HUSKERS BATTLE NO. 15 BUCKEYES SATURDAY ON BTN

• Nebraska opens a two-game Big Ten home stand by battling No. 15 Ohio State on Saturday. Tip-off between the Big Red (6-4, 4-3 Big Ten) and the unbeaten Buckeyes (7-0, 3-0 Big Ten) at Pinnacle Bank Arena is set for 4 p.m. (CT).

• The Big Ten Network will provide a live telecast with Larry Puntenev and Meghan McKeown on the call. Live radio will also be available through the Husker Sports Network with Matt Coatney and Jeff Griesch calling the action across the network stations, the Huskers App and on Huskers.com.

• Nebraska enjoyed the mid-week off after defeating its second top-25 opponent of the season with a 68-64 road win at No. 23 Michigan State last Sunday in East Lansing. The Huskers led by as many as 10 points in the first half before rallying from a five-point fourth-quarter deficit for a 68-64 victory over the Spartans.

• Sam Haiby earned her second straight appearance on the Big Ten Women's Basketball Weekly Honor Roll after notching her first career double-double with 11 points and a career-high 12 rebounds against the Spartans. It followed a 27-point, nine-rebound effort in a last-second loss at No. 15 Michigan (Jan. 7). Haiby enters the Ohio State game as Nebraska's leader in scoring (16.7 ppg), rebounding (7.8 rpg), assists (3.8 apg) and steals (1.3 spg).

• Sophomore Isabelle Bourne also has solidified herself as a rising star in the Big Ten. The 6-2 forward from Canberra, Australia led the Huskers with a game-high 18 points to go along with seven rebounds at Michigan State. In her first season as a starter, Bourne is averaging 14.0 points and 7.3 rebounds per game.

• Nebraska's team defensive efforts have been outstanding in recent weeks. The Huskers are 3-1 over the last four contests despite facing three ranked teams who all entered the contest averaging better than 80 points per game. None of the four opponents (No. 15 Northwestern, Rutgers, No. 15 Michigan, No. 23 Michigan State) scored 65 points against Nebraska's defense.

• The Huskers have held each of the four foes to their lowest point totals of the year.

• Ohio State, which will be NU's fourth Big Ten opponent this season to be ranked as the AP No. 15 team in the nation at game time, comes to Lincoln averaging 89.9 points per game and has not scored less than 78 points in any contest this season.

• Kate Cain, a 6-5 center from Middletown, N.Y., joins Haiby and Bourne as Nebraska's tri-captains in 2020-21, and plays a central role in the back of the Big Red defense. A three-time Lisa Leslie Award candidate, Cain notched four blocks against Northwestern to become just the sixth player in Big Ten history with 300 career blocked shots. Cain is averaging 2.5 blocks per game this season to go along with 8.0 points and 5.8 rebounds.

HUSKER NUGGETS

- Sam Haiby's 33-point effort against Illinois (Dec. 10) marked Nebraska's first 30-point game since Jan. 24, 2016 (Jessica Shepard, 35 at Michigan).
- Haiby's game-winning buzzer-beater in a 65-63 win over No. 15 Northwestern was the ESPN SportsCenter Play of the Day on New Year's Eve.
- Annika Stewart became just the fifth Husker in the last 20 seasons (2001-02) to score double figures in each of her first two games, joining All-Americans Jessica Shepard (2015-16), Jordan Hooper (2010-11) and Kelsey Griffin (2005-06).
- Nebraska led the Big Ten in blocked shots (6.3 bpg) in 2019-20, while shattering the school record with 188 blocks on the season.
- Kate Cain has produced the top three individual block totals in NU history the past three seasons (101, 2019-20; 100, 2017-18; 79, 2018-19).
- The Huskers have produced the top three blocked shot totals in school history in each of the last three seasons (188, 2019-20; 163, 2017-18; 156, 2018-19).
- NU's bench outscored opponent reserves in 25 of 30 games in 2019-20. The Husker bench had outscored opposing benches 55 times in 62 games, including double-digit edges 39 times, before entering the Illinois game (Dec. 10) with just eight available players.
- Nebraska had just seven players available at Indiana and Purdue and the Husker bench was outscored 62-9, including 32-0 at Purdue (Dec. 23).
- The bench got a bounce-back game by outscoring No. 15 Northwestern 16-0 (Dec. 31).
- In 2019-20, NU's bench outscored opposing benches 781-479 (26.0-16.0 ppg) an average of 10 points per game. Over the previous two seasons, Nebraska's bench outscored opponent reserves by an average of 28-16 per game.
- Nebraska has hit 10 or more threes 20 times in the last three-plus seasons (101 games), including five times in the last 30 contests. Through the first 20 seasons with the three-point shot in women's basketball (1988-2007), Nebraska hit 10 threes in a game just six times (312 games).

- Ashley Scoggin has stepped into a major role in her first year as a Husker. The 22-year-old redshirt sophomore has started all 10 games and is averaging 7.5 points while leading NU with 15 made three-pointers (.417). She posted career highs of 16 points against Purdue and Idaho State.

- Junior Bella Cravens has been a major contributor as a starter in Big Ten play. The 6-3 forward from Laie, Hawaii, is averaging 7.4 points and a team-best 9.1 rebounds in conference play, including a career-high-tying 16 rebounds in the win over Illinois. She added 13 boards in the win over Rutgers and had nine points, nine rebounds and three blocks in the win at No. 23 Michigan State.

SCOUTING THE OHIO STATE BUCKEYES

- No. 15 Ohio State carries an unbeaten record into Saturday's game at Pinnacle Bank Arena. The Buckeyes are 3-0 in Big Ten play following an 84-82 OT win over Iowa on Wednesday in Iowa City. The win snapped Iowa's 42-game home winning streak, which dated back to Nebraska's 92-74 win at Carver-Hawkeye Arena on Jan. 28, 2018.

- COVID-19 protocols have affected the Buckeye game schedule significantly this season, beginning with a cancellation against Akron (Nov. 25) and postponements for their first three Big Ten games (Iowa, Dec. 19; at Maryland, Dec. 23; Michigan State, Dec. 31).

- The Buckeyes return all five starters from the team that defeated Nebraska 80-74 in overtime last season at Pinnacle Bank Arena. Ohio State never led in regulation, but outscored the Huskers 15-9 in the fourth quarter and 12-6 in overtime to escape with the victory.

- Junior Dorka Juhasz, who has missed Ohio State's first three Big Ten games, was a first-team All-Big Ten selection last year. The 6-4 forward from Pecs, Hungary, is averaging 17.8 points and 10.5 rebounds per game early this season. She claimed a spot on the Big Ten All-Freshman team in 2018-19. Juhasz can stretch the floor inside-out, but has struggled outside early this season, hitting just 3-of-14 threes and 8-of-20 free throws. She had 12 points, 13 rebounds and five steals in last season's win over Nebraska in Lincoln (Feb. 2), before getting 16 points and 16 rebounds in a 65-52 Buckeye win over the Huskers in Columbus (Feb. 19).

