The Nebraska Cornhuskers begin an abbreviated 2020 season on Saturday when the Huskers travel to Columbus, Ohio, to take on the fifth-ranked and defending Big Ten champion Ohio State Buckeyes.

Nebraska, which is playing its latest season opener in more than 125 years, is scheduled to play a nine-game, conference-only schedule. NU will take on all six Big Ten West opponents in addition to crossover contests with Big Ten East opponents Ohio State and Penn State. The ninth game will be part of "Big Ten Champions Week" where all seven Big Ten games will be cross-divisional matchups between teams in similar standings in the East and West divisions, including the Big Ten Championship Game.

Saturday's season opener marks Nebraska's first game in 330 days, dating back to Black Friday last year. The stretch of 330 days without a game is the second-longest in school history, trailing only the 331 days between the 1892 and 1893 seasons. Saturday's game also pits two of college football's historical powers against each other. Nebraska and Ohio State are two of the seven college football programs who have won 900 games, and Saturday's contest will be just the eighth meeting in college football history between 900-win programs.

Ohio State defeated Nebraska 48-7 in Lincoln last year, but the Huskers were competitive in their last trip to the Horseshoe. In 2018, Nebraska led by five at halftime before falling 36-31 to the eighth-ranked Buckeyes. That game marks the last time Ohio State has trailed at any point in the second half at home.

Scott Frost begins his third season as Nebraska's head coach on Saturday. Frost, the 2017 national coach of the year, is 9-15 in his first two seasons with nine losses by seven or fewer points, including eight by five or fewer points.

Saturday's game will mark just the eighth meeting between 900-win programs in college football history. Last year's meeting between the Huskers and Buckeyes was only the second meeting between 900-win teams.

Nebraska has won its last four season openers against a ranked opponent, defeating No. 11 Florida State in 1986, No. 10 Texas A&M in 1987, No. 24 West Virginia in 1994 and No. 24 Oklahoma State in 2003.

SERIES HISTORY: NEBRASKA VS. OHIO STATE

Ohio State holds a 7-1 all-time edge in the series, including a 5-1 advantage since Nebraska joined the Big Ten Conference in 2011.

- The schools are meeting for the fifth straight season and will meet again next year in Lincoln before taking a break from the series in 2022.
- Nebraska won the first matchup between the schools as Big Ten opponents, a 34-27 win at Memorial Stadium in 2011, the Huskers' first-ever Big Ten home game. Nebraska rallied from a 27-6 deficit to post its first Big Ten victory, marking the largest comeback in school history.
- With Ohio State ranked No. 5 in this week's Associated Press poll, the Buckeyes have been ranked no lower than 12th in the past six meetings between the schools and in the top 10 in each of the past five matchups.
- In Scott Frost's lone trip to Columbus in 2018, Nebraska fell to No. 8 Ohio State 36-31. The fivepoint setback marks the only home game the Buckeyes have failed to win by double digits over the past two seasons.

HUSKER-OHIO STATE MATCHUP PITS TWO TRADITIONAL POWERS

Saturday's matchup features two of the historically dominant programs in college football. Ohio State and Nebraska are two of only seven teams who have won 900 games, with Ohio State ranking second all-time with 924 wins and the Huskers ranking seventh with 902 victories.

- Saturday's matchup between the Huskers and Buckeyes is just the eighth in college football history between 900-win programs, two of which have been Nebraska-Ohio State matchups.
- The schools have combined to win 1,826 games, 11 national championships and 86 conference titles, including five national championships and 46 conference crowns by Nebraska.

HUSKER HISTORY IN SEASON OPENERS

Nebraska has an impressive history in season openers. The Huskers have won 98 of their 130 season openers, winning their first game more than 77 percent of the time while posting a 98-27-5 record.

- Nebraska is 33-2 in its first game of the season dating back to 1986.
- The Huskers are opening a season on road for only the fourth time in the past 42 seasons and for the first time since 1999, when Nebraska began its Big 12 championship season with a 42-7 win at lowa.

RANKED FOE A RARITY IN A SEASON OPENER

Saturday's game will mark the first time in 17 years that Nebraska has faced a ranked opponent in its season opener. The unranked Huskers opened the 2003 season with a 17-7 win over No. 24 Oklahoma State in their last opener against a ranked opponent.

