## HUSKERS SHOOT FOR SEASON SWEEP AT MINNESOTA

- The Nebraska women's basketball team takes aim at a second straight Big Ten road win while shooting for a season series sweep of Minnesota on Thursday night in Minneapolis.
- Tip-off between the Huskers (15-5, 5-4 Big Ten) and the Golden Gophers (12-8, 2-7 Big Ten) is set for 7 p.m. (CT) at Williams Arena.
- Live radio coverage for Thursday's game can be heard on B107.3 FM and 1400 AM KLIN in Lincoln and ESPN 590 AM in Omaha beginning at 6:45 p.m. (CT). Stations across the state will also carry the broadcast on the Learfield IMG College Husker Sports Network. Free live audio can be found at Huskers.com, the Huskers App and on TuneIn.
- A live video stream will be available for BTN+ subscribers.
- Nebraska heads to Minnesota after earning its first Big Ten road win of the season with a 72-71 victory at Wisconsin on Saturday. The Huskers rallied from a 10-point fourth-quarter deficit to take a four-point lead in the closing seconds before the Badgers hit a three at the buzzer for the final margin.
- It marked the third consecutive game that Nebraska rallied from a double-digit second-half deficit to take a lead in the fourth quarter. In a 74-71 win over Michigan (Jan. 19), the Huskers trailed by 13 points in the third quarter. In a 76-68 loss to Purdue (Jan. 22), the Huskers trailed by 21 in the second quarter and 13 in the third before taking a four-point lead midway through the fourth quarter, only to see Purdue answer down the stretch.
- Junior center Kate Cain led the Huskers in the first meeting with Minnesota this season, a 72-58 Husker win at Pinnacle Bank Arena in Lincoln (Jan. 4). Cain notched her third straight double-double to open Big Ten play with 19 points, 15 rebounds and six blocks. Cain needs three blocks on Thursday to tie the Nebraska career block record (238, Janet Smith, 1979-82).
- Sam Haiby, a sophomore from Moorhead, Minn., also had a big game for the Big Red in the first meeting with the Gophers. Haiby scored 17 points and grabbed a season-high eight rebounds, while adding three assists and two steals. In Saturday's win at Wisconsin, Haiby finished with 11 points and a career-high five steals, including a key steal with 7.7 seconds left and a pair of free throws with five seconds left to seal the win.
- Senior Hannah Whitish (Barneveld, Wis.) also had 17 points on 5-of-8 three-point shooting in the first meeting with Minnesota.

**HUSKER NUGGETS**

- Nebraska ranks No. 17 nationally in total home attendance (55,450).
- Nebraska is No. 37 in the Massey Ratings (Jan. 28). A total of 11 Big Ten teams are in the top 64, including: Maryland (9), Northwestern (13), Iowa (16), Indiana (18), Rutgers (32), Purdue (35), Michigan (40), Ohio State (41), Michigan State (54) and Minnesota (56).
- Through 20 games, Nebraska is allowing an average of 64.1 points per game, after allowing 70.1 points per game last season. NU's 2018 NCAA Tournament team allowed 63.6.
- Opponents are shooting 37.3 percent from the field and 30.6 percent from three-point range against NU. Last year, Husker foes hit 41.1 percent, including 33.4 percent from three. In 2017-18, Nebraska led the Big Ten in field goal percentage defense (.371) and three-point field goal percentage defense (.299).
- Nebraska has held eight opponents to 55 points or less this season. Last year, NU held only two foes (Radford-39, Kansas-52) to 55 or less. NU held 11 opponents to 55 or less in 2017-18.
- NU's bench has outscored opponent reserves in 17 of 20 games in 2019-20. The Husker bench has outscored opposing benches in 45 of the last 50 games, including double-digit edges 32 times.
- This season, NU's bench has outscored opposing benches 510-318 (25.5-15.9 ppg).
- Nebraska has hit 10 or more threes 19 times in the last three seasons (81 games), including four times in the last 11 contests. Through the first 20 seasons with the three-point shot in women's basketball (1988-2007), Nebraska hit 10 threes in a game just six times (311 games).
- In Big Ten play, Sam Haiby ranks fourth in the league in steals (2.2 spg), sixth in assists (3.9 apg), seventh in three-point field goal percentage, (.480), 14th in free throw percentage (.788) and 24th in scoring (12.0 ppg).

**SCOUTING THE MINNESOTA GOLDEN GOPHERS**

• Head coach Lindsay Whalen's Minnesota team has experienced turmoil since the first meeting with the Huskers in Lincoln on Jan. 4. Nebraska knocked off then-No. 24 Minnesota, 72-58, to drop the Golden Gophers to 11-3 overall and 1-2 in the Big Ten.

• While Nebraska knocked the Gophers out of the top-25 in the AP rankings for the second straight season, Minnesota's 2020 campaign took a step in a more negative direction with the departure of leading scorer Destiny Pitts (16.3 ppg), who chose to enter the NCAA Transfer Portal after playing just one more game with the Gophers.

• Although Minnesota is just 1-6 in its last seven games, four of the losses are by one possession, including a one-point loss to No. 18 Iowa (76-75), a two-point loss to No. 23 Northwestern (56-54), a three-point loss to Ohio State (66-63) and a three-point loss at Illinois (74-71)

• Minnesota has shown plenty of fight, including a 72-59 win at Purdue (Jan. 19). The game was tied at 43 late in the third quarter when Minnesota erupted on a 19-0 run to surge to victory.

• Minnesota is 0-4 at Williams Arena in Big Ten play this season.

• Minnesota slipped to 12-8 overall and 2-7 with a 65-52 loss at No. 20 Indiana on Monday.

• Although the Gophers have had to make up for the loss of Pitts' 16.3 points per game, their offense without Pitts over the last five games is averaging 66.3 points. In Minnesota's first three Big Ten losses with Pitts, the Gophers averaged just 58.3 points per game.

• All five of Minnesota's guards have stepped up their production without Pitts. Junior Masha Adashchik started the four games after Pitts' departure. Adashchik has averaged 4.8 points, 3.8 rebounds and 1.0 steal the last five games. In her first four Big Ten games, she totaled just four points, seven boards and one steal. She had no stats in five minutes off the bench in Lincoln.

• Freshman guard Jasmine Powell drew her first start at Indiana on Monday night. She has increased her production, averaging 11.2 points, 2.4 rebounds, 2.4 assists and 1.4 steals the last five games. Through the first four Big Ten games, Powell averaged 5.0 points, 2.3 rebounds and 1.2 assists. Powell had eight points and four rebounds in the first meeting with the Huskers.

• Senior guard Jasmine Brunson has stepped up big, averaging 13.2 points, 2.4 rebounds, 3.4 assists and 1.2 steals. Through the first four Big Ten games, Brunson averaged 8.8 points, 3.0 rebounds, 1.5 assists and no steals. She had seven points and an assist in the first meeting with Nebraska.

• Junior Gadiva Hubbard has increased her averages to 12.4 points, 3.2 rebounds, 2.4 assists and 1.6 steals the last five games. She averaged just 8.8 points through Minnesota's first four Big Ten games. Hubbard had 10 points and four boards in Lincoln (Jan. 4).

• Freshman guard Sara Scalia is averaging a team-best 14.2 points, 5.6 rebounds, 1.4 assists and 1.4 steals the last five games. She averaged 13.0 points and 5.5 rebounds through the first four Big Ten games. Scalia had five points and seven rebounds in the first meeting with Nebraska.

• Senior Taiye Bello continues to be the focus inside for Minnesota. The athletic 6-2 forward is nearly averaging a double-double with 12.2 points and 9.9 rebounds, including 10.5 points and 9.6 boards in Big Ten play. Bello also has 35 blocks. She led Minnesota with 16 points in the first meeting at Nebraska.

