HUSKERS OPEN BIG TEN TOURNAMENT WITH MICHIGAN

• The Nebraska women's basketball team opens its stay at the 2020 Big Ten Tournament by taking on Michigan Thursday in Indianapolis.

• Tip-off between the No. 10 seed Huskers (17-12, 7-11 Big Ten) and the No. 7 seed Wolverines (19-10, 10-8 Big Ten) is set for 5:30 p.m. (CT) at Bankers Life Fieldhouse. It will be the fifth game of the tournament and the opening game of the second day's evening session. Both Nebraska and Michigan earned first-round byes in the 14-team tournament.

• Live television coverage will be provided by the Big Ten Network with Lisa Byington and Christy Winters Scott on the call while Vera Jones provides sideline reports.

• Live radio coverage of Thursday's game can be heard on B107.3 FM in Lincoln and CD 105.9 FM in Omaha beginning at 5:15 p.m. (CT). Stations across the state will also carry the broadcast on the Learfield IMG College Husker Sports Network. Free live audio can be found at Huskers.com, the Huskers App and on TuneIn.

• Sophomore Leigha Brown (Auburn, Ind.) leads the Huskers to her home state after earning Big Ten Sixth Player-of-the-Year honors from both the conference coaches and media. Nebraska's leading scorer at 14.2 points per game, Brown was also an honorable-mention All-Big Ten selection. She closed the regular season by earning a spot on the Big Ten Weekly Honor Roll after scoring 22 points at No. 22 Indiana in Bloomington on Feb. 27.

• Brown, who was a finalist for Indiana High School Player-of-the-Year honors as a senior at DeKalb High School in 2017-18, leads all Big Ten reserves and ranks 12th in the conference overall in scoring. No other non-starter in the Big Ten ranks among the league's top 25 in scoring.

• Kate Cain joined Brown as an honorable-mention All-Big Ten choice while claiming a spot on the Big Ten All-Defensive Team from both the coaches and league media. Cain, a 6-5 junior from Middletown, N.Y., leads the Big Ten with 98 blocks this season. Her 277 career blocks rank in the top 10 in Big Ten history and are a Nebraska school record. She needs two more blocks to match her Nebraska single-season record set with 100 in 2017-18, when she also earned Big Ten All-Defensive honors.

• Cain, who is averaging 9.2 points and 7.4 rebounds per game on the season, led the Big Ten in both blocks (3.6 bpg) and defensive rebounds (6.7 drpg) during regular-season conference play.

HUSKER NUGGETS

• The Big Ten features 11 teams in the top 64 of the Massey Ratings: Maryland (4), Northwestern (6), Indiana (11), Iowa (16), Ohio State (23), Michigan (28), Rutgers (30), Purdue (43), Michigan State (45), Nebraska (48), Minnesota (63).

• The Big Ten has 11 teams in the NCAA RPI Top 100: Maryland (3), Northwestern (7), Iowa (12), Indiana (15), Ohio State (22), Michigan (37), Rutgers (42), Purdue (46), Minnesota (86), Nebraska (88), Michigan State (92).

• Through 29 games, Nebraska is allowing an average of 65 points per game, after allowing 70.1 points per game last season. NU's 2018 NCAA Tournament team allowed 63.6.

 Opponents are shooting 37.1 percent from the field and 31.4 percent from three-point range against NU. Last year, Husker foes hit 41.1 percent, including 33.4 percent from three. In 2017-18, Nebraska led the Big Ten in field goal percentage defense (.371) and three-point field goal percentage defense (.299).

• Nebraska has held eight opponents to 55 points or less this season. Last year, NU held only two foes (Radford-39, Kansas-52) to 55 or less. NU held 11 opponents to 55 or less in 2017-18.

NU's bench has outscored opponent reserves in 24 of 29 games in 2019-20. The Husker bench has outscored opposing benches in 52 of the last 59 games, including double-digit edges 36 times.
This season, NU's bench has outscored opposing benches 738-467 (25.4-16.1 ppg).

 Nebraska has hit 10 or more threes 20 times in the last three seasons (91 games), including five times in the last 20 contests. Through the first 20 seasons with the three-point shot in women's basketball (1988-2007), Nebraska hit 10 threes in a game just six times (311 games).

SCOUTING THE MICHIGAN WOLVERINES

• Michigan enters the Big Ten Tournament with a 19-10 record including a 10-8 Big Ten mark. The Wolverines, who earned the No. 7 seed in the tournament, are hoping to solidify their grip on an NCAA Tournament bid and possibly improve their seeding in the Big Dance.

• Michigan had posted three straight wins before falling 78-60 to No. 22 Indiana on Senior Day in Ann Arbor on Sunday. The Maize and Blue own a 7-4 record since suffering a 74-71 loss to Nebraska in Lincoln on Jan. 19. That game marked the last for Wolverine senior forward Kayla Robbins, who suffered a knee injury early in the first half against the Cornhuskers. Robbins was averaging 12.2 points per game entering that contest.

• In the only meeting between Nebraska and Michigan this season, Husker senior Hannah Whitish scored a game-high 20 points by knocking down a season-high six threes. She also had a game-high five assists. Sam Haiby added 18 points and a trio of threes, while Nicea Eliely pitched in 11 points and three threes of her own. Nebraska went 12-for-24 from long range against Michigan, while the Wolverines answered with 8-for-14 three-point shooting. Hailey Brown led Michigan with 17 points, Naz Hillmon had 15 and Akienreh Johnson contributed 13 points and a game-high eight rebounds.

• Coach Kim Barnes Arico is in her eighth season leading Michigan and her 24th year as a head coach. The Wolverines finished 22-12 and 11-7 in the Big Ten last year, advancing to the second round of the 2019 NCAA Tournament.

• Michigan is led by sophomore forward Naz Hillmon, who is averaging team bests of 17.1 points and 8.6 rebounds per game. Hillmon was the 2019 Big Ten Sixth Player of the Year and a member of the Big Ten All-Freshman Team. She was a unanimous first-team All-Big Ten selection by the conference coaches and media this season and has averaged 19.1 points the last 11 games.

• Fellow sophomore Amy Dilk has been solid at the point for the Wolverines, averaging 11.7 points and 4.9 rebounds to go along with a team-best 4.4 assists. Dilk earned second-team All-Big Ten honors from league coaches this season, averaging 13.5 points since the injury to Robbins.

• Michigan's only active senior Akienreh Johnson is averaging 10.6 points and 6.4 rebounds. She is averaging 12.3 points and 7.9 boards since the first meeting with Nebraska.

• Junior Hailey Brown has pitched in 8.2 points and 3.1 rebounds this season. The 6-1 forward has averaged 11.8 points and 4.8 rebounds in four career meetings against Nebraska, including 8-for-15 three-point shooting. Brown did not play against Nebraska in the 2018 Big Ten Tournament.

• Freshman guard Maddie Nolan has stepped into the Michigan starting five since the injury to Robbins and an injury to Danielle Rauch that followed. The 5-9 Nolan is averaging 2.7 points and 1.9 rebounds on the season, including 7.2 points and 4.2 rebounds over the last five games.

• Freshman forward/center Izabel Varejão has played a significant role inside, averaging 5.4 points and 3.9 rebounds on the season, including 5.8 points and 4.4 boards since the injury to Robbins. Varejão had eight points in nine minutes in the first meeting at Nebraska.

• Michigan has gotten contributions off the bench from Michelle Sidor (3.6 ppg), Emily Kiser (3.3 ppg) and Priscilla Smeenge (1.7 ppg).

• Michigan is shooting 45 percent from the field and 32.4 percent from three and 68.7 percent from the free throw line this season. In the possession game, the Wolverines own a Big Ten-best plus-7.6 rebound margin but a minus-0.2 turnover margin.

NEBRASKA VS. MICHIGAN SERIES HISTORY

• Nebraska owns a 14-5 edge in the all-time series with Michigan, including a 74-71 win in the only meeting this season at Pinnacle Bank Arena in Lincoln (Jan. 19).

• The Huskers have won three of the last four meetings with the Wolverines, including a 61-54 victory over Michigan in the Big Ten Tournament quarterfinals on March 2, 2018, at Bankers Life Fieldhouse in Indianapolis - the only neutral site meeting between the two schools.

• Nebraska is 7-3 all-time against Michigan in Lincoln. The Huskers are 7-2 all-time against the Wolverines away from home, including 6-2 in Ann Arbor and 1-0 at the Big Ten Tournament.

• The series has been evenly matched as Big Ten foes, with Nebraska owning an 8-5 edge since joining the conference in 2011-12.

• Nebraska was 6-0 against Michigan as non-conference foes dating back to the first meeting between the two teams on Nov. 28, 1980 at the Bob Devaney Sports Center in Lincoln. The Huskers won 118-92 in the highest scoring game in Nebraska women's basketball history.

NEBRASKA STREAKS

• Kate Cain owns Nebraska's longest streak of consecutive starts (90).

- Nicea Eliely owns Nebraska's second-longest streak of starts (85).
- Nicea Eliely and Leigha Brown are the only Huskers to score in every game this season.
- Kate Cain is the only Husker to record at least one rebound in all 29 games this season.

• Eliely was the only Husker to score in all 30 games last season, and the only Husker to score in all of Nebraska's games against Big Ten Conference foes. She has scored in 63 consecutive games overall. She did not score in a win over Penn State on Feb. 22, 2018, the only time in the past three seasons (including 2019-20, 83 games) that Eliely was shut out.

• The Huskers have knocked down at least one three in 371 straight games dating back to a loss at UTEP on Dec. 20, 2008. Nebraska has hit at least two three-pointers in 250 consecutive games.

(4.0) Kate Cain and Kristian Hudson posted perfect 4.0 grade-point averages during the fall semester of 2019.

• (9) Sam Haiby needs nine points to reach 600 in her career.

• (115) Nicea Eliely is scheduled to make her 115th career start, which will move her into 10th in Nebraska history ahead of former WNBA All-Star Anna DeForge (Indiana Fever) on the Husker all-time list for starts.

BROWN NAMED BIG TEN SIXTH PLAYER OF THE YEAR

• Leigha Brown was named the Big Ten Sixth Player of the Year by both the conference coaches and media following the conclusion of the 2020 league regular season.

• Through 29 games, the 6-1 guard/forward from Auburn, Ind., leads the Huskers in scoring with 14.2 points per game, while adding 3.5 rebounds and 1.9 assists off the bench.

• Brown (12th) is the only non-starter among the top 25 scorers in the Big Ten.