- Nebraska is 7-4 when taking on a ranked opponent in a season opener. The Huskers have won their last four season openers against ranked opponents dating back to 1986.
- The Huskers are 4-2 when facing a top-10 opponent in a season opener. That includes a 14-13 win at No. 4 Texas to open the 1960 season, Nebraska's only season-opening road win over a ranked opponent in program history.

FROST SET FOR THIRD SEASON

Scott Frost is set for his third season at Nebraska in 2020. The consensus 2017 national coach of the year, Frost boasts a 28-22 career record in four seasons as a collegiate head coach.

- Frost is 9-15 in his first two seasons at Nebraska, with nine losses by seven or fewer points, including eight by five or fewer points.
- Nebraska went 5-7 in 2019, a one-game improvement over the previous two seasons. NU's 12-game schedule in 2019 featured six teams that were ranked in the top 25 at least once during the season, including four that finished the year in the top 15.
- Frost has improved upon his team's previous season record every year he has been a head coach. At UCF, Frost - who inherited a winless team - went from 6-7 in his first season to 13-0 in year two. He improved by one game at Nebraska from 2018 to 2019.
- At UCF, Frost became the first coach in FBS history to turn a winless team into an undefeated team
 in just two years.
- Of Frost's 10 assistant coaches, seven have been with him in each of his five seasons as a collegiate head coach, while Mike Dawson has been on four of Frost's five staffs.
- In 13 years as a full-time assistant or head coach, Frost's teams have posted a 131-40 record, averaging more than 10 wins per season. Frost has been a part of seven conference championship teams in his 13 seasons and has twice coached in the national championship game.
- Frost's teams have been ranked in the top 15 in 10 of his 13 seasons, including eight final top-10 rankings and six final top-five rankings.

NEW FACES, NEW ROLES ON HUSKER COACHING STAFF

Seven of Nebraska's 10 full-time assistant coaches return for their third season in 2020, and all seven have been a member of Scott Frost's staff for his entire five-year head coaching career. The Huskers also welcome two new assistant coaches this season, but both are familiar with Frost.

- Matt Lubick joins the staff as Nebraska's offensive coordinator and wide receivers coach. Lubick previously was the offensive coordinator at Pac-12 powers Oregon and Washington. He succeeded Frost as the Ducks' offensive coordinator, as Lubick was the passing game coordinator and wide receivers coach in each of Frost's three seasons as Oregon's offensive coordinator.
- The other new face on the Husker sideline is a familiar one. **Mike Dawson**, who was on Frost's staff for both seasons at UCF, coached the Husker defensive line in 2018 before moving on to the NFL in 2019, coaching outside linebackers for the New York Giants. In his return to Nebraska, Dawson will coach the outside linebackers.
- In addition to the two new full-time assistant coaches, Frost announced new titles and roles for two other members of the staff. **Greg Austin** adds the title of run game coordinator to his duties as offensive line coach, while **Ryan Held** will serve as recruiting coordinator in addition to continuing his role as running backs coach.

• The Husker staff features three Broyles Award nominees in defensive coordinator Erik Chinander (2016 at UCF), offensive coordinator Matt Lubick (2012 at Duke) and quarterbacks coach Mario Verduzco (2018 at Nebraska). The Broyles Award is presented annually to the nation's top assistant coach. Lubick was also named the national wide receivers coach of the year and an AFCA Assistant Coach of the Year finalist in 2012.

HUSKERS RETURN OFFENSIVE PRODUCTION

Nebraska boasts plenty of returning offensive production in 2020. NU returns more than 80 percent of its yards from last year in rushing (86 percent), passing (82 percent) and total offense (82 percent).