- All five of the Buckeye starters are averaging double figures, led by guard Jacy Sheldon. The 5-10 sophomore from Dublin, Ohio is averaging a team-best 18.3 points including 19.7 in Big Ten play. She is the only Buckeye who has hit more than six three-pointers on the season (14-38), and she also ranks second on the team with 11 steals.

- Fellow sophomore Madison Greene, a 5-8 guard from Pickerington, Ohio, has added 14.3 points and a team-high 4.7 assists per game. She had 20 points and six steals at Iowa on Wednesday. Her steals total at Iowa matched her season total entering the game, and she now leads OSU with 12. Greene is 24-for-28 at the free throw line after going 1-for-5 at Iowa. She entered that game 23-for-23.

- Braxtin Miller is the lone senior in the OSU starting five. The 5-10 guard from Dayton is averaging 11.8 points, 3.2 rebounds and 3.5 assists after an 18-point effort at Iowa. She averaged 13.1 points in 62 games at Oklahoma State. Last season, she scored all of her game-high 17 points after halftime in Ohio State's 80-74 OT win at Nebraska (Feb. 2). She added 13 in OSU's win in Columbus (Feb. 19).

- Junior Aaliyah Patty joins Juhasz on the Buckeye starting front line. The 6-3 forward from Lombard, Ill., is averaging 11.7 points and 7.0 rebounds. Patty had 12 points and 12 rebounds in OSU's win last season in Lincoln, before adding 11 points and seven boards to complete the sweep.

- Sophomore Rebeka Mikulasikova averaged 10 points in Ohio State's wins over Nebraska last year. The 6-4 forward from Nitra, Slovakia, missed Ohio State's first two Big Ten games this season but is averaging 6.3 points and 2.8 rebounds off the bench. She played 12 minutes at Iowa.

- The rest of the Ohio State roster will be new faces against the Huskers this season, beginning with graduate transfer Tanaya Beacham, who adds more size and experience inside. Beacham has averaged 4.5 points and 5.5 rebounds per game in six contests, including three starts in place of Juhasz to open Big Ten play. Beacham averaged 10.8 points and 5.5 rebounds at Toledo last season.

- Freshman Kateri Poole is averaging 7.3 points and has hit 5-of-12 three-pointers. Rikki Harris, a redshirt freshman for the Buckeyes, has added 5.6 points on 5-of-13 three-point shooting. Freshman Gabby Hutcherson, a 6-2 forward, has hit 6-of-16 threes to average 5.1 points per game.

- Ohio State owns one of the Big Ten's most explosive offenses, averaging 89.9 points per game, while shooting 50.4 percent from the field, 34 percent from three-point range and 70.9 percent from the free throw line. The Buckeyes carry a plus-3.6 rebound margin and a plus-6.4 turnover margin.

- OSU is No. 9 in the NET rankings but has not played an AP ranked opponent yet this season.

NEBRASKA VS. OHIO STATE SERIES HISTORY

- Saturday's game will mark the 20th all-time meeting between Nebraska and Ohio State, with the Buckeyes holding an 11-8 edge in the series after getting a pair of wins last season.

- OSU has won seven of the last eight, including an 80-74 OT win in Lincoln on Feb. 2, 2020.

- Nebraska and Ohio State met five times before the Huskers joined the Big Ten, with the Buckeyes owning a 3-2 edge as non-conference opponents. NU won the first-ever meeting between the two teams, a 63-54 Husker win in Columbus on Dec. 2, 1990. The Huskers also defeated OSU 60-55 at the Devaney Center in Lincoln on Dec. 12, 2003, in the second meeting.

- NU dropped four straight games to Ohio State, including three in Columbus, capped by an 82-68 loss at Value City Arena on Jan. 19, 2012 - the first meeting between the two teams as Big Ten foes, before uncorking five consecutive series wins from Feb. 26, 2012 through Feb. 20, 2014.

- Ohio State leads the series 9-6 as Big Ten foes. Nebraska is 4-6 all-time against OSU in Columbus, including a 78-69 win over the Buckeyes on Dec. 31, 2018 - NU's most recent win in the series.

- Nebraska won the only meeting in the series at a neutral site, a 77-62 victory over the Buckeyes at the Big Ten Tournament in Indianapolis (March 3, 2012).

- **Series History (OSU leads, 11-8):** Ohio State leads 5-3 in Lincoln; Ohio State leads 6-4 in Columbus; Nebraska leads 1-0 at the Big Ten Tournament.



CAIN NAMED LISA LESLIE AWARD CANDIDATE

• Kate Cain was named to the Lisa Leslie Award Watch List for the third consecutive year, when the candidates for the national center-of-the-year honor were announced by the Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame and the Women’s Basketball Coaches Association on Friday, Nov. 13.

• Cain, a 6-5 center from Middletown, N.Y., and a Nebraska graduate student, has started 101 consecutive games as a Husker.

• As a junior, Cain earned her second appearance on the Big Ten All-Defensive Team by notching a school-record 101 blocked shots while ranking third in the NCAA in blocks per game. She added 9.3 points and 7.2 rebounds while shooting 53.9 percent from the field and 68.3 percent from the free throw line on her way to earning honorable-mention All-Big Ten accolades.

• Cain led the Big Ten in both blocks (3.6 bpg) and defensive rebounds (6.7 drpg) in conference play, while moving into the Big Ten’s all-time top-10 list.

• Nebraska’s career blocked shot record holder with 305, Cain opened 2020-21 with her 13th career double-double with 14 points, 11 rebounds and six blocks in a win over Oral Roberts.

• Cain claimed her first spot on the Big Ten All-Defensive Team as a freshman in 2017-18 when she posted a then-school record with 100 blocks while averaging 9.9 points and 7.0 rebounds to help the Huskers to the 2018 NCAA Tournament.

• She also was a member of the Big Ten All-Freshman Team after being named the Big Ten Freshman of the Week on four occasions. Along the way, she produced the first points-rebounds-blocks triple-double in Husker history with 22 points, 14 rebounds and 11 blocked shots in a win over Florida Atlantic (Dec. 19, 2017).

• Cain, who earned mention on the Lisa Leslie Award Watch List prior to the 2018-19 and 2019-20 seasons, was recently projected as a middle second-round pick in the 2021 WNBA Draft.

• A CoSIDA Academic All-America candidate, Cain is a two-time Big Ten Distinguished Scholar and Academic All-Big Ten choice who earned her bachelor’s degree as a management major in May of 2020, just three years into her Nebraska career.

HUSKER HISTORY OF HOME-OPENING SUCCESS

• Nebraska's season opener against Oral Roberts (Dec. 4) marked the latest home-opening game on the calendar in school history. NU's previous latest home tip came with a 61-59 win over Kearney State on Dec. 2, 1976.

• The only other December home opener in school history came with an 86-79 win over Arizona State at the Devaney Center on Dec. 1, 1992.