• She leads the Huskers in free throws made (115) and attempted (150) while shooting 76.7 percent at the line. Brown is the first Husker guard to make 100 free throws in a season since 2013 WNBA first-round draft pick Lindsey Moore in 2012-13 (121-150, .807).

• Brown erupted for a season-high 25 points to go along with five rebounds and four assists in the win over Manhattan (Dec. 22). Brown tied her career high with four three-pointers against the Jaspers. She had 18 points in the first half.

• She went off for 24 points while grabbing five rebounds to play a major role in Nebraska's 90-85 OT win at Missouri (Nov. 10). She scored 18 points after halftime to help the Huskers, and she added a huge assist on Sam Haiby's gametying three-pointer to send the contest to overtime.

• Brown recorded her seventh 20-point effort of the season with 22 points at No. 22 Indiana to close the regular season (Feb. 27). She earned a spot on the Big Ten Weekly Honor Roll (March 2).

• She had a game-high 22 points, including 17 in the first half, in Nebraska's win over Illinois (Feb. 22). Brown tied a career high with four threes, while adding six rebounds and two assists.

• Brown scored 20 points, including eight in the fourth quarter, to help Nebraska rally from a 10-point deficit to a win at Wisconsin (Jan. 25).

- Brown had 20 points at Iowa (Feb. 6) and 20 more in a win over Penn State (Feb. 13).
- She owns 22 double-figure efforts on the year, including 14 games with 15 or more points.
- Brown led Nebraska with 19 points, including 15 in the second half, at No. 20 Maryland (Jan. 16).

• Brown added a game-high 16 points while tying her career high with five assists in a win over Morgan State (Nov. 14). She scored 16 more in a win over Southern (Nov. 20), while pitching in four rebounds and three assists, before contributing 16 again in NU's win over USC (Nov. 29).

• She scored 15 points against Wisconsin (Jan. 9) and a team-high 15 at Minnesota (Jan. 30). She added 15 points in Nebraska's win over Oral Roberts (Dec. 15).

• Brown scored a career-high 30 points in a win over Purdue in Lincoln (Feb. 10, 2019). She scored

22 in the second half to earn a spot on the Big Ten Weekly Honor Roll as a freshman (Feb. 11, 2019). Brown had 20 points at NCAA Elite Eight qualifier Iowa (Jan. 3, 2019), which followed a 19-point

effort in a win at Ohio State (Dec. 31, 2018). Those two performances earned Brown Big Ten Freshmanof-the-Week honors (Jan. 7, 2019).

Brown started Nebraska's final six games of 2018-19 after coming off the bench the first 24.
She owns 34 double-figure scoring efforts in her career (22, 2019-20; 12, 2018-19), including nine 20-point games.

CAIN EARNS SECOND SPOT ON ALL-DEFENSIVE TEAM

• The greatest shot-blocker in Nebraska history, Kate Cain earned a spot on the Big Ten All-Defensive Team for the second time in her career in 2020. She was also an honorablemention All-Big Ten selection.

• In Big Ten regular-season play, Cain led the conference in both blocks (3.6 bpg) and defensive rebounds (6.7 drpg).

• Cain, who has shattered the Nebraska career block record (277), joined the Big Ten's all-time top 10 in blocks with two blocks at Ohio State (Feb. 19).

• The 6-5 Cain owns 98 blocks on the year and needs two blocks to tie her Nebraska season record (100, 2017-18).

• Cain, who was among the 20 initial candidates for the 2020 Lisa Leslie Award, is averaging 9.2 points and 7.4 rebounds on the season.

• She owns five Big Ten double-doubles this season, including 12 points, 12 rebounds, seven blocks and a careerhigh four steals at No. 19 Northwestern (Feb. 16).

• Cain had 14 points, 13 rebounds and eight blocks against Ohio State (Feb. 2), before just missing a double-double with *(#31) Kate Cain, 6-5, Jr., Center* 13 points and nine boards at OSU (Feb. 19).

• She added five blocks each against both No. 20 Iowa and No. 18 Indiana before getting six blocks in a win over Penn State (Feb. 13).

• After going without a block for the only time this season at No. 20 Maryland (Jan. 16), Cain had multiple blocks in 11 consecutive games, including at least five blocks in six straight games from Minnesota (Jan. 30) to Northwestern (Feb. 16).

• Cain opened the 2019-20 season by recording eight blocks - the third-best total in school history - in a win over Alabama A&M (Nov. 6). She added 10 points and seven rebounds in the win.

• She posted a double-double with season highs of 19 points and 15 rebounds to go with six blocks in a win over No. 24 Minnesota (Jan. 4), earning a Big Ten Weekly Honor Roll spot (Jan. 6).

Cain got her first double-double with 16 points and 12 rebounds in the win over Iowa (Dec. 28).
She added her second double-double with 10 points, 14 rebounds and four blocks at Michigan State (Dec. 31).

• She had 18 points with seven boards and three blocks vs. Creighton (Nov. 24).

• Cain played a strong all-around game with 12 points, five rebounds, five blocks and two steals in a win over Duke (Dec. 4).

• She had 12 points, seven rebounds and five blocks to go with two steals at No. 20 Iowa (Feb. 6), before adding 12 points, four boards, five blocks and two steals against No. 18 Indiana (Feb. 9).

• Cain set the Nebraska season block record with 100 as a freshman. She finished No. 8 nationally in total blocks, and No. 7 in NCAA D-I and No. 1 in the Big Ten with 3.1 blocks per game in 2017-18.

• She set the Nebraska sophomore block record with 79 in 2018-19.

• Cain set the Husker single-game block record while also posting the first points (22), rebounds

(14) and blocked shots (11) triple-double in school history in a win over Florida Atlantic (Dec. 19, 2017).
She became just the sixth player in Big Ten Conference history to record 11 or more blocks and

just the 10th Big Ten player to notch double-digit blocks in a single game.

• Cain's 22 points against Florida Atlantic were also a career high, and her three assists against the Owls also tied a career best.

• She owns 40 double-figure scoring efforts, 15 double-figure rebounding games and one doubledigit block game in the first 91 games of her career. She has made a team-leading 90 straight starts.

• Cain owns 48 games (15, 2019-20; 17, 2018-19; 15, 2017-18) with three or more blocks in her career. She has recorded five or more blocks 16 times - Clemson (6, Nov. 30, 2017), Kansas (5, Dec. 6, 2017), FAU (11, Dec. 19, 2017), Northwestern (5, Jan. 7, 2018), Iowa (5, Jan. 16, 2018), Maryland (Jan. 8, 2019), Michigan State (7, Feb. 17, 2019), Alabama A&M (8, Nov. 6, 2019), Minnesota (6, Jan. 4), Minnesota (6, Jan. 30, 2020), Ohio State (8, Feb. 2, 2020), Iowa (5, Feb. 6, 2020), Indiana (5, Feb. 9, 2020), Penn State (Feb. 13, 2020) and Northwestern (7, Feb. 16, 2020).

• Cain was the only player to capture spots on both the Big Ten All-Freshman Team and Big Ten All-Defensive Team in 2017-18. Both five-player teams were chosen by the league coaches.

• She captured four Big Ten Freshman-of-the-Week awards (Nov. 13, Dec. 4, Dec. 11, Dec. 26) during the 2017-18 non-conference.

• Cain's 56.6 field goal percentage ranked as the second-best mark by a freshman in school history.

• Her 223 rebounds ranked fourth among freshmen in Husker history, and was the sixth NU freshman with 200 boards. She is the only Husker freshman to record 300 points, 200 rebounds and 100 blocks.

• A two-time All-Big Ten guard (2nd, 2018; HM, 2019) Hannah Whitish is averaging 9.0 points, 3.3 rebounds and 3.5 assists as a senior.

• Whitish became the first Husker in history to hit the combined career milestones of 1,000 points, 400 assists and 200 three-pointers, crossing the 400-assist plateau in the win over Duke.

• She ranks ninth in career points (1,228) and third in assists (465) among active Big Ten players.

• The 5-9 guard from Barneveld, Wis., heads to the Big Ten Tournament needing 15 points to tie Brooke Schwartz (1,243, 1997-2000) at No. 18 on the all-time Husker scoring list.

• Whitish poured in a season-high 20 points with a careerhigh-tying six threes in a win over Michigan (Jan. 19). She added five assists with no turnovers against the Wolverines.

• She scored 17 in a win over No. 24 Minnesota (Jan. 4) and added 13 at Minnesota (Jan. 30).

• Whitish produced a 16-point effort when she also tied a career high with four steals and drew a pair of charges against Ohio State (Feb. 2).

• She had 15 points on five threes in a win over Sacred Heart (Nov. 30). She earned a spot on the All-South Point Shootout

team for her performances in Las Vegas (Nov. 29-30).

- She managed 14 points and five assists while knocking down four threes at Iowa (Feb. 6).
- Whitish had 12 points on four threes and seven assists in a Senior Day win over Illinois (Feb. 22).
- Whitish opened the season with 12 points on 4-of-6 threes in a win over Alabama A&M (Nov. 6).
 She added 12 points on team highs of seven rebounds, five assists and a career-high-tying four

 sne added 12 points on team rights of seven rebounds, in steals in an overtime win at Missouri (Nov. 10).

• Whitish has scored in double figures 14 times this season.

• She has led Nebraska in assists 15 times this season and has five or more assists 11 times.

• Whitish has ascended to No. 3 on the Nebraska career three-point list with 258. She is nine threes away from Kiera Hardy at No. 2 (267, 2004-07).

• Whitish led the Huskers with 65 three-pointers in 2018-19, which was the third-best total by a junior in school history.

• She led the Huskers with 10.1 points and 4.3 assists per game last season.

• Whitish erupted for a 2018-19 season-high 28 points at Purdue (Jan. 31). She added a career-high 12 assists to notch her first career double-double. She also tied a career high with six threes.

• Whitish's 12 assists tied for the ninth-best total by a Husker in school history. Only three players in Nebraska history [Rachel Theriot (4), Kathy Hawkins (3), Stacy Imming (1)] have had more than 12 assists in a game.

• Whitish's career high of 29 points came as a sophomore in 2017-18 in back-to-back non-conference wins at Kansas and Drake.

• She owns a team-best 62 career double-figure scoring efforts (14, 2019-20; 17, 2018-19; 18, 2017-18; 13, 2016-17). She has six career 20-point games (1, 2016-17; 3, 2017-18; 1, 2018-19; 1, 2019-20).