- Nebraska returns its top three rushers from last season in Dedrick Mills (745), Adrian Martinez (626) and Wan'Dale Robinson (340).
- The Husker rushing attack improved throughout 2019. Nebraska averaged 254 rushing yards per game over its final three contests while facing a pair of top-15 rushing defenses in that stretch (No. 6 Wisconsin and No. 14 Iowa).
- Mills averaged 115.7 rushing yards per game over Nebraska's final three contests, despite playing only the first half of the Huskers' win at Maryland. He ran for a career-high 188 yards on 17 carries against Wisconsin, averaging more than 11 yards per carry. Mills' 188 individual yards were more rushing yards than Wisconsin allowed to 11 of the 12 other teams it faced during the 2019 season.
- NU also returns its leading passer in Adrian Martinez (1,956 yards), while Luke McCaffrey showed promise in limited action last year, completing 9-of-12 passes for 142 yards and two touchdowns.
- In the receiving game, Nebraska must replace two of its three leading receivers from 2019. Wan'Dale Robinson, who split time at running back last fall, is NU's top returning receiver after he ranked second on the team with 40 catches and 453 receiving yards in 2019. Tight end Jack Stoll also returns after ranking third with 25 catches in 2019 and fourth with 234 receiving yards.
- Robinson was one of four national finalists for the Paul Hornung Award (nation's most versatile player) in 2019, joining Ameer Abdullah as the only Huskers to be a Hornung Award finalist. Robinson was also on the preseason watch list for the 2020 Paul Hornung Award, while Stoll earned a spot on the Mackey Award (nation's top tight end) watch list in 2018, 2019 and 2020.
- With Nebraska most likely to rely on newcomers at the wideout position, NU signed the top junior college wide receiver in the 2020 class (Omar Manning) and the No. 12 high school wideout and top 60 overall recruit (Zavier Betts). Nebraska also added graduate transfer Levi Falck, who caught 70 passes for 774 yards in 24 games the past three seasons at South Dakota.

A TALE OF TWO LINES

Nebraska returns every offensive line starter from last season, while the Huskers must replace every defensive line starter, as all three 2019 starting defensive linemen are on NFL rosters.

- Based on available records, 2020 is believed to be the first time Nebraska returns its entire starting offensive line since two-platoon systems were first allowed under NCAA rules in 1964.
- Nebraska is the only team in the country who had the same starting offensive line (by player and position) for every game during the 2019 season and returned all five of those starters.
- Nebraska had the same starting offensive line for all 12 games in 2019, one of eight teams nationally to start the same five linemen every game. It marked the first time since 2010 that NU had the same starting line for an entire season.
- Nebraska's five returning starting offensive linemen have combined for 106 career starts, including three players who have made at least 20 consecutive starts at their position. Entering the 2020 season, Nebraska's 106 combined starts among offensive linemen ranked eighth nationally.
- The returning starters are **Brenden Jaimes** (24 straight starts at left tackle; 33 straight starts overall), Matt Farniok (24 straight starts at right tackle), Boe Wilson (21 straight starts at right quard), Trent Hixson (12 straight starts at left guard) and Cam Jurgens (12 straight starts at center).
- Jaimes is a two-time honorable-mention All-Big Ten pick, while Wilson was honorable mention in 2018 and Jurgens is the only Husker freshman (true or redshirt) to ever start at center.
- On defense, the Huskers must replace all three defensive line starters, all of whom are now on NFL rosters. The last time Nebraska had to replace its entire defensive line was in 2016.
- Ben Stille is Nebraska's most experienced defensive lineman. The senior has started 14 games at defensive end in his career and is the Huskers' active leader with 23 tackles for loss and 11.5 sacks. Damion Daniels is the only other defensive lineman whith a career start (1 start in 2019).

MARTINEZ RANKS AMONG NATION'S TOP QUARTERBACKS

Adrian Martinez has put up statistics in his two seasons that have him ranked among the top quarterbacks in the country and among the best to ever play the position at Nebraska. Martinez has thrown for 4,573 career yards, rushed for 1,255 yards and totaled 5,828 yards of offense.

He owns three NU career records, four season records and one game record. Last season, Martinez was just the second Husker sophomore to be a team captain since 1930.

- Martinez enters his junior season as Nebraska's all-time leader in total offensive yards per game (277.5) and 400-yard total offense games (4). He has produced four of Nebraska's 16 individual 400-yard total offense performances, and Martinez's career average of 277.5 yards of total offense per game is 40 yards higher than any other Husker quarterback who played in at least 15 career games.
- Martinez averaged a school-record 295.1 yards of total offense per game as a true freshman in 2018, an average that ranked 12th nationally, led all freshmen and was the ninth-highest average by a freshman in NCAA history, including the third-best mark by a true freshman.
- Martinez also set NU season records for 300-yard total offense games (7) and 400-yard total offense games (3) in 2018.
- Martinez set an NU record with an 86.2 completion percentage against Minnesota in 2018, connecting on 25-of-29 passes for 276 yards and three touchdowns.
- At Illinois in 2019, Martinez produced the second 300-yard passing and 100-yard rushing performance in Nebraska history (328 passing, 118 rushing). His career-high 446 yards of total offense was the third-highest total in program history.
- Martinez has been one of the nation's top dual threat quarterbacks. He was one of only six active FBS quarterbacks who entered the 2020 season with 4,000 career passing yards and 1,000 career rushing yards. Martinez is only the fourth Husker with 4,000 career passing yards and 1,000 career rushing yards.
- In 2018, Martinez became just the sixth freshman in NCAA history to average 200 passing yards and 50 rushing yards per game and just the second true freshman to hit those marks. Martinez was also one of only four FBS quarterbacks regardless of class who averaged 225 passing yards and 50 rushing yards per game in 2018.

