- The 2016 season marks Shaw's sixth as Stanford's Bradford M. Freeman Director of Football.
- Fifth alum to hold the position of head football coach.
- Signed a long-term contract extension following the 2012 regular season.
- Holds remarkable 54-14 (.794) career record and is 36-9 (.800) in Pac-12 play through five seasons.
- Led Cardinal to three Pac-12 titles in the past four seasons and a pair of Rose Bowl Game wins in three trips to The Granddaddy of Them All.
- Stanford is one of three Power 5 schools to win multiple conference championship games since 2012, and its 66 wins since 2010 are the most by any private school.
- Stanford has won at least 11 games four times in five seasons under Shaw. From 1891-2010, the program recorded four 10-win seasons.
- Following the 2015 season, Stanford became the only school ever ranked in the top-4 by U.S. News and World Report (4th) and the Associated Press (3rd) in the same year.
- The Cardinal toppled five ranked opponents in 2015 including a trio of top-10 foes in No. 6 USC, No. 4 Notre Dame and No. 6 Iowa. Stanford was one of four teams in 2015 to record five or more wins over AP Top 25 opponents and one of four teams with three or more wins over AP Top 10 opponents.
- Christian McCaffrey was named 2015 AP Player of the Year while winning the Paul Hornung Award and Johnny "Jet" Rodgers Award. McCaffrey, also a Heisman Trophy finalist, set the NCAA record for all-purpose yards (3,864) while earning Academic All-America honors.
- McCaffrey earned consensus All-America first team nods and Outland Trophy winner Joshua Garnett received unanimous All-America distinction.

- Fifteen student-athletes were lauded with All-Pac-12 honors and 22 received All-Pac-12 academic distinction in 2015.
- McCaffrey posted the top four FBS individual all-purpose single-game performances in 2015 and his 461 all-purpose yards vs. USC in the Pac-12 Championship Game was fifth-most in FBS history. He owned three of the top five 100-yard receiving and rushing games by an FBS player and became the only FBS player ever with 200 rushing, 100 receiving and 100 kickoff return yards vs. USC.
- For the third time in five seasons, named Pac-12 Coach of the Year and McCaffrey earned Pac-12 Offensive Player of the Year honors.
- Fastest ever to earn three Pac-12 Coach of the Year honors.
- Five Cardinal heard their name called during the NFL Draft: Garnett (first round - San Francisco 49ers), Austin Hooper (third round - Atlanta Falcons), Blake Martinez (fourth round - Green Bay Packers), Kevin Hogan (fifth round - Kansas City Chiefs) and Kyle Murphy (sixth round - Green Bay Packers). No Pac-12 Conference team has had more draftees over the past five years than Stanford (24).
- Stanford received an NCAA GSR of 99 percent for the second consecutive year in 2015, a total that led all FBS and FCS institutions.
- Stanford's West Coast offense led nation with 13 consecutive games scoring at least 30 points in 2015.
- Matched school-record with six selections in 2015 NFL Draft.
- Historic defensive output in 2012 broke single-season sacks record (57) and led Pac-12 in scoring defense (17.21), total defense (336.21), rushing defense (97.0), sacks (4.07), tackles for loss (9.00).
- Wide receivers and passing game coordinator at University of San Diego during 2006 season, winning Division I-AA Mid-Major national title and Pioneer League championship with nation's top offense.
- Nine years of NFL experience with Philadelphia Eagles (1997), Oakland Raiders (1998-2001) and Baltimore Ravens (2002-05).
- Four-year letterwinner at Stanford from 1991-94 as a receiver.
- Represents the Pac-12 on the AFCA Ethics Committee and is one of 18 individuals named to USA Football's Football Advisory Committee.
- Wife, Kori, and three children -- Keegan, Carter and Gavin.

