HUSKERS SALUTE SERVICE, COLLECT TOYS WEDNESDAY

- Nebraska continues its four-game home stand by battling Southern University on Wednesday night at Pinnacle Bank Arena.
- Tip-off between the Huskers (4-0) and the defending Southwestern Athletic Conference champion Jaguars (2-2) is set for 7 p.m., with tickets on sale now through the Nebraska Athletic Ticket Office at Huskers.com.
- Wednesday night's game includes a Veterans Day/Military Salute with two complimentary tickets for all Veterans and Active Military through print-at-home or mobile PDF delivery. The U.S. Marines will also be collecting for their Toys 4 Tots drive, beginning when the gates open 90 minutes prior to tip-off, and concluding at the start of the game. Marines will collect new, unwrapped toys or cash donations inside each main entrance at Pinnacle Bank Arena.
- Live radio coverage (beginning at 6:45 p.m.) can be heard in Lincoln on B107.3 FM and in Omaha on ESPN 590 AM. Stations across the state will also carry the broadcast on the Learfield-IMG College Husker Sports Network. Free live audio can be found at Huskers.com and the Huskers App.
- A live video stream will be provided by BTN+ as part of Nebraska's BTN Student U telecasts.
- Nebraska is coming off a 63-49 win over SIUE in Lincoln on Sunday. Senior wing Nicea Eliely notched her second straight double-double with 13 points and 10 rebounds to go along with game highs of four steals and two blocks. Eliely is averaging 9.8 points and 7.8 rebounds.
- Leigha Brown recorded double-figure points for the fourth straight game with 12 points against the Cougars. The 6-1 sophomore from Auburn, Ind., is averaging a team-best 15.5 points while adding 4.3 rebounds and 2.0 assists. She is the only Husker to score in double digits in all four games.
- Ashtyn Veerbeek continued her strong play as a starter with 10 points and six boards in the win over SIUE. The 6-2 sophomore is averaging 10.5 points and 5.8 rebounds per game.
- Sophomore guard Sam Haiby ranks second among the Huskers with 13.0 points per game, including a career-high 28 in a win at Missouri (Nov. 10).
- Senior guard Hannah Whitish needs just two points to become the 33rd Husker to score 1,000 points in a career. Whitish had eight points and a career-high nine rebounds to go along with five assists in Sunday's win over SIUE. Whitish is just 22 assists away from becoming the eighth Husker in history to dish out 400 assists.

HUSKER NUGGETS

• Nebraska will try to open the season 5-0 for the first time under Coach Amy Williams in her fourth season at Nebraska. The last Husker team to open 5-0 was the 2014-15 Nebraska team that advanced to the NCAA Tournament after opening the year 7-0.

• Through four games, Nebraska is allowing an average of 58.8 points per game while holding opponents to 31.7 percent shooting from the field and 21.5 percent success from three-point range.

• Last season, Nebraska allowed an average of 70.1 points per game, while opponents shot 41.1 percent from the field and 33.4 percent from long range.

• Nebraska has held three opponents to 55 points or less in four games this season. Last year, NU held only two foes (Radford-39, Kansas-52) to 55 or less.

• Nebraska's bench has outscored the opposing bench in all four games this season. The Huskers have outscored the opponent bench in 32 of the last 34 games.

• The Husker bench has outscored the opponent bench by double digits 23 times in the last 34 games, including a 30-1 edge in a loss to 2019 NCAA Elite Eight qualifier Iowa (Feb. 25, 2019).

• Overall, Nebraska's bench outscored opposition benches 950-492 (31.7-16.4 ppg) for a plus-15.3 margin in 2018-19.

• Nebraska's bench scored 40 or more points seven times last season, including a season-high 45 in a loss at Arkansas.

• Nebraska has hit 10 or more threes 15 times in the last three seasons (including 2019-20, 66 games). Through the first 20 seasons of the three-point shot in women's basketball (1988-2007), Nebraska hit 10 threes in a game only six times (311 games).

SCOUTING THE SOUTHERN JAGUARS

• Southern University comes to Lincoln with a 2-2 record after a narrow 69-63 loss at Wichita State on Sunday afternoon. The Jaguars own wins over Wiley and Tougaloo, and a loss at Iowa State to open the season at Hilton Coliseum in Ames on Nov. 7.

• The defending Southwestern Athletic Conference champions, Southern went 20-13 overall and 14-4 in the SWAC last season to advance to the first round of the NCAA Tournament to play Mississippi State. Southern's losses last year included road games at Baylor, Kentucky, Arizona State, Texas Tech, TCU and Michigan.

• Southern, which is the preseason pick to win the SWAC, returns three starters and seven letterwinners from last year's squad.

• Carlos Funchess is in his second season as the head coach of the Jaguars. A long-time assistant under Sandy Pugh at Southern U before taking the top job at the Baton Rouge, La., school, Funchess was not only the 2019 SWAC Coach of the Year, he also claimed the 2019 Spalding Maggie Dixon Rookie Coach-of-the-Year award from the WBCA.

• An outstanding college player, Funchess was the winner of the ESPN College Slam Dunk Contest in 1991 following his career at Northeast Louisiana (now University of Louisiana Monroe). He was the Southland Conference Co-Player of the Year in 1991.

• Brittany Rose has been a starter for the Jaguars early this season. The 5-9 senior guard from Jackson, Miss., is averaging 14.5 points, 3.0 assists and 2.3 steals per game. She has scored in double figures in all four games, including a season-high 21 points on 8-of-10 shooting in just 16 minutes in the win over Tougaloo (Nov. 14). In her first season at Southern, Rose averaged 7.4 points while primarily coming off the bench. She ranked second among the Jags a year ago with 38 threes. The transfer played at the same junior college (Copiah-Lincoln CC) as Southern Head Coach Carlos Funchess.

• Alyric Scott, a 5-10 junior guard, returns to the Southern starting five after averaging 9.0 points and a team-best 6.0 rebounds a year ago. She also ranked fourth among the Jags with 21 made three-pointers. Scott, who was a preseason first-team All-SWAC selection, is averaging 9.3 points and 3.3 rebounds through four games this season. As a high school player in Richton, Miss., Scott scored 3,000 career points.

• Another returning starter in the backcourt, Jaden Towner is averaging 4.5 points and 3.8 rebounds through four games this season. The 5-10 Towner started 19 games last season and averaged 6.2 points and 2.7 boards per contest while ranking third on the team with 22 three-pointers made.

• Caitlin Davis, a 5-6 junior guard has stepped into the lineup in place of graduated senior star Skylar O'Bear (9.2 ppg, 2.9 rpg). Davis, who spent her first two seasons as a starting guard at McNeese State before sitting out as a transfer last season at Southern, is averaging 4.3 points and 1.3 rebounds through four games. As a sophomore at McNeese State in 2017-18, Davis was the team MVP, averaging 12.2 points and 5.8 assists. She averaged 8.9 points and 3.3 assists as a true freshman for the Cowgirls.

• Raven White (6.0 ppg, 4.3 rpg), a 6-1 freshman forward from Fort Lauderdale, Fla., gives the Jaguars talent and size inside as a starter. She was a member of the South Florida Sun's Fab Five at Dillard High School the last two years, averaging a double-double both seasons. She is the daughter of former Michigan State and eight-year NFL running back Lorenzo White (Houston Oilers, 7 seasons, Cleveland Browns, 1). Lorenzo White, who was also a graduate of Dillard High School, spent two seasons in the backfield with former Nebraska Heisman Trophy winner Mike Rozier with the Oilers (1988, 1989).

• Raven White's high school teammate Genovea Johnson is Southern's second-leading scorer (9.8 ppg) through four games while coming off the bench. The 5-8 Johnson and White led Dillard High School to a Florida Class 7A state championship together in 2019. Johnson also averaged a double-double (10.9 ppg, 11.2 rpg) last season while adding 4.8 assists per contest.

• Sophomore Amani McWain (6.5 ppg, 2.8 rpg) and junior Nakia Kinsey (5.3 ppg, 1.8 rpg, 3.0 apg) have also been reliable contributors off the bench this season, along with sophomore Taneara Moore. A 6-0 forward, Moore started 12 games and averaged 6.2 points and 5.7 rebounds last season.

• Nebraska is 2-0 all-time against Southern, including an 89-38 win at Pinnacle Bank Arena on Nov. 23, 2015. The Jaguars were the fourth opposing women's basketball team in history to face the Huskers at Pinnacle Bank Arena, as Nebraska notched an 87-64 win over the Jags on Nov. 24, 2013. Southern star Kendra Coleman scored 30 points in that game, while Nebraska All-American Jordan Hooper had 23 points and Emily Cady contributed 18 points and 14 rebounds.

NEBRASKA STREAKS

• Kate Cain owns Nebraska's longest streak of consecutive starts (65).

• Nicea Eliely owns Nebraska's second-longest streak of starts (60).

• Eliely was the only Husker to score in all 30 games last season, and the only Husker to score in all of Nebraska's games against Big Ten Conference foes. She has scored in 38 consecutive games overall. She did not score in a win over Penn State on Feb. 22, 2018, the only time in the past three seasons (including 2019-20, 60 games) that Eliely was shut out.

• Leigha Brown has scored in double figures in all four games to open the season. She has scored in double figures in five consecutive games overall - the longest active streak by a Husker.

