HUSKERS OPEN BIG TEN TOURNAMENT WITH MICHIGAN

- The Nebraska women's basketball team opens its stay at the 2020 Big Ten Tournament by taking on Michigan Thursday in Indianapolis.
- Tip-off between the No. 10 seed Huskers (17-12, 7-11 Big Ten) and the No. 7 seed Wolverines (19-10, 10-8 Big Ten) is set for 5:30 p.m. (CT) at Bankers Life Fieldhouse. It will be the fifth game of the tournament and the opening game of the second day's evening session. Both Nebraska and Michigan earned first-round byes in the 14-team tournament.
- Live television coverage will be provided by the Big Ten Network with Lisa Byington and Christy Winters Scott on the call while Vera Jones provides sideline reports.
- Live radio coverage of Thursday's game can be heard on B107.3 FM in Lincoln and CD 105.9 FM in Omaha beginning at 5:15 p.m. (CT). Stations across the state will also carry the broadcast on the Learfield IMG College Husker Sports Network. Free live audio can be found at Huskers.com, the Huskers App and on Tuneln.
- Sophomore Leigha Brown (Auburn, Ind.) leads the Huskers to her home state after earning Big Ten Sixth Player-of-the-Year honors from both the conference coaches and media. Nebraska's leading scorer at 14.2 points per game, Brown was also an honorable-mention All-Big Ten selection. She closed the regular season by earning a spot on the Big Ten Weekly Honor Roll after scoring 22 points at No. 22 Indiana in Bloomington on Feb. 27.
- Brown, who was a finalist for Indiana High School Player-of-the-Year honors as a senior at DeKalb High School in 2017-18, leads all Big Ten reserves and ranks 12th in the conference overall in scoring. No other non-starter in the Big Ten ranks among the league's top 25 in scoring.
- Kate Cain joined Brown as an honorable-mention All-Big Ten choice while claiming a spot on the Big Ten All-Defensive Team from both the coaches and league media. Cain, a 6-5 junior from Middletown, N.Y., leads the Big Ten with 98 blocks this season. Her 277 career blocks rank in the top 10 in Big Ten history and are a Nebraska school record. She needs two more blocks to match her Nebraska single-season record set with 100 in 2017-18, when she also earned Big Ten All-Defensive honors.
- Cain, who is averaging 9.2 points and 7.4 rebounds per game on the season, led the Big Ten in both blocks (3.6 bpg) and defensive rebounds (6.7 drpg) during regular-season conference play.

HUSKER NUGGETS

- The Big Ten features 11 teams in the top 64 of the Massey Ratings: Maryland (4), Northwestern (6), Indiana (11), Iowa (16), Ohio State (23), Michigan (28), Rutgers (30), Purdue (43), Michigan State (45), Nebraska (48), Minnesota (63).
- The Big Ten has 11 teams in the NCAA RPI Top 100: Maryland (3), Northwestern (7), Iowa (12), Indiana (15), Ohio State (22), Michigan (37), Rutgers (42), Purdue (46), Minnesota (86), Nebraska (88), Michigan State (92).
- Through 29 games, Nebraska is allowing an average of 65 points per game, after allowing 70.1 points per game last season. NU's 2018 NCAA Tournament team allowed 63.6.
- Opponents are shooting 37.1 percent from the field and 31.4 percent from three-point range against NU. Last year, Husker foes hit 41.1 percent, including 33.4 percent from three. In 2017-18, Nebraska led the Big Ten in field goal percentage defense (.371) and three-point field goal percentage defense (.299).
- Nebraska has held eight opponents to 55 points or less this season. Last year, NU held only two foes (Radford-39, Kansas-52) to 55 or less. NU held 11 opponents to 55 or less in 2017-18.
- NU's bench has outscored opponent reserves in 24 of 29 games in 2019-20. The Husker bench has outscored opposing benches in 52 of the last 59 games, including double-digit edges 36 times.
- This season, NU's bench has outscored opposing benches 738-467 (25.4-16.1 ppg).
- Nebraska has hit 10 or more threes 20 times in the last three seasons (91 games), including five times in the last 20 contests. Through the first 20 seasons with the three-point shot in women's basketball (1988-2007), Nebraska hit 10 threes in a game just six times (311 games).

SCOUTING THE MICHIGAN WOLVERINES

• Michigan enters the Big Ten Tournament with a 19-10 record including a 10-8 Big Ten mark. The Wolverines, who earned the No. 7 seed in the tournament, are hoping to solidify their grip on an NCAA Tournament bid and possibly improve their seeding in the Big Dance.

• Michigan had posted three straight wins before falling 78-60 to No. 22 Indiana on Senior Day in Ann Arbor on Sunday. The Maize and Blue own a 7-4 record since suffering a 74-71 loss to Nebraska in Lincoln on Jan. 19. That game marked the last for Wolverine senior forward Kayla Robbins, who suffered a knee injury early in the first half against the Cornhuskers. Robbins was averaging 12.2 points per game entering that contest.

• In the only meeting between Nebraska and Michigan this season, Husker senior Hannah Whitish scored a game-high 20 points by knocking down a season-high six threes. She also had a game-high five assists. Sam Haiby added 18 points and a trio of threes, while Nicea Eliely pitched in 11 points and three threes of her own. Nebraska went 12-for-24 from long range against Michigan, while the Wolverines answered with 8-for-14 three-point shooting. Hailey Brown led Michigan with 17 points, Naz Hillmon had 15 and Akienreh Johnson contributed 13 points and a game-high eight rebounds.

• Coach Kim Barnes Arico is in her eighth season leading Michigan and her 24th year as a head coach. The Wolverines finished 22-12 and 11-7 in the Big Ten last year, advancing to the second round of the 2019 NCAA Tournament.

• Michigan is led by sophomore forward Naz Hillmon, who is averaging team bests of 17.1 points and 8.6 rebounds per game. Hillmon was the 2019 Big Ten Sixth Player of the Year and a member of the Big Ten All-Freshman Team. She was a unanimous first-team All-Big Ten selection by the conference coaches and media this season and has averaged 19.1 points the last 11 games.

• Fellow sophomore Amy Dilk has been solid at the point for the Wolverines, averaging 11.7 points and 4.9 rebounds to go along with a team-best 4.4 assists. Dilk earned second-team All-Big Ten honors from league coaches this season, averaging 13.5 points since the injury to Robbins.

• Michigan's only active senior Akienreh Johnson is averaging 10.6 points and 6.4 rebounds. She is averaging 12.3 points and 7.9 boards since the first meeting with Nebraska.

• Junior Hailey Brown has pitched in 8.2 points and 3.1 rebounds this season. The 6-1 forward has averaged 11.8 points and 4.8 rebounds in four career meetings against Nebraska, including 8-for-15 three-point shooting. Brown did not play against Nebraska in the 2018 Big Ten Tournament.

