Television Coverage

FOX will broadcast the game to a national audience. Gus Johnson (play-by-play), Joel Klatt (color) and Jenny Taft (sideline) will call the game.

Radio Coverage

Doug Karsch (play-by-play), Jon Jansen (color) and Jason Avant (sideline) will call the action on the LEARFIELD Michigan Sports Network. Anchored by WWJ-AM (950) in Detroit, the Michigan Radio Network is comprised of 35 affiliate stations in Michigan and Ohio during football season (see page 3).

Wolverines and Nittany Lions

This will be the 26th meeting between Michigan and Penn State. The Wolverines have a 15-10 advantage in the all-time series, with an 8-4 record at Michigan Stadium and a 7-6 mark at Beaver Stadium.

Michigan vs. Penn State at Michigan Stadium

This will be the 13th game played between the two schools at Michigan Stadium. The Wolverines have compiled an 8-4 record against the Nittany Lions at the Big

House, which includes victories in three of the last four games. Penn State defeated Michigan, 27-17, during the 2020 COVID season. Coach Jim Harbaugh has a 2-1 record at Michigan Stadium against the Nittany Lions.

Wolverines from Pennsylvania

Michigan has two student-athletes from the state of Pennsylvania: offensive lineman Kraig Correll (Easton) and linebacker Nikhai Hill-Green (Pittsburgh).

U-M Lists Top 10 in Scoring Offense and Defense

Michigan ranks fifth nationally in scoring defense at 11.3 points per game, while the offense is averaging 43.0 points per contest to list seventh in the NCAA. Michigan and Alabama are the only teams ranked in the top 10 on both sides of the ball.

A Quick Look at 2021

- Michigan finished the season with a 12-2 record and won the Big Ten East Division title with a 8-1 mark; suffered its only regular season loss in a 37-33 setback to then No. 8 Michigan State (Oct. 30)
- The Wolverines advanced to the Big Ten Championship Game for the first time in school history and defeated Iowa, 42-3, to claim the program's 43 conference title
- Michigan reached the College Football Playoff for the first time in school history, losing in the semi-final to eventual national Georgia (34-11) at the Orange Bowl
- U-M won 12 games for just the third time in school history, joining the 1905 and 1997 teams
- Michigan won 10-plus games for the fourth time under coach Jim Harbaugh and for the 30th time in school history

THE 2022 SEASON

Series History with Penn State

- This will be the 26th meeting between Michigan and Penn State
- The Wolverines lead the all-time series, 15-10, and are 4-3 under coach Jim Harbaugh against the Nittany Lions
- In the seven games under Harbaugh's leadership, the Wolverines have claimed victories in two of the three games at Michigan Stadium and are 2-2 at Beaver Stadium
- Michigan has a 7-3 advantage in games decided by seven points or less, and has a 2-1 mark in games decided by three or fewer points

Michigan vs. Penn State at Michigan Stadium

- Michigan has compiled an 8-4 record against the Nittany Lions at Michigan Stadium
- The Wolverines maintained a five-game win streak at home against Penn State between 1998 and 2007
- U-M won three of the past four games played at Michigan Stadium; lost a 27-17 affair during the 2020 COVID season
- This will be Jim Harbaugh's fourth game against PSU at the Big House, claiming a 49-10 victory in 2016 and a 42-7 win in 2018 while losing in 2020

Michigan When Ranked vs. Penn State

- This will be the 19th time that Michigan is ranked in 26 games against Penn State
- U-M has been ranked in the AP poll for 18 of the 25 match-ups with PSU, including the first 10 games of the series
- Michigan is 12-6 all-time against Penn State when listed in the top 25 of the polls
- The Wolverines have compiled a 7-5 record against the Nittany Lions when both teams enter the game ranked in the AP poll
- Michigan has a 4-1 mark against Penn State when ranked in the top 5 of the national polls
- U-M has been ranked in the polls for all but two of the 13 games played at Beaver Stadium; suffered losses during the 2008 and 2010 seasons

Top 10 Match-up

- This will be the third time that both teams enter the game ranked in the top 10 of the polls
- The previous two times both programs were listed in the top 5 of the AP poll
- Penn State won the first match-up, a 31-24 victory at Michigan Stadium in 1994, and Michigan won the second meeting of top 10 teams, a 34-8 victory at Beaver Stadium during the 1997 national championship season

Michigan Ranked in Top 5 of National Polls

- For the sixth straight week, U-M is ranked in the top five of the national polls
- The Wolverines list No. 4 in the AFCA Coaches Poll and rank No. 5 in the Associated Press Media Poll and following its 31-10 victory at

Indiana

- Michigan began the season ranked sixth in the coaches poll and eighth in the AP rankings
- U-M finished the 2021 season ranked No. 3 in both national polls, its first top five finish for the program since 1999 (No. 5) and the highest final ranking since winning the 1997 national title
- U-M is ranked in the top 10 of the polls for the 17th straight rankings, including the final 11 of the 2021 season
- Michigan has been ranked for all but 13 contests during Harbaugh's tenure (79 of 92 games); wasn't ranked in the initial four games of 2015, four games in 2017 and 2020 and the initial two contests of 2021
- The Wolverines had been ranked in the national polls for 31 straight games dating back to the start of the 2018 season prior to falling out of the polls during the 2020 season

2022 Schedule Notes

- Michigan is one of 15 schools in FBS that will not play an FCS opponent this season
- Two of the Wolverines' foes this fall were ranked in the preseason AP Top 25 poll: No. 2 Ohio State and No. 15 Michigan State
- Six of the Wolverines' opponents played in bowl games: Ohio State (Rose Bowl), Michigan State (Peach Bowl), Iowa (Citrus Bowl), Penn State (Outback Bowl), Maryland (Pinstripe Bowl) and Rutgers (Gator Bowl)