• Nebraska's current four-game winning streak is its longest since a pair of five-game winning streaks in 2017-18. The Huskers have not had a six-game winning streak since 2015-16 (Jan. 10-27).

• Nebraska will be shooting to open the season with five straight wins for the first time since 2014-15, when the Huskers opened the season 7-0.

• The Huskers have knocked down at least one three in 346 straight games dating back to a loss at UTEP on Dec. 20, 2008. Nebraska has hit at least two three-pointers in 225 consecutive games.

NEBRASKA'S 2018-19 SEASON AT A GLANCE

- Nebraska finished with a 14-16 overall record and a 9-9 Big Ten mark in Coach Amy Williams' third season with the Huskers in 2018-19.
- Hannah Whitish earned honorable-mention All-Big Ten honors as a junior in 2018-19.
- Whitish was Nebraska's Offensive MVP for the second straight season, while fellow junior Nicea Eliely was Nebraska's Defensive MVP for the the second time in three seasons (2017, 2019).
- Ashtyn Veerbeek earned Nebraska's Lifter-of-the-Year Award.
- The .500 league finish by the Huskers marked the seventh time in eight Big Ten seasons since joining the conference in 2011-12 that Nebraska has finished .500 or better in the final standings.
- Although Nebraska finished below .500 on the season, the Huskers fought hard down to the wire, with a school-record 14 games decided by two possessions or less. Unfortunately, the Huskers were just 4-10 in games decided by six or fewer points, including 3-7 against Big Ten foes. No other Husker team has ever played more than 11 games decided by six points or less in a season.
- Nebraska only had five double-digit losses last season (Louisville, Maryland-2, Iowa, Miami) and all five were to teams that were ranked in the top 15 in the AP rankings at some point in the year.
- Nebraska's 2018-19 freshmen combined for 865 points in 29 regular-season games, which ranked second nationally among all freshmen in NCAA Division I basketball, trailing only Alabama State.

WHITISH SHOOTS FOR ANOTHER ALL-BIG TEN HONOR

- All-Big Ten guard Hannah Whitish closed 2018-19 by earning honorable-mention All-Big Ten recognition as a junior. She was a second-team All-Big Ten choice as a sophomore in 2017-18.
- Whitish is on track to become the first Husker in history to hit the combined career milestones of 1,000 points, 400 assists and 200 three-pointers.
- She opened her senior season with a team-high 12 points on 4-of-6 three-point shooting to lead Nebraska to a win over Alabama A&M (Nov. 6).
- Whitish added 12 points on team highs of seven rebounds, five assists and a career-high-tying four steals in an overtime win at Missouri (Nov. 10)
- She heads into the Southern game needing two points to become the 33rd Husker in history to reach 1,000 career points.
- Whitish has climbed to No. 9 on the Nebraska career assist list with 378, and she is 22 away from becoming just the eighth Husker in history with 400 assists.

- She has ascended to No. 3 on the Nebraska career three-point list with 203, moving ahead of current WNBA guard Yvonne Turner (183, 2007-10).

- Whitish led the Huskers with 65 three-pointers in 2018-19, which was the third-best total by a junior in school history.
- Whitish led the Huskers with 10.1 points and 4.3 assists per game last season.

- She erupted for a season-high 28 points at Purdue (Jan. 31). Whitish added a career-high 12 assists to notch her first career double-double. She also tied a career high with six threes.

- Whitish's 12 assists tied for the ninth-best total by a Husker in school history. Only three players in Nebraska history [Rachel Theriot (4), Kathy Hawkins (3), Stacy Imming (1)] have had more than 12 assists in a game.

- Whitish's career high of 29 points came as a sophomore in 2017-18 in back-to-back non-conference wins at Kansas and Drake.

- She owns a team-best 50 career double-figure scoring efforts (2, 2019-20; 17, 2018-19; 18, 2017-18; 13, 2016-17). She has five career 20-point games (1, 2016-17; 3, 2017-18; 2, 2018-19).

CAIN NAMED TO LISA LESLIE AWARD WATCH LIST

- Kate Cain is among the 20 initial candidates for the 2020 Lisa Leslie Award presented by the Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame and the Women's Basketball Coaches Association (WBCA), which announced the award watch list on Oct. 25. Cain earned her first spot on the Lisa Leslie Award watch list in 2018-19.

- On track to become the greatest shot-blocker in Husker history, Cain heads into the Southern game with 194 career blocks, 45 shy of taking over Nebraska's career record of 238 (Janet Smith, 1979-82).

- She opened the 2019-20 season by recording eight blocks - the third-best total in school history - in a win over Alabama A&M (Nov. 6). Cain contributed 10 points and seven rebounds in the win over the Bulldogs.

- Cain added two blocks while affecting many other shots both inside and on the perimeter in an overtime win at Missouri (Nov. 10).

- She added four blocks to go along with 13 points, five rebounds and three assists in the win over Morgan State (Nov. 14). She ranks among national leaders with 3.8 blocks per game and 15 total blocks on the young season.

- Cain set the Nebraska season block record with 100 as a freshman. She finished No. 8 nationally in total blocks, and No. 7 in NCAA D-I and No. 1 in the Big Ten with 3.1 blocks per game in 2017-18.

- She set the Nebraska sophomore block record with 79 in 2018-19. She played 144 fewer minutes as a sophomore than she did as a freshman, primarily because of NU's deeper bench.

- Cain set the Husker single-game block record while also recording the first points (22), rebounds (14) and blocked shots (11) triple-double in school history in a win over Florida Atlantic (Dec. 19, 2017).

- She became just the sixth player in Big Ten Conference history to record 11 or more blocks and just the 10th Big Ten player to notch double-digit blocks in a single game.

- Cain's 22 points against Florida Atlantic were also a career high, and her three assists against the Owls also tied a career best.

- She owns 26 double-figure scoring efforts, 10 double-figure rebounding games and one double-digit block game in the first 66 games of her career. She has made 65 straight starts.

- Cain owns seven career double-doubles with the most recent one coming with 14 points and a career-high 20 rebounds in a win at Penn State (Feb. 22, 2019). Her 20 rebounds tied for the sixth-best total in school history.

- Cain owns 34 games (2, 2019-20; 17, 2018-19; 15, 2017-18) with three or more blocks in her career. She has recorded five or more blocks eight times - Clemson (6, Nov. 30, 2017), Kansas (5, Dec. 6, 2017), FAU (11, Dec. 19, 2017), Northwestern (5, Jan. 7, 2018), Iowa (5, Jan. 16, 2018), Maryland (Jan. 8, 2019), Michigan State (7, Feb. 17, 2019), and most recently Alabama A&M (8, Nov. 6, 2019).

- She has climbed to No. 4 on the Nebraska career blocks list with 194 and needs six more to become the fourth player in Husker history with 200 career blocks.

- Cain was the only player to capture spots on both the Big Ten All-Freshman Team and Big Ten All-Defensive Team in 2017-18. Both five-player teams were chosen by the league coaches.

- She captured four Big Ten Freshman-of-the-Week awards (Nov. 13, Dec. 4, Dec. 11, Dec. 26) during the 2017-18 non-conference.



(#31) Kate Cain, 6-5, Jr., Center

- Cain's 56.6 field goal percentage ranked as the second-best mark by a Nebraska freshman in school history.
- Her 223 total rebounds ranked fourth among freshmen in Husker history, and she was just the sixth Husker freshman ever to grab 200 rebounds.
- She is the only Husker freshman ever to record 300 points, 200 rebounds and 100 blocks.

ELIELY PREPARED FOR BIG SENIOR SEASON

• One of the top overall defenders in the Big Ten Conference, Nicea Eliely is ready to show her all-around game at a higher level in 2019-20.

• Nebraska's defensive MVP in both 2017 and 2019, Eliely led the Huskers with a career-high 54 steals in her third year as a starter in 2018-19. She ranked among the top five players in the Big Ten with 1.8 steals per game last season.

• She needs 49 steals to join the top 10 in Husker history in that category.

• Eliely also has a chance to become the fifth Husker to reach career milestones of 1,000 points, 500 rebounds and 200 steals. Eliely will need a big year to reach those plateaus. She owns 738 points (-262), 368 rebounds (-132) and 142 steals (-58).

• Eliely's 89 career starts at Nebraska are the most by any current Husker. She has started 60 consecutive games, which trails only Kate Cain's 65 straight starts among the Huskers.

• Through four games, Eliely is averaging 9.8 points and a team-best 7.8 rebounds. She has added 1.8 assists, 1.5 blocks and 1.5 steals.

• Eliely is seeking her first career 20-point game in 2019-20. She set her career high with 19 points as a freshman against Cal (Dec. 4, 2016). She scored a season-high 18 points as a junior against No. 7 Maryland (Feb. 14, 2019).

• She owns 32 career double-figure scoring efforts, including a season-high 13 points in a win over SIUE (Nov. 17), 12 points in a win over Morgan State (Nov. 14) and 10 points in a 90-85 overtime win at Missouri (Nov. 10).

• Eliely produced her first career double-double with 12 points and a career-high 15 rebounds in the win over Morgan State (Nov. 14). She added three blocks against the Bears. She added a second straight double-double with game highs of 13 points, 10 rebounds, four steals and two blocks to go along with three assists in a win over SIUE (Nov. 17).

• She had a career-high six steals in a win over No. 23 Minnesota (Jan. 20, 2019), when she had five in the fourth quarter to help the Huskers hold the Gophers without a field goal for the game's final six minutes. She added five steals at Wisconsin (Jan. 27, 2019).