• Freshman guard Maddie Nolan has stepped into the Michigan starting five since the injury to Robbins and an injury to Danielle Rauch that followed. The 5-9 Nolan is averaging 2.7 points and 1.9 rebounds on the season, including 7.2 points and 4.2 rebounds over the last five games.

• Freshman forward/center Izabel Varejão has played a significant role inside, averaging 5.4 points and 3.9 rebounds on the season, including 5.8 points and 4.4 boards since the injury to Robbins. Varejão had eight points in nine minutes in the first meeting at Nebraska.

• Michigan has gotten contributions off the bench from Michelle Sidor (3.6 ppg), Emily Kiser (3.3 ppg) and Priscilla Smeenge (1.7 ppg).

• Michigan is shooting 45 percent from the field and 32.4 percent from three and 68.7 percent from the free throw line this season. In the possession game, the Wolverines own a Big Ten-best plus-7.6 rebound margin but a minus-0.2 turnover margin.

NEBRASKA VS. MICHIGAN SERIES HISTORY

• Nebraska owns a 14-5 edge in the all-time series with Michigan, including a 74-71 win in the only meeting this season at Pinnacle Bank Arena in Lincoln (Jan. 19).

• The Huskers have won three of the last four meetings with the Wolverines, including a 61-54 victory over Michigan in the Big Ten Tournament quarterfinals on March 2, 2018, at Bankers Life Fieldhouse in Indianapolis - the only neutral site meeting between the two schools.

• Nebraska is 7-3 all-time against Michigan in Lincoln. The Huskers are 7-2 all-time against the Wolverines away from home, including 6-2 in Ann Arbor and 1-0 at the Big Ten Tournament.

• The series has been evenly matched as Big Ten foes, with Nebraska owning an 8-5 edge since joining the conference in 2011-12.

• Nebraska was 6-0 against Michigan as non-conference foes dating back to the first meeting between the two teams on Nov. 28, 1980 at the Bob Devaney Sports Center in Lincoln. The Huskers won 118-92 in the highest scoring game in Nebraska women's basketball history.

NEBRASKA STREAKS

- Kate Cain owns Nebraska's longest streak of consecutive starts (90).
- Nicea Eliely owns Nebraska's second-longest streak of starts (85).
- Nicea Eliely and Leigha Brown are the only Huskers to score in every game this season.
- Kate Cain is the only Husker to record at least one rebound in all 29 games this season.
- Eliely was the only Husker to score in all 30 games last season, and the only Husker to score in all of Nebraska's games against Big Ten Conference foes. She has scored in 63 consecutive games overall. She did not score in a win over Penn State on Feb. 22, 2018, the only time in the past three seasons (including 2019-20, 83 games) that Eliely was shut out.
- The Huskers have knocked down at least one three in 371 straight games dating back to a loss at UTEP on Dec. 20, 2008. Nebraska has hit at least two three-pointers in 250 consecutive games.

NUMBERS TO WATCH

- **(2)** Kate Cain needs two blocks to reach 100 on the year to tie her own Nebraska season record.
- **(4.0)** Kate Cain and Kristian Hudson posted perfect 4.0 grade-point averages during the fall semester of 2019.

- (9) Sam Haiby needs nine points to reach 600 in her career.
- (115) Nicea Eliely is scheduled to make her 115th career start, which will move her into 10th in Nebraska history ahead of former WNBA All-Star Anna DeForge (Indiana Fever) on the Husker all-time list for starts.

BROWN NAMED BIG TEN SIXTH PLAYER OF THE YEAR

• Leigha Brown was named the Big Ten Sixth Player of the Year by both the conference coaches and media following the conclusion of the 2020 league regular season.

• Through 29 games, the 6-1 guard/forward from Auburn, Ind., leads the Huskers in scoring with 14.2 points per game, while adding 3.5 rebounds and 1.9 assists off the bench.

• Brown (12th) is the only non-starter among the top 25 scorers in the Big Ten.

• She leads the Huskers in free throws made (115) and attempted (150) while shooting 76.7 percent at the line. Brown is the first Husker guard to make 100 free throws in a season since 2013 WNBA first-round draft pick Lindsey Moore in 2012-13 (121-150, .807).

• Brown erupted for a season-high 25 points to go along with five rebounds and four assists in the win over Manhattan (Dec. 22). Brown tied her career high with four three-pointers against the Jaspers. She had 18 points in the first half.

• She went off for 24 points while grabbing five rebounds to play a major role in Nebraska's 90-85 OT win at Missouri (Nov. 10). She scored 18 points after halftime to help the Huskers, and she added a huge assist on Sam Haiby's game-tying three-pointer to send the contest to overtime.

• Brown recorded her seventh 20-point effort of the season with 22 points at No. 22 Indiana to close the regular season (Feb. 27). She earned a spot on the Big Ten Weekly Honor Roll (March 2).

• She had a game-high 22 points, including 17 in the first half, in Nebraska's win over Illinois (Feb. 22). Brown tied a career high with four threes, while adding six rebounds and two assists.

• Brown scored 20 points, including eight in the fourth quarter, to help Nebraska rally from a 10-point deficit to a win at Wisconsin (Jan. 25).

• Brown had 20 points at Iowa (Feb. 6) and 20 more in a win over Penn State (Feb. 13).

• She owns 22 double-figure efforts on the year, including 14 games with 15 or more points.

• Brown led Nebraska with 19 points, including 15 in the second half, at No. 20 Maryland (Jan. 16).

• Brown added a game-high 16 points while tying her career high with five assists in a win over Morgan State (Nov. 14). She scored 16 more in a win over Southern (Nov. 20), while pitching in four rebounds and three assists, before contributing 16 again in NU's win over USC (Nov. 29).

• She scored 15 points against Wisconsin (Jan. 9) and a team-high 15 at Minnesota (Jan. 30). She added 15 points in Nebraska's win over Oral Roberts (Dec. 15).

• Brown scored a career-high 30 points in a win over Purdue in Lincoln (Feb. 10, 2019). She scored 22 in the second half to earn a spot on the Big Ten Weekly Honor Roll as a freshman (Feb. 11, 2019).

• Brown had 20 points at NCAA Elite Eight qualifier Iowa (Jan. 3, 2019), which followed a 19-point effort in a win at Ohio State (Dec. 31, 2018). Those two performances earned Brown Big Ten Freshman-of-the-Week honors (Jan. 7, 2019).

- Brown started Nebraska's final six games of 2018-19 after coming off the bench the first 24.
- She owns 34 double-figure scoring efforts in her career (22, 2019-20; 12, 2018-19), including nine 20-point games.

