HUSKERS JOURNEY TO WISCONSIN TO FACE BADGERS

- The Nebraska women's basketball team makes a quick trip to Wisconsin this weekend to take on the Badgers Saturday.
- Tip-off between the Huskers (14-5, 4-4 Big Ten) and the Badgers (10-9, 2-6 Big Ten) is set for 11 a.m. (CT) at the Kohl Center in Madison.
- Live television coverage will be provided by the Big Ten Network with Sloane Martin on play-by-play and Vera Jones providing commentary.
- Live radio coverage for Saturday's game can be heard on B107.3 FM in Lincoln and CD 105.9 FM in Omaha beginning at 10:45 a.m. (CT). Stations across the state will also carry the broadcast on the Learfield IMG College Husker Sports Network. Free live audio can be found at Huskers.com, the Huskers App.
- Nebraska heads to Wisconsin looking to rebound from a disappointing 76-68 loss to Purdue on Wednesday at Pinnacle Bank Arena. The Huskers dug themselves a 39-18 hole midway through the second quarter, before producing a massive 25-point swing to take a 63-59 lead with 4:30 left in the game. However, Purdue responded with an 11-0 run to regain control over the next three minutes.
- Senior guard Nicea Elieli continued her strong play with 15 points, five rebounds, three assists and two steals for the Huskers. She scored five straight points midway through the fourth to shoot Nebraska to its four-point lead.
- Sophomores Ashtyn Veerbeek (13 points), Sam Haiby (10) and Leigha Brown (10) all added double figures against the Boilermakers. Brown led the Huskers with 15 points in the first meeting this season against Wisconsin, a 65-50 NU win (Jan. 9) in Lincoln. Haiby added seven assists.
- Brown continues to make a strong case for Big Ten Sixth Player of the Year honors. The 6-1 guard from Auburn, Ind., is averaging a team-high 13.3 points per game for the Huskers. She leads Nebraska with 15 double-figure scoring efforts this season, including three straight games.
- Senior Hannah Whitish makes her final homecoming as a Husker to Wisconsin. Whitish was the 2016 Wisconsin Miss Basketball at Barneveld High School. In two previous trips to Madison as a Husker, Whitish has averaged 12.5 points and 5.5 assists per game but is 0-2.
- Another former Husker great from Wisconsin was two-time WNBA All-Star Anna DeForge, who was a teammate of Nebraska Coach Amy Williams (1995-98). DeForge, who was an All-Star with the Indiana Fever and Phoenix Mercury, was the 1994 Wisconsin Miss Basketball.

HUSKER NUGGETS

- Nebraska ranks No. 13 nationally in total home attendance (55,450).
- Nebraska is No. 41 in the Massey Ratings (Jan. 23). A total of 11 Big Ten teams are in the top 55, including: Maryland (11), Northwestern (13), Indiana (16), Iowa (17), Rutgers (28), Purdue (34), Ohio State (38), Nebraska (41), Michigan (43), Michigan State (49) and Minnesota (52).
- Through 19 games, Nebraska is allowing an average of 63.7 points per game, after allowing 70.1 points per game last season. NU's 2018 NCAA Tournament team allowed 63.6.
- Opponents are shooting 37.3 percent from the field and 30.3 percent from three-point range against NU. Last year, Husker foes hit 41.1 percent, including 33.4 percent from three. In 2017-18, Nebraska led the Big Ten in field goal percentage defense (.371) and three-point field goal percentage defense (.299).
- Nebraska has held eight opponents to 55 points or less this season. Last year, NU held only two foes (Radford-39, Kansas-52) to 55 or less. NU held 11 opponents to 55 or less in 2017-18.
- NU's bench has outscored opponent reserves in 16 of 19 games in 2019-20. The Husker bench has outscored opposing benches in 44 of the last 49 games, including double-digit edges 32 times.
- This season, NU's bench has outscored opposing benches 482-297 (25.4-15.6 ppg).
- Nebraska has hit 10 or more threes 19 times in the last three seasons (80 games), including four times in the last 10 contests. Through the first 20 seasons with the three-point shot in women's basketball (1988-2007), Nebraska hit 10 threes in a game just six times (311 games).

SCOUTING THE WISCONSIN BADGERS

• Head coach Jonathan Tsipis brings his fourth Wisconsin team into Saturday's game following a 72-62 win at Minnesota on Wednesday night, snapping a 13-game series losing streak to their border rivals. The Badgers improved to 10-9 overall and 2-6 in the Big Ten, snapping a four-game losing streak that began with a 65-50 loss to Nebraska in Lincoln (Jan. 9).

• Last season, Wisconsin finished with a 15-18 overall record that included a 4-14 Big Ten mark. The 15 wins for the Badgers were their most since 2010-11 (18-15), which was also their last winning season in women's basketball.

• Tsipis, who is 43-70 in his four seasons at Wisconsin, has his Badgers taking pride in their defense. Wisconsin is allowing 63.3 points per game and has only allowed one opponent (Iowa - 85) to score 75 in any game this season. Colorado (74) and Purdue (72) are the only other Badger foes to hit 70.

• Last season, the Badgers defeated Nebraska, 70-69, on a Kelly Karlis buzzer-beating three-pointer in the corner in Madison (Jan. 27, 2019).

• Wisconsin is led by outstanding sophomore Imani Lewis. The 6-1 forward is averaging team bests of 15.2 points and 9.1 rebounds per game, including 18.5 points and 11.9 boards in Big Ten play, after her huge 23-point, 16-rebound effort at Minnesota. She has taken nearly 23 percent of UW's shots in league play. She had 18 points and 10 rebounds in the first meeting with NU in Lincoln.

• Senior Abby Laszewski, a 6-3 forward, has added 11.1 points and 6.7 rebounds on the season. The Huskers held Laszewski in check with just three points and two rebounds in the first meeting. Neither Lewis nor Laszewski have attempted a three-pointer this season.

• Freshman Sydney Hilliard has made an immediate impact. The 5-11 guard is averaging 9.6 points and 4.8 rebounds on the season and has started all eight Big Ten contests. Hilliard had nine points and three assists in Lincoln.

• Senior point guard Kendra Van Leeuwen has averaged 6.1 points, 3.8 rebounds and a team-best 4.2 assists. She managed five points and four assists against the Huskers in Lincoln.

• Junior Niya Beverley rounds out Wisconsin's starting five with 7.8 points and 2.3 rebounds per game. Over the last three games, Beverley is averaging 12.7 points, 3.7 rebounds, 3.3 assists and 1.0 steal, while going 15-of-31 from the field and 5-of-5 at the free throw line. She's averaging 15.0 points and 4.0 rebounds in UW's Big Ten wins, and 7.7 points and 1.8 rebounds in the Badgers' Big Ten losses. She had 10 points, four rebounds, five assists and four steals in Wisconsin's win over Nebraska last season in Madison.

• Senior Suzanne Gilreath leads Wisconsin from long range with 31 three-pointers on the year, including 8-of-22 in Big Ten play. Gilreath is averaging 6.2 points per game.

• Freshman Julie Pospisilova has added more pop from long range with 16 threes on the season. Pospisilova started nine non-conference games and is averaging 4.8 points per game on the year, but just 2.0 points in 16.1 minutes in Big Ten play.

• Freshman Tara Stauffacher is one of five Badgers to play in all 19 games this season. She is averaging 2.9 points and 2.4 rebounds per game. She did not score in the first meeting with NU.

• As a team, Wisconsin is averaging 64.9 points per game on the season while shooting 41.2 percent from the field, including 29.4 percent from three-point range. UW is averaging just 4.6 threes per game. In last season's win over Nebraska, Wisconsin went just 2-for-10 including the game-winner at the buzzer. The Badgers went 3-for-10 from long range in Lincoln this season.

• In Big Ten play, Wisconsin is shooting 40 percent from the field, including 25.9 percent (28-108) from three-point range. UW owns a plus-1.8 rebound margin on the season but a minus-0.7 turnover margin. However, the Badgers own a plus-0.1 turnover margin and a minus-2.0 rebound margin in Big Ten play.

• For the season, Wisconsin is holding opponents to just 38.6 percent shooting from the field, including 30.8 percent from long range.

NEBRASKA VS. WISCONSIN SERIES HISTORY

• Nebraska leads the all-time series with Wisconsin, 10-7, including a 65-50 win over the Badgers at Pinnacle Bank Arena on Jan. 9. All 10 of NU's victories over the Badgers have come as Big Ten foes.

• The Badgers have won back-to-back games against the Huskers in Madison, including a 70-69 win over the Huskers at the Kohl Center on Jan. 27, 2019. Nicea Eliely hit a driving layup with 0.7 seconds left to give NU a 69-67 lead, before Kelly Karlis answered with a three in front of the Wisconsin bench as time expired. Taylor Kissinger led Nebraska with 15 points, while Kate Cain added 14 points and seven rebounds. Hannah Whitish and Nicea Eliely each had 12 points.

• Wisconsin rolled to an 82-56 win in Madison Feb. 9, 2017 - the largest victory margin in the series.

• The Huskers are 10-2 against the Badgers as Big Ten Conference opponents, including 6-0 in Lincoln and 4-0 at Pinnacle Bank Arena. Nebraska is 4-2 against Wisconsin at the Kohl Center. Nebraska's first three wins at the Kohl Center were by a combined nine points, including a 71-70 OT win on Feb. 5, 2014, a 55-53 win on Feb. 28, 2013, and a 75-69 win on Jan. 12, 2012 - the first meeting between the schools as Big Ten foes.