Michigan in the Big Ten Conference

- The Wolverines have a 3-0 Big Ten record after opening the 2022 Big Ten slate with a 34-27 home victory over Maryland and a pair of road wins, 27-14 at Iowa and 31-10 at Indiana
- U-M captured its league-leading 43rd conference title with a 42-3 victory over No. 12 Iowa in the 2021 Big Ten Championship Game
- Michigan finished the 2021 conference season with an 8-1 mark and shared the Big Ten East Division title with Ohio State
- Michigan has a 46-17 mark in Big Ten action under seventh-year head coach Jim Harbaugh
- The Wolverines have a 22-8 record at home in Big Ten play under Harbaugh and have a 23-9 mark on the road; 1-0 on a neutral site
- U-M has compiled a 531-216-18 record all-time in Big Ten action

THE TEAM UNDER HARBAUGH

Michigan on the Field

- Michigan has won 10 games in four of Harbaugh's seven seasons leading the program
- The Wolverines have won 67 overall games during Coach Harbaugh's eight seasons (67-24)
- U-M has scored 379 touchdowns while allowing just 200 to its opponents during that stretch
- The defense has been listed in the top 12 nationally in six seasons, including four of those years ranking among the top 5

Wolverines Excelling in the Classroom

- Not only has the program done well on the field, the players have achieved at a high level in the classroom under Harbaugh
- 284 Academic All-Big Ten Performers (2015-21); fourth-highest total in the conference
- Achieved a school record 60 Academic All-Big Ten Football Players in 2021
- 21 graduate students on the 2022 team
- 24 players have been named Big Ten Distinguished Scholars (3.7 GPA or better during the academic year)

U-M Earning National and Big Ten Accolades

- Harbaugh was named the 2021 Associated Press Coach of the Year in college football, becoming the first U-M head coach to win the honor since the award was established in 1998
- A total of 80 Wolverines have earned All-Big Ten honors (1st, 2nd or 3rd team): eight players in 2015, 16 in 2016, nine in 2017, 15 in both 2018 and 2019, 2 in 2020 and 15 in 2021
- Seven players earned first-team All-America honors: Jake Butt (2015-16), Jourdan Lewis (2015-16), Jabrill Peppers (2016), Maurice Hurst (2017), Devin Bush (2018), Aidan Hutchinson (2021) and Jake Moody (2021)
- Moody became Michigan's first-ever winner of the Lou Groza Award as the nation's outstanding place-kicker in 2021 and was just the second kicker to earn first-team All-American honors
- Hutchinson finished as the 2021 Heisman Trophy runner-up and won the Rotary Lombardi Award, Ted Hendricks Trophy, Lott IMPACT Trophy and was the recipient of the Chicago Tribune Silver Football as the Big Ten's MVP as voted by the conference coaches
- Butt and Peppers each collected a pair of national awards during the 2016 season: Butt won the Mackey Award and Senior CLASS Award while Peppers collected the Lott IMPACT Trophy and the Paul Hornung Award
- Additionally, four players have been named finalists for national awards during Harbaugh's tenure: Jabrill Peppers (Lombardi and Bednarik, 2016), Jourdan Lewis (Thorpe, 2016), Devin Bush (Butkus, 2017-18 and Bronko Nagurski, 2018) and Blake Corum (Hornung, 2021)
- Harbaugh has mentored two Heisman Trophy finalists at Michigan and four in his coaching career, in addition to placing third as a player during his senior year

Michigan at Home in the Harbaugh Era

- The Wolverines have compiled a 41-8 home record under Jim Harbaugh
- Michigan has a 22-8 mark in Big Ten games at

the Big House under Harbaugh's leadership

- The Wolverines have gone undefeated three times; posted a 7-0 mark in 2018 and 2021 and an 8-0 mark in 2016
- U-M had a 10-game home winning streak snapped against Michigan State in 2017 and a 13-game streak snapped by Ohio State in 2019
- The only setbacks in Big Ten home games came in losses to rivals Michigan State and Ohio State as well as Wisconsin and Penn State during the pandemic in 2020
- The Wolverines are a perfect 19-0 in non-conference games under Harbaugh at the Big House, outscoring the opposition by a 827-216 margin in those games

Michigan on the Road under Harbaugh

- U-M has compiled a 23-11 record (.676) on the road under head coach Jim Harbaugh
- The Wolverines have posted a 23-9 record (.719) in Big Ten road games during his tenure, including a 4-0 record in 2015 and a 4-1 mark in 2021
- Michigan has won six of its last seven conference road games dating back to the start of the 2021 season
- The program has posted a 2-4 record in neutral site games: 1-4 mark in bowl games
- The team's only regular season neutral site affair was a 33-17 victory over Florida in the 2017 season opener at Cowboys Stadium

MISCELLANEOUS NOTES

Michigan Tops NCAA in Attendance

- U-M led the nation in attendance 44 of the past 47 seasons; only years that U-M did not lead the country in attendance was 1997, 2014 and 2020
- Michigan has drawn 100,000-plus fans for 304 straight home games at Michigan Stadium; every game since Nov. 8, 1975
- The Wolverines averaged 108,763 fans at their seven games played at Michigan Stadium during the 2021 season, edging out Penn State (106,799 avg.) by nearly 2,000 fans per game to claim the top spot; also had 384,499 patrons in attendance at its five road contests
- Michigan played in front of more than a million fans during the 14-game schedule (1,279,862) in 2021
- U-M played in front of 67,183 fans at the Big Ten Championship Game in Indianapolis, setting the all-time attendance record for the event

College Football's Top TV Draw

- Michigan has played in a NCAA record 561 televised football games, compiling a 370-183-8 record in those contests
- Every single football game since 1995 has been televised, a streak of 336 consecutive broadcasts
- The Wolverines have played 316 nationally televised football games over the year
- The very first televised U-M football game came on Sept. 27, 1947, a 55-0 shutout of rival Michigan State on WWJ TV in Detroit