CAIN EARNS SECOND SPOT ON ALL-DEFENSIVE TEAM

• The greatest shot-blocker in Nebraska history, Kate Cain earned a spot on the Big Ten All-Defensive Team for the second time in her career in 2020. She was also an honorable-mention All-Big Ten selection.

• In Big Ten regular-season play, Cain led the conference in both blocks (3.6 bpg) and defensive rebounds (6.7 drpg).

• Cain, who has shattered the Nebraska career block record (277), joined the Big Ten's all-time top 10 in blocks with two blocks at Ohio State (Feb. 19).

• The 6-5 Cain owns 98 blocks on the year and needs two blocks to tie her Nebraska season record (100, 2017-18).

• Cain, who was among the 20 initial candidates for the 2020 Lisa Leslie Award, is averaging 9.2 points and 7.4 rebounds on the season.

• She owns five Big Ten double-doubles this season, including 12 points, 12 rebounds, seven blocks and a career-high four steals at No. 19 Northwestern (Feb. 16).

• Cain had 14 points, 13 rebounds and eight blocks against Ohio State (Feb. 2), before just missing a double-double with 13 points and nine boards at OSU (Feb. 19).

• She added five blocks each against both No. 20 Iowa and No. 18 Indiana before getting six blocks in a win over Penn State (Feb. 13).

• After going without a block for the only time this season at No. 20 Maryland (Jan. 16), Cain had multiple blocks in 11 consecutive games, including at least five blocks in six straight games from Minnesota (Jan. 30) to Northwestern (Feb. 16).

• Cain opened the 2019-20 season by recording eight blocks - the third-best total in school history - in a win over Alabama A&M (Nov. 6). She added 10 points and seven rebounds in the win.

• She posted a double-double with season highs of 19 points and 15 rebounds to go with six blocks in a win over No. 24 Minnesota (Jan. 4), earning a Big Ten Weekly Honor Roll spot (Jan. 6).

• Cain got her first double-double with 16 points and 12 rebounds in the win over Iowa (Dec. 28).

• She added her second double-double with 10 points, 14 rebounds and four blocks at Michigan State (Dec. 31).

• She had 18 points with seven boards and three blocks vs. Creighton (Nov. 24).

• Cain played a strong all-around game with 12 points, five rebounds, five blocks and two steals in a win over Duke (Dec. 4).

• She had 12 points, seven rebounds and five blocks to go with two steals at No. 20 Iowa (Feb. 6), before adding 12 points, four boards, five blocks and two steals against No. 18 Indiana (Feb. 9).

• Cain set the Nebraska season block record with 100 as a freshman. She finished No. 8 nationally in total blocks, and No. 7 in NCAA D-I and No. 1 in the Big Ten with 3.1 blocks per game in 2017-18.

• She set the Nebraska sophomore block record with 79 in 2018-19.

• Cain set the Husker single-game block record while also posting the first points (22), rebounds (14) and blocked shots (11) triple-double in school history in a win over Florida Atlantic (Dec. 19, 2017).

• She became just the sixth player in Big Ten Conference history to record 11 or more blocks and just the 10th Big Ten player to notch double-digit blocks in a single game.

• Cain's 22 points against Florida Atlantic were also a career high, and her three assists against the Owls also tied a career best.

• She owns 40 double-figure scoring efforts, 15 double-figure rebounding games and one double-digit block game in the first 91 games of her career. She has made a team-leading 90 straight starts.

• Cain owns 48 games (15, 2019-20; 17, 2018-19; 15, 2017-18) with three or more blocks in her career. She has recorded five or more blocks 16 times - Clemson (6, Nov. 30, 2017), Kansas (5, Dec. 6, 2017), FAU (11, Dec. 19, 2017), Northwestern (5, Jan. 7, 2018), Iowa (5, Jan. 16, 2018), Maryland (Jan. 8, 2019), Michigan State (7, Feb. 17, 2019), Alabama A&M (8, Nov. 6, 2019), Minnesota (6, Jan. 4), Minnesota (6, Jan. 30, 2020), Ohio State (8, Feb. 2, 2020), Iowa (5, Feb. 6, 2020), Indiana (5, Feb. 9, 2020), Penn State (Feb. 13, 2020) and Northwestern (7, Feb. 16, 2020).

• Cain was the only player to capture spots on both the Big Ten All-Freshman Team and Big Ten All-Defensive Team in 2017-18. Both five-player teams were chosen by the league coaches.

• She captured four Big Ten Freshman-of-the-Week awards (Nov. 13, Dec. 4, Dec. 11, Dec. 26) during the 2017-18 non-conference.

• Cain's 56.6 field goal percentage ranked as the second-best mark by a freshman in school history.

• Her 223 rebounds ranked fourth among freshmen in Husker history, and was the sixth NU freshman with 200 boards. She is the only Husker freshman to record 300 points, 200 rebounds and 100 blocks.

• A two-time All-Big Ten guard (2nd, 2018; HM, 2019) Hannah Whitish is averaging 9.0 points, 3.3 rebounds and 3.5 assists as a senior.

• Whitish became the first Husker in history to hit the combined career milestones of 1,000 points, 400 assists and 200 three-pointers, crossing the 400-assist plateau in the win over Duke.

• She ranks ninth in career points (1,228) and third in assists (465) among active Big Ten players.

• The 5-9 guard from Barneveld, Wis., heads to the Big Ten Tournament needing 15 points to tie Brooke Schwartz (1,243, 1997-2000) at No. 18 on the all-time Husker scoring list.

• Whitish poured in a season-high 20 points with a career-high-tying six threes in a win over Michigan (Jan. 19). She added five assists with no turnovers against the Wolverines.

• She scored 17 in a win over No. 24 Minnesota (Jan. 4) and added 13 at Minnesota (Jan. 30).

• Whitish produced a 16-point effort when she also tied a career high with four steals and drew a pair of charges against Ohio State (Feb. 2).

• She had 15 points on five threes in a win over Sacred Heart (Nov. 30). She earned a spot on the All-South Point Shootout team for her performances in Las Vegas (Nov. 29-30).

• She managed 14 points and five assists while knocking down four threes at Iowa (Feb. 6).

• Whitish had 12 points on four threes and seven assists in a Senior Day win over Illinois (Feb. 22).

• Whitish opened the season with 12 points on 4-of-6 threes in a win over Alabama A&M (Nov. 6).

• She added 12 points on team highs of seven rebounds, five assists and a career-high-tying four steals in an overtime win at Missouri (Nov. 10).

• Whitish has scored in double figures 14 times this season.

• She has led Nebraska in assists 15 times this season and has five or more assists 11 times.

• Whitish has ascended to No. 3 on the Nebraska career three-point list with 258. She is nine threes away from Kiera Hardy at No. 2 (267, 2004-07).