• One of the top overall defenders in the Big Ten Conference, Nicea Eliely is showing her all-around game at a higher level in 2019-20.

• Nebraska's defensive MVP in both 2017 and 2019, Eliely led the Huskers with a career-high 54 steals in her third year as a starter in 2018-19. She ranked among the top five players in the Big Ten with 1.8 steals per game last season.

• She needs 20 steals to join the top 10 in Husker history in that category.

• With 114 career starts entering Thursday's game against Michigan, Eliely will take sole possession of 10th on the Nebraska career starts list with 115. She has started 85 consecutive games, which trails only Kate Cain's 90 straight starts among the Huskers.

• Eliely is one of only 12 players in Nebraska history to reach the combined career milestones of 900 points (941), 400 rebounds (460) and 200 assists (254).

• Through 29 games, Eliely is averaging 8.3 points, 4.2 rebounds, 2.4 assists and 1.2 steals.

• Eliely tied her career high with 19 points at Maryland (Jan. 16). She hit 6-of-10 shots from the field, including both of her three-point attempts and all five free throws.

• She set her career high with 19 points as a freshman against Cal (Dec. 4, 2016). She scored a season-high 18 points as a junior against No. 7 Maryland (Feb. 14, 2019).

• She owns 38 career double-figure scoring efforts, including 15 points, five rebounds, three assists and two steals against Purdue (Jan. 22).

 Sophomore Sam Haiby ranks second among the Huskers in scoring (10.0 ppg) and assists (3.3 apg) while leading Nebraska in steals (1.4 spg) on the season.

• Haiby erupted for a career-high 28 points on 11-of-19 shooting to power Nebraska to a 90-85 OT win at Missouri (Nov. 10). She tied a career high with three threes against the Tigers, including the game-tying triple with three seconds left to send the game to OT tied at 76. She scored NU's first eight points and added 18 points after halftime, including two free throws with 13.3 seconds left to seal the win.

• Haiby helped the Huskers go 2-0 in her first week as a starter by leading Nebraska with 18.0 points per game to earn a spot on the Big Ten Weekly Honor Roll (Nov. 11).

• She added her second 20-point game of the year and third of her career with 20 points and a career-high four steals in a win over Oral Roberts (Dec. 14). She earned her second Big Ten Weekly Honor Roll selection (Dec. 16) this season.

• Haiby had 19 points at Michigan State (Dec. 31), when she had 15 points on 6-of-6 shooting in the first half.

• Through 28 games as a starter this season, Veerbeek is averaging 7.5 points and 4.4 rebounds to go along with 1.0 assist per game. She is shooting 44.6 percent from the field, including 35.9 percent (22-60) from three-point range and 76 percent (38-50) from the free throw line.

GRADUATE TRANSFER HUDSON RETURNS AFTER REDSHIRT

• Nebraska graduate transfer Kristian Hudson returned to the court by scoring four points, grabbing three rebounds and dishing out an assist in NU's win over Alabama A&M (Nov. 6).

• Hudson is averaging 0.9 points and 0.7 rebounds this season, while playing in 18 games.

• Off the court, Hudson posted a 4.0 GPA in the fall of 2019 while pursuing her master's degree in applied science.

• She was recently chosen to participate in the WBCA's "So You Want To Be A Coach" program in conjunction with the national coaches convention and the NCAA Women's Final Four in New Orleans.

• She ignited the Huskers with a second-quarter threepointer - her first of the season - to spark a 14-5 Nebraska surge that put the Huskers in control the rest of the game in a 78-69 win over Iowa (Dec. 28).

• The 5-5 guard from Birmingham, Ala., averaged 2.4 points and 1.6 rebounds through Nebraska's first seven games last season before missing a win over Kansas (Dec. 5, 2019).

• She missed the final 23 games of 2018-19 with a foot injury that required surgery in December, 2018.

(#11) Kristian Hudson, 5-5, RSr., Guard

• Hudson was a three-year starter at Florida International before joining the Huskers late in the summer of 2018, following her graduation from FIU.

• She had 1,076 points, 372 rebounds, 383 assists and 107 steals in 89 games with 87 starts at FIU. She averaged 14.5 points and 4.5 rebounds per game as a senior in 2017-18.

• Hudson ranks 15th in points (1,109) and seventh in assists (400) among active Big Ten players.

HUSKERS ANNOUNCE KISSINGER OUT FOR SEASON

• Nebraska women's basketball coach Amy Williams announced on Dec. 14 that junior guard Taylor Kissinger would undergo hip surgery in early January and be out for the rest of the season. Kissinger underwent surgery on Friday, Jan. 3.

• Kissinger, who was bothered by the nagging injury for several months, averaged 8.4 points and 2.8 rebounds off the bench in five games this season. She missed four games in the concussion protocol after playing in the season-opening win over Alabama A&M (Nov. 6).

• In Nebraska's win over Duke in the Big Ten/ACC Challenge (Dec. 4), Kissinger led the Huskers with 19 points, including a career-high-matching six three-pointers. She also dished out four assists.

• Last season, Kissinger led the Big Ten and ranked No. 4 nationally in three-point field goal percentage (.456, 62-136).

• In her first two seasons, Kissinger averaged 9.4 points and 3.6 rebounds while competing in 55 games with 31 starts.

• Because she only played in five games this season, Kissinger is expected to regain her junior season of eligibility in 2020-21.

AUSTRALIAN BOURNE BRINGS STRONG IDENTITY

• Isabelle Bourne is averaging 5.6 points and 4.3 rebounds through the first 29 games of her college career, including career highs with 13 points, three blocks and two steals in a career-high 27 minutes against Ohio State (Feb. 2).

• She added 11 points and a career-high eight rebounds in a win over Wisconsin (Jan. 9), before adding her third doubledigit effort in Big Ten play with 11 points and four boards in a win over Penn State (Feb. 13).

• Bourne had nine points and a career-high-tying eight rebounds at Rutgers (Jan. 12).

• Bourne played big in Nebraska's big games early in her career, including then-career highs of eight points and seven rebounds in a Big Ten-opening win over Iowa (Dec. 28). She scored eight straight points in the second quarter while knocking down two threes to cap a 14-5 surge that put the Huskers in the lead the rest of the way.

 The 6-2 freshman from Canberra, Australia, had six points, seven rebounds in a win over Duke, after getting eight points and six boards in a win over USC (Nov. 29) at the South Point Shootout.

• She had seven points, including her first career three, to go along with three rebounds against Creighton (Nov. 24), and added seven points and four boards against Purdue (Jan. 22).

Bourne was a major factor in Australia's silver medal at the FIBA U19 World Cup, averaging 8.4

points, 5.1 rebounds and 1.1 assists in 23.1 minutes per game over seven contests for the Gems. • Australia went 5-2 at the World Cup with both losses to the USA U19 team, including an overtime setback in the gold medal game.





• One of the most talented young players in Australia, Bourne joined the Huskers in August of 2019 after helping the Gems to a silver medal at 2019 FIBA Under-19 World Cup in Bangkok, Thailand, July 20-28.

• The Australian U19 National Team entered the tournament ranked No. 7 in the world, but came up just short of the gold medal, falling 74-70 in overtime to the United States.

• Bourne averaged 8.4 points, 5.1 rebounds and 1.1 assists in 23.1 minutes for the Gems.

• In 2017, Bourne led Australia's U17 team to gold at the Oceania Championship in Guam by averaging 19 points, 9.8 rebounds and 2.6 assists to claim a spot on the all-tournament team.

• She was also the MVP of the 2017 FIBA Under-18 Asia Cup 3-on-3 tournament in Mongolia, leading her team to another gold medal. Bourne was also named to the Gems squad for the 2018 FIBA Under-18 Asian Championships.

•Bourne trained at the Australian Institute of Sport and Basketball Australia's Centre of Excellence. She was a developmental player in the University of Canberra Capitals program.

•Issie's sister, Callie, is a sophomore at Idaho State. Callie, a 5-9 guard, led ISU in scoring (12.7 ppg) and rebounding (6.8 rpg) to go along with 1.9 assists and 1.5 steals through 27 games this season for the Bengals. She had a career-high 26 points in a win at Weber State (Jan. 16). Last season, she averaged 4.1 points and 3.6 rebounds while starting 20 games. Their older sister, Emma, plays in the Canberra Capitals Academy.

BRADY MAKES IMPACT AFTER MISSING FIRST 10 GAMES

• Trinity Brady made her regular-season collegiate debut in Nebraska's non-conference finale against Manhattan (Dec. 22). Brady finished with two points, four rebounds, one assist and one block in 16 minutes off the bench.

• Brady put together the most productive game of her young career with seven points on 2-for-2 three-point shooting in just nine minutes off the bench at Rutgers (Jan. 12).

• Brady, who played in 17 straight games before sitting out the win over Illinois (Feb. 22) to rest a minor injury, added five points as part of a 10-0 Nebraska run midway through the second quarter against No. 18 Indiana (Feb. 9). The run helped the Huskers rally from a 25-point first-half deficit to tie the game in the fourth before losing in the closing seconds.

• She is averaging 1.6 points and 1.1 rebounds per game.

• She contributed three points, two assists and a steal in the Big Ten-opening win over Iowa (Dec. 28). Brady's first career three-pointer gave Nebraska a 30-27 second-quarter lead early in a 14-5 surge that put the Huskers in control the rest of the game.

• Brady added two points, two rebounds and two steals at Michigan State (Dec. 31). She ignited a 10-0 Husker run in the first quarter to help Nebraska maintain the lead for more than 30 minutes.

• Brady missed Nebraska's first 10 regular-season games after sustaining a concussion in the Huskers' exhibition win over Rogers State (Nov. 2). Brady took contact to her head and neck area late in the game against the Hillcats, but finished with eight points and eight rebounds in the game.

• The final piece of Nebraska's three-player recruiting class, Brady came to Nebraska after completing her senior season at Hamilton Heights Christian Academy in Chattanooga, Tenn. She was ranked as the No. 106 player overall in the 2019 class by Prospects Nation.

• The Lady Hawks finished the season No. 18 in the USA Today Super 25 rankings with a 22-3 overall record. Hamilton Heights Christian Academy fell to Riverdale Baptist in the NACA Championships.

• Brady competed for Lawrence North High School in Indianapolis her first three seasons.

• As a junior, Brady averaged 21.0 points, 8.5 rebounds and 4.0 assists to earn a spot on the IBCA Subway Supreme 15 Underclass All-State Team. She was also a member of the Indiana Junior All-Star Team and the Central Indiana Super Team.