(#5) Nicea Eliely, 6-1, Sr., Guard/Forward

KISSINGER SETTING SHOOTING STANDARD

• Taylor Kissinger led the Big Ten in three-point field goal percentage (.456, 62-136) as a sophomore in 2018-19. Her school-record-tying percentage ranked fourth in NCAA Division I last season.

• Kissinger showed a more complete game in her second season at Nebraska, averaging 8.9 points, 3.2 rebounds and 1.2 assists, while doubling the number of steals (22-11) from her freshman season.

• The only Nebraska native on the Husker roster, Kissinger scored four points and grabbed eight rebounds to open the 2019-20 season in a win over Alabama A&M (Nov. 6).

• She did not play in Nebraska's wins over Missouri (Nov. 10), Morgan State (Nov. 14) or SIUE (Nov. 17) after entering the concussion protocol following a collision in practice on Nov. 8.

• Kissinger set a Nebraska basketball record by going 6-for-6 from three-point range in the win over USC Upstate (Nov. 11, 2018). She led Nebraska with 22 points - the second 20-point performance of her career.

• Kissinger's 62 three-pointers in 2018-19 ranked as the fifth-best total by a sophomore in Nebraska history.

• She notched the 24th double-digit scoring game of her career with a team-high 15 points on 5-of-10 three-point shooting against Purdue in the 2019 Big Ten Tournament.

• Kissinger recorded her second career double-double in a win over Kansas (Dec. 5, 2018), registering 11 points and a career-high 11 rebounds while going 3-for-4 from three-point range against the Jayhawks. Her first double-double came with 10 points and 10 rebounds at Indiana (Feb. 17, 2018).

• The 6-1 guard/forward from Minden, Neb., finished third on the 2017-18 team in scoring with 10.0 points per game, while adding 4.1 rebounds per contest as a freshman. She also ranked second on the team with 50 threes, which was the fourth-highest total by a freshman in Nebraska history.

- In the 2018 NCAA Tournament, Kissinger scored 15 points in 21 minutes off the bench, after missing all but six minutes over the three previous games with a sprained SC joint suffered in the first quarter of a loss in the regular-season finale at No. 13 Maryland (Feb. 25).

- Kissinger scored a career-high 25 points in a win over Arkansas (Nov. 16, 2017). Kissinger hit 9-of-15 shots from the floor, including 4-of-7 threes. She added eight rebounds and four assists.

- Kissinger's older twin sisters were both Division I guards, with Brooke completing her career at Creighton in 2018-19 after spending her first two seasons at Illinois. Jamie completed her eligibility at San Diego in 2017-18.

HAIBY EARNS BIG TEN HONOR IN OPENING WEEK

- Sam Haiby helped the Huskers go 2-0 in her first week as a starter by leading Nebraska with 18.0 points per game to earn a spot on the Big Ten Weekly Honor Roll (Nov. 11).

- Haiby erupted for a career-high 28 points on 11-of-19 shooting to power Nebraska to a 90-85 OT win at Missouri (Nov. 10). She tied a career high with three threes against the Tigers, including the game-tying triple with three seconds left to send the game to overtime tied at 76. She scored NU's first eight points in the game and added 18 points after halftime, including two free throws with 13.3 seconds left to seal the win.

- The 5-9 guard from Moorhead, Minn., ranks second on the team in scoring (13.0 ppg) through four games in 2019-20. She opened her second season by making her first career start in a win over Alabama A&M (Nov. 6). Haiby scored eight points and dished out three assists against the Bulldogs.

- She added eight points, three rebounds, two assists and a steal in a win over Morgan State (Nov. 14).

- Haiby added eight points, two rebounds, two assists and her second block of the season in a win over SIUE (Nov. 17).

- Haiby gives the Huskers an athletic, explosive guard who can attack the basket off the dribble, create opportunities for her teammates and knock down the three-point shot.

- She finished her freshman season as Nebraska's second-leading scorer with 10.0 points per game while coming off the bench in all 30 contests in 2018-19.

- Haiby scored a season-high 20 points early in her freshman season at Washington State. All 20 came after halftime for the Huskers.

- She was named the Big Ten Freshman of the Week (Feb. 4, 2019) after scoring her personal Big Ten-best with 17 points against Indiana (Feb. 3, 2019) after helping the Huskers to a road win at Purdue (Jan. 31, 2019) with 13 points.

- Haiby produced double figures in each of Nebraska's final four games of 2018-19. For the season, she finished in double figures 15 times.

- She ranked second among the Huskers with 78 assists (2.6 apg) as a freshman.

- Haiby led the Huskers in free throws made (76) and attempted (106) in 2018-19.

BROWN READY FOR NEXT STEP AS SOPHOMORE

- Leigha Brown is hoping to help the Huskers climb the Big Ten ladder in her second season at Nebraska.

- The 6-1 guard/forward from Auburn, Ind., leads the Huskers in scoring with 15.5 points per game, while adding 4.3 rebounds and 2.0 assists off the bench for the Big Red through four games in 2019-20.

- The only Husker to produce double figures in all four games this season, Brown went off for 24 points while grabbing five rebounds to play a major role in Nebraska's 90-85 OT win at Missouri (Nov. 10). She scored 18 points after halftime to help the Huskers, and she added a huge assist on Sam Haiby's game-tying three-pointer to send the contest to overtime.

- Brown added a game-high 16 points while tying her career high with five assists in a win over Morgan State (Nov. 14).

- She scored 12 points including a pair of threes in a win over SIUE (Nov. 17).

- Brown opened her sophomore season with 10 points and a career-high seven rebounds off the bench in Nebraska's win over Alabama A&M (Nov. 6).

- Brown ranked second among the Huskers in scoring during Big Ten play last season with 10.2 points per game to finish the year with averages of 9.6 points, 2.6 rebounds and 1.5 assists.

- She showed her explosiveness several times as a freshman, including a career-high 30-point outburst in a win over Purdue at Pinnacle Bank Arena (Feb. 10, 2019). She scored 22 in the second half against the Boilermakers to earn a spot on the Big Ten Weekly Honor Roll (Feb. 11, 2019).
- Brown had 20 points at NCAA Elite Eight qualifier Iowa (Jan. 3, 2019), which followed a 19-point effort in a win at Ohio State (Dec. 31, 2018). Those two performances earned Brown Big Ten Freshman-of-the-Week honors (Jan. 7, 2019).
- Brown started Nebraska's final six games of 2018-19 after coming off the bench for the first 24 games of her freshman season.
- She owns 15 double-figure scoring efforts in her career (4, 2019-20; 11, 2018-19).
- During a three-game European Tour in August of 2019, Brown led the Huskers by averaging 19.7 points per game in wins over teams from Italy and Spain.

VEERBEEK WORKING FOR BIGGER ROLE IN 2020

- Ashtyn Veerbeek has worked hard to make greater contributions for the Huskers in 2019-20.
- The 6-2, sophomore, forward from Sioux Center, Iowa, has proven herself as one of the hardest working Huskers, claiming the team's 2019 Lifter-of-the-Year Award as a freshman.
- Through four games as a starter this season, Veerbeek has provided a consistent presence inside, averaging 10.5 points, 5.8 rebounds, 1.5 assists and 1.0 steal per game.
- Veerbeek scored a season-high 13 points while adding six rebounds in a win over Morgan State (Nov. 14).
- She opened the season by making her first start in a win over Alabama A&M (Nov. 6). She scored Nebraska's first points of the season with a three-pointer on her way to finishing with 10 points and six rebounds.
- Veerbeek produced double figures for the third time on the season with 10 points, six rebounds and a career-high-matching two steals in a win over SIUE (Nov. 17).
- She added nine points, five rebounds, a career-high-matching three assists, a block and a steal to help the Huskers to a 90-85 overtime win at Missouri (Nov. 10).



(#13) Ashtyn Veerbeek, 6-2, So., Forward

- Last season, Veerbeek averaged 6.9 points and ranked second on the squad with 5.5 rebounds in 16.7 minutes per game.
- The explosive scorer around the rim and dangerous three-point shooter is also hoping to work her way to the line more as a sophomore, after shooting better than 78 percent at the stripe last season.
- Greater contributions from Veerbeek could help the Huskers compensate for the absence of graduated senior starter Maddie Simon, who averaged 6.8 points and 3.1 rebounds a year ago.
- Veerbeek scored a career-high 19 points and grabbed eight rebounds in a win at Illinois (Jan. 17, 2019). It was one of seven double-figure scoring efforts for Veerbeek on the year.
- She notched her first career double-double with 14 points and a career-high 14 rebounds in a win over San Jose State (Dec. 8, 2019).
- Veerbeek earned a spot on the Miami Thanksgiving Classic All-Tournament Team by producing 13 points and nine rebounds in a win over NCAA Tournament-bound Radford (Nov. 25, 2018).

MERSHON PREPARED FOR ANY ROLE INSIDE

- Kayla Mershon is ready to provide any kind of contribution needed inside for the Huskers as a sophomore in 2019-20.
- The 6-3 forward from Chanhassen, Minn., started Nebraska's final 14 games of 2018-19, providing defensive stability and solid all-around play. Mershon averaged 3.2 points and 3.0 rebounds while also owning Nebraska's best assist-to-turnover ratio (27-12) on the season.
- Mershon is averaging 1.5 points and 3.8 rebounds through four games in 2019-20.
- Mershon opened her sophomore season with four points, five rebounds and a block in 15 minutes off the bench in Nebraska's win over Alabama A&M (Nov. 6).
- She added four rebounds, a block and a steal to help the Huskers to a 90-85 OT win at Missouri (Nov. 6).
- Mershon pitched in two points, four boards and another block in a win over Morgan State (Nov. 14).