• Whitish led the Huskers with 65 three-pointers in 2018-19, which was the third-best total by a junior in school history.

• She led the Huskers with 10.1 points and 4.3 assists per game last season.

• She needs 20 steals to join the top 10 in Husker history in that category.

• With 114 career starts entering Thursday's game against Michigan, Eliely will take sole possession of 10th on the Nebraska career starts list with 115. She has started 85 consecutive games, which trails only Kate Cain's 90 straight starts among the Huskers.

• Eliely is one of only 12 players in Nebraska history to reach the combined career milestones of 900 points (941), 400 rebounds (460) and 200 assists (254).

• Eliely tied her career high with 19 points at Maryland (Jan. 16). She hit 6-of-10 shots from the field, including both of her three-point attempts and all five free throws.

• She set her career high with 19 points as a freshman against Cal (Dec. 4, 2016). She scored a season-high 18 points as a junior against No. 7 Maryland (Feb. 14, 2019).

• She owns 38 career double-figure scoring efforts, including 15 points, five rebounds, three assists and two steals against Purdue (Jan. 22).

• Sophomore Sam Haiby ranks second among the Huskers in scoring (10.0 ppg) and assists (3.3 apg) while leading Nebraska in steals (1.4 spg) on the season.

• Haiby erupted for a career-high 28 points on 11-of-19 shooting to power Nebraska to a 90-85 OT win at Missouri (Nov. 10). She tied a career high with three threes against the Tigers, including the game-tying triple with three seconds left to send the game to OT tied at 76. She scored NU's first eight points and added 18 points after halftime, including two free throws with 13.3 seconds left to seal the win.

• Haiby helped the Huskers go 2-0 in her first week as a starter by leading Nebraska with 18.0 points per game to earn a spot on the Big Ten Weekly Honor Roll (Nov. 11).

• She added her second 20-point game of the year and third of her career with 20 points and a career-high four steals in a win over Oral Roberts (Dec. 14). She earned her second Big Ten Weekly Honor Roll selection (Dec. 16) this season.

• Haiby had 19 points at Michigan State (Dec. 31), when she had 15 points on 6-of-6 shooting in the first half.

• She pumped in 18 points, including 3-of-4 threes and 5-of-6 free throws in a win over Michigan (Jan. 19). She also had four assists against the Wolverines.

• Haiby produced 17 points, seven rebounds and four assists against Creighton (Nov. 24).

• Haiby added 17 points and a career-high eight boards in a win over No. 24 Minnesota (Jan. 4).

• She was named the Big Ten Freshman of the Week (Feb. 4, 2019) after scoring her then-Big Ten-best with 17 points against Indiana (Feb. 3, 2019), which followed a 13-point effort in a road win at Purdue (Jan. 31, 2019).

• Haiby produced double figures in each of Nebraska's final four games of 2018-19. For the season, she finished in double figures 15 times. She owns 30 double-digit scoring efforts in her career, including 15 as a sophomore in 2019-20.

• She ranked second among the Huskers with 78 assists (2.6 apg) as a freshman.

• Haiby led the Huskers in free throws made (76) and attempted (106) in 2018-19.

• Ashtyn Veerbeek has worked hard to make greater contributions for the Huskers in 2019-20.

• The 6-2, sophomore, forward from Sioux Center, Iowa, has proven herself as one of the hardest working Huskers, claiming the team's 2019 Lifter-of-the-Year Award as a freshman.

• Through 28 games as a starter this season, Veerbeek is averaging 7.5 points and 4.4 rebounds to go along with 1.0 assist per game. She is shooting 44.6 percent from the field, including 35.9 percent (22-60) from three-point range and 76 percent (38-50) from the free throw line.

• Veerbeek has produced more three-pointers (23-11), assists (28-18) and steals (17-9) than she did last season for the Huskers from her power forward spot.

• Veerbeek owns 10 double-figure scoring efforts this season, including five in Big Ten play.

- She produced a season-high 15 points in a win over Illinois (Feb. 22).

- She put up 14 points at Rutgers (Jan. 12) when she set a career high by connecting on 4-of-7 three-pointers. She added five boards and three assists.

GRADUATE TRANSFER HUDSON RETURNS AFTER REDSHIRT

• Nebraska graduate transfer Kristian Hudson returned to the court by scoring four points, grabbing three rebounds and dishing out an assist in NU's win over Alabama A&M (Nov. 6).

• Hudson is averaging 0.9 points and 0.7 rebounds this season, while playing in 18 games.

• Off the court, Hudson posted a 4.0 GPA in the fall of 2019 while pursuing her master's degree in applied science.

• She was recently chosen to participate in the WBCA's "So You Want To Be A Coach" program in conjunction with the national coaches convention and the NCAA Women's Final Four in New Orleans.

• She ignited the Huskers with a second-quarter three-pointer - her first of the season - to spark a 14-5 Nebraska surge that put the Huskers in control the rest of the game in a 78-69 win over Iowa (Dec. 28).

• The 5-5 guard from Birmingham, Ala., averaged 2.4 points and 1.6 rebounds through Nebraska's first seven games last season before missing a win over Kansas (Dec. 5, 2019).

• She missed the final 23 games of 2018-19 with a foot injury that required surgery in December, 2018.

• Hudson was a three-year starter at Florida International before joining the Huskers late in the summer of 2018, following her graduation from FIU.

• She had 1,076 points, 372 rebounds, 383 assists and 107 steals in 89 games with 87 starts at FIU. She averaged 14.5 points and 4.5 rebounds per game as a senior in 2017-18.

• Hudson ranks 15th in points (1,109) and seventh in assists (400) among active Big Ten players.

HUSKERS ANNOUNCE KISSINGER OUT FOR SEASON

• Nebraska women's basketball coach Amy Williams announced on Dec. 14 that junior guard Taylor Kissinger would undergo hip surgery in early January and be out for the rest of the season. Kissinger underwent surgery on Friday, Jan. 3.

• Kissinger, who was bothered by the nagging injury for several months, averaged 8.4 points and 2.8 rebounds off the bench in five games this season. She missed four games in the concussion protocol after playing in the season-opening win over Alabama A&M (Nov. 6).

• In Nebraska's win over Duke in the Big Ten/ACC Challenge (Dec. 4), Kissinger led the Huskers with 19 points, including a career-high-matching six three-pointers. She also dished out four assists.

• Last season, Kissinger led the Big Ten and ranked No. 4 nationally in three-point field goal percentage (.456, 62-136).

• In her first two seasons, Kissinger averaged 9.4 points and 3.6 rebounds while competing in 55 games with 31 starts.

• Because she only played in five games this season, Kissinger is expected to regain her junior season of eligibility in 2020-21.