• Nebraska owns a history of season-opening success on the Huskers' home court. NU improved to 44-3 in home season openers with the 90-61 victory over Oral Roberts on Dec. 4, 2020.

• NU is 7-1 at Pinnacle Bank Arena in season openers, including a win over Alabama A&M last year. The lone loss came on Nov. 7, 2018, with an 83-77 loss to Drake. In the first regular-season game in the history of Pinnacle Bank Arena, Nebraska powered its way to a 77-49 win over UCLA on Nov. 8, 2013.

• Nebraska's only season-opening home losses have come to Drake (2018), South Dakota State (Nov. 19, 2005) and Kansas (Nov. 21, 1980).

• Nebraska has been strong in its first four home games every season. In fact, NU is 163-25 (.867) over 47 seasons in its first four home contests, including 40-7 in Game No. 2.

• Nebraska is 38-9 in Game No. 3 and 41-6 in Game No. 4.

HUSKERS WORKING TO HANDLE CURVEBALLS

• In the midst of the COVID-19 pandemic, Nebraska Coach Amy Williams has put part of the focus this season on helping the Huskers expect the unexpected. An avid baseball fan whose basketball family is also a baseball/softball family, Williams likes to refer to the ability to handle the curveball.

• Nebraska's curveballs early in the season have been far more extensive than just dealing with complications to the season caused by the coronavirus.

• Senior guard Taylor Kissinger chose to end her playing career after undergoing hip surgery midway through last season. Kissinger made her announcement Sept. 15.

• Texas Tech transfer Nailah Dillard began experiencing pain in her hip in late summer and was limited during the fall. The sophomore underwent season-ending surgery on Dec. 15, and she will be out for the 2020-21 season.

• Sophomore guard Trinity Brady (Indianapolis) suffered a lower leg injury in the final minute of the win over Idaho State (Dec. 6). Brady did not play against Illinois or Creighton and is listed as day-to-day. Kissinger, Dillard and Brady all played the wing position for Nebraska.

• The curveballs kept coming with a lower leg injury to Ruby Porter in the first half at Creighton (Dec. 14) that knocked her out of the game, forcing the Huskers to finish with just seven players, including four posts and three guards, including preferred walk-on Whitney Brown. Porter also missed Nebraska's losses at No. 15 Indiana (Dec. 20) and at Purdue (Dec. 23).

• Prior to the recent stretch of injuries, the Huskers had to battle illnesses and injuries that kept multiple players off the practice court in preseason practice.

• All of those challenges mixed together prevented Nebraska from having 10 players fully participating in practice from Oct. 14 to Nov. 29. The first time the Huskers had 10 players on the court together in a full practice setting came on Monday, Nov. 30, just four days ahead of their season opener with Oral Roberts (Dec. 4).

• MiCole Cayton continues to gain strength in her leg and has impressed in practice drills but has not been cleared for full-court practice with contact.

HAIBY CONTINUING GROWTH IN BACKCOURT

• Nebraska's top returning player in scoring (10.0 ppg), assists (3.3 apg) and steals (1.5 spg), Sam Haiby returns for her third season in the program and second year as a starter in 2020-21.

• The junior from Moorhead, Minn., leads the Huskers in scoring (16.7 ppg), rebounding (7.8 rpg), assists (3.8 apg) and steals (1.3 spg) through 10 games this season.

• Haiby was named the College Sports Madness Big Ten Player of the Week (Jan. 4) after leading Nebraska to a pair of wins over No. 15 Northwestern (Dec. 31) and Rutgers (Jan. 3). She averaged 17.5 points, 6.5 rebounds and 5.0 assists in the low-scoring, one-possession wins.

• Her game-winning put-back at the buzzer gave the Huskers a 65-63 win over No. 15 Northwestern and was ESPN SportsCenter's Top Play (Dec. 31), capping a 19-point, eight-rebound, five-assist effort against the previously unbeaten and defending Big Ten champion Wildcats.

• She closed the week with 16 points, five rebounds and five assists in the win over Rutgers, including six straight points to cap a 9-0 Husker run that turned a 44-40 fourth-quarter deficit into a 49-44 lead. Haiby was also instrumental in a Big Red defensive effort that held the Scarlet Knights 36 points below their season scoring average in NU's 53-50 win.

• Her efforts earned her a second spot this season on the Big Ten Weekly Honor Roll (Jan. 4) and the fourth of her career.

- Haiby earned a third spot this season on the Weekly Honor Roll (Jan. 11) after recording her first career double-double with 11 points and a career-high 12 rebounds in a road win at No. 23 Michigan State (Jan. 10). She also had 27 points and nine boards in a 64-62 loss at No. 15 Michigan to average 19.0 points, 10.5 rebounds and 3.5 assists for the week.

- Haiby produced the best performance of her career with a career-high 33 points to go along with nine rebounds, four assists, two steals and a blocked shot in Nebraska's 78-72 Big Ten-opening win over Illinois (Dec. 10). Haiby scored double figures in each of the final three quarters against the Fighting Illini. She had 21 points in the second half and went 11-for-11 at the free throw after halftime on her way to a career-best night at the line (14-16).

- Haiby was named to the Big Ten Weekly Honor Roll for the first time this season (Dec. 14), following her effort against Illinois.

- Haiby added a game-high 18 points to go along with eight rebounds at Creighton (Dec. 14).

- She contributed 16 points at Purdue and is averaging a team-best 18.4 points through seven Big Ten games.

- She opened the season with a strong all-around effort with 14 points, eight rebounds and seven assists in a win over Oral Roberts (Dec. 4).

- She followed with six points and a career-high 11 boards in a win over Idaho State (Dec. 6).

- Haiby had a 2019-20 season-high 28 points on 11-of-19 shooting to power Nebraska to a 90-85 OT win at Missouri (Nov. 10, 2019). She tied a career high with three threes against the Tigers, including the game-tying triple with three seconds left to send the game to OT tied at 76. She scored NU's first eight points and added 18 points after halftime, including two free throws with 13.3 seconds left to seal the win.

- Haiby earned a spot on the Big Ten Weekly Honor Roll (Nov. 11, 2019) for averaging 18.0 points in Nebraska's first two games in 2019-20.

- She added her second 20-point game of the year and third of her career with 20 points and a career-high four steals in a win over Oral Roberts (Dec. 14, 2019). She earned her second Big Ten Weekly Honor Roll selection (Dec. 16).

- Haiby has produced double-figure points 39 times as a Husker (7, 2020-21), including five 20-point games. She had 16 double-figure efforts in 2019-20 and 15 as a freshman in 2018-19.

- Haiby finished her freshman season as Nebraska's second-leading scorer with 10.0 points per game while coming off the bench in all 30 contests in 2018-19.

- Haiby scored 20 points at Washington State as a freshman with all 20 coming after halftime.

- She was named the Big Ten Freshman of the Week (Feb. 4, 2019) after scoring 17 points against Indiana (Feb. 3, 2019), which followed 13 points in a road win at Purdue (Jan. 31, 2019).