NEBRASKA LINEBACKING CORPS A MIX OF VETERANS, YOUTH

Nebraska must replace one starting inside and outside linebacker, but the Huskers have players with starting experience to fill those roles. NU will also rely on youth at the position, as 22 of the 29 linebackers on the Husker roster are either freshmen or sophomores.

- Outside linebackers JoJo Domann and Caleb Tannor split time as starters in 2019, and Domann had nine TFLs, the most of any returning Husker.
- Domann and Tannor are two of only four upperclassmen among NU's 14 outside linebackers, with the other two being juniors **Lance McCallum** and **Damian Jackson**. Both are in their first year playing outside linebacker as McCallum is a converted safety and Jackson is a former defensive linemen. Nebraska's other 10 outside linebackers are either freshmen or sophomores.
- Seniors **Will Honas** and **Collin Miller** split time at inside linebacker in 2019. Honas ranked second on the team with 73 tackles, while Miller tied for third with 67 tackles.
- Honas and Miller are two of the three upperclassmen among Nebraska's 15 inside linebacker, along
 with first-year junior college transfer Eteva Mauga-Clements. The other 12 inside linebackers are
 all either freshmen or sophomores.

SECONDARY LOOKS STRONG AGAIN

Nebraska's secondary was stout in 2019, as the Huskers allowed only 200.8 passing yards per game, the program's fewest yards allowed since 2012. Although NU must replace starting all-conference cornerback Lamar Jackson, the rest of last year's regular secondary members return.

- Dicaprio Bootle, a third-team All-Big Ten selection in 2018 and honorable-mention pick in 2019, has started 24 consecutive games. He can play either cornerback or safety and his 21 career pass breakups are one shy of 10th place in Nebraska history.
- Cam Taylor-Britt can also play either safety or cornerback. In 10 starts as a sophomore in 2019, Taylor-Britt ranked third nationally in forced fumbles and also intercepted three passes.
- Marquel Dismuke started all 12 games at safety last fall, and he led the secondary with a careerhigh 67 tackles, which tied for third on the team overall. Dismuke also added four pass breakups.
- The secondary also figures to get a boost from the return of **Deontai Williams**, who suffered a season-ending injury in the first game of 2019. In his first season at Nebraska in 2018, Williams was a ballhawk who led NU in interceptions (2), forced fumbles (2) and fumble recoveries (1).

NEBRASKA AIMS FOR SPECIAL TEAMS IMPROVEMENT

Nebraska will essentially field an entirely new special teams unit this season - including a new special teams coach - as it aims to improve in that aspect of the game in 2020.

- According to Football Outsiders, Nebraska's special teams unit ranked 112th nationally last season and 85th in 2018. To help improve those rankings, Scott Frost hired **Jonathan Rutledge** as Nebraska's Senior Special Teams Analyst during the offseason. With Auburn the past two seasons, Rutledge led a Tigers' special teams unit that was ranked 13th nationally in 2019 and 14th in 2018 by Football Outsiders.
- Nebraska will be looking for both a new punter and place-kicker this season, along with a new long snapper and holder. NU must also replace its top punt returner from last season.
- No player on the roster has ever punted for Nebraska and all four punters are underclassmen. Sophomore **William Przystup** averaged 40.6 yards on 27 punts at Michigan State as a freshman

in 2018, and he is the lone Husker who has punted in a collegiate game. One of two newcomers at punter is freshman **Daniel Cerni**, who comes to Nebraska from Prokick Australia, which has produced five Ray Guy Award winners.

