HUSKERS OPEN BIG TEN PLAY WITH ILLINOIS ON BTN

- The Nebraska women's basketball team shoots for a perfect three-game home stand to open the season when the Huskers tip Big Ten Conference play against Illinois on Thursday night at Pinnacle Bank Arena. Tip-off against the Fighting Illini (2-1) is set for 7 p.m. (CT) with live television coverage provided by the Big Ten Network with Larry Punteney and Brenda VanLengen on the call.
- Due to Big Ten Conference policies and local directed health measures, no fans will be permitted inside Pinnacle Bank Arena. Free live radio will be available on the Husker Sports Network with Matt Coatney and Jeff Griesch on the call.
- Nebraska opened its 2020-21 season with a 2-0 start over the weekend. The Huskers ran to a 90-61 season-opening win over Oral Roberts on Friday night (Dec. 4) before completing the weekend sweep with a 64-51 win over Idaho State on Sunday (Dec. 6) at Pinnacle Bank Arena.
- Husker senior (graduate student) Kate Cain produced a solid opening weekend by averaging 11.0 points, 8.0 rebounds and 4.0 blocked shots, including the 13th double-double of her career with 14 points, 11 rebounds and six rejections in the win over ORU. The three-time Lisa Leslie Award candidate enters the Illinois game with a school-record 288 career blocks and needs two rejections to move into a tie for seventh with Ashley Adams (Ohio State) on the Big Ten all-time list. Cain is just five blocks away from sixth (Morgan Johnson, Iowa, 293) and needs 12 blocks to become just the sixth player in Big Ten history to record 300 career blocked shots.
- Sophomore Isabelle Bourne enjoyed a strong opening weekend as a Husker starter, averaging 11.5 points, 6.0 rebounds and 2.5 assists to help the Huskers. Bourne had nine second-half points in Sunday's win over Idaho State and her older sister, Callie, a junior guard for the Bengals.
- Junior Sam Haiby continued to show her all-around game. Nebraska's top returning scorer averaged 10 points, 9.5 rebound and 5.0 assists over the weekend. The 5-9 guard had 14 points, seven rebounds and seven assists through the first three quarters of Nebraska's opening-night win over Oral Roberts. She followed with a career-best 11 rebounds in the win over Idaho State.
- Redshirt sophomore Ashley Scoggin started both games to open her Husker career and erupted for a career-high 16 points on 4-of-5 three-point shooting in the win over Idaho State.
- Freshman Annika Stewart was the only Husker to produce double figures in both wins, totaling 27 points in just 24 minutes off the bench. The 6-3 forward hit the first five shots of her NU career and buried four threes over two games. She is averaging a team-best 13.5 points per game.

HUSKER NUGGETS

- Annika Stewart became just the fifth Husker in the last 20 seasons (2001-02) to score double figures in each of her first two games, joining All-Americans Jessica Shepard (2015-16), Jordan Hooper (2010-11) and Kelsey Griffin (2005-06).
- Stewart's 27 points through her first two games rank fifth among freshmen through two games during that same span, trailing Shepard (51), Hooper (37), Griffin (37) and Katie Robinette (31).
- Nebraska led the Big Ten in blocked shots (6.3 bpg) in 2019-20, while shattering the school record with 188 blocks on the season.
- Kate Cain has produced the top three individual block totals in NU history the past three seasons (101, 2019-20; 100, 2017-18; 79, 2018-19).
- The Huskers have produced the top three blocked shot totals in school history in each of the last three seasons (188, 2019-20; 163, 2017-18; 156, 2018-19).
- NU's bench outscored opponent reserves in 25 of 30 games in 2019-20. The Husker bench has outscored opposing benches in 55 of the last 62 games, including double-digit edges 39 times.
- In 2019-20, NU's bench outscored opposing benches 781-479 (26.0-16.0 ppg) an average of 10 points per game. Over the last two-plus seasons, Nebraska's bench has outscored opponent reserves 1,757-974 (28.3-15.7 ppg).
- Nebraska has hit 10 or more threes 20 times in the last three-plus seasons (94 games), including five times in the last 23 contests. Through the first 20 seasons with the three-point shot in women's basketball (1988-2007), Nebraska hit 10 threes in a game just six times (311 games).

SCOUTING ILLINOIS

- Coach Nancy Fahey brings her fourth Fighting Illini team to Lincoln with a 2-1 record this season following 53-50 win over Omaha on Sunday in Champaign.
- Sophomore starter Kennadi Myles produced a double-double against the Mavericks with 13 points and 14 rebounds. The 6-2 forward is averaging a double-double (10.3 ppg, 10.3 rpg) through three games after averaging 8.9 points and 8.7 rebounds in 29 games as a starter for the Illini last season.
- Fellow sophomore Jada Peebles led Illinois in the scoring column with 15 points against the Mavs and has matched Myles with 10.3 points per game on the season. The 5-10 guard also sank two free throws with four seconds left to help Illinois secure the win. Last season Peebles averaged 5.4 points while making 11 starts for the 11-19 Illini, who finished 2-16 in the Big Ten.
- A third sophomore, 5-11 guard Jeanae Terry, leads Illinois in scoring at 14.0 points per game, while adding 9.3 rebounds. Terry opened the season with a career-high 24 points in a win over Indiana State (Nov. 25), before producing her first career double-double with 16 points and a career-high 13 rebounds in a loss to Valparaiso (Dec. 2). However, she was held to just two points in the win over Omaha.
- Terry has hit a team-best four three-pointers (4-12) over three games, while Peebles has gone 3-for-11 from beyond the arc. As a team, Illinois has struggled to hit just 10-of-54 three-point attempts (.185) over the first three games.
- J-Naya Ephraim, a 5-9 junior guard, is one of the most experienced members of the Illini program. Ephraim has played in 61 games with 23 starts in her Illinois career and is averaging 8.3 points per game this season. She averaged 2.9 points and 2.5 rebounds while playing in all 30 games with 16 starts a year ago. Ephraim ranks third on the team with two three-pointers (2-9) early this season, but is shooting 17.4 percent (8-46) over her career.
- Redshirt junior Eva Rubin rounds out the Illinois projected starting five. The 6-5 center who transferred from Arizona State in December of 2019 after playing nine games as a sophomore in 2018-19, is averaging 7.5 points and 5.5 rebounds after getting 11 points in the win over Omaha. Rubin was a freshman on the 2017-18 Sun Devil squad that defeated Nebraska in the first round of the 2018 NCAA Tournament in Austin, Texas, but she did not play in the game.
- Brazilian post player Geovana Lopes has provided the biggest contributions outside the starting five, averaging 6.0 points and 3.7 rebounds over three games. Lopes had 12 points and six rebounds off the bench in the win over Indiana (Nov. 25), before getting six points and five rebounds in her first career start in the loss to Valpo (Dec. 2). The 6-3 junior did not score or get a rebound in eight minutes against UNO.
- Freshman guard Aaliyah Nye (3.7 ppg, 2.3 rpg), sophomore guard Aaliyah McQueen and sophomore forward Solape Amusan (2.0 ppg, 1.7 rpg) provide Illinois with more depth alongside senior forward Lyric Robins (0.3 ppg, 1.3 rpg) and redshirt junior Nancy Panagiotopoulou Andritsopoulou (0.0 ppg, 0.7 rpg).
- As a team, Illinois has hit just 35.4 percent (64-181) of its shots from the field and 64.6 percent (42-65) of its free throws but the Illini did seal Sunday's win by going 13-for-16 (.813) at the line.
- While they have struggled to shoot it, Illinois has been an excellent rebounding team through three games with a plus-11.0 rebound margin (44.7-33.7). The Illinoi also carry a plus-one turnover margin. Illinois has averaged 60 points per game, but has surrendered just 53.7 points per contest.

