

2015 PAC-12 WOMEN'S BASKETBALL TOURNAMENT Post-Game Notes

GAME 9: #3 Stanford (59), #2 Arizona State (56) Saturday, March 7, 2015

Stanford moves on to play in Sunday's championship game, set for 6:00 p.m. PDT. Stanford has played in 12 of the previous 13 title games. The Cardinal won championships in 2003-05 and 2007-13. Stanford beat Colorado 62-55 at Maples Pavilion during the regular season and split two matchups with California.

Stanford has won four of five Tournament games against ASU. The lone loss was in the inaugural championship game (2002).

After losing both regular-season games to the Sun Devils, the Cardinal avoided losing to the same team three times in a season for the first time since 1990-91 (Tennessee).

The three meetings between the teams were decided by a combined seven points. Arizona State's two wins came by one and three points, respectively.

Stanford wore its cardinal-colored uniforms as a lower seed for the first time in 39 Tournament games.

Down 52-41 with 6:38 to play, Arizona State went on a 15-3 run to take its first lead of the second half at the 2:19 mark. Taylor Greenfield then put Stanford ahead for good with 44.3 seconds remaining.

Arizona State was held to season-low 31.6% shooting from the field.

Stanford's eight 3-pointers were the most allowed by ASU this season (previously seven vs. Oregon State).

Stanford's Amber Orrange reached double-digit scoring at the 7:00 mark of the 1st half (25th time this season). 15 of her 18 points were scored before halftime.

Taylor Greenfield scored a career-high 17 points, her fourth time in double figures this year.

Kaylee Johnson's block in the final minute gave her a career-high five blocks (previously four, done 3x). Stanford's nine blocks were also a team season high (previously eight).

The Cardinal had attempted just one free throw before shooting four in the final 11.4 seconds.

ASU's Sophie Brunner and Quinn Dornstauder reached double figure scoring for the 20th and 11th times this season, respectively. Brunner added 10 rebounds for her fifth double-double of 2014-15.

With a pair of 3-pointers, Stanford's Bonnie Samuelson tied former Washington Kristi Kingma for 10th place on the career Pac-12 3-point leaderboard with 225 apiece.
