UNIVERSITY PARK, Pa.; September 29, 2021 -- The Penn State Nittany Lions (6-2, 1-1 B1G), ranked No. 8 nationally, host two critical Big Ten games this weekend at the Penn State Field Hockey Complex. The Lions welcome Indiana (6-4, 0-2 B1G) on Friday, Oct. 1, for a 6 p.m. game. The team then hosts No. 4 Northwestern (8-2, 0-1 B1G) on Sunday at 12 p.m.

Penn State is coming off two road losses at No. 2 lowa last weekend. The Nittany Lions dropped a 1-0 conference game on Friday night and then a 4-0 non-conference battle on Sunday.

Penn State is being led by Sophia Gladieux and Anna Simon's 16 points. Both athletes have seven goals and two assists. Mackenzie Allessie checks win with 12 points off three goals and six assists while Elena Vos has six points, all off assists.

Indiana dropped an 8-2 game to Maryland on Friday and then rebounded to beat Ball State 1-0 on the road Sunday. The Hoosiers are 6-4 overall, 0-2 in the confernce, and are being led by Kira Curland's eight points (four goals). Penn State leads the all-time series 25-4, downing the Hoosiers in the last meeting, 3-0 on 4/11/21 in Happy Valley.

Northwestern checks in with an 8-2 mark overall, 0-1 in the Big Ten. The Wildcats lost a 2-1 home game to Rutgers on Friday in their last contest. Bente Baekers has 22 points to lead NU with eight goals and six assists. The Nittany Lions lead the all-time series 33-6-1, including a 2-1 double-overtime win in Virginia Beach in the last meeting on 3/5/21.

Penn State will host two games again next weekend. The Nittany Lions host Rutgers on Friday, Oct. 8, at 4 p.m. in a Big Ten battle. The team then welcomes Bucknell on Saturday, Oct. 9, at 2 p.m. in a non-conference battle.

Sophomore Sophia Gladieux scored twice to lead Penn State to a 3-2 overtime win at #7 Maryland on Sept. 18. Gladieux connected on two backhands in the game, including the winner in overtime. Mackenzie Allessie scored Penn State's other goal and goalie Brie Barraco had seven saves in the win. Gladieux was named the Big Ten Offensive Player of the Week for her efforts.

IMPORTANT PARKING UPDATES FOR 2021

Parking for all Penn State Athletics' non-football events will require a valid permit or payment of the applicable parking fee for campus lots. Fans with valid Penn State University Park parking permits will be permitted to park at non-football athletics events for free, following Transportation Services parking policies and access. For field hockey, fans are asked to park in Jordan East, Stadium West or Porter North. Fans without a permit are encouraged to prepay for event parking at a discounted rate of \$5.50 through ParkMobile - https://psu.parkmobile.io/. Prepayment is available through 11:59 p.m. the day prior to each event. Event day parking will be [\$10/\$20] per vehicle [and is cash only/can be purchased on the ParkMobile app]. The East Deck is also available for most events for \$1 per hour. Parking for all non-football athletics events is managed by Penn State Transportation Services. #16 PENN STATE 3, #8 VIRGINIA 2 (OT)

Friday, Aug. 27, 2021 -- Charlottesville, Va.

The Penn State Nittany Lion field hockey team (1-0, 0-0 B1G) opened up the 2021 fall season with a thrilling 3-2 overtime win at No. 8 Virginia (0-1) on Friday afternoon. Goalie Brie Barraco (Allentown, Pa.) was outstanding in the cage, fending off 25 total shots and collecting nine saves while Jemma Punch (McDowall, Australia) scored the game winner in extra time to clinch the win.