• She led Lawrence North to a 20-4 record and produced several huge individual efforts as a junior in 2017-18, including a 38-point performance against Tindley, 30 points in a win over Pike and 28 points against nationally ranked North Central.

HELMS NOT AFRAID TO TAKE CHARGE

• Makenzie Helms has seen increased action in Big Ten play, competing in seven conference contests including each of the last six games. She has played in 12 games on the season.

• Over the last six games, Helms has eight of her 10 points on the season and six of her seven assists. She had career highs with three points against Indiana (Feb. 9) and Penn State (Feb. 13) and three assists against Indiana and Northwestern (Feb. 16).

 Helms made her greatest impact against the Hoosiers. After Nebraska fell behind 36-11, Helms entered in the second quarter and sparked a 10-0 Husker run. She converted the first three-point play of her career and dished out three assists in just seven total minutes. Nebraska rallied to tie the game midway through the fourth quarter before losing in the closing seconds to the Hoosiers.

 She made her collegiate debut by dishing out an assist in three minutes of action off the bench in Nebraska's seasonopening win over Alabama A&M (Nov. 6).

• She returned to action to play eight minutes, getting the first points (2) and rebounds (2) of her career in a win over Sacred Heart (Nov. 30) at the South Point Shootout in Las Vegas. Helms captured Gatorade Connecticut High School Player-

(#1) Makenzie Helms, 5-8, Fr., Guard

of-the-Year honors by averaging 26.5 points, 7.4 rebounds, 6.6 assists and 4.3 steals while leading the East Haven Yellowiackets to the Southern Connecticut Conference title in 2018-19.

• Helms, who was the conference player of the year, led East Haven to a 20-5 overall record and a spot in the Connecticut Class L state quarterfinals.

• She was the first commitment to Nebraska's 2018-19 class, making her intentions known in January of 2018. Her commitment followed a junior season in 2017-18 in which Helms averaged 17.5 points, 5.0 rebounds, 7.2 assists and 4.0 steals per game. East Haven finished No. 3 in the state of Connecticut with a 25-3 record in 2017-18. Helms earned first-team all-state honors and was a USA Today first-team All-Connecticut selection.

 She played her summer basketball for New Heights NYC, averaging 20 points, six rebounds, eight assists and five steals. ESPN ranked her as the No. 27 point guard in the class of 2019.

2019-20 SCHEDULE KEEPS HUSKERS HOME MORE

• Last season, Nebraska played just 14 regular-season games at home at Pinnacle Bank Arena, including just five non-conference contests. In 2019-20, the Huskers will play 17 regular-season home games in Lincoln, including eight non-conference games.

• As a team, the Huskers will shoot to "Bring IT" from start-to-finish, beginning with their 97-33 exhibition win over Rogers State at Pinnacle Bank Arena (Nov. 2). Rogers State provided Coach Williams with her first head coaching job, and the Oklahoma school currently features former Husker Jasmine Cincore as an assistant coach.

• The Big Red opened regular-season play against a former Husker when Coach Margaret Richards and Alabama A&M came to Lincoln. Richards, who played for coaches Paul Sanderford and Connie Yori at Nebraska as a four-vear letterwinner (2001-04). The Huskers battled to a 68-46 win over the Bulldogs in front of 5,250 fans on Wednesday (Nov. 6) at noon inside Pinnacle Bank Arena - the thirdlargest season-opening crowd in school history.

• The game with Alabama A&M was preceded by the Nebraska Life Skills Sportsmanship Pep Rally on the court at Pinnacle Bank Arena, which began at 9:30 a.m. and featured nearly 2,000 students and sponsors from 27 school districts across Nebraska.

• The Huskers made their first road trip a successful one by beating 2019 NCAA Tournament qualifier Missouri 90-85 in overtime at Mizzou Arena (Nov. 10).

• Nebraska returned home to tip a four-game stand featuring Morgan State (Nov. 14), SIUE (Nov. 17), Southern (Nov. 20) and Creighton (Nov. 24). The game with SIUE was part of Alumni Weekend, when the Huskers honored members of the 2010 Big 12 Champion and NCAA Sweet 16 team on the 10th anniversary of their undefeated regular season in 2009-10.

• The Huskers spent Thanksgiving in Las Vegas at the South Point Shootout, where they defeated USC (Nov. 29) and Sacred Heart (Nov. 30).

• Nebraska returned to Pinnacle Bank Arena to take on perennial power Duke in the Big Ten/ACC Challenge (Dec. 4), knocking off the Blue Devils, 83-79.

• Nebraska rolled to a 77-67 win over Oral Roberts (Dec. 14) before closing the non-conference season with a 71-51 win over Manhattan (Dec. 22).

• The Huskers closed a four-game home stand by opening Big Ten play with a 78-69 win at home over defending Big Ten Tournament champion and NCAA Elite Eight gualifier Iowa (Dec. 28).

• The game with lowa tipped off an 18-game conference schedule that included home battles with Minnesota (Jan. 4), Wisconsin (Jan. 9), Michigan (Jan. 19), Purdue (Jan. 22), Ohio State (Feb. 2), Indiana (Feb. 9), Penn State (Feb. 13) and Illinois (Feb. 22).

• The Huskers opened their nine-game Big Ten road schedule at Michigan State (Dec. 31), followed by road trips to Rutgers (Jan. 12), Maryland (Jan. 16), Wisconsin (Jan. 25), Minnesota (Jan. 30), Iowa (Feb. 6), Northwestern (Feb. 16), Ohio State (Feb. 19) and Indiana (Feb. 27).

• The Big Ten Tournament returns to Bankers Life Fieldhouse in Indianapolis (March 4-8), before the NCAA Tournament Selection Show reveals the 64-team field on March 16.

• NCAA first and second rounds will be held March 20-23, before Regionals are held in Dallas, Texas, Fort Wayne, Ind., Greenville, S.C., and Portland, Ore., March 27-30. The NCAA Women's Final Four will take place at the Smoothie King Center in New Orleans, April 3-5.

NEBRASKA'S HISTORY OF HOME SUCCESS

• Nebraska is 13-4 on its home court at Pinnacle Bank Arena in 2019-20.

• The Huskers went 15-4 at Pinnacle Bank Arena in 2015-16 after going 12-3 (13-3 at home) in 2014-15. The Huskers are 81-34 (.704) all-time at Pinnacle Bank Arena since the building opened for the 2013-14 campaign. The Big Red went 16-2 at home in 2013-14, suffering their only Big Ten loss to Purdue, 77-75, on Jan. 19, 2014. NU's 16 home wins in 2013-14 tied the school record for single-season home victories.

• The Huskers played the first regular-season game in arena history against USA Today No. 25 UCLA (Nov. 8, 2013) and rolled to a 77-49 win over the Bruins. NU's first win over an AP Top 25 team came with a 76-56 win over No. 24 Michigan State on Feb. 8, 2014. The Huskers added their first-ever win over an AP Top 10 team at the arena with a 94-74 victory over No. 8 Penn State on Feb. 24, 2014.

• NU won its first-ever Big Ten home game at Pinnacle Bank Arena with a 66-65 thriller over Northwestern Jan. 2, 2014, before an 88-85 win over Minnesota on Jan. 16, 2014, marked the first overtime game.

• NU suffered its first loss at the arena to Washington State (76-72) on Nov. 30, 2013.

• The Huskers are 43-3 all-time in home season openers, following a 68-46 win over Alabama A&M on Nov. 6, 2019. Nebraska had its streak of 12 consecutive season-opening wins snapped with an 83-77 loss to Missouri Valley Conference champion Drake on Nov. 7, 2018.

• The Huskers are 470-164 (.741) all-time at home. The Huskers have gone 206-68 (.752) over the last 17 seasons (including 2019-20), posting double-figure home victory totals 15 times.

• Nebraska played in the Devaney Center from 1976-77 through 2012-13, and added one appearance at Devaney against Utah on Nov. 23, 2014. The Huskers own a 389-130 record at the Devaney Center, including 146-88 (.624) mark in conference play.

• Nebraska ranks No. 20 nationally in average home attendance (4,397 fans per game) through 17 regular-season games at Pinnacle Bank Arena in 2019-20. It marks an increase of 296 fans per game over the 2018-19 season, when the Huskers ranked No. 22 nationally (4,101).

The Huskers have ranked among the top 25 nationally in attendance for 11 consecutive seasons.
Nebraska has ranked among the top 25 nationally in average home attendance in each of its first

• The Huskers opened the 2019-20 season with 5,250 fans at Pinnacle Bank Arena for a Wednesday, noon tip against Alabama A&M on Nov. 6. Nebraska hosted a Life Skills Sportsmanship Pep Rally prior to the game, which included nearly 2,000 students and sponsors from 27 school districts around the Cornhusker State. It was the third-largest opening day crowd in Husker history.

• In 115 all-time home games at Pinnacle Bank Arena, the Huskers own an 81-34 record (.704 winning percentage) while averaging 5,058 fans per game (581,612 total fans/115 games).

• Nebraska attracted a Pinnacle Bank Arena non-conference record crowd of 9,750 to open its stay in the arena with a win over UCLA on Nov. 8, 2013.

• Nebraska set its all-time single-game record with a sellout crowd of 13,595 fans against Missouri at the Devaney Center on Feb. 27, 2010. NU drew 10 straight crowds of more than 10,000 fans at the Devaney Center in 2009-10.

• Nebraska produced its top attendance season in school history by ranking No. 7 nationally with a record 7,390 fans per game at the Bob Devaney Sports Center in 2009-10. The Huskers went 16-0 at the Devaney Center on their way to a perfect 29-0 record, a Big 12 title and a No. 1 seed in the NCAA Tournament.

NEBRASKA SETS PACE IN ALL-SPORT ATTENDANCE

• Nebraska Athletics has long been one of the biggest in-person attractions in all of college sports. Among its seven major team sports (football, men's and women's basketball, volleyball, women's soccer, baseball and softball) the Huskers ranked No. 3 in the nation in 2018-19 with nearly 1.235 million fans attending Nebraska events.

• In NCAA Division I women's attendance, combining the sports of women's basketball, volleyball, softball and soccer, Nebraska ranked No. 2 nationally last year with a combined 251,429 fans at its home events across those four sports. Only South Carolina attracted more fans (259,439) at home.

• In fall and winter sports combined (football, volleyball, soccer, men's and women's basketball) Nebraska also ranked No. 2 in the nation with 1.139 million fans, trailing only Tennessee's 1.159 million.