Jordan Brand

- The Michigan Football program is in its seventh season wearing brand Jordan apparel
- U-M was the first college and/or professional football program to wear Jordan on its uniforms and sideline apparel, starting with the 2016 season
- The Wolverines were joined by North Carolina as Jordan football schools in 2017; Oklahoma and Florida were outfitted by Jordan starting with the 2018 season
- Jordan outfits Michigan from head-to-toe on all apparel needs for the football and basketball programs
- Michigan and NIKE began its 15-year agreement on Aug. 1, 2016

THE TEAM

- U-M is 6-0 in back-to-back season for the first time since 1976-77
- The Wolverines have won 18 of their last 20 games
- In Big Ten play, Michigan has claimed wins in 12 of its last 13 contests
- Five players were voted 2022 captains for the Wolverines: WR Ronnie Bell was a returning captain from 2021 and was joined on offense by TE Erick All and QB Cade McNamara while the defensive is represented by DB Mike Sainristil and DL Mazi Smith
- U-M has 83 returning lettermen: 48 on offense, 32 on defense and three specialists
- The 2022 roster features 121 student-athletes that have seen game action during their career, including 40 players that made their career debut this season
- Four players made the first starting assignment of their careers during the 2022 season: TE Max Bredeson, OL Giovanni El-Hadi, DL Mason Graham, EDGE Braiden McGregor, DB Makari Paige and LB Kaleb Mullings

U-M Ranks Top 10 in Scoring 'O' and 'D'

- The Wolverines outscored the opposition 258

to 68 margin this fall

- U-M ranks seventh in the nation in scoring offense, averaging 43.0 points per contest, while also listing fifth in scoring defense by allowing just 11.3 points per game
- Michigan and Alabama (No. 5 offense, No. 6 defense) are the only teams ranked in the top 10 on both sides of the ball
- U-M scored more than 50 points in the first three games of the season for the first time in school history
- The defense held the opposition to less than 10 points in four games, including a shutout against UConn

High-Scoring Offense

- Michigan is sixth in the NCAA in scoring at 43.0 points per contest
- The Wolverines have scored 258 points: 33 touchdowns (20 rushing, 11 passing, 1 punt return, 1 interception return) and nine FGs
- The team has scored 30 points or more in five games and tallied a season-high 59 points against UConn
- Michigan scored more than 50 points in the first three games of the season for the first time in school history

Scoring Across All Quarters

- The Wolverines have scored points in 21 of the 24 quarters played so far this season
- U-M has tallied more than 65 points in three of the four quarters this fall: first, second and fourth stanzas
- The team has registered double digits in points scored in 14 quarters
- Michigan scored a season-high 21 points in a quarter on three occasions: first and second quarters against Hawaii and second quarter against UConn
- U-M did not tally points in the third quarter against Hawaii and Maryland and failed to score in the second quarter at Indiana

Dominant First Half Scoring

- Michigan has outscored the opposition by a 143-23 margin in the first half of games this fall
- The Wolverines have out-paced opponents in the first quarter, 75-17
- The margin is very similar in the second quarter as U-M has racked up 68 points while yielding just six
- The team did not allow any first half points until the fourth game of the season when Maryland tallied 13 points in the opening half
- Michigan has scored touchdowns on the opening possession of four games: Hawaii, UConn, Maryland, Iowa and Indiana

Turnover Margin Ranks Top 20 Nationally

- All three phases have teamed to rank the Wolverines among the top 20 nationally in turnover margin this fall
- U-M is second in the Big Ten and 27th in the NCAA in turnover margin (0.67 avg. per game)
- Michigan has forced at least one turnover in four games, including a season-high three miscues by Maryland
- The Wolverines have seven takeaways – four interceptions and three fumble recoveries –

while only turning the ball over three times on offense

- The special teams contributed on one of the opponent miscues as Matt Hibner recovered a fumble on the opening kickoff against Maryland
- The Wolverines have turned the ball over just three times this season, with two interceptions and one fumble; leads the conference in both categories while ranking sixth nationally in fumble lost and 13th in interceptions

Creating Points of Turnovers

- U-M has scored points on five of the seven opponent miscues in 2022 while yielding just three points following its two turnovers
- The Wolverines have gained 27 points off sudden change situations
- Michigan scored 10 points on the two Colorado State turnovers, converted a field goal following a UConn fumble and scored 14 points after three Maryland turnovers
- U-M has forced turnovers in four games with its only miscues coming against Hawaii, Maryland and Indiana

One of the Nation's Least Penalized Teams

- Michigan has been one the least penalized teams in the country this season
- The Wolverines have been flagged 24 times over the course of six games, which lists second in the Big Ten and ninth nationally
- Michigan is tops nationally in fewest penalties per game (4.0 avg.) and is ninth in fewest penalty yards per contest (36.5 avg.)
- U-M had only one penalty enforced against Colorado State and Maryland
- The Wolverines committed a season-high 10 penalties at Indiana

12 Starters Return from 2021 Team

- U-M had six returning players (2 offense, 1 defense and 3 specialists) that started all 14 games in 2021

THE OFFENSE

- Michigan has two returning second-team All-Big Ten performers from 2021 - LT Hayes and RG Zinter - as well as two third-team honorees in QB McNamara and RB Corum; TEs All and Schoonmaker and LG Keegan were honorable mention in 2021 and WR Bell received honorable mention status in 2020

Balanced Offensive Production

- The offense has generated more than 440

yards of total offense in five games

- U-M is fourth in the conference and 29th nationally in total offense at 458.7 yards per game
- Michigan is one of the nation's most balanced offenses, averaging 212.3 yards on the ground and 246.3 yards through the air
- The Wolverines have run 400 plays totaling 2,752 yards for an average of 6.9 yards per play
- Michigan generated a season-high 588 yards against Hawaii

Grounding Out Yards

- The Wolverines' running game has picked up where it left off last season, ranking among the nation's best