Penn State got on the scoreboard first in the season's opening game. Midway through the first period, Penn State's offensive pressure led to a penalty corner that ended in a 1-0 Penn State lead. New Nittany Lion Mackenzie Allessie assisted on the corner, setting up Lion captain Anna Simon (Hanau, Germany) for the goal, giving Penn State a 1-0 lead at the 7:03 mark. Penn State's defense, anchored by Meghan Reese (Coopersburg, Pa.) and goalie Brie Barraco (Allentown, Pa.) kept the Cavaliers at length for the opening stanza and Penn State led 1-0 after one. The Nittany Lions continued to hold the lead deep into the second period, but the Cavalier defense stiffened, and Penn State led 1-0 late into the period. Virginia's offense began to break through as the clock moved below the 10:00 mark, forcing a number of penalty corners down the stretch. The home team got on the board for the first time when Amber Ezecheils scored off a penalty corner with 2:39 left in the half, assice by Meghen Hengerer. The goal tied the game and the 1-1 score held to intermission. Virginia outshot Penn State 12-1 in the first half, six in each period. Penn State keeper Barraco notched three saves, all in the first period. Virginia's Lauren Hausheer had none. Virginia had five penalty corners to one for the Nittany Lions.

Virginia's offense kept the pressure on Penn State for the bulk of the third quarter. Virginia dominated the period on offense, but Barraco held firm in the cage and Penn State maintained it's 1-1 deadlock deep into the stanza. The Nittany Lions took a 2-1 lead with just 0:24 left on the clock when Sophia Gladieux (Boyertown, Pa.) scored off an assist from senior Hannah Zemaitis (Camp Hill, Pa.) with less than thirty seconds to play, allowing Penn State to lead 2-1 after three periods. Barraco had three saves in the period. Penn State saw its one-goal lead disappear early in the final period. Virginia tied the game with 10:08 left to play when Adele lacobucci scored off a deflection and an Ezechiels assist. The goal came off a penalty corner to knot the game at 2-2. The teams traded possessions for the next few minutes and Barraco kept the game tied with a nice save off an Ezechiels shot with under 7:00 to play. Penn State had a late chance to grab the lead, forcing a penalty corner with just 1:32 left in regulation. But Hausheer notched the save on a Gladieux shot and the game moved to overtime.

Virginia began the first extra period fast, working the ball downfield and getting off a shot quickly. But Barraco's save off the Noa Tollaksen shot kept the game tied. Allessie followed for Penn State, getting off a quick shot just seconds later, but the effort was blocked as well. Penn State wrapped the game up, however, just 3:58 into extra time when Jemma Punch (McDowall, Australia) took a great pass from Emma Spisak (Boiling Springs, Pa.) who got the assist, and broke away down field. Elena Vos (Grave, The Netherlands) started the break that led to the final goal. Punch ended the game with a goal at the 6:02 mark of overtime to give Penn State a 3-2 victory. Virginia outshot Penn State 25-8 but the Nittany Lions scored on three of their eight shots while Barraco collected nine saves for Penn State. Hausheer had two saves for Virginia. The Cavaliers had an 11-3 edge in penalty corners as well.

The Penn State Nittany Lion field hockey team (2-0, 0-0 B1G) rolled to a big non-conference win at William and Mary (2-0) to close out a two-game swing through Virginia to open up the 2021 fall season. After falling behind by a goal early, Penn State dominated the second period and roared to a 7-2 victory in Williamsburg. Senior Anna Simon (Hanau, Germany) sparked Penn State with three goals, scoring each time within Penn State's penalty corner offense. Junior Elena Vos (Grave, The Netherlands) anchored a strong Penn State defensive showing as well as the Nittany Lion corner offense.