AUSTRALIAN BOURNE BRINGS STRONG IDENTITY

• Isabelle Bourne is averaging 5.6 points and 4.3 rebounds through the first 29 games of her college career, including career highs with 13 points, three blocks and two steals in a career-high 27 minutes against Ohio State (Feb. 2).

• She added 11 points and a career-high eight rebounds in a win over Wisconsin (Jan. 9), before adding her third double-digit effort in Big Ten play with 11 points and four boards in a win over Penn State (Feb. 13).

• Bourne had nine points and a career-high-tying eight rebounds at Rutgers (Jan. 12).

• Bourne played big in Nebraska's big games early in her career, including then-career highs of eight points and seven rebounds in a Big Ten-opening win over Iowa (Dec. 28). She scored eight straight points in the second quarter while knocking down two threes to cap a 14-5 surge that put the Huskers in the lead the rest of the way.

• The 6-2 freshman from Canberra, Australia, had six points, seven rebounds in a win over Duke, after getting eight points and six boards in a win over USC (Nov. 29) at the South Point Shootout.

• She had seven points, including her first career three, to go along with three rebounds against Creighton (Nov. 24), and added seven points and four boards against Purdue (Jan. 22).

• Bourne was a major factor in Australia's silver medal at the FIBA U19 World Cup, averaging 8.4 points, 5.1 rebounds and 1.1 assists in 23.1 minutes per game over seven contests for the Gems.

• Australia went 5-2 at the World Cup with both losses to the USA U19 team, including an overtime setback in the gold medal game.

- One of the most talented young players in Australia, Bourne joined the Huskers in August of 2019 after helping the Gems to a silver medal at 2019 FIBA Under-19 World Cup in Bangkok, Thailand, July 20-28.

- The Australian U19 National Team entered the tournament ranked No. 7 in the world, but came up just short of the gold medal, falling 74-70 in overtime to the United States.

- Bourne averaged 8.4 points, 5.1 rebounds and 1.1 assists in 23.1 minutes for the Gems.

- In 2017, Bourne led Australia's U17 team to gold at the Oceania Championship in Guam by averaging 19 points, 9.8 rebounds and 2.6 assists to claim a spot on the all-tournament team.

- She was also the MVP of the 2017 FIBA Under-18 Asia Cup 3-on-3 tournament in Mongolia, leading her team to another gold medal. Bourne was also named to the Gems squad for the 2018 FIBA Under-18 Asian Championships.

- Bourne trained at the Australian Institute of Sport and Basketball Australia's Centre of Excellence. She was a developmental player in the University of Canberra Capitals program.

- Issie's sister, Callie, is a sophomore at Idaho State. Callie, a 5-9 guard, led ISU in scoring (12.7 ppg) and rebounding (6.8 rpg) to go along with 1.9 assists and 1.5 steals through 27 games this season for the Bengals. She had a career-high 26 points in a win at Weber State (Jan. 16). Last season, she averaged 4.1 points and 3.6 rebounds while starting 20 games. Their older sister, Emma, plays in the Canberra Capitals Academy.

BRADY MAKES IMPACT AFTER MISSING FIRST 10 GAMES

- Trinity Brady made her regular-season collegiate debut in Nebraska's non-conference finale against Manhattan (Dec. 22). Brady finished with two points, four rebounds, one assist and one block in 16 minutes off the bench.

- Brady put together the most productive game of her young career with seven points on 2-for-2 three-point shooting in just nine minutes off the bench at Rutgers (Jan. 12).

- Brady, who played in 17 straight games before sitting out the win over Illinois (Feb. 22) to rest a minor injury, added five points as part of a 10-0 Nebraska run midway through the second quarter against No. 18 Indiana (Feb. 9). The run helped the Huskers rally from a 25-point first-half deficit to tie the game in the fourth before losing in the closing seconds.

- She is averaging 1.6 points and 1.1 rebounds per game.

- She contributed three points, two assists and a steal in the Big Ten-opening win over Iowa (Dec. 28). Brady's first career three-pointer gave Nebraska a 30-27 second-quarter lead early in a 14-5 surge that put the Huskers in control the rest of the game.

- Brady added two points, two rebounds and two steals at Michigan State (Dec. 31). She ignited a 10-0 Husker run in the first quarter to help Nebraska maintain the lead for more than 30 minutes.

- Brady missed Nebraska's first 10 regular-season games after sustaining a concussion in the Huskers' exhibition win over Rogers State (Nov. 2). Brady took contact to her head and neck area late in the game against the Hillcats, but finished with eight points and eight rebounds in the game.

- The final piece of Nebraska's three-player recruiting class, Brady came to Nebraska after completing her senior season at Hamilton Heights Christian Academy in Chattanooga, Tenn. She was ranked as the No. 106 player overall in the 2019 class by Prospects Nation.

- The Lady Hawks finished the season No. 18 in the USA Today Super 25 rankings with a 22-3 overall record. Hamilton Heights Christian Academy fell to Riverdale Baptist in the NACA Championships.

- Brady competed for Lawrence North High School in Indianapolis her first three seasons.

- As a junior, Brady averaged 21.0 points, 8.5 rebounds and 4.0 assists to earn a spot on the IBCA Subway Supreme 15 Underclass All-State Team. She was also a member of the Indiana Junior All-Star Team and the Central Indiana Super Team.

- She led Lawrence North to a 20-4 record and produced several huge individual efforts as a junior in 2017-18, including a 38-point performance against Tindley, 30 points in a win over Pike and 28 points against nationally ranked North Central.

HELMS NOT AFRAID TO TAKE CHARGE

• Makenzie Helms has seen increased action in Big Ten play, competing in seven conference contests including each of the last six games. She has played in 12 games on the season.

• Over the last six games, Helms has eight of her 10 points on the season and six of her seven assists. She had career highs with three points against Indiana (Feb. 9) and Penn State (Feb. 13) and three assists against Indiana and Northwestern (Feb. 16).

• Helms made her greatest impact against the Hoosiers. After Nebraska fell behind 36-11, Helms entered in the second quarter and sparked a 10-0 Husker run. She converted the first three-point play of her career and dished out three assists in just seven total minutes. Nebraska rallied to tie the game midway through the fourth quarter before losing in the closing seconds to the Hoosiers.

• She made her collegiate debut by dishing out an assist in three minutes of action off the bench in Nebraska's season-opening win over Alabama A&M (Nov. 6).

• She returned to action to play eight minutes, getting the first points (2) and rebounds (2) of her career in a win over Sacred Heart (Nov. 30) at the South Point Shootout in Las Vegas.

• Helms captured Gatorade Connecticut High School Player-of-the-Year honors by averaging 26.5 points, 7.4 rebounds, 6.6 assists and 4.3 steals while leading the East Haven Yellowjackets to the Southern Connecticut Conference title in 2018-19.

