux. Gladieux scored four goals in Friday's 5-2 victory, sparking Penn State in a comeback victory (the Lions trailed 2-0 in the third). Two days later, with keeper Brie Barraco pitching her second shutout, Gladieux scored another goal to total five for the weekend.

### GLADIEUX NFHCA OFFENSIVE; B1G OFFENSIVE PLAYER & FRESHMAN OF THE WEEK (3/23)

Penn State Nittany Lion field hockey player Sophia Gladieux (Boyertown, Pa.) has been named NFHCA Offensive Player of the Week and both the Big Ten Field Hockey Freshman and Offensive Player of the Week for the week ending March 21, 2021. Gladieux's honors are the second and third of the season for Penn State. Bree Bednarski earned the Offensive Player of the Week honor last week. Gladieux roared into East Lansing for her first two Big Ten road games and left Michigan State with five goals. With Penn State trailing the Spartans 2-0 in the second half of Friday's game, Gladieux rallied Penn State with four second half goals as the Lions won 5-2. Two days later, Gladieux notched her fifth goal of the weekend in Penn State's 3-0 shutout victory over MSU.

### BREE BEDNARSKI B1G OFFENSIVE AoW (3/16)

Senior Bree Bednarski was named Big Ten field hockey Offensive Player of the Week for the week ending 3/14/21. Bednarski tallied points in each of Penn State's home games against Maryland this weekend at the Penn State Field Hockey Complex. Bednarski assisted on Penn State's first goal Friday, taking the penalty corner that led to an Anna Simon goal in the team's 3-0 shutout victory over the Terrapins. Two days later, Bednarski kept Penn State in contention in a tough 3-2 loss to Maryland. Bednarski had a goal and an assist in the game.

## NITTANY LIONS SPLIT WEEKEND SERIES WITH VISITING MARYLAND

Anna Simon and Sophia Gladieux each had a goal and an assist and Brie Barraco collected seven saves in a 3-0 shutout win over Maryland on Friday, March 12, in the first of two games against the Terrapins. The win counted in the Big Ten standings as well. Two days later, Maryland scored a late goal to walk away with a 3-2 win at the Penn State Field Hockey Complex. Bree Bednarski had a goal and an assist in the contest.

### BARRACO GRABS 12 SAVES, LIONS DOWN WILDCATS IN SHOOT OUT

Sophomore goalie Brie Barraco collected 12 saves in Penn State's March 5 win over Northwestern in Virginia Beach. Her outstanding effort in the cage led Penn State to a 2-1 victory in a shoot out. Bree Bednarski scored the Lions' goal in regulation and the team won the shoot out 4-3, with Barraco stopping two Northwestern shots.

### PENN STATE DROPS TWO 1-0 GAMES TO IOWA

The Penn State Nittany Lions battled lowa evenly for the entirety of its season opener on Feb. 28, but dropped a close 1-0 game to the Hawkeyes. While the teams were basically dead-even statistically, lowa used a fourth quarter goal to secure the victory. A week later, the two teams met again in Virginia Beach and this time lowa made a second period goal stand, in the game played on March 7.

## GAME SUMMARIES



### PENN STATE 0, IOWA 1

### Sunday, February 28, 2021 -- Virginia Beach, Va.

The Penn State Nittany Lion field hockey team (0-1, 0-1 B1G) dropped a close game to Iowa (2-0, 2-0 B1G) in the season opener for the Nittany Lions. A fourth period Hawkeye goal was the difference as Iowa won 1-0 over head coach Char Morett-Curtiss' squad in a game played in Virginia Beach, Va.

The teams traded possessions over the first few minutes of the game. Iowa managed to push the ball down into Penn State territory and maintained possession until pushing the ball into the Penn State circle. The Hawkeyes kept the ball down on the Lion side of the field for the next five minutes. But the Nittany Lion defense kept Iowa from any real threat on the cage and the game remained scoreless midway through the first period. Freshman Sophia Gladieux (Boyertown, Pa.) worked midfield possession into the Iowa zone and Penn State set up on offense at the 5:30 mark. Senior Abby Myers (Hartland, Wis.) nearly got off Penn State's first shot of the game with 3:40 left in the period but the Iowa defenders deflected the effort. The first period ended in a scoreless tie.