THE DEFENSE

A Look at the 2022 Defense

- The defense is led by first-year defensive coordinator Jesse Minter
- Michigan also has two new assistant coaches on the defensive side of the ball: Jay Harbaugh (safeties) and Mike Elston (defensive line)
- The Wolverines have 18 defenders that have started at least one game in their career
- U-M has six players with five-plus starts from 2021, not including CB Gemon Green and LB Michael Barrett who were starters in 2020
- Junior Colson leads the defense with 105 career tackles while Barrett is second with 101 stops
- A total of 22 Wolverine defenders have recorded stops in the opposition's backfield during their career, led by transfer DL Cam Goode (12.0) and Edge Taylor Upshaw (9.5); Goode accumulated his total at UCF
- The 22 players have combined to post 77.5 TFLs over their careers
- U-M's defense has 18 players who have combined for 37.5 career sacks: Goode (6.0), Mike Morris (5.5), Barrett (4.0), Upshaw (3.5), Eyabi Okie (3.0), Mike Sainristil (2.0), Derrick Moore (2.0), Braiden McGregor (1.5), Jaylen Harrell (1.5), Junior Colson (1.5), Mason Graham (1.5), D.J. Turner (1.0), Kris Jenkins (1.0), Julius Welschof (1.0), T.J. Guy (1.0), R.J. Moten (0.5), Mazi Smith (0.5) and Rod Moore (0.5)
- Seven (7) Wolverines have collected interceptions during their career, led by D.J. Turner with three and Moten and Moore with two; Goode, Gemon Green, Morris, and Caden Kolesar have each collected one pick
- Gemon Green leads the team with 13 career PBUs
- 19 players have collected at least one pass defended in their career: Gemon Green (13), Turner (12), Goode (5), Moten (4), Sainristil (3), Mazi Smith (3), Moore (2), Morris (2), Colson (2), Paige (2), Okie (2), Kolesar (1), Barrett (1), Nikhai Hill-Green (1), Harrell (1), Welschof (1), Jaydon Hood (1), German Green (1), Keshaur Harris (1), Mason Graham (1) and Ja'Den McBurrows (1); Goode registered four PBUs at UCF
- Three Wolverines have scooped up an opponent fumble: Colson and George Rooks on defense and Velazquez and Matt Hibner on special teams
- Turner is the only player with a defensive touchdown, scoring on a 42-yard interception return at Maryland (2021) and a 45-yard fumble recovery against Colorado State (2022)
- Four defenders have started double-digit career games: Smith (19), Gemon Green (17), Mike Sainristil (13) and D.J. Turner (13)
- Smith (HM, 2021), Turner (HM, 2021) and Barrett (HM, 2020) are returning players with All-Big Ten recognition in their careers

2022 Defensive Prowess

- The Wolverines list top 10 nationally in four categories and rank among the top 25 teams in the country in 10 categories
- U-M is top 10 nationally in five categories: scoring defense (5), total defense (5), sacks (5), pass

- efficiency (6) and rushing defense (7)
- Michigan ranks 11th in pass defense (165.3 avg.), 19th in fourth down defense (30.8%), 20th in red zone defense (72.7%), 22nd in first downs allowed (93 total) and 24th in defensive TDs (1)
- CB D.J. Turner has the team's only defensive score on a 45-yard fumble return against Colorado State
- 16 players have contributed to the team's 39 tackles for loss, including 14 of those individuals sharing a part in a sack
- U-M has allowed the opposition only 11 trips inside the red zone, yielding just eight scores (six touchdowns and two field goals)
- 36 defenders recorded at least one stop this season; does not include George Rooks who recovered a fumble for his only statistic
- The defense forced the opposition to move long distance to score, with seven of the eight touchdown drives requiring 75-plus yards; the field goals came on drives of 39, 40, 45 and 52 yards

NCAA's Fifth-Best Scoring Defense

- U-M ranks fifth nationally and fourth in the Big Ten in scoring defense at 11.3 points per game
- The Wolverines have held five opponents to 14 points or less, including four to less than 10 point, with a shutout against UConn
- The defense has yielded only nine touchdowns (three rushing, five passing) and four field goals
- Overall, Michigan has allowed 68 points over the six games

U-M Ranks Top 5 in Total Defense

- The defense is allowing just 247.0 yards per game this fall, the fifth-best mark in the nation
- Michigan has yielded just 1,482 yards on 383 offensive plays
- Opponent have been held to 3.9 yards per play, including a stingy 5.1 yards per pass play
- The Wolverines held four opponents under 255 yards of total offense: Colorado State (219), Hawaii (253), UConn (110) and Indiana (222)

Stingy Pass Defense

- The Wolverines boast one of the nation's best pass defenses, ranking sixth in pass efficiency (100.42 rating) and 11th in passing yards allowed (165.3 avg.)
- The opposition has completed just 53.6 percent of their passes (105-196) this fall for 992 yards and five touchdowns
- Michigan has held three opponents to less than 150 passing yards, including a season low 24 yards by UConn: Colorado State (137), Hawaii (113) and UConn (24)
- Colorado State (1 TD), Maryland (2 TDs), Iowa (1 TD) and Indiana (1 TD) are the only teams to score against the Wolverines through the air
- U-M is allowing just 5.1 yards per pass attempt
- The defense has intercepted four passes, accumulated 18 total passes defended and had their hands on quite a few additional plays
- The Wolverines collected a season-high two interceptions and four pass breakups against Maryland

Playing in the Opposition's Backfield

- Michigan has accumulated 205 negative yards on 39 tackles for loss this season
- 16 different players have contributed to the 39 TFLs, with 14 of those individuals contributing to the team's sack total (22)
- Mike Morris leads the team in TFLs (7.0) and sacks (5.0)
- The Wolverines registered a season-high 11 tackles for loss and seven sacks against Colorado State
- U-M equaled its output from the opener with 10 TFLs and seven sacks at Indiana; each of the sacks came from a different player
- The defense tallied five or more tackles for loss in five games and registered at least one sack in five contests
- U-M leads the Big Ten and is fifth nationally in sacks per contest (3.67 avg.)