• Wisconsin won the first five meetings between the two school as non-conference opponents, including a pair of overtime victories at the Devaney Center in Lincoln and three wins in Madison. All five of the non-conference meetings between the schools were decided by 10 or fewer points.

• Twelve of 17 meetings have been decided by 10 or fewer points, including three overtime games.

NEBRASKA STREAKS

- Kate Cain owns Nebraska's longest streak of consecutive starts (80).
- Nicea Eliely owns Nebraska's second-longest streak of starts (75).
- Nicea Eliely and Leigha Brown are the only Huskers to score points in each of Nebraska's first 19 games this season.

- Kate Cain and Isabelle Bourne are the only Huskers to record at least one rebound for Nebraska in all 19 games this season.
- Eliely was the only Husker to score in all 30 games last season, and the only Husker to score in all of Nebraska's games against Big Ten Conference foes. She has scored in 53 consecutive games overall. She did not score in a win over Penn State on Feb. 22, 2018, the only time in the past three seasons (including 2019-20, 73 games) that Eliely was shut out.
- The Huskers have knocked down at least one three in 361 straight games dating back to a loss at UTEP on Dec. 20, 2008. Nebraska has hit at least two three-pointers in 240 consecutive games.

- (12) Hannah Whitish is 12 assists away from No. 6 on the Nebraska career assist list (444, Amy Stephens, 1986-89).
- (22) Nicea Eliely is 22 points away from 900 in her career.

HUSKERS ANNOUNCE KISSINGER OUT FOR SEASON

- Nebraska women's basketball coach Amy Williams announced on Dec. 14 that junior guard Taylor Kissinger would undergo hip surgery in early January and be out for the rest of the season. Kissinger underwent surgery on Friday, Jan. 3.
- Kissinger, who was bothered by the nagging injury for several months, averaged 8.4 points and 2.8 rebounds off the bench in five games this season. She missed four games in the concussion protocol after playing in the season-opening win over Alabama A&M (Nov. 6).
- In Nebraska's win over Duke in the Big Ten/ACC Challenge (Dec. 4), Kissinger led the Huskers with 19 points, including a career-high-matching six three-pointers. She also dished out four assists.
- Last season, Kissinger led the Big Ten and ranked No. 4 nationally in three-point field goal percentage (.456, 62-136).
- In her first two seasons, Kissinger averaged 9.4 points and 3.6 rebounds while competing in 55 games with 31 starts.
- Because she only played in five games this season, Kissinger is expected to regain her junior season of eligibility in 2020-21.

WHITISH SHOOTS FOR ANOTHER ALL-BIG TEN HONOR

- All-Big Ten guard Hannah Whitish closed 2018-19 by earning honorable-mention All-Big Ten recognition as a junior. She was second-team All-Big Ten as a sophomore in 2017-18.
- Whitish is averaging 9.1 points and a team-best 3.6 assists to go with 3.3 rebounds and 1.1 steals as a senior.
- Whitish became the first Husker in history to hit the combined career milestones of 1,000 points, 400 assists and 200 three-pointers, crossing the 400-assist plateau in the win over Duke.
- She ranks eighth in career points (1,138) and third in career assists (432) among active Big Ten players.
- The 5-9 guard from Barneveld, Wis., became the 33rd Husker in history to reach 1,000 career points - knocking down a mid-range jumper midway through the first quarter in the win over Southern (Nov. 20) to hit the mark.

- She heads into Saturday's game ranked No. 20 in Nebraska history with 1,138 points. She needs 45 points to tie Jan Crouch (1,183, 1976-79) at No. 19 on the Husker list.

- Whitish poured in a season-high 20 points with a career-high-tying six threes in a win over Michigan (Jan. 19). She added five assists with no turnovers against the Wolverines.

- She scored 17 points and hit five threes in a win over No. 24 Minnesota (Jan. 4).

- She had 15 points on five threes in a win over Sacred Heart (Nov. 30). She earned a spot on the All-South Point Shootout team for her performances in Las Vegas (Nov. 29-30).

- Whitish opened the season with 12 points on 4-of-6 threes in a win over Alabama A&M (Nov. 6).

- She added 12 points on team highs of seven rebounds, five assists and a career-high-tying four steals in an overtime win at Missouri (Nov. 10).

- Whitish had 11 points, three rebounds and three assists in a win over Iowa (Dec. 28).

- She had 10 points and a season-high six assists in a win over Duke (Dec. 4). She went 4-for-4 at the free throw line in the closing minute to seal the win. She added 10 points, four rebounds and four assists at Rutgers (Jan. 12); before adding 10 more points at No. 20 Maryland (Jan. 16).

- Whitish has scored in double figures nine times this season, including four of the last six games.

- Whitish has climbed to No. 7 on the Nebraska career assist list with 432.

- She has led Nebraska in assists nine times this season and has five or more assists seven times.

- Whitish has ascended to No. 3 on the Nebraska career three-point list with 238. She is 29 threes away from Kiera Hardy at No. 2 (267, 2004-07).

- Whitish led the Huskers with 65 three-pointers in 2018-19, which was the third-best total by a junior in school history.

- She led the Huskers with 10.1 points and 4.3 assists per game last season.

- Whitish erupted for a season-high 28 points at Purdue (Jan. 31, 2019). Whitish added a career-high 12 assists to notch her first career double-double. She also tied a career high with six threes.

- Whitish's 12 assists tied for the ninth-best total by a Husker in school history. Only three players in Nebraska history [Rachel Theriot (4), Kathy Hawkins (3), Stacy Imming (1)] have had more than 12 assists in a game.

- Whitish's career high of 29 points came as a sophomore in 2017-18 in back-to-back non-conference wins at Kansas and Drake.

- She owns a team-best 57 career double-figure scoring efforts (9, 2019-20; 17, 2018-19; 18, 2017-18; 13, 2016-17). She has six career 20-point games (1, 2016-17; 3, 2017-18; 1, 2018-19; 1, 2019-20).

CAIN NAMED TO LISA LESLIE AWARD WATCH LIST

- Kate Cain is among the 20 initial candidates for the 2020 Lisa Leslie Award presented by the Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame and the Women's Basketball Coaches Association (WBCA), which announced the award watch list on Oct. 25. Cain earned her first spot on the Lisa Leslie Award watch list in 2018-19.

- On track to become the greatest shot-blocker in Husker history, Cain notched the 200th blocked shot of her career against USC (Nov. 29) in the South Point Shootout.

- Cain is six blocks away from matching Nebraska's career record of 238 (Janet Smith, 1979-82).

- Cain ranks second in the Big Ten with 2.8 blocks per game.

- In Big Ten action, Cain leads the Huskers with 8.9 rebounds per game. She opened Big Ten play with three straight double-doubles.

- She ranks No. 2 on the Nebraska career blocks list with 232. Cain had six blocks in a win over No. 24 Minnesota (Jan. 4). Her 232 career blocks rank 18th in Big Ten history, and she is 42 blocks from the league's all-time top 10 (274, Alex Wittinger, Illinois, 2016-19).

- Cain opened the 2019-20 season by recording eight blocks - the third-best total in school history - in a win over Alabama A&M (Nov. 6). She added 10 points and seven rebounds in the win.

- She produced her third consecutive double-double with season highs of 19 points and 15 rebounds to go with six blocked shots in the win over No. 24 Minnesota (Jan. 4). It was her 10th career double-double. She was named to the Big Ten Weekly Honor Roll (Jan. 6).

- Cain notched her first double-double of the year with 16 points and 12 rebounds in the win over Iowa (Dec. 28).

- She added her second straight double-double with 10 points and 14 rebounds to go with four blocks at Michigan State (Dec. 31).

- She had 18 points with seven boards and three blocks vs. Creighton (Nov. 24).

- Cain played an outstanding all-around game with 15 points, while adding eight rebounds and four blocks in a win over Oral Roberts (Dec. 14).

- She followed with 13 points and eight rebounds against Manhattan (Dec. 22).

- Cain played a strong all-around game with 12 points, five rebounds, five blocks and two steals in a win over Duke (Dec. 4). She outperformed Duke's Lisa Leslie Award candidate Jade Williams, limiting Williams to seven points, two rebounds and no blocks.



(#3) Hannah Whitish, 5-9, Sr., Guard

- Cain produced double figures with 10 points, five rebounds, a block, an assist and a steal in Nebraska's win over USC (Nov. 29).

- She had 13 points, five rebounds, four blocks and a season-high three assists in a win over Morgan State (Nov. 14).

- Cain set the Nebraska season block record with 100 as a freshman. She finished No. 8 nationally in total blocks, and No. 7 in NCAA D-I and No. 1 in the Big Ten with 3.1 blocks per game in 2017-18.

- She set the Nebraska sophomore block record with 79 in 2018-19. She played 144 fewer minutes as a sophomore than she did as a freshman, primarily because of NU's deeper bench.

- Cain set the Husker single-game block record while also posting the first points (22), rebounds (14) and blocked shots (11) triple-double in school history in a win over Florida Atlantic (Dec. 19, 2017).

- She became just the sixth player in Big Ten Conference history to record 11 or more blocks and just the 10th Big Ten player to notch double-digit blocks in a single game.

- Cain's 22 points against Florida Atlantic were also a career high, and her three assists against the Owls also tied a career best.

- She owns 34 double-figure scoring efforts, 13 double-figure rebounding games and one double-digit block game in the first 81 games of her career. She has made 80 straight starts.