• Kehinde Bello, a 6-2 forward and twin sister of Gopher starter Taiye Bello, has managed 1.1 points and 2.1 rebounds on the year.

• Sophomore Barbora Tomancova has also provided more for Minnesota the last five games, averaging 1.8 points and 4.4 rebounds. Tomancova did not play at all in the first four Big Ten contests.

• In Big Ten play, Minnesota is shooting just 38.7 percent from the field, but a strong 35.6 percent (62-174) from three-point range. The Gophers also excel at the free throw line on the season (.753). They have been even in turnovers but a minus-1.2 boards per game in Big Ten play.

**NEBRASKA VS. MINNESOTA SERIES HISTORY**

• Nebraska leads the all-time series with Minnesota 14-9, including a 72-58 Husker win in Lincoln (Jan. 4, 2020) in the first meeting between the two schools this season.

• Kate Cain led Nebraska with 19 points, 15 rebounds and six blocks, while Sam Haiby and Hannah Whitish each pitched in 17 points in the win. Taiye Bello led Minnesota with 16 points.

• Nebraska owns three straight series wins, including a 79-74 victory in Minneapolis (Dec. 31, 2017) in the last meeting at Williams Arena.

• Minnesota's last win was a 79-69 OT victory at Pinnacle Bank Arena (Feb. 4, 2017).

• Nebraska owns a 9-4 edge as Big Ten foes.

• Nebraska is 11-3 all-time against Minnesota in Lincoln. The Huskers are 2-6 against Minnesota in Minneapolis and 1-0 against the Gophers in the Big Ten Tournament (March 7, 2014).

• Although women's basketball was not a full varsity sport at Nebraska until 1975-76, a women's team from Nebraska suffered its first defeat at Minnesota in 1904 after going unbeaten between 1897 and 1903. Two weeks after the first meeting with Minnesota, Nebraska beat the same team in Lincoln.

• Minnesota's Laura Coenen scored 42 points for the Gophers in a 90-79 win over the Huskers on Nov. 30, 1984. That effort is tied for the most points by any opponent in a game against the Huskers.

**NEBRASKA STREAKS**

• Kate Cain owns Nebraska's longest streak of consecutive starts (81).

• Nicea Eliely owns Nebraska's second-longest streak of starts (76).

• Nicea Eliely and Leigha Brown are the only Huskers to score points in each of Nebraska's first 20 games this season.

• Kate Cain and Isabelle Bourne are the only Huskers to record at least one rebound for Nebraska in all 20 games this season.

- Eliely was the only Husker to score in all 30 games last season, and the only Husker to score in all of Nebraska's games against Big Ten Conference foes. She has scored in 54 consecutive games overall. She did not score in a win over Penn State on Feb. 22, 2018, the only time in the past three seasons (including 2019-20, 74 games) that Eliely was shut out.
- The Huskers have knocked down at least one three in 362 straight games dating back to a loss at UTEP on Dec. 20, 2008. Nebraska has hit at least two three-pointers in 241 consecutive games.

## HUSKERS ANNOUNCE KISSINGER OUT FOR SEASON

- Nebraska women's basketball coach Amy Williams announced on Dec. 14 that junior guard Taylor Kissinger would undergo hip surgery in early January and be out for the rest of the season. Kissinger underwent surgery on Friday, Jan. 3.
- Kissinger, who was bothered by the nagging injury for several months, averaged 8.4 points and 2.8 rebounds off the bench in five games this season. She missed four games in the concussion protocol after playing in the season-opening win over Alabama A&M (Nov. 6).
- In Nebraska's win over Duke in the Big Ten/ACC Challenge (Dec. 4), Kissinger led the Huskers with 19 points, including a career-high-matching six three-pointers. She also dished out four assists.
- Last season, Kissinger led the Big Ten and ranked No. 4 nationally in three-point field goal percentage (.456, 62-136).
- In her first two seasons, Kissinger averaged 9.4 points and 3.6 rebounds while competing in 55 games with 31 starts.
- Because she only played in five games this season, Kissinger is expected to regain her junior season of eligibility in 2020-21.

## WHITISH SHOOTS FOR ANOTHER ALL-BIG TEN HONOR

- All-Big Ten guard Hannah Whitish closed 2018-19 by earning honorable-mention All-Big Ten recognition as a junior. She was second-team All-Big Ten as a sophomore in 2017-18.
- Whitish is averaging 8.9 points and a team-best 3.5 assists to go with 3.3 rebounds and 1.0 steal as a senior.
- Whitish became the first Husker in history to hit the combined career milestones of 1,000 points, 400 assists and 200 three-pointers, crossing the 400-assist plateau in the win over Duke.
- She ranks eighth in career points (1,143) and third in career assists (432) among active Big Ten players.
- The 5-9 guard from Barneveld, Wis., became the 33rd Husker in history to reach 1,000 career points - knocking down a mid-range jumper midway through the first quarter in the win over Southern (Nov. 20) to hit the mark.
- She heads into Thursday's game ranked No. 20 in Nebraska history with 1,143 points. She needs 40 points to tie Jan Crouch (1,183, 1976-79) at No. 19 on the Husker list.

- Whitish poured in a season-high 20 points with a career-high-tying six threes in a win over Michigan (Jan. 19). She added five assists with no turnovers against the Wolverines.

- She scored 17 points and hit five threes in a win over No. 24 Minnesota (Jan. 4).

- She had 15 points on five threes in a win over Sacred Heart (Nov. 30). She earned a spot on the All-South Point Shootout team for her performances in Las Vegas (Nov. 29-30).

- Whitish opened the season with 12 points on 4-of-6 threes in a win over Alabama A&M (Nov. 6).

- She added 12 points on team highs of seven rebounds, five assists and a career-high-tying four steals in an overtime win at Missouri (Nov. 10).

- Whitish had 11 points, three rebounds and three assists in a win over Iowa (Dec. 28).

- She had 10 points and a season-high six assists in a win over Duke (Dec. 4). She went 4-for-4 at the free throw line in the closing minute to seal the win. She added 10 points, four rebounds and four assists at Rutgers (Jan. 12); before adding 10 more points at No. 20 Maryland (Jan. 16).

- Whitish has scored in double figures nine times this season, including four of the last seven games.

- Whitish has climbed to No. 7 on the Nebraska career assist list with 432.

- She has led Nebraska in assists nine times this season and has five or more assists seven times.

- Whitish has ascended to No. 3 on the Nebraska career three-point list with 239. She is 28 threes away from Kiera Hardy at No. 2 (267, 2004-07).

- Whitish led the Huskers with 65 three-pointers in 2018-19, which was the third-best total by a junior in school history.

- She led the Huskers with 10.1 points and 4.3 assists per game last season.

- Whitish erupted for a season-high 28 points at Purdue (Jan. 31, 2019). Whitish added a career-high 12 assists to notch her first career double-double. She also tied a career high with six threes.

- Whitish's 12 assists tied for the ninth-best total by a Husker in school history. Only three players in Nebraska history [Rachel Theriot (4), Kathy Hawkins (3), Stacy Imming (1)] have had more than 12 assists in a game.

- Whitish's career high of 29 points came as a sophomore in 2017-18 in back-to-back non-conference wins at Kansas and Drake.

- She owns a team-best 57 career double-figure scoring efforts (9, 2019-20; 17, 2018-19; 18, 2017-18; 13, 2016-17). She has six career 20-point games (1, 2016-17; 3, 2017-18; 1, 2018-19; 1, 2019-20).

**CAIN NAMED TO LISA LESLIE AWARD WATCH LIST**

- Kate Cain is among the 20 initial candidates for the 2020 Lisa Leslie Award presented by the Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame and the Women's Basketball Coaches Association (WBCA), which announced the award watch list on Oct. 25. Cain earned her first spot on the Lisa Leslie Award watch list in 2018-19.