Mike Bloomgren

Andrew Luck Director of Offense

- Sixth season at Stanford
- 18th season overall
- Florida State '99

- Serves as associate head coach, offensive coordinator and offensive line coach.
- Instrumental in the breakout season posted by AP Player of the Year and Heisman Trophy finalist Christian McCaffrey in 2015. McCaffrey, the program's single-season rushing leader, led the nation in all-purpose yards while breaking Barry Sanders' NCAA record.
- Quarterback Kevin Hogan's passing efficiency in 2015 (171.0) was a Stanford single-season best, and the balance of the Cardinal offense proved to be a cornerstone during the program's run to the Pac-12 title and victory over Iowa in the Rose Bowl.
- Stanford amassed a school-record 3,131 rushing yards on 610 attempts, the most ever by a Cardinal program. The offense unit's 529 points ranked second-most in a season, its 33 rushing touchdowns, 223.7 rushing yards/game, 30 passing touchdowns, 37.8 points/game and 6,097 total yards of offense ranked third.
- Four Cardinal heard their name called at the NFL Draft following the 2015 season, including first-round selection Joshua Garnett, Stanford's unanimous first team All-America -- and only the ninth in school history. Garnett was the program's first Outland Trophy winner as the nation's top interior lineman, and won the Morris Trophy, presented to the Pac-12 Lineman of the Year.
- Stanford amassed 2,904 rushing yards during the 2013 season, Bloomgren's first year at the offensive helm. Cultivating explosive plays in Bloomgren's offense, Stanford scored 23 offensive touchdowns covering 20 yards or more in 2013.
- In 2013, all five offensive linemen received All-Pac-12 honors, including first-team selection David Yankey, Stanford's first two-time first team All-American selection since Bob Whitfield (1990-91), and a semifinalist for the Outland Trophy and Lombardi Award.
- The Cardinal offensive line afforded 200-plus yards rushing in six games during the 2012 season, paving the way for record-breaking running back Stephan Taylor, who produced the best season of his career (109.29 yards/game) behind the most inexperienced offensive line of his career.
- Bloomgren's work with the offensive line in 2011, which included three first-year starters, played a pivotal role in providing protection for Heisman finalist Andrew Luck to complete over 70 percent of his passes and throw a school-record 37 touchdowns, in addition to compiling the third-highest rushing total in school annals.
- Stanford's ground game in 2011 keyed an offense that ranked seventh nationally in scoring average at 43.2 points/game and eighth in total offense at 489.3 yards/game. Bloomgren's play calling and schemes aided single-game rushing record of 446 yards against No. 25 Washington.
- Right guard David DeCastro was a unanimous 2011 All-America selection and finalist for the Outland Trophy under Bloomgren's watch, while left tackle Jonathan Martin earned first team Walter Camp Football Foundation and American Football Coaches Association All-America honors.
- Joined the Cardinal staff as offensive line coach and run game coordinator in 2011 after spending four seasons with the New York Jets, where he served as assistant offensive coordinator (2010), offensive assistant (2009) and offensive quality control coach (2007-08).
- Launched coaching career as an undergraduate assistant for Bobby Bowden at Florida State, where the Seminoles captured a pair of Atlantic Coast Conference titles (1997-98) during his tenure.
- A 1999 graduate of Florida State with a bachelor's degree in sports management.
- Earned his master's degree in higher education from Alabama in 2001.
- Hails from Tallahassee, Florida.
- Wife, Lara, and two sons -- Tyler and Parker.



Lance Anderson

Willie Shaw Director of Defense

- 10th season at Stanford
- 20th season overall
- Idaho State '96

- Third season overseeing Stanford's defense, seventh campaign working with the outside linebackers.
- Previously worked with the defensive tackles from 2007-09.
- One of the architects of Stanford's vaunted defense and program's liaison to the Stanford admissions office.
- Stanford ranked among the Pac-12's best defensive units in 2015: second in third-down conversion percentage (.363), third in total defense (368.3), third in first-down defense (267), third in scoring defense (22.6) and fourth in rushing defense (139.9).
- That unit was spearheaded by inside linebacker Blake Martinez, a fourth-round draft choice of the Green Bay Packers. Martinez, Stanford's 11th defensive player taken in the NFL Draft since 2010, was selected to the AP All-America third team, USA Today All-America second team and All-Pac-12 first team as a senior in 2015. Martinez led the Pac-12 with 141 tackles (75 solo) -- ranking seventh nationally -- and averaged a conference-best 10.1 per contest. In 14 games, he collected 10 or more tackles nine times.
- The Cardinal posted the league's fifth-best passing efficiency defense (123.96) and third-best total defense (368.3). Stanford's secondary allowed only 6.76 yards/pass attempt while picking off eight balls, led by Quenton Meeks' team-best three interceptions. Meeks added a pick-six in the Rose Bowl Game win over Iowa. The Cardinal tied for fifth in the Pac-12 in pass breakups (51).
- In 2014, Stanford ranked second nationally in scoring defense (16.4 points/game), third in total defense (282.4 yards/game), seventh in rushing defense (104.5 yards/game) and eighth in passing defense (177.9 yards/game) -- one of three teams in 2014 to finish in the top-10 nationally in all four categories. The team was also among the best nationally in getting to the quarterback, ranking sixth with 46 sacks.
- Defense ranked third in the NCAA in rushing defense (89.4 yards/game), 10th in scoring defense (19.0 points/game) and 16th in total defense (343.1 yards/game) in 2013 -- one of only five teams to allow fewer than 100 rushing yards/game. The 2013 unit was also among the best nationally in producing stops for negative yardage, ranking fifth with 44 sacks and seventh with 109 tackles for loss.
- Work on the admissions front has been noteworthy, as Stanford earned consecutive Academic Achievement Awards from the American Football Coaches Association after posting a 100 percent graduation rate.
- The 2012 defensive unit paved the way to a historic defensive output, breaking Stanford's single-season sacks record (57). The Cardinal went on to win the Pac-12 title and claimed its first Rose Bowl crown in over 40 years.
- As recruiting coordinator from 2007-11, played instrumental role in landing four consecutive nationally acclaimed recruiting classes that were ranked in the top-25 by various scouting services.
- Came to Stanford from San Diego in 2007 after spending two seasons working with the Toreros under former Stanford head coach Jim Harbaugh.
- Prior to joining Harbaugh in San Diego, Anderson had coached at Utah State, Saint Mary's, Bucknell and Idaho State.
- After serving a church mission, was a walk-on at Idaho State where he played linebacker in 1993 and 1994.
- Hails from Rupert, Idaho.