- Cain owns 41 games (9, 2019-20; 17, 2018-19; 15, 2017-18) with three or more blocks in her career. She has recorded five or more blocks 10 times - Clemson (6, Nov. 30, 2017), Kansas (5, Dec. 6, 2017), FAU (11, Dec. 19, 2017), Northwestern (5, Jan. 7, 2018), Iowa (5, Jan. 16, 2018), Maryland (Jan. 8, 2019), Michigan State (7, Feb. 17, 2019), Alabama A&M (8, Nov. 6, 2019) and Minnesota (6, Jan. 4, 2020).

- Cain was the only player to capture spots on both the Big Ten All-Freshman Team and Big Ten All-Defensive Team in 2017-18. Both five-player teams were chosen by the league coaches.

- She captured four Big Ten Freshman-of-the-Week awards (Nov. 13, Dec. 4, Dec. 11, Dec. 26) during the 2017-18 non-conference.

- Cain's 56.6 field goal percentage ranked as the second-best mark by a freshman in school history.

- Her 223 rebounds ranked fourth among freshmen in Husker history, and was the sixth NU freshman with 200 boards. She is the only Husker freshman to record 300 points, 200 rebounds and 100 blocks.

ELIELY PREPARED FOR BIG SENIOR SEASON

- One of the top overall defenders in the Big Ten Conference, Nicea Eliely is showing her all-around game at a higher level in 2019-20.

- Nebraska's defensive MVP in both 2017 and 2019, Eliely led the Huskers with a career-high 54 steals in her third year as a starter in 2018-19. She ranked among the top five players in the Big Ten with 1.8 steals per game last season.

- She needs 35 steals to join the top 10 in Husker history in that category.

- Eliely's 104 career starts at Nebraska are the most by any current Husker. She has started 75 consecutive games, which trails only Kate Cain's 80 straight starts among the Huskers.

- Eliely is one of only 12 players in Nebraska history to reach the combined career milestones of 800 points (878), 400 rebounds (417) and 200 assists (235).

- Over the last four games, Eliely is averaging 13.5 points per game while hitting 8-of-11 threes (.727) and all 10 of her free throws. Through the first 15 games, she averaged 8.3 points while going 4-for-29 from three (.138) and 25-of-38 (.658) at the line.

- Through 19 games, Eliely is averaging 9.4 points, 4.2 rebounds, 2.6 assists and 1.1 steals.

- Eliely tied her career high with 19 points at Maryland (Jan. 16). She hit 6-of-10 shots from the field, including both of her three-point attempts and all five free throws.

- She set her career high with 19 points as a freshman against Cal (Dec. 4, 2016). She scored a season-high 18 points as a junior against No. 7 Maryland (Feb. 14, 2019).

- She owns 38 career double-figure scoring efforts, including 15 points, five rebounds, three assists and two steals against Purdue (Jan. 22).

- Eliely added 14 points on 5-of-6 shooting at Michigan State (Dec. 31). She also had 11 points and three second-half three-pointers in Nebraska's comeback win over Michigan (Jan. 19).

- She had 13 points in a win over SIUE (Nov. 17), 12 points in wins over Iowa (Dec. 28), USC (Nov. 29) and Morgan State (Nov. 14) and 10 in a 90-85 overtime win at Missouri (Nov. 10).

- Sophomore Sam Haiby leads the Huskers in scoring (12.1 ppg), assists (4.0 apg) and steals (1.9 spg) in Big Ten play. She has hit 52.2 percent (12-23) of her threes in league action.
- Haiby erupted for a career-high 28 points on 11-of-19 shooting to power Nebraska to a 90-85 OT win at Missouri (Nov. 10). She tied a career high with three threes against the Tigers, including the game-tying triple with three seconds left to send the game to OT tied at 76. She scored NU's first eight points and added 18 points after halftime, including two free throws with 13.3 seconds left to seal the win.
- Haiby helped the Huskers go 2-0 in her first week as a starter by leading Nebraska with 18.0 points per game to earn a spot on the Big Ten Weekly Honor Roll (Nov. 11).
- She added her second 20-point game of the year and third of her career with 20 points and a career-high four steals in a win over Oral Roberts (Dec. 14). She earned her second Big Ten Weekly Honor Roll selection (Dec. 16) this season.
- Haiby had 19 points at Michigan State (Dec. 31), when she had 15 points on 6-of-6 shooting in the first half.
- She pumped in 18 points, including 3-of-4 threes and 5-of-6 free throws in a win over Michigan (Jan. 19). She also had four assists against the Wolverines.

- Haiby added 17 points and a career-high eight boards in a win over No. 24 Minnesota (Jan. 4).
- She had 11 points and a season-high seven assists to go with three steals, three rebounds and a block in a win over Wisconsin (Jan. 9).
- Haiby produced 17 points, seven rebounds and four assists against Creighton (Nov. 24).
- She managed 10 points while leading the Huskers in rebounds (6), assists (5) and steals (3) while adding a block against Purdue (Jan. 22).
- Haiby had 10 points and six assists in a win over Manhattan (Dec. 22), and 10 points in wins over Iowa (Dec. 28) and Southern (Nov. 20). She has 11 double-figure scoring efforts overall this season.
- She opened the season with her first career start in a win over Alabama A&M (Nov. 6). She scored eight points against the Bulldogs, Morgan State (Nov. 14) and SIUE (Nov. 17).
- Haiby finished her freshman season as Nebraska's second-leading scorer with 10.0 points per game while coming off the bench in all 30 contests in 2018-19.
- Haiby scored a season-high 20 points early in her freshman season at Washington State. All 20 came after halftime for the Huskers.
- She was named the Big Ten Freshman of the Week (Feb. 4, 2019) after scoring her then-Big Ten-best with 17 points against Indiana (Feb. 3, 2019), which followed a 13-point effort in a road win at Purdue (Jan. 31, 2019).
- Haiby produced double figures in each of Nebraska's final four games of 2018-19. For the season, she finished in double figures 15 times. She owns 26 double-digit scoring efforts in her career, including 11 as a sophomore in 2019-20.
- She ranked second among the Huskers with 78 assists (2.6 apg) as a freshman.
- Haiby led the Huskers in free throws made (76) and attempted (106) in 2018-19.

BROWN BATTLING FOR BIG TEN SIXTH PLAYER AWARD

- Leigha Brown is a leading contender for Big Ten Sixth Player of the Year honors early in the 2019-20 season.
- Through 19 games, the 6-1 guard/forward from Auburn, Ind., leads the Huskers in scoring with 13.3 points per game, while adding 3.4 rebounds and 1.8 assists off the bench.
- Brown is the only player among the top 30 scorers in the Big Ten who has not started a game this year. The only other non-starter among the league's top 30 scorers is Indiana freshman post Mackenzie Holmes, who is averaging 11.8 points per game. Holmes has made a pair of starts.
- Brown leads the Huskers in free throws made (75) and attempted (97) while shooting 77.3 percent at the line. Nebraska has not had a guard make more than 76 free throws since 2013 WNBA first-round draft pick Lindsey Moore in 2012-13 (121-150, .807).

- Brown erupted for a season-high 25 points to go along with five rebounds and four assists in the win over Manhattan (Dec. 22). Brown tied her career high with four three-pointers against the Jaspers. She had 18 points in the first half.

- Brown went off for 24 points while grabbing five rebounds to play a major role in Nebraska's 90-85 OT win at Missouri (Nov. 10). She scored 18 points after halftime to help the Huskers, and she added a huge assist on Sam Haiby's game-tying three-pointer to send the contest to overtime.

- She led Nebraska with 19 points, including 15 in the second half, at No. 20 Maryland (Jan. 16). She hit 6-of-9 shots from the field including both of her three-point attempts while going 5-of-6 at the free throw line against the Terps.

- Brown added a game-high 16 points while tying her career high with five assists in a win over Morgan State (Nov. 14). She scored 16 more in a win over Southern (Nov. 20), while pitching in four rebounds and three assists, before contributing 16 again in NU's win over USC (Nov. 29).

- She scored 15 points, including eight straight in the first quarter to turn a 10-5 Nebraska deficit into a 13-10 lead against Wisconsin (Jan. 9). She added 15 points in Nebraska's win over Oral Roberts (Dec. 15) and had 14 points and four rebounds against Creighton (Nov. 24).

- She scored 12 points including a pair of threes in a win over SIUE (Nov. 17).

- Brown has scored 10 points on five occasions, including back-to-back games against Michigan (Jan. 19) and Purdue (Jan. 22). She opened her sophomore season with 10 points and a career-high seven rebounds in a win over Alabama A&M (Nov. 6). She opened Big Ten play with 10 points, six rebounds, two assists and a steal in a win over Iowa (Dec. 28), before adding 10 points, three rebounds and three assists at Michigan State (Dec. 31).

- She owns 15 double-figure efforts on the year, including eight games with 15 or more points.

- Brown ranked second among the Huskers in scoring during Big Ten play last season with 10.2 points per game to finish the year with averages of 9.6 points, 2.6 rebounds and 1.5 assists.

- She showed her explosiveness several times as a freshman, including a career-high 30-point outburst in a win over Purdue at Pinnacle Bank Arena (Feb. 10, 2019). She scored 22 in the second half against the Boilermakers to earn a spot on the Big Ten Weekly Honor Roll (Feb. 11, 2019).

- Brown had 20 points at NCAA Elite Eight qualifier Iowa (Jan. 3, 2019), which followed a 19-point effort in a win at Ohio State (Dec. 31, 2018). Those two performances earned Brown Big Ten Freshman-of-the-Week honors (Jan. 7, 2019).