Forcing Turnovers

- U-M has gained seven turnovers on the season, six on defense and one on kickoff coverage
- The Wolverines forced a season-high three turnovers against Maryland (2 interceptions and 1 fumble recovery)
- The only games in which Michigan did not secure an opponent miscue was against Hawaii and Iowa
- The team has four interceptions and three fumble recoveries on the season
- The Wolverines have recovered a fumble in three contests and corralled an interception in three games
- Rod Moore (two picks) and D.J. Turner lead the team with two turnovers; Turner had an interception against Maryland and a 45-yard fumble recovery for a touchdown against Colorado State

EDGE

- 11 edge players have seen game action during their careers
- Taylor Upshaw leads the group with 30 games of experience
- Upshaw is also pacing the edge performers in career tackles (33), tackles for loss (9.5) and sacks (3.5)
- Five of the edge defenders have made starts during their career: Mike Morris (9), Jaylen Harrell (9), Upshaw (2), Braiden McGregor (1) and Julius Welschof (1)
- Eight players have registered 36.5 tackles in the opposition's backfield: Upshaw (9.5), Morris (8.0), Harrell (7.0), Eyabi Okie (4.5), Braiden McGregor (3.5), Derrick Moore (2.0), Welschof (1.0) and T.J. Guy (1.0)
- 50.7 percent (18.5 of 36.5) of those stops have been sacks: Morris (5.0), Upshaw (3.5), Okie (3.0), Moore (2.0), Harrell (1.5) and McGregor (1.5), Welschof (1.0) and Guy (1.0)
- Morris leads the group with two pass breakups and one interception; Okie has also contributed two PBUs
- Morris (2), Okie (2), Harrell (1) and Welschof (1) are the only players to record pass breakups

Taylor Upshaw

- Appeared in 31 career games and started two contests at defensive end
- Tallied 33 tackles, 9.5 tackles for loss, 3.5 sacks and one forced fumble during his career
- Played in all six games this season; contributed six tackles, 2.5 TFLs and an assisted sack
- Posted one tackle for loss at Iowa and Indiana
- Recorded one stop against Colorado State, Hawaii and UConn
- Played defensive end in 12 games during the 2021 season, contributing eight tackles, 4.5 tackles for loss, 2.5 sacks and one forced fumble
- Posted one tackle in the Big Ten Championship Game against Iowa
- Three of his four stops were in the backfield vs. Indiana, including one sack and a forced fumble
- Picked up one sack at Wisconsin
- Assisted on a sack and made two stops against Washington
- Played in all six contests and started two games at defensive end during the 2020 season
- Tops among defensive linemen with 17 tackles in 2020, including three TFLs and one sack
- Contributed three solo tackles and his first career sack against Penn State
- Set career high with six stops, one TFL and one forced fumble at Rutgers
- Contributed five tackles against Wisconsin, his first career starting assignment
- Registered two solo tackles and first career tackle for loss at Indiana
- Made one solo tackle at Minnesota
- Played in six games during the 2019 season, registering two solo tackles
- Made first career stop against Notre Dame, playing both defensive line and special teams
- Made career debut against Rutgers, playing snaps along the defensive line
- Father, Regan, played nine seasons in the NFL

Mike Morris

- Started five games this season and played in all six contests, recording 11 tackles, seven tackles for loss and five sacks
- Leads the team in TFLs (7.0) and sacks (5.0); ranks third in the Big Ten and 13th in the NCAA in sacks per game (0.83 avg.)
- Amassed at least one sack in four games
- Registered one sack at Indiana
- Set career highs with two sacks and three solo tackles at Iowa
- Tallied three tackles and one sack vs. Maryland
- Registered one sack against Hawaii
- Two of his three stops were tackles for loss vs. Colorado State; forced a fumble that D.J. Turner returned for a touchdown
- Played along the defensive line in all 14 games during the 2021 season with four starts; recorded 17 tackles, one TFL, an assisted sack, one interception and two passes defensed
- Played along the defensive line against Georgia in the CFP Semifinal at the Orange Bowl and against Iowa in the Big Ten Championship Game
- Assisted on a tackle and batted down a pass against Ohio State
- Assisted on two tackles at Penn State
- Made first career interception and assisted on a

U-M'S DEFENSE UNDER HARBAUGH

- Michigan has ranked in the top four nationally in total defense four times: No. 4 in 2015, No. 1 in 2016, No. 3 in 2017 and No. 2 in 2018
- The Wolverines' pass defense has been among the nation's top three in four seasons: No. 3 in 2015, No. 1 in 2016, No. 1 in 2017, No. 2 in 2018
- U-M led the nation in pass efficiency defense in 2015, finished second in 2016, placed fourth in 2017 and ranked seventh in 2018
- The Wolverines have held 34 of their 91 opponents under Harbaugh to 10 points or less, including six shut-outs
- Only 36 opponents have managed to score 20 or more points against Michigan
- U-M has scored 14 defensive touchdowns: 1 in 2015, 3 in 2016, 3 in 2017, 4 in 2018, 1 in 2020, 2021 and 2022
- The defense has held the opposition to 100 rushing yards or less in 41 of the 91 games
- The Wolverines have posted 609 tackles for loss: 39 in 2022, 72 in 2021, 20 in 2020, 79 in 2019, 76 in 2018, 114 in 2017, 121 in 2016 and 88 in 2015
- Quarterbacks have been sacked 256 times: 22 in 2022, 34 in 2021, 9 in 2020, 36 in 2019, 34 in 2018, 42 in 2017, 46 in 2016 and 32 in 2015
- Michigan led the nation in third down defense in consecutive seasons (2016-17); set a school record in 2016 by allowing the opponent to convert just 21 percent on third down and followed up by allowing the opposition to convert just 26.1 percent of its chances in 2017
- Only 15 opponents have converted more than six third-down chances against Michigan since 2016; held 16 opponents with two or less third down conversions over the past eight seasons
- Michigan has finished in the top five nationally in three-and-outs forced on two occasions: first nationally in 2017 (83 in 162 series, 51.2%) and fourth in 2016 (73 in 164 possessions, 44.5%)