Pete Alamar

Special Teams Coordinator

- Fifth season at Stanford
- 32nd season overall
- Cal Lutheran '83

• A veteran of the Pac-12 Conference, Alamar also served as special teams coordinator and tight ends coach at California for seven seasons, and had a six-year stay at Arizona where he worked primarily with special teams.

• Alamar has coached on seven teams that won at least 10 games -- two at Arizona, two at Cal and three at Stanford -- and has been a part of 15 bowl teams.

• Alamar's specialists came through big in 2015 while helping the Cardinal to a third Pac-12 title in four years and a win over Iowa in the Rose Bowl Game. Christian McCaffrey, who won the Jet Award as the nation's top kick returner, became the third Cardinal ever with more than 1,000 kickoff return yards (1,070) in a single season. McCaffrey was second nationally in combined kick returns (1,200).

• Conrad Ukropina's .900 (18-20) field goal percentage was a single-season school record and ranked third nationally. Ukropina also made each of his 67 extra point attempts, the most for Stanford in a season.

• Punter Alex Robinson's 42.42 average was the eight-best single-season clip by a Cardinal.

• In 2014, Alamar helped the Cardinal lead the nation in punt return average -- Ty Montgomery averaged 19.8 yards per return and had two touchdowns, and freshman Christian McCaffrey averaged 17.1 yards per return.

• Under Alamar's watch, fifth-year senior Jordan Williamson set a Stanford record with 77 consecutive extra points made and also passed John Hopkins for the most field goals made in a Stanford career with 63.

• In 2013, Montgomery and the kickoff return unit ranked second nationally in return average at 27.4 yards/return. Montgomery also returned two kickoffs for touchdowns, going 99 yards on the opening kickoff against Washington and a school-record 100 yards at Utah while the kickoff coverage unit was equally as good, allowing just 18.1 yards/return to rank 10th nationally.

• Alamar was named Phil Steele's Special Teams Coach of the Year following the 2013 season.

• Alamar steered Stanford's 2013 special teams to a trio of top 40 NCAA rankings, including net punting (33rd - 38.49 yards/punt), punt returns (21st - 11.96 yards/return) and kickoff returns (39th - 23.09).

• Stanford also led the Pac-12 and ranked 10th nationally in kickoff coverage, allowing just 18.2 yards/return during the 2013 season.

• Alamar's specialists Daniel Zychlinski and Williamson posted banner years in 2012 with Zychlinski ranking among the nation's best punters at 43.12 yards/punt, while Williamson delivered a series of clutch field goals at No. 1 Oregon, against UCLA in the Pac-12 Championship Game and against Wisconsin in the Rose Bowl Game.

• While at Fresno State, Alamar worked closely with punt returner Devon Wylie, who earned 2011 All-America honors from Yahoo! Sports (third team), Phil Steele (fourth team) and Sports Illustrated (honorable mention).

• Fresno State sophomore Isaiah Burse set NCAA FBS single-season records for most kickoff returns (75), most returns/game (5.8), kickoff return yardage (1,606) and most yards returned/game (123.5) in 2011.