NEBRASKA VS. ILLINOIS SERIES HISTORY

- Nebraska leads the all-time series with Illinois 14-5, including four consecutive victories. Last season, the Huskers notched an 80-58 win over the Illini on Senior Day (Feb. 22, 2020) at Pinnacle Bank Arena, making Illinois NU's last Big Ten home opponent a year ago and first Big Ten home opponent this season.
- Kennedi Myles produced a double-double with 10 points and 12 rebounds for Illinois against Nebraska last season. Jada Peebles added eight points and J-Naya Ephraim pitched in five points along with two points from Nancy Panagiotopoulou Andritsopoulou.
- Myles and Nebraska's Kate Cain (8 points, 5 rebounds) and Sam Haiby (3 points, 8 rebounds, 6 assists) are the only three returning players among the 10 starters for both teams in last season's game.
- Isabelle Bourne (0 points, 2 rebounds) and Makenzie Helms (2 points, 1 rebound) are the only other current Huskers who faced the Illini last season, as all the returning players from both teams combined for just 38 total points and 30 rebounds.
- Nebraska owns five consecutive victories over Illinois at Pinnacle Bank Arena, and is 7-1 all-time against the Fighting Illini in Lincoln. The only Illinois win came with a 62-52 victory over the Huskers on Jan. 17, 2013.
- Nebraska is 11-3 against Illinois as Big Ten Conference foes, including 10-2 in Big Ten regularseason conference games.
- The series dates back to an 89-86 Nebraska win over the Illini on March 3, 1982 at the Bob Devaney Sports Center.

CAIN NAMED LISA LESLIE AWARD CANDIDATE

- Kate Cain was named to the Lisa Leslie Award Watch List for the third consecutive year, when the candidates for the national center-of-the-year honor were announced by the Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame and the Women's Basketball Coaches Association on Friday, Nov. 13.
- Cain, a 6-5 center from Middletown, N.Y., and a Nebraska graduate student, has started 93 consecutive games as a Husker.
- As a junior, Cain earned her second appearance on the Big Ten All-Defensive Team by notching a school-record 101 blocked shots while ranking third in the NCAA in blocks per game. She added 9.3 points and 7.2 rebounds while shooting 53.9 percent from the field and 68.3 percent from the free throw line on her way to earning honorable-mention All-Big Ten accolades.
- Cain led the Big Ten in both blocks (3.6 bpg) and defensive rebounds (6.7 drpg) in conference play, while moving into the Big Ten's all-time top-10 list.
- Nebraska's career blocked shot record holder with 288, Cain opened 2020-21 with her 13th career double-double with 14 points, 11 rebounds and six blocks in a win over Oral Roberts.
- Cain claimed her first spot on the Big Ten All-Defensive Team as a freshman in 2017-18 when she posted a then-school record with 100 blocks while averaging 9.9 points and 7.0 rebounds to help the Huskers to the 2018 NCAA Tournament.
- She also was a member of the Big Ten All-Freshman Team after being named the Big Ten Freshman of the Week on four occasions. Along the way, she produced the first points-rebounds-blocks triple-double in Husker history with 22 points, 14 rebounds and 11 blocked shots in a win over Florida Atlantic (Dec. 19, 2017).
- Cain, who earned mention on the Lisa Leslie Award Watch List prior to the 2018-19 and 2019-20 seasons, was recently projected as a middle second-round pick in the 2021 WNBA Draft.
- A CoSIDA Academic All-America candidate, Cain is a two-time Big Ten Distinguished Scholar and Academic All-Big Ten choice who earned her bachelor's degree as a management major in May of 2020, just three years into her Nebraska career.

HUSKER HISTORY OF HOME-OPENING SUCCESS

- Nebraska's season opener against Oral Roberts (Dec. 4) marked the latest home-opening game on the calendar in school history. NU's previous latest home tip came with a 61-59 win over Kearney State on Dec. 2, 1976.
- The only other December home opener in school history came with an 86-79 win over Arizona State at the Devaney Center on Dec. 1, 1992.
- Nebraska owns a history of season-opening success on the Huskers' home court. NU improved to 44-3 in home season openers with the 90-61 a victory over Oral Roberts on Dec. 4, 2020.
- NU is 7-1 at Pinnacle Bank Arena in season openers, including a win over Alabama A&M last year. The lone loss came on Nov. 7, 2018, with an 83-77 loss to Drake. In the first regular-season game in the history of Pinnacle Bank Arena, Nebraska powered its way to a 77-49 win over UCLA on Nov. 8, 2013.
- Nebraska's only season-opening home losses have come to Drake (2018), South Dakota State (Nov. 19, 2005) and Kansas (Nov. 21, 1980).
- Nebraska has been strong in its first four home games every season. In fact, NU is 161-25 (.866) over 47 seasons in its first four home contests, including 40-7 in Game No. 2.
 - Nebraska is 37-9 in Game No. 3 and 40-6 in Game No. 4.

2020-21 HUSKER SEASON PREVIEW

- Nebraska officially tipped off practice for the 2020-21 season with an afternoon workout at the Hendricks Training Complex in Lincoln on Wednesday, Oct. 14.
- Nebraska's 11-player roster for the 2020-21 campaign is led by 6-5 senior center Kate Cain. NU's career blocked shot leader is coming off a junior season in which she set the school single-season mark with 101 blocks. Cain, who earned her bachelor's degree in management from Nebraska in just three years in May of 2020, was recently projected as a WNBA middle second-round pick by DraftSite.com. She was one of four Big Ten players projected in the top three rounds.
- Cain is joined by returning starter Sam Haiby. The 5-9 junior guard ranked second on the team in scoring (10.0 ppg) and assists (3.3 apg) while leading NU in steals (1.5 spg) in 2019-20.
- The Huskers also are bolstered by the return of sophomore Isabelle Bourne. The 6-2 forward from Canberra, Australia played in all 30 games a year ago, averaging 5.9 points and 4.4 rebounds per game. Bourne, who has been a regular in the Australian National Team program for several years, joins Cain and newcomers Bella Cravens and Annika Stewart in the front court.
- Stewart adds more size at 6-3 while also being able to stretch the floor. The freshman out of Wayzata High School in Minneapolis, Minn., averaged 20.0 points and 8.1 rebounds while hitting 41.5 percent (39-94) of her three-pointers and 89.5 percent (51-57) of her free throws as a senior in 2019-20. The first-team Minnesota Class 4A All-State selection was ranked as the No. 35 post player in the nation by ESPN in 2020.
- Cravens, a 6-3 junior transfer from Laie, Hawaii, averaged 10.4 points and a Big Sky Conferenceleading 8.5 rebounds per game last season at Eastern Washington. Cravens was also one of the top shot-blockers in the Big Sky the past two seasons, totaling 96 blocks in 60 games. She was an honorable-mention All-Big Sky choice as a sophomore in 2019-20.
- Another member of the Australian National Team program, freshman Ruby Porter will be part of a revamped Husker backcourt this season. Porter, a 5-10 guard from Adelaide, was a member of the Australian U17 National Team that competed at the 2018 World Championships, while also being a key player on the Australian U18 3x3 National Team that won the Asia Cup in the summer of 2019.
- Junior college transfer Ashley Scoggin adds a dangerous three-point threat. Scoggin hit nearly 40 percent of her threes and 95 percent of her free throws last season as a redshirt freshman at Salt Lake City Community College. The 5-7 guard from Dallas, Ore., averaged 10.0 points, 5.2 rebounds and 2.1 assists in helping the Bruins to the NJCAA Region 18 title.
- Texas Tech transfer Nailah Dillard and California transfer MiCole Cayton also join the Huskers, along with freshman Whitney Brown. The 5-8 guard was a two-time All-Nebraska player at Grand Island Northwest. As a senior, Brown averaged 17.5 points, 4.0 rebounds, 3.3 assists and 2.0 steals.
- Trinity Brady returns to the Big Red backcourt as a sophomore in 2020-21. She battled injuries as a freshman but appeared in 17 games, averaging 1.6 points and 1.1 rebounds.

HAIBY CONTINUING GROWTH IN BACKCOURT

- Nebraska's top returning player in scoring (10.0 ppg), assists (3.3 apg) and steals (1.5 spg), Sam Haiby returns for her third season in the program and second year as a starter in 2020-21.
- Haiby opened the season with a strong all-around performance with 14 points, a then-career-high-tying eight rebounds and seven assists in a win over Oral Roberts (Dec.
- She followed with six points and a career-high 11 boards in a win over Idaho State (Dec. 6).
- Haiby enters the Illinois game averaging 10.0 points and team bests of 9.5 rebounds and 5.0 assists.
- Haiby erupted for a career-high 28 points on 11-of-19 shooting to power Nebraska to a 90-85 OT win at Missouri (Nov. 10, 2019). She tied a career high with three threes against the Tigers, including the game-tying triple with three seconds left to send the game to OT tied at 76. She scored NU's first eight points and added 18 points after halftime, including two free throws with 13.3 seconds left to seal the win.
- Haiby earned a spot on the Big Ten Weekly Honor Roll (Nov. 11, 2019) for averaging 18.0 points in Nebraska's first two games in 2019-20.