• Helms, who was the conference player of the year, led East Haven to a 20-5 overall record and a spot in the Connecticut Class L state quarterfinals.

• She was the first commitment to Nebraska's 2018-19 class, making her intentions known in January of 2018. Her commitment followed a junior season in 2017-18 in which Helms averaged 17.5 points, 5.0 rebounds, 7.2 assists and 4.0 steals per game. East Haven finished No. 3 in the state of Connecticut with a 25-3 record in 2017-18. Helms earned first-team all-state honors and was a USA Today first-team All-Connecticut selection.

• She played her summer basketball for New Heights NYC, averaging 20 points, six rebounds, eight assists and five steals. ESPN ranked her as the No. 27 point guard in the class of 2019.

2019-20 SCHEDULE KEEPS HUSKERS HOME MORE

• Last season, Nebraska played just 14 regular-season games at home at Pinnacle Bank Arena, including just five non-conference contests. In 2019-20, the Huskers will play 17 regular-season home games in Lincoln, including eight non-conference games.

• As a team, the Huskers will shoot to "Bring IT" from start-to-finish, beginning with their 97-33 exhibition win over Rogers State at Pinnacle Bank Arena (Nov. 2). Rogers State provided Coach Williams with her first head coaching job, and the Oklahoma school currently features former Husker Jasmine Cincore as an assistant coach.

• The Big Red opened regular-season play against a former Husker when Coach Margaret Richards and Alabama A&M came to Lincoln. Richards, who played for coaches Paul Sanderford and Connie Yori at Nebraska as a four-year letterwinner (2001-04). The Huskers battled to a 68-46 win over the Bulldogs in front of 5,250 fans on Wednesday (Nov. 6) at noon inside Pinnacle Bank Arena - the third-largest season-opening crowd in school history.

• The game with Alabama A&M was preceded by the Nebraska Life Skills Sportsmanship Pep Rally on the court at Pinnacle Bank Arena, which began at 9:30 a.m. and featured nearly 2,000 students and sponsors from 27 school districts across Nebraska.

• The Huskers made their first road trip a successful one by beating 2019 NCAA Tournament qualifier Missouri 90-85 in overtime at Mizzou Arena (Nov. 10).

• Nebraska returned home to tip a four-game stand featuring Morgan State (Nov. 14), SIUE (Nov. 17), Southern (Nov. 20) and Creighton (Nov. 24). The game with SIUE was part of Alumni Weekend, when the Huskers honored members of the 2010 Big 12 Champion and NCAA Sweet 16 team on the 10th anniversary of their undefeated regular season in 2009-10.

• The Huskers spent Thanksgiving in Las Vegas at the South Point Shootout, where they defeated USC (Nov. 29) and Sacred Heart (Nov. 30).

• Nebraska returned to Pinnacle Bank Arena to take on perennial power Duke in the Big Ten/ACC Challenge (Dec. 4), knocking off the Blue Devils, 83-79.

• Nebraska rolled to a 77-67 win over Oral Roberts (Dec. 14) before closing the non-conference season with a 71-51 win over Manhattan (Dec. 22).

• The Huskers closed a four-game home stand by opening Big Ten play with a 78-69 win at home over defending Big Ten Tournament champion and NCAA Elite Eight qualifier Iowa (Dec. 28).

• The game with Iowa tipped off an 18-game conference schedule that included home battles with Minnesota (Jan. 4), Wisconsin (Jan. 9), Michigan (Jan. 19), Purdue (Jan. 22), Ohio State (Feb. 2), Indiana (Feb. 9), Penn State (Feb. 13) and Illinois (Feb. 22).

• The Huskers opened their nine-game Big Ten road schedule at Michigan State (Dec. 31), followed by road trips to Rutgers (Jan. 12), Maryland (Jan. 16), Wisconsin (Jan. 25), Minnesota (Jan. 30), Iowa (Feb. 6), Northwestern (Feb. 16), Ohio State (Feb. 19) and Indiana (Feb. 27).

- The Big Ten Tournament returns to Bankers Life Fieldhouse in Indianapolis (March 4-8), before the NCAA Tournament Selection Show reveals the 64-team field on March 16.
- NCAA first and second rounds will be held March 20-23, before Regionals are held in Dallas, Texas, Fort Wayne, Ind., Greenville, S.C., and Portland, Ore., March 27-30. The NCAA Women's Final Four will take place at the Smoothie King Center in New Orleans, April 3-5.

NEBRASKA'S HISTORY OF HOME SUCCESS

- Nebraska is 13-4 on its home court at Pinnacle Bank Arena in 2019-20.
- The Huskers went 15-4 at Pinnacle Bank Arena in 2015-16 after going 12-3 (13-3 at home) in 2014-15. The Huskers are 81-34 (.704) all-time at Pinnacle Bank Arena since the building opened for the 2013-14 campaign. The Big Red went 16-2 at home in 2013-14, suffering their only Big Ten loss to Purdue, 77-75, on Jan. 19, 2014. NU's 16 home wins in 2013-14 tied the school record for single-season home victories.
- The Huskers played the first regular-season game in arena history against USA Today No. 25 UCLA (Nov. 8, 2013) and rolled to a 77-49 win over the Bruins. NU's first win over an AP Top 25 team came with a 76-56 win over No. 24 Michigan State on Feb. 8, 2014. The Huskers added their first-ever win over an AP Top 10 team at the arena with a 94-74 victory over No. 8 Penn State on Feb. 24, 2014.
- NU won its first-ever Big Ten home game at Pinnacle Bank Arena with a 66-65 thriller over Northwestern Jan. 2, 2014, before an 88-85 win over Minnesota on Jan. 16, 2014, marked the first overtime game.
- NU suffered its first loss at the arena to Washington State (76-72) on Nov. 30, 2013.
- The Huskers are 43-3 all-time in home season openers, following a 68-46 win over Alabama A&M on Nov. 6, 2019. Nebraska had its streak of 12 consecutive season-opening wins snapped with an 83-77 loss to Missouri Valley Conference champion Drake on Nov. 7, 2018.
- The Huskers are 470-164 (.741) all-time at home. The Huskers have gone 206-68 (.752) over the last 17 seasons (including 2019-20), posting double-figure home victory totals 15 times.
- Nebraska played in the Devaney Center from 1976-77 through 2012-13, and added one appearance at Devaney against Utah on Nov. 23, 2014. The Huskers own a 389-130 record at the Devaney Center, including 146-88 (.624) mark in conference play.