• Nebraska baseball ranked No. 9 in the nation in average home attendance (4,426), while football (89,034) and men's basketball (15,341) both ranked No. 10 nationally. The Nebraska wrestling team also ranked No. 11 in the country (2,231). Husker volleyball led the nation in average home attendance (8,205), while soccer ranked No. 21 (1,029) and women's basketball (4,101) ranked No. 22.

The Husker Sports Network and Nebraska women's basketball have teamed up for nearly two decades to take every game, home and away, around the world for free on Huskers.com.

In addition to carrying every women's basketball game free on Huskers.com, the Husker Sports Network flagship stations B107.3 FM-KBBK (Lincoln) and ESPN 590 AM-KXSP (Omaha) provide strong signals for Husker women's basketball. When a network conflict occurs in Omaha, the Huskers also could be heard on CD105.9 FM-KKCD. 880-AM-KRVN (Lexington) also provides a huge AM signal statewide in central Nebraska, while more than 20 stations carry the Husker Sports Network's women's basketball coverage across the state and the Midwest.

Inside Pinnacle Bank Arena, fans can access the direct radio call of the game at 87.7 FM.

NEBRASKA OVERTIME FACTS

 Nebraska is 23-25 all-time in overtime games, including 12-12 at home, 8-10 in true road games and 3-3 on neutral courts in overtime.

• The Huskers are 1-2 in overtime games in 2019-20 following an 80-74 OT loss to Ohio State (Feb. 2). It was Nebraska's second overtime loss in Big Ten play this season, joining a 78-70 OT loss at Michigan State (Dec. 31, 2019). The Huskers opened road action this season with a 90-85 OT win at Missouri (Nov. 10, 2019).

• The 2019-20 season marks the first time that Nebraska has played three overtime games in the same season since 2011-12 - NU's first season in the Big Ten. In 2011-12, the Huskers played a total of seven OT periods in those three games.

• Nebraska has never played four overtime games in the same season.

• Nebraska's lone overtime game of 2018-19 also came in the Huskers' first road game of the season, but NU suffered an 87-84 double-overtime loss at Washington State (Nov. 16, 2019). It marked the second straight season that Nebraska played a multi-overtime game (also at Drake, Dec. 9, 2017).

• The Huskers went 1-1 in overtime in 2017-18, including a 69-64 overtime loss to No. 23 Michigan at Pinnacle Bank Arena (Jan. 13). The Huskers won their first overtime game of 2017-18 with an 89-85 double-overtime win at Drake (Dec. 9).

• Nebraska was 1-1 in overtime in 2016-17, including a 76-74 win over Michigan State at Pinnacle Bank Arena to close the regular season (Feb. 26, 2017). The Huskers lost 79-69 in OT to Minnesota at the arena (Feb. 4, 2017).

• The Huskers are 3-5 in overtime games under Coach Amy Williams.

Nebraska is 2-3 in overtime games at Pinnacle Bank Arena.

• Nebraska is 5-2 in multi-overtime games with its most recent loss coming in the 87-84 2OT setback at Washington State (Nov. 16, 2018) in Pullman. NU's only other loss in a multi-overtime game came to Purdue in the 2012 Big Ten Championship Game, 74-70 in double-overtime.

• The Huskers defeated Minnesota 88-85 in overtime on Jan. 16, 2014. It marked the first overtime game in the history of Pinnacle Bank Arena. Nebraska's first overtime game in the history of the Bob Devaney Sports Center also came against Minnesota - a 68-67 win for the Huskers on Dec. 30, 1977.

 The Huskers have played 15 all-time overtime games against Big Ten opponents and own a 5-10 record. NU is 4-7 against Big Ten opponents in OT since joining the conference in 2011-12.

• Nebraska played its fourth OT game in 73 meetings with Missouri in a 90-85 OT win at Mizzou Arena (Nov. 10, 2019). All four OT games against the Tigers were settled in a single overtime period.

 Nebraska's next most frequent overtime opponents are Big Ten foes Purdue, Minnesota and Wisconsin. The Huskers and Purdue have played three overtime games in 14 all-time meetings. NU's six total overtimes against Purdue are the most against any team in school history.

• The Huskers also have played three overtime games against Minnesota (24 games), including two of the five overtime games in Pinnacle Bank Arena history.

• In 18 all-time games with Wisconsin the Huskers have played three overtime contests.

• Nebraska has never played back-to-back overtime games at home. The Huskers have played back-to-back overtime games only once in school history, an 83-81 loss to Texas A&M in College Station on Dec. 30, 1985, before returning to Lincoln for an 80-75 win over Eastern Kentucky at the Devaney Center on Jan. 2, 1986.

NEBRASKA POSTS 15TH STRAIGHT PERFECT GSR

In the eyes of the NCAA's Division I Graduation Success Rate (GSR), the Husker women's basketball program has been perfect for 15 consecutive years. Nebraska is the only program among the 14 Big Ten Conference schools to accomplish the perfect score for 15 straight seasons.

The NCAA announced the release of its annual Graduation Success Rate report on Oct. 16, 2019, and Nebraska was a national leader in women's basketball for the 15th straight season, dating back to the initial public tracking of the GSR since 2004-05.

The Nebraska women's basketball program joins the Husker women's tennis and volleyball programs as Husker teams that have produced perfect 100 percent rates each of the last 15 years.

Nebraska was one of just 28 teams in the 64-team field of the 2018 NCAA Tournament to also boast a 100 percent Graduation Success Rate.

Overall, the Nebraska Athletic Department produced a record-high GSR for the seventh consecutive year, reaching 93 percent. A total of 10 Husker programs recorded perfect 100 percent GSR scores, including women's basketball, volleyball, softball, soccer, swimming and diving, rifle, men's and women's gymnastics and men's and women's tennis.

Omaha North grad Dariauna Lewis added eight points and a gamehigh nine rebounds for A&M, but Husker Kate Cain finished with 10 points, seven rebounds and eight blocks to help Nebraska reject any Bulldog upset hopes. Veerbeek and fellow sophomore Leigha Brown each scored 10 points for the Big Red.

Game Highlights: Nebraska played a strong allaround game and Hannah Whitish became the 33rd 1,000-point scorer in Husker history, as the Big Red rolled to a 73-39 win over defending SWAC champion Southern at Pinnacle Bank Arena. Whitish scored her 1,000th career point on a mid-range jumper near the left elbow midway through the first guarter to give Nebraska a 10-5 lead. That lead grew to 30-14 midway through the second quarter after Whitish buried a pair of three-pointers. She finished the night with eight points to go along with five rebounds and five assists. Leigha Brown led a balanced Big Red attack with a game-high 16 points, while Ashtyn Veerbeek pitched in 12 points and a game-high eight rebounds. Sam Haiby rounded out the Huskers in double figures with 10 points and four assists. All 10 Huskers who played in the game had at least two points and one rebound, and eight of the Huskers added an assist. Nebraska's defense all but shut down an experienced 2019 NCAA Tournament team, holding the Jaguars to 26.4 percent shooting from the field. NU also committed just one second-half turnover against a Southern club that prides itself on pressure defense.

As a team, Nebraska dished out 23 assists on 28 made baskets, while shooting 48.3 percent from the field, including 44.4 percent from three-point range. Nebraska handed Duke just its third loss in the Big Ten/ACC Challenge with two of those coming to the Huskers at Pinnacle Bank Arena. Leaonna Odom led Duke with 20 points, while Meila Goodchild added 15 points for the Blue Devils.

Game Highlights: Nebraska rallied from a 10-point fourth-quarter deficit to leave Wisconsin with a 72-71 win over the Badgers at the Kohl Center. The Huskers led 38-36 at halftime, but struggled to 3-for-17 shooting in the third quarter and headed to the fourth down 57-47 on the road. The Badgers maintained a 59-49 lead with eight minutes left before back-to-back three-point plays by Kate Cain and Leigha Brown sparked the Huskers. Brown, who led the Huskers with 20 points, added another three-point play later in the quarter and a pair of big free throws to finish with eight points in the decisive fourth quarter. Cain finished with 11 points, a game-high nine rebounds, three blocks and two steals. Ashtyn Veerbeek and Sam Haiby added 11 points each and made the game's biggest plays down the stretch. Just 20 seconds after Wisconsin's Imani Lewis hit her first three of the season to put the Badgers up 68-67, Veerbeek answered with her third three of the game to give Nebraska a 70-68 lead. With 7.7 seconds, Haiby grabbed her careerhigh fifth steal, then buried a pair of free throws two seconds later to seal NU's first Big Ten road win.

Game Highlights: In a back-and-fourth game that featured runs throughout, Minnesota made the game's last surge in the fourth guarter to claim a 67-61 victory over Nebraska at Williams Arena. The Huskers trailed early but closed the first quarter strong to take a 19-15 lead to the second. The teams were tied at 27 before the Huskers erupted on a 12-0 run over a three-minute stretch late in the second quarter. The Gophers ended the run with a last-second three by Masha Adashchyk to end the half and send the Huskers to the locker room with a 39-30 lead. But Minnesota opened the second half with 10 straight points to claim a 40-39 lead. Nebraska rebuilt a six-point lead at 55-49 midway through the fourth, but the Gophers outscored NU 18-6 down the stretch to split the season series with the Huskers. Turnovers plagued Nebraska in the second half, as the Huskers committed 13 miscues in the final 20 minutes. Minnesota capitalized by outscoring NU 14-0 in points off turnovers in the second half. Leigha Brown (15) and Hannah Whitish (13) led the Huskers on the night, but the duo combined for just five points in the second half. Kate Cain provided a bright spot for the Huskers with six blocked shots, becoming Nebraska's career leader in that category at the end of the night with 241 after 83 career games. She broke the previous mark of 238, set by Janet Smith (1979-82) over a span of 136 career games.

Game Highlights: Nebraska put together its best first half of the season, building a 49-34 halftime lead, but the Huskers struggled through their worst shooting half of the year to fall 80-74 in overtime to Ohio State at Pinnacle Bank Arena. After trailing 17-10 early, the Huskers erupted for 15 points in the final four minutes of the first quarter to take a 25-23 lead on a buzzer-beating three by Hannah Whitish to end their highest scoring first quarter of the year. They continued to surge in the second period, capped by a buzzer-beating layup from Kate Cain to end the half up 15. In the third guarter, NU went 1-for-12 from the field, including 0-for-7 from long range. In the fourth, the Huskers went just 3-for-16. Despite going 4-for-28 from the floor in the second half, Nebraska never trailed in the second half and Ohio State didn't tie it until Kierstan Bell's shot with one minute left to close the scoring in regulation tied at 68. Nebraska led 74-72 with just over a minute left in OT, but the Buckeyes closed the game on an 8-0 run in the final 1:06 to claim the victory. The 21 combined blocks (12, Nebraska; 9, Ohio State) were the most in a game in Husker history. The 113 combined rebounds were the fourth-most in Nebraska history, and the most since 1990.