- She added her second 20-point game of the year and third of her career with 20 points and a career-high four steals in a win over Oral Roberts (Dec. 14, 2019). She earned her second Big Ten Weekly Honor Roll selection (Dec. 16).
- Haiby has produced double-figure points 32 times as a Husker, including three 20-point games. She had 16 double-figure efforts in 2019-20 after producing 15 as a freshman in 2018-19.
 - She scored 17 points and had seven rebounds and four assists against Creighton (Nov. 24, 2019).
- Haiby finished her freshman season as Nebraska's second-leading scorer with 10.0 points per game while coming off the bench in all 30 contests in 2018-19.
- Haiby scored 20 points early in her freshman season at Washington State with all 20 coming after
- She was named the Big Ten Freshman of the Week (Feb. 4, 2019) after scoring 17 points against Indiana (Feb. 3, 2019), which followed 13 points in a road win at Purdue (Jan. 31, 2019).

BOURNE BACK TO ADD LEADERSHIP ON FRONT LINE

- One of three captains on the 2020-21 Huskers, Isabelle Bourne joins Kate Cain and Sam Haiby as leaders for Nebraska in 2020-21.
- Bourne, a 6-2 sophomore forward from Canberra, Australia, made her first career start in the season-opening win over Oral Roberts and produced 14 points and a career-high nine rebounds.
- She added nine points all in the second half to help lead the Huskers past Idaho State (Dec. 6) in a head-to-head match-up with her older sister, Callie, a junior for the Bengals.
- Bourne enters the Illinois game ranked second on the team in scoring (11.5 ppg), assists (2.5 apg) and blocks (1.5 bpg) while ranking third in rebounding (6.0 rpg).
- As a true freshman in 2019-20, Bourne averaged 5.9 points and 4.4 rebounds per game. She scored in double figures four times off the bench as a freshman.
- Bourne capped her first season at Nebraska with career highs of 16 points and five blocks to go along with six rebounds, an assist and a steal in a career-high 29 minutes off the bench in the Big Ten Tournament against Michigan (March 5, 2020).
- Her 29 blocks on the season ranked as the sixth-best total by a freshman in Husker history.
 - Bourne had 13 points, three blocks and two steals in 27 minutes against Ohio State (Feb. 2, 2020).
- She added 11 points and a freshman season-high eight rebounds in a win over Wisconsin (Jan. 9, 2020), before adding 11 points and in a win over Penn State (Feb. 13, 2020).
- Bourne's older sister, Callie, averaged 12.0 points and 6.6 rebounds as a 5-9 guard at Idaho State in 2019-20, after averaging 4.1 points and 3.6 rebounds while starting 20 games for the Bengals in 2018-19. Their older sister Emma, plays in the Canberra Capitals Academy.
- Isabelle Bourne was a major factor in Australia's silver medal at the FIBA U19 World Cup, averaging 8.4 points, 5.1 rebounds and 1.1 assists in 23.1 minutes per game over seven contests for the Gems.
- Australia went 5-2 at the World Cup with both losses to the USA U19 team, including an overtime setback in the gold medal game.

- Kate Cain set the Nebraska single-game block record while also posting the first points (22), rebounds (14) and blocked shots (11) triple-double in school history in a win over Florida Atlantic (Dec. 19, 2017).
- She became just the sixth player in Big Ten Conference history to record 11 or more blocks and just the 10th Big Ten player to notch double-digit blocks in a single game.
- Cain's 22 points against Florida Atlantic were a career high, and her three assists against the Owls also tied a career best.
- She owns 42 double-figure scoring efforts, 16 double-figure rebounding games and one double-digit block game in the first 94 games of her career. She has made a team-leading 93 straight starts.
- Cain owns 50 games (1, 2020-21; 16, 2019-20; 17, 2018-19; 15, 2017-18) with three or more blocks.

 - Cain has blocked at least one shot in 15 consecutive games and 88 of 94 games in her career.
- Sam Haiby has scored in 61 of 63 games in her Husker career, including 29 of 30 games in 2019-20 and 30 of 31 games as a freshman in 2018-19. She has scored at least three points in 25 consecutive games for Nebraska, dating back to being held scoreless by USC at the South Point Shootout on Nov.

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29, 2019. The Huskers won that game 67-54. She was also held scoreless in a 70-69 loss at Wisconsin on Jan. 27, 2018.

• The Huskers have knocked down at least one three in 374 straight games dating back to a loss at UTEP on Dec. 20, 2008. Nebraska has hit at least two three-pointers in 253 consecutive games.

HUSKERS HUNGRY JUST TO BE BACK ON COURT

- Like every team, Nebraska has had to scratch and claw to fight its way back to the court for the start of 2020-21. Daily testing, health screenings, occasional isolation and pauses for the program have been part of the preparation for the season.
- Teams also have to deal with unexpected injuries and life situations, and Nebraska has had its share of those leading up to the start of the season.
 - Taylor Kissinger elected to end her career on Sept. 15 because of chronic hip pain.
- MiCole Cayton continues to gain strength in her leg and has impressed in practice drills but has not been cleared for full-court practice with contact.
 - Other Huskers have had to battle illnesses and injuries that have kept them off the practice court.
- All of those challenges mixed together prevented Nebraska from having 10 players fully participating in practice from Oct. 14 to Nov. 29. The first time the Huskers had 10 players on the court together in a full practice setting came on Monday, Nov. 30.

BIG RED SIGN TOP 25 RECRUITING CLASS FOR 2021

- Nebraska women's basketball coach Amy Williams received National Letters of Intent from five talented players on Wednesday, Nov. 11, as the Huskers earned a No. 21 national ranking for its incoming class of 2021 from ESPN.
- Nebraska's impressive group includes two players ranked among the top 100 in the ESPN individual rankings, led by the versatile Kendall Coley (No. 49) and Nebraska high school standout Allison Weidner (No. 80) at the national level. Lincoln native Alexis Markowski, who will contend with Weidner for Nebraska's state high school player-of-the-year award in 2021, Illinois prep star Kendall Moriarity and Tatiana Popa fortify a strong five-player class.
- Four members of the Husker class have been ranked among the top 100 in the country by at least one ranking service, and all five have been mentioned among the top 275.
- "This 2021 recruiting class is a special group that has already been building great bonds with each other," Williams said. "We know that they are a group that can make an incredible impact on our program and the goals we have to become Big Ten Champions."

KENDALL COLEY, 6-2, F/G, MINNEAPOLIS, MINN. (ST. LOUIS PARK)

- Kendall Coley comes to Nebraska as the top-ranked player among a top 25 recruiting class for the Huskers and Coach Amy Williams. Coley, a 6-2 wing from Minneapolis, Minn., was ranked as one of the top 50 players in the nation by All-Star Girls Report (36), Prospects Nation (39) and ESPN Hoopgurlz (49) in 2021, while adding a No. 52 ranking from Blue Star.
- Coley, who committed to Nebraska in April of 2020, averaged 15.5 points, 7.4 rebounds and 3.7 assists as a junior at St. Louis Park High School.
- "Kendall is one of the most exciting players in the 2021 class," Williams said. "She is very versatile and can play every position on the court. She is long, athletic and skilled, which is a devastating combination. She is a special talent, and we believe she can make a great impact in the Big Ten Conference."

ALEXIS MARKOWSKI, 6-3, C/F, LINCOLN, NEB. (LINCOLN PIUS X)

- Alexis Markowski joins Allison Weidner as the top high school players in the state of Nebraska in 2021. Markowski, who was a first-team All-Nebraska and Super-State center while leading Lincoln Pius X to the 2020 Class A state title, set school single-season records for points (560) and rebounds (315) before being named the honorary captain of the Class A All-State team. The 6-3 Markowski also tied the Class A tournament scoring record with 80 points over three games, matching Nebraska Athletics Hall of Famer Maurtice Ivy's record.
- Markowski was ranked No. 76 in the 2021 class by World Exposure, which also slots international players among its rankings.
- "We are so excited that Alexis is staying home," Williams said. "She had an incredible junior season capped off by a state championship and is poised for a great senior year. All summer she played against some of the best post players in the country and continued to shine. She is a winner who just keeps working to expand her game, and her skills align perfectly with our needs."