- Brown started Nebraska's final six games of 2018-19 after coming off the bench the first 24.

- She owns 27 double-figure scoring efforts in her career (15, 2019-20; 12, 2018-19), including four 20-point games.

- During a three-game European Tour in August of 2019, Brown led the Huskers by averaging 19.7 points per game in wins over teams from Italy and Spain.

- Ashtyn Veerbeek has worked hard to make greater contributions for the Huskers in 2019-20.

- The 6-2, sophomore, forward from Sioux Center, Iowa, has proven herself as one of the hardest working Huskers, claiming the team's 2019 Lifter-of-the-Year Award as a freshman.

- Through 18 games as a starter this season, Veerbeek has provided a consistent presence inside, averaging 8.4 points and 4.9 rebounds to go along with 1.3 assists per game. She is shooting 47.7 percent from the field, including 38.5 percent (15-39) from three-point range and 73.2 percent (30-41) from the free throw line.

- Veerbeek has already produced more three-pointers (15-11), assists (23-18) and steals (12-9) than she did all last season for the Huskers from her power forward spot.

- She put up a season-high-tying 14 points at Rutgers (Jan. 12) when she set a career high by connecting on 4-of-7 three-pointers. She added five boards and three assists.

- She had 1,076 points, 372 rebounds, 383 assists and 107 steals in 89 games with 87 starts at FIU. She averaged 14.5 points and 4.5 rebounds per game as a senior in 2017-18.

- Hudson ranks 11th in points (1,109) and fifth in assists (398) among active Big Ten players.

• Isabelle Bourne is averaging 5.4 points and 4.8 rebounds through the first 19 games of her college career, including career highs with 11 points, eight rebounds, two blocks and 24 minutes in a win over Wisconsin (Jan. 9).

• She followed with nine points and a career-high-tying eight rebounds at Rutgers (Jan. 12).

• Over the last five games, Bourne is averaging 8.0 points and 5.4 rebounds. She had eight points, all in the second half, and four rebounds at No. 20 Maryland (Jan. 16).

• Bourne played big in Nebraska's big games early in her career, including then-career highs of eight points and seven rebounds in a Big Ten-opening win over Iowa (Dec. 28). • Bourne averaged 8.4 points, 5.1 rebounds and 1.1 assists in 23.1 minutes for the Gems.

• In 2017, Bourne led Australia's U17 team to gold at the Oceania Championship in Guam by averaging 19 points, 9.8 rebounds and 2.6 assists to claim a spot on the all-tournament team.

• She was also the MVP of the 2017 FIBA Under-18 Asia Cup 3-on-3 tournament in Mongolia, leading her team to another gold medal. Bourne was also named to the Gems squad for the 2018 FIBA Under-18 Asian Championships.

• Bourne trained at the Australian Institute of Sport and Basketball Australia's Centre of Excellence. She was a developmental player in the University of Canberra Capitals program.

• Issie's sister, Callie, is a sophomore at Idaho State. Callie, a 5-9 guard, led ISU in scoring (12.5 ppg) and rebounding (7.5 rpg) to go along with 1.8 assists and 1.2 steals through 15 games this season for the Bengals. She had a career-high 26 points in a win at Weber State (Jan. 16). Last season, she averaged 4.1 points and 3.6 rebounds while starting 20 games. Their older sister, Emma, plays in the Canberra Capitals Academy.

• Brady put together the most productive game of her young career with seven points on 2-for-2 three-point shooting in just nine minutes off the bench at Rutgers (Jan. 12). She is averaging 2.1 points and 1.4 rebounds through eight games.

• She contributed three points, two assists and a steal in the Big Ten-opening win over Iowa (Dec. 28). Brady's first career three-pointer gave Nebraska a 30-27 second-quarter lead early in a 14-5 surge that put the Huskers in control the rest of the game.

- She led Lawrence North to a 20-4 record and produced several huge individual efforts as a junior in 2017-18, including a 38-point performance against Tindley, 30 points in a win over Pike and 28 points against nationally ranked North Central.

- As a sophomore, Brady averaged 15 points and 7.5 rebounds per game for Lawrence North, after averaging 7.2 points and 6.0 rebounds as a freshman.

HELMS NOT AFRAID TO TAKE CHARGE

- Makenzie Helms made her collegiate debut by dishing out an assist in three minutes of action off the bench in Nebraska's season-opening win over Alabama A&M (Nov. 6).

- She returned to action to play a career-high eight minutes, getting the first points (2) and rebounds (2) of her career in a win over Sacred Heart (Nov. 30) at the South Point Shootout in Las Vegas.

- Helms captured Gatorade Connecticut High School Player-of-the-Year honors by averaging 26.5 points, 7.4 rebounds, 6.6 assists and 4.3 steals while leading the East Haven Yellowjackets to the Southern Connecticut Conference title in 2018-19.

- Helms, who was the conference player of the year, led East Haven to a 20-5 overall record and a spot in the Connecticut Class L state quarterfinals.

- She was the first commitment to Nebraska's 2018-19 class, making her intentions known in January of 2018. Her commitment followed a junior season in 2017-18 in which Helms averaged 17.5 points, 5.0 rebounds, 7.2 assists and 4.0 steals per game. East Haven finished No. 3 in the state of Connecticut with a 25-3 record in 2017-18. Helms earned first-team all-state honors and was a USA Today first-team All-Connecticut selection.

- As a sophomore, Helms averaged 16.7 points, 5.0 rebounds, 6.0 assists and 4.0 steals at the Loomis Chaffee School. She earned All-New England accolades as both a freshman and sophomore.

- She played her summer basketball for New Heights NYC, averaging 20 points, six rebounds, eight assists and five steals. ESPN ranked her as the No. 27 point guard in the class of 2019.

2019-20 SCHEDULE KEEPS HUSKERS HOME MORE

- Last season, Nebraska played just 14 regular-season games at home at Pinnacle Bank Arena, including just five non-conference contests. In 2019-20, the Huskers will play 17 regular-season home games in Lincoln, including eight non-conference games.

- As a team, the Huskers will shoot to "Bring IT" from start-to-finish, beginning with their 97-33 exhibition win over Rogers State at Pinnacle Bank Arena (Nov. 2). Rogers State provided Coach Williams with her first head coaching job, and the Oklahoma school currently features former Husker Jasmine Cincore as an assistant coach.

- The Big Red opened regular-season play against a former Husker when Coach Margaret Richards and Alabama A&M came to Lincoln. Richards, who played for coaches Paul Sanderford and Connie Yori at Nebraska as a four-year letterwinner (2001-04). The Huskers battled to a 68-46 win over the Bulldogs in front of 5,250 fans on Wednesday (Nov. 6) at noon inside Pinnacle Bank Arena - the third-largest season-opening crowd in school history.

- The game with Alabama A&M was preceded by the Nebraska Life Skills Sportsmanship Pep Rally on the court at Pinnacle Bank Arena, which began at 9:30 a.m. and featured nearly 2,000 students and sponsors from 27 school districts across Nebraska.

- The Huskers made their first road trip a successful one by beating 2019 NCAA Tournament qualifier Missouri 90-85 in overtime at Mizzou Arena (Nov. 10).

- Nebraska returned home to tip a four-game stand featuring Morgan State (Nov. 14), SIUE (Nov. 17), Southern (Nov. 20) and Creighton (Nov. 24). The game with SIUE was part of Alumni Weekend, when the Huskers honored members of the 2010 Big 12 Champion and NCAA Sweet 16 team on the 10th anniversary of their undefeated regular season in 2009-10.

- The Huskers spent Thanksgiving in Las Vegas at the South Point Shootout, where they defeated USC (Nov. 29) and Sacred Heart (Nov. 30).

- Nebraska returned to Pinnacle Bank Arena to take on perennial power Duke in the Big Ten/ACC Challenge (Dec. 4), knocking off the Blue Devils, 83-79.

- Nebraska rolled to a 77-67 win over Oral Roberts (Dec. 14) before closing the non-conference season with a 71-51 win over Manhattan (Dec. 22).

- The Huskers closed a four-game home stand by opening Big Ten play with a 78-69 win at home over defending Big Ten Tournament champion and NCAA Elite Eight qualifier Iowa (Dec. 28).

- The game with Iowa tipped off an 18-game conference schedule that includes home battles with Minnesota (Jan. 4), Wisconsin (Jan. 9), Michigan (Jan. 19), Purdue (Jan. 22), Ohio State (Feb. 2), Indiana (Feb. 9), Penn State (Feb. 13) and Illinois (Feb. 22).

- The Huskers opened their nine-game Big Ten road schedule at Michigan State (Dec. 31), followed by road trips to Rutgers (Jan. 12), Maryland (Jan. 16), Wisconsin (Jan. 25), Minnesota (Jan. 30), Iowa (Feb. 6), Northwestern (Feb. 16), Ohio State (Feb. 19) and Indiana (Feb. 27).

- The Big Ten Tournament returns to Bankers Life Fieldhouse in Indianapolis (March 4-8), before the NCAA Tournament Selection Show reveals the 64-team field on March 16.

- NCAA first and second rounds will be held March 20-23, before Regionals are held in Dallas, Texas, Fort Wayne, Ind., Greenville, S.C., and Portland, Ore., March 27-30. The NCAA Women's Final Four will take place at the Smoothie King Center in New Orleans, April 3-5.