• Hails from Thousand Oaks, California.

Duane Akina

Defensive Backs

- Third season at Stanford
- 37th season overall
- Washington '79

• A 36-year coaching veteran, joined the Stanford football coaching staff as defensive backs coach in the spring of 2014.

• Anchored by All-Pac-12 second team defensive back Ronnie Harris, Akina's secondary in 2015 included a pair of starting safeties in Kodi Whitfield and Dallas Lloyd, who each transitioned from the offensive side of the ball.

• The Cardinal posted the league's fifth-best passing efficiency defense (123.96) and third-best total defense (368.3). Stanford's secondary allowed only 6.76 yards/pass attempt while picking off eight balls.

• The Cardinal tied for fifth in the Pac-12 in pass breakups (51).

• In Akina's first season coaching the secondary in 2014, Stanford finished second nationally in scoring defense and eighth in passing defense.

• The Cardinal did not allow a passing touchdown in five games, one passing score in four games and two passing touchdowns in the remaining four games, for an average of under one per game.

• Stanford forced the same number of interceptions as passing touchdowns allowed (12).

• Strong safety Jordan Richards, a first team All-Pac-12 selection, led the Cardinal with three interceptions and three forced fumbles, was awarded the 2014 National Football Foundation's Scholar-Athlete Award, and finished his career with nine interceptions.

• Came to Stanford from Texas, where he spent 13 seasons on the defensive side of the ball for the Longhorns while developing an impressive number of NFL defensive backs.

• Akina has coached three Thorpe Award winners, six Thorpe finalists and 33 defensive backs who have played in the NFL -- including six Pro Bowlers and eight Super Bowl participants.

• Akina's secondary helped Texas rank among the nation's top 10 in pass defense six times and featured consecutive Thorpe Award winners in Michael Huff (2005) and Aaron Ross (2006) to go along with two finalists in Earl Thomas (2009) and Quentin Jammer (2001) and 14 first team All-Big 12 picks.

• Held titles of assistant head coach and co-defensive coordinator during his stay in Austin.

• Prior to his time at Texas, Akina spent 14 years at Arizona (1987-2000), where he started as the defensive backs coach and was later named the Wildcats' associate head coach before spending four years as the offensive coordinator, after which he resumed defensive coordinator duties shortly before his departure.

• Helped guide Arizona's famed "Desert Swarm" defense, one of the nation's most aggressive and productive groups.

• Coached 1990 Jim Thorpe Award winner Darryll Lewis and finalist Chris McAlister. Lewis went on to a 10-year NFL career and was a Pro Bowler for the San Diego Chargers and McAlister earned a spot in the 2004 Pro Bowl and was a member of the 2000 Super Bowl Champion Baltimore Ravens. Mentored Green Bay Packer and Pro Bowl selection Chuck Cecil.

• Spent five years at Hawaii (1981-85) following a graduate assistant role at his alma mater, Washington (1979-80).

• One season at the professional level came in 1986 when he served as the defensive backs coach for Calgary in the Canadian Football League.

• Hails from Honolulu, Hawaii.

• Wife, Donna, and five children -- Kainoa, Keoni, Dionicia, Alli and Kamalii.