GRADUATE TRANSFER HUDSON RETURNS AFTER REDSHIRT

- Nebraska graduate transfer Kristian Hudson returned to the court by scoring four points, grabbing three rebounds and dishing out an assist in NU's win over Alabama A&M (Nov. 6).
- Hudson missed the final 23 games of 2018-19 with a foot injury that required surgery in December, 2018.
- Hudson, a 5-5 guard from Birmingham, Ala., averaged 2.4 points and 1.6 rebounds through Nebraska's first seven games before missing a win over Kansas (Dec. 5, 2019).
- Hudson was a three-year starter at Florida International before joining the Huskers late in the summer of 2018, following her graduation from FIU.

AUSTRALIAN BOURNE BRINGS STRONG IDENTITY

• Isabelle Bourne is averaging 3.8 points and 4.3 rebounds through the first four games of her college career.

• She is coming off a solid eight-point, six-rebound performance in a win over Morgan State (Nov. 14). Bourne opened her career with two points, four rebounds and a blocked shot in 15 minutes off the bench in Nebraska's win over Alabama A&M (Nov. 6).

• The 6-2 forward added a point, two rebounds and another block in 13 minutes to help the Huskers to a 90-85 OT win at Missouri (Nov. 10).

• Bourne was a major factor in Australia's silver medal at the FIBA U19 World Cup, averaging 8.4 points, 5.1 rebounds and 1.1 assists in 23.1 minutes per game over seven contests for the Gems.

• Australia went 5-2 at the World Cup with both losses to the USA U19 team, including an overtime setback in the gold medal game.

• One of the most talented young players in Australia, Bourne joined the Huskers in August of 2019 after helping the Gems to a silver medal at 2019 FIBA Under-19 World Cup in Bangkok, Thailand, July 20-28.

• The Australian U19 National Team entered the tournament ranked No. 7 in the world, but came up just short of the gold medal, falling 74-70 in overtime to the United States.

• Bourne averaged 8.4 points, 5.1 rebounds and 1.1 assists in 23.1 minutes for the Gems.

• In 2017, Bourne led Australia's U17 team to gold at the Oceania Championship in Guam by averaging 19 points, 9.8 rebounds and 2.6 assists to claim a spot on the all-tournament team.

• She was also the MVP of the 2017 FIBA Under-18 Asia Cup 3-on-3 tournament in Mongolia, leading her team to another gold medal. Bourne was also named to the Gems squad for the 2018 FIBA Under-18 Asian Championships.

• Bourne trained at the Australian Institute of Sport and Basketball Australia's Centre of Excellence under Coach Kristen Veal. She was also a developmental player in the University of Canberra Capitals program.

BRADY PREPARED TO SCORE AT THREE LEVELS

• Trinity Brady did not attend Nebraska's season-opening wins over Alabama A&M (Nov. 6) and Missouri (Nov. 10) as part of the concussion protocol. She was on the bench for Nebraska's wins over Morgan State (Nov. 14) and SIUE (Nov. 17), but did not play. Brady sustained contact to her head and neck area late in NU's exhibition win over Rogers State (Nov. 2). She had eight points and eight rebounds in the game.

• The final piece of Nebraska's three-player recruiting class, Brady came to Nebraska after completing her senior season at Hamilton Heights Christian Academy in Chattanooga, Tenn. She was ranked as the No. 106 player overall in the 2019 class by Prospects Nation.

• The Lady Hawks finished the season No. 18 in the final USA Today Super 25 rankings with a 22-3 overall record. Hamilton Heights Christian Academy fell to Riverdale Baptist in the NACA Championships.

• Brady competed for Lawrence North High School in Indianapolis her first three seasons.

• As a junior, Brady averaged 21.0 points, 8.5 rebounds and 4.0 assists to earn a spot on the IBCA Subway Supreme 15 Underclass All-State Team. She was also a member of the Indiana Junior All-Star Team and the Central Indiana Super Team.

• She led Lawrence North to a 20-4 record and produced several huge individual efforts as a junior in 2017-18, including a 38-point performance against Tindley, 30 points in a win over Pike and 28 points against nationally ranked North Central.

• As a sophomore, Brady averaged 15 points and 7.5 rebounds per game for Lawrence North, after averaging 7.2 points and 6.0 rebounds as a freshman.

• She played her club basketball with the George Hill Lady Stars for coaches Mike Saunders and DeJuan Howard.

HELMS NOT AFRAID TO TAKE CHARGE

• Makenzie Helms made her collegiate debut by dishing out an assist in three minutes of action off the bench in Nebraska's season-opening win over Alabama A&M (Nov. 6). She did not play in Nebraska's road win at Missouri (Nov. 10), but played four minutes in a win over Morgan State (Nov. 14).

• Helms captured Gatorade Connecticut High School Player-of-the-Year honors by averaging 26.5 points, 7.4 rebounds, 6.6 assists and 4.3 steals while leading the East Haven Yellowjackets to the Southern Connecticut Conference title in 2018-19.

• Helms, who was the conference player of the year, led East Haven to a 20-5 overall record and a spot in the Connecticut Class L state quarterfinals.

• She was the first commitment to Nebraska's 2018-19 class, making her intentions known in January of 2018. Her commitment followed a junior season in 2017-18 in which Helms averaged 17.5 points, 5.0 rebounds, 7.2 assists and 4.0 steals per game. East Haven finished No. 3 in the state of Connecticut with a 25-3 record in 2017-18. Helms earned first-team all-state honors and was a USA Today first-team All-Connecticut selection.

• As a sophomore, Helms averaged 16.7 points, 5.0 rebounds, 6.0 assists and 4.0 steals at the Loomis Chaffee School. She earned All-New England accolades as both a freshman and sophomore.

• She played her summer basketball for New Heights NYC for Coach Rock Rosa, averaging 20 points, six rebounds, eight assists and five steals per contest. ESPN ranked her as the No. 27 point guard in the class of 2019.

• Last season, Nebraska played just 14 regular-season games at home at Pinnacle Bank Arena, including just five non-conference contests. In 2019-20, the Huskers will play 17 regular-season home games in Lincoln, including eight non-conference games.

• As a team, the Huskers will shoot to "Bring IT" from start-to-finish, beginning with their 97-33 exhibition win over Rogers State at Pinnacle Bank Arena (Nov. 2). Rogers State provided Coach Williams with her first head coaching job, and the Oklahoma school currently features former Husker Jasmine Cincore as an assistant coach.

• The Big Red opened regular-season play against a former Husker when Coach Margaret Richards and Alabama A&M came to Lincoln. Richards, who played for coaches Paul Sanderford and Connie Yori at Nebraska as a four-year letterwinner (2001-04). The Huskers battled to a 68-46 win over the Bulldogs in front of 5,250 fans on Wednesday (Nov. 6) at noon inside Pinnacle Bank Arena - the third-largest season-opening crowd in school history.

• The game with Alabama A&M was preceded by the Nebraska Life Skills Sportsmanship Pep Rally on the court at Pinnacle Bank Arena, which began at 9:30 a.m. and featured nearly 2,000 students and sponsors from 27 school districts across Nebraska.

• The Huskers made their first road trip a successful one by beating 2019 NCAA Tournament qualifier Missouri 90-85 in overtime at Mizzou Arena (Nov. 10).

• Nebraska returned home to tip a four-game stand featuring Morgan State (Nov. 14), SIUE (Nov. 17), Southern (Nov. 20) and Creighton (Nov. 24). The game with SIUE was part of Alumni Weekend, when the Huskers will honor members of the 2010 Big 12 Champion and NCAA Sweet 16 team on the 10th anniversary of their undefeated regular season in 2009-10.

• The Huskers will spend Thanksgiving in Las Vegas at the South Point Shootout, where they will face USC (Nov. 29) and Sacred Heart (Nov. 30), before returning to Pinnacle Bank Arena to take on perennial power Duke in the Big Ten/ACC Challenge (Dec. 4).

• Nebraska closes non-conference play at home against Oral Roberts (Dec. 14) and Manhattan (Dec. 22), before opening Big Ten play at home against defending Big Ten Tournament champion and NCAA Elite Eight qualifier Iowa (Dec. 28).

• The game with Iowa tips off an 18-game conference schedule that includes home battles with Minnesota (Jan. 4), Wisconsin (Jan. 9), Michigan (Jan. 19), Purdue (Jan. 22), Ohio State (Feb. 2), Indiana (Feb. 9), Penn State (Feb. 13) and Illinois (Feb. 22).

• The Huskers open their nine-game Big Ten road schedule at Michigan State (Dec. 31), followed by road trips to Rutgers (Jan. 12), Maryland (Jan. 16), Wisconsin (Jan. 25), Minnesota (Jan. 30), Iowa (Feb. 6), Northwestern (Feb. 16), Ohio State (Feb. 19) and Indiana (Feb. 27).

• The Big Ten Tournament returns to Bankers Life Fieldhouse in Indianapolis (March 4-8), before the NCAA Tournament Selection Show reveals the 64-team field on March 16.