NEBRASKA'S HISTORY OF HOME SUCCESS

- Nebraska is 11-1 on its home court at Pinnacle Bank Arena early in 2019-20.
- The Huskers went 15-4 at Pinnacle Bank Arena in 2015-16 after going 12-3 (13-3 at home) in 2014-15. The Huskers are 79-31 (.718) all-time at Pinnacle Bank Arena since the building opened for the 2013-14 campaign. The Big Red went 16-2 at home in 2013-14, suffering their only Big Ten loss to Purdue, 77-75, on Jan. 19, 2014. NU's 16 home wins in 2013-14 tied the school record for single-season home victories.
- The Huskers played the first regular-season game in arena history against USA Today No. 25 UCLA (Nov. 8, 2013) and rolled to a 77-49 win over the Bruins. NU's first win over an AP Top 25 team came with a 76-56 win over No. 24 Michigan State on Feb. 8, 2014. The Huskers added their first-ever win over an AP Top 10 team at the arena with a 94-74 victory over No. 8 Penn State on Feb. 24, 2014.
- NU won its first-ever Big Ten home game at Pinnacle Bank Arena with a 66-65 thriller over Northwestern Jan. 2, 2014, before an 88-85 win over Minnesota on Jan. 16, 2014, marked the first overtime game.
- NU suffered its first loss at the arena to Washington State (76-72) on Nov. 30, 2013.
- The Huskers are 43-3 all-time in home season openers, following a 68-46 win over Alabama A&M on Nov. 6, 2019. Nebraska had its streak of 12 consecutive season-opening wins snapped with an 83-77 loss to Missouri Valley Conference champion Drake on Nov. 7, 2018.
- The Huskers are 468-161 (.744) all-time at home. The Huskers have gone 204-65 (.758) over the last 17 seasons (including 2019-20), posting double-figure home victory totals 15 times.
- Nebraska played in the Devaney Center from 1976-77 through 2012-13, and added one appearance at Devaney against Utah on Nov. 23, 2014. The Huskers own a 389-130 record at the Devaney Center, including 146-88 (.624) mark in conference play.

NEBRASKA RANKS NEAR TOP IN ATTENDANCE

- Nebraska ranked No. 22 nationally with an average home attendance of 4,101 at Pinnacle Bank Arena in 2018-19. It marked the 10th consecutive year that the Huskers have ranked in the top 25 nationally in average home attendance.
- Nebraska has ranked among the top 25 nationally in average home attendance in each of its first six seasons inside Pinnacle Bank Arena.
- The Huskers opened the 2019-20 season with 5,250 fans at Pinnacle Bank Arena for a Wednesday, noon tip against Alabama A&M on Nov. 6. Nebraska hosted a Life Skills Sportsmanship Pep Rally prior to the game, which included nearly 2,000 students and sponsors from 27 school districts around the Cornhusker State. It was the third-largest opening day crowd in Husker history.
- In 111 all-time home games at Pinnacle Bank Arena, the Huskers own a 79-32 record (.712 winning percentage) while averaging 5,066 fans per game (562,312 total fans/111 games).
- Nebraska attracted a Pinnacle Bank Arena non-conference record crowd of 9,750 to open its stay in the arena with a win over UCLA on Nov. 8, 2013.
- Nebraska set its all-time single-game record with a sellout crowd of 13,595 fans against Missouri at the Devaney Center on Feb. 27, 2010. NU drew 10 straight crowds of more than 10,000 fans at the Devaney Center in 2009-10.
- Nebraska produced its top attendance season in school history by ranking No. 7 nationally with a record 7,390 fans per game at the Bob Devaney Sports Center in 2009-10. The Huskers went 16-0 at the Devaney Center on their way to a perfect 29-0 record, a Big 12 title and a No. 1 seed in the NCAA Tournament.

NEBRASKA SETS PACE IN ALL-SPORT ATTENDANCE

- Nebraska Athletics has long been one of the biggest in-person attractions in all of college sports. Among its seven major team sports (football, men's and women's basketball, volleyball, women's soccer, baseball and softball) the Huskers ranked No. 3 in the nation in 2018-19 with nearly 1.235 million fans attending Nebraska events.
- In NCAA Division I women's attendance, combining the sports of women's basketball, volleyball, softball and soccer, Nebraska ranked No. 2 nationally last year with a combined 251,429 fans at its home events across those four sports. Only South Carolina attracted more fans (259,439) at home.
- In fall and winter sports combined (football, volleyball, soccer, men's and women's basketball) Nebraska also ranked No. 2 in the nation with 1.139 million fans, trailing only Tennessee's 1.159 million.
- Nebraska baseball ranked No. 9 in the nation in average home attendance (4,426), while football (89,034) and men's basketball (15,341) both ranked No. 10 nationally. The Nebraska wrestling team also ranked No. 11 in the country (2,231). Husker volleyball led the nation in average home attendance (8,205), while soccer ranked No. 21 (1,029) and women's basketball (4,101) ranked No. 22.

HUSKER SPORTS NETWORK COVERS WORLD

The Husker Sports Network is in its 26th season producing and marketing the live broadcasts of Nebraska women's basketball in 2019-20. Women's basketball play-by-play announcer Matt Coatney and color commentator Jeff Griesch will team up for their 19th season as the Husker broadcast team. The Husker Sports Network and Nebraska women's basketball have teamed up for nearly two decades to take every game, home and away, around the world for free on Huskers.com. In addition to carrying every women's basketball game free on Huskers.com, the Husker Sports Network flagship stations B107.3 FM-KBBK (Lincoln) and ESPN 590 AM-KXSP (Omaha) provide strong signals for Husker women's basketball. When a network conflict occurs in Omaha, the Huskers also

- Nebraska was 1-1 in overtime in 2016-17, including a 76-74 win over Michigan State at Pinnacle Bank Arena to close the regular season (Feb. 26, 2017). The Huskers lost 79-69 in OT to Minnesota at the arena (Feb. 4, 2017).
- The Huskers are 3-4 in overtime games under Coach Amy Williams.
- Nebraska is 2-2 in overtime games at Pinnacle Bank Arena.
- Nebraska is 5-2 in multi-overtime games with its most recent loss coming in the 87-84 2OT setback at Washington State (Nov. 16, 2018) in Pullman. NU's only other loss in a multi-overtime game came to Purdue in the 2012 Big Ten Championship Game, 74-70 in double-overtime.
- The Huskers defeated Minnesota 88-85 in overtime on Jan. 16, 2014. It marked the first overtime game in the history of Pinnacle Bank Arena. Nebraska's first overtime game in the history of the Bob Devaney Sports Center also came against Minnesota - a 68-67 win for the Huskers on Dec. 30, 1977.
- The Huskers have played 14 all-time overtime games against Big Ten opponents and own a 5-9 record. NU is 4-6 against Big Ten opponents in OT since joining the conference in 2011-12.
- Nebraska played its fourth OT game in 73 meetings with Missouri in a 90-85 OT win at Mizzou Arena (Nov. 10, 2019). All four OT games against the Tigers were settled in a single overtime period.
- Nebraska's next most frequent overtime opponents are Big Ten foes Purdue, Minnesota and Wisconsin. The Huskers and Purdue have played three overtime games in 14 all-time meetings. NU's six total overtimes against Purdue are the most against any team in school history.
- The Huskers also have played three overtime games against Minnesota (22 games), including two of the three overtime games in Pinnacle Bank Arena history.
- In 16 all-time games with Wisconsin the Huskers have played three overtime contests.
- Nebraska has never played back-to-back overtime games at home. The Huskers have played back-to-back overtime games only once in school history, an 83-81 loss to Texas A&M in College Station on Dec. 30, 1985, before returning to Lincoln for an 80-75 win over Eastern Kentucky at the Devaney Center on Jan. 2, 1986.

NEBRASKA POSTS 15TH STRAIGHT PERFECT GSR

In the eyes of the NCAA's Division I Graduation Success Rate (GSR), the Husker women's basketball program has been perfect for 15 consecutive years. Nebraska is the only program among the 14 Big Ten Conference schools to accomplish the perfect score for 15 straight seasons.

The NCAA announced the release of its annual Graduation Success Rate report on Oct. 16, 2019, and Nebraska was a national leader in women's basketball for the 15th straight season, dating back to the initial public tracking of the GSR since 2004-05.

The Nebraska women's basketball program joins the Husker women's tennis and volleyball programs as Husker teams that have produced perfect 100 percent rates each of the last 15 years.

Nebraska was one of just 28 teams in the 64-team field of the 2018 NCAA Tournament to also boast a 100 percent Graduation Success Rate.

Overall, the Nebraska Athletic Department produced a record-high GSR for the seventh consecutive year, reaching 93 percent. A total of 10 Husker programs recorded perfect 100 percent GSR scores, including women's basketball, volleyball, softball, soccer, swimming and diving, rifle, men's and women's gymnastics and men's and women's tennis.

Game Highlights: Nebraska overcame a 21-point second-quarter deficit to take a four-point lead midway through the fourth period, but Purdue executed down the stretch to escape with a 76-68 win over the Huskers at Pinnacle Bank Arena. Nebraska struggled through its worst first quarter of the season, trailing 26-13 after the first 10 minutes, then fell behind 39-18 with 5:21 left in the first half. The Huskers rallied with an 11-0 run to close the half and cut the Purdue margin to 39-29. The Boilermakers pushed the lead back to 13 points midway through the third, before Nebraska closed on a 9-0 run to cut the margin to 54-50 heading to the fourth. NU took its first lead on a Leigha Brown shot that made it 58-56 with 5:48 left. After Purdue briefly regained the lead on a Karissa McLaughlin three, Nicea Eliely scored five straight points to give NU a 63-59 edge with 4:30 left. But Purdue erupted on an 11-0 run over the next three minutes to secure the win. Eliely led Nebraska with 15 points, while Ashtyn Veerbeek added 13. Ae'Rianna Harris led all scorers with 25 points on 10-of-12 shooting while adding a game-high nine rebounds. McLaughlin finished with 19 points, while Dominique Oden added 14 points for the Boilermakers.