KENDALL MORIARITY, 6-1, G, WHEATON, ILL. (BENET ACADEMY)

- The first commit to Nebraska's top-25 recruiting class, Kendall Moriarity announced her decision in November of 2019. Moriarity was ranked among the top 100 players in the country by Prospects Nation (74), All-Star Girls Report (100) and Prep Girls Hoops (100) entering her senior season at Benet Academy in Lisle, Ill. She was also ranked as high as the No. 12 guard prospect in the country by Prospects Nation.
- The 6-1 Moriarity hit 43.1 percent of her three-pointers while also leading Benet Academy in steals and deflections as a junior 2019-20. She led her high school team to a No. 1 ranking in Illinois and a No. 23 team rank nationally at one point as a junior. In 2019, Moriarity was invited to the USA 16U National Team trials, advancing to the top 68.

TATIANA POPA, 6-5, C/F, PARKERSBURG, W. VA. (BREWSTER ACADEMY)

- Tatiana Popa comes to Nebraska as a four-star recruit before entering her senior season at Brewster Academy. She closed her junior year at Parkersburg High School in West Virginia. She previously played at IMG Academy and Montverde Academy (2018-19) in Florida. She also competed at Quince Orchard High School in Maryland as a freshman in 2017-18. The 6-5 center/forward was ranked as the No. 263 overall player in the nation by All-Star Girls Report.
- Popa's father, Constantin, was a second-round NBA Draft choice of the Los Angeles Clippers in 1995 after playing basketball collegiately at the University of Miami. He is a member of the Miami Sports Hall of Fame, and played professionally overseas in Israel.
- "Our program is thrilled to be adding this hard-working, talented young lady to our Husker family," Williams said. "She knows how to use her length to her advantage on defense and has expanded her versatility on offense. She is working hard to add strength to her frame and understands the benefits that Husker Power will provide her in that area. The sky is the limit for her growth, and we can't wait to watch it happen here at Nebraska."

ALLISON WEIDNER, 5-10, G, HUMPHREY, NEB. (HUMPHREY ST. FRANCIS)

- Allison Weidner joins Alexis Markowski as two of the top basketball players the state of Nebraska has produced in recent years. Weidner was ranked as the No. 80 player on the ESPN Hoopgurlz Top 100. She was also a first-team Super-State selection and earned first-team Class D2 all-state honors in both basketball and volleyball for the Humphrey St. Francis Flyers as a junior in 2019-20. A member of the Class D2 All-Decade Team, Weidner is also a five-time gold medalist at the Nebraska state track and field meet.
- One of the top multi-sport athletes the state has produced, Weidner led the Cornhusker State in both assists and steals as a sophomore in 2018-19. As a junior, she averaged 25.2 points, 6.1 rebounds, 6.5 assists and a whopping 7.3 steals per game to power St. Francis to a Class D2 state runner-up finish.
- "We cannot wait to add Allison to our Husker program," Williams said. "She is a crafty point guard who can score at all three levels and is very good in the open court. She has great court vision and makes those around her better. She is a Nebraska native who possesses the values and character we look for in a Husker."

NEBRASKA'S HISTORY OF HOME SUCCESS

- Nebraska went 13-4 on its home court at Pinnacle Bank Arena in 2019-20.
- The Huskers were 15-4 at Pinnacle Bank Arena in 2015-16 after going 12-3 (13-3 at home) in 2014-15. The Huskers are 83-34 (.709) all-time at Pinnacle Bank Arena since the building opened for the 2013-14 campaign. The Big Red went 16-2 at home in 2013-14, suffering their only Big Ten loss to Purdue, 77-75, on Jan. 19, 2014. NU's 16 home wins in 2013-14 tied the school record for single-season home victories.
- The Huskers played the first regular-season game in arena history against USA Today No. 25 UCLA (Nov. 8, 2013) and rolled to a 77-49 win over the Bruins. NU's first win over an AP Top 25 team came with a 76-56 win over No. 24 Michigan State on Feb. 8, 2014. The Huskers added their first-ever win over an AP Top 10 team at the arena with a 94-74 victory over No. 8 Penn State on Feb. 24, 2014.
- NU won its first-ever Big Ten home game at Pinnacle Bank Arena with a 66-65 thriller over Northwestern Jan. 2, 2014, before an 88-85 win over Minnesota on Jan. 16, 2014, marked the first overtime game.
 - NU suffered its first loss at the arena to Washington State (76-72) on Nov. 30, 2013.
- The Huskers are 44-3 all-time in home season openers, following a 90-51 win over Oral Roberts on Dec. 4, 2020. Nebraska had its streak of 12 consecutive season-opening wins snapped with an 83-77 loss to Missouri Valley Conference champion Drake on Nov. 7, 2018.
- The Huskers are 472-164 (.742) all-time at home. The Huskers have gone 208-68 (.754) over the last 18 seasons (including 2020-21), posting double-figure home victory totals 15 times.
- Nebraska played in the Devaney Center from 1976-77 through 2012-13, and added one appearance at Devaney against Utah on Nov. 23, 2014. The Huskers own a 389-130 record at the Devaney Center, including 146-88 (.624) mark in conference play.

KISSINGER ENDS PLAYING CAREER WITH INJURY

- Nebraska guard Taylor Kissinger announced the end of her collegiate playing career on Tuesday,
 tent 15.
- The 6-1 shooter from Minden, Neb., was preparing for her fourth season with the Husker women's basketball team in 2020-21. She redshirted because of a hip injury as a junior in 2019-20. Kissinger underwent season-ending surgery on Jan. 3, 2020, after appearing in five games with the Big Red during the fall of 2019.
- Kissinger faced setbacks during her rehabilitation following surgery, and her participation was limited throughout the summer.

Purdue Wisconsin

Northwestern (17)

- Kissinger appeared in 60 games with 31 starts over two-plus seasons with the Huskers. She averaged 10.0 points and 4.1 rebounds while appearing in 25 games with seven starts as a true freshman in 2017-18. She helped the Huskers produce the biggest turnaround in the nation and advance to the 2018 NCAA Tournament, despite missing six games in midseason with a knee injury. She also suffered an upper body sprain late in 2017-18 that limited her contributions at the end of the season.
- She produced her most consistent season as a sophomore, playing in all 30 games with 24 starts in 2018-19, while averaging 8.9 points and 3.2 rebounds. She tied the Nebraska single-season record by hitting 45.6 percent (62-136) of her three-point attempts and connected on 88.2 percent (30-34) of her free throws.
- Kissinger missed four games in the concussion protocol early last season, but returned to action and tied a career high with six three-pointers on her way to a team-high 19 points in a win over Duke (Dec. 4) in the Big Ten/ACC Challenge. A hip injury knocked her out for the rest of the season after a game with Oral Roberts (Dec. 14).
- Kissinger finished her career with 559 points, 214 rebounds, 78 assists and 36 steals. Her career .404 (122-302) three-point percentage is the best mark in Nebraska women's basketball history.

HUSKER SPORTS NETWORK COVERS WORLD

The Husker Sports Network is in its 27th season producing and marketing the live broadcasts of Nebraska women's basketball in 2020-21, as play-by-play announcer Matt Coatney and color commentator Jeff Griesch team up for their 20th season as the Husker broadcast team.

The Husker Sports Network and Nebraska women's basketball have teamed up for two decades to carry every game, home and away, around the world for free on Huskers.com.

In addition to carrying every women's basketball game free on Huskers.com, the Husker Sports Network flagship stations B107.3 FM-KBBK (Lincoln) and ESPN 590 AM-KXSP (Omaha) provide strong signals for Husker women's basketball. When a network conflict occurs in Omaha, the Huskers also could be heard on CD105.9 FM-KKCD. 880-AM-KRVN (Lexington) also provides a huge AM signal statewide in central Nebraska, while more than 20 stations carry the Husker Sports Network's women's basketball coverage across the state and the Midwest.