BOURNE BACK TO ADD LEADERSHIP ON FRONT LINE

- One of three captains on the 2020-21 Huskers, Isabelle Bourne joins Kate Cain and Sam Haiby as leaders for Nebraska in 2020-21.

- Bourne is off to a strong start to her second season, averaging 14.6 points and 7.3 rebounds. She produced back-to-back double-doubles with 11 points and a career-high 12 rebounds in a win over Rutgers (Jan. 3) after getting 11 points and a then-career-high 10 boards in a win over No. 15 Northwestern (Dec. 31). They were the first two double-doubles of Bourne's career.

- She posted career highs of 22 points and four assists at Purdue (Dec. 23).

- Bourne opened Big Ten play with a then-career-high 21 points to go along with eight boards in a win over Illinois (Dec. 10).

- She added a game-high 18 points to go along with seven rebounds and three assists in Nebraska's road win at No. 23 Michigan State (Jan. 10).

- Bourne added 16 points and six boards at No. 15 Indiana (Dec. 20) and through seven Big Ten games ranks second on the team in scoring (15.4 ppg) and rebounding (7.6 rpg) in league play-only.

- The 6-2 sophomore forward from Canberra, Australia, made her first career start in the season-opening win over Oral Roberts and produced 14 points and a career-high nine rebounds.

- She added nine points - all in the second half - to help lead the Huskers past Idaho State (Dec. 6) in a head-to-head match-up with her older sister, Callie, a junior for the Bengals.

- Bourne had nine points, eight rebounds, two assists and two blocks at Creighton (Dec. 14).

- As a true freshman in 2019-20, Bourne averaged 5.9 points and 4.4 rebounds per game. She scored in double figures four times off the bench as a freshman.

• Bourne capped her first season at Nebraska with a then-career-high 16 points and five blocks to go along with six rebounds, an assist and a steal in 29 minutes off the bench in the Big Ten Tournament against Michigan (March 5, 2020).

- Her 29 blocks on the season ranked as the sixth-best total by a freshman in Husker history.
- Bourne had 13 points, three blocks and two steals against Ohio State (Feb. 2, 2020).
- She added 11 points and a freshman season-high eight rebounds in a win over Wisconsin (Jan. 9, 2020), before adding 11 points and in a win over Penn State (Feb. 13, 2020).
- Bourne's older sister, Callie, averaged 12.0 points and 6.6 rebounds as a 5-9 guard at Idaho State in 2019-20, after averaging 4.1 points and 3.6 rebounds while starting 20 games for the Bengals in 2018-19. Their older sister Emma, plays in the Canberra Capitals Academy.
- Isabelle Bourne was a major factor in Australia's silver medal at the FIBA U19 World Cup, averaging 8.4 points, 5.1 rebounds and 1.1 assists in 23.1 minutes per game over seven contests for the Gems.
- Australia went 5-2 at the World Cup with both losses to the USA U19 team, including an overtime setback in the gold medal game.
- One of the most talented young players in Australia, Bourne joined the Huskers in August of 2019 after helping the Gems to a silver medal at 2019 FIBA Under-19 World Cup in Bangkok, Thailand, July 20-28.
- The Australian U19 National Team entered the tournament ranked No. 7 in the world, but came up just short of the gold medal, falling 74-70 in overtime to the United States.
- Bourne averaged 8.4 points, 5.1 rebounds and 1.1 assists in 23.1 minutes for the Gems.
- In 2017, Bourne led Australia's U17 team to gold at the Oceania Championship in Guam by averaging 19 points, 9.8 rebounds and 2.6 assists to claim a spot on the all-tournament team.
- She was also the MVP of the 2017 FIBA Under-18 Asia Cup 3-on-3 tournament in Mongolia, leading her team to another gold medal. Bourne was also named to the Gems squad for the 2018 FIBA Under-18 Asian Championships.
- Bourne trained at the Australian Institute of Sport and Basketball Australia's Centre of Excellence. She was a developmental player in the University of Canberra Capitals program.

NEBRASKA IN THE NET

- Nebraska was No. 71 in the NET rankings as of Thursday, Jan. 14.
- The Huskers climbed more than 50 spots in the rankings last week after a 64-62 loss at AP No. 15 Michigan (Jan. 7), before notching a 68-64 win at AP No. 23 Michigan State (Jan. 10).
- Nebraska is 1-2 against Tier 1 opponents [17-Rutgers (W, 53-50); 14-@Michigan (L, 64-62); 11-@Indiana (L, 81-45)] and 2-0 against Tier 2 foes [30-Northwestern (W, 65-63); 39-@Michigan State (W, 68-64)] and 1-1 against Tier 3 teams [87-Idaho State (W, 64-51); 94-@Creighton (L, 78-64)].
- The Big Ten is showing strong in the NET rankings early this season, led by Ohio State (9), Maryland (10), Indiana (11), Michigan (14) and Rutgers (17). Three other Big Ten teams, Northwestern (30), Iowa (32) and Michigan State (39) rank among the top 50 and Nebraska is scheduled to play all three of those teams twice this season. Nebraska (72) and Penn State (93) round out the 10 Big Ten teams currently in the top 100, while Purdue (112), Illinois (158), Wisconsin (167) and Minnesota (205) round out the conference.

NEBRASKA SCHEDULE NOTES

- Nebraska's game against Ohio State will mark the third time this season that Nebraska has played an AP No. 15 team that also entered the game unbeaten (Northwestern, 4-0; Michigan, 7-0; Ohio State, 7-0).
- Overall, Ohio State will be the fifth Nebraska opponent in 11 games this season to enter the contest unbeaten, joining ORU (0-0), Idaho State (1-0), No. 15 Northwestern (4-0), No. 15 Michigan (7-0) and No. 15 Ohio State (7-0).
- Nebraska's non-conference win over Idaho State is holding strong. The preseason favorite to win the Big Sky, the Bengals are 8-1 with their only loss at Nebraska (64-51). Two days after losing at Nebraska, Idaho State rolled to a 65-50 win at Kansas State. The Bengals have opened Big Sky play at 6-0 with sweeps of Northern Colorado, Weber State and Northern Arizona. Idaho State has won six of its eight games this season by double digits and all eight wins are by at least two possessions.
- NU is 5-0 at home this season and owns a seven-game winning streak at Pinnacle Bank Arena that began with a 75-58 win over Penn State on Feb. 13, 2020. (Last loss, Indiana, 57-53, Feb. 9, 2020).