The first period began with a flurry. William and Mary scored quickly, getting a goal from Mollie Schuma just 3:20 into the contest. The Nittany Lions would not trail long, however. Sophia Gladieux (Boyertown, Pa.) took a Meghan Reese (Coopersburg, Pa.) assist and tied the game just over a minute later to tie the score 1-1 with less than five minutes played. Penn State goalie Brie Barraco (Allentown, Pa.) made a nice save off an Audrey Domovich shot with just over 2:30 left in the period, knocking away the shot on a penalty corner. But the Tribe was able to take a 2-1 lead just seconds later when Lily Saunders scored at the 2:15 mark. Gladieux had a shot blocked as the first period wound down and Penn State trailed 2-1 after one. Penn State tied the game quickly in the second period. The Lion offense forced a penalty corner. Mackenzie Allessie (Mount Joy, Pa.) took the corner and fed Vos. Vos tossed it to Simon who knocked in the shot just :37 into the period to tie the game. Jemma Punch (McDowall, Australia) nearly put the Lions on top with a shot a minute later, but her effort hit the post. Bree Bednarski (Wyoming, Pa.) took a corner at the 3:23 mark, sent the ball to Gladieux who assisted on a third goal by Simon to put Penn State on top by two, 4-2. Penn State wrapped up a dominant second period when Meghan Reese found the back of the cage with just: 04 on the clock, taking another assist from Gladieux, and the Lions led 5-2 at the break. Penn State outshot William and Mary 8-5 in the opening half. Barraco had two saves to one for Tribe keeper Kimi Jones. The Nittany Lions had a 5-2 edge in penalty corners in the first half as well.

The Nittany Lions continued to pour it on offensively early in the third period. The Penn State Nittany Lion field hockey team (3-0, 0-0 B1G), ranked No. 16 in the NFHCA Coaches Poll, used a late goal from sophomore Sophia Gladieux (Boyertown, Pa.) to beat No. 20 St. Joseph's (1-2) in the home opener for head coach Char Morett-Curtiss and her squad. The Boyertown native scored her second goal of the game with less than 10:00 to play to spark Penn State to the 3-2 non-conference win in Happy Valley.

The two teams battled to an even draw in the opening period. The visitors withstood four early Penn State shots with keeper Robin Bleekemolen notching a save in the period to keep the game knotted in a 0-0 tie after the opening 15:00 of play. The Penn State Nittany Lion field hockey team (4-0, 0-0 B1G), ranked No. 9 in the NFHCA Coaches Poll, used two first half corners and a fourth quarter goal to down visiting Albany (2-2) in a nonconference game at the Penn State Field Hockey Complex. Penn State took down the Great Danes 3-1 at the Penn State Field Hockey Complex. The two teams battled evenly for nearly the entire first period. Penn State's offense was met with a stingy Albany defense that withstood an early Nittany Lion penalty corner effort. The Nittany Lions were able to get on the board late, however, converting on the team's second corner of the period. The Penn State Nittany Lion field hockey team (5-0, 0-0 B1G), ranked No. 9 in the NFHCA Coaches Poll, used a furious second half of offense to run away from No. 19 Delaware (2-4) for another impressive non-conference win. The Nittany Lions posted the 3-0 victory at the Penn State Field Hockey Complex to improve their record to 5-0 on the year. The two teams set a fast pace from the opening whistle. The Nittany Lions and Blue Hens worked the middle of the field for the opening 15:00. The Nittany Lions played a bend but don't break defense to keep the visitors from mustering any shots in the opening stanza while recording two of their own. The Penn State Nittany Lion field hockey team (6-0, 1-0 B1G), ranked No. 8 in the NFHCA Coaches Poll, posted a thrilling overtime win over No. 7 Maryland (4-2, 0-1 B1G) to open up Big Ten play. Sophia Gladieux (Boyertown, Pa.) scored in extra time as Penn State won 3-2 in overtime in Maryland on Saturday afternoon.

Maryland controlled possession early in the first period, keeping the ball in or near the Penn State circle for the first five-plus minutes. Penn State goalie Brie Barraco (Allentown, Pa.) made a great save on her left side as the clock moved below the 10:00 mark to keep the Terrapins off the board early. Maryland continued to pressure the Lion defense and picked up its first penalty corner midway through the period. The Terrapins took advantage of the corner and took a 1-0 lead with 8:12 left in the period, with Julianna Tornetta finding the back of the cage for Maryland. Penn State's offense began to get untracked in the last five minutes of the period, with Penn State forcing its first penalty corner with just under 5:00 on the clock. Maryland keeper Noelle Frost made a good save on a hard shot from Anna Simon (Hanau, Germany) off the corner set. Penn State continued to control possession as the period wound down, however. Gladieux took a hard back-hand from the left side of the Maryland cage that Frost knocked away. Nittany Lion Mackenzie Allessie (Mount Joy, Pa.) was there for the rebound, however, knocking in the unassisted goal at the 3:11 mark to tie the game. Barraco made another diving save on a late corner for Maryland and Elena Vos (Grave, The Netherlands) knocked away the rebound shot to send the game into the second period tied 1-1. The Nittany Lion defense was tested early in the second, fending off a Maryland penalty corner to keep the game tied. Penn State moved the ball down field and Gladieux took over as the ball hit the Maryland circle. The Lion sophomore moved to the left of the Terrapin cage and launched a backhand rocket that zipped by Frost to put Penn State up 2-1 with 2:00 left in the half, a lead it would hold into intermission. Maryland outshot Penn State 9-5 and had a 5-3 lead in corners in the half. But Barraco's seven saves, to three for Frost, allowed Penn State to carry the one-goal lead into the break.