Penn State trimmed the margin to 12 early in the period, before Isabelle Bourne scored seven of Nebraska's points in a 9-0 run over a two-minute span to take its biggest lead at 69-48. Bourne finished with 11 points as one of four Huskers in double figures. Leigha Brown led all scorers with 20 points to go along with six rebounds and three assists in a strong effort. Ashtyn Veerbeek pitched in 12 points, including 10 in the first half, while Sam Haiby added 10 points, four rebounds and four assists. Kate Cain continued her torrid blocked shot pace with six rejections as Nebraska matched its season high with 12 blocks.

Cain and the Huskers held Northwestern to just 28.8 percent shooting from the field, but the Wildcats produced 16 offensive rebounds and were plus-eight in turnovers on the day against the Big Red. Leigha Brown added 14 points off the bench for Nebraska, including the Huskers' final bucket with 2:45 left. Northwestern's Veronica Burton led all scorers with 21 points, including a 9-for-9 effort at the free throw line. Jordan Hamilton added 10 points off the bench for the Cats, including a big three with 1:45 left that tied the game at 56. Lindsey Pulliam closed the win with the final four points to finish with nine points and 10 rebounds, despite going 1-for-13 from the field on the afternoon. Nebraska trailed 16-11 late in the first quarter but took a 33-29 lead to halftime. The Husker lead grew to 38-29 early in the third quarter, before the Wildcats rallied to take a 49-48 lead midway through the fourth.

FRESHMAN (2019-20) Makenzie Helms made her collegiate debut and recorded an assist in Nebraska's seasonopening win over Alabama A&M (Nov. 6). She made her second appearance in a win over Morgan State (Nov. 14). She missed NU's games with SIUE and Southern while battling illness.

She recorded the first points and rebounds of her career in a win over Sacred Heart at the South Point Shootout (Nov. 30).

Helms made her first Big Ten appearance in a win over Wisconsin (Jan. 9).

She made her most significant contributions of the year with three points and three assists in seven minutes off the bench against No. 18 Indiana. Helms helped spark a 10-0 Nebraska run midway through the second quarter that helped rally the Huskers from a 25-point deficit to eventually tie the Hoosiers in the fourth quarter.

She followed with a career-high 12 minutes against Penn State, adding another three-point play in the first half to help rally the Huskers to a halftime lead. Helms added three assists in just over four minutes at No. 19 Northwestern (Feb. 16).

Helms was the 2019 Connecticut High School Player of the Year after averaging 26.5 points, 7.4 rebounds, 6.6 assists and 4.3 steals at East Haven High School.

She was limited during the summer while recovering from offseason surgery and did not compete in Nebraska's summer tour in Europe. However, she has progressed well since the start of the fall semester and could become a contributor for the Huskers as a freshman.

Nebraska Coach Amy Williams said the creative and competitive instincts of Helms will make her an asset for the Huskers in the future.

"We are excited to add Makenzie to the Husker women's basketball family," Williams said. "She has incredible court vision and creates offense for her teammates with tempo and passing ability. Combining that with her confident scoring mentality and her ability to score at all three levels, Makenzie is a great fit for the versatility we like in our system. She is an intense competitor, and we are eager to have her fighting for the Huskers."

BEFORE NEBRASKA

Helms captured Gatorade Connecticut High School Player-of-the-Year honors by averaging 26.5 points, 7.4 rebounds, 6.6 assists and 4.3 steals while leading the East Haven Yellowjackets to the Southern Connecticut Conference title.

Helms, who was the conference player of the year, led East Haven to a 20-5 overall record and a spot in the Connecticut Class L state quarterfinals.

She was the first commitment to Nebraska's 2018-19 class, making her intentions known in January of 2018. Her commitment followed a junior season in 2017-18 in which Helms averaged 17.5 points, 5.0 rebounds, 7.2 assists and 4.0 steals per game. East Haven finished No. 3 in the state of Connecticut with a 25-3 record in 2017-18. Helms earned first-team all-state honors and was a USA Today first-team All-Connecticut selection.

As a sophomore, Helms averaged 16.7 points, 5.0 rebounds, 6.0 assists and 4.0 steals at the Loomis Chaffee School. She earned All-New England accolades as both a freshman and sophomore.

FRESHMAN (2019-20)

Trinity Brady brings strength and versatility to Nebraska's backcourt as a freshman. One of the top high school players in Indiana in 2017-18, Brady completed her prep career at Hamilton Heights Christian Academy in Tennessee.

Brady missed Nebraska's first 10 games as part of the concussion protocol, before making her regular-season debut in the win over Manhattan (Dec. 22). She played in 17 consecutive games before missing the Illinois game (Feb. 22) while resting an injury.

Brady played strong defense while recording two points, four rebounds, an assist and a block in 16 minutes off the bench against the Jaspers. She hit the first three-pointer of her career and added two assists and her first career steal in the win over Iowa (Dec. 28). Brady's three gave Nebraska a 30-27 second-quarter lead, and the Huskers led the rest of the way.

She sparked a 10-0 first-quarter run at Michigan State with two points, two steals and two rebounds to help Nebraska lead for much of the game against the Spartans before falling in OT on New Year's Eve in East Lansing.

Brady scored a career-high seven points and knocked down a career-best two threes while adding two rebounds in nine minutes off the bench at Rutgers (Jan. 12).

She scored five points in a 10-0 secondquarter run that sparked Nebraska in a rally from a 25-point first-half deficit against No. 18 Indiana (Feb. 9). The Huskers eventually tied the game in the fourth quarter.

Brady scored eight points and had eight rebounds in an exhibition win over Rogers State (Nov. 2). An opponent fell on Brady inside the paint late in the game, contacting her head and shoulder area.

TRINITY BRADY

5-11 Freshman Guard Indianapolis, Indiana (Heritage Christian (Tenn.) Academy)

Nebraska Coach Amy Williams said Brady's skill, work ethic and high basketball IQ could make her a strong contributor to the future of the Husker program.

"Our coaching staff has been very impressed with Trinity's coachability and how quickly she picks things up," Williams said. "She is already one of our better help-defenders, and she is determined and focused. She brings a fun, upbeat personality to our team, and we need that energy."

BEFORE NEBRASKA

The final piece of Nebraska's three-player recruiting class, Brady came to Nebraska after completing her senior season at Hamilton Heights Christian Academy in Chattanooga, Tenn. She was ranked as the No. 106 player overall in the 2019 class by Prospects Nation.

The Lady Hawks finished the season No. 18 in the final USA Today Super 25 rankings with a 22-3 overall record. Hamilton Heights Christian Academy fell to Riverdale Baptist in the NACA Championships.

Brady competed for Lawrence North High School in Indianapolis her first three seasons.

As a junior, Brady averaged 21.0 points, 8.5 rebounds and 4.0 assists to earn a spot on the IBCA Subway Supreme 15 Underclass All-State Team. She was also a member of the Indiana Junior All-Star Team and the Central Indiana Super Team.

She led Lawrence North to a 20-4 record and produced several huge individual efforts as a junior in 2017-18, including a 38-point performance against Tindley, 30 points in a win over Pike and 28 points against nationally ranked North Central.

SENIOR (2019-20)

A two-time All-Big Ten selection, Hannah Whitish (pronounced WHITE-ish) ranks No. 19 in Nebraska history with 1,228 points.

The 5-9 guard from Barneveld, Wis., has climbed to No. 6 on NU's career assist chart (465). She is the first Husker in history to reach combined career milestones of 1,000 points, 400 assists and 200 three-pointers.

She became just the third Husker in history to reach 200 career threes with her first threepointer in a win at Missouri (Nov. 10), and has since moved her career total to 258.

Whitish is averaging 9.0 points, 3.3 rebounds and 3.5 assists. She had a season-high 20 points and a career-high-tying six threes in a win over Michigan (Jan. 19). She had 17 points in a win over No. 24 Minnesota (Jan. 4). She added 16 against Ohio State (Feb. 2) and tied a career high with four steals. Whitish had 12 points and a career-high four steals in a 90-85 OT win at Missouri.

JUNIOR (2018-19)

Whitish was honorable-mention All-Big Ten after leading the Huskers with 10.1 points and 4.3 assists per game. She added 2.9 rebounds and 1.0 steal. She knocked down a team-best 65 threes on the year to climb to third on Nebraska's career list with 195. She moved to No. 9 on NU's career assist chart with 363.

Whitish led the Huskers with 17 double-figure

scoring efforts in 2018-19, pushing her career total to 48. She scored a season-high 28 points to go along with a career-high 12 assists for her first career double-double in a win at Purdue (Jan. 31). She tied her career best with six threes.

Whitish had 19 in a win at Northwestern (Feb. 21), which followed 16 points in a win over No. 24 Michigan State (Feb. 17) and against Indiana (Feb. 3). She had 15 at No. 5 Louisville (Nov. 29) and scored 14 at No. 19 Iowa (Jan. 3). She also had 13 points at No. 24 Miami (Nov. 23) and at Michigan (Feb. 7).

She scored 12 points in four straight games (at Illinois, Jan. 17; No. 23 Minnesota, Jan. 20; Northwestern, Jan. 24; at Wisconsin, Jan. 27).

SOPHOMORE (2017-18)

Whitish earned second-team All-Big Ten honors and was named Nebraska's offensive MVP after leading the Huskers in scoring (12.6 ppg), assists (4.7 apg), steals (1.3 spg) and threepoint shooting (2.3 pg) in 2017-18. She was the only Husker to start all 32 games on the year.

Whitish was a major catalyst in Nebraska's huge team turnaround from a 7-22 season in 2016-17 to a 21-11 campaign in 2017-18. Nebraska's 14-game improvement tied for the largest increase in victories in NCAA Division I women's basketball in 2017-18.

Her 73 made threes marked the third-best total by a sophomore in school history.

Whitish dished out 150 assists, which tied for the fifth-best total by a sophomore in NU history. She ranked among Big Ten leaders with 4.7 assists per game, and she carried nearly a 2-to-1 assist to turnover ratio (150-77).