KATE CAIN ON THE BLOCK: BY THE NUMBERS

- Kate Cain became just the sixth player in Big Ten history to record 300 career blocks, reaching the mark on her third of four blocks in a 65-63 win over No. 15 Northwestern (Dec. 31, 2020).
- Cain is expected to start her 102nd game as a Husker on Saturday against No. 15 Ohio State.
- She set the Nebraska single-game block record while also posting the first points (22), rebounds (14) and blocked shots (11) triple-double in school history in a win over Florida Atlantic (Dec. 19, 2017).
- She became just the sixth player in Big Ten Conference history to record 11 or more blocks and just the 10th Big Ten player to notch double-digit blocks in a single game.
- Cain's 22 points against Florida Atlantic were a career high, and her three assists against the Owls also tied a career best.
- She owns 45 double-figure scoring efforts, 17 double-figure rebounding games and one double-digit block game in the first 102 games of her career. She has made a team-leading 101 straight starts.
- Cain has 52 games (4, 2020-21; 16, 2019-20; 17, 2018-19; 15, 2017-18) with at least three blocks.
- She has recorded five or more blocks 17 times - Clemson (6, Nov. 30, 2017), Kansas (5, Dec.

- Cain had blocked at least one shot in 21 consecutive games before going without a block at Michigan (Jan. 7). She owns at least one block in 95 of 102 games in her career.
- Sam Haiby has scored in 68 of 70 games in her Husker career, including 29 of 30 games in 2019-20 and 29 of 30 games as a freshman in 2018-19. She has scored at least three points in 33 consecutive games for Nebraska, dating back to being held scoreless by USC at the South Point Shootout on Nov. 29, 2019. The Huskers won that game 67-54. She was also held scoreless in a 70-69 loss at Wisconsin on Jan. 27, 2018.
- The Huskers have knocked down at least one three in 382 straight games dating back to a loss at UTEP on Dec. 20, 2008. Nebraska has hit at least two three-pointers in 261 consecutive games.

BIG RED SIGN TOP 25 RECRUITING CLASS FOR 2021

- Nebraska women's basketball coach Amy Williams received National Letters of Intent from five talented players on Wednesday, Nov. 11, as the Huskers earned a No. 21 national ranking for its incoming class of 2021 from ESPN.
- Nebraska's impressive group includes two players ranked among the top 100 in the ESPN individual rankings, led by the versatile Kendall Coley (No. 49) and Nebraska high school standout Allison Weidner (No. 80) at the national level. Lincoln native Alexis Markowski, who will contend with Weidner for Nebraska's state high school player-of-the-year award in 2021, Illinois prep star Kendall Moriarity and Tatiana Popa fortify a strong five-player class.
- Four members of the Husker class have been ranked among the top 100 in the country by at least one ranking service, and all five have been mentioned among the top 275.
- "This 2021 recruiting class is a special group that has already been building great bonds with each other," Williams said. "We know that they are a group that can make an incredible impact on our program and the goals we have to become Big Ten Champions."

KENDALL COLEY, 6-2, F/G, MINNEAPOLIS, MINN. (ST. LOUIS PARK)

- Kendall Coley comes to Nebraska as the top-ranked player among a top 25 recruiting class for the Huskers and Coach Amy Williams. Coley, a 6-2 wing from Minneapolis, Minn., was ranked as one of the top 50 players in the nation by All-Star Girls Report (36), Prospects Nation (39) and ESPN Hoopgurlz (49) in 2021, while adding a No. 52 ranking from Blue Star.
- Coley, who committed to Nebraska in April of 2020, averaged 15.5 points, 7.4 rebounds and 3.7 assists as a junior at St. Louis Park High School.
- "Kendall is one of the most exciting players in the 2021 class," Williams said. "She is very versatile and can play every position on the court. She is long, athletic and skilled, which is a devastating combination. She is a special talent, and we believe she can make a great impact in the Big Ten Conference."

ALEXIS MARKOWSKI, 6-3, C/F, LINCOLN, NEB. (LINCOLN PIUS X)

- Alexis Markowski joins Allison Weidner as the top high school players in the state of Nebraska in 2021. Markowski, who was a first-team All-Nebraska and Super-State center while leading Lincoln Pius X to the 2020 Class A state title, set school single-season records for points (560) and rebounds (315) before being named the honorary captain of the Class A All-State team. The 6-3 Markowski also tied the Class A tournament scoring record with 80 points over three games, matching Nebraska Athletics Hall of Famer Maurice Ivy's record.

• Markowski was ranked No. 76 in the 2021 class by World Exposure, which also slots international players among its rankings.

• “We are so excited that Alexis is staying home,” Williams said. “She had an incredible junior season capped off by a state championship and is poised for a great senior year. All summer she played against some of the best post players in the country and continued to shine. She is a winner who just keeps working to expand her game, and her skills align perfectly with our needs.”

KENDALL MORIARITY, 6-1, G, WHEATON, ILL. (BENET ACADEMY)

• The first commit to Nebraska's top-25 recruiting class, Kendall Moriarity announced her decision in November of 2019. Moriarity was ranked among the top 100 players in the country by Prospects Nation (74), All-Star Girls Report (100) and Prep Girls Hoops (100) entering her senior season at Benet Academy in Lisle, Ill. She was also ranked as high as the No. 12 guard prospect in the country by Prospects Nation.

• The 6-1 Moriarity hit 43.1 percent of her three-pointers while also leading Benet Academy in steals and deflections as a junior 2019-20. She led her high school team to a No. 1 ranking in Illinois and a No. 23 team rank nationally at one point as a junior. In 2019, Moriarity was invited to the USA 16U National Team trials, advancing to the top 68.

• “Kendall was our first commit in the 2021 class, and she fits perfectly into all aspects of our program,” Williams said. “She is a long, tough, gritty player with great versatility. She is a talented scorer, but her willingness to do all the dirty work on the court is what separates her. She is a great teammate and will lay it on the line for her team to win.”

TATIANA POPA, 6-5, C/F, PARKERSBURG, W. VA. (BREWSTER ACADEMY)

• Tatiana Popa comes to Nebraska as a four-star recruit before entering her senior season at Brewster Academy. She closed her junior year at Parkersburg High School in West Virginia. She previously played at IMG Academy and Montverde Academy (2018-19) in Florida. She also competed at Quince Orchard High School in Maryland as a freshman in 2017-18. The 6-5 center/forward was ranked as the No. 263 overall player in the nation by All-Star Girls Report.

• Popa's father, Constantin, was a second-round NBA Draft choice of the Los Angeles Clippers in 1995 after playing basketball collegiately at the University of Miami. He is a member of the Miami Sports Hall of Fame, and played professionally overseas in Israel.

• “Our program is thrilled to be adding this hard-working, talented young lady to our Husker family,” Williams said. “She knows how to use her length to her advantage on defense and has expanded her versatility on offense. She is working hard to add strength to her frame and understands the benefits that Husker Power will provide her in that area. The sky is the limit for her growth, and we can't wait to watch it happen here at Nebraska.”

ALLISON WEIDNER, 5-10, G, HUMPHREY, NEB. (HUMPHREY ST. FRANCIS)

• Allison Weidner joins Alexis Markowski as two of the top basketball players the state of Nebraska has produced in recent years. Weidner was ranked as the No. 80 player on the ESPN Hoopgurlz Top 100. She was also a first-team Super-State selection and earned first-team Class D2 all-state honors in both basketball and volleyball for the Humphrey St. Francis Flyers as a junior in 2019-20. A member of the Class D2 All-Decade Team, Weidner is also a five-time gold medalist at the Nebraska state track and field meet.