• NCAA first and second rounds will be held March 20-23, before Regionals are held in Dallas, Texas, Fort Wayne, Ind., Greenville, S.C., and Portland, Ore., March 27-30. The NCAA Women's Final Four will take place at the Smoothie King Center in New Orleans, April 3-5.

NEBRASKA'S HISTORY OF HOME SUCCESS

• The Huskers went 15-4 at Pinnacle Bank Arena in 2015-16 after going 12-3 (13-3 at home) in 2014-15. The Huskers are 71-30 (.703) all-time at Pinnacle Bank Arena since the building opened for the 2013-14 campaign. The Big Red went 16-2 at home in 2013-14, suffering their only Big Ten loss to Purdue, 77-75, on Jan. 19, 2014. NU's 16 home wins in 2013-14 tied the school record for single-season home victories.

• The Huskers played the first regular-season game arena history against USA Today No. 25 UCLA (Nov. 8, 2013) and rolled to a 77-49 win over the Bruins. NU's first win over an AP Top 25 team came with a 76-56 win over No. 24 Michigan State on Feb. 8, 2014. The Huskers added their first-ever win over an AP Top 10 team at the arena with a 94-74 victory over No. 8 Penn State on Feb. 24, 2014.

• NU won its first-ever Big Ten home game at Pinnacle Bank Arena with a 66-65 thriller over Northwestern Jan. 2, 2014, before an 88-85 win over Minnesota on Jan. 16, 2014, marked the first overtime game.

• NU suffered its first loss at the arena to Washington State (76-72) on Nov. 30, 2013.

• The Huskers are 43-3 all-time in home season openers, following a 68-46 win over Alabama A&M on Nov. 6, 2019. Nebraska had its streak of 12 consecutive season-opening wins snapped with an 83-77 loss to Missouri Valley Conference champion Drake on Nov. 7, 2018.

• The Huskers are 460-160 (.742) all-time at home. The Huskers have gone 196-64 (.754) over the last 17 seasons (including 2019-20), posting double-figure home victory totals 14 times.

• Nebraska played in the Devaney Center from 1976-77 through 2012-13, and added one appearance at Devaney against Utah on Nov. 23, 2014. The Huskers own a 389-130 record at the Devaney Center, including 146-88 (.624) mark in conference play.

NEBRASKA RANKS NEAR TOP IN ATTENDANCE

• Nebraska ranked No. 22 nationally with an average home attendance of 4,101 at Pinnacle Bank Arena in 2018-19. It marked the 10th consecutive year that the Huskers have ranked in the top 25 nationally in average home attendance.

• Nebraska has ranked among the top 25 nationally in average home attendance in each of its first six seasons inside Pinnacle Bank Arena.

• The Huskers opened the 2019-20 season with 5,250 fans at Pinnacle Bank Arena for a Wednesday, noon tip against Alabama A&M on Nov. 6. Nebraska hosted a Life Skills Sportsmanship Pep Rally prior to the game, which included nearly 2,000 students and sponsors from 27 school districts around the Cornhusker State. It was the third-largest opening day crowd in Husker history.

• In 101 all-time home games at Pinnacle Bank Arena, the Huskers own a 71-30 record (.703 winning percentage) while averaging 5,139 fans per game (519,026 total fans/101 games).

• Nebraska attracted a Pinnacle Bank Arena non-conference record crowd of 9,750 to open its stay in the arena with a win over UCLA on Nov. 8, 2013.

• Nebraska set its all-time single-game record with a sellout crowd of 13,595 fans against Missouri at the Devaney Center on Feb. 27, 2010. NU drew 10 straight crowds of more than 10,000 fans at the Devaney Center in 2009-10.

• Nebraska produced its top attendance season in school history by ranking No. 7 nationally with a record 7,390 fans per game at the Bob Devaney Sports Center in 2009-10. The Huskers went 16-0 at the Devaney Center on their way to a perfect 29-0 record, a Big 12 title and a No. 1 seed in the NCAA Tournament.

NEBRASKA SETS PACE IN ALL-SPORT ATTENDANCE

• Nebraska Athletics has long been one of the biggest in-person attractions in all of college sports. Among its seven major team sports (football, men's and women's basketball, volleyball, women's soccer, baseball and softball) the Huskers ranked No. 3 in the nation in 2018-19 with nearly 1.235 million fans attending Nebraska events.

• In NCAA Division I women's attendance, combining the sports of women's basketball, volleyball, softball and soccer, Nebraska ranked No. 2 nationally last year with a combined 251,429 fans at its home events across those four sports. Only South Carolina attracted more fans (259,439) at home.

• In fall and winter sports combined (football, volleyball, soccer, men's and women's basketball) Nebraska also ranked No. 2 in the nation with 1.139 million fans, trailing only Tennessee's 1.159 million.

• Nebraska baseball ranked No. 9 in the nation in average home attendance (4,426), while football (89,034) and men's basketball (15,341) both ranked No. 10 nationally. The Nebraska wrestling team also ranked No. 11 in the country (2,231). The Husker volleyball program led the nation in average home attendance (8,205), while soccer ranked No. 21 (1,029) and women's basketball (4,101) ranked No. 22.

OPTIONS HELP HUSKER FANS JOIN THE FUN

• Approximately 3,000 season ticket holders take advantage of huge savings offered by purchasing Nebraska women's basketball season tickets. Reserved adult season tickets for Nebraska's 18 home games (17 regular season plus 1 exhibition) are just \$180 (\$10 per game) at Pinnacle Bank Arena. That is a savings of \$90 (33 percent) off the face value of the tickets for the season.

• Husker fans with full schedules can still take advantage of the "Starting Five Pack" which allows fans to save over single-game pricing while getting reserved seats for any five games.

• This season, Husker women's basketball has added an exciting option for families with the "You Betcha Bundle", named after the thrilling three-point call of long-time Nebraska radio voice Matt Coatney. The "You Betcha Bundle" offers 10 vouchers to exchange for General Admission tickets to any regular-season women's basketball game for just \$30. Take the whole family, share with friends or use all 10 tickets to individual games.

HUSKERS HONOR 2010 CHAMPIONS ON ALUMNI DAY

• The Huskers celebrated Alumni Weekend against SIUE (Nov. 17), while honoring the 10th anniversary of Nebraska's Big 12 Championship team in 2010. That group of Huskers posted the first unbeaten regular season in school history and the first unbeaten conference season by any school in Big 12 history.

• The 2010 Huskers were led by first-team All-American, Big 12 Player of the Year, Senior CLASS Award winner and Nebraska Female Student-Athlete of the Year Kelsey Griffin. Griffin, who is currently one of the top professional players in Australia. She returned to Nebraska during her WNBL season and attended games against both Morgan State (Nov. 14) and SIUE (Nov. 17).

• Other standout members of the 2010 team who attended the activities were first-team All-Big 12 forward Cory Montgomery (Barrett), first-round WNBA Draft pick Lindsey Moore, Dominique Kelley (Johnson), Nikki Bober (Marcoe), Kala Kuhlmann (Preister), Jess Periago and Layne Reeves (Mulamba).

• Former Nebraska Head Coach Connie Yori was also on hand at Pinnacle Bank Arena with her team. Former Assistant Coach Tory Verdi, who is now the head coach at UMass, attended a team banquet (Nov. 15). Midland University Head Coach Shawn Gilbert, who was the video coordinator for the 2010 team, also attended the weekend events, along with team managers Cliff Countryman and Kevin Dickens.

HUSKER SPORTS NETWORK COVERS WORLD

The Husker Sports Network enters its 26th season producing and marketing the live broadcasts of Nebraska women's basketball in 2019-20. Women's basketball play-by-play announcer Matt Coatney and color commentator Jeff Griesch will team up for their 19th season together as the Husker broadcast team.

The Husker Sports Network and Nebraska women's basketball have teamed up for nearly two decades to take every game, home and away, around the world for free on Huskers.com.

In addition to carrying every women's basketball game free on Huskers.com, the Husker Sports Network flagship stations B107.3 FM-KBBK (Lincoln) and ESPN 590 AM-KXSP (Omaha) provide strong signals for Husker women's basketball. When a network conflict occurs in Omaha, the Huskers also could be heard on CD105.9 FM-KKCD. 880-AM-KRVN (Lexington) also provides a huge AM signal statewide in central Nebraska, while more than 20 stations carry the Husker Sports Network's women's basketball coverage across the state and the Midwest.

Inside Pinnacle Bank Arena, fans can access the direct radio call of the game at 87.7 FM.