Whitish erupted for a career-high 29 points, including 25 in the second half, to lead Nebraska to a road win at Kansas (Dec. 6). She added 29 points, six rebounds and six assists in an 89-

SOPHOMORE (2019-20)

Sam Haiby (pronounced HY-bee) ranks second among the Huskers in scoring (10.0 ppg) and assists (3.3 apg) while leading Nebraska in steals (1.4 spg).

The 5-9 sophomore from Moorhead, Minn., had a career-high 28 points, including a career-high three threes, in a 90-85 OT win at Missouri (Nov. 10). Her third three came with three seconds left to send the game to overtime. She added the final field goal and two free throws with 13.3 seconds left in OT to seal the win.

Haiby produced her second 20-point game of the season with 20 points, five rebounds and four steals in a win over ORU (Dec. 14). She had 19 points, four rebounds, three assists and three steals at Michigan State (Dec. 31). Haiby pitched in 18 points and tied her career high with three threes in a win over Michigan (Jan. 19). She added 17 points, a career-high eight rebounds and three assists in a win over No. 24 Minnesota (Jan. 4). Haiby also had 17 points, seven rebounds and four assists against Creighton (Nov. 24). She had 11 points, a season-high seven assists and three steals in a win over Wisconsin (Jan. 9). She added 11 points, six rebounds and a career-high five steals in the sweep of the Badgers (Jan. 25).

FRESHMAN (2018-19)

Haiby provided sparks off the bench in all 30 games throughout the season. Nebraska's second-leading scorer, Haiby averaged 10.0 points, 3.0 rebounds and 2.6 assists.

She scored in double figures 15 times, including each of the final four games.

Haiby erupted for a career-high 20 points all after halftime - at Washington State (Nov. 16). She recorded her best Big Ten effort with 17

points against Indiana (Feb. 3) and had 17 more at Creighton (Dec. 2).

She was named the Big Ten Freshman of the Week after averaging 15.0 points on 10-of-15 shooting at Purdue (Jan. 31) and Indiana (Feb. 3).

She closed the regular season with a teamhigh 16 points in a win at Penn State (March 2), including 12 points in the fourth quarter. She also had 16 points in a win over No. 23 Minnesota (Jan. 20). She scored six in the fourth quarter including NU's final four points to seal the win.

Haiby added 16 more to go along with a career-high three steals at Arkansas (Dec. 18).

She scored 14 points at No. 24 Miami. She also led NU with 1'3 points against Drake (Nov. 7). She added 13 points with a career-high three threes in a win at Purdue (Jan. 31).

Haiby scored 12 points four times, including No. 5 Louisville (Nov. 29), Michigan (Dec. 28), No. 12 Iowa (Feb. 25) and against Purdue (March 7). She added 11 points at Northwestern (Feb. 21) and No. 7 Maryland (Feb. 14).

Haiby had a strong game with seven points and career highs of six rebounds, eight assists and a block against Denver (Dec. 15).

BEFORE NEBRASKA

Haiby was ranked as the No. 122 player in the country by Prospects Nation and the No. 125 player in the nation by Blue Star. She was ranked as the No. 28 guard in the country by ESPN.

She overcame a knee injury as a senior to average 25.1 points, 7.1 rebounds and 5.3 assists, including 46 points in a 54-49 win over White Bear Lake. It followed 45 points in a win over Brainerd. Haiby finished her high school career with more than 2,000 points. As a junior, she averaged 22.1 points, 7.6 rebounds, 4.4 assists and 4.1 steals, including 44 points against Fargo Shanley. She was a first-team Minnesota Class 4A pick for Coach Jed Carlson.

Nicea Eliely (pronounced ny-SEE-ah EE-lylee) has proven herself as one of the Big Ten's best defenders throughout her career.

The 6-1 senior from Colorado Springs, ranked among the top five players in the Big Ten in steals (1.8 spg), and her solid all-around game could place her in elite company in Husker history by the end of the season.

players in the Big Ten with 1.8 steals per game. Eliely, who joined Kate Cain as the only Huskers to start all 30 games in 2018-19, finished with 54 steals, the highest total by a Husker since All-American Lindsey Moore nabbed 60 (2012-13).

Eliely averaged 7.9 points while shooting career bests of 47.8 percent from the field and 80.7 percent from the free throw line. She added 3.8 rebounds and 2.1 assists per game.

She scored in double figures nine times, including a season-high 18 points at No. 7 Maryland (Feb. 14). She followed with 10 points and four steals in a win over No. 24 Michigan State (Feb. 17).

Eliely opened Big Ten play with 14 points in back-to-back wins over Michigan (Dec. 28) and at Ohio State (Dec. 31). She fueled fourthquarter comebacks in both games combining for 24 points in the final periods.

She added five of her career-high six steals in the fourth quarter of NU's comeback win over Minnesota (Jan. 20). She helped hold the Gophers without a field goal the final six minutes.

Kristian Hudson provides experience and depth at point guard as a graduate student in 2019-20. In her first year at Nebraska last season, Hudson appeared in seven games with one start before undergoing season-ending foot surgery in mid-December. She was granted a medical redshirt. She has scored 1,109 points in 114 career games in her college career.

Hudson opened her fifth collegiate season and second as a Husker with four points, three rebounds and an assist in 10 minutes off the bench in a win over Alabama A&M (Nov. 6).

She matched her season high with four points in a win over Sacred Heart (Nov. 30). She contributed a season-high three assists and a steal in a win over ORU (Dec. 14).

Hudson hit her first three-pointer of the season in the second quarter in NU's win over lowa (Dec. 28). Her shot gave Nebraska a 27-25 lead and sparked a 14-5 Husker surge.

SENIOR (2018-19 - MEDICAL REDSHIRT)

Hudson joined the Nebraska women's basketball team after earning her bachelor's degree from Florida International in just three years. The psychology major not only excelled in the classroom, she also starred on the court for FIU for three seasons.

Hudson appeared in Nebraska's first seven games of 2018-19, including a start in place of an injured Hannah Whitish in a win over USC Upstate (Nov. 11). Hudson had six points, three rebounds and three assists against the Spartans, after opening her Husker career with seven points and three assists against Drake (Nov. 7).

Hudson averaged 2.4 points, 1.6 rebounds and 1.1 assists through seven games, before

Hudson averaged 14.5 points, 4.5 rebounds and 4.7 assists as a junior for the Panthers in 2017-18. She was at her best during the final seven games of her junior season when she averaged 18.3 points, 4.3 rebounds, 6.0 assists and 1.7 steals in 37 minutes per game.

As a junior, Hudson produced 21 doublefigure scoring efforts in 29 games, including nine 20-plus scoring efforts. She recorded season highs with 27-point efforts against North Dakota State (Dec. 20) and Clemson (Dec. 21).

Her performance against Clemson included a career-high-tying 10 rebounds and 10-for-10 free throw shooting. Hudson also notched a double-double with 11 points and a career-highmatching 10 assists at Howard on Dec. 2, 2017.

As a sophomore, Hudson contributed 12.1 points, 4.6 rebounds and 4.3 assists per game, while improving her field goal percentage to .341 and her three-point field goal percentage to .303. She averaged 36.9 minutes per game, including a remarkable 35-point, eight-rebound, 10-assist effort while playing the full 55 minutes in an 88-87 3OT win over UTEP on Jan. 12, 2017.

Her 35-point, 10-assist outburst against Conference USA-rival UTEP was the first of backto-back double-doubles for Hudson, joining an 11-point, 10-rebound game that included six assists against UTSA on Jan. 14, 2017. Hudson finished with three 20-point scoring efforts as a sophomore among her 19 double-digit efforts.

JUNIOR (2019-20)

The greatest shot-blocker in Nebraska history, Kate Cain owns a school-record 277 career blocks. The 6-5 center from Middletown, N.Y., leads the Big Ten and ranks third in the NCAA with 3.4 blocks per game, while adding 9.2 points and a team-best 7.4 rebounds.

She owns five double-doubles this season, including season highs of 19 points and 15 rebounds to go with six blocks in a win over No. 24 Minnesota (Jan. 4). It followed 10 points and 14 rebounds at Michigan State (Dec. 31), after she opened Big Ten play with 16 points and 12 rebounds in the win over Iowa (Dec. 28). She added 14 points, 13 rebounds and eight blocks against Ohio State (Feb. 2), before going for 12 points, 12 boards, seven blocks and a careerhigh four steals at No. 19 Northwestern (Feb. 16). She owns 12 career double-doubles.

Cain had 15 points, eight rebounds and four blocks against ORU (Dec. 14), and added 13 points and eight boards vs. Manhattan (Dec. 22).

Cain had 18 points, seven rebounds and three blocks vs. Creighton (Nov. 24). She added 13 points, nine boards and two blocks at Ohio State (Feb. 19). In NU's win over Duke (Dec. 4),

she had 12 points, five rebounds, five blocks and two steals.

She opened the South Point Shootout with 10 points, five rebounds and her 200th career block in a win over USC (Nov. 29). She had eight blocks along with 10 points and seven boards in NU's win over Alabama A&M (Nov. 6).

SOPHOMORE (2018-19)

Cain set the Husker sophomore record with 79 blocks, while ranking second in the Big Ten and 13th nationally with 2.6 blocks per game.

Cain, who started all 30 games, averaged 7.5 points and 5.9 rebounds. Cain had 16 points and a season-high 17 rebounds in a win over San Jose State (Dec. 8). She had 16 points against USC Upstate (Nov. 11) and notched a double-double with 10 points and 10 boards at Washington State (Nov. 16). She had a seasonhigh seven blocks in a win over No. 24 Michigan State (Feb. 17).

FRESHMAN (2017-18)

Cain earned spots on the Big Ten All-Defensive and Big Ten All-Freshman teams by averaging 9.9 points and team bests of 7.0 rebounds and 3.1 blocks in 2017-18. She led the Big Ten and ranked among the top eight players nationally with a school-record 100 blocks on the season to help the Huskers lead the Big Ten in both field goal percentage defense and three-point field goal percentage defense.

She started NU's last 31 games and was a four-time Big Ten Freshman of the Week. She produced the first points (22), rebounds (14) and blocks (11) triple-double in school history against Florida Atlantic (Dec. 19).

She had five double-doubles, including 14 points and 20 rebounds in a win over Penn State (Feb. 22). Her 20 rebounds tied for sixth-best in Husker history, helping NU post a plus-29

Leigha Brown (pronounced LEE-uh) earned the Big Ten Sixth Player of the Year Award by averaging 14.2 points, 3.5 rebounds and 1.9 assists as a sophomore.