• One of the top multi-sport athletes the state has produced, Weidner led the Cornhusker State in both assists and steals as a sophomore in 2018-19. As a junior, she averaged 25.2 points, 6.1 rebounds, 6.5 assists and a whopping 7.3 steals per game to power St. Francis to a Class D2 state runner-up finish.

• “We cannot wait to add Allison to our Husker program,” Williams said. “She is a crafty point guard who can score at all three levels and is very good in the open court. She has great court vision and makes those around her better. She is a Nebraska native who possesses the values and character we look for in a Husker.”

NEBRASKA'S HISTORY OF HOME SUCCESS

• Nebraska went 13-4 on its home court at Pinnacle Bank Arena in 2019-20.

• The Huskers were 15-4 at Pinnacle Bank Arena in 2015-16 after going 12-3 (13-3 at home) in 2014-15. The Huskers are 86-34 (.717) all-time at Pinnacle Bank Arena since the building opened for the 2013-14 campaign. The Big Red went 16-2 at home in 2013-14, suffering their only Big Ten loss to Purdue, 77-75, on Jan. 19, 2014. NU's 16 home wins in 2013-14 tied the school record for single-season home victories.

• The Huskers played the first regular-season game in arena history against USA Today No. 25 UCLA (Nov. 8, 2013) and rolled to a 77-49 win over the Bruins. NU's first win over an AP Top 25 team came with a 76-56 win over No. 24 Michigan State on Feb. 8, 2014. The Huskers added their first-ever win over an AP Top 10 team at the arena with a 94-74 victory over No. 8 Penn State on Feb. 24, 2014.

• NU won its first-ever Big Ten home game at Pinnacle Bank Arena with a 66-65 thriller over Northwestern Jan. 2, 2014, before an 88-85 win over Minnesota on Jan. 16, 2014, marked the first overtime game.

• NU suffered its first loss at the arena to Washington State (76-72) on Nov. 30, 2013.

• The Huskers are 44-3 all-time in home season openers, following a 90-51 win over Oral Roberts on Dec. 4, 2020. Nebraska had its streak of 12 consecutive season-opening wins snapped with an 83-77 loss to Missouri Valley Conference champion Drake on Nov. 7, 2018.

- The Huskers are 475-164 (.743) all-time at home. The Huskers have gone 211-68 (.756) over the last 18 seasons (including 2020-21), posting double-figure home victory totals 15 times.
- Nebraska played in the Devaney Center from 1976-77 through 2012-13, and added one appearance at Devaney against Utah on Nov. 23, 2014. The Huskers own a 389-130 record at the Devaney Center, including 146-88 (.624) mark in conference play.

KISSINGER ENDS PLAYING CAREER WITH INJURY

- Nebraska guard Taylor Kissinger announced the end of her collegiate playing career on Tuesday, Sept. 15. The 6-1 shooter from Minden, Neb., redshirted because of a hip injury as a junior in 2019-20. Kissinger underwent season-ending surgery on Jan. 3, 2020, after appearing in five games with the Big Red during the fall of 2019.
- Kissinger appeared in 60 games with 31 starts over two-plus seasons with the Huskers. She averaged 10.0 points and 4.1 rebounds while appearing in 25 games with seven starts as a true freshman in 2017-18. She helped the Huskers produce the biggest turnaround in the nation and advance to the 2018 NCAA Tournament, despite missing six games in midseason with a knee injury. She also suffered an upper body sprain late in 2017-18 that limited her contributions at the end of the season.
- She produced her most consistent season as a sophomore, playing in all 30 games with 24 starts in 2018-19, while averaging 8.9 points and 3.2 rebounds. She tied the Nebraska single-season record by hitting 45.6 percent (62-136) of her three-point attempts and connected on 88.2 percent (30-34) of her free throws.
- Kissinger missed four games in the concussion protocol early last season, but returned to tie a career high with six threes and a team-high 19 points in a win over Duke (Dec. 4) in the Big Ten/ACC Challenge. A hip injury kept her out the rest of the season after a game with Oral Roberts (Dec. 14).
- Kissinger finished her career with 559 points, 214 rebounds, 78 assists and 36 steals. Her career .404 (122-302) three-point percentage is the best mark in Nebraska women's basketball history.

HUSKER SPORTS NETWORK COVERS WORLD

The Husker Sports Network is in its 27th season producing and marketing the live broadcasts of Nebraska women's basketball in 2020-21, as play-by-play announcer Matt Coatney and color commentator Jeff Griesch team up for their 20th season as the Husker broadcast team.

The Husker Sports Network and Nebraska women's basketball have teamed up for two decades to carry every game, home and away, around the world for free on Huskers.com.

In addition to carrying every women's basketball game free on Huskers.com, the Husker Sports Network flagship stations B107.3 FM-KBBK (Lincoln) and ESPN 590 AM-KXSP (Omaha) provide strong signals for Husker women's basketball. When a network conflict occurs in Omaha, the Huskers also could be heard on CD105.9 FM-KKCD. 880-AM-KRVN (Lexington) also provides a huge AM signal statewide in central Nebraska, while more than 20 stations carry the Husker Sports Network's women's basketball coverage across the state and the Midwest.

Inside Pinnacle Bank Arena, fans can access the direct radio call of the game at 87.7 FM.

NEBRASKA POSTS 16TH STRAIGHT PERFECT GSR

In the eyes of the NCAA's Division I Graduation Success Rate (GSR), the Husker women's basketball program has been perfect for 16 consecutive years. Nebraska is the only program among the 14 Big Ten Conference schools to accomplish the perfect score for 16 straight seasons.

The NCAA announced the release of its annual Graduation Success Rate report Nov. 17, 2020, and Nebraska was a national leader in women's basketball for the 16th straight season, dating back to the initial public tracking of the GSR since 2004-05.

The Nebraska women's basketball program joins the Husker women's tennis and volleyball programs as Husker teams that have produced perfect 100 percent rates each of the last 16 years.

Nebraska was one of just 28 teams in the 64-team field of the 2018 NCAA Tournament to also boast a 100 percent Graduation Success Rate.

Overall, the Nebraska Athletic Department produced a record-high GSR for the eighth consecutive year, reaching 94 percent. Nebraska's GSR ranked No. 2 among the 14 Big Ten Conference programs. A total of 13 Husker programs recorded perfect 100 percent GSR scores, including men's and women's basketball, volleyball, softball, soccer, men's and women's gymnastics, swimming and diving, men's and women's golf, men's and women's tennis and rifle.