- On track to become the greatest shot-blocker in Husker history, Cain notched the 200th blocked shot of her career against USC (Nov. 29) in the South Point Shootout.

- Cain is three blocks away from matching Nebraska's career record of 238 (Janet Smith, 1979-82).

- Cain ranks second in the Big Ten with 2.8 blocks per game.

- In Big Ten action, Cain leads the Huskers with 8.9 rebounds per game. She opened Big Ten play with three straight double-doubles.

- She ranks No. 2 on the Nebraska career blocks list with 235. Cain had six blocks in a win over No. 24 Minnesota (Jan. 4). Her 235 career blocks rank 16th in Big Ten history, and she is 39 blocks from the league's all-time top 10 (274, Alex Wittinger, Illinois, 2016-19).

- Cain opened the 2019-20 season by recording eight blocks - the third-best total in school history - in a win over Alabama A&M (Nov. 6). She added 10 points and seven rebounds in the win.

- She produced her third consecutive double-double with season highs of 19 points and 15 rebounds to go with six blocked shots in the win over No. 24 Minnesota (Jan. 4). It was her 10th career double-double. She was named to the Big Ten Weekly Honor Roll (Jan. 6).

- Cain notched her first double-double of the year with 16 points and 12 rebounds in the win over Iowa (Dec. 28).

- She added her second straight double-double with 10 points and 14 rebounds to go with four blocks at Michigan State (Dec. 31).

- Cain just missed another double-double with 11 points and nine rebounds in a win at Wisconsin (Jan. 25).

- She had 18 points with seven boards and three blocks vs. Creighton (Nov. 24).

- Cain played an outstanding all-around game with 15 points, while adding eight rebounds and four blocks in a win over Oral Roberts (Dec. 14).

- She followed with 13 points and eight rebounds against Manhattan (Dec. 22).

- Cain played a strong all-around game with 12 points, five rebounds, five blocks and two steals in a win over Duke (Dec. 4). She outperformed Duke's Lisa Leslie Award candidate Jade Williams, limiting Williams to seven points, two rebounds and no blocks.

- Cain produced double figures with 10 points, five rebounds, a block, an assist and a steal in

Nebraska's win over USC (Nov. 29).

- She had 13 points, five rebounds, four blocks and a season-high three assists in a win over Morgan State (Nov. 14).

- Cain set the Nebraska season block record with 100 as a freshman. She finished No. 8 nationally in total blocks, and No. 7 in NCAA D-I and No. 1 in the Big Ten with 3.1 blocks per game in 2017-18.

- She set the Nebraska sophomore block record with 79 in 2018-19. She played 144 fewer minutes as a sophomore than she did as a freshman, primarily because of NU's deeper bench.

- Cain set the Husker single-game block record while also posting the first points (22), rebounds (14) and blocked shots (11) triple-double in school history in a win over Florida Atlantic (Dec. 19, 2017).

- She became just the sixth player in Big Ten Conference history to record 11 or more blocks and just the 10th Big Ten player to notch double-digit blocks in a single game.

- Cain's 22 points against Florida Atlantic were also a career high, and her three assists against the Owls also tied a career best.

- She owns 35 double-figure scoring efforts, 13 double-figure rebounding games and one double-digit block game in the first 82 games of her career. She has made 81 straight starts.

- Cain owns 42 games (10, 2019-20; 17, 2018-19; 15, 2017-18) with three or more blocks in her career. She has recorded five or more blocks 10 times - Clemson (6, Nov. 30, 2017), Kansas (5, Dec. 6, 2017), FAU (11, Dec. 19, 2017), Northwestern (5, Jan. 7, 2018), Iowa (5, Jan. 16, 2018), Maryland (Jan. 8, 2019), Michigan State (7, Feb. 17, 2019), Alabama A&M (8, Nov. 6, 2019) and Minnesota (6, Jan. 4, 2020).

- Cain was the only player to capture spots on both the Big Ten All-Freshman Team and Big Ten All-Defensive Team in 2017-18. Both five-player teams were chosen by the league coaches.

- She captured four Big Ten Freshman-of-the-Week awards (Nov. 13, Dec. 4, Dec. 11, Dec. 26) during the 2017-18 non-conference.

- Cain's 56.6 field goal percentage ranked as the second-best mark by a freshman in school history.

- Her 223 rebounds ranked fourth among freshmen in Husker history, and was the sixth NU freshman with 200 boards. She is the only Husker freshman to record 300 points, 200 rebounds and 100 blocks.

## ELIELY PREPARED FOR BIG SENIOR SEASON

- One of the top overall defenders in the Big Ten Conference, Nicea Eliely is showing her all-around game at a higher level in 2019-20.

- Nebraska's defensive MVP in both 2017 and 2019, Eliely led the Huskers with a career-high 54 steals in her third year as a starter in 2018-19. She ranked among the top five players in the Big Ten with 1.8 steals per game last season.

- She needs 34 steals to join the top 10 in Husker history in that category.

- Eliely's 105 career starts at Nebraska are the most by any current Husker. She has started 76 consecutive games, which trails only Kate Cain's 81 straight starts among the Huskers.

- Eliely is one of only 12 players in Nebraska history to reach the combined career milestones of 800 points (884), 400 rebounds (419) and 200 assists (236).

- Over the last five games, Eliely is averaging 12.0 points per game while hitting 8-of-13 threes (.615) and 14-of-15 free throws (.933). Through the first 15 games, she averaged 8.3 points while going 4-for-29 from three (.138) and 25-of-38 (.658) at the line.

- Through 20 games, Eliely is averaging 9.3 points, 4.1 rebounds, 2.6 assists and 1.1 steals.

- Eliely tied her career high with 19 points at Maryland (Jan. 16). She hit 6-of-10 shots from the field, including both of her three-point attempts and all five free throws.

- She set her career high with 19 points as a freshman against Cal (Dec. 4, 2016). She scored a season-high 18 points as a junior against No. 7 Maryland (Feb. 14, 2019).

- She owns 38 career double-figure scoring efforts, including 15 points, five rebounds, three assists and two steals against Purdue (Jan. 22).

- Eliely added 14 points on 5-of-6 shooting at Michigan State (Dec. 31). She also had 11 points and three second-half three-pointers in Nebraska's comeback win over Michigan (Jan. 19).

- She had 13 points in a win over SIUE (Nov. 17), 12 points in wins over Iowa (Dec. 28), USC (Nov. 29) and Morgan State (Nov. 14) and 10 in a 90-85 overtime win at Missouri (Nov. 10).

- Eliely produced her first career double-double with 12 points and a career-high 15 rebounds in the win over Morgan State (Nov. 14). She added three blocks against the Bears.

- Eliely had a career-high six steals in a win over No. 23 Minnesota (Jan. 20, 2019), when she had five in the fourth quarter to help the Huskers hold the Gophers without a field goal for the game's final six minutes. She added five steals at Wisconsin (Jan. 27, 2019).

**HAIBY EARNS TWO BIG TEN WEEKLY HONORS**

• Sophomore Sam Haiby leads Nebraska in assists (3.9 apg) and steals (2.2 spg) while ranking second in scoring (12.0 ppg) and third in rebounding (4.8 rpg) among the Huskers in Big Ten play. She has hit 48 percent (12-25) of her threes in league action.

• Haiby erupted for a career-high 28 points on 11-of-19 shooting to power Nebraska to a 90-85 OT win at Missouri (Nov. 10). She tied a career high with three threes against the Tigers, including the game-tying triple with three seconds left to send the game to OT tied at 76. She scored NU's first eight points and added 18 points after halftime, including two free throws with 13.3 seconds left to seal the win.

