Stanford returns experienced core for 2016 campaign

STANFORD, Calif. – No. 5 Stanford heads east this weekend to open its regular season with a pair of games at Navy and Georgetown.

The Cardinal begins its 2016 campaign Friday at 4 p.m. (PT) against the Mids before heading to nation's capital Sunday at 9 a.m. to take on the Hoyas.

Stanford posted a 19-2-2 record in 2015 and advanced to the NCAA Tournament Quarterfinals for the seventh time in eight years, completing the season with a No. 6 national ranking.

The Cardinal returns 16 letterwinners, including nine starters, and will be led by an experienced upper class and talented group of underclassmen.

Andi Sullivan, a 2015 first-team All-American, returns for her junior season and will dictate play in the midfield. Maddie Bauer, a 2015 All-Region selection, and Alana Cook, the 2015 Pac-12 Freshman of the Year, will anchor the central defense for the second consecutive season.

Jane Campbell earned Pac-12 Goalkeeper of the Year honors in 2015 and will log a majority of the minutes in goal. She has 30 career shutouts and is five shy of the all-time record of 35 held by Nicole Barnhart ('04).

Stanford returns four of its top-five goal-scorers from a year ago, including Kyra Carusa, Michelle Xiao, Sullivan and Jordan DiBiasi.

A live stream and live statistics will be available for both games.

MAC Hermann Trophy Watch List

• Jane Campbell and Andi Sullivan were named to the MAC Hermann Trophy Watch List for the second consecutive season. The award is presented by the Missouri Athletic Club to the nation's top player. Stanford has won three times: Kelley O'Hara in 2009, Christen Press in 2010, and Teresa Noyola in 2011.

Rankings

• Stanford enters the 2016 season ranked No. 5 in the NSCAA Preseason Coaches Poll and No. 1 in the TopDrawerSoccer rankings. The Cardinal was selected to finish first in the Pac-12 for the second consecutive season in a vote by conference head coaches.

• Stanford finished the 2015 season ranked No. 6 in the NSCAA/Continental Tire coaches' poll and TopDrawerSoccer rankings.

• Stanford finished the regular season No. 5 in RPI. The Cardinal took on seven of the top 30 teams in the RPI rankings, including Penn State (No. 2), California (No. 18), BYU (No. 19), USC (No. 21), Santa Clara (No. 24), Arizona (No. 27) and Washington State (No. 28).

Five Cardinal Recognized

• Stanford is well-represented on TopDrawerSoccer's Preseason Best XI teams with five players earning recognition. Andi Sullivan and Jane Campbell were named to the first team, Maddie Bauer claimed second team recognition and Alana Cook earned a third team nod. Tierna Davidson was named to the freshman team.

Welcome to The Farm

• Stanford added eight freshmen to the roster this season. Six are from California, one from Washington and one from Australia.

Challenging Road Ahead

• Stanford will take on a challenging 19-game schedule in 2016, including 10 teams that appeared in last year's NCAA Tournament.

• Cardinal opponents registered a winning percentage of .590 with a combined record of 211-140-42 in 2015. Six teams finished the season ranked in the top 25 nationally.

• The Cardinal will play nine consecutive home games from Aug. 26-Oct. 2 and conclude nonconference play against 2015 NCAA Tournament teams Minnesota (Sept. 9), Notre Dame (Sept. 11) and Santa Clara (Sept. 16).

National Honors for Sullivan

• Andi Sullivan became the 14th first-team All-American in program history in 2015 and was named one of 15 semifinalists for the MAC Hermann Trophy. She was the only Pac-12 representative on the first team and is one of five Pac-12 players to receive All-America recognition. She was the only sophomore and one of two underclassmen on the first team.

Bauer Named NSCAA Scholar All-American

• Maddie Bauer earned third-team NSCAA Scholar All-America honors in 2015 and was the only Pac-12 player selected to the three teams. She holds a 3.49 GPA as an international relations major. Bauer was named an NSCAA All-Pacific Region first team selection, earned her third consecutive All-Pac-12 second team honor and second straight Pac-12 All-Academic award.

Head Coach Paul Ratcliffe

Paul Ratcliffe is the most successful coach in more than 100 years of Stanford soccer, among men or women.

In 13 full seasons as head coach, the Stanford women have won one national championship, reached three NCAA finals, and won five Pac-12 titles. He's led the Card to six College Cups, and reached the NCAA third round the past 10 seasons.



He also coached four national players of the year -- Kelley O'Hara, Christen Press, Teresa Noyola, and Lindsay Taylor -- and five

Pac-12 Scholar Athlete of the Year winners.