NEBRASKA OVERTIME FACTS

- Nebraska is 23-25 all-time in overtime games, including 12-12 at home, 8-10 in true road games and 3-3 on neutral courts in overtime.
- The Huskers are 1-2 in overtime games in 2019-20 following an 80-74 OT loss to Ohio State (Feb. 2). It was Nebraska's second overtime loss in Big Ten play this season, joining a 78-70 OT loss at Michigan State (Dec. 31, 2019). The Huskers opened road action this season with a 90-85 OT win at Missouri (Nov. 10, 2019).
- The 2019-20 season marks the first time that Nebraska has played three overtime games in the same season since 2011-12 - NU's first season in the Big Ten. In 2011-12, the Huskers played a total of seven OT periods in those three games.
- Nebraska has never played four overtime games in the same season.
- Nebraska's lone overtime game of 2018-19 also came in the Huskers' first road game of the season, but NU suffered an 87-84 double-overtime loss at Washington State (Nov. 16, 2019). It marked the second straight season that Nebraska played a multi-overtime game (also at Drake, Dec. 9, 2017).

- The Huskers went 1-1 in overtime in 2017-18, including a 69-64 overtime loss to No. 23 Michigan at Pinnacle Bank Arena (Jan. 13). The Huskers won their first overtime game of 2017-18 with an 89-85 double-overtime win at Drake (Dec. 9).

- Nebraska is 1-1 in overtime in 2016-17, including a 76-74 win over Michigan State at Pinnacle Bank Arena to close the regular season (Feb. 26, 2017). The Huskers lost 79-69 in OT to Minnesota at the arena (Feb. 4, 2017).

- The Huskers are 3-5 in overtime games under Coach Amy Williams.

- Nebraska is 2-3 in overtime games at Pinnacle Bank Arena.

- Nebraska is 5-2 in multi-overtime games with its most recent loss coming in the 87-84 2OT setback at Washington State (Nov. 16, 2018) in Pullman. NU's only other loss in a multi-overtime game came to Purdue in the 2012 Big Ten Championship Game, 74-70 in double-overtime.

- The Huskers defeated Minnesota 88-85 in overtime on Jan. 16, 2014. It marked the first overtime game in the history of Pinnacle Bank Arena. Nebraska's first overtime game in the history of the Bob Devaney Sports Center also came against Minnesota - a 68-67 win for the Huskers on Dec. 30, 1977.

- The Huskers have played 15 all-time overtime games against Big Ten opponents and own a 5-10 record. NU is 4-7 against Big Ten opponents in OT since joining the conference in 2011-12.

- Nebraska played its fourth OT game in 73 meetings with Missouri in a 90-85 OT win at Mizzou Arena (Nov. 10, 2019). All four OT games against the Tigers were settled in a single overtime period.

- Nebraska's next most frequent overtime opponents are Big Ten foes Purdue, Minnesota and Wisconsin. The Huskers and Purdue have played three overtime games in 14 all-time meetings. NU's six total overtimes against Purdue are the most against any team in school history.

- The Huskers also have played three overtime games against Minnesota (24 games), including two of the five overtime games in Pinnacle Bank Arena history.

- In 18 all-time games with Wisconsin the Huskers have played three overtime contests.

- Nebraska has never played back-to-back overtime games at home. The Huskers have played back-to-back overtime games only once in school history, an 83-81 loss to Texas A&M in College Station on Dec. 30, 1985, before returning to Lincoln for an 80-75 win over Eastern Kentucky at the Devaney Center on Jan. 2, 1986.

NEBRASKA ATTENDANCE ROSE IN 2019-20

- Nebraska ranked No. 20 nationally in average home attendance (4,397 fans per game) over 17 regular-season games at Pinnacle Bank Arena in 2019-20. It marked an increase of 296 fans per game compared to the 2018-19 season, when the Huskers ranked No. 22 nationally (4,101).

- The Huskers have ranked among the top 25 nationally in attendance for 11 consecutive seasons.

- Nebraska has ranked among the top 25 nationally in average home attendance in each of its first seven seasons inside Pinnacle Bank Arena.

- The Huskers opened the 2019-20 season with 5,250 fans at Pinnacle Bank Arena for a Wednesday, noon tip against Alabama A&M on Nov. 6. Nebraska hosted a Life Skills Sportsmanship Pep Rally prior to the game, which included nearly 2,000 students and sponsors from 27 school districts around the Cornhusker State. It was the third-largest opening day crowd in Husker history.

- In 115 all-time home games at Pinnacle Bank Arena, the Huskers own an 81-34 record (.704 winning percentage) while averaging 5,058 fans per game (581,612 total fans/115 games).

- Nebraska attracted a Pinnacle Bank Arena non-conference record crowd of 9,750 to open its stay in the arena with a win over UCLA on Nov. 8, 2013.

- Nebraska set its all-time single-game record with a sellout crowd of 13,595 fans against Missouri at the Devaney Center on Feb. 27, 2010. NU drew 10 straight crowds of more than 10,000 fans at the Devaney Center in 2009-10.

- Nebraska produced its top attendance season in school history by ranking No. 7 nationally with a record 7,390 fans per game at the Bob Devaney Sports Center in 2009-10. The Huskers went 16-0 at the Devaney Center on their way to a perfect 29-0 record, a Big 12 title and a No. 1 seed in the NCAA Tournament.

PANDEMIC PLANS STOP LONG NEBRASKA STREAKS

- Nebraska Communications Director Jeff Griesch did not make the trip to Indiana with the Huskers snapping a streak of 561 consecutive regular-season games in attendance, home and away for Griesch dating back to Dec. 30, 2002 (vs. Penn State in San Diego, last game not in attendance).

- Either Griesch or Husker Sports Network radio play-by-play announcer Matt Coatney (who also did not make the trip to Indiana) had personally been in attendance at every Nebraska women's basketball home or away game dating back to March 13, 1998 (Coach Amy Williams' senior season in the NCAA Tournament in Norfolk, Va.) - a stretch of 697 consecutive regular-season games and 40 additional exhibition games for a total of 737 straight contests.

5-7 Redshirt Sophomore Guard Dallas, Oregon (Westview/Salt Lake City CC)

REDSHIRT FRESHMAN (SALT LAKE CITY CC, 2019-20)

Scoggin averaged 10.0 points, 5.2 rebounds, 2.1 assists and 1.3 steals per game as a redshirt freshman for Salt Lake City CC in 2019-20. She helped lead the 20-7 Bruins to the NJCAA Region 18 title and a share of the Scenic West Athletic Conference championship. Scoggin, who hit nearly 40 percent of her three-point attempts and almost 95 percent of her free throws on the season, earned first-team All-Region 18 honors and was a member of the Region 18 All-Tournament team.

Scoggin's strength and fitness level increased throughout 2019-20 at Salt Lake City CC. At Utah State Eastern on Feb. 22, Scoggin played 40 minutes. She was also a regular double-figure scorer down the stretch for the Bruins. Early in the year, she erupted for a season-high 22 points while knocking down 6-of-9 threes in a win over Eastern Wyoming (Nov. 29). Her performance helped her earn conference player-of-the-week honors.

Scoggin was slowed at the start of the season after undergoing a minor meniscus repair on her knee in September of 2019.