The third period began with Penn State owning possession early. The Maryland defense was able to withstand early presses by the Lion midfield but eventually, Penn State was able to work the ball into the Terrapin circle. Allessie took a long shot a midway into the period and Bree Bednarksi (Wyoming, Pa.) forced a corner on a rebound shot. Frost knocked away a hard Simon blast off the corner to keep the score 2-1 in Penn State's favor. Grace Wallis (Blue Bell, Pa.) moved the ball quickly into the circle a couple minutes later, fording another corner with 6:28 left in the third. The corner was denied by another Frost save but Penn State's offense remained in control and carried the one-goal lead into the final period. Maryland forced an early corner in the fourth period, just :25 in. The Terrapins tied the game off the corner set with Nathalie Feichter scoring off the corner set-up with an assist from Riley Donnelly, tying the game at 2-2. The Nittany Lions responded by working the ball down to the Maryland circle and forcing a corner a couple minutes later. Simon's shot was blocked off the play, but Penn State quickly forced another corner. But a defensive save from Belle Bressler kept Penn State from retaking the lead and the clock moved down to the 11:00 mark. The teams traded possession for the bulk of the final 10:00 and the game moved into overtime. The seven-on-seven overtime began with Penn State's Vos defending an early Maryland press and working the ball downfield to Gladieux. Gladieux forced a Maryland green card with a nifty move on the sideline. Jemma Punch (McDowall,



Australia) forced penalty corner at the 8:15 mark in overtime but the Lions could not connect. Penn State maintained possession. Simon worked the ball to the top of the Maryland circle and fed Gladieux, who connected on another hard backhand, finding the back of the cage at the 6:49 mark. Gladieux's second goal of the game gave Penn State the thrilling 3-2 win. Maryland outshot Penn State 15-13 over the course of the game but Penn State owned an 8-6 edge in penalty corners. The Nittany Lion defense stiffened in the second half and Barraco ended the game with seven saves, all in the opening two periods. Frost also had seven for Maryland.

Friday, Sept. 24, 2021 -- Iowa City, Iowa

The Penn State Nittany Lion field hockey team (6-1, 1-1 B1G), ranked No. 6 in the NFHCA Coaches Poll, lost a close game in its Big Ten road opener at No. 2 lowa (9-0, 2-0 B1G) in lowa City. Penn State lost 1-0 in the first of two games in lowa City this weekend (this game counts in the conference standings as it is a regularly scheduled conference game). The teams traded possessions over the course of the first three minutes. Iowa had two possessions go deep into the Penn State side of the field, with both efforts ending with the ball rolling across the end line. Penn State gained control of the ball and worked it downfield into the lowa circle. Jemma Punch (McDowall, Australia) had a first shot blocked by lowa keeper Grace McGuire and a rebound shot slide just wide. Mackenzie Allessie (Mount Joy, Pa.) also had an early shot sail wide seconds later. Annika Urbine had a shot blocked at the 6:30 mark in the first half in lowa's first real press on the cage. Maddy Murphy's shot at the 3:45 mark was just wide for lowa. A late Ellie Holley shot was saved by Penn State keeper Brie Barraco (Allentown, Pa.) and the game moved to the second period tied 0-0.