5-8 Freshman Guard East Haven, Connecticut (East Haven)

26.5 points, 7.4 rebounds, 6.6 assists and 4.3 steals while leading the East Haven Yellowjackets to the Southern Connecticut Conference title.

Helms, who was the conference player of the year, led East Haven to a 20-5 overall record and a spot in the Connecticut Class L state quarterfinals.

She was the first commitment to Nebraska's 2018-19 class, making her intentions known in January of 2018. Her commitment followed a junior season in 2017-18 in which Helms averaged 17.5 points, 5.0 rebounds, 7.2 assists and 4.0 steals per game. East Haven finished No. 3 in the state of Connecticut with a 25-3 record in 2017-18. Helms earned first-team all-state honors and was a USA Today first-team All-Connecticut selection.

As a sophomore, Helms averaged 16.7 points, 5.0 rebounds, 6.0 assists and 4.0 steals at the Loomis Chaffee School. She earned All-New England accolades as both a freshman and sophomore.

She played her summer basketball for New Heights NYC for Coach Rock Rosa, averaging 20 points, six rebounds, eight assists and five steals per contest. ESPN ranked her as the No. 27 point guard in the class of 2019.

The Lady Hawks finished the season No. 18 in the final USA Today Super 25 rankings with a 22-3 overall record. Hamilton Heights Christian Academy fell to Riverdale Baptist in the NACA Championships.

Brady competed for Lawrence North High School in Indianapolis her first three seasons.

As a junior, Brady averaged 21.0 points, 8.5 rebounds and 4.0 assists to earn a spot on the IBCA Subway Supreme 15 Underclass All-State Team. She was also a member of the Indiana Junior All-Star Team and the Central Indiana Super Team.

FRESHMAN (2019-20)

Trinity Brady brings strength and versatility to Nebraska's backcourt as a freshman in 2019-20. One of the top high school players in Indiana in 2017-18, the 5-11 Brady completed her prep career at Hamilton Heights Christian Academy in Tennessee.

Brady missed Nebraska's first 10 games as part of the concussion protocol, before making her regular-season debut in the win over Manhattan (Dec. 22). Brady played strong defense while recording two points, four rebounds, an assist and a block in 16 minutes off the bench against the Jaspers. She hit the first three-pointer of her career and added two assists and her first career steal in the win over Iowa (Dec. 28). Brady's three gave Nebraska a 30-27 second-quarter lead, and the Huskers led the rest of the way.

She sparked a 10-0 first-quarter run at Michigan State with two points, two steals and two rebounds to help Nebraska lead for much of the game against the Spartans before falling in OT on New Year's Eve in East Lansing.

Brady scored a career-high seven points and knocked down a career-best two threes while adding two rebounds in nine minutes off the bench at Rutgers (Jan. 12).

Brady scored eight points and had eight rebounds in an exhibition win over Rogers State (Nov. 2). An opponent fell on Brady inside the paint late in the game, contacting her head and shoulder area.

Nebraska Coach Amy Williams said Brady's skill, work ethic and high basketball IQ could make her a strong contributor to the future of the Husker program.

"Our coaching staff has been very impressed with Trinity's coachability and how quickly she picks things up," Williams said. "She is already one of our better help-defenders, and she is

JUNIOR (2018-19)

Whitish was honorable-mention All-Big Ten after leading the Huskers with 10.1 points and 4.3 assists per game. She added 2.9 rebounds and 1.0 steal. She knocked down a team-best 65 threes on the year to climb to third on Nebraska's career list with 195. She moved to No. 9 on NU's career assist chart with 363.

Whitish led the Huskers with 17 double-figure scoring efforts in 2018-19, pushing her career total to 48. She scored a season-high 28 points to go along with a career-high 12 assists for her first career double-double in a win at Purdue (Jan. 31). She tied her career best with six threes.

Whitish had 19 in a win at Northwestern (Feb. 21), which followed 16 points in a win over No. 24 Michigan State (Feb. 17) and against Indiana (Feb. 3). She had 15 at No. 5 Louisville (Nov. 29) and scored 14 at No. 19 Iowa (Jan. 3). She also had 13 points at No. 24 Miami (Nov. 23) and at Michigan (Feb. 7).

She scored 12 points in four straight games (at Illinois, Jan. 17; No. 23 Minnesota, Jan. 20; Northwestern, Jan. 24; at Wisconsin, Jan. 27).

SOPHOMORE (2017-18)

Whitish earned second-team All-Big Ten honors and was named Nebraska's offensive MVP after leading the Huskers in scoring (12.6 ppg), assists (4.7 apg), steals (1.3 spg) and three-point shooting (2.3 pg) in 2017-18. She was the only Husker to start all 32 games on the year.

Whitish was a major catalyst in Nebraska's huge team turnaround from a 7-22 season in 2016-17 to a 21-11 campaign in 2017-18. Nebraska's 14-game improvement tied for the largest increase in victories in NCAA Division I women's basketball in 2017-18.

Her 73 made threes marked the third-best total by a sophomore in school history.

Whitish dished out 150 assists, which tied for the fifth-best total by a sophomore in NU history. She ranked among Big Ten leaders with 4.7 assists per game, and she carried nearly a 2-to-1 assist to turnover ratio (150-77).

Whitish erupted for a career-high 29 points, including 25 in the second half, to lead Nebraska to a road win at Kansas (Dec. 6). She added 29

points, six rebounds and six assists in an 89-84 2OT win at Drake (Dec. 9) to earn Big Ten Player-of-the-Week honors (Dec. 11).

Whitish scored in double figures 18 times, including 20-point performances on the season.

FRESHMAN (2016-17)

Whitish finished with averages of 9.0 points, 2.5 rebounds, a team-best 2.9 assists. She led the Huskers with 57 threes, which ranked as the second-best total by a freshman in Nebraska history. Whitish's 40.7 three-point percentage was a freshman school record.

Whitish started all 16 Big Ten regular-season games and the Big Ten Tournament. She played in all 29 games with 17 starts, scoring in double figures 13 times, including 10 double-digit efforts in 16 regular-season conference games.

SENIOR (2019-20)

A two-time All-Big Ten selection, Hannah Whitish (pronounced WHITE-ish) is working to lead Nebraska back to the NCAA Tournament.

The 5-9 guard from Barneveld, Wis., became Nebraska's 33rd 1,000-point scorer during an eight-point effort in a win over Southern (Nov. 20). She added five rebounds and five assists.

Whitish has climbed to No. 7 on NU's career assist chart (432). She is the first Husker in history to reach combined career milestones of 1,000 points, 400 assists and 200 three-pointers.

She became just the third Husker in history to reach 200 career threes with her first three-pointer in a win at Missouri (Nov. 10), and has since moved her career total to 238.

Whitish is averaging 9.1 points, 3.3 rebounds, 3.6 assists and 1.1 steals. She had a season-high 20 points and a career-high-tying six threes in a win over Michigan (Jan. 19). She had 17 points in a win over No. 24 Minnesota (Jan. 4). She had 15 points in a win over Sacred Heart (Nov. 30).

Whitish had 12 points, seven rebounds, five assists and a career-high-tying four steals while drawing several charges in a 90-85 OT win at Missouri. She had 12 points in a win over Alabama A&M (Nov. 6). She hit 4-of-6 threes against the Bulldogs. Whitish had 10 points and six assists in a win over Duke (Dec. 4), before notching 11 points in a win over Iowa (Dec. 28).

She added eight points and a career-high nine rebounds in a win over SIUE (Nov. 17).

After an impressive freshman season, Sam Haiby (pronounced HY-bee) is looking to take her a game to a higher level in 2019-20.

The 5-9 sophomore guard from Moorhead, Minn., ranks second overall among the Huskers in scoring (11.3 ppg) and assists (3.4 apg), while leading the Huskers in steals (1.5 spg).

She erupted for a career-high 28 points, including a career-high-tying three threes, in a 90-85 OT win at Missouri (Nov. 10). Her third three came with three seconds left to send the game to overtime. She added the final field goal and two free throws with 13.3 seconds left in OT to seal the win.

Haiby produced her second 20-point game of the season with 20 points, five rebounds and a career-high four steals in a win over ORU (Dec. 14). She had 19 points, four rebounds, three assists and three steals at Michigan State (Dec. 31). Haiby pitched in 18 points and tied her career high with three threes in a win over Michigan (Jan. 19). She added 17 points, a career-high eight rebounds and three assists in a win over No. 24 Minnesota (Jan. 4). Haiby also had 17 points, seven rebounds and four assists against Creighton (Nov. 24). She produced 11 points, a season-high seven assists and three steals in a win over Wisconsin (Jan. 9).

Haiby opened Big Ten play with 10 points in a win over Iowa (Dec. 28). She also had 10 points and six assists in a win over Manhattan (Dec. 22). She had 10 points against Southern (Nov. 20) and Purdue (Jan. 22).