• Haiby helped the Huskers go 2-0 in her first week as a starter by leading Nebraska with 18.0 points per game to earn a spot on the Big Ten Weekly Honor Roll (Nov. 11).

• She added her second 20-point game of the year and third of her career with 20 points and a career-high four steals in a win over Oral Roberts (Dec. 14). She earned her second Big Ten Weekly Honor Roll selection (Dec. 16) this season.

• Haiby had 19 points at Michigan State (Dec. 31), when she had 15 points on 6-of-6 shooting in the first half.

• She pumped in 18 points, including 3-of-4 threes and 5-of-6 free throws in a win over Michigan (Jan. 19). She also had four assists against the Wolverines.

• Haiby added 17 points and a career-high eight boards in a win over No. 24 Minnesota (Jan. 4).

• She had 11 points and a season-high seven assists to go with three steals, three rebounds and a block in a win over Wisconsin (Jan. 9). She added 11 points, six boards, three assists and a career-high five steals to help the Huskers complete a season sweep of the Badgers (Jan. 25).

• Haiby produced 17 points, seven rebounds and four assists against Creighton (Nov. 24).

• She managed 10 points while leading the Huskers in rebounds (6), assists (5) and steals (3) while adding a block against Purdue (Jan. 22).

• Haiby had 10 points and six assists in a win over Manhattan (Dec. 22), and 10 points in wins over Iowa (Dec. 28) and Southern (Nov. 20). She has 11 double-figure scoring efforts overall this season.

• She opened the season with her first career start in a win over Alabama A&M (Nov. 6). She scored eight points against the Bulldogs, Morgan State (Nov. 14) and SIUE (Nov. 17).

• Haiby finished her freshman season as Nebraska's second-leading scorer with 10.0 points per game while coming off the bench in all 30 contests in 2018-19.

• Haiby scored a season-high 20 points early in her freshman season at Washington State. All 20 came after halftime for the Huskers.

• She was named the Big Ten Freshman of the Week (Feb. 4, 2019) after scoring her then-Big Ten-best with 17 points against Indiana (Feb. 3, 2019), which followed a 13-point effort in a road win at Purdue (Jan. 31, 2019).

• Haiby produced double figures in each of Nebraska's final four games of 2018-19. For the season, she finished in double figures 15 times. She owns 27 double-digit scoring efforts in her career, including 12 as a sophomore in 2019-20.

• She ranked second among the Huskers with 78 assists (2.6 apg) as a freshman.

• Haiby led the Huskers in free throws made (76) and attempted (106) in 2018-19.

**BROWN BATTLING FOR BIG TEN SIXTH PLAYER AWARD**

• Leigha Brown is a leading contender for Big Ten Sixth Player of the Year honors in 2019-20.

• Through 20 games, the 6-1 guard/forward from Auburn, Ind., leads the Huskers in scoring with 13.7 points per game, while adding 3.4 rebounds and 1.8 assists off the bench.

• Brown is the only player among the top 30 scorers in the Big Ten who has not started a game this year. The only other non-starter among the league's top 30 scorers is Indiana freshman post Mackenzie Holmes, who is averaging 11.8 points per game. Holmes has made a pair of starts.

• Brown leads the Huskers in free throws made (84) and attempted (107) while shooting 78.5 percent at the line. She is the first Husker guard to make more than 76 free throws in a season since 2013 WNBA first-round draft pick Lindsey Moore in 2012-13 (121-150, .807).

• Brown erupted for a season-high 25 points to go along with five rebounds and four assists in the win over Manhattan (Dec. 22). Brown tied her career high with four three-pointers against the Jaspers. She had 18 points in the first half.

- Brown went off for 24 points while grabbing five rebounds to play a major role in Nebraska's 90-85 OT win at Missouri (Nov. 10). She scored 18 points after halftime to help the Huskers, and she added a huge assist on Sam Haiby's game-tying three-pointer to send the contest to overtime.

- She added her third 20-point effort of the year with 20 points, including eight in the fourth quarter, to help Nebraska rally from a 10-point deficit to a win at Wisconsin (Jan. 25).

- She led Nebraska with 19 points, including 15 in the second half, at No. 20 Maryland (Jan. 16). She hit 6-of-9 shots from the field including both of her three-point attempts.

- Brown added a game-high 16 points while tying her career high with five assists in a win over Morgan State (Nov. 14). She scored 16 more in a win over Southern (Nov. 20), while pitching in four rebounds and three assists, before contributing 16 again in NU's win over USC (Nov. 29).

- She scored 15 points, including eight straight in the first quarter to turn a 10-5 Nebraska deficit into a 13-10 lead against Wisconsin (Jan. 9). She added 15 points in Nebraska's win over Oral Roberts (Dec. 15) and had 14 points and four rebounds against Creighton (Nov. 24).

- She scored 12 points including a pair of threes in a win over SIUE (Nov. 17).

- Brown has scored 10 points on five occasions, including back-to-back games against Michigan (Jan. 19) and Purdue (Jan. 22). She opened her sophomore season with 10 points and a career-high seven rebounds in a win over Alabama A&M (Nov. 6). She opened Big Ten play with 10 points, six rebounds, two assists and a steal in a win over Iowa (Dec. 28), before adding 10 points, three rebounds and three assists at Michigan State (Dec. 31).

- She owns 16 double-figure efforts on the year, including nine games with 15 or more points.

- Brown ranked second among the Huskers in scoring during Big Ten play last season with 10.2 points per game to finish the year with averages of 9.6 points, 2.6 rebounds and 1.5 assists.

- She showed her explosiveness several times as a freshman, including a career-high 30-point outburst in a win over Purdue at Pinnacle Bank Arena (Feb. 10, 2019). She scored 22 in the second half against the Boilermakers to earn a spot on the Big Ten Weekly Honor Roll (Feb. 11, 2019).

- Brown had 20 points at NCAA Elite Eight qualifier Iowa (Jan. 3, 2019), which followed a 19-point effort in a win at Ohio State (Dec. 31, 2018). Those two performances earned Brown Big Ten Freshman-of-the-Week honors (Jan. 7, 2019).

- Brown started Nebraska's final six games of 2018-19 after coming off the bench the first 24.

- She owns 28 double-figure scoring efforts in her career (16, 2019-20; 12, 2018-19), including five 20-point games.

- During a three-game European Tour in August of 2019, Brown led the Huskers by averaging 19.7 points per game in wins over teams from Italy and Spain.

- Ashtyn Veerbeek has worked hard to make greater contributions for the Huskers in 2019-20.

- The 6-2, sophomore, forward from Sioux Center, Iowa, has proven herself as one of the hardest working Huskers, claiming the team's 2019 Lifter-of-the-Year Award as a freshman.

- Through 19 games as a starter this season, Veerbeek has provided a consistent presence inside, averaging 8.5 points and 4.9 rebounds to go along with 1.2 assists per game. She is shooting 47.9 percent from the field, including 40.9 percent (18-44) from three-point range and 74.4 percent (32-43) from the free throw line.

- Veerbeek has already produced more three-pointers (18-11), assists (23-18) and steals (12-9) than she did all last season for the Huskers from her power forward spot.

- She put up a season-high-tying 14 points at Rutgers (Jan. 12) when she set a career high by connecting on 4-of-7 three-pointers. She added five boards and three assists.

• She missed the final 23 games of 2018-19 with a foot injury that required surgery in December, 2018.

• Hudson was a three-year starter at Florida International before joining the Huskers late in the summer of 2018, following her graduation from FIU.

• She had 1,076 points, 372 rebounds, 383 assists and 107 steals in 89 games with 87 starts at FIU. She averaged 14.5 points and 4.5 rebounds per game as a senior in 2017-18.

• Hudson ranks 11th in points (1,109) and fifth in assists (398) among active Big Ten players.