The 6-1 wing from Auburn, Ind., has been Nebraska's most consistent offensive threat in 2019-20. She has produced double figures 22 times, including seven 20-point games.

Brown erupted for a season-high 25 points and tied a career high with four threes in a win over Manhattan (Dec. 22). She pitched in five rebounds and four assists against the Jaspers.

She had 24 points and five rebounds in a 90-85 OT win at Missouri (Nov. 10). She scored 18 after halftime, including four in OT to help NU seal their first road win over an SEC school since the 2013 NCAA Tournament.

Brown scored 22 points, including 17 in the first half, in Nebraska's win over Illinois (Feb. 22). She added 22 more at No. 22 Indiana (Feb. 27).

She led NU with 20 points, including eight in the fourth quarter, to help rally the Huskers from a 10-point deficit to a road win at Wisconsin (Jan. 25). She added 20 points at Iowa (Feb. 6), and 20 more in a win over Penn State (Feb. 13). Brown had 19 at No. 20 Maryland (Jan. 16). She had 16 points and a career-high-tying five assists in a win over Morgan State (Nov. 14). She had 16 more in a win over Southern (Nov. 20) before getting 16 in a win over USC (Nov. 29). Brown had 15 points in wins over Wisconsin (Jan. 9) and ORU (Dec. 14), and 15 more at Minnesota (Jan. 30).

Brown worked her way into Nebraska's lineup for the final six games of her freshman season.

Brown scored 30 points in 25 minutes off the bench in a win over Purdue (Feb. 10) to earn a spot on the Big Ten Weekly Honor Roll. She started NU's next six games, with the first starts coming in place of an ill Taylor Kissinger against No. 7 Maryland (Feb. 14) and No. 24 Michigan State (Feb. 17).

For the season, Brown averaged 9.6 points, 2.6 rebounds and 1.5 assists, including 10.2 points, 3.0 rebounds and 1.6 assists in Big Ten play. She had 11 double-digit scoring efforts, including eight in Big Ten play.

JUNIOR (2019-20)

One of the nation's most accurate longrange shooters, Taylor Kissinger battled a pair of early season injuries before being forced out for the season prior to Nebraska's game with Oral Roberts (Dec. 14). Kissinger, who battled a hip injury throughout preseason and non-conference play, underwent season-ending hip surgery on Jan. 3.

Kissinger had four points and pulled down a team-high eight rebounds off the bench in Nebraska's season-opening win over Alabama A&M (Nov. 6), then entered the concussion protocol after a collision in practice (Nov. 8). She missed Nebraska's next four games. Prior to succumbing to the hip injury, Kissinger tied a career high with six three-pointers to finish with a team-high 19 points in a win over Duke (Dec. 4). She also tied a career high with four assists.

She scored 11 points in a win over over Sacred Heart (Nov. 30), after putting up eight points in a win over USC (Nov. 29). Kissinger returned to action against Creighton (Nov. 24), but had just one full practice leading up to the game.

Kissinger ranked No. 4 nationally and led the Big Ten with her .456 three-point percentage as a sophomore.

The 6-1 shooter from Minden, Neb., made 24 starts while enjoying her healthiest season since early in her high school career.

SOPHOMORE (2018-19)

Kissinger led the Big Ten by tying the Nebraska season three-point field goal percentage record (.456, 62-136). Her 62 threes were the fifth-best total by a sophomore in Husker history.

She averaged 8.9 points, 3.2 rebounds and 1.2 assists. She stared NU's first 24 games, before missing starts at No. 7 Maryland (Feb. 14) and No. 24 Michigan State (Feb. 17) while recovering from illness.

She came off the bench the final six games, producing double figures in three of those six games, including a 15-point effort on 5-of-10 three-point shooting in the Big Ten Tournament against Purdue (March 7). Her five threes were the third-best total by a Husker in Big Ten Tournament history.

She closed the regular season with 14 points on 4-of-5 three-point shooting in a road win at Penn State (March 2).

Kissinger had a record-setting effort against USC Upstate (Nov. 11) when she went a perfect 6-for-6 from three-point range on her way to a season-high 22 points.

She had 18 points in a win over Denver (Dec. 15), after getting 17 vs. San Jose State (Dec. 8).

Kissinger posted her second career doubledouble with 11 points and a career-high 11 rebounds in a win over KU (Dec. 5).

She notched 12 double-figure efforts on the year, including 15 points at Wisconsin (Jan. 27), 12 at Michigan (Feb. 7).

FRESHMAN (2017-18)

Kissinger averaged 10.0 points, 4.1 rebounds and 1.4 assists in 25 games with seven starts. She shot 40.8 percent from the field, including 36.2 percent from three-point range, while knocking down 71.7 percent of her free throws. She joined Kate Cain (9.9 ppg) as the first pair of Husker freshmen to both average 9.9 points per game since Debra Powell and Crystal Coleman in 1981-82.

Kissinger made an instant impact, averaging a team-best 14.0 points per game through NU's first seven contests before suffering a knee injury

FRESHMAN (2019-20)

Isabelle Bourne has made immediate contributions as a freshman. The 6-2 forward from Canberra, Australia, is averaging 5.6 points and 4.3 rebounds through 29 games.

Bourne produced career highs with 13 points, three blocks and two steals while playing a career-high 27 minutes against Ohio State (Feb. 2). She notched her first career double-digit scoring game with 11 points and a career-high eight rebounds in NU's win over Wisconsin (Jan. 9). She added her third double-digit game with 11 points and four rebounds in just 15 minutes in a win over Penn State (Feb. 13).

Bourne had nine points and a career-high matching eight boards at Rutgers (Jan. 12).

Bourne opened Big Ten play with eight points and seven rebounds to go with a career-high two three-pointers in a win over Iowa (Dec. 28).

She also played a strong role inside with six points, seven rebounds and two blocks in a win over Duke (Dec. 4). She added six points and seven more rebounds vs. Manhattan (Dec. 22).

Bourne had eight points, six rebounds and two assists in a win over USC (Nov. 29). She added eight points, five boards and two blocks in a win at Wisconsin (Jan. 25).

Bourne also had eight points, six rebounds and a block in a win over Morgan State (Nov. 14). She added seven points on 2-of-3 shooting including her first career three-pointer, while adding three boards vs. Creighton (Nov. 24).

She had five points and three rebounds in a win over Michigan (Jan. 19). Bourne added four points and five rebounds in a win over SIUE (Nov. 17), before getting four points, four boards, two assists and two steals against Southern (Nov. 20).

Bourne has extensive international experience and is coming off an impressive summer with the Australian U19 National Team. Bourne (who also

likes to be called "Issie" - sounds like IZZY) was a major factor in Australia's silver medal at the FIBA U19 World Cup, averaging 8.4 points, 5.1 rebounds and 1.1 assists in 23.1 minutes per game over seven contests for the Gems.

Australia went 5-2 at the World Cup with both losses to the USA U19 team, including an overtime setback in the gold medal game.

BEFORE NEBRASKA

One of the most talented young players in Australia, Bourne joined the Huskers in August of 2019 after helping the Gems to a silver medal at 2019 FIBA Under-19 World Cup in Bangkok, Thailand, July 20-28.

The Australian U19 National Team entered the tournament ranked No. 7 in the world, but came up just short of the gold medal, falling 74-70 in overtime to the United States.

In 2017, Bourne led Australia's U17 team to gold at the Oceania Championship in Guam by averaging 19 points, 9.8 rebounds and 2.6 assists to claim a spot on the all-tournament team. She was also the MVP of the 2017 FIBA Under-18 Asia Cup 3-on-3 tournament in Mongolia, leading her team to another gold medal. Bourne was also named to the Gems squad for the 2018 FIBA Under-18 Asian Championships.

Bourne trained at the Australian Institute of Sport and Basketball Australia's Centre of Excellence under Coach Kristen Veal. She was also a developmental player in the University of Canberra Capitals program.

As a sophomore, Mershon is averaging 1.5 points and 2.6 rebounds. She made her first start of the season in place of an injured Ashtyn Veerbeek in Nebraska's win over Manhattan (Dec. 22). She had four points, four rebounds, two assists and a steal against the Jaspers.

Mershon scored a season-high five points in a win over Illinois (Feb. 22). She grabbed a careerhigh nine rebounds and tied a career-high with two steals at Ohio State (Feb. 19).

She opened the season with four points, five rebounds and a block in 15 minutes off the bench in a win over Alabama A&M (Nov. 6). She added four rebounds and a block in a win at Missouri (Nov. 10), before getting two points, four rebounds and another block in a win over Morgan State (Nov. 14).

She had four points in a win over Sacred Heart (Nov. 30), before getting four more points in a win over Oral Roberts (Dec. 14). Mershon had six rebounds vs. Creighton (Nov. 24) and five boards in a win over No. 24 Minnesota (Jan. 4).

FRESHMAN (2018-19)

Mershon earned her way into the starting lineup for the final 14 games, after coming off the bench in her first 16 games as a true freshman.

A solid defender and good facilitator who rarely turns the ball over, Mershon averaged 3.2 points and 3.0 rebounds on the season.

Over the final seven games, Mershon averaged 4.4 points, 4.0 rebounds, 1.3 assists

and 1.1 steals, including a career-high-tying eight points in a win at Penn State (March 2). She added four rebounds, an assist, a block and two steals against the Lady Lions.

Mershon established her career high with eight points, while adding four boards off the bench against No. 9 Maryland (Jan. 8). She added seven points, three rebounds, two assists and a steal the next time out against Rutgers (Jan. 13), before making her first career start in a win at Illinois (Jan. 17). She scored five points against the Illini, including NU's final points at the free throw line.

Mershon grabbed a career-high seven rebounds off the bench in a win over Kansas (Dec. 5), before matching that total with seven boards against Northwestern (Jan. 24).

She established a career best with three assists in Nebraska's Big Ten-opening win over Michigan (Dec. 28), before matching that mark with three assists against No. 12 Iowa (Feb. 25).

She had two steals seven times, including at Arkansas (Dec. 18) when she also blocked a career-high two shots. Mershon played a careerhigh 30 minutes in a win over Purdue (Feb. 10).

In Big Ten play, Mershon hit 36.4 percent of her threes (8-22) and 75 percent (18-24) of her free throws, while averaging 3.6 points and 3.5 rebounds per game.
