

## 2015 PAC-12 WOMEN'S BASKETBALL TOURNAMENT Post-Game Notes

GAME 11: #3 Stanford (61), #4 Calfornia (60)

Sunday, March 8, 2015

Stanford won the championship of the 2015 Pac-12 Women's Basketball Tournament presented by New York Life. It also earned the conference's automatic bid to the NCAA basketball tournament. Stanford won its 11<sup>th</sup> Tournament title (2003-05, 2007-13, 2015) in 13 title game appearances. The Cardinal have appeared in 40 Tournament games, winning 37 (7-0 vs. Cal).

Greenfield is the first non-starter to win the MOP award in the Tournament's 14 year history. She is the 6<sup>th</sup> Cardinal to win the award (Nicole Powell, 2002-04; Candice Wiggins, 2005, 2007-08; Kayla Pedersen, 2009; Nnemkadi Ogwumike 2010-12; and Chiney Ogwumike, 2013).

Greenfield's 20 points were a career high. Her two highest scoring games of the season have come in the Tournament semifinal and tonight (17 vs. ASU). The only previous time she scored in double figures in consecutive games occurred last season (12/21/13, Tenn. 11 pts and 12/28/13, Fresno State 18 pts).

Stanford had a 27-17 advantage in bench points, led by Greenfield's 20.

Orrange's 6 steals were a career high and tied her for the most in a Tournament championship game.

Stanford had an 11-8 advantage in steals. The 11 tied a season high for the Cardinal. Cal had an 18-8 advantage (combined) over its two previous Tournament opponents.

This was the first #3-#4 seed matchup in Tournament history. Stanford is the third #3 seed to claim the Tournament championship (ASU, 2002 and UCLA, 2006).

Stanford's Kaylee Johnson snared 12 rebounds, giving her 17 10+ rebound games this season.

Courtney Range, Cal scored in double figures (17) for the 10<sup>th</sup> time this season (2<sup>nd</sup> time in Tournament). It was the most she has ever scored against a conference opponent. Her 9 rebounds led the Bears tonight and were the most she had against a conference opponent this season.

Cal's Brittany Boyd left the game with an injury at 15:27 of the 1<sup>st</sup> half with her team leading 5-4. She returned with 2:22 to go and her team ahead 24-20.

Tonight's attendance of 4,864 raised the total Tournament attendance to 26,898. The 6 session total is the most during the three years the Tournament has been in Seattle and second only to the 27,415 who attended the 2002 Tournament in Eugene, Oregon. Only the 2002 championship game was better attended (5,349).