• Isabelle Bourne is averaging 5.5 points and 4.9 rebounds through the first 20 games of her college career, including career highs with 11 points, eight rebounds, two blocks and 24 minutes in a win over Wisconsin (Jan. 9).

• She followed with nine points and a career-high-tying eight rebounds at Rutgers (Jan. 12).

• Over the last six games, Bourne is averaging 8.0 points and 5.4 rebounds, including eight points, five boards and two blocks in a win at Wisconsin (Jan. 25). She also had eight points, all in the second half, and four rebounds at No. 20 Maryland (Jan. 16).

• Bourne had eight points and six boards in a win over Morgan State (Nov. 14).

• The Australian U19 National Team entered the tournament ranked No. 7 in the world, but came up just short of the gold medal, falling 74-70 in overtime to the United States.

• Bourne averaged 8.4 points, 5.1 rebounds and 1.1 assists in 23.1 minutes for the Gems.

• In 2017, Bourne led Australia's U17 team to gold at the Oceania Championship in Guam by averaging 19 points, 9.8 rebounds and 2.6 assists to claim a spot on the all-tournament team.

• She was the MVP of the 2017 FIBA Under-18 Asia Cup 3-on-3 tournament in Mongolia, leading her team to another gold medal. Bourne was also named to the Gems squad for the 2018 FIBA Under-18 Asian Championships.

• Bourne trained at the Australian Institute of Sport and Basketball Australia's Centre of Excellence. She was a developmental player in the University of Canberra Capitals program.

• Issie's sister, Callie, is a sophomore at Idaho State. Callie, a 5-9 guard, led ISU in scoring (12.5 ppg) and rebounding (7.5 rpg) to go along with 1.8 assists and 1.2 steals through 15 games this season for the Bengals. She had a career-high 26 points in a win at Weber State (Jan. 16). Last season, she averaged 4.1 points and 3.6 rebounds while starting 20 games. Their older sister, Emma, plays in the Canberra Capitals Academy.

## BRADY MAKES IMPACT AFTER MISSING FIRST 10 GAMES

• Trinity Brady made her regular-season collegiate debut in Nebraska's non-conference finale against Manhattan (Dec. 22). Brady finished with two points, four rebounds, one assist and one block in 16 minutes off the bench.

• Brady put together the most productive game of her young career with seven points on 2-for-2 three-point shooting in just nine minutes off the bench at Rutgers (Jan. 12). She is averaging 1.7 points and 1.4 rebounds through 10 games.

• She contributed three points, two assists and a steal in the Big Ten-opening win over Iowa (Dec. 28). Brady's first career three-pointer gave Nebraska a 30-27 second-quarter lead early in a 14-5 surge that put the Huskers in control the rest of the game.

• Brady added two points, two rebounds and two steals at Michigan State (Dec. 31). She ignited a 10-0 Husker run in the first quarter to help Nebraska maintain the lead for more than 30 minutes.

• Brady missed Nebraska's first 10 regular-season games after sustaining a concussion in the Huskers' exhibition win over Rogers State (Nov. 2). Brady took contact to her head and neck area late in the game against the Hillcats, but finished with eight points and eight rebounds in the game.

• The final piece of Nebraska's three-player recruiting class, Brady came to Nebraska after completing her senior season at Hamilton Heights Christian Academy in Chattanooga, Tenn. She was ranked as the No. 106 player overall in the 2019 class by Prospects Nation.

• The Lady Hawks finished the season No. 18 in the USA Today Super 25 rankings with a 22-3 overall record. Hamilton Heights Christian Academy fell to Riverdale Baptist in the NACA Championships.

• Brady competed for Lawrence North High School in Indianapolis her first three seasons.

- As a junior, Brady averaged 21.0 points, 8.5 rebounds and 4.0 assists to earn a spot on the IBCA Subway Supreme 15 Underclass All-State Team. She was also a member of the Indiana Junior All-Star Team and the Central Indiana Super Team.

- She led Lawrence North to a 20-4 record and produced several huge individual efforts as a junior in 2017-18, including a 38-point performance against Tindley, 30 points in a win over Pike and 28 points against nationally ranked North Central.

- As a sophomore, Brady averaged 15 points and 7.5 rebounds per game for Lawrence North, after averaging 7.2 points and 6.0 rebounds as a freshman.

**HELMS NOT AFRAID TO TAKE CHARGE**

- Makenzie Helms made her collegiate debut by dishing out an assist in three minutes of action off the bench in Nebraska's season-opening win over Alabama A&M (Nov. 6).

- She returned to action to play a career-high eight minutes, getting the first points (2) and rebounds (2) of her career in a win over Sacred Heart (Nov. 30) at the South Point Shootout in Las Vegas.

- Helms captured Gatorade Connecticut High School Player-of-the-Year honors by averaging 26.5 points, 7.4 rebounds, 6.6 assists and 4.3 steals while leading the East Haven Yellowjackets to the Southern Connecticut Conference title in 2018-19.

- Helms, who was the conference player of the year, led East Haven to a 20-5 overall record and a spot in the Connecticut Class L state quarterfinals.

- She was the first commitment to Nebraska's 2018-19 class, making her intentions known in January of 2018. Her commitment followed a junior season in 2017-18 in which Helms averaged 17.5 points, 5.0 rebounds, 7.2 assists and 4.0 steals per game. East Haven finished No. 3 in the state of Connecticut with a 25-3 record in 2017-18. Helms earned first-team all-state honors and was a USA Today first-team All-Connecticut selection.

- As a sophomore, Helms averaged 16.7 points, 5.0 rebounds, 6.0 assists and 4.0 steals at the Loomis Chaffee School. She earned All-New England accolades as both a freshman and sophomore.

- She played her summer basketball for New Heights NYC, averaging 20 points, six rebounds, eight assists and five steals. ESPN ranked her as the No. 27 point guard in the class of 2019.

**2019-20 SCHEDULE KEEPS HUSKERS HOME MORE**

- Last season, Nebraska played just 14 regular-season games at home at Pinnacle Bank Arena, including just five non-conference contests. In 2019-20, the Huskers will play 17 regular-season home games in Lincoln, including eight non-conference games.

- As a team, the Huskers will shoot to "Bring IT" from start-to-finish, beginning with their 97-33 exhibition win over Rogers State at Pinnacle Bank Arena (Nov. 2). Rogers State provided Coach Williams with her first head coaching job, and the Oklahoma school currently features former Husker Jasmine Cincore as an assistant coach.

- The Big Red opened regular-season play against a former Husker when Coach Margaret Richards and Alabama A&M came to Lincoln. Richards, who played for coaches Paul Sanderford and Connie Yori at Nebraska as a four-year letterwinner (2001-04). The Huskers battled to a 68-46 win over the Bulldogs in front of 5,250 fans on Wednesday (Nov. 6) at noon inside Pinnacle Bank Arena - the third-largest season-opening crowd in school history.

- The game with Alabama A&M was preceded by the Nebraska Life Skills Sportsmanship Pep Rally on the court at Pinnacle Bank Arena, which began at 9:30 a.m. and featured nearly 2,000 students and sponsors from 27 school districts across Nebraska.

- The Huskers made their first road trip a successful one by beating 2019 NCAA Tournament qualifier Missouri 90-85 in overtime at Mizzou Arena (Nov. 10).

- Nebraska returned home to tip a four-game stand featuring Morgan State (Nov. 14), SIUE (Nov. 17), Southern (Nov. 20) and Creighton (Nov. 24). The game with SIUE was part of Alumni Weekend, when the Huskers honored members of the 2010 Big 12 Champion and NCAA Sweet 16 team on the 10th anniversary of their undefeated regular season in 2009-10.

- The Huskers spent Thanksgiving in Las Vegas at the South Point Shootout, where they defeated USC (Nov. 29) and Sacred Heart (Nov. 30).