Two minutes into the second period, the Lion defense looked to let an lowa shot from outside the circle go wide but the ball hit the post and darted back into play. The Lion defense, led by Elena Vos (Grave, The Netherlands) pushed the ball out. Iowa kept possession, with Esme Gibson taking a shot that was blocked right in front of the cage with 12:00 left in the half. Meghan Reese (Coopersburg, Pa.) stole an lowa pass with just under 9:00 left and worked the ball to the right side of the lowa circle, with Sophia Gladieux (Boyertown, Pa.) looking to pressure the cage. But lowa's defense held firm, the Hawkeyes pushed the ball down the field and picked up the game's first penalty corner at the 8:15 mark. Penn State stopped the first lowa corner, but lowa picked up a quick second. The Hawkeyes connected on the second corner, with Lokke Stribbs scoring off the corner with assist Leah Zellner and Anthe Nijziel at the 7:51 mark. The Hawkeyes kept the pressure on Penn State for the next five minutes and picked up their third corner of the period with 2:58 left in the half. The Penn State defense held, and the Nittany Lions trailed by one at intermission. lowa outshot Penn State 11-4 in the first half, including a 7-0 edge in the second period. Barraco had two saves for the Lions while McGuire had one for lowa. lowa had a 3-0 lead in corners in the first two periods.

The opening minutes of the third period were battled at midfield with each team notching a couple steals. But neither squad pushed the ball into the opposing circle until the 13:25 mark when lowa had a pass roll through the Lion circle and out of bounds. The Nittany Lion defense worked hard over the next 2:00 to keep lowa from collapsing in on the Penn State circle. The Hawkeyes got hit for a green card with 11:00 left in the period but lowa was able to kill the advantage and the clock moved to the 9:00 mark. Gery Schnarrs (Camp Hill, Pa.) and the Penn State defense stopped a quick lowa break and Penn State moved the ball down to the lowa side of the field. But lowa's defense was up to the task and lowa regained possession, moved the ball downfield, and grabbed the first corner of the second half with 6:53 on the clock. Meghan Reese deftly defended the corner and started a fast break that ended in the lowa circle. Allessie and Bree Bednarski (Wyoming, Pa.) moved the ball around in front of the lowa cage and forced the first Lion corner of the game with 6:22 on the clock. Allessie took the corner, feeding Vos who spotted Anna Simon (Hanau, Germany). Simon's shot was tipped wide, however, with 6:00 left in the quarter. The teams traded cards (green for lowa, yellow for Penn State) in the final 2:00 of the period and Penn State trailed by one after three.

The Penn State defense had to kill an lowa player advantage over the first minutes of the final period to keep the game a one-goal affair thanks to the third period's yellow card. The Hawkeyes kept pressure on Penn State and the lowa offense nearly found the cage with 11:34 to play. But a Holley shot hit the crossbar and the game stayed at 1-0 with 11:30 left on the clock. Penn State got hit with another yellow card with 9:40 left in the game, giving the Hawkeyes the player advantage. The Nittany Lions withstood the Hawkeyes offense over the next minutes, killing the yellow card advantage and keeping the ball on the lows side of the field. Freshmen Sophia Mannino (Doylestown, Pa.) and Anouk Knuvers ('s-Hertogenbosch, The Netherlands) helped spark the Penn State defense in the fourth period. Emily Farrell (Wyoming, Pa.) drove the ball towards the lowa circle as the clock moved to the 3:00 mark and forced a penalty corner. The corner was defended by lowa, but Penn State kept possession with 2:40 left to play. Penn State tried to force a corner over the next minute, but lowa's defense kept Penn State from getting off another shot and the Nittany Lions dropped a hard-fought 1-0 game. Iowa outshot Penn State 12-6, with the Lions owning a 2-1 edge in the second half. Barraco had two saves, McGuire had one, all coming in the first period. Iowa had a 4-2 advantage in penalty corners. The shutout was the seventh straight for lowa. This also marks the fourth straight time Penn State has lost 1-0 to lowa, including two 1-0 games last season in Virginia Beach and 1-0 overtime loss in the Big Ten Tournament title game in 2019 at Penn State.