- Nebraska used six place-kickers last season and the only one that returns for 2020 is Lane
 - **McCallum**, an outside linebacker who filled in as an emergency kicker last season and figures to focus exclusively on defense this fall. NU added five place-kickers to its roster during the offseason, including a pair of transfers. Senior **Connor Culp** joined Nebraska as a graduate transfer from LSU, and he was the Tigers' starting place-kicker as a sophomore in 2017, connecting on 11-of-16 field goals. Sophomore **Chase Contreraz** is in his first season after making 15-of-18 field goals as a freshman for lowa Western Community College in 2019.
- At long snapper, Nebraska must replace Chase Urbach, who started every game last season. The Huskers have four dedicated long snappers on their roster all of whom are in either their first or second year with the program while junior outside linebacker **Damian Jackson** began practicing as a long snapper last season. No current Husker has ever snapped in a collegiate game.
- In the return game, **Wan'Dale Robinson** is back after leading Nebraska with 11 kickoff returns and 236 kickoff return yards in 2019. In the punt return game, no current Husker has ever returned a punt at the collegiate level.

HUSKER STREAKS CONTINUE INTO 2020 SEASON

A pair of impressive team streaks and several individual streaks will continue this season, while a legendary streak takes a one-year hiatus in 2020.

- Nebraska has sold out 375 consecutive games at Memorial Stadium, dating from the next-to-last home game of the 1962 season through all seven home games last season. With the Big Ten Conference decision to prohibit the sale of tickets this year, the Huskers' legendary sellout streak an NCAA record will pause during the 2020 season. Nebraska's streak will remain at 375 consecutive home sellouts until next year's home opener with Buffalo on Sept. 11, 2021.
- The Huskers have scored in 307 consecutive games. The streak is the longest in school history, the seventh-longest in FBS history and the fifth-longest active streak. The last time Nebraska was shut out was a 19-0 loss at No. 17 Arizona State on Sept. 21, 1996.
- Nebraska has also scored in 341 consecutive home games, a school record. The last time the Huskers were shut out at home came on Nov. 9, 1968 against Kansas State (12-0 loss).
- The Huskers scored at least 35 points twice in seven home games last season. Nebraska is 251-0 all-time when scoring 35 or more points at home. **Scott Frost** is also 21-0 in his head coaching career when his team scores at least 35 points.
- Several individual Huskers have double-digit streaks of consecutive starts, including five offensive linemen. Brenden Jaimes has started 33 consecutive games overall and 24 straight at left tackle, Dicaprio Bootle (cornerback/safety), Matt Farniok (right tackle) and Jack Stoll (tight end) have each started 24 consecutive games, Boe Wilson (right guard) has made 21 consecutive starts and Trent Hixson (left guard) and Cam Jurgens (center) have each started 12 consecutive games.

HUSKERS OWN BIG HOME-FIELD ADVANTAGE

Nebraska has enjoyed much success in its history when playing at home in front of the greatest fans in college football. Recently, the Huskers have won at least six home games in 24 of the past 33 seasons. Nebraska is 178-40 (.838) at home over the last 30 seasons.

- Since 1970, NU is 280-55 (.836) at Memorial Stadium and has posted 41 perfect home seasons.
- The Huskers are 549-159-20 all-time in Lincoln (.768 in 130 years).
- Nebraska is 422-136-13 in Memorial Stadium (.750 in 96 years dating back to 1923).
- The Huskers are 47-8 all-time in Memorial Stadium night games.

NEBRASKA AMONG TOP ALL-TIME PROGRAMS

Nebraska is playing its 131st season this fall, and the Huskers boast a 902-395-40 all-time record in 1,337 games (.690). Nebraska is one of seven programs with 900 wins.

- Nebraska joined the 900-win club at Illinois on Sept. 21, 2019, joining Michigan, Ohio State, Texas and Alabama in that club. Notre Dame and Oklahoma joined the elite club on Sept. 28.
- Since 1970, Nebraska owns a 468-154-5 record (.750) with five national championships. The Huskers rank second among all FBS programs in national titles and third in wins since 1970.
- Nebraska boasts 27 10-win seasons in school history, including 24 since 1970. The Huskers also have 12 seasons with 11 or more wins, seven seasons with 12 or more wins and three 13-win seasons.
- The Huskers own 50 nine-win seasons, tied with Alabama for the most in NCAA history. Forty-two of those nine-win seasons have come since 1970 and 48 since 1962, 13 more than any other school.
- Nebraska was the first team in NCAA history to win 100 games in consecutive decades, leading the nation with 103 wins in the 1980s and ranking second with 108 wins in the 1990s.