- Nebraska returned to Pinnacle Bank Arena to take on perennial power Duke in the Big Ten/ACC Challenge (Dec. 4), knocking off the Blue Devils, 83-79.

- Nebraska rolled to a 77-67 win over Oral Roberts (Dec. 14) before closing the non-conference season with a 71-51 win over Manhattan (Dec. 22).

- The Huskers closed a four-game home stand by opening Big Ten play with a 78-69 win at home over defending Big Ten Tournament champion and NCAA Elite Eight qualifier Iowa (Dec. 28).

- The game with Iowa tipped off an 18-game conference schedule that includes home battles with Minnesota (Jan. 4), Wisconsin (Jan. 9), Michigan (Jan. 19), Purdue (Jan. 22), Ohio State (Feb. 2), Indiana (Feb. 9), Penn State (Feb. 13) and Illinois (Feb. 22).

- The Huskers opened their nine-game Big Ten road schedule at Michigan State (Dec. 31), followed by road trips to Rutgers (Jan. 12), Maryland (Jan. 16), Wisconsin (Jan. 25), Minnesota (Jan. 30), Iowa (Feb. 6), Northwestern (Feb. 16), Ohio State (Feb. 19) and Indiana (Feb. 27).

- The Big Ten Tournament returns to Bankers Life Fieldhouse in Indianapolis (March 4-8), before the NCAA Tournament Selection Show reveals the 64-team field on March 16.

- NCAA first and second rounds will be held March 20-23, before Regionals are held in Dallas, Texas, Fort Wayne, Ind., Greenville, S.C., and Portland, Ore., March 27-30. The NCAA Women's Final Four will take place at the Smoothie King Center in New Orleans, April 3-5.

## NEBRASKA'S HISTORY OF HOME SUCCESS

- Nebraska is 11-1 on its home court at Pinnacle Bank Arena early in 2019-20.
- The Huskers went 15-4 at Pinnacle Bank Arena in 2015-16 after going 12-3 (13-3 at home) in 2014-15. The Huskers are 79-31 (.718) all-time at Pinnacle Bank Arena since the building opened for the 2013-14 campaign. The Big Red went 16-2 at home in 2013-14, suffering their only Big Ten loss to Purdue, 77-75, on Jan. 19, 2014. NU's 16 home wins in 2013-14 tied the school record for single-season home victories.
- The Huskers played the first regular-season game in arena history against USA Today No. 25 UCLA (Nov. 8, 2013) and rolled to a 77-49 win over the Bruins. NU's first win over an AP Top 25 team came with a 76-56 win over No. 24 Michigan State on Feb. 8, 2014. The Huskers added their first-ever win over an AP Top 10 team at the arena with a 94-74 victory over No. 8 Penn State on Feb. 24, 2014.
- NU won its first-ever Big Ten home game at Pinnacle Bank Arena with a 66-65 thriller over Northwestern Jan. 2, 2014, before an 88-85 win over Minnesota on Jan. 16, 2014, marked the first overtime game.
- NU suffered its first loss at the arena to Washington State (76-72) on Nov. 30, 2013.
- The Huskers are 43-3 all-time in home season openers, following a 68-46 win over Alabama A&M on Nov. 6, 2019. Nebraska had its streak of 12 consecutive season-opening wins snapped with an 83-77 loss to Missouri Valley Conference champion Drake on Nov. 7, 2018.
- The Huskers are 468-161 (.744) all-time at home. The Huskers have gone 204-65 (.758) over the last 17 seasons (including 2019-20), posting double-figure home victory totals 15 times.
- Nebraska played in the Devaney Center from 1976-77 through 2012-13, and added one appearance at Devaney against Utah on Nov. 23, 2014. The Huskers own a 389-130 record at the Devaney Center, including 146-88 (.624) mark in conference play.

## NEBRASKA RANKS NEAR TOP IN ATTENDANCE

- Nebraska ranked No. 22 nationally with an average home attendance of 4,101 at Pinnacle Bank Arena in 2018-19. It marked the 10th consecutive year that the Huskers have ranked in the top 25 nationally in average home attendance.
- Nebraska has ranked among the top 25 nationally in average home attendance in each of its first six seasons inside Pinnacle Bank Arena.
- The Huskers opened the 2019-20 season with 5,250 fans at Pinnacle Bank Arena for a Wednesday, noon tip against Alabama A&M on Nov. 6. Nebraska hosted a Life Skills Sportsmanship Pep Rally prior to the game, which included nearly 2,000 students and sponsors from 27 school districts around the Cornhusker State. It was the third-largest opening day crowd in Husker history.
- In 111 all-time home games at Pinnacle Bank Arena, the Huskers own a 79-32 record (.712 winning percentage) while averaging 5,066 fans per game (562,312 total fans/111 games).
- Nebraska attracted a Pinnacle Bank Arena non-conference record crowd of 9,750 to open its stay in the arena with a win over UCLA on Nov. 8, 2013.
- Nebraska set its all-time single-game record with a sellout crowd of 13,595 fans against Missouri at the Devaney Center on Feb. 27, 2010. NU drew 10 straight crowds of more than 10,000 fans at the Devaney Center in 2009-10.
- Nebraska produced its top attendance season in school history by ranking No. 7 nationally with a record 7,390 fans per game at the Bob Devaney Sports Center in 2009-10. The Huskers went 16-0 at the Devaney Center on their way to a perfect 29-0 record, a Big 12 title and a No. 1 seed in the NCAA Tournament.

## NEBRASKA SETS PACE IN ALL-SPORT ATTENDANCE

- Nebraska Athletics has long been one of the biggest in-person attractions in all of college sports. Among its seven major team sports (football, men's and women's basketball, volleyball, women's soccer, baseball and softball) the Huskers ranked No. 3 in the nation in 2018-19 with nearly 1.235 million fans attending Nebraska events.
- In NCAA Division I women's attendance, combining the sports of women's basketball, volleyball, softball and soccer, Nebraska ranked No. 2 nationally last year with a combined 251,429 fans at its home events across those four sports. Only South Carolina attracted more fans (259,439) at home.
- In fall and winter sports combined (football, volleyball, soccer, men's and women's basketball) Nebraska also ranked No. 2 in the nation with 1.139 million fans, trailing only Tennessee's 1.159 million.
- Nebraska baseball ranked No. 9 in the nation in average home attendance (4,426), while football (89,034) and men's basketball (15,341) both ranked No. 10 nationally. The Nebraska wrestling team also ranked No. 11 in the country (2,231). Husker volleyball led the nation in average home attendance (8,205), while soccer ranked No. 21 (1,029) and women's basketball (4,101) ranked No. 22.

The Husker Sports Network and Nebraska women's basketball have teamed up for nearly two decades to take every game, home and away, around the world for free on Huskers.com.