NEBRASKA OVERTIME FACTS

- Nebraska is 23-23 all-time in overtime games, including 12-11 at home, 8-9 in true road games and 3-3 on neutral courts in overtime.
- The Huskers are 1-0 in overtime games in 2019-20 following an impressive 90-85 OT win at Missouri (Nov. 10, 2019).
- Nebraska's lone overtime game of 2018-19 also came in the Huskers' first road game of the season, but NU suffered an 87-84 double-overtime loss at Washington State (Nov. 16, 2019). It marked the second straight season that Nebraska played a multi-overtime game (also at Drake, Dec. 9, 2017).
- The Huskers went 1-1 in overtime in 2017-18, including a 69-64 overtime loss to No. 23 Michigan at Pinnacle Bank Arena (Jan. 13). The Huskers won their first overtime game of 2017-18 with an 89-85 double-overtime win at Drake (Dec. 9).
- Nebraska was 1-1 in overtime in 2016-17, including a 76-74 win over Michigan State at Pinnacle Bank Arena to close the regular season (Feb. 26, 2017). The Huskers lost 79-69 in OT to Minnesota at the arena (Feb. 4, 2017).
- The Huskers are 3-3 in overtime games under Coach Amy Williams.
- Nebraska is 2-2 in overtime games at Pinnacle Bank Arena.
- Nebraska is 5-2 in multi-overtime games with its most recent loss coming in the 87-84 2OT setback at Washington State (Nov. 16, 2018) in Pullman. NU's only other loss in a multi-overtime game came to Purdue in the 2012 Big Ten Championship Game, 74-70 in double-overtime.
- The Huskers defeated Minnesota 88-85 in overtime on Jan. 16, 2014. It marked the first overtime game in the history of Pinnacle Bank Arena. Nebraska's first overtime game in the history of the Bob Devaney Sports Center also came against Minnesota - a 68-67 win for the Huskers on Dec. 30, 1977.
- The Huskers have played 13 all-time overtime games against Big Ten opponents and own a 5-8 record. NU is 4-5 against Big Ten opponents in OT since joining the conference in 2011-12.
- Nebraska played its fourth overtime game in 73 all-time meetings with Missouri in a 90-85 OT win at Mizzou Arena (Nov. 10, 2019). All four OT games against the Tigers were settled in a single overtime period.
- Nebraska's next most frequent overtime opponents are Big Ten foes Purdue, Minnesota and Wisconsin. The Huskers and Purdue have played three overtime games in 14 all-time meetings. NU's six total overtimes against Purdue are the most against any team in school history.
- The Huskers also have played three overtime games against Minnesota (22 games), including two of the three overtime games in Pinnacle Bank Arena history.
- In 16 all-time games with Wisconsin the Huskers have played three overtime contests.
- Nebraska has never played back-to-back overtime games at home. The Huskers have played back-to-back overtime games only once in school history, an 83-81 loss to Texas A&M in College Station on Dec. 30, 1985, before returning to Lincoln for an 80-75 win over Eastern Kentucky at the Devaney Center on Jan. 2, 1986.

NEBRASKA POSTS 15TH STRAIGHT PERFECT GSR

In the eyes of the NCAA's Division I Graduation Success Rate (GSR), the Husker women's basketball program has been perfect for 15 consecutive years. Nebraska is the only program among the 14 Big Ten Conference schools to accomplish the perfect score for 15 straight seasons.

The NCAA announced the release of its annual Graduation Success Rate report on Oct. 16, 2019, and Nebraska was a national leader in women's basketball for the 15th straight season, dating back to the initial public tracking of the GSR since 2004-05.

The Nebraska women's basketball program joins the Husker women's tennis and volleyball programs as Husker teams that have produced perfect 100 percent rates each of the last 15 years.

Nebraska was one of just 28 teams in the 64-team field of the 2018 NCAA Tournament to also boast a 100 percent Graduation Success Rate.

Overall, the Nebraska Athletic Department produced a record-high GSR for the seventh consecutive year, reaching 93 percent. A total of 10 Husker programs recorded perfect 100 percent GSR scores, including women's basketball, volleyball, softball, soccer, swimming and diving, rifle, men's and women's gymnastics and men's and women's tennis.

Makenzie Helms made her collegiate debut and recorded an assist in Nebraska's season-opening win over Alabama A&M (Nov. 6). She made her second appearance in a win over Morgan State (Nov. 14).

Helms was the 2019 Connecticut High School Player of the Year after averaging 26.5 points, 7.4 rebounds, 6.6 assists and 4.3 steals at East Haven High School.

She was limited during the summer while recovering from offseason surgery and did not compete in Nebraska's summer tour in Europe. However, she has progressed well since the start of the fall semester and could become a contributor for the Huskers as a freshman.

Nebraska Coach Amy Williams said the creative and competitive instincts of Helms will make her an asset for the Huskers in the future.

"We are excited to add Makenzie to the Husker women's basketball family," Williams said. "She has incredible court vision and creates offense for her teammates with tempo and passing ability. Combining that with her confident scoring mentality and her ability to score at all three levels, Makenzie is a great fit for the versatility we like in our system. She is an intense competitor, and we are eager to have her fighting for the Huskers."

BEFORE NEBRASKA

Helms captured Gatorade Connecticut High School Player-of-the-Year honors by averaging 26.5 points, 7.4 rebounds, 6.6 assists and 4.3 steals while leading the East Haven Yellowjackets to the Southern Connecticut Conference title.

Helms, who was the conference player of the year, led East Haven to a 20-5 overall record

and a spot in the Connecticut Class L state quarterfinals.

She was the first commitment to Nebraska's 2018-19 class, making her intentions known in January of 2018. Her commitment followed a junior season in 2017-18 in which Helms averaged 17.5 points, 5.0 rebounds, 7.2 assists and 4.0 steals per game. East Haven finished No. 3 in the state of Connecticut with a 25-3 record in 2017-18. Helms earned first-team all-state honors and was a USA Today first-team All-Connecticut selection.

As a sophomore, Helms averaged 16.7 points, 5.0 rebounds, 6.0 assists and 4.0 steals at the Loomis Chaffee School. She earned All-New England accolades as both a freshman and sophomore.

She played her summer basketball for New Heights NYC for Coach Rock Rosa, averaging 20 points, six rebounds, eight assists and five steals per contest. ESPN ranked her as the No. 27 point guard in the class of 2019.

Whitish had 19 in a win at Northwestern (Feb. 21), which followed 16 points in a win over No. 24 Michigan State (Feb. 17) and against Indiana (Feb. 3). She had 15 at No. 5 Louisville (Nov. 29) and scored 14 at No. 19 Iowa (Jan. 3). She also had 13 points at No. 24 Miami (Nov. 23) and at Michigan (Feb. 7).

She scored 12 points in four straight games (at Illinois, Jan. 17; No. 23 Minnesota, Jan. 20; Northwestern, Jan. 24; at Wisconsin, Jan. 27).

SOPHOMORE (2017-18)

Whitish earned second-team All-Big Ten honors and was named Nebraska's offensive MVP after leading the Huskers in scoring (12.6 ppg), assists (4.7 apg), steals (1.3 spg) and three-point shooting (2.3 pg) in 2017-18. She was the only Husker to start all 32 games on the year.

Whitish was a major catalyst in Nebraska's huge team turnaround from a 7-22 season in 2016-17 to a 21-11 campaign in 2017-18. Nebraska's 14-game improvement tied for the largest increase in victories in NCAA Division I women's basketball in 2017-18.

Her 73 made threes marked the third-best total by a sophomore in school history.

Whitish dished out 150 assists, which tied for the fifth-best total by a sophomore in NU history. She ranked among Big Ten leaders with 4.7 assists per game, and she carried nearly a 2-to-1 assist to turnover ratio (150-77).

Whitish erupted for a career-high 29 points, including 25 in the second half, to lead Nebraska to a road win at Kansas (Dec. 6). She added 29 points, six rebounds and six assists in an 89-84 2OT win at Drake (Dec. 9) to earn Big Ten Player-of-the-Week honors (Dec. 11).

A two-time All-Big Ten selection, Hannah Whitish (pronounced WHITE-ish) is working to lead Nebraska back to the NCAA Tournament.

The 5-9 guard from Barneveld, Wis., needs two points to reach 1,000 in her career, while needing 22 assists to achieve 400 in that category. She became just the third Husker in history to reach 200 career threes with her first three-pointer in a win at Missouri (Nov. 10).

Whitish is averaging 8.0 points, 5.0 rebounds, 3.8 assists and 2.3 steals. She had 12 points and team highs of seven rebounds, five assists and a career-high-tying four steals while also drawing several charges in NU's 90-85 OT win at Missouri. She opened with 12 points, three rebounds and three assists in a win over Alabama A&M (Nov. 6). She hit 4-of-6 threes against the Bulldogs. She added eight points, five assists and a career-high nine rebounds in a win over SIUE (Nov. 17).

JUNIOR (2018-19)

Whitish was honorable-mention All-Big Ten after leading the Huskers with 10.1 points and 4.3 assists per game. She added 2.9 rebounds and 1.0 steal. She knocked down a team-best 65 threes on the year to climb to third on Nebraska's career list with 195. She moved to No. 9 on NU's career assist chart with 363.

The 5-9 sophomore guard from Moorhead, Minn., ranks second among the Huskers in scoring at 13.0 points through four games as a starter.

She erupted for a career-high 28 points, including a career-high-matching three three-pointers, in a 90-85 OT win at Missouri (Nov. 10). Her third three came with three seconds left to send the game to overtime tied at 76. She added the final field goal and two free throws with 13.3 seconds left in OT to seal the win.

Haiby has scored eight points in each of Nebraska's other three wins. She had a season-high three rebounds against Morgan State (Nov. 14) and a season-best three assists against Alabama A&M (Nov. 6).

FRESHMAN (2018-19)

Haiby provided sparks off the bench in all 30 games throughout the season. Nebraska's second-leading scorer, Haiby averaged 10.0 points, 3.0 rebounds and 2.6 assists.

She scored in double figures 15 times, including each of the final four games.

Haiby erupted for a career-high 20 points - all after halftime - at Washington State (Nov. 16). She recorded her best Big Ten effort with 17 points against Indiana (Feb. 3) and had 17 more at Creighton (Dec. 2).