HUSKERS RANK HIGHLY IN NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIPS

Nebraska has won five national championships, including three outright titles (1971, 1994, 1995) and two shared championships (1970, 1997). In 1970, Nebraska was awarded the Associated Press national title, but was No. 3 in the coaches poll behind No. 1 Texas and No. 2 Ohio State, both of whom lost their bowl games (the coaches' poll was voted on before bowl games). In 1997, undefeated Nebraska was voted No. 1 in the coaches' poll, while undefeated Michigan was No. 1 in the AP poll.

- Nebraska's four AP national championships rank seventh all-time.
- The Huskers' four coaches' poll national championships rank fourth all-time.

NEBRASKA NO. 2 IN CONFERENCE TITLES

Nebraska is one of only five schools in NCAA history that has won at least 40 conference championships, ranking second all-time with 46 conference titles. In 36 seasons (1962-97) under Hall-of-Fame coaches Bob Devaney (8) and Tom Osborne (13), the Huskers won 21 conference titles.

NEBRASKA ALSO EXCELS IN THE CLASSROOM

Nebraska's rich tradition is not limited to the field, as the Huskers have been outstanding in the classroom as well.

- Nebraska owns the NCAA record with 340 CoSIDA Academic All-Americans across all sports.
- Husker football has produced 108 CoSIDA Academic All-Americans, the most of any single sport in NCAA history.
- Nebraska owns the NCAA record with 17 NCAA Top 10 Award Winners, which is considered the "Heisman Trophy" of academics for NCAA student-athletes.
- Nebraska football has produced nine NCAA Top 10 Award winners, the most of any single team in NCAA history.
- Nebraska recorded an all-time high in the most recent NCAA Graduation Success Rate numbers released in October of 2019. Nebraska's all-sports GSR rate of 93 percent marked the seventh consecutive year the Huskers GSR rate had improved.
- The football team posted a program-record team grade-point average of 3.297 in the 2020 spring semester. Entering this fall, the team's 3.149 cumulative GPA was also the highest in program history.

- Nebraska and Arkansas are the only teams in the country scheduled to play more than four top-15 opponents from a season ago. Arkansas faces five 2019 top-15 opponents in 10 games, while Nebraska faces five top-15 opponents in its eight scheduled games.
- The Huskers' original 12-game schedule was altered to become a 10-game conferenceonly schedule on Aug. 5. Six days later on Aug. 11, the Big Ten Conference postponed the season. The Big Ten then announced a nine-game conference-only slate on Sept. 16.
- With a nine-game schedule, Nebraska is set to play its fewest regular-season games since an eight-game slate in 1944. Nebraska is also opening the season on its latest date (Oct. 24) since 1892.

COACHING STAFF NOTES

- Scott Frost is in his fifth season as a head coach. Frost is one of four former Husker players to return to the Nebraska sideline as head coach, and he is one of 17 FBS head coaches coaching at his alma mater in 2020.
- Nebraska's staff also includes former Huskers Greg Austin (2003-06), Ryan Held (1993-96) and Barrett Ruud (2001-04).
- Frost is one of only four FBS head coaches to win a national title as a player. Both Frost (1995 & 1997) and Ryan Held (1994 & 1995) were two-time national champions as players at Nebraska.
- Frost and seven of his 10 assistant coaches are in their fifth consecutive season working together, including two seasons at UCF.
- There are two new addition to the staff in 2020.
 Matt Lubick is in his first season as the Huskers' offensive coordinator and wide receivers coach.
 Mike Dawson, who spent the 2016 and 2017 seasons on Frost's UCF staff and the 2018 season on Frost's Nebraska staff, returns to Lincoln to coach the outside linebackers.
- Frost was the consensus choice as the 2017 national coach of the year, while offensive coordinator Matt Lubick was a finalist for AFCA Assistant Coach of the Year in 2012. Defensive coordinator Erik Chinander was a nominee for the 2016 Broyles Award and quarterbacks coach Mario Verduzco was a Broyles Award nominee in 2018.