The Penn State Nittany Lion field hockey team (6-2, 1-1 B1G), ranked No. 6 in the NFHCA Coaches Poll, lost a non-conference game at No. 2 lowa (10-0, 2-0 B1G) in lowa City. Penn State fell 4-0 in the last of two games in lowa City this weekend (this game does not count in the conference standings, lowa took an early 1-0 lead, with Ellie Holley scoring from the left side of the Lion circle. Holley's shot moved by Penn State's defense, with a late defensive save effort just missing. lowa took the 1-0 lead at the 12:00 mark. Five minutes later, the Nittany Lions worked the ball down to the lowa circle with Sophia Gladieux (Boyertown, Pa.) moving possession towards the Hawkeye cage. The momentum forced a penalty corner at the 6:28 mark for the Nittany Lions. The initial shot off the corner was defended and then Anna Simon (Hanau, Germany) had a solid shot knocked away by lowa keeper Grace McGuire. A second Nittany Loin corner with 5:00 left in the period was also defended by lowa. Penn State continued to press the Hawkeye defense, forcing a third corner just two minutes later. But a Gladieux backhand was ruled too high. lowa quickly moved the ball down into the Lion circle and Penn State keeper Brie Barraco (Allentown, Pa.) made a great save on a quick lowa shot and the Lions trailed by one after one.

The second period began with the teams working the midfield, battling for control of the ball. lowa's Maddy Murphy got off a point-blank shot that Barraco saved, but the Hawkeyes picked up a penalty corner off the ensuing scramble. I lowa connected on the corner, with Nikke Freeman scoring at the 11:23 mark to give the Hawkeyes a 2-0 lead. Penn State worked to answer the goal, with Mackenzie Allessie (Mount Joy, Pa.) moving the ball into the Hawkeye circle. But lowa was able to defend the Penn State effort. Meghan Reese, Allessie and Bree Bednarski (Wyoming, Pa.) controlled the ball in the midfield, working the ball forward to Grace Wallis (Blue Bell, Pa.), but the leading pass sailed out of bounds with 7:00 on the clock. lowa scored quickly after the Lion effort, with Holley scoring at the 6:48 mark to put the home team up 3-0. With under two minutes left, Barraco and the Lion defense withstood two close Hawkeye shots at the 1:40 mark. A late Jemma Punch (McDowall, Australia) shot slipped just wide of McGuire and the lowa cage and Penn State trailed 3-0 at the break. lowa outshot Penn State 7-4 in the first half. McGuire had a 2-1 lead in saves and Penn State owned a 3-1 edge in corners in the opening two quarters.

Gladieux nearly put the Nittany Lions on the board just over 2:00 into the third quarter. But an effort from the left side of the Hawkeye circle was defended by McGuire and lowa held on to its 3-0 lead. The Nittany Lions controlled the ball for the next two minutes and continued to look for their first goal of the game. Iowa was able to steal the ball at the 10:20 mark and began a fast break down their left side. But Lion sophomore Kelsey Love (State College, Pa.) was able to steal the ball back and Penn State regained possession. The teams spent the last minutes of the third period tradling possessions. The Nittany Lions had a late corner defended by lowa and the score remained 3-0 after three.

lowa began the fourth period by pressing the ball downfield and picking up a penalty corner. Barraco made a save on the first shot off the corner, but lowa connected on the rebound, getting an Anthe Nijziel goal off the rebound at the 13:36 mark to give the Hawkeyes a 4-0 lead. Minutes later, Barraco made a great save on a Zellner shot with 11:00 to play to keep the home team from getting another goal. Penn State controlled the time of possession over the next ten minutes but could not find the back of the cage as lowa's defense bent but did not break. The Hawkeyes went on to post the 4-0 win, notching its eighth-straight shutout in the process. The Hawkeyes worked up a 14-6 lead in shots during the game while Penn State had a 4-2 lead in penalty corners. Barraco ended the contest with five saves while McGuire had three in another shutout victory.