The start of the second period started with Penn State grabbing early possession and pressing the Hawkeye defense. Meghan Reese (Coopersburg, Pa.) and Grace Wallis (Blue Bell, Pa.) pushed the ball down field early, forcing lowa's defense to step up and push back on the attack. With lowa countering Penn State's early pressure, the Nittany Lion defense quickly turned away a brief Hawkeye possession. The Nittany Lion sregained possession and moved the ball downfield, picking up the game's first penalty corner at the 9:43 mark. Junior Anna Simon (Hanau, Germany) had her shot off the corner blocked by a Hawkeye defender before the ball reached the goal. Emma Spisak (Boiling Springs, Pa.) worked on of fense to keep the ball in front of the lowa cage but the Hawkeye defense held firm. Penn State picked up its second corner with 6:30 left in the half but could not get off a solid shot. Iowa countered, moved the ball downfield, and picked up its first corner with 3:42 on the clock. Penn State's defense, led by Madison Hutson (Gloucester Point, Va.), forced a wide shot. The first half ended tied 0-0. Neither team had a shot in the first period and lowa outshot Penn State 3-2 in the second stara. Both teams had two penalty corners in the second period as well and neither goalie had a first half save.

The two teams traded early possessions in the third with lowa finally gaining an advantage and pushing the ball into Penn State territory, forcing a penalty corner just 2:30 into the third period. Penn State's defense, with Brie Barraco (Allentown, Pa) guarding the cage, was equal to the task and the Hawkeye corner was for naught. Iowa kept the pressure on Penn State, however, and the ball remained in or near the Lion circle for the next 3:00-plus. Iowa pushed the ball to within feet of Barraco and the Lion cage with 6:40 left in the period but Penn State's defense was able to push the ball out of its circle. Penn State regained control of the tempo as the clock moved below the 5:00 mark, pushing the ball down to the lowa side of the field. But the Hawkeyes countered the Penn State press and regain control of the action. A long Hawkeye shot was turned away by Barraco to keep the game scoreless. Iowa had a fast break rolling with under a minute left, but Hutson was deft defensively, stealing the ball from the Hawkeye forward as the third period bit is final seconds.

Penn State's defense was once again called to action as the fourth period began with Iowa gaining control early in the final stanza. Penn State's offense made a push a couple minutes into the period with Spisak taking a long pass from Bree Bednarski (Wyoming, Pa.) and working the ball down to the right of Iowa's cage. The Lions worked to shift momentum, keeping Iowa on defense, but the Hawkeyes quickly regained possession of the ball. Iowa's Ellie Holley worked the ball from midfield down into the Lion circle and pushed the ball past the Penn State defense for the game's first goal at the 8:10 mark of the fourth quarter. Penn State worked furiously to keep control of the ball as it worked to the the game. Iowa was unable to get the ball out of its own zone as the Nittany Lion offense kept the pressure on. Penn State was able to secure a penalty corner in the final minutes. Penn State's first corner of the period was defended but led to a second. Bednarski worked the ball into Hutson and a penalty stroke was called with just under 2:00 left to play. Hutson's penalty shot was blocked by Iowa keeper Grace McGuire and the Hawkeyes kept their 1-0 lead and secured the early-season victory. Penn State had five shots over the course of the game while Iowa had six. Both keepers Barraco and McGuire had a save a piece and Penn State held a 4-3 penalty corner edge in the game.

### Friday, March 5, 2021 -- Virginia Beach, Va.

The Penn State Nittany Lion field hockey team (1-1, 1-1 B1G) took down Northwestern (2-1, 2-1 B1G) this afternoon in a Big Ten contest. Head coach Char Morett-Curtiss' squad battled over 80:00 and through a shoot out to beat the Wildcats 2-1 in a game played in Virginia Beach, Va.