ROSTER NOTES

- Nebraska's roster features 154 players. NU is believed to have the largest roster of any non-service academy in the country.
- The roster features players from 27 different states, including 64 homegrown Huskers. Besides Nebraska, the states with at least five players ont he roster are: Florida (10), Georgia (8), Iowa (8), Texas (7), Colorado (6), Arizona (5) and Oklahoma (5).
- The roster also features three players from foreign countries in Daniel Cerni (Australia), Barron Miles Jr. (Canada) and Nouredin Nouili (Germany). Nebraska has had only one letterwinner from Australia and Germany.
- The roster features 53 newcomers, including 39 true freshmen and 14 transfers. NU added five FBS transfers - four from Power Five teams - one FCS transfer and eight junior college transfers.
- More than two-thirds of the Husker roster is underclassmen, as 109 of the 154 players are either freshmen or sophomores (71 percent).
- Nebraska has 79 freshmen on its roster, more than the sophomore, junior and senior classes combined. Fifty-one percent of NU's roster is freshmen, the second straight season freshmen have made up more than half of the roster.
- Nebraska has four sets of brothers on its 2020 roster (Brant & Brig Banks; lan & Nate Boerkircher; Matt & Will Farniok; Connor & Corbin Ruth). The four sets of brothers ties for the second-most brothers on any FBS roster.
- The Husker team captains are seniors Dicaprio Bootle, Matt Farniok and Collin Miller and juniors Adrian Martinez and Kade Warner. Farniok and Martinez are serving as captains for the second straight season.


ACADEMIC NOTES

- The Husker football program has produced more CoSIDA Academic All-Americans (108) than any other sport in NCAA history.
- A total of 11 Huskers are playing the 2020 season as graduates, including 10 of 18 seniors.

- Six more Huskers are on track to graduate in December. If that happens, 15 members of the 18-player senior class and two juniors will have earned their degrees before season's end.
- Nebraska posted a 3.297 team GPA in the 2020 spring semester, the highest record team GPA in program history. NU also entered this semester with a 3.149 cumulative team gradepoint average, the highest in program history.

HOME OF THE HUSKERS



Memorial Stadium's history dates nearly 100 years. In the fall of 1922, a drive for \$430,000 in stadium construction funds was undertaken by faculty, students, alumni and friends of the University.

The stadium was named Memorial Stadium to honor all Nebraskans who served in the Civil and Spanish-American Wars; the 751 Nebraskans who died in World War I; the 3,839 in World War II; the 225 in Korea; the 422 in Vietnam; and those in Iraq.

Construction was completed in a few more than 90 working days and Memorial Stadium was dedicated on Oct. 20, 1923, at the Homecoming game in which Nebraska was held to a scoreless tie by Kansas.

The field at Memorial Stadium was named Tom Osborne Field - after the Huskers' legendary Hall-of-Fame coach - in 1998, one year after Osborne's retirement following 25 years and 255 victories as head coach.

HEAD COACH SCOTT FROST



HISTORIC TURNAROUND AT UCF

At UCF, Frost produced the greatest two-year turnaround in college football history, inheriting an 0-12 team and leading the Knights to a 13-0 record just two years later.

- In his first season in 2016, Frost made history as the only first-time head coach in FBS history to make a bowl game with a team that was winless the previous season.
- UCF tied for the national lead with a six-win improvement from the 2015 to 2016 season.
 The Knights then ranked third nationally after improving by seven wins from the 2016 to 2017 season.
- The Knights' seven-win improvement from 2016 to 2017 ranked 11th in NCAA history and marked just the second time ever a bowl team improved by more than six wins the next season.
- UCF was the American Athletic Conference and Peach Bowl champions and was the only FBS team to go undefeated in 2017.
- Frost called UCF's plays, orchestrating the greatest two-year offensive turnaround in NCAA history. The Knights went from last to fifth in total offense, improving their output by more than 260 yards per game. UCF also went from third-to-last to first in scoring offense, improving by nearly 35 points per game.

13-0 AS A PLAYER & COACH

In his second year as a head coach, Scott Frost guided UCF to a 13-0 record in 2017, when the Knights were the nation's only undefeated team.

- Frost became the fourth coach in FBS history to post a 13-0 record or better in either his first or second season as a head coach. Among that quartet, Frost is the only coach who inherited a team that won fewer than five games, as UCF went 0-12 the year before Frost's arrival.
- Frost is one of only seven active FBS head coaches who has posted a 13-0 season or better, joining Jimbo Fisher, Ed Orgeron, Gary Patterson, Nick Saban, Dabo Swinney and Kyle Whittingham.
- Frost also led Nebraska to a 13-0 record and a national title as the Huskers' starting quarterback in 1997. Frost was the first person in NCAA history to be part of a 13-0 season as both a player and a head coach.