Ratcliffe, who has never failed to direct the Cardinal to the NCAA tournament, now is Stanford's winningest soccer coach, with a 233-47-26 record on The Farm and 288-81-33 overall as a Division I head coach.

He also is the most successful in the postseason, with a 36-10-4 record in NCAA playoff action. His Stanford teams have an ongoing unbeaten streak of 29 in NCAA tournament play at home.

Ratcliffe is a six-time Pac-12 Coach of the Year and three-time NSCAA National Coach of the Year.

In 2011, he led Stanford to its first NCAA women's soccer championship, and a third consecutive NCAA final.

Under Ratcliffe, Stanford had a 73-match home unbeaten streak (70-0-3) from 2008-13 for the second-longest such streak in NCAA annals and won 44 consecutive conference matches.

All-Region Recognition

- Five Cardinal players earned 2015 NSCAA All-Pacific Region recognition. Four Cardinal players earned first team honors, including Andi Sullivan (M), Maddie Bauer (D), Jane Campbell (GK) and Haley Rosen (M). Freshman Alana Cook (D) earned second team honors.
- Stanford's four first-team regional selections were the most of any program in the nation and its five honors are the most in the Pacific region.
- Paul Ratcliffe was named the 2015 NSCAA Pacific Region Coach of the Year. It is the sixth NSCAA regional coaching award of Ratcliffe's career.

Pac-12 Honors

- Stanford is well-represented in 2015 All-Pac-12 selections with eight players earning all-conference honors, five freshman named to the All-Freshmen Team and three members winning individual awards.
- Paul Ratcliffe was named the Pac-12 Coach of the Year, Jane Campbell earned Goalkeeper of the Year recognition and Alana Cook claimed Freshman/Newcomer of the Year honors. It is Ratcliffe's sixth coach of the year honor in the past eight years. Campbell claimed her first goalkeeper of the year honor and Cook became the second consecutive Cardinal to earn freshman of the year recognition after Andi Sullivan did so a year ago.

- Stanford's team captains this season are seniors Maddie Bauer and Jane Campbell and junior Andi Sullivan.

Impressive Defensive Streaks

- Stanford has not allowed more than two goals in a match over its past 258 contests, not since a 4-0 loss to North Carolina on Sept. 11, 2005, in San Francisco. During that stretch, Stanford allowed two goals 26 times, which comes out to once every 9.92 matches.
- Stanford hasn't allowed more than two goals in a match at home since Oct. 5, 1998, in a 3-2 overtime loss to BYU.
- Stanford hasn't allowed more than two at home in regulation since Oct. 10, 1997, in a 3-2 loss to USC.

Stanford Defensive Notes

- Senior Jane Campbell recorded her 30th career shutout in the 2015 NCAA Tournament Third Round against Arizona (Nov. 21). She is five shy of the all-time record of 35 held by Nicole Barnhart ('04).
- Jane Campbell's shutout streak of 803:18 during the 2014 season (Aug. 22-Sept. 26) is the 18th-longest by a goalkeeper in NCAA Division I history.
- Stanford recorded nine consecutive shutouts in 2014 to set school records for consecutive shutouts and consecutive shutouts to open a season.

Senior Class

• Stanford's senior class of Jane Campbell, Maddie Bauer, Ryan Walker-Hartshorn, Siobhan Cox, Megan Turner and Stephanie Amack have a three-year record of 54-10-6 (.814).

Unbeaten in the Pac-12

• Stanford went undefeated in Pac-12 play for the first time since 2012 during the 2015 season. The Cardinal outscored Pac-12 opponents 24-6 in conference play.

Super Sophomores

• Stanford's sophomore class played an important role in the team's success during 2015. All five freshmen field players Michelle Xiao, Jordan DiBiasi, Alana Cook, Tegan McGrady and Averie Collins saw significant time and made regular contributions.

• All five field players scored at least one goal and one game-winning goal in 2015.

• Xiao was particularly impressive in the offensive zone, scoring twice against Boston College and netting the game-winners against UC Davis and Oregon State. She scored Stanford's only goal against Duke in the NCAA Tournament Quarterfinals.

• Four of DiBiasi's five goals were game-winners in crucial moments against top competition. She scored game-winners against No. 9 BYU, at Washington, No. 16 USC and again against the Cougars in the second round of the NCAA Tournament.

• Cook did well taking on the centerback position that required her to be a strong presence in the center of the field and decisive on the ball when distributing. She also contributed three goals and an assist. She was named the Pac-12 Freshman/Newcomer of the Year.