Inside Pinnacle Bank Arena, fans can access the direct radio call of the game at 87.7 FM.

NEBRASKA POSTS 16TH STRAIGHT PERFECT GSR

In the eyes of the NCAA's Division I Graduation Success Rate (GSR), the Husker women's basketball program has been perfect for 16 consecutive years. Nebraska is the only program among the 14 Big Ten Conference schools to accomplish the perfect score for 16 straight seasons.

The NCAA announced the release of its annual Graduation Success Rate report Nov. 17, 2020, and Nebraska was a national leader in women's basketball for the 16th straight season, dating back to the initial public tracking of the GSR since 2004-05.

The Nebraska women's basketball program joins the Husker women's tennis and volleyball programs as Husker teams that have produced perfect 100 percent rates each of the last 16 years.

Nebraska was one of just 28 teams in the 64-team field of the 2018 NCAA Tournament to also boast a 100 percent Graduation Success Rate.

Overall, the Nebraska Athletic Department produced a record-high GSR for the eighth consecutive year, reaching 94 percent. Nebraska's GSR ranked No. 2 among the 14 Big Ten Conference programs. A total of 13 Husker programs recorded perfect 100 percent GSR scores, including men's and women's basketball, volleyball, softball, soccer, men's and women's gymnastics, swimming and diving, men's and women's golf, men's and women's tennis and rifle.

NEBRASKA OVERTIME FACTS

- Nebraska is 23-25 all-time in overtime games, including 12-12 at home, 8-10 in true road games and 3-3 on neutral courts in overtime.
- The Huskers are 1-2 in overtime games in 2019-20 following an 80-74 OT loss to Ohio State (Feb. 2). It was Nebraska's second overtime loss in Big Ten play this season, joining a 78-70 OT loss at Michigan State (Dec. 31, 2019). The Huskers opened road action this season with a 90-85 OT win at Missouri (Nov. 10, 2019).
- The 2019-20 season marks the first time that Nebraska has played three overtime games in the same season since 2011-12 NU's first season in the Big Ten. In 2011-12, the Huskers played a total of seven OT periods in those three games.
 - Nebraska has never played four overtime games in the same season.
- Nebraska's lone overtime game of 2018-19 also came in the Huskers' first road game of the season, but NU suffered an 87-84 double-overtime loss at Washington State (Nov. 16, 2019). It marked the second straight season that Nebraska played a multi-overtime game (also at Drake, Dec. 9, 2017).
- The Huskers went 1-1 in overtime in 2017-18, including a 69-64 overtime loss to No. 23 Michigan at Pinnacle Bank Arena (Jan. 13). The Huskers won their first overtime game of 2017-18 with an 89-85 double-overtime win at Drake (Dec. 9).
- Nebraska was 1-1 in overtime in 2016-17, including a 76-74 win over Michigan State at Pinnacle Bank Arena to close the regular season (Feb. 26, 2017). The Huskers lost 79-69 in OT to Minnesota at the arena (Feb. 4, 2017).

- The Huskers are 3-5 in overtime games under Coach Amy Williams.
- Nebraska is 2-3 in overtime games at Pinnacle Bank Arena.
- Nebraska is 5-2 in multi-overtime games with its most recent loss coming in the 87-84 2OT setback at Washington State (Nov. 16, 2018) in Pullman. NU's only other loss in a multi-overtime game came to Purdue in the 2012 Big Ten Championship Game, 74-70 in double-overtime.
- The Huskers defeated Minnesota 88-85 in overtime on Jan. 16, 2014. It marked the first overtime game in the history of Pinnacle Bank Arena. Nebraska's first overtime game in the history of the Bob Devaney Sports Center also came against Minnesota a 68-67 win for the Huskers on Dec. 30, 1977.
- The Huskers have played 15 all-time overtime games against Big Ten opponents and own a 5-10 record. NU is 4-7 against Big Ten opponents in OT since joining the conference in 2011-12.
- Nebraska played its fourth OT game in 73 meetings with Missouri in a 90-85 OT win at Mizzou Arena (Nov. 10, 2019). All four OT games against the Tigers were settled in a single overtime period.
- Nebraska's next most frequent overtime opponents are Big Ten foes Purdue, Minnesota and Wisconsin. The Huskers and Purdue have played three overtime games in 14 all-time meetings. NU's six total overtimes against Purdue are the most against any team in school history.
- The Huskers also have played three overtime games against Minnesota (24 games), including two of the five overtime games in Pinnacle Bank Arena history.
 - In 18 all-time games with Wisconsin the Huskers have played three overtime contests.
- Nebraska has never played back-to-back overtime games at home. The Huskers have played back-to-back overtime games only once in school history, an 83-81 loss to Texas A&M in College Station on Dec. 30, 1985, before returning to Lincoln for an 80-75 win over Eastern Kentucky at the Devaney Center on Jan. 2, 1986.

NEBRASKA ATTENDANCE ROSE IN 2019-20

- Nebraska ranked No. 20 nationally in average home attendance (4,397 fans per game) over 17 regular-season games at Pinnacle Bank Arena in 2019-20. It marked an increase of 296 fans per game compared to the 2018-19 season, when the Huskers ranked No. 22 nationally (4,101).
 - The Huskers have ranked among the top 25 nationally in attendance for 11 consecutive seasons.
- Nebraska has ranked among the top 25 nationally in average home attendance in each of its first seven seasons inside Pinnacle Bank Arena.
- The Huskers opened the 2019-20 season with 5,250 fans at Pinnacle Bank Arena for a Wednesday, noon tip against Alabama A&M on Nov. 6. Nebraska hosted a Life Skills Sportsmanship Pep Rally prior to the game, which included nearly 2,000 students and sponsors from 27 school districts around the Cornhusker State. It was the third-largest opening day crowd in Husker history.
- In 115 all-time home games at Pinnacle Bank Arena, the Huskers own an 81-34 record (.704 winning percentage) while averaging 5,058 fans per game (581,612 total fans/115 games).
- Nebraska attracted a Pinnacle Bank Arena non-conference record crowd of 9,750 to open its stay in the arena with a win over UCLA on Nov. 8, 2013.
- Nebraska set its all-time single-game record with a sellout crowd of 13,595 fans against Missouri at the Devaney Center on Feb. 27, 2010. NU drew 10 straight crowds of more than 10,000 fans at the Devaney Center in 2009-10.
- Nebraska produced its top attendance season in school history by ranking No. 7 nationally with a record 7,390 fans per game at the Bob Devaney Sports Center in 2009-10. The Huskers went 16-0 at the Devaney Center on their way to a perfect 29-0 record, a Big 12 title and a No. 1 seed in the NCAA Tournament.

REDSHIRT SOPHOMORE (2020-21)

Ashley Scoggin earned starts in Nebraska's season-opening wins over Oral Roberts (Dec. 4) and Idaho State (Dec. 6). In the victory over Idaho State, Scoggin established career highs with 16 points, four three-pointers and three rebounds to help shoot the Huskers to victory.

Through two games at Nebraska, she is averaging 8.0 points and 2.5 rebounds per contest

The 22-year-old redshirt sophomore came to Nebraska with the potential of three years of eligibility, after an outstanding redshirt freshman season at Salt Lake City Community College in 2019-20. She earned first-team All-Region 18 honors and was a member of the Region 18 All-Tournament team while helping the Bruins to the NJCAA Region 18 title.

Scoggin proved herself as a knock-down shooter, connecting on nearly 40 percent of her three-pointers and 95 percent of her free throws.

"We are excited to add Ashley to our Husker family," Nebraska Coach Amy Williams said. "She is a play-making guard with experience and maturity and will provide us with another consistent presence from behind the arc."

REDSHIRT FRESHMAN (SALT LAKE CITY CC, 2019-20)

Scoggin averaged 10.0 points, 5.2 rebounds, 2.1 assists and 1.3 steals per game as a redshirt freshman for Salt Lake City CC in 2019-20. She helped lead the 20-7 Bruins to the NJCAA Region 18 title and a share of the Scenic West Athletic Conference championship. Scoggin, who hit nearly 40 percent of her three-point attempts and almost 95 percent of her free throws on the season, earned first-team

All-Region 18 honors and was a member of the Region 18 All-Tournament team.