FRESHMAN (2018-19)

Haiby provided sparks off the bench in all 30 games throughout the season. Nebraska's

Fargo Shanley on Jan. 17, 2017. She was a first-team Minnesota Class 4A selection for Coach Jed Carlson at Moorhead.

Haiby played her club basketball alongside Husker teammate Kayla Mershon for North Tartan and Coach Gerard Coury. Haiby was a part of five consecutive Minnesota State AAU championships with North Tartan.

Haiby was a starting outfielder and pitcher on Moorhead High School's baseball team in the spring of 2017. She was the first pitcher to ever throw a pitch in U.S. Bank Stadium in Minneapolis, taking the mound for the Spuds against the Sartell Sabres at the home of the Minnesota Vikings and Super Bowl LII in the Twin Cities. She also became the first female in history to pitch a scoreless inning in a Minnesota High School boys baseball game in spring 2017.

PERSONAL

The daughter of Jay Haiby and Janet Haiby, Samantha Rae Brianna Haiby was born Sept. 25, 1999 in St. Louis, Mo. She has an older brother, Andrew. She has not declared a major, but she earned a spot on the Nebraska Scholar-Athlete Honor Roll in the fall of 2018. She was a member of the 2019 Tom Osborne Citizenship Team.

Haiby chose Nebraska over Minnesota, Arizona, Creighton, North Dakota State, South Dakota and South Dakota State.

BEFORE NEBRASKA

Haiby was ranked as the No. 122 player in the country by Prospects Nation and the No. 125 player in the nation by Blue Star. She was also ranked as the No. 28 guard in the country by ESPN.

She overcame an early season knee injury as a senior to average 25.1 points, 7.1 rebounds and 5.3 assists per game, including a monstrous 46-point performance in a 54-49 win over White Bear Lake on Dec. 10, 2017. It followed a 45-point effort in a win over Brainerd on Nov. 28. Haiby finished her high school career with more than 2,000 points. As a junior, she averaged 22.1 points, 7.6 rebounds, 4.4 assists and 4.1 steals, including a huge 44-point performance against

SENIOR (2019-20)

Nicea Eliely (pronounced ny-SEE-ah EE-ly-lee) has proven herself as one of the Big Ten's best defenders throughout her career.

The 6-1 senior from Colorado Springs, ranked among the top five players in the Big Ten in steals (1.8 spg), and her solid all-around game could place her in elite company in Husker history by the end of the season.

She is the 12th Husker in history to achieve the combined career milestones of 800 points (878), 400 rebounds (417) and 200 assists (235).

Through 19 games as a senior, Eliely is averaging 9.4 points, 4.2 rebounds, 2.6 assists, and 1.1 steals per game.

Eliely produced a career-high-tying 19 points at No. 20 Maryland (Jan. 16). She followed with 11 points, all in the second half, in Nebraska's comeback win over Michigan (Jan. 19). She added 15 points and five boards against Purdue (Jan. 22). Eliely produced her first career double-double with 12 points and a career-high 15 rebounds in a win over Morgan State (Nov. 14). She added her second double-double with 13 points, 10 boards, three assists, two blocks and four steals in a win over SIUE (Nov. 17).

Eliely scored 14 points on 5-of-6 shooting at Michigan State (Dec. 31). She had 12 points in a win over USC (Nov. 29), and 10 in a win at Missouri (Nov. 10). Eliely had a career-high seven assists to go with six points, three steals and two blocks in a win over ORU (Dec. 14). She opened Big Ten play with 12 points and five assists in a win over Iowa (Dec. 28).

JUNIOR (2018-19)

Eliely was one of Nebraska's top perimeter

defenders as a junior, ranking among the top five players in the Big Ten with 1.8 steals per game. Eliely, who joined Kate Cain as the only Huskers to start all 30 games in 2018-19, finished with 54 steals, the highest total by a Husker since All-American Lindsey Moore nabbed 60 (2012-13).

Eliely averaged 7.9 points while shooting career bests of 47.8 percent from the field and 80.7 percent from the free throw line. She added 3.8 rebounds and 2.1 assists per game.

She scored in double figures nine times, including a season-high 18 points at No. 7 Maryland (Feb. 14). She followed with 10 points and four steals in a win over No. 24 Michigan State (Feb. 17).

Eliely opened Big Ten play with 14 points in back-to-back wins over Michigan (Dec. 28) and at Ohio State (Dec. 31). She fueled fourth-quarter comebacks in both games combining for 24 points in the final periods.

She added five of her career-high six steals in the fourth quarter in NU's comeback win over No. 23 Minnesota (Jan. 20), helping the Huskers hold the Gophers without a field goal for the final six minutes.

Eliely also had 14 points in a win over Denver (Dec. 15). She had 12 points, five rebounds and five steals at Wisconsin (Jan. 27). She added 12 points at Purdue (Jan. 31).

Eliely scored 10 against Drake (Nov. 7) and at No. 24 Miami (Nov. 23). She had a season-high eight rebounds to go along with nine points at Creighton (Dec. 2). She matched the eight rebounds in a win over Kansas (Dec. 5), when she set a career high with four blocks.

SOPHOMORE (2017-18)

Eliely started NU's final 26 games after missing the first three contests of 2017-18 while recovering from an ankle injury that kept her off the court and out of practice for the month of October and the first part of November.

In 29 games, Eliely averaged 8.2 points, 4.0 rebounds, 1.7 assists and 1.2 steals. She also had 20 blocked shots on the season.

One of Nebraska's best defenders, she played a key role in helping Nebraska lead the Big Ten in both field goal percentage defense and three-point field goal percentage defense.

Eliely started all 29 games as a true freshman, averaging 7.7 points, 3.7 rebounds, 2.6 assists and a team-leading 1.6 steals per game.

She led the Huskers in both steals (46) and blocked shots (21).

after opening her Husker career with seven points and three assists against Drake (Nov. 7).

Hudson averaged 2.4 points, 1.6 rebounds and 1.1 assists through seven games, before undergoing season-ending foot surgery during Finals Week (Dec. 10-14).

JUNIOR (2017-18, FIU)

Hudson averaged 14.5 points, 4.5 rebounds and 4.7 assists as a junior for the Panthers in 2017-18. She was at her best during the final seven games of her junior season when she averaged 18.3 points, 4.3 rebounds, 6.0 assists and 1.7 steals in 37 minutes per game.

As a junior, Hudson produced 21 double-figure scoring efforts in 29 games, including nine 20-plus scoring efforts.

She recorded season highs with back-to-back 27-point performances while playing the full 40 minutes against North Dakota State (Dec. 20) and Clemson (Dec. 21).

Her performance against Clemson included a career-high-tying 10 rebounds and 10-for-10 free throw shooting. Hudson also notched a double-double with 11 points and a career-high-matching 10 assists at Howard on Dec. 2, 2017.

(Nov. 24). She added 13 points, six boards and four blocks in a win over Morgan State (Nov. 14). In NU's win over Duke (Dec. 4), she had 12 points, five rebounds, five blocks and two steals.

She opened the South Point Shootout with 10 points, five rebounds and her 200th career block in a win over USC (Nov. 29). She had eight blocks along with 10 points and seven boards in NU's win over Alabama A&M (Nov. 6).

SOPHOMORE (2018-19)

Cain set the Husker sophomore record with 79 blocks, while ranking second in the Big Ten and 13th nationally with 2.6 blocks per game.

Cain, who joined Nicea Eliely as the only Huskers to start all 30 games, averaged 7.5 points, 5.9 rebounds and 1.2 assists in 23 minutes per game. Over the final eight games, Cain averaged 8.6 points while hitting 61 percent (30-49) of her shots from the field and 71.4 percent (10-14) of her free throws.

She had 16 points and a season-high 17 rebounds in a win over San Jose State (Dec. 8). She added 16 points against USC Upstate (Nov. 11) and notched a double-double with 10 points, 10 boards and four blocks at Washington State (Nov. 16). She had a season-high seven blocks in a win over No. 24 Michigan State (Feb. 17).

FRESHMAN (2017-18)

Cain earned spots on the Big Ten All-Defensive and Big Ten All-Freshman teams by averaging 9.9 points and team bests of 7.0 rebounds and 3.1 blocks in 2017-18. She led the Big Ten and ranked among the top eight players nationally with a school-record 100 blocks on the season to help the Huskers lead the Big Ten in both field goal percentage defense and three-point field goal percentage defense.

She started NU's last 31 games while playing in all 32 contests in 2017-18. The four-time Big Ten Freshman of the Week produced 22 points, 14 rebounds and a school-record 11 blocks for the first points-rebounds-blocks triple-double in Husker history against Florida Atlantic (Dec. 19).

Cain had six games with five or more blocks, including the top three single-game totals by a freshman in Husker history.

She ranked 10th in Fairfield history with 734 rebounds, while ranking second in Stags history with 268 blocks.

Kate's older brother, John, is a 6-10 left-handed pitcher in the Los Angeles Angels organization. He signed a free agent contract in June of 2019 and played with the Burlington Bees and AZL Angels during the summer.

Kate also has a younger brother, Chris.

Kate Cain returns stronger, quicker and more confident for her junior season at Nebraska. On the brink of becoming the greatest shot-blocker in Nebraska history, the 6-5 center from Middletown, N.Y., ranks among NCAA leaders with 2.8 blocks per game, while adding 9.2 points and a team-best 7.3 rebounds in 2019-20.