• McGrady scored the game-winning goal in overtime against Oklahoma to lift Stanford to a 2-1 win. She assisted both game-winning goals against Oregon State (Oct. 8) and Oregon (Oct. 11). McGrady is electric down the sideline, constantly making runs and taking on defenders one-on-one.

• Averie Collins scored her first collegiate game-winning goal with a header off a corner kick in the 109th minute at No. 25 Washington State. She scored the first goal of her collegiate career in her Pac-12 debut at Utah to help lead Stanford to a 4-1 victory.

Young Goal-Scorers

• Underclassmen accounted for 29 of Stanford's 43 goals in 2015. Freshmen led the team with 18 goals, followed by the sophomores (11), juniors (8) and seniors (5).

Dominating at Both Ends of the Field

• Stanford outshot opponents 439-156 and held a 180-51 corner kick advantage in 2015.

• The Cardinal did not allow a corner kick in seven-of-23 games.

• Stanford did not permit a corner kick for a span of 348:34 minutes to start the 2015 season. The Cardinal registered 36 consecutive corner kicks and did not allow the opposition an opportunity until the fourth game of the season when No. 9 BYU earned a corner kick at 78:34.

Stanford's NCAA History

• The Cardinal qualified for 18 consecutive NCAA tournaments and 25 overall in 2015. The Cardinal is unbeaten in its past 29 home NCAA tournament matches, has advanced past the first round the past nine seasons, and has reached six NCAA College Cups in the previous seven years. Stanford's all-time NCAA tournament record is 48-20-6 (.689).

• Stanford's defense earned its 11th shutout of the season and Averie Collins scored the first postseason goal of her career to lift Stanford to a 2-0 victory against San Jose State in the NCAA Tournament First Round.

• Alana Cook scored the game-tying goal in the 80th minute against No. 20 California to send the game to overtime and help Stanford complete an undefeated conference season.

• Kyra Carusa and Megan Turner scored a goal apiece to defeat UCLA 2-0 and secure the Pac-12 championship outright.

• Jordan DiBiasi scored the game-winner against No. 16 USC on a quality assist by Haley Rosen to clinch at least a share of the Pac-12 title.

• Jordan DiBiasi scored the game-winner in the 61st minute, and Haley Rosen and Alana Cook added second-half goals in a 16-minute span to earn a convincing 3-0 victory at Washington on a rain-drenched evening in Seattle.

• Haley Rosen produced a goal and an assist, and Averie Collins scored the first game-winning goal of her career to lift No. 4 Stanford to a 2-1 double-overtime victory at No. 25 Washington State.

• Michelle Xiao assisted both goals and Mariah Lee scored her first goal of the year, the game-winner, in a 2-1 victory against Colorado.

• Andi Sullivan headed in a game-winner in the 75th minute to lift Stanford to a 1-0 victory against Oregon.

• Michelle Xiao, Kyra Carusa and Stephanie Amack scored a goal apiece against Oregon State.

• Haley Rosen and Andi Sullivan scored first-half goals, and Kyra Carusa scored in the second overtime period to lift Stanford to a 3-2 victory at Arizona.

• Andi Sullivan and Haley Rosen scored highlight-reel goals in the second half and Stanford earned its fifth shutout in 10 games, defeating Arizona State 2-0.

• Kyra Carusa scored the first two goals of her collegiate career, Averie Collins scored the first goal of her career and Ryan Walker-Hartshorn added a last-second score to help lead Stanford to a 4-1 comeback victory at Utah.

• Michelle Xiao scored the game-winning goal in overtime to lift Stanford to a 1-0 victory against UC Davis.

• Tegan McGrady scored the first goal of her collegiate career to help Stanford earn a 2-1 overtime victory against Oklahoma.

• Jordan DiBiasi scored the first goal of her collegiate career to help lead Stanford to a 1-0 victory against No. 9 BYU.

• Ryan Walker-Hartshorn scored in the 84th minute to help lead Stanford to a 1-0 victory at Cal Poly. The Cardinal held advantages in shots (18-3) and corner kicks (12-0) against the Mustangs.

• Michelle Xiao scored twice in Stanford's home debut, a 4-0 victory against Boston College.

• Alana Cook scored the game-winner in her collegiate debut to help lead Stanford to a season-opening win at Hawai'i. (Aug. 21)

Pac-12 All-Century Team

• Stanford head coach Paul Ratcliffe and alumna Julie Foudy ('93) were named the Pac-12 Coach and Player of the Century by the conference. The Cardinal led the conference with eight representatives on the team.
