POSTGAME NOTES

No. 4 Stanford Notes:

- With the win, Stanford has advanced to its eighth straight Sweet 16.
- Stanford is 6-2 all-time against Oklahoma and 4-1 in the NCAA Tournament. Stanford is 3-0 all-time against Oklahoma at Maples Pavilion.
- Stanford is 77-26 all-time in the NCAA Tournament and 32-4 while at Maples Pavilion, including 12 straight.
- With her 24 points, Amber Orrange became the 21st player in Stanford history to eclipse the 1,400-point plateau and tied Louise Smith for 20th on the school's all-time scoring list with 1,414. She also made a career-high 11 field goals, which surpassed her previous career-high of 10.
- Amber Orrange (24), Bonnie Samuelson (19), Lili Thompson (19), and Briana Roberson (13) each reached double figures in points against Oklahoma. Stanford is now 13-0 when at least four players score at least 10 points.
- All 19 of Bonnie Samuelson's points came in the second half. Samuelson did not connect on any of her first five three-point attempts, but went on to hit three treys on the game.
- Stanford has trailed at the half 14 times this season and is 9-5 in those games, with wins in each of the last six. It is the fifth time Stanford has won a game by double digits after falling behind at the half. The Cardinal has trailed both NCAA Tournament games at halftime and won both by double figures.
- Stanford made a season-high 30 free throws on 38 attempts, which tied a season-high.
- Stanford overcame a season-high tying 20 turnovers for the victory. The Cardinal entered the game averaging 12.1 turnovers/game, the 13th-best clip nationally.

No. 5 Oklahoma Notes:

- Oklahoma has not beaten Stanford since the second round of the 2001 NCAA Tournament when the Sooners won 67-50 in Norman, Okla.
- Gioya Carter finished with 20 points, including 16 in the first half, and scored the team's first 12 points for the game. Carter's first bucket after the break came 11 minutes into the second half.
- The 38.9 field goal percentage was the 11th time this season Oklahoma failed to shoot better than 40 percent.
- The Sooners dominated the paint, outscoring the Cardinal by a 34-16 margin.