Scoggin's strength and fitness level increased throughout 2019-20 at Salt Lake City CC. At Utah State Eastern on Feb. 22, Scoggin played 40 minutes. She was also a regular double-figure scorer down the stretch for the Bruins. Early in the year, she erupted for a season-high 22 points while knocking down 6-of-9 threes in a win over Eastern Wyoming (Nov. 29). Her performance helped her earn conference player-of-the-week honors.

Scoggin was slowed at the start of the season after undergoing a minor meniscus repair on her knee in September of 2019.

FRESHMAN (SALT LAKE CITY CC, 2018-19)

Scoggin enrolled at Salt Lake City CC prior to the 2017-18 season. She suffered a torn ACL in her right knee on July 13, 2017, and redshirted during the 2017-18 season.

In 2018-19, Scoggin continued to feel discomfort in her right knee and underwent another ACL surgery on her right knee in November of 2018.

HIGH SCHOOL

Scoggin suffered a torn ACL in left knee in the summer of 2015, prior to her senior season at Westview High School in Portland, Ore. The injury also caused her to delay her collegiate enrollment until after 2016-17.

As a junior at Westview in 2014-15, Scoggin averaged 17 points, five rebounds, three assists and three steals. She was a two-time first-team all-metro performer at Westview.

SOPHOMORE (2020-21)

A talented and tough competitor, Trinity Brady is looking to make greater contributions for the Huskers in her second season at Nebraska in 2020-21.

The 5-11 guard from Indianapolis produced the best game of her young career in Nebraska's 90-61 season-opening win over Oral Roberts (Dec. 4). Brady erupted for a career-high 15 points while adding a career-best five rebounds while making the first start of her collegiate career. She hit 5-of-7 shots from the field and all three of her three-point attempts against the Golden Eagles.

She added five more rebounds while setting a career high with four steals in a win over Idaho State (Dec. 6).

Through two games a starter, Brady is averaging 8.5 points, 5.0 rebounds and 2.0 steals.

FRESHMAN (2019-20)

Brady brought strength and versatility to Nebraska's backcourt as a freshman. One of the top high school players in Indiana in 2017-18, Brady completed her prep career at Hamilton Heights Christian Academy in Tennessee.

She missed Nebraska's first 10 games as part of the concussion protocol, before making her regular-season debut in the win over Manhattan (Dec. 22). She played in 17 consecutive games before missing the final three games with tendonitis.

Brady played strong defense while recording two points, four rebounds, an assist and a block in 16 minutes off the bench against the Jaspers. She hit the first three-pointer of her career and

added two assists and her first career steal in the win over lowa (Dec. 28). Brady's three gave Nebraska a 30-27 second-quarter lead, and the Huskers led the rest of the way.

She sparked a 10-0 first-quarter run at Michigan State with two points, two steals and two rebounds to help Nebraska lead for much of the game against the Spartans before falling in OT on New Year's Eve in East Lansing.

Brady scored a career-high seven points and knocked down a career-best two threes while adding two rebounds in nine minutes off the bench at Rutgers (Jan. 12).

She scored five points in a 10-0 secondquarter run that sparked Nebraska in a rally from a 25-point first-half deficit against No. 18 Indiana (Feb. 9). The Huskers eventually tied the game in the fourth quarter.

Brady scored eight points and had eight rebounds in an exhibition win over Rogers State (Nov. 2). An opponent fell on Brady inside the paint late in the game, contacting her head and shoulder area.

BEFORE NEBRASKA

The final piece of Nebraska's three-player recruiting class, Brady came to Nebraska after completing her senior season at Hamilton Heights Christian Academy in Chattanooga, Tenn. She was ranked as the No. 106 player overall in the 2019 class by Prospects Nation.

The Lady Hawks finished the season No. 18 in the final USA Today Super 25 rankings with a 22-3 overall record. Hamilton Heights Christian Academy fell to Riverdale Baptist in the NACA Championships.

Brady competed for Lawrence North High School in Indianapolis her first three seasons.

As a junior, Brady averaged 21.0 points, 8.5 rebounds and 4.0 assists to earn a spot on the IBCA Subway Supreme 15 Underclass All-State Team. She was also a member of the Indiana

As a sophomore, Brady averaged 15 points and 7.5 rebounds per game for Lawrence North, after averaging 7.2 points and 6.0 rebounds as a freshman.

She played her club basketball with the George Hill Lady Stars for coaches Mike Saunders and DeJuan Howard.

Trinity is the daughter of Vincent and Jamie Brady, and has a younger brother, Vincent II.

Brady is majoring in criminology and criminal justice at Nebraska. She was a member of the 2020 Tom Osborne Citizenship Team.

She had approximately 20 scholarship offers before ultimately choosing Nebraska over Marquette, Dayton and Illinois.

JUNIOR (2020-21)

Sam Haiby (pronounced HY-bee) entered her junior season at Nebraska after averaging double-figure points each of her first two seasons. Haiby, who has averaged 10.0 points per game the past two years, saw significant increases in her rebounding, assist and steals totals as a sophomore as she develops into an outstanding all-around Big Ten guard.

She continued to show the growth in her all-around game in Nebraska's 2020-21 seasonopening win over Oral Roberts (Dec. 4). Haiby nearly produced a triple-double with 14 points, eight rebounds and seven assists. She added a career-high 11 rebounds to go with six points in a win over Idaho State (Dec. 6).

SOPHOMORE (2019-20)

Haiby ranked second among the Huskers in scoring (10.0 ppg) and assists (3.3 apg) while leading Nebraska in steals (1.5 spg) in 2019-20.

The 5-9 guard from Moorhead, Minn., had a career-high 28 points, including a career-high three threes, in a 90-85 OT win at Missouri (Nov. 10). Her third three came with three seconds left to send the game to overtime. She added the final field goal and two free throws with 13.3 seconds left in OT to seal the win.

Haiby produced her second 20-point game of the season with 20 points, five rebounds and four steals in a win over ORU (Dec. 14). She had 19 points, four rebounds, three assists and three steals at Michigan State (Dec. 31). Haiby pitched in 18 points and tied her career high with three

threes in a win over Michigan (Jan. 19). She added 17 points, a career-high eight rebounds and three assists in a win over No. 24 Minnesota (Jan. 4). Haiby also had 17 points, seven rebounds and four assists against Creighton (Nov. 24). She had 11 points, a season-high seven assists and three steals in a win over Wisconsin (Jan. 9). She added 11 points, six rebounds and a career-high five steals in the sweep of the Badgers (Jan. 25).

FRESHMAN (2018-19)
Haiby provided consistent sparks for Nebraska off the bench in 30 games. NU's second-leading scorer, Haiby averaged 10.0 points, 3.0 rebounds and 2.6 assists. She scored in double figures 15 times, including the final four games. Haiby erupted for a career-high 20 points - all after halftime - at Washington State (Nov. 16). She recorded her best Big Ten effort with 17 points against Indiana (Feb. 3) and had 17 more at Creighton (Dec. 2).

She was named the Big Ten Freshman of the Week after averaging 15.0 points on 10-of-15 shooting at Purdue (Jan. 31) and Indiana (Feb. 3).

She closed the regular season with a teamhigh 16 points in a win at Penn State (March 2), including 12 points in the fourth quarter. She also had 16 points in a win over No. 23 Minnesota (Jan. 20). Haiby added 16 more to go along with a career-high three steals at Arkansas (Dec. 18).

She scored 14 points at No. 24 Miami. She led NU with 13 points in her college debut against Drake (Nov. 7). She added 13 points with a career-high three threes in a win at Purdue (Jan. 31). Haiby scored 12 points four times, including No. 5 Louisville (Nov. 29), Michigan (Dec. 28), No. 12 Iowa (Feb. 25) and at the Big Ten Tournament against Purdue (March 7). She added 11 points in a win at Northwestern (Feb. 21) and 11 at No. 7 Maryland (Feb. 14).

as a senior to average 25.1 points, 7.1 rebounds and 5.3 assists per game, including a monstrous 46-point performance in a 54-49 win over White Bear Lake on Dec. 10, 2017. It followed a 45-point effort in a win over Brainerd on Nov. 28. Haiby finished her high school career with more than 2,000 points. As a junior, she averaged 22.1 points, 7.6 rebounds, 4.4 assists and 4.1 steals, including a huge 44-point performance against Fargo Shanley on Jan. 17, 2017.