Northwestern had an early penalty corner that Penn State defended. The Lions got off two close shots on goal that ended in a high save and a wide shot, both coming before the 11:30 mark of the first period. Freshman Sophia Gladieux (Boyertown, Pa.) forced a penalty corner at the 8:01 mark. Elena Vos (Grave, The Netherlands) had her first shot off the corner blocked but the Lions followed up with a second. Madison Hutson (Gloucester Point, Va.) appeared to score off a rebound on the second corner but the goal was waved off by the officials. Northwestern had a player advantage after a Penn State green card but Penn State still controlled the action, with Jemma Punch (McDowall, Australia) getting off a solid shot at the 4:00 mark. Northwestern keeper Annabel Skubisz was able to knock the shot aside. Northwestern picked up a green card, evening the sides, and the first period ended in a scoreless tie. Penn State looked to control the tempo to start the second period. The Nittany Lions kept the ball down on the Northwestern side of the field for the opening few minutes but could not find the cage as Penn State continued to pressure the Wildcat defense. Northwestern countered Penn State and worked the ball down to the Penn State circle. Sabrina Solomen connected at the 10:47 mark to give Northwestern a 1-0 lead early in the second period despite Penn State's consistent pressure. Grace Wallis (Blue Bell, Pa.) moved the ball down the sideline at the 7:00 mark and Penn State picked up a penalty corner with 6:48 left in the quarter. Emma Spisak's (Boiling Springs, Pa.) shot was blocked away. Northwestern was able to move the action down to Penn State's side of the field with under 3:00 left in the period and forced a penalty comer with 2:34 on the clock. Penn State's defense held firm on the corner but Northwestern maintained possession. Lion keeper Brie Barraco (Allentown, Pa.) was able to keep Penn State within one with a diving save during the flury. Penn State trailed 1-0 at halftime. Penn State outshot Northwestern 12-3 in the first half but found itself down by a point. Wildcat keeper Skubisz had five saves to keep the Lions off the board early.

Northwestern withstood some early Penn State pressure in to start the third period and gained possession three minutes in. The Wildcats picked up a series of penalty corners that the Lion defense was able to withstand, keeping the score close at 1-0. The Nittany Lions pushed the ball down to Northwestern's circle at the 7:30 mark and made the offensive push pay off. Serior Bree Bednarski (Myoming, Pa.) scored Penn State's first goal of the young season, tying the game at 1-1 with 7:23 on the clock with an assist from Abby Myers (Hartland, Wis.). Northwestern countered by forcing a penalty corner at the 5:28 mark. Vos made a good defensive save on the corner to keep the game tied with under 5:00 to play in the third starza. Penn State defended two more Northwestern corners later in the period and entered the format tied 1-1.

Penn State picked up an early penalty corner to start the fourth period but the Lions shot went high. The Lions had a number of opportunities near the Wildcat circle but the NU defense was able to hamper Penn State just enough to force a turnover as the clock hit 10:00. The Wildcats could not put together a sustained offensive push for the first half of the final period. With 8:30 on the clock, Northwestern moved the ball into the Penn State circle briefly but the Lion defense, anchored by freshman Kelsey Love (State College, Pa.), was equal to the task and the game remained tied 1-1. With just under 7:00, Northwestern found itself in the Lion circle again and Love once more forced an NU turnover and Penn State pushed the ball down the sideline and out of its own territory. Barraco knocked away a high Northwestern shot with 5:20 left to keep the game tied as the Wildcats began to sustain some momentum. Penn State's defense was pressed over four minutes and held its own. The Lions moved into Northwestern territory for a corner at the 3:08 mark but the Lion shot went wide. The Lions kept the ball on NU's side for the final minutes, forcing the Wildcat keeper into a couple saves to send the game into overtime.

Penn State took the opening possession in sudden victory and pressured the Wildcat defense right away. But Northwestern pushed the Lions back, regained possession themselves and looked to move the ball into the Lion circle. With the teams trading barbs in the midfield, Northwestern took a hard shot that Barraco knocked aside with 7:22 on the clock. Barraco had another save shortly after that and a subsequent NU shot went just wide with 6:40 left. Meghan Reese (Coopersburg, Pa) helped Penn State regain possession as the clock hit 5:00. Northwestern took a player advantage on a Nittany Lion green card with just under 5:00 and forced a penalty corner with 4:08 left in overtime. Barraco defended the initial shot and the rebound effort from Northwestern. Penn State killed off the penalty and took possession of the ball as the clock moved to the 2:00 mark. Penn State picked up a penalty corner with 111 left. Anna Simon's (Hanau, Germany) shot off the corner was blocked and the game moved to a second overtime.