Peter Hansen

Inside Linebackers

- Third season at Stanford
- Sixth season overall
- Arizona '01

- Rejoined Stanford as inside linebackers coach in the spring of 2014.
- Helped the Cardinal rank among the Pac-12's best defensive units in 2015: second in third-down conversion percentage (.363), third in total defense (368.3), third in first-down defense (267), third in scoring defense (22.6) and fourth in rushing defense (139.9).
- Tutored All-American inside linebacker Blake Martinez, the Cardinal's leading tackler for two straight seasons and fourth-round draft choice of the Green Bay Packers.
- Martinez led the Pac-12 with 141 tackles (75 solo) -- ranking seventh nationally -- and averaged a conference-best 10.1 per contest. In 14 games, he collected 10 or more tackles nine times.
- Under Hansen's watch in 2014, the Cardinal defense ranked second nationally in scoring defense and third in total defense.
- The linebackers played a strong role in all facets on defense; four linebackers finished among the top-six Cardinal tacklers, and the unit combined for 26 of Stanford's 46 sacks.
- In 2014, Hansen coached fifth-year senior A.J. Tarpley, who ranked second on the team with 84 tackles, Blake Martinez, who led the Cardinal with 102 tackles and three interceptions, both of whom were awarded All-Pac-12 honors.
- Spent the 2009 and 2010 seasons at Stanford as a defensive assistant, working closely with current San Francisco 49ers defensive coordinator Vic Fangio in film breakdown, scouting reports and practice preparation.
- Served as a strength and conditioning intern for the Cardinal in 2008.
- Hansen went to the 49ers in 2011 and worked as a defensive assistant for three years, during which the team posted a 36-11-1 regular season record and advanced to three straight NFC championship games and one Super Bowl.
- In 2011 Hansen worked with inside linebackers Patrick Willis and Navarro Bowman before moving to outside linebackers in 2012, where he worked with Ahmad Brooks, Parys Harrelson, Corey Lemonier, Aldon Smith and Dan Skuta.
- Prior to his first stop at Stanford, Hansen was an assistant coach at Palo Alto High School (Calif.) for four seasons (2004-07), working primarily with the Vikings' tight ends and defensive ends.
- Two-sport athlete at Arizona, playing both football and basketball.
- On the gridiron, he blocked seven field goals and point after attempts during his career and earned second team All-Pac-10 Conference honors as a special teams performer in 2000.
- Member of the Wildcats basketball team during the 1999-2000 and 2001-02 seasons.
- Hansen graduated from Arizona in 2001 with a degree in economics before playing the 2001-02 basketball season.
- Played professional football for Cannes Iron Mask in Cannes, France, in 2003, and basketball for Club Falcon in Copenhagen, Denmark, during the 2003-04 season.
- A Palo Alto native, Hansen attended Palo Alto High School where he played for his father, Earl, the school's long-time head football coach.
- Hails from Palo Alto, California.

Tavita Pritchard

Kevin M. Hogan Quarterbacks Coach • Wide Receivers

- Seventh season at Stanford
- Seventh season overall
- Stanford '09

- Former Stanford quarterback Tavita Pritchard is in his seventh season on the Cardinal coaching staff and third as quarterbacks and wide receivers coach.
- In 2013, his first season as an assistant coach, Pritchard worked with the Cardinal running backs after serving as a defensive assistant for two years and a volunteer assistant in 2010.
- Named the Kevin M. Hogan Quarterbacks Coach prior to 2016 season.
- Instructed Hogan, a fifth-round draft pick of the Kansas City Chiefs, during his monumental final season in a Cardinal uniform. Hogan led the Cardinal to the 2015 Pac-12 title and a Rose Bowl crown to cap a season in which he threw 27 touchdowns to eight interceptions and completed 67.8 percent of his throws.
- Hogan appeared in more than 50 contests and posted a school-best 36-10 record as a starter. He ranked first in career total offense (10,634), second in completion percentage (.659) and passing efficiency (154.6), and third in passing yards (9,385) and passing touchdowns (75). His 171.0 passing efficiency clip in 2015 was the best single-season mark ever by a Cardinal signal caller.
- Hogan set school records for career rushing yards (1,249) and touchdowns (15) by a quarterback.
- In Pritchard's first season coaching the quarterbacks and wide receivers in 2014, Stanford averaged 229.8 yards/game through the air while Kevin Hogan increased his completion percentage from 61.0 to 65.9 percent and reduced his interception total from 10 to eight, even though he threw almost 60 more passes in 2014 than 2013.
- In 2013, Pritchard nurtured Tyler Gaffney, a Doak Walker Award semifinalist that season, to second team All-Pac-12 honors. Gaffney rushed for 1,709 yards, 21 touchdowns, and was named the Pac-12 Championship Game MVP after rushing for 133 yards and three touchdowns in a 38-20 win over Arizona State before being selected in the sixth round of the NFL draft by the Carolina Panthers.
- With Pritchard as a defensive assistant in 2011 and 2012, the Cardinal finished with consecutive top-15 national standings in defensive efficiency.
- In 2012, Stanford's defense broke the school's single-season sacks record (57) and led the Pac-12 in scoring defense (17.21), total defense (336.21), rushing defense (97.0), sacks (4.07) and tackles for loss (9.00).
- Capped off by a Pac-12 title game victory and Rose Bowl crown, the 2012 Cardinal ranked first nationally in sacks, second in tackles for loss, fifth in rushing defense and 11th in scoring defense.
- Four-year letterwinner for the Cardinal from 2006-09, appeared in 31 career games and made 20 starts, throwing for 2,865 yards and 15 touchdowns.
- Made his first career start against USC on Oct. 6, 2007, engineering an epic 24-23 upset of the second-ranked Trojans at the Los Angeles Coliseum highlighted by a 10-yard game-winning touchdown pass to Mark Bradford on fourth down with 0:49 left in the game to secure his place in Stanford football lore.
- Started all 12 games as a junior in 2008 and threw for 1,633 yards and 10 touchdowns, helping Stanford to a 5-7 record before relinquishing his starting duties to Andrew Luck in 2009.
- Earned a communication degree from Stanford, graduating in 2009.
- Hails from Tacoma, Washington.
- Wife, Caroline '10, '14.