Haiby was also a starting outfielder and pitcher on Moorhead High School's baseball team in the spring of 2017. She was the first pitcher to ever throw a pitch in U.S. Bank Stadium in Minneapolis, taking the mound for the Spuds against the Sartell Sabres. She also became the first female in history to pitch a scoreless inning in a Minnesota High School boys baseball game in the spring of 2017.

OUTLOOK (2020-21)

MiCole Cayton hopes to put knee injuries behind her after choosing to transfer following her graduation from California. The 5-9 guard from Stockton, Calif., originally signed with the Huskers out of high school as part of a top-15 national recruiting class in November 2015.

In the midst of a coaching change at Nebraska, Cayton chose to stay closer to home at Cal and was an All-Pac-12 Freshman honorable-mention choice in 2016-17. She started 13 games as a freshman, including the last 12 games of the season for the Bears. That stretch of starts began with a career-high 18 points in a win over No. 13 UCLA and ended in the second round of the NCAA Tournament at Baylor.

"MiCole has an infectious competitive spirit and drive to be her very best," Nebraska Coach Amy Williams said. "Her high energy and passion along with her experience as a collegiate athlete make her a great fit for our program."

(CALIFORNIA, 2017-20)

Cayton missed the entire 2019-20 season with a knee injury. She earned her bachelor's degree from California in May of 2020.

As a redshirt sophomore in 2018-19, Cayton returned to the court for eight minutes in a debut against her hometown school, Pacific (Nov. 18), before playing two minutes against Tulane (Nov. 23) and scoring her only points of the season in a win at San Diego (Nov. 24). She played three total games in her third year before undergoing

surgery to repair cartilage damage in her right knee.

She opened her sophomore season with 13 points, including a career-high-tying three threepointers in a win over Saint Mary's (Nov. 10), but missed the remainder of the year after suffering a torn ACL. Cayton did not play the rest of the season.

Cayton earned an honorable-mention selection to the Pac-12 All-Freshman Team by starting 13 games for California. For the season, she averaged 5.6 points, 2.5 rebounds, 2.1 assists and 1.0 steal per contest for the Bears. She finished second on the team in steals (34) and third in assists (73).

Cayton started each of the last 12 games of the season for Cal, beginning with a career-high 18 points in a win over No. 13 UCLA. She had 11 of her 18 points in the first quarter against the Bruins, and tied her career high with three threepointers.

In the first round of the Pac-12 Tournament, Cayton had 12 points, four rebounds and three steals in a win over USC (March 1). She also had nine points, including a pair of free throws with 8.8 seconds left to seal Cal's win over Oregon (Feb. 24).

She scored in double figures six times as a freshman, including 13 points against CSU Bakersfield (Nov. 20), going 5-for-7 from the field and a perfect 3-for-3 from three-point range. She notched her second double-figure scoring performance of her career with 11 points and five assists in 25 minutes off the bench in a win at Nebraska (Dec. 4).

Cayton also had 10 points against Arizona (Jan. 22) and 11 points in a career-high 37

JUNIOR (2020-21)

Bella Cravens hopes to make an immediate impact for the Huskers inside as a junior in 2020-21. The 6-3 forward from Laie, Hawaii, earned honorable-mention All-Big Sky recognition as a sophomore at Eastern Washington, and will have two seasons of eligibility at Nebraska.

She averaged 4.5 points, 4.0 rebounds, 2.0 assists and 1.0 block in 15.5 minutes per game in a pair of Nebraska season-opening wins over Oral Roberts (Dec. 4) and Idaho State (Dec. 6).

Cravens, who possesses the strength and athleticism to play both power forward and center, competed in 28 games with 26 starts for Eastern Washington in 2019-20. She averaged 10.4 points while leading the Big Sky with 8.5 rebounds per game, which ranked No. 92 nationally.

Cravens produced six double-doubles on the season, including a career-high 28 points and 10 rebounds in just 20 minutes of action against Northern Arizona (Feb. 22).

"Bella is an excellent athlete who is motivated to become the best player she can," Nebraska Coach Amy Williams said. "We have a strong need for the things she brings to the table, and we believe her best basketball is still in front of her. We can't wait to pour into her as a Husker."

SOPHOMORE

(EASTERN WASHINGTON, 2019-20)

An honorable-mention All-Big Sky selection as a sophomore at Eastern Washington, Cravens averaged 10.4 points and a Big Sky-leading 8.5 rebounds per game while appearing in 28 games with 26 starts.

BELLA CRAVENS

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6-3 Junior Forward Laie, Hawaii (Maryknoll School/Eastern Washington)

She ranked 92nd nationally in rebounding average. Cravens produced six double-doubles on the season, including a career-high 28 points and 10 rebounds in just 20 minutes of action against Northern Arizona (Feb. 22). She hit 10-of-12 field goals against NAU just two days after going 8-for-8 from the field against Sacramento State (Feb. 18).

She had 18 points and 15 rebounds against Portland State (Feb. 15) and 20 points, career highs of 16 rebounds and five steals, along with a season-high four blocks against Southern Utah (Feb. 27).

During that four-game stretch (Feb. 15-27), Cravens averaged 20.8 points, 12.0 rebounds, 2.8 assists, 2.3 blocks and 1.8 steals while hitting 69.6 percent (32-46) of her field goal attempts.

For the season, she scored in double figures 14 times, including two 20-point efforts, while grabbing 10 or more rebounds on 10 occasions.

Cravens ranked fifth in the Big Sky and 66th nationally with 1.7 blocks per game. She totaled 96 blocks in two seasons at Eastern Washington, which ranked ninth on the school career charts.

FRESHMAN (EASTERN WASHINGTON, 2018-19)

Cravens competed in 32 games with 17 starts as a true freshman for EWU in 2018-19. She averaged 3.2 points, 4.4 rebounds and 1.5 blocks in just 15.8 minutes per game. Cravens had a season-high 13 points to go along with 12 rebounds for her first career double-double against Idaho State (March 12).

She added a career-high five blocks and a season-best 15 rebounds against Sacramento State (Feb. 28). She finished the season with two games in double-figure points and three with double-digit rebounds.

FRESHMAN (2020-21)

Annika (pronounced AH-nick-ah) Stewart, a 6-3 forward out of Wayzata High School in Plymouth, Minn., was the first commitment in Nebraska's signing class, making her intentions known on July 31, 2019.

Stewart gives the Huskers a versatile forward with a strong post game and the ability to shoot the three. Stewart enjoyed a strong senior season at Wayzata, averaging 25 points over her final 12 games of the season to earn first-team Class 4A All-State accolades.

In her collegiate debut, Stewart got off to an impressive start with 12 points, seven rebounds, an assist, a block and two steals in 16 minutes of action in a 90-61 win over Oral Roberts (Dec. 4). Stewart hit her first five shots, including a pair of three-pointers, against the Golden Eagles to help shoot Nebraska to victory.

She starred again off the bench with 15 points and two more three-pointers in just nine minutes off the bench in a 64-51 win over Idaho State (Dec. 6).

Stewart was Nebraska's nominee for Big Ten Freshman of the Week (Dec. 7) after averaging 13.5 points and 4.5 rebounds in 12.5 minutes per game to open the season.

BEFORE NEBRASKA

Stewart averaged approximately 20.0 points, 8.1 rebounds and 1.8 assists while hitting 65.6 percent of her two-point field goal attempts, 41.5 percent (39-94) of her threes and 89.5 percent (51-57) of her free throws as a senior.

She led Wayzata to a 24-5 record with three of its losses coming to national No. 1 Hopkins. In the third meeting, Stewart finished with 27 points in the 6-4A sectional championship game against Hopkins and Gatorade National High

School Player of the Year Paige Bueckers.

Over the final 12 games of 2019-20, Stewart turned up her production to 25 points per contest. She opened the 4A playoffs with 27 points in a win over Armstrong, before erupting for a season-high 36 points in a sectional semifinal win over St. Louis Park and future Husker teammate Kendall Coley. Wayzata finished with a final No. 3 ranking in the state.

Stewart earned first-team Class 4A All-State honors from the Minnesota Girls Coaches Association, while also earning first-team All-Lake Conference honors. She was also an All-Metro selection.