In addition to carrying every women's basketball game free on Huskers.com, the Husker Sports Network flagship stations B107.3 FM-KBBK (Lincoln) and ESPN 590 AM-KXSP (Omaha) provide strong signals for Husker women's basketball. When a network conflict occurs in Omaha, the Huskers also could be heard on CD105.9 FM-KKCD. 880-AM-KRVN (Lexington) also provides a huge AM signal

## NEBRASKA OVERTIME FACTS

- Nebraska is 23-24 all-time in overtime games, including 12-11 at home, 8-10 in true road games and 3-3 on neutral courts in overtime.
- The Huskers are 1-1 in overtime games in 2019-20 following a 78-70 OT loss at Michigan State (Dec. 31, 2019). Both of Nebraska's true road games in 2019-20 have gone to overtime, including a 90-85 OT win at Missouri (Nov. 10, 2019).
- Nebraska's lone overtime game of 2018-19 also came in the Huskers' first road game of the season, but NU suffered an 87-84 double-overtime loss at Washington State (Nov. 16, 2019). It marked the second straight season that Nebraska played a multi-overtime game (also at Drake, Dec. 9, 2017).
- The Huskers went 1-1 in overtime in 2017-18, including a 69-64 overtime loss to No. 23 Michigan at Pinnacle Bank Arena (Jan. 13). The Huskers won their first overtime game of 2017-18 with an 89-85 double-overtime win at Drake (Dec. 9).
- Nebraska was 1-1 in overtime in 2016-17, including a 76-74 win over Michigan State at Pinnacle Bank Arena to close the regular season (Feb. 26, 2017). The Huskers lost 79-69 in OT to Minnesota at the arena (Feb. 4, 2017).
- The Huskers are 3-4 in overtime games under Coach Amy Williams.
- Nebraska is 2-2 in overtime games at Pinnacle Bank Arena.
- Nebraska is 5-2 in multi-overtime games with its most recent loss coming in the 87-84 2OT setback at Washington State (Nov. 16, 2018) in Pullman. NU's only other loss in a multi-overtime game came to Purdue in the 2012 Big Ten Championship Game, 74-70 in double-overtime.
- The Huskers defeated Minnesota 88-85 in overtime on Jan. 16, 2014. It marked the first overtime game in the history of Pinnacle Bank Arena. Nebraska's first overtime game in the history of the Bob Devaney Sports Center also came against Minnesota - a 68-67 win for the Huskers on Dec. 30, 1977.
- The Huskers have played 14 all-time overtime games against Big Ten opponents and own a 5-9 record. NU is 4-6 against Big Ten opponents in OT since joining the conference in 2011-12.
- Nebraska played its fourth OT game in 73 meetings with Missouri in a 90-85 OT win at Mizzou Arena (Nov. 10, 2019). All four OT games against the Tigers were settled in a single overtime period.
- Nebraska's next most frequent overtime opponents are Big Ten foes Purdue, Minnesota and Wisconsin. The Huskers and Purdue have played three overtime games in 14 all-time meetings. NU's six total overtimes against Purdue are the most against any team in school history.
- The Huskers also have played three overtime games against Minnesota (22 games), including two of the three overtime games in Pinnacle Bank Arena history.
- In 16 all-time games with Wisconsin the Huskers have played three overtime contests.
- Nebraska has never played back-to-back overtime games at home. The Huskers have played back-to-back overtime games only once in school history, an 83-81 loss to Texas A&M in College Station on Dec. 30, 1985, before returning to Lincoln for an 80-75 win over Eastern Kentucky at the Devaney Center on Jan. 2, 1986.

## NEBRASKA POSTS 15TH STRAIGHT PERFECT GSR

In the eyes of the NCAA's Division I Graduation Success Rate (GSR), the Husker women's basketball program has been perfect for 15 consecutive years. Nebraska is the only program among the 14 Big Ten Conference schools to accomplish the perfect score for 15 straight seasons.

The NCAA announced the release of its annual Graduation Success Rate report on Oct. 16, 2019, and Nebraska was a national leader in women's basketball for the 15th straight season, dating back to the initial public tracking of the GSR since 2004-05.

The Nebraska women's basketball program joins the Husker women's tennis and volleyball programs as Husker teams that have produced perfect 100 percent rates each of the last 15 years.

Nebraska was one of just 28 teams in the 64-team field of the 2018 NCAA Tournament to also boast a 100 percent Graduation Success Rate.

Overall, the Nebraska Athletic Department produced a record-high GSR for the seventh consecutive year, reaching 93 percent. A total of 10 Husker programs recorded perfect 100 percent GSR scores, including women's basketball, volleyball, softball, soccer, swimming and diving, rifle, men's and women's gymnastics and men's and women's tennis.

Nebraska struggled through its worst first quarter of the season, trailing 26-13 after the first 10 minutes, then fell behind 39-18 with 5:21 left in the first half. The Huskers rallied with an 11-0 run to close the half and cut the Purdue margin to 39-29. The Boilermakers pushed the lead back to 13 points midway through the third, before Nebraska closed on a 9-0 run to cut the margin to 54-50 heading to the fourth. NU took its first lead on a Leigha Brown shot that made it 58-56 with 5:48 left. After Purdue briefly regained the lead on a Karissa McLaughlin three, Nicea Eliely scored five straight points to give NU a 63-59 edge with 4:30 left. But Purdue erupted on an 11-0 run over the next three minutes to secure the win. Eliely led Nebraska with 15 points, while Ashtyn Veerbeek added 13. Ae'Rianna Harris led all scorers with 25 points on 10-of-12 shooting while adding a game-high nine rebounds. McLaughlin finished with 19 points, while Dominique Oden added 14 points for the Boilermakers.

Makenzie Helms made her collegiate debut and recorded an assist in Nebraska's season-opening win over Alabama A&M (Nov. 6). She made her second appearance in a win over Morgan State (Nov. 14). She missed NU's games with SIUE and Southern while battling illness.

She recorded the first points and rebounds of her career in a win over Sacred Heart at the South Point Shootout (Nov. 30).

Helms made her first Big Ten appearance in a win over Wisconsin (Jan. 9).

Helms was the 2019 Connecticut High School Player of the Year after averaging 26.5 points, 7.4 rebounds, 6.6 assists and 4.3 steals at East Haven High School.

She was limited during the summer while recovering from offseason surgery and did not compete in Nebraska's summer tour in Europe. However, she has progressed well since the start of the fall semester and could become a contributor for the Huskers as a freshman.

Nebraska Coach Amy Williams said the creative and competitive instincts of Helms will make her an asset for the Huskers in the future.

"We are excited to add Makenzie to the Husker women's basketball family," Williams said. "She has incredible court vision and creates offense for her teammates with tempo and passing ability. Combining that with her confident scoring mentality and her ability to score at all three levels, Makenzie is a great fit for the versatility we like in our system. She is an intense competitor, and we are eager to have her fighting for the Huskers."

## BEFORE NEBRASKA

Helms captured Gatorade Connecticut High School Player-of-the-Year honors by averaging

26.5 points, 7.4 rebounds, 6.6 assists and 4.3 steals while leading the East Haven Yellowjackets to the Southern Connecticut Conference title.

Helms, who was the conference player of the year, led East Haven to a 20-5 overall record and a spot in the Connecticut Class L state quarterfinals.

She was the first commitment to Nebraska's 2018-19 class, making her intentions known in January of 2018. Her commitment followed a junior season in 2017-18 in which Helms averaged 17.5 points, 5.0 rebounds, 7.2 assists and 4.0 steals per game. East Haven finished No. 3 in the state of Connecticut with a 25-3 record in 2017-18. Helms earned first-team all-state honors and was a USA Today first-team All-Connecticut selection.

As a sophomore, Helms averaged 16.7 points, 5.0 rebounds, 6.0 assists and 4.0 steals at the Loomis Chaffee School. She earned All-New England accolades as both a freshman and sophomore.

She played her summer basketball for New Heights NYC for Coach Rock Rosa, averaging 20 points, six rebounds, eight assists and five steals per contest. ESPN ranked her as the No. 27 point guard in the class of 2019.

The final piece of Nebraska's three-player recruiting class, Brady came to Nebraska after completing her senior season at Hamilton Heights Christian Academy in Chattanooga, Tenn. She was ranked as the No. 106 player overall in the 2019 class by Prospects Nation.

The Lady Hawks finished the season No. 18 in the final USA Today Super 25 rankings with a 22-3 overall record. Hamilton Heights Christian Academy fell to Riverdale Baptist in the NACA Championships.

Brady competed for Lawrence North High School in Indianapolis her first three seasons.

### FRESHMAN (2019-20)

Trinity Brady brings strength and versatility to Nebraska's backcourt as a freshman in 2019-20. One of the top high school players in Indiana in 2017-18, the 5-11 Brady completed her prep career at Hamilton Heights Christian Academy in Tennessee.