A LOOK BACK AT THE 2021 DEFENSE

- The defense listed top 30 in six categories: scoring defense (8th), pass efficiency defense (16th), total defense (20th), third down defense (26th), pass defense (27th) and rushing defense (27th)
- U-M was fourth in the Big Ten and eighth nationally in scoring defense, allowing just 17.4 points per contest (243 points; 17 passing TDs, 11 rushing TDs and 14 FGs)
- Michigan yielded more than 17 points just five times
- The Wolverines were third in the league and 20th nationally in total defense (331.1 yards per game)
- 38 defenders recorded at least one stop, and 35 of those individuals set career highs in tackles
- The defense forced the opposition to move long distance to score, with 25 of the 28 touchdown drives requiring more than 50 yards and 11-of-14 field goal drives coming on drives of 50-plus yards
- U-M yielded only six scoring drives under 50 yards, with five coming following turnovers
- Michigan's opponents gained 1,769 yards on 484 carries (126.4 yards per game)
- U-M held two opponents to less than 50 rushing yards: Washington (50) and Wisconsin (43)
- The only teams to score a rushing TD against the defense were Western Michigan, Nebraska, Northwestern, Michigan State, Indiana and Ohio State
- The Wolverines registered 72 tackles for loss on the season with 34 of those plays being sacks
- U-M had three-plus TFLs in every game except the Orange Bowl (2 TFLs); recorded a season high 12 tackles behind the line of scrimmage at Penn State
- The defense tallied at least one sack in 13 of the 14 games and posted a season-best seven at Penn State
- Michigan broke up 57 passes while adding eight interceptions
- 20 different players contributed at least one pass breakup; that is the highest number of players with at least one PBU in a single season in more than 25 years
- The defense got their hand on a season-high nine passes at Michigan State
- Aidan Hutchinson was the 2021 Heisman Trophy runner-up, becoming just the fourth defensive player in college football history to finish first or second in the voting
- Hutchinson won the Rotary Lombardi Award (best lineman, offense or defense), Ted Hendricks Award (best defensive end) and the Lott IMPACT Trophy (best defensive player); also received recognition as a National Football Foundation Scholar-Athlete and CoSIDA Academic All-American first team

SPECIAL TEAMS

A Look at the 2022 Special Teams

- Jay Harbaugh is in his third season as the program's Special Teams Coordinator after serving as an assistant the prior five seasons on staff
 - The Wolverines return all four of its primary specialists: kicker Jake Moody, punter/holder Brad Robbins, long snapper William Wagner and return specialist A.J. Henning
 - Moody is the returning 2021 Lou Groza Award winner and the Big Ten's 2021 Kicker of the Year
 - Robbins was a semifinalist for the 2021 Ray Guy Award and is a candidate for this year's top punting honor
 - Michigan blocked a punt and returned a punt for a touchdown against UConn
 - U-M is second in the conference and 12th nationally with two blocks: Caden Kolesar on a punt vs. UConn and Mike Morris on a field goal attempt at Indiana
 - A.J. Henning leads the Big Ten and is 19th in the NCAA in punt return average (10.3 avg.)
 - U-M has punted 19 times for a 45.9-yard average and has six fair caught, 10 downed inside the 20 and eight over 50 yards
 - The Wolverines are second in the Big Ten and are third nationally in net punting at 45.0 yards
 - Robbins is averaging 46.2 yards on 18 punts, with five punts fair caught, nine downed inside the opposition's 20-yard line and eight boots over 50 yards
 - According to PFFCollege, Robbins' 4.38-second hang time is the best in the country among punters with at least one punt per game; he is the only punter in the nation above 4.3 seconds
 - No opponent has registered a punt return of 10 yards against the Wolverines since Ohio State in 2017
 - 13 of Robbins' 18 punts have been downed, fair caught or rolled out of bounds
 - Jake Moody is second on the team in scoring with 57 points; hit 9-12 field goals and all 30 PATs
 - Moody scored 10-plus points in three games this fall
 - Moody has allowed five returns on 41 kickoffs this season; 88 total return yards with an average starting field position of the 17-yard line
 - For the second straight season, Moody lists in the top 25 in field goals per game; he is 20th in the NCAA this year (1.5 avg.) after ranking 13th in 2021 (1.64 avg.)
 - 34 of the 48 kickoffs have been touchbacks
 - The Wolverines have allowed just 105 return yards on 13 returns (punts, kickoffs and interceptions); average of 8.0 yards per return
- ### Special Teams Play under Harbaugh
- The Wolverine have converted 127-159 field goals (79%) and 349-354 point-after-attempts
 - U-M has 313 touchbacks on 585 kickoffs
 - Michigan has punted the ball three or less times in 40 games, including three contests where the team did not attempt a punt (Hawaii and Maryland in 2016 and Northern Illinois in 2021)

- A tradition for more than 25 years, football players and student-athletes in other sports across Michigan Athletics visit patients at **C.S. Mott Children’s Hospital** on Thursday nights throughout the year
- The football team makes annual visits to the **Veteran’s Hospital** in Ann Arbor, allowing the players a chance to give back to our military and thank them for their service to our country.
- Student-athletes participate in reading programs throughout the Ann Arbor School system and attend and speak at ACT (Athletes for Community Transformation) at Bryant Community Center
- Football players engage with special needs students from across the area at **Victors Day**, an event put together by the T. Wall Foundation
- The coaches and student-athletes work with the **KIDSPORT** Program to teach youngsters from around the Washtenaw County area about football, complete with youth run drills and demonstrations