Stewart averaged 12.2 points and 7.0 rebounds as a junior for 26-3 Wayzata, while earning All-Lake Conference and All-Metro honors. She produced 10.0 points and 6.0 rebounds per game as a sophomore for the 25-3 Trojans to earn All-Lake Conference honors in her first season at the school. She played her eighth grade and freshman seasons in North Dakota the Minot's Bishop Ryan High School, before her family moved to Minneapolis. Wayzata was the No. 2 ranked team in Class 4A in Minnesota in both 2018 and 2019.

After coming off the bench as an eighth grader, Stewart averaged 15.2 points and 7.1 rebounds as a freshman for Bishop Ryan. She earned all-region and all-conference honors while helping Bishop Ryan to a 20-5 record on the season. She totaled 1,675 points, 836 rebounds, 130 blocks and 119 three-pointers in her five high school seasons combined.

Kate Cain returns for her fourth season as a Husker and her first year as a graduate student at Nebraska. An honorable-mention All-Big Ten selection last year and a two-time Big Ten All-Defensive choice, Cain has been projected as a second-round pick in the 2021 WNBA Draft. She already owns Nebraska career (288) and season (101) blocked shot records and could join the Huskers' 1,000-point club this year.

She has opened her senior season by averaging 11.0 points, 8.0 rebounds and 4.0 blocks in a pair of Husker wins, including her 13th career double-double with 14 points and 11 rebounds and six blocks in a win over Oral Roberts (Dec. 4).

JUNIOR (2019-20)

The greatest shot-blocker in Nebraska history, Cain owns a school-record 280 career blocks, including a season-record 101 in 2019-

20. The 6-5 center from Middletown, N.Y., led the Big Ten and ranked third in the NCAA with 3.4 blocks per game, while adding 9.3 points and a team-best 7.2 rebounds. She notched five double-doubles in 2019-20, including season highs of 19 points and 15 rebounds to go with six blocks in a win over No. 24 Minnesota (Jan. 4). It followed 10 points and 14 rebounds at Michigan State (Dec. 31), after she opened Big Ten play with 16 points and 12 rebounds in a win over lowa (Dec. 28). She added 14 points, 13 rebounds and eight blocks against Ohio State (Feb. 2), before going for 12 points, 12 boards, seven blocks and a career-high four steals at No. 19 Northwestern (Feb. 16). She owns 12 career double-doubles.

Cain had 15 points, eight rebounds and four blocks against ORU (Dec. 14), and added 13 points and eight boards vs. Manhattan (Dec. 22).

Cain had 18 points, seven rebounds and three blocks vs. Creighton (Nov. 24). She added 13 points, nine boards and two blocks at Ohio State (Feb. 19). In a win over Duke (Dec. 4), she had 12 points, five rebounds and five blocks.

She opened the South Point Shootout with 10 points, five rebounds and her 200th career block in a win over USC (Nov. 29). She had eight blocks along with 10 points and seven boards in NU's win over Alabama A&M (Nov. 6).

SOPHOMORE (2018-19)

Cain set the Husker sophomore record with 79 blocks, while ranking second in the Big Ten and 13th nationally with 2.6 blocks per game. She started all 30 games and averaged 7.5 points and 5.9 rebounds. Cain had 16 points and a seasonhigh 17 rebounds in a win over San Jose State (Dec. 8). She had 16 points against USC Upstate (Nov. 11) and notched a double-double with 10 points and 10 boards at Washington State (Nov. 16). She had a season-high seven blocks in a win over No. 24 Michigan State (Feb. 17).

FRESHMAN (2017-18)

Cain earned spots on the Big Ten All-Defensive and Big Ten All-Freshman teams by averaging 9.9 points and team bests of 7.0 rebounds and 3.1 blocks in 2017-18. She led the Big Ten and ranked among the top eight players nationally with a school-record 100 blocks on the season to help the Huskers lead the Big Ten in both field

She started NU's last 31 games and was a four-time Big Ten Freshman of the Week. She produced the first points (22), rebounds (14) and blocks (11) triple-double in school history against Florida Atlantic (Dec. 19).

She had five double-doubles, including 14 points and 20 rebounds in a win over Penn State (Feb. 22). Her 20 rebounds tied for sixth-best in Husker history, helping NU post a plus-29 rebound margin against Penn State - the largest against a conference foe in Husker history.

Isabelle Bourne returns for her second season at Nebraska with a chance to make significant increases in contributions. Bourne, a member of the Australian U19 National Team in 2019, averaged 5.9 points, 4.4 rebounds and 1.0 block off the bench as a freshman for the Huskers in 2019-20.

She has opened her sophomore season by averaging 11.5 points, 6.0 rebounds and 2.5 assists in a pair of Husker wins in the first two starts of her career.

Bourne (who also goes by "Issie" - sounds like IZZY) opened the 2020-21 season by making her first collegiate start in a 90-61 win over Oral Roberts (Dec. 4). She just missed a double-double with 14 points and a career-high nine rebounds to go along three assists, three blocks and a steal against the Golden Eagles. She added nine points, three rebounds and two assists going head-to-head against her older sister, Callie, in a 64-51 win over Idaho State (Dec. 6).

FRESHMAN (2019-20)

Bourne made an immediate impact as a freshman. The 6-2 forward from Canberra, Australia, averaged 5.9 points and 4.4 rebounds while playing in all 30 games.

Bourne closed her freshman campaign with career highs of 16 points and five blocks against Michigan in the Big Ten Tournament (March 5). She added six rebounds, an assist and a steal in a career-high 29 minutes against the Wolverines.

She finished the season with four doublefigure scoring efforts - all against Big Ten foes.

Bourne had 13 points, three blocks and two steals in 27 minutes against Ohio State (Feb. 2).

She also played a strong role inside with six points, seven rebounds and two blocks in a win over Duke (Dec. 4). She added six points and seven more rebounds vs. Manhattan (Dec. 22).

Bourne had eight points, six rebounds and two assists in a win over USC (Nov. 29). She added eight points, five boards and two blocks in a win at Wisconsin (Jan. 25).

Bourne also had eight points, six rebounds and a block in a win over Morgan State (Nov. 14). She added seven points on 2-of-3 shooting including her first career three-pointer, while adding three boards vs. Creighton (Nov. 24).

She had five points and three rebounds in a win over Michigan (Jan. 19). Bourne added four points and five rebounds in a win over SIUE (Nov. 17), before getting four points, four boards, two assists and two steals against Southern (Nov. 20).

Bourne has extensive international experience. She had an impressive summer with the Australian U19 National Team. Bourne was a key in Australia's silver medal at the FIBA U19 World Cup, averaging 8.4 points, 5.1 rebounds and 1.1 assists in 23.1 minutes per game over seven contests for the Gems.

Australia went 5-2 at the World Cup with both losses to the USA U19 team, including an overtime setback in the gold medal game.

One of the most talented young players in Australia, Bourne joined the Huskers in August of 2019 after helping the Gems to a silver medal at 2019 FIBA Under-19 World Cup in Bangkok, Thailand, July 20-28.

Game Highlights: Kate Cain led six Huskers in double figures by producing her 13th career double-double to lead Nebraska to a 90-61 season-opening win over Oral Roberts. Cain had 10 points and five rebounds in the first quarter to help get the Huskers rolling after falling behind early. She finished with 14 points, 11 rebounds and six blocked shots. Isabelle Bourne nearly added the first double-double of her career with 14 points and a career-high nine rebounds in her first collegiate start. Fellow sophomore Trinity Brady helped the Huskers surge to a 45-35 halftime lead by burying back-to-back threes in the opening minute of the second guarter. Brady finished with career highs of 15 points, five rebounds and three threes in her starting debut. Sam Haiby pitched in 14 points, eight rebounds and seven assists, while Makenzie Helms added 10 points - all in the second half to put all five of Nebraska's returning players in double figures. They were joined by freshman Annika Stewart, who opened her career by hitting her first five shots, including a pair of threes, on her way to 12 points and seven rebounds.

Isabelle Bourne finished with nine points for the Huskers, while her older sister, Callie, had nine points, 14 rebounds and seven assists for an Idaho State squad that returned its top nine scorers from an 18-win team in 2019-20.