She was named the Big Ten Freshman of the Week after averaging 15.0 points on 10-of-15 shooting at Purdue (Jan. 31) and Indiana (Feb. 3).

She closed the regular season with a team-high 16 points in a win at Penn State (March 2),

BEFORE NEBRASKA

Haiby was ranked as the No. 122 player in the country by Prospects Nation and the No. 125 player in the nation by Blue Star. She was also ranked as the No. 28 guard in the country by ESPN.

She overcame an early season knee injury as a senior to average 25.1 points, 7.1 rebounds and 5.3 assists per game, including a monstrous 46-point performance in a 54-49 win over White Bear Lake on Dec. 10, 2017. It followed a 45-point effort in a win over Brainerd on Nov. 28. Haiby finished her high school career with more than 2,000 points. As a junior, she averaged 22.1 points, 7.6 rebounds, 4.4 assists and 4.1 steals, including a huge 44-point performance against Fargo Shanley on Jan. 17, 2017. She was a first-team Minnesota Class 4A selection for Coach Jed Carlson at Moorhead.

Haiby played her club basketball alongside Husker teammate Kayla Mershon for North Tartan and Coach Gerard Coury. Haiby was a part of five consecutive Minnesota State AAU championships with North Tartan.

Haiby was a starting outfielder and pitcher on Moorhead High School's baseball team in the spring of 2017. She was the first pitcher to ever throw a pitch in U.S. Bank Stadium in Minneapolis, taking the mound for the Spuds against the Sartell Sabres at the home of the Minnesota Vikings and Super Bowl LII in the Twin Cities. She also became the first female in history to pitch a scoreless inning in a Minnesota High School boys baseball game in spring 2017.

Eliely also had 14 points in a win over Denver (Dec. 15). She had 12 points, five rebounds and five steals at Wisconsin (Jan. 27). She added 12 points at Purdue (Jan. 31).

Eliely scored 10 against Drake (Nov. 7) and at No. 24 Miami (Nov. 23). She had a season-high eight rebounds to go along with nine points at Creighton (Dec. 2). She matched the eight rebounds in a win over Kansas (Dec. 5), when she set a career high with four blocks.

SOPHOMORE (2017-18)

Eliely started NU's final 26 games after missing the first three contests of 2017-18 while recovering from an ankle injury that kept her off the court and out of practice for the month of October and the first part of November.

SENIOR (2019-20)

Nicea Eliely (pronounced ny-SEE-ah EE-ly-lee) has proven herself as one of the Big Ten's best defenders and a reliable starter for the Huskers throughout her career.

The 6-1 senior from Colorado Springs, ranked among the top five players in the Big Ten in steals (1.8 spg), and her solid all-around game could place her in elite company in Husker history by the end of the season.

Eliely is within striking distance of 1,000 points, 500 rebounds and 200 career steals. If she reaches those milestones, she would become just the fifth Husker in history to achieve them, joining Anna DeForge, Maurice Ivy, Deb Powell and Brooke Schwartz. Only nine players in Husker history have reached 200 career steals, and Eliely needs 58 to achieve that standard.

Eliely produced her first career double-double with 12 points and a career-high 15 rebounds in a win over Morgan State (Nov. 14). She added her second career double-double with 13 points, 10 boards, three assists, two blocks and four steals in a win over SIUE (Nov. 17). She increased her season averages to 9.8 points and 7.8 rebounds. She had 10 points in a win at Missouri (Nov. 10).

JUNIOR (2018-19)

Eliely was one of Nebraska's top perimeter defenders as a junior, ranking among the top five players in the Big Ten with 1.8 steals per game. Eliely, who joined Kate Cain as the only Huskers to start all 30 games in 2018-19, finished with 54 steals, the highest total by a Husker since All-American Lindsey Moore nabbed 60 steals as a senior in 2012-13.

JUNIOR (2017-18, FIU)

Hudson averaged 14.5 points, 4.5 rebounds and 4.7 assists as a junior for the Panthers in 2017-18. She was at her best during the final seven games of her junior season when she averaged 18.3 points, 4.3 rebounds, 6.0 assists and 1.7 steals in 37 minutes per game.

As a junior, Hudson produced 21 double-figure scoring efforts in 29 games, including nine 20-plus scoring efforts.

She recorded season highs with back-to-back 27-point performances while playing the full 40 minutes against North Dakota State (Dec. 20) and Clemson (Dec. 21).

Veerbeek put the finishing touches on an outstanding high school career by being named first-team all-state in both basketball and volleyball for the second straight year. On the basketball court, Veerbeek broke the Western Christian single-season scoring record for the second straight year with 619 points, after scoring 592 points as a junior.

Her point total as a senior ranked third among all players in the state of Iowa, while her 346 rebounds led the state. She added 86 blocks to rank eighth across all classes in Iowa.

A strong, hard-working post player who has given Nebraska consistent depth throughout her career, Grace Mitchell is providing leadership on and off the court as a senior.

The 6-2 forward from Wellington, Kan., has played in 88 career games and is a two-time Big Ten Distinguished Scholar. The two-time academic All-Big Ten choice also earned a prestigious Sam Foltz Hero 27 Leadership Award as one of Nebraska's most committed student-athletes to community involvement.

Mitchell scored a season-high five points, including her first three-pointer since hitting one against Arkansas Pine Bluff (Dec. 2, 2017) in a win over Morgan State (Nov. 14). She came off the bench to contribute four points and three rebounds in 10 minutes in a win at Missouri (Nov. 10). Mitchell started the overtime and scored NU's first points of the extra period in a 90-85 win in Columbia.

She opened the season by playing 14 minutes off the bench in Nebraska's win over Alabama A&M (Nov. 6). She started NU's exhibition win over Rogers State (Nov. 2).

JUNIOR (2018-19)

Mitchell appeared in 26 games as a junior in 2018-19, while continuing to give Nebraska an explosive, powerful athlete in the paint.

Mitchell had a strong effort off the bench against USC Upstate when she scored six

SOPHOMORE (2018-19)

Cain set the Husker sophomore record with 79 blocks, while ranking second in the Big Ten and 13th nationally with 2.6 blocks per game.

Cain, who joined Nicea Eliely as the only Huskers to start all 30 games, averaged 7.5 points, 5.9 rebounds and 1.2 assists in 23 minutes per game. Over the final eight games, Cain averaged 8.6 points while hitting 61 percent (30-49) of her shots from the field and 71.4 percent (10-14) of her free throws.

Her best performance of the year came with 16 points and a season-high 17 rebounds in a win over San Jose State (Dec. 8).

She set her season high with 16 points in a win over USC Upstate (Nov. 11) and notched her first double-double of the year with 10 points, 10 rebounds and four blocks at Washington State (Nov. 16). She had a season-high seven blocks in a win over No. 24 Michigan State (Feb. 17).

FRESHMAN (2017-18)

Cain earned spots on the Big Ten All-Defensive and Big Ten All-Freshman teams by averaging 9.9 points and team bests of 7.0 rebounds and 3.1 blocks in 2017-18. She led the Big Ten and ranked among the top eight players nationally with a school-record 100 blocks on the season to help the Huskers lead the Big Ten in both field goal percentage defense and three-point field goal percentage defense.

She started NU's last 31 games while playing in all 32 contests in 2017-18. The four-time Big Ten Freshman of the Week produced 22 points, 14 rebounds and a school-record 11 blocks for the first points-rebounds-blocks triple-double in Husker history against Florida Atlantic (Dec. 19).

Cain had six games with five or more blocks, including the top three single-game totals by a freshman in Husker history.

She had five double-doubles, including 14 points and 20 rebounds in a win over Penn State (Feb. 22). Her 20 rebounds tied for the sixth-best total in Husker history. She helped Nebraska post a plus-29 team rebound margin against Penn State - the biggest margin against a conference opponent in Husker history.

JUNIOR (2019-20)

Kate Cain returns stronger, quicker and more confident for her junior season at Nebraska. On the brink of becoming the greatest shot-blocker in Nebraska history, the 6-5 center from Middletown, N.Y., ranks among NCAA leaders with 4.7 blocks per game, while adding 8.3 points and 6.0 rebounds in 2019-20.

Cain enters the SIUE game with 193 career blocks. She recorded eight rejections to go along with 10 points and seven rebounds in Nebraska's season-opening win over Alabama A&M (Nov. 6). It was third-best individual block total in Husker history, trailing only her school-record 11 blocks as a freshman against Florida Atlantic and nine blocks from Olympic bronze medalist Danielle Page against Baylor in 2007.

She added a season-high 13 points to go along with six rebounds and four blocks in a win over Morgan State (Nov. 14).

6-1 Sophomore Guard/Forward Auburn, Indiana (DeKalb)

Purdue (Feb. 10) to earn a spot on the Big Ten Weekly Honor Roll. Brown started Nebraska's next six games, with the first starts coming in place of an ill Taylor Kissinger against No. 7 Maryland (Feb. 14) and No. 24 Michigan State (Feb. 17).

For the season, Brown averaged 9.6 points, 2.6 rebounds and 1.5 assists, including 10.2 points, 3.0 rebounds and 1.6 assists in regular-season Big Ten play. She notched eight double-figure scoring efforts against Big Ten foes among her 11 double-digit performances on the season.