Northwestern had possession to start the second extra period and moved the ball down into the Lion circle. Penn State defended the effort and regained possession, pushing the ball downfield as the clock moved to the 7:51 mark. Myers moved deep into the NU circle only to have the ball roll over the end line. Northwestern countered and Barraco knocked back a point-blank Northwestern shot, keeping the game tied 1-1 at the 6:12 mark. Another Northwestern effort ended in a shot just wide off the Lion cage with 4:27 left as well. Hutson broke up a Northwestern fast break with 3:00 on the clock and Penn State countered. Emma Spisak (Boiling Springs, Pa.) took the ball the length off the field but the Wildcats pushed back on her drive and the clock moved under the 2:00 mark. The final minutes were scoreless as well and the game moved to a shoot out.

Sophia Gladieux (Boyertown, Pa.), Simon and Reese each connected on their shoot out efforts while Barraco had saves on three of Northwestern's five efforts to help Penn State win the shoot out by one and secure the 2-1 victory. Penn State had 18 shots in the game while Northwestern had 24. The Lions had six penalty corners to nine for NU. Barraco gave Penn State a chance to win in the shoot out, totaling 12 saves in the game, including 10 in the second half and overtime periods.

The Penn State Nittany Lion field hockey team (1-2, 1-1 B1G) dropped a hard-fought game to lowa (4-0, 3-0 B1G) this afternoon in a Big Ten contest. Head coach Char Morett-Curtiss' squad lost 1-0 to the Hawkeyes in a game played in Virginia Beach, Va. Being the second game between the two squads, the result counts overall for the teams but not in the Big Ten standings.

The teams traded possessions early in the opening period. Just over 10:00 into the first period, Iowa's offensive pressure forced Penn State into a foul in the circle and a penalty stroke ensued. Lion goalie Brie Barraco (Allentown, Pa.) stood firm in the cage, knocking the stroke to the side to keep the game scoreless as the cock moved below 5:00 in the period. Penn State's pushed back another Penn State effort before Bree Bednarski (Wyoming, Pa.) was able to take possession of the ball and move it down the sideline, into Iowa territory. The two teams battled evenly for the rest of the period and the game moved to the second tied 0-0.

The Penn State Nittany Lion field hockey team (1-1, 1-' B1G) shut out visiting Maryland (2-2, 2-1 B1G) in the home opener for head coach Char Morett-Curtiss' squad. Penn State scored a goal in the first, third and fourth quarters to roll to a 3-0 win in the first game played at the Penn State Field Hockey Complex this season. In instances where teams are schedule to play each other twice during this year's Big Ten season, only the first game between the two squads is considered for the Big Ten regular season standings. Given that, today's game counts both overall and in conference.

Ellie Wheatley scored off a scramble after the corner to give the home team a two-goal lead. But Lion freshman Gladieux quickly answered, getting Penn State back in the game with a goal of her own just four minutes later. Gladieux then tied the game with a brilliant drive into the MSU circle, taking the ball by herself and scoring from the outskirts of the MSU circle at the 8:30 mark, just ninety seconds after her first score. The flashy freshman made it a three-for-third period with another unassisted goal with just 1:10 left in the period. Penn State continued to pour it on in the fourth period. Madison Hutson (Gloucester Point, Va.) took an assist from Bree Bednarski (Wyoming, Pa.) to put Penn State up 4-2, scoring the Lions' fourth straight goal just 2:24 into the final period. Gladieux was not done, however. The Lion freshman nothed a fourth unassisted goal with just 1:48 left in the game to spark Penn State to the 5-2 victory. Gladieux's four scores is just one shy of the all-time Penn State record of five held by Morett-Curtiss (in 1977) and Dawn Lammey (in 1999). Penn State outshot Michigan State 15-7 over the course of the game and had a 9-2 advantage in corners. Arundell ended the game with six saves while Barraco had two, both in the first half.

The Penn State Nittany Lion field hockey team (4-3, 3-1 B1G) shut out host Michigan State (1-6, 1-4 B1G) in a Big Ten Sunday matinee in East Lansing, Mich. Head coach Char Morett-Curtiss' squad completed the weekend series sweep with a 3-0 victory. In instances where teams are scheduled to play each other twice during this year's Big Ten season, only the first game between the two squads is considered for the Big Ten regular season standings. Given that, today's game counts only in the overall standings.