Brady missed Nebraska's first 10 games as part of the concussion protocol, before making her regular-season debut in the win over Manhattan (Dec. 22). Brady played strong defense while recording two points, four rebounds, an assist and a block in 16 minutes off the bench against the Jaspers. She hit the first three-pointer of her career and added two assists and her first career steal in the win over Iowa (Dec. 28). Brady's three gave Nebraska a 30-27 second-quarter lead, and the Huskers led the rest of the way.

She sparked a 10-0 first-quarter run at Michigan State with two points, two steals and two rebounds to help Nebraska lead for much of the game against the Spartans before falling in OT on New Year's Eve in East Lansing.

Brady scored a career-high seven points and knocked down a career-best two threes while adding two rebounds in nine minutes off the bench at Rutgers (Jan. 12).

Brady scored eight points and had eight rebounds in an exhibition win over Rogers State (Nov. 2). An opponent fell on Brady inside the paint late in the game, contacting her head and shoulder area.

Nebraska Coach Amy Williams said Brady's skill, work ethic and high basketball IQ could make her a strong contributor to the future of the Husker program.

"Our coaching staff has been very impressed with Trinity's coachability and how quickly she picks things up," Williams said. "She is already one of our better help-defenders, and she is

## SOPHOMORE (2018-19)

Kissinger led the Big Ten by tying the Nebraska season three-point field goal percentage record (.456, 62-136). Her 62 threes were the fifth-best total by a sophomore in Husker history.

She averaged 8.9 points, 3.2 rebounds and 1.2 assists. She started NU's first 24 games, before missing starts at No. 7 Maryland (Feb. 14) and No. 24 Michigan State (Feb. 17) while recovering from illness.

She came off the bench the final six games, producing double figures in three of those six games, including a 15-point effort on 5-of-10 three-point shooting in the Big Ten Tournament against Purdue (March 7). Her five threes were the third-best total by a Husker in Big Ten Tournament history.

She closed the regular season with 14 points on 4-of-5 three-point shooting in a road win at Penn State (March 2).

Kissinger had a record-setting effort against USC Upstate (Nov. 11) when she went a perfect 6-for-6 from three-point range on her way to a season-high 22 points.

She had 18 points in a win over Denver (Dec. 15), after getting 17 vs. San Jose State (Dec. 8).

Kissinger posted her second career double-double with 11 points and a career-high 11 rebounds in a win over KU (Dec. 5).

She notched 12 double-figure efforts on the year, including 15 points at Wisconsin (Jan. 27), 12 at Michigan (Feb. 7).

## FRESHMAN (2017-18)

Kissinger averaged 10.0 points, 4.1 rebounds and 1.4 assists in 25 games with seven starts. She shot 40.8 percent from the field, including 36.2 percent from three-point range, while knocking down 71.7 percent of her free throws. She joined Kate Cain (9.9 ppg) as the first pair of Husker freshmen to both average 9.9 points per game since Debra Powell and Crystal Coleman in 1981-82.

Kissinger made an instant impact, averaging a team-best 14.0 points per game through NU's first seven contests before suffering a knee injury

## JUNIOR (2019-20)

One of the nation's most accurate long-range shooters, Taylor Kissinger battled a pair of early season injuries before being forced out for the season prior to Nebraska's game with Oral Roberts (Dec. 14). Kissinger, who battled a hip injury throughout preseason and non-conference play, underwent season-ending hip surgery on Jan. 3.

Kissinger had four points and pulled down a team-high eight rebounds off the bench in Nebraska's season-opening win over Alabama A&M (Nov. 6), then entered the concussion protocol after a collision in practice (Nov. 8). She missed Nebraska's next four games. Prior to succumbing to the hip injury, Kissinger tied a career-high with six three-pointers to finish with a team-high 19 points in a win over Duke (Dec. 4). She also tied a career high with four assists.

She scored 11 points in a win over Sacred Heart (Nov. 30), after putting up eight points in a win over USC (Nov. 29). Kissinger returned to action against Creighton (Nov. 24), but had just one full practice leading up to the game.

Kissinger ranked No. 4 nationally and led the Big Ten with her .456 three-point percentage as a sophomore.

The 6-1 shooter from Minden, Neb., made 24 starts while enjoying her healthiest season since early in her high school career.

She missed six consecutive games for the Huskers to close non-conference play.

Kissinger produced 12 double-figure scoring efforts in 25 contests, including a career-high 25 points in a win over Arkansas (Nov. 16).

Her parents were both collegiate student-athletes, with Brian playing basketball and Amy playing volleyball at NCAA Division II Nebraska-Kearney. Jamie completed her eligibility at San Diego in 2017-18. Taylor's brother Derek played college basketball at NAIA Hastings College.

A mathematics education major, Taylor is a four-time member of the Nebraska Scholar-Athlete Honor Roll. She also earned spots on the Tom Osborne Citizenship Team in 2018 and 2019.

Isabelle Bourne is making immediate contributions to the Huskers as a freshman. The 6-2 forward from Canberra, Australia, is averaging 5.5 points and 4.9 rebounds through 20 games.

Bourne produced career highs with 11 points, eight rebounds and two blocks in Nebraska's win over Wisconsin (Jan. 9). She played a career-high 24 minutes off the bench against the Badgers. She followed with nine points and a career-high matching eight boards in 19 minutes at Rutgers (Jan. 12). She added eight points and four rebounds at No. 20 Maryland (Jan. 16), to go along with seven points and four boards against Purdue (Jan. 22).

She opened Big Ten play by matching then-career highs with eight points and seven rebounds to go along with a career-high two three-pointers in the win over Iowa (Dec. 28).

She also played a strong role inside with six points, seven rebounds and two blocks in a win over Duke (Dec. 4). She added six points and seven more rebounds vs. Manhattan (Dec. 22).

Bourne had eight points, six rebounds and two assists in a win over USC (Nov. 29). She added eight points, five boards and two blocks in a win at Wisconsin (Jan. 25).

One of the most talented young players in Australia, Bourne joined the Huskers in August of 2019 after helping the Gems to a silver medal at 2019 FIBA Under-19 World Cup in Bangkok, Thailand, July 20-28.

The Australian U19 National Team entered the tournament ranked No. 7 in the world, but came up just short of the gold medal, falling 74-70 in overtime to the United States.

In 2017, Bourne led Australia's U17 team to gold at the Oceania Championship in Guam by averaging 19 points, 9.8 rebounds and 2.6 assists to claim a spot on the all-tournament team. She was also the MVP of the 2017 FIBA Under-18 Asia Cup 3-on-3 tournament in Mongolia, leading her team to another gold medal. Bourne was also named to the Gems squad for the 2018 FIBA Under-18 Asian Championships.

Bourne trained at the Australian Institute of Sport and Basketball Australia's Centre of Excellence under Coach Kristen Veal. She was also a developmental player in the University of Canberra Capitals program.

## PERSONAL

Her older sister, Callie, is a sophomore guard at Idaho State, and her oldest sister, Emma, also

plays in the Canberra Capitals Academy. Callie, a 5-9 guard, leads Idaho State in scoring (12.6 ppg) and rebounding (7.2 rpg) to go along with 1.7 assists and 1.3 steals through 18 games this season. She had a career-high 26 points in a win at Weber State (Jan. 16). Last season, she averaged 4.1 points and 3.6 rebounds.

Isabelle's father, Trent, played Australian Football, while her mother, Ann, was a basketball player.

Bourne chose Nebraska over Marquette, Arizona State and Utah.

"I really connected with the coaches when I first met them, and then was very impressed with the team culture, facilities and Lincoln when I came on an official visit," Bourne said. "I also knew two former players who spoke very highly of the NU experience."