Cain notched three straight double-doubles, including season highs of 19 points and 15 rebounds to go with six blocks in a win over No. 24 Minnesota (Jan. 4). It followed 10 points and 14 rebounds at Michigan State (Dec. 31), after she opened Big Ten play with 16 points and 12 rebounds in the win over Iowa (Dec. 28). She owns 10 career double-doubles.

for the final six games of her freshman season.

An explosive scorer, Brown put up Nebraska's top offensive effort of the season with 30 points in just 25 minutes off the bench in a win over Purdue (Feb. 10) to earn a spot on the Big Ten Weekly Honor Roll. Brown started Nebraska's next six games, with the first starts coming in place of an ill Taylor Kissinger against No. 7 Maryland (Feb. 14) and No. 24 Michigan State (Feb. 17).

For the season, Brown averaged 9.6 points, 2.6 rebounds and 1.5 assists, including 10.2 points, 3.0 rebounds and 1.6 assists in regular-season Big Ten play. She notched eight double-figure scoring efforts against Big Ten foes among her 11 double-digit performances on the season.

In Brown's 30-point performance against Purdue, she scored 22 in the second half. She set career highs with four threes and 10 free throws made against the Boilermakers while tying a career high with two steals. She tied a career best by hitting four more threes in a win over No. 24 Michigan State on her way to 14 points, five rebounds and three assists.

Brown added 20 points while matching a career best with two steals at No. 19 Iowa (Jan. 3). She was named the Big Ten Freshman of the Week (Jan. 7), for her performance against Iowa and a 19-point effort to go along with four rebounds, three assists and a steal in a Big Ten road win at Ohio State (Dec. 31).

Brown opened Big Ten play with 11 points and five rebounds in a win over Michigan (Dec. 28). She had 18 points and a career-high six rebounds against Rutgers (Jan. 13), before adding 10 points in a win at Illinois (Jan. 17).

6-1 Junior Guard/Forward Minden, Nebraska (Minden)

SOPHOMORE (2018-19)

Kissinger led the Big Ten by tying the Nebraska season three-point field goal percentage record (.456, 62-136). Her 62 threes were the fifth-best total by a sophomore in Husker history.

She averaged 8.9 points, 3.2 rebounds and 1.2 assists. She started NU's first 24 games, before missing starts at No. 7 Maryland (Feb. 14) and No. 24 Michigan State (Feb. 17) while recovering from illness.

She came off the bench the final six games, producing double figures in three of those six games, including a 15-point effort on 5-of-10 three-point shooting in the Big Ten Tournament against Purdue (March 7). Her five threes were the third-best total by a Husker in Big Ten Tournament history.

She closed the regular season with 14 points on 4-of-5 three-point shooting in a road win at Penn State (March 2).

Kissinger had a record-setting effort against USC Upstate (Nov. 11) when she went a perfect 6-for-6 from three-point range on her way to a season-high 22 points.

She had 18 points in a win over Denver (Dec. 15), after getting 17 vs. San Jose State (Dec. 8).

Kissinger posted her second career double-double with 11 points and a career-high 11 rebounds in a win over KU (Dec. 5).

She notched 12 double-figure efforts on the year, including 15 points at Wisconsin (Jan. 27), 12 at Michigan (Feb. 7).

FRESHMAN (2017-18)

Kissinger averaged 10.0 points, 4.1 rebounds and 1.4 assists in 25 games with seven starts. She shot 40.8 percent from the field, including 36.2 percent from three-point range, while knocking down 71.7 percent of her free throws. She joined Kate Cain (9.9 ppg) as the first pair of Husker freshmen to both average 9.9 points per game since Debra Powell and Crystal Coleman in 1981-82.

Kissinger made an instant impact, averaging a team-best 14.0 points per game through NU's first seven contests before suffering a knee injury

Kissinger produced 12 double-figure scoring efforts in 25 contests, including a career-high 25 points in a win over Arkansas (Nov. 16).

Her parents were both collegiate student-athletes, with Brian playing basketball and Amy playing volleyball at NCAA Division II Nebraska-Kearney. Jamie completed her eligibility at San Diego in 2017-18. Taylor's brother Derek played college basketball at NAIA Hastings College.

JUNIOR (2019-20)

One of the nation's most accurate long-range shooters, Taylor Kissinger battled a pair of early season injuries before being forced out for the season prior to Nebraska's game with Oral Roberts (Dec. 14). Kissinger, who battled a hip injury throughout preseason and non-conference play, underwent season-ending hip surgery on Jan. 3.

Kissinger had four points and pulled down a team-high eight rebounds off the bench in Nebraska's season-opening win over Alabama A&M (Nov. 6), then entered the concussion protocol after a collision in practice (Nov. 8). She missed Nebraska's next four games. Prior to succumbing to the hip injury, Kissinger tied a career-high with six three-pointers to finish with a team-high 19 points in a win over Duke (Dec. 4). She also tied a career high with four assists.

She scored 11 points in a win over Sacred Heart (Nov. 30), after putting up eight points in a win over USC (Nov. 29). Kissinger returned to action against Creighton (Nov. 24), but had just one full practice leading up to the game.

Kissinger ranked No. 4 nationally and led the Big Ten with her .456 three-point percentage as a sophomore.

The 6-1 shooter from Minden, Neb., made 24 starts while enjoying her healthiest season since early in her high school career.

Isabelle Bourne is making immediate contributions to the Huskers as a freshman. The 6-2 forward from Canberra, Australia, is averaging 5.3 points and 4.8 rebounds through 19 games.

Bourne produced career highs with 11 points, eight rebounds and two blocks in Nebraska's win over Wisconsin (Jan. 9). She played a career-high 24 minutes off the bench against the Badgers. She followed with nine points and a career-high matching eight boards in 19 minutes at Rutgers (Jan. 12). She added eight points and four rebounds at No. 20 Maryland (Jan. 16), to go along with seven points and four boards against Purdue (Jan. 22).

She opened Big Ten play by matching then-career highs with eight points and seven rebounds to go along with a career-high two three-pointers in the win over Iowa (Dec. 28).

She also played a strong role inside with six points, seven rebounds and two blocks in a win over Duke (Dec. 4). She added six points and seven more rebounds vs. Manhattan (Dec. 22).

Bourne had eight points, six rebounds and two assists in a win over USC (Nov. 29). She added four points, five boards and two assists in a win over Sacred Heart (Nov. 30).

Bourne also had eight points, six rebounds and a block in a win over Morgan State (Nov. 14). She added seven points on 2-of-3 shooting including her first career three-pointer, while adding three boards vs. Creighton (Nov. 24).

One of the most talented young players in Australia, Bourne joined the Huskers in August of 2019 after helping the Gems to a silver medal at 2019 FIBA Under-19 World Cup in Bangkok, Thailand, July 20-28.

The Australian U19 National Team entered the tournament ranked No. 7 in the world, but came up just short of the gold medal, falling 74-70 in overtime to the United States.

Bourne averaged 8.4 points, 5.1 rebounds and 1.1 assists in 23.1 minutes per game.

In 2017, Bourne led Australia's U17 team to gold at the Oceania Championship in Guam by averaging 19 points, 9.8 rebounds and 2.6 assists to claim a spot on the all-tournament team. She was also the MVP of the 2017 FIBA Under-18 Asia Cup 3-on-3 tournament in Mongolia, leading her team to another gold medal. Bourne was also named to the Gems squad for the 2018 FIBA Under-18 Asian Championships.

Bourne trained at the Australian Institute of Sport and Basketball Australia's Centre of Excellence under Coach Kristen Veal. She was also a developmental player in the University of Canberra Capitals program.

PERSONAL

Her older sister, Callie, is a sophomore guard at Idaho State, and her oldest sister, Emma, also plays in the Canberra Capitals Academy. Callie, a 5-9 guard, leads Idaho State in scoring (12.4 ppg) and rebounding (7.4 rpg) to go along with 1.8 assists and 1.2 steals through 16 games this season. She had a career-high 26 points in a win at Weber State (Jan. 16). Last season, she averaged 4.1 points and 3.6 rebounds.

Isabelle's father, Trent, played Australian Football, while her mother, Ann, was a basketball player.

Bourne chose Nebraska over Marquette, Arizona State and Utah.

"I really connected with the coaches when I first met them, and then was very impressed with the team culture, facilities and Lincoln when I came on an official visit," Bourne said. "I also knew two former players who spoke very highly of the NU experience."

Kayla Mershon (pronounced MER-shawn) played her way into Nebraska's starting lineup during the second half of her freshman season.

The 6-3 forward from Chanhassen, Minn., provides a steady and consistent presence inside at both ends of the court, while also supplying versatility to the Huskers.

As a sophomore, Mershon is averaging 1.6 points and 2.2 rebounds. She made her first start of the season in place of an injured Ashtyn Veerbeek in Nebraska's win over Manhattan (Dec. 22). She had four points, four rebounds, two assists and a steal against the Jaspers.

Mershon opened the season with four points, five rebounds and a block in 15 solid minutes off the bench in a win over Alabama A&M (Nov. 6). She added four rebounds and a block in a win at Missouri (Nov. 10), before getting two points, four rebounds and another block in a win over Morgan State (Nov. 14).

She matched her season high with four points in a win over Sacred Heart (Nov. 30), before getting four more points in a win over Oral Roberts (Dec. 14). Mershon notched a season-high six rebounds against Creighton (Nov. 24) and added five boards in a win over No. 24 Minnesota (Jan. 4).

FRESHMAN (2018-19)

Mershon earned her way into the starting lineup for the final 14 games of the season, after coming off the bench in her first 16 games as a true freshman.