The Nittany Lions scored quickly in the first quarter, with Anna Simon (Hanau, Germany) scoring off a penalty corner with assists from Bree Bednarski (Wyoming, Pa) and Elena Vos (Grave, The Netherlands). Michigan State stilled Penn State's offense for the remainder of the first period and the Lions settled for the one goal lead after the opening stanza. With the Nittany Lion defense pushing back and Spartan effort and offensive continuity in the second period, Penn State worked to pressure the Spartan circle. Michigan State was able to keep Penn State from getting into a similar offensive flow showcased in the second half of Friday's game. While unable to dent the scoreboard, however, Penn State kept the Spartan offense shut down as well and controlled the action for much of the stanza. Penn State made its first period goal stand in a 1-0 lead at intermission.

## PENN STATE 0, RUTGERS 3

### Friday, April 2, 2021 -- Piscataway, N.J.

The Penn State Nittany Lion field hockey team (4-4, 3-2 B1G) dropped a hard-fought contest at Rutgers (6-3, 4-2 B1G) in a Big Ten road game Friday in New Jersey. The Nittany Lions could not break through a stingy Scarlet Knight defense in a 3-0 loss in Piscataway. In instances where teams are scheduled to play each other twice during this year's Big Ten season, only the first game between the two squads is considered for the Big Ten regular season standings. Given that, today's game counts in both the conference and overall standings.

The two teams traded early possessions with each team pushing the ball into the opposing circle early on. The Scarlet Knights maintained possession midway through the period and picked up the game's first penalty comer at the 6:13 mark. Penn State goalie Brie Barraco (Allentown, Pa.) made a good save on the initial shot off the corner but Rutgers' Clayre Smith knocked in a goal off the rebound to give the Scarlet Knights a 1-0 lead at the 6:06 mark. Penn State worked to rally its offense after the goal with Emma Spisak (Boiling Springs, Pa.) and Bree Bednarski (Wyoming, Pa.) controlling action in the RU circle. But Rutgers defense was able to push back on the Lions and Penn State trailed by one after the opening period. Penn State began the second period in control offensively. The Nittany Lions spent the first minute pushing the ball into the Knight circle. Rutgers briefly regained possession but Penn State answered on defense the teams traded barbs in the midfield. Abby Myers (Hartland, Wis.), Grace Wallis (Blue Bell, Pa.) and the Lion forwards kept the pressure on Rutgers as the clock moved to the 11:00 mark but lost possession out of bounds, allowing the Knights to hit the ball down to the Nittany Lion side of the field. Penn State won the time of possession battle over the course of the second period but Rutgers had the period's best scoring chance, with Barraco knocking back a late RU pass at the :35 mark to set up a Penn State first penalty corner with just :05 on the clock. Rutgers was able to keep its shutout alive as Penn State did not score on the comer and the Nittany Lions trailed 1-0 at the half. Rutgers had the only two shots of the first half, owning a 2-0 edge in shots over the first 30 minutes. Neither Barraco nor Rutgers goalie Glanna Glatz had a save. Each team had one penalty comer as well.

The Nittany Lions once controlled action early on in the third period but could not break through the final levels of Rutgers' defense. The Scarlet Knights regained possession and worked the ball down into the Penn State circle at the 9:00 mark. After a minute-plus of action, Rutgers took a 2:0 lead when Rachel Houston scored at the 7:29 mark. Down by two, Penn State quickly tried to press the action into Rutgers territory but the Knights' defense continued to stymie the Lion efforts. Penn State forced a penalty corner with 5:20 on the clock. Glatz knocked back an Anna Simon (Hanau, Germany) shot after the correr to keep Penn State off the scoreboard. Penn State staved off a final Rutgers offensive push and trailed by two goals heading into the final period. Rutgers was able to work away the first minutes of the fourth period, forcing Barraco and the Lion defense to push back an early Knight effort as the clock moved to the 11:00 mark. Myers and freshman Sophia Gladieux (Boyertown, Pa.) nearly connected shortly after that as a Lion Fastbreak moved the ball into Rutgers territory. But the ball skipped past the Knight cage and Penn State continued to trail by two. Penn State was able to force a penalty corner at the GiSP mark but Glatz skipped back a hard Gladieux shot to keep her shutout intact. Another Lion corner at 2:15 led to a Glatz kick save on a Simon shot and the Scarlet Knights. Glatz had five saves for RU while Barraco had three for the Nittany Lions.