NATIONAL COACH OF THE YEAR

Frost was the consensus choice as the 2017 national coach of the year, earning the honor from at least eight different organizations.

- Frost won the 2017 Paul "Bear" Bryant Award as the national coach of the year. He joined Chris Petersen (2006 & 2009, Boise State) as the only coaches in the 32-year history of the award to win the honor while coaching a team outside of a Power Five Conference.
- Frost was also the AP Coach of the Year, becoming the sixth coach to win the award in his first or second season as a head coach.

FROST A TOP OFFENSIVE COACH

For each of the last 11 years, Scott Frost has either been an offensive assistant, offensive coordinator or head coach who calls the offensive plays. During that time, he has consistently proven to be one of the nation's finest offensive coaches.

- In 11 seasons coaching offense, Frost has worked with eight units that finished in the top 10 nationally in scoring, including seven that ranked in the top five.
- Frost has also been a part of seven teams that ranked in the top 10 nationally in total offense the past 11 seasons.

FROST A PROVEN WINNER

Frost is a proven winner. In his 14-year full-time coaching career, Frost's teams have combined for a 131-40 record.

- Frost teams have averaged more than 10 wins per season, including seven 12-win campaigns.
- He has won seven conference titles in 13 years.
- Frost has coached in two national title games and his teams have finished with a top-10 ranking eight times in the past 13 years.
- In two seasons as UCF's head coach, the Knights were the nation's most improved team in 2016 and were the only FBS team to go undefeated in 2017.
- As a Husker quarterback, Frost was a two-time national champion who helped NU to a 36-2 record, including a 24-2 mark as a starter.
- Frost is one of four active head coaches who won a national title as a player and is the only coach who won multiple national titles.

The 2012 National Wide Receivers Coach of the Year, Lubick coached two of the 10 all-time leading receivers at Washington.

The 2019 Big Ten Coach of the Year, Ryan Day is in his second full season as Ohio State's head coach. In his first season, he led Ohio State to a 13-1 record that included an undefeated regular season, a Big Ten championship and an appearance in the College Football Playoff. Day was also credited with Ohio State's first three wins of the 2018 season when he served as the Buckeyes' acting head coach.

Prior to becoming head coach, Day was Ohio State's offensive coordinator in 2017 and 2018. He is in his 19th season of coaching, which includes two seasons as an NFL quarterbacks coach and three previous seasons as an offensive coordinator at Temple and Boston College.

Day graduated from the University of New Hampshire, where he was a three-year starter for head coach Chip Kelly. Day set nine school records, including career marks for completions, touchdown passes, completion percentage and total offense.

OHIO STATE INFORMATION

Ohio State is one of the top programs in the history of college football. With an all-time record of 924-326-53, the Buckeyes rank second in wins among all college football programs. Although Ohio State ranks second in wins, its winning percentage (.729) is the best in FBS history.

The Buckeyes claim eight national titles, winning their first championship in 1942 and their most recent title in 2014 when Ohio State won the inaugural College Football Playoff. OSU has produced seven Heisman Trophy winners, including Archie Griffin, the only player to win two Heisman Trophies.

Ohio State has spent the second-most time ranked No. 1 in the Associated Press poll, and the Buckeyes rank third in college football history in NFL Draft picks and fourth in conference titles.

No. 5 Ohio State is the three-time defending Big Ten champion. OSU has won 15 straight games against Big Ten opponents, including 18 consecutive home games.

Ohio State is 52-4 against the Big Ten since the conference expanded to 14 teams in 2014, including four Big Ten Championship Game victories in that span. In the past three seasons, Ohio State is 28-2 against the league, but both losses have come to teams from the West Division.

The Buckeyes are coming off a 2019 campaign which included a Big Ten Championship, an appearance in the College Football Playoff and a No. 3 national ranking. OSU was third nationally in scoring offense, fourth in total offense and fifth in rushing offense last season. The Buckeyes must replace 2,000-yard rusher J.K. Dobbins and two of their top three receivers, but quarterback Justin Fields, a 2019 Heisman Trophy finalist, is back. Fields ranked third nationally in passing touchdowns and passing efficiency last season. Defensively, Ohio State led the nation in total defense and pass defense a year ago, while ranking fourth in scoring defense and ninth against the run. But Ohio State returns only three of its top 10 tackles from last year's dominant unit.