2021 SEASON HIGHLIGHTS

- Michigan led the NCAA in fewest tackles for loss allowed per game (2.43 avg.) and ranked sixth in fewest sacks allowed (1.0 avg.).
- The Wolverines led the nation in kick return defense, allowing just 12.14 yards per return.
- Jake Moody was the team's leading scorer with 125 points, converting 23-25 field goals and a school record 56 PATs. His 125 points are the second-most in U-M history.
- Aidan Hutchinson and David Ojabo formed the top pass rushing duo in college football, combining for 25 sacks. Hutchinson set the Michigan season record with 14 sacks and Ojabo added 11, which is tied for the fourth-best season total in school history. Ojabo also set the U-M season record with five forced fumbles.
- Hassan Haskins carried the 270 times for 1,327 yards and scored a school record 20 rushing touchdowns. His yardage total is the most for a running back since Mike Hart gained 1,562 yards in 2007.
- The Wolverines had 23 players (10 offense, 9 defense, 3 special teams) recognized with all-conference accolades.
- U-M was led by six players that earned first-team All-Big Ten honors: Hassan Haskins and Andrew Stueber on offense, Aidan Hutchinson, David Ojabo and Dax Hill on defense and Jake Moody on special teams.
- Hutchinson was named the Big Ten Defensive Player of the Year and the Defensive Lineman of the Year, while Moody was selected as the Big Ten's Kicker of the Year.
- Hutchinson finished as the Heisman Trophy runner-up and won the Rotary Lombardi Award, Ted Hendricks Trophy, Lott IMPACT Trophy and was the recipient of the Chicago Tribune Silver Football as the Big Ten's MVP as voted by the conference coaches.
- Moody became Michigan's first-ever winner of the Lou Groza Award as the nation's outstanding place-kicker and became just the second kicker in school history to earn first-team All-American honors.
- The offensive line was named winner's of the Joe Moore Award as the nation's top unit.
- Michigan had a school record 60 football players earn Academic All-Big Ten honors this fall.
- The Wolverines set a program record with five players earning CoSIDA Academic All-District 5 honors: RB Blake Corum, DE Aidan Hutchinson, K Jake Moody, LB David Ojabo and C Andrew Vastardis.
- U-M had three players earn CoSIDA Academic All-American accolades: Hutchinson (1st), Ojabo (2nd) and Vastardis (2nd).
- Jim Harbaugh was named the Associated Press Coach of the Year and offensive coordinator Josh Gattis won the Broyles Award as the nation's top assistant coach.

MICHIGAN'S NFL FACTS AND INFORMATION

- Michigan has 59 players listed on NFL Rosters at the outset of the 2022 season
- A total of 44 Wolverines have been drafted during Coach Jim Harbaugh's tenure, including eight (8) first-round picks and 21 players chosen in the first three rounds
- During Harbaugh's tenure, Michigan has had 52 participants in the NFL Combine, including a record 14 players in 2017 and 11 in 2020
- Michigan is the only school to have a player selected in every NFL Draft; 84 consecutive selection meetings with a Wolverine chosen
- Since the inaugural draft in 1938, a total of 392 Michigan players have been selected; ranks fifth-best all-time among college programs
- A total of 59 players have been chosen in the first round of the professional draft: 51 NFL, 5 AAFC and 3 AFL
- Tom Harmon (1941) and Jake Long (2008) were the first overall picks in the NFL Draft
- U-M has had a first round pick five of the past six drafts, including multiple first round selection in three of those drafts
- 10 Wolverines selected in the first round of the NFL Draft are still active

Jim Harbaugh led the University of Michigan football program to the 2021 Big Ten Championship, the program's first conference title since 2004, with a 42-3 victory over No. 12 Iowa at Lucas Oil Stadium. The Wolverines made their first appearance in the College Football Playoff.

Michigan won 12 games in 2021 for just the third time in school history, equaling the school record victory totals of the 1905 and 1997 teams. The Wolverines won the Big Ten East Division title with a 42-27 victory over No. 2 Ohio State to finish the regular season with an 8-1 conference mark.

U-M had 22 players (10 offense, 9 defense, 3 special teams) recognized with all-conference accolades, led by six first-team All-Big Ten performers. In addition, defensive end Aidan Hutchinson and kicker Jake Moody were named consensus All-Americans. Hutchinson finished as the Heisman Trophy runner-up and won the Rotary Lombardi Award, Ted Hendricks Award, Lott IMPACT Trophy and was the recipient of the Chicago Tribune Silver Football as the Big Ten's MVP as voted by the conference coaches. Moody became Michigan's first-ever winner of the Lou Groza Award as the nation's most outstanding place-kicker.

Harbaugh has led the Michigan football program to four 10-win seasons during his seven years in Ann Arbor, becoming one of just four Big Ten coaches to accomplish the feat in the history of the conference.

The J. Ira and Nicki Harris Family Head Football Coach, Harbaugh was named the 20th coach in Michigan football history on Dec. 30, 2014. He became the sixth Michigan football player selected to lead college football's winningest program.

U-M has appeared in a bowl game in six seasons under Harbaugh, including the 2021 College Football Playoff National Semifinal, two New Year's Six Bowls and three other bowls

played on New Year's Day.

10 Wolverines have secured 14 All-America honors under Harbaugh, including consensus honorees Devin Bush, Jake Butt, Maurice Hurst, Jourdan Lewis, Jabrill Peppers, Aidan Hutchinson and Jake Moody.

Additionally, Butt won the Mackey Award as the nation's top tight end in 2016 while Peppers received the Lott IMPACT Trophy, Paul Hornung Award and was a fifth-place finisher in the Heisman Trophy race that same season. Several other athletes have been national award finalists under Harbaugh.

A total of 80 Wolverines have earned All-Big Ten honors (1st, 2nd or 3rd team), including a record 16 in 2016 and 15 players in 2018, 2019 and 2021. In the classroom, Wolverines have totaled 284 Academic All-Big Ten honors during his ten-

ure, including a program-record 60 in 2021.

Harbaugh's teams at Michigan have each finished the season ranked in the national polls, including a No. 10 season-ending ranking in 2016, when the Wolverines came within inches of claiming their first Big Ten East Division Title and a spot in the conference championship game in 2016. U-M has finished the season as a top-15 team three times in Harbaugh's tenure.

Under Harbaugh, Michigan has produced two of the five most-productive offensive seasons in school history. U-M has had a top-12 national defense in five seasons and a top-three unit on three occasions.