NEBRASKA RANKS NEAR TOP IN ATTENDANCE

- Nebraska ranks No. 20 nationally in average home attendance (4,397 fans per game) through 17 regular-season games at Pinnacle Bank Arena in 2019-20. It marks an increase of 296 fans per game over the 2018-19 season, when the Huskers ranked No. 22 nationally (4,101).
- The Huskers have ranked among the top 25 nationally in attendance for 11 consecutive seasons.
- Nebraska has ranked among the top 25 nationally in average home attendance in each of its first seven seasons inside Pinnacle Bank Arena.
- The Huskers opened the 2019-20 season with 5,250 fans at Pinnacle Bank Arena for a Wednesday, noon tip against Alabama A&M on Nov. 6. Nebraska hosted a Life Skills Sportsmanship Pep Rally prior to the game, which included nearly 2,000 students and sponsors from 27 school districts around the Cornhusker State. It was the third-largest opening day crowd in Husker history.
- In 115 all-time home games at Pinnacle Bank Arena, the Huskers own an 81-34 record (.704 winning percentage) while averaging 5,058 fans per game (581,612 total fans/115 games).
- Nebraska attracted a Pinnacle Bank Arena non-conference record crowd of 9,750 to open its stay in the arena with a win over UCLA on Nov. 8, 2013.
- Nebraska set its all-time single-game record with a sellout crowd of 13,595 fans against Missouri at the Devaney Center on Feb. 27, 2010. NU drew 10 straight crowds of more than 10,000 fans at the Devaney Center in 2009-10.
- Nebraska produced its top attendance season in school history by ranking No. 7 nationally with a record 7,390 fans per game at the Bob Devaney Sports Center in 2009-10. The Huskers went 16-0 at the Devaney Center on their way to a perfect 29-0 record, a Big 12 title and a No. 1 seed in the NCAA Tournament.

NEBRASKA SETS PACE IN ALL-SPORT ATTENDANCE

- Nebraska Athletics has long been one of the biggest in-person attractions in all of college sports. Among its seven major team sports (football, men's and women's basketball, volleyball, women's soccer, baseball and softball) the Huskers ranked No. 3 in the nation in 2018-19 with nearly 1.235 million fans attending Nebraska events.
- In NCAA Division I women's attendance, combining the sports of women's basketball, volleyball, softball and soccer, Nebraska ranked No. 2 nationally last year with a combined 251,429 fans at its home events across those four sports. Only South Carolina attracted more fans (259,439) at home.
- In fall and winter sports combined (football, volleyball, soccer, men's and women's basketball) Nebraska also ranked No. 2 in the nation with 1.139 million fans, trailing only Tennessee's 1.159 million.
- Nebraska baseball ranked No. 9 in the nation in average home attendance (4,426), while football (89,034) and men's basketball (15,341) both ranked No. 10 nationally. The Nebraska wrestling team also ranked No. 11 in the country (2,231). Husker volleyball led the nation in average home attendance (8,205), while soccer ranked No. 21 (1,029) and women's basketball (4,101) ranked No. 22.

The Husker Sports Network and Nebraska women's basketball have teamed up for nearly two decades to take every game, home and away, around the world for free on Huskers.com.

In addition to carrying every women's basketball game free on Huskers.com, the Husker Sports Network flagship stations B107.3 FM-KBBK (Lincoln) and ESPN 590 AM-KXSP (Omaha) provide strong signals for Husker women's basketball. When a network conflict occurs in Omaha, the Huskers also could be heard on CD105.9 FM-KKCD. 880-AM-KRVN (Lexington) also provides a huge AM signal statewide in central Nebraska, while more than 20 stations carry the Husker Sports Network's women's basketball coverage across the state and the Midwest.

Inside Pinnacle Bank Arena, fans can access the direct radio call of the game at 87.7 FM.

NEBRASKA OVERTIME FACTS

- Nebraska is 23-25 all-time in overtime games, including 12-12 at home, 8-10 in true road games and 3-3 on neutral courts in overtime.
- The Huskers are 1-2 in overtime games in 2019-20 following an 80-74 OT loss to Ohio State (Feb. 2). It was Nebraska's second overtime loss in Big Ten play this season, joining a 78-70 OT loss at Michigan State (Dec. 31, 2019). The Huskers opened road action this season with a 90-85 OT win at Missouri (Nov. 10, 2019).
- The 2019-20 season marks the first time that Nebraska has played three overtime games in the same season since 2011-12 - NU's first season in the Big Ten. In 2011-12, the Huskers played a total of seven OT periods in those three games.
- Nebraska has never played four overtime games in the same season.
- Nebraska's lone overtime game of 2018-19 also came in the Huskers' first road game of the season, but NU suffered an 87-84 double-overtime loss at Washington State (Nov. 16, 2019). It marked the second straight season that Nebraska played a multi-overtime game (also at Drake, Dec. 9, 2017).
- The Huskers went 1-1 in overtime in 2017-18, including a 69-64 overtime loss to No. 23 Michigan at Pinnacle Bank Arena (Jan. 13). The Huskers won their first overtime game of 2017-18 with an 89-85 double-overtime win at Drake (Dec. 9).
- Nebraska was 1-1 in overtime in 2016-17, including a 76-74 win over Michigan State at Pinnacle Bank Arena to close the regular season (Feb. 26, 2017). The Huskers lost 79-69 in OT to Minnesota at the arena (Feb. 4, 2017).
- The Huskers are 3-5 in overtime games under Coach Amy Williams.
- Nebraska is 2-3 in overtime games at Pinnacle Bank Arena.
- Nebraska is 5-2 in multi-overtime games with its most recent loss coming in the 87-84 2OT setback at Washington State (Nov. 16, 2018) in Pullman. NU's only other loss in a multi-overtime game came to Purdue in the 2012 Big Ten Championship Game, 74-70 in double-overtime.
- The Huskers defeated Minnesota 88-85 in overtime on Jan. 16, 2014. It marked the first overtime game in the history of Pinnacle Bank Arena. Nebraska's first overtime game in the history of the Bob Devaney Sports Center also came against Minnesota - a 68-67 win for the Huskers on Dec. 30, 1977.
- The Huskers have played 15 all-time overtime games against Big Ten opponents and own a 5-10 record. NU is 4-7 against Big Ten opponents in OT since joining the conference in 2011-12.
- Nebraska played its fourth OT game in 73 meetings with Missouri in a 90-85 OT win at Mizzou Arena (Nov. 10, 2019). All four OT games against the Tigers were settled in a single overtime period.
- Nebraska's next most frequent overtime opponents are Big Ten foes Purdue, Minnesota and Wisconsin. The Huskers and Purdue have played three overtime games in 14 all-time meetings. NU's six total overtimes against Purdue are the most against any team in school history.
- The Huskers also have played three overtime games against Minnesota (24 games), including two of the five overtime games in Pinnacle Bank Arena history.
- In 18 all-time games with Wisconsin the Huskers have played three overtime contests.
- Nebraska has never played back-to-back overtime games at home. The Huskers have played back-to-back overtime games only once in school history, an 83-81 loss to Texas A&M in College Station on Dec. 30, 1985, before returning to Lincoln for an 80-75 win over Eastern Kentucky at the Devaney Center on Jan. 2, 1986.