The Penn State Nittany Lion field hockey team (4-5, 3-2 B1G) lost a hard fought road game at Rutgers (7-3, 4-2 B1G) to close out a weekend series in New Jersey. Head coach Char Morett-Curtiss' squad dropped a tight 1-0 game in Piscataway, its second of the weekend against the Scarlet Knights. In instances where teams are scheduled to play each other twice during this year's Big Ten season, only the first game between the two squads is considered for the Big Ten regular season standings. Given that, today's game only counts in the overall standings.

Penn State and Rutgers battled for control over the opening minutes of the first quarter, with neither team able to create a solid scoring chance at the game's stat. Penn State began to assert itself on offense midway through the period, forcing the Scarlet Knight defense into action. While beginning to win the ball control game, sophomore Jemma Punch (McDowall, Australia) pushed the ball deep into the RU circle only to be denied by the back half of the Rutgers defense. The Nittany Lions picked up the game's first corner with 4:55 left in the period. Anna Simon's (Hanau, Germany) shot off the corner was knocked away by RU keeper Gianna Glatz. Rutgers responded with a break down the field that resulted in RU's first corner with 4:04 on the clock. Penn State disrupted the effort to keep the game tied. Rutgers forced a second corner with 2:14 left in the period but Elena Vos (Grave, The Netherlands) and the Penn State defense pushed the Knights back, sending the game to the second period tied 0-0. Bree Bedmarski (Wyoning, Pa.) got things going in the second period, taking a hard shot less than 3::00 into the statz, forcing Glatz into a save and earning Penn State a penalty corner. Sophia Gladieux (Boyertown, Pa.) got off a good shot off the corner but Glatz kept the Lions off the scoreboard with another save. Nittary Lion goalie Brie Barraco (Allentown, Pa.) moved forward to push back an ensuing Rutgers press, knocking back an initial furry of shots. But Rutgers' Gianna Mancini knocked a rebound past the Lion keeper at the 8:58



mark to give the home team a 1-0 lead. Penn State battled to regain control on offense but Rutgers was able to keep the ball in the Lion circle deep into the second period. Madison Hutson (Gloucester Point, Va.) shot the ball deep into the Knight circle after Penn State regained possession, but the Knight defense held firm. Rutgers made one last push into the Penn State zone as the second period wound down but a high stick gave the ball back to Penn State. Punch worked the ball down the field and Meghan Reese (Coopersburg, Pa.) continued the break into the Knight circle in the final minute but a turnover handed the ball back to Rutgers and Penn State trailed by one at halfitime. Rutgers outshot the Niltany Lions by one, 4-3, in the opening half and both teams had two penalty comers. Glatz had three saves to keep Penn State off the scoreboard while Barraco had one for the Niltany Lions. Rutgers picked up an early penalty corner to start the third period, pushing the ball into the Lion circle at the 13:13 mark. Barraco and the Lion defense kept Rutgers from getting off a good shot and the Nittany Lions regained control of the ball briefly. But Rutgers forced a Lion turnover seconds later and Penn state was back on defense. The teams traded possession deep into the third period. Penn State's offense moved into the RU circle late in the period, forcing a penalty corner with 3:16 left in the period. But Rutgers was able to defend the effort. The Lion defense held off a last second rush by Rutgers and the Nittany Lions trailed by one after three periods of play. Rutgers opened up the fourth period on offense and moved the ball down to the Penn State circle off the whistle. But the Lion defense, with Vos, Simon and freshman Kelsey Love (State College, Pa.), forced a Knight turnover and moved the ball back to midfield. Penn State was unable to keep possession and Rutgers quickly got off a point blank shot at the 13:15 mark. But Barraco kicked the ball aside to keep the Lions within striking distance. The Nittany Lions worked to clear the ball from the Penn State end of the field as the clock moved down below the 9:00 mark. Punch finished off a fast break midway through the final period with a diving shot that drifted just wide of the Knight cage with 7:58 left to play. Eleni Prodes (Bethlehem, Pa.) had a shot blocked high seconds later and then Glatz knocked back a hard Gladieux shot less than a minute after that. Penn State picked up a penalty corner off the flurry, then another corner after that. Rutgers held off what was Penn State's best offensive effort of the game to maintain its one-goal lead and carry that to the end of the contest. Like Friday night, Penn State outshot Rutgers over the course of the contest, 11-6. But Glatz had six saves to shut down Penn State's offense. The Nittany Lions had a 5-3 edge in corners. Barraco finished the game with two saves for Penn State.