Diron Reynolds

Defensive Line

- First season at Stanford
- 17th season overall
- Wake Forest '94

- First joined the Stanford coaching staff in 2014 as a defensive assistant, and rejoined the Cardinal as defensive line coach prior to the 2016 season.
- Succeeded Randy Hart, and served as a defensive assistant while working with Hart during the 2014 season, when the Cardinal ranked third nationally in total defense and tied for fifth among FBS squads by registering 46.0 sacks.
- Pedigree includes more than a decade of coaching in the NFL ranks with Indianapolis, Miami and Minnesota.
- Defensive line coach at Oklahoma in 2015, helping lead the Sooners to a Big 12 Title, College Football Playoff berth and an 11-2 record.

- Joined the Stanford program in 2014 as the Cardinal's running backs coach.
- The 2015 FootballScoop.com Running Backs Coach of the Year was instrumental in the breakout season of AP Player of the Year and Heisman Trophy finalist Christian McCaffrey. McCaffrey set the school record for single-game rushing yards (243) against UCLA and became the first Cardinal to eclipse the 2,000-yard rushing mark in a season (2,019). He was second among all FBS backs in rushing yards.
- McCaffrey had 11 100-yard rushing outputs and a school-record nine-straight such performances. He combined with quarterback Kevin Hogan to comprise the program's best-ever rushing tandem (2,355). McCaffrey's 144.2 rushing yards/game ranked third nationally.
- Remound Wright notched 13 rushing scores during his fifth-year senior campaign, seventh-most in school history. Wright finished his career with 26 rushing touchdowns, good for sixth-best by a Cardinal back.
- Stanford's rushing offense averaged 223.7 yards/game, 19th-best nationally and second among Pac-12 programs.
- In 2014, Stanford averaged 158.8 yards/game on the ground, rushed for at least 100 yards in 11 of 13 games, and finished with at least 200 yards on the ground in each of its last three games -- all Cardinal victories.
- Wright led Stanford with 601 rushing yards and 11 touchdowns, running for nine scores in the final three games of the season, which included a Big Game record-tying four-touchdown performance against Cal.
- Taylor came to Stanford from the Carolina Panthers, where he spent the 2013 season as assistant wide receivers coach, working directly with Ricky Proehl.
- Prior to his time at Carolina, Taylor spent three seasons with the New York Jets from 2010-12, serving as a coaching intern in 2010, offensive quality control coach in 2011 and assistant tight ends/quality control coach in 2012.
- During Taylor's time with the Jets' tight ends, Jeff Cumberland (29) and Dustin Keller (28) ranked second and third on the team, respectively, in receptions.
- Before his stint in the NFL, Taylor coached the wide receivers at Appalachian State in 2009 where, under his tutelage, the Mountaineers set school records with 284 receptions and 3,621 receiving yards.
- The Mountaineers finished 11-3 in 2009, and won the Southern Conference title, advancing to the Football Championship Subdivision semifinals.
- Began coaching career as a graduate assistant for Nick Saban at Alabama from 2007-08.
- A walk-on at Alabama before earning a scholarship, played in 38 consecutive games at wide receiver from 1999-2003 for the Crimson Tide and, as a senior, served as special teams captain.
- Played professionally for the Colorado Crush and Columbus Destroyers of the Arena Football League, and af2's Green Bay Blizzard and Louisville Fire from 2004-06.
- Graduated from Alabama in 2003 with a degree in management.
- Father, James, also attended Alabama and was a member of the school's 1973 national championship team as a running back under legendary head coach Paul "Bear" Bryant.

- Fourth season as a full-time member of the coaching staff in 2016.
- Stanford's tight ends amassed 49 receptions for 625 yards and nine touchdowns in 2015, as the group was led by Austin Hooper, an All-America performer and third-round draft pick of the Atlanta Falcons.
- Tight ends accounted for 55 receptions for 763 yards and five touchdowns in 2014, and helped pave the way for the Cardinal rushing game, which averaged 158.8 yards/game and broke 200 yards in each of the last three games on the season.