In Brown's 30-point performance against Purdue, she scored 22 in the second half. She set career highs with four threes and 10 free throws made against the Boilermakers while tying a career high with two steals. She tied a career best by hitting four more threes in a win over No. 24 Michigan State on her way to 14 points, five rebounds and three assists.

Brown added 20 points while matching a career best with two steals at No. 19 Iowa (Jan. 3). She was named the Big Ten Freshman of the Week (Jan. 7), for her performance against Iowa and a 19-point effort to go along with four rebounds, three assists and a steal in a Big Ten road win at Ohio State (Dec. 31).

Brown opened Big Ten play with 11 points and five rebounds in a win over Michigan (Dec. 28). She had 18 points and a career-high six rebounds against Rutgers (Jan. 13), before adding 10 points in a win at Illinois (Jan. 17).

Through her first six Big Ten games, Brown averaged 13.7 points and 3.5 rebounds in just 20.2 minutes per game. She had 18 points on 8-of-11 shooting in a win over San Jose State (Dec. 8). She added 17 points and career highs of five assists and two steals in a win over Denver (Dec. 15). She scored 13 points in a win over Radford (Nov. 25).

SOPHOMORE (2019-20)

Leigha Brown (pronounced LEE-uh) showed a glimpse of her all-around game as a freshman for the Huskers and may be ready to take on greater roles as a sophomore.

The 6-1 wing from Auburn, Ind., has been Nebraska's most consistent offensive threat through the first three games in 2019-20. She leads Nebraska with 15.5 points per game while adding 4.3 rebounds and 2.0 assists per contest. She is the only Husker to produce double figures in all four contests.

Brown erupted for 24 points and five rebounds off the bench to help carry Nebraska to a 90-85 overtime win at Missouri (Nov. 10). Brown scored 18 points after halftime, including four in OT to help the Huskers seal their first road win over an SEC school since the 2013 NCAA Tournament.

She added a game-high 16 points and a career-high-tying five assists in a win over Morgan State (Nov. 14). She contributed 12 points in a win over SIUE (Nov. 17). Brown opened the season with 10 points and a career-high seven rebounds in Nebraska's season-opening win over Alabama A&M (Nov. 6).

During Nebraska's European tour to Italy and Spain in August of 2019, Brown averaged a team-best 19.7 points over three games. Her toughness and leadership could also be driving forces for Nebraska's growth.

FRESHMAN (2018-19)

Brown worked her way into Nebraska's lineup for the final six games of her freshman season.

An explosive scorer, Brown put up Nebraska's top offensive effort of the season with 30 points in just 25 minutes off the bench in a win over

State honors as a junior. She earned second-team Class 4A all-state honors after averaging 17.9 points, 8.4 rebounds and 3.3 assists as a sophomore in 2015-16.

Brown closed her high school career with 1,798 points, 810 rebounds, 325 assists, 161 steals and 86 blocked shots. In the first game of her senior season, Brown had a triple-double (34 points, 20 rebounds 10 assists). Her second game, she erupted for a career-high 53 points to go along with 24 rebounds in a win over Lakeland High School (Nov. 3, 2018).

She came off the bench the final six games, producing double figures in three of those six games, including a 15-point effort on 5-of-10 three-point shooting in the Big Ten Tournament against Purdue (March 7). Her five threes were the third-best total by a Husker in Big Ten Tournament history.

She closed the regular season with 14 points on 4-of-5 three-point shooting in a road win at Penn State (March 2).

Kissinger had a record-setting effort against USC Upstate (Nov. 11) when she went a perfect 6-for-6 from three-point range on her way to a season-high 22 points.

She had 18 points in a win over Denver (Dec. 15), after getting 17 vs. San Jose State (Dec. 8). Kissinger posted her second career double-double with 11 points and a career-high 11 rebounds in a win over KU (Dec. 5).

She notched 12 double-figure efforts on the year, including 15 points at Wisconsin (Jan. 27), 12 at Michigan (Feb. 7).

FRESHMAN (2017-18)

Kissinger averaged 10.0 points, 4.1 rebounds and 1.4 assists in 25 games with seven starts. She shot 40.8 percent from the field, including 36.2 percent from three-point range, while knocking down 71.7 percent of her free throws. She joined Kate Cain (9.9 ppg) as the first pair of Husker freshmen to both average 9.9 points per game since Debra Powell and Crystal Coleman in 1981-82.

Kissinger made an instant impact, averaging a team-best 14.0 points per game through NU's first seven contests before suffering a knee injury late in a one-point loss to Clemson (Nov. 30).

She missed six consecutive games for the Huskers to close non-conference play.

FRESHMAN (2019-20)

Isabelle Bourne is making immediate contributions to the Huskers as a freshman. The 6-2 forward from Canberra, Australia, is averaging 3.8 points and 4.3 rebounds through four games. She produced the best effort of her young career with eight points, six rebounds and a block in a win over Morgan State (Nov. 14).

Bourne has extensive international experience and is coming off an impressive summer with the Australian U19 National Team. Bourne (who also likes to be called "Issie" - sounds like IZZY) was a major factor in Australia's silver medal at the FIBA U19 World Cup, averaging 8.4 points, 5.1 rebounds and 1.1 assists in 23.1 minutes per game over seven contests for the Gems.

Australia went 5-2 at the World Cup with both losses to the USA U19 team, including an overtime setback in the gold medal game.

Bourne's commitments with the Australian National program kept her from competing with the Huskers during their summer tour in Europe, but she did travel with the team in Italy and Spain.

BEFORE NEBRASKA

One of the most talented young players in Australia, Bourne joined the Huskers in August of 2019 after helping the Gems to a silver medal at 2019 FIBA Under-19 World Cup in Bangkok, Thailand, July 20-28.

The Australian U19 National Team entered the tournament ranked No. 7 in the world, but came up just short of the gold medal, falling 74-70 in overtime to the United States.

Bourne averaged 8.4 points, 5.1 rebounds and 1.1 assists in 23.1 minutes per game for the Gems.

In 2017, Bourne led Australia's U17 team to gold at the Oceania Championship in Guam by averaging 19 points, 9.8 rebounds and 2.6 assists

She notched two steals on seven occasions, including at Arkansas (Dec. 18) when she also blocked a career-high two shots.

Mershon played a career-high 30 minutes in a win over Purdue (Feb. 10).

In Big Ten play, Mershon hit 36.4 percent of her threes (8-22) and 75 percent (18-24) of her free throws, while averaging 3.6 points and 3.5 rebounds per game.

SOPHOMORE (2019-20)

Kayla Mershon (pronounced MER-shawn) played her way into Nebraska's starting lineup during the second half of her freshman season.

The 6-3 forward from Chanhassen, Minn., provides a steady and consistent presence inside at both ends of the court, while also supplying versatility to the Huskers.

As a sophomore, Mershon is averaging 1.5 points and 3.8 rebounds per contest.

Mershon opened the season with four points, five rebounds and a block in 15 solid minutes off the bench in a win over Alabama A&M (Nov. 6). She added four rebounds and a block in a win at Missouri (Nov. 10), before getting two points, four rebounds and another block in a win over Morgan State (Nov. 14).

FRESHMAN (2018-19)

Mershon earned her way into the starting lineup for the final 14 games of the season, after coming off the bench in her first 16 games as a true freshman.

A solid defender and good facilitator who rarely turns the ball over, Mershon averaged 3.2 points and 3.0 rebounds on the season.

Over the final seven games, Mershon averaged 4.4 points, 4.0 rebounds, 1.3 assists and 1.1 steals, including a career-high-tying eight points in a win at Penn State (March 2). She added four rebounds, an assist, a block and two steals against the Lady Lions.

Mershon established her career high with eight points, while adding four boards off the bench against No. 9 Maryland (Jan. 8). She added seven points, three rebounds, two assists and a steal the next time out against Rutgers (Jan. 13), before making her first career start in a win at Illinois (Jan. 17). She scored five points

BEFORE NEBRASKA

A six-time high school basketball letterwinner, Mershon was a four-time first-team All-Lake Conference for Coach Leah Dasovich. Mershon averaged 12 points and 10 rebounds as a junior in 2016-17. She helped Minnetonka to its first state title in 2016.

She capped her high school career by averaging 12.7 points, 9.1 rebounds, 1.8 assists, 1.2 steals and 1.5 blocks as a senior.

She was ranked the No. 132 overall player in the country by Prospects Nation and was rated as the No. 14 wing nationally by ESPN.

Mershon also has played club basketball at the highest level for Coach Gerard Coury and the North Tartan program, which won the Minnesota State AAU title seven years in a row. Mershon played for North Tartan alongside current Husker Sam Haiby.

She was also invited to Nike All-American

National Elite Camp in 2014, and advanced to the second round of tryouts for USA Basketball in 2016. She also competed internationally with North Tartan in Europe against national teams from France and the Netherlands.

The daughter of Rick and Leslie Mershon, Kayla was born May 30, 1999, in Royal Oak, Mich. She has two sisters, Lauren and Ally. Kayla is majoring in marketing and earned a spot on the Nebraska Scholar-Athlete Honor Roll in the fall of 2018. She was also a member of the 2019 Tom Osborne Citizenship Team.

Kayla chose Nebraska over Indiana, Iowa, Arkansas, Oregon, DePaul, Utah, Minnesota, Princeton, Wake Forest, Colorado, Creighton, Saint Louis, Drake and South Dakota State.