Harbaugh came to Ann Arbor after a four-year run in the NFL with the San Francisco 49ers. He led the franchise to the NFC Championship Game in each of his first three seasons, winning the NFC title in 2012. Harbaugh tallied a 49-22-1 overall record, including 5-3 in the postseason.

Harbaugh led the Niners to a 13-3 regular-season record and the NFC Championship Game in 2011, his first season, earning the AP NFL Coach of the Year award. He followed up with an 11-4-1 regular-season mark in 2012, culminating with an appearance in Super Bowl XLVII. Harbaugh's 49ers lost a back-and-forth affair, 34-31, to the Baltimore Ravens and his brother, John, in the only matchup of brothers as head coaches in NFL history.

At the collegiate level, Harbaugh spent three years at the University of San Diego (2004-06) and four years at Stanford (2007-10). He turned around a Cardinal program that went 1-11 prior to his arrival, culminating with a 12-1 campaign and FedEx Orange Bowl victory in 2010. In his debut as a head coach, Harbaugh led San Diego to a 29-6 record in three seasons.

He spent the 2002 and 2003 NFL seasons as the Oakland Raiders' quarterbacks coach, assisting the team to Super Bowl XXXVII.

Harbaugh began preparing for a coaching career during his professional playing days, spending eight years as an NCAA-certified unpaid assistant coach for his father, Jack, at Western Kentucky (1994-2001).

As an NFL quarterback, Harbaugh played for five organizations in his 15-year career (1987-2001). He threw for 26,288 yards and 129 touchdowns in 177 games and made 140 career starts. He was the AFC Offensive Player of the Year, the NFL Comeback Player of the Year and a Pro Bowl selection after

leading the Indianapolis Colts to the AFC Championship Game in 1995. In 2005, he was inducted into the Colts Ring of Honor.

As a Wolverine, Harbaugh was one of the most efficient passers in NCAA history. In 1985, he led the nation in pass efficiency and finished runner-up the following year. His career pass efficiency rating was the NCAA's top mark for more than 12 years.

In 1986, Harbaugh won the "Chicago Tribune" Big Ten Most Valuable Player award, was a first-team All-American and finished third in Heisman Trophy voting.

The first Michigan quarterback to throw for more than 300 yards in a single game (310 vs. Wisconsin), Harbaugh also eclipsed the 200-yard passing mark 12 times. He led the Wolverines to a 21-3-1 record as a full-time starter during his final two seasons, including a pair of victories against Michigan State and Ohio State. During his college career, he completed 387-of-620 passes for 5,449 yards and 31 touchdowns; all four statistical categories still list among the top 12 in school history.

Harbaugh and his wife, Sarah, have two daughters, Addison and Katherine, and two sons, Jack and John. He also has three adult children, Jay, James Jr., and Grace.

Michigan Stadium -- 1927-2022 (95 Years)

The football program is in its 95th season in the "Big House" in 2022, with a 448-133-15 all-time record at Michigan Stadium. The largest college football stadium in the country, it was completed in 1927 at a cost of \$950,000, initially seating 72,000 fans. Michigan won the first game played at Michigan Stadium, defeating Ohio Wesleyan, 33-0, on Oct. 1, 1927. The stadium was officially dedicated on Oct. 22, 1927, with a 21-0 shutout over Ohio State.

Since that inaugural season, the capacity of Michigan Stadium has been altered 10 times to its present capacity of 107,601. The Wolverines have led the nation in attendance 44 times of the past 47 years, and reestablished the NCAA single-game attendance record at 115,109 fans during the 2013 Notre Dame game.

Michigan has drawn crowds of 100,000-plus for 304 consecutive games; the current streak was paused when health officials and government agencies limited fans at sporting events during the 2020 football season due to the COVID-19 pandemic. On football Saturdays in Ann Arbor, Michigan Stadium ranks as the fourth-largest "city" in the state, surpassing the population of Ann Arbor itself.

Michigan Stadium was the first college-owned football facility with a video scoreboard above both end zones and was also the first stadium to use electronic scoreboards for official time when, in 1930, two were installed.

CAPACITY: 107,601 -- the largest college-owned structures of its kind designed solely for football -- closer to the playing field with no running track -- no posts or other obstructions.

COMPLETION: 1927 --- at a cost in excess of \$950,000 to seat 72,000 spectators. Capacity raised to 84,401 by addition of temporary wooden bleachers until 1949 when permanent steel stands replaced the wooden bleachers, increasing the capacity to 97,239. Seating capacity then raised to 101,001 in 1956, 101,701 in 1973, 102,501 in 1992 and 107,501 in 1998.

FIRST GAME: October 1, 1927 -- Michigan led by Captain Bennie Oosterbaan, defeated Ohio Wesleyan, 33-0. LaVerne (Kip) Taylor, Michigan end, scored first in the stadium on a 28-yard pass from halfback Louis Gilbert.

DEDICATION GAME: October 22, 1927 -- Michigan defeated Ohio State, 21-0.

REDEDICATION GAME: September 4, 2010 -- vs. Connecticut.

ATTENDANCE: Since 1927, 52,514,261 fans have watched the Wolverines play at Michigan Stadium. Stadium attendance record of 115,109 was set on Sept. 7, 2013 against Notre Dame.

FIELD: 360 x 160 feet -- Installed new FieldTurf in 2010. The original FieldTurf surface was installed in 2003, returning Michigan to an artificial surface for the first time since the 1990 season. Installed Prescription Athletic Turf in 1991, giving Michigan its first natural grass field since 1968. Field was also lowered 3-1/2 feet allowing better sightlines for those seated in the lower rows.

100,000-Plus Crowds at Michigan Stadium

The football program has played 304 consecutive home games in front of crowds in excess of 100,000; current streak was paused when health officials and government agencies limited fans at sporting events during the 2020 football season due to the COVID-19 pandemic. The last time Michigan did not have 100,000 in attendance in Michigan Stadium was on Oct. 25, 1975 vs. Indiana. A crowd of 93,857 was on hand for the 55-7 Michigan victory.