NEBRASKA POSTS 15TH STRAIGHT PERFECT GSR

In the eyes of the NCAA's Division I Graduation Success Rate (GSR), the Husker women's basketball program has been perfect for 15 consecutive years. Nebraska is the only program among the 14 Big Ten Conference schools to accomplish the perfect score for 15 straight seasons.

The NCAA announced the release of its annual Graduation Success Rate report on Oct. 16, 2019, and Nebraska was a national leader in women's basketball for the 15th straight season, dating back to the initial public tracking of the GSR since 2004-05.

The Nebraska women's basketball program joins the Husker women's tennis and volleyball programs as Husker teams that have produced perfect 100 percent rates each of the last 15 years.

Nebraska was one of just 28 teams in the 64-team field of the 2018 NCAA Tournament to also boast a 100 percent Graduation Success Rate.

Overall, the Nebraska Athletic Department produced a record-high GSR for the seventh consecutive year, reaching 93 percent. A total of 10 Husker programs recorded perfect 100 percent GSR scores, including women's basketball, volleyball, softball, soccer, swimming and diving, rifle, men's and women's gymnastics and men's and women's tennis.

UW cut NU's lead to 35-30 before the Huskers responded with a 14-0 run, closing the third with six straight points before putting up the first eight points in the fourth to build a 21-point lead. Isabelle Bourne was big with 11 points and eight rebounds, while Sam Haiby added 11 points, seven assists and three steals.

Game Highlights: Nebraska trailed by just six with two seconds left in the third quarter, before a three-pointer by Indiana's Ali Patberg to end the period ignited a 16-0 run, as No. 22 Indiana ran away with an 81-53 win at Assembly Hall. Leigha Brown's layup with 33 seconds left in the third had NU within 47-41 and even with the Hoosiers in the quarter after trailing 33-27 at the half. But Patberg's three to close the quarter and her jumper just nine seconds into the fourth pushed the IU lead to 52-41. Back-to-back threes by Jaelynn Penn and Patberg and a traditional three-point play by Grace Berger extended the margin to 61-41 just 2:07 into the fourth quarter, and the Huskers could not recover. Patberg led all scorers with 26 points, including four three-pointers, while Berger added 15 points, seven rebounds and six assists for the Hoosiers. Brown led Nebraska with 22 points, while Hannah Whitish was the only other Husker to manage double figures with 11 points. Brown went 7-for-12 from the field, but the rest of the Huskers went just 10-for-49, as Nebraska suffered through a season-low 27.9 percent shooting from the field. Nebraska also dished out a season-low three assists.

SOPHOMORE (2018-19)

Kissinger led the Big Ten by tying the Nebraska season three-point field goal percentage record (.456, 62-136). Her 62 threes were the fifth-best total by a sophomore in Husker history.

She averaged 8.9 points, 3.2 rebounds and 1.2 assists. She started NU's first 24 games, before missing starts at No. 7 Maryland (Feb. 14) and No. 24 Michigan State (Feb. 17) while recovering from illness.

She came off the bench the final six games, producing double figures in three of those six games, including a 15-point effort on 5-of-10 three-point shooting in the Big Ten Tournament against Purdue (March 7). Her five threes were the third-best total by a Husker in Big Ten Tournament history.

She closed the regular season with 14 points on 4-of-5 three-point shooting in a road win at Penn State (March 2).

Kissinger had a record-setting effort against USC Upstate (Nov. 11) when she went a perfect 6-for-6 from three-point range on her way to a season-high 22 points.

She had 18 points in a win over Denver (Dec. 15), after getting 17 vs. San Jose State (Dec. 8).

Kissinger posted her second career double-double with 11 points and a career-high 11 rebounds in a win over KU (Dec. 5).

She notched 12 double-figure efforts on the year, including 15 points at Wisconsin (Jan. 27), 12 at Michigan (Feb. 7).

FRESHMAN (2017-18)

Kissinger averaged 10.0 points, 4.1 rebounds and 1.4 assists in 25 games with seven starts. She shot 40.8 percent from the field, including 36.2 percent from three-point range, while knocking down 71.7 percent of her free throws. She joined Kate Cain (9.9 ppg) as the first pair of Husker freshmen to both average 9.9 points per game since Debra Powell and Crystal Coleman in 1981-82.

Kissinger made an instant impact, averaging a team-best 14.0 points per game through NU's first seven contests before suffering a knee injury

JUNIOR (2019-20)

One of the nation's most accurate long-range shooters, Taylor Kissinger battled a pair of early season injuries before being forced out for the season prior to Nebraska's game with Oral Roberts (Dec. 14). Kissinger, who battled a hip injury throughout preseason and non-conference play, underwent season-ending hip surgery on Jan. 3.

Kissinger had four points and pulled down a team-high eight rebounds off the bench in Nebraska's season-opening win over Alabama A&M (Nov. 6), then entered the concussion protocol after a collision in practice (Nov. 8). She missed Nebraska's next four games. Prior to succumbing to the hip injury, Kissinger tied a career-high with six three-pointers to finish with a team-high 19 points in a win over Duke (Dec. 4). She also tied a career high with four assists.

She scored 11 points in a win over Sacred Heart (Nov. 30), after putting up eight points in a win over USC (Nov. 29). Kissinger returned to action against Creighton (Nov. 24), but had just one full practice leading up to the game.

Kissinger ranked No. 4 nationally and led the Big Ten with her .456 three-point percentage as a sophomore.

The 6-1 shooter from Minden, Neb., made 24 starts while enjoying her healthiest season since early in her high school career.

late in a one-point loss to Clemson (Nov. 30).

She missed six consecutive games for the Huskers to close non-conference play.

Kissinger produced 12 double-figure scoring efforts in 25 contests, including a career-high 25 points in a win over Arkansas (Nov. 16).

The daughter of Brian and Amy Kissinger, Taylor was born March 10, 1999. Her parents were both collegiate student-athletes, with Brian playing basketball and Amy playing volleyball at NCAA Division II Nebraska-Kearney. Kissinger's older twin sisters were both Division I guards. Brooke completed her playing career at Creighton in 2018-19, after spending her first two seasons at Illinois. Jamie completed her eligibility at San Diego in 2017-18. Taylor's brother Derek played college basketball at NAIA Hastings College.

A mathematics education major, Taylor is a five-time member of the Nebraska Scholar-Athlete Honor Roll. She also earned spots on the Tom Osborne Citizenship Team in 2018 and 2019.