FRESHMAN (SALT LAKE CITY CC, 2018-19)

Scoggin enrolled at Salt Lake City CC prior to the 2017-18 season. She suffered a torn ACL in her right knee on July 13, 2017, and redshirted during the 2017-18 season.

In 2018-19, Scoggin continued to feel discomfort in her right knee and underwent another ACL surgery on her right knee in November of 2018.

HIGH SCHOOL

Scoggin suffered a torn ACL in left knee in the summer of 2015, prior to her senior season at Westview High School in Portland, Ore. The

REDSHIRT SOPHOMORE (2020-21)

Ashley Scoggin has earned starts in each of Nebraska's 10 games this season. The 22-year-old redshirt sophomore transfer is averaging 7.5 points, 2.0 rebounds and 2.1 assists in 31 minutes per game.

In the victory over Idaho State, Scoggin established career highs with 16 points and four three-pointers to help shoot the Huskers to victory. She matched her career best with 16 points while adding career bests with four rebounds and two steals at Purdue (Dec. 23).

Scoggin added her third double-digit scoring effort with 11 points in Nebraska's win over No. 15 Northwestern (Dec. 31), before scoring 11 more and hitting three three-pointers in a win over Rutgers (Jan. 3). She also sank two free throws with 12 seconds left to seal the win. She added eight points, including seven in the first quarter, to go along with four assists to help the Huskers win at No. 23 Michigan State (Jan. 10).

Scoggin has the potential of three years of eligibility after an outstanding redshirt freshman season at Salt Lake City Community College in 2019-20. She earned first-team All-Region 18 honors and was a member of the Region 18 All-Tournament team while helping the Bruins to the NJCAA Region 18 title.

Scoggin proved herself as a knock-down shooter, connecting on nearly 40 percent of her three-pointers and 95 percent of her free throws.

"We are excited to add Ashley to our Husker family," Nebraska Coach Amy Williams said. "She is a play-making guard with experience and maturity and will provide us with another consistent presence from behind the arc."

injury also caused her to delay her collegiate enrollment until after 2016-17.

As a junior at Westview in 2014-15, Scoggin averaged 17 points, five rebounds, three assists and three steals. She was a two-time first-team all-metro performer at Westview.

As a sophomore at Westview, Scoggin averaged 10 points, five rebounds, four assists and three steals while helping Westview to a third-place finish at the Class 6A state tournament. Scoggin played her sophomore season along current WNBA player Jaime Nared (Las Vegas Aces).

Scoggin played her freshman season at West Salem High School, averaging 15.7 points, five rebounds, four assists and five steals.

in 16 minutes off the bench against the Jaspers. She hit the first three-pointer of her career and added two assists and her first career steal in the win over Iowa (Dec. 28). Brady's three gave Nebraska a 30-27 second-quarter lead, and the Huskers led the rest of the way.

She sparked a 10-0 first-quarter run at Michigan State with two points, two steals and two rebounds to help Nebraska lead for much of the game against the Spartans before falling in OT on New Year's Eve in East Lansing.

Brady scored a career-high seven points and knocked down a career-best two threes while adding two rebounds in nine minutes off the bench at Rutgers (Jan. 12).

She scored five points in a 10-0 second-quarter run that sparked Nebraska in a rally from a 25-point first-half deficit against No. 18 Indiana (Feb. 9). The Huskers eventually tied the game in the fourth quarter.

Brady scored eight points and had eight rebounds in an exhibition win over Rogers State (Nov. 2). An opponent fell on Brady inside the paint late in the game, contacting her head and shoulder area.

BEFORE NEBRASKA

The final piece of Nebraska's three-player recruiting class, Brady came to Nebraska after completing her senior season at Hamilton Heights Christian Academy in Chattanooga, Tenn. She was ranked as the No. 106 player overall in the 2019 class by Prospects Nation.

The 5-11 guard from Indianapolis produced the best game of her young career in Nebraska's 90-61 season-opening win over Oral Roberts (Dec. 4). Brady erupted for a career-high 15 points while adding a career-best five rebounds while making the first start of her collegiate career. She hit 5-of-7 shots from the field and all three of her three-point attempts against the Golden Eagles.

She added five more rebounds while setting a career high with four steals in a win over Idaho State (Dec. 6).

Through two games as a starter, Brady averaged 8.5 points, 5.0 rebounds and 2.0 steals. She missed NU's next eight games with a lower leg injury suffered in the final minute of the Idaho State game.

FRESHMAN (2019-20)

JUNIOR (2020-21)

Sam Haiby (pronounced HY-bee) continues to show growth in her all-around game, averaging team bests with 16.7 points, 7.8 rebounds, 3.8 assists and 1.3 steals. She erupted for a career-high 33 points to go along with nine rebounds and four assists in a Big Ten win over Illinois (Dec. 10). She added 27 points, nine rebounds and three assists at No. 15 Michigan (Jan. 7).

Haiby had 19 points, eight rebounds and five assists, including the game-winning put-back as time expired in a 65-63 win over No. 15 Northwestern (Dec. 31). Her circus shot was named ESPN SportsCenter's Top Play of the day. She followed with 16 points, five rebounds and five assists in NU's win over Rutgers (Jan. 3).

She added her first career double-double with 11 points and a career-high 12 rebounds in a win at No. 23 Michigan State (Jan. 10).

Haiby opened with 14 points, eight rebounds and seven assists in a win over ORU (Dec. 4). She added six points and 11 boards in a win over Idaho State (Dec. 6), and had 18 points and eight rebounds at Creighton (Dec. 14).

SOPHOMORE (2019-20)

Haiby ranked second among the Huskers in scoring (10.0 ppg) and assists (3.3 apg) while leading Nebraska in steals (1.5 spg) in 2019-20.

She had a season-high 28 points, including a career-high three threes, in a 90-85 OT win at Missouri (Nov. 10). Her third three came with

FRESHMAN (2018-19)

Haiby provided consistent sparks for Nebraska off the bench in 30 games. NU's second-leading scorer, Haiby averaged 10.0 points, 3.0 rebounds and 2.6 assists. She scored in double figures 15 times, including the final four games. Haiby erupted for a season-high 20 points - all after halftime - at Washington State (Nov. 16). She recorded her best Big Ten effort with 17 points against Indiana (Feb. 3) and had 17 more at Creighton (Dec. 2).

She was named the Big Ten Freshman of the Week after averaging 15.0 points on 10-of-15 shooting at Purdue (Jan. 31) and Indiana (Feb. 3).

She closed the regular season with 16 points in a win at Penn State (March 2). She also had 16 points in a win over No. 23 Minnesota (Jan. 20). Haiby added 16 more to go along with a season-high three steals at Arkansas (Dec. 18).

She scored 14 points at No. 24 Miami. She led NU with 13 points in her college debut against Drake (Nov. 7). She added 13 points with a career-high three threes in a win at Purdue (Jan. 31). Haiby scored 12 points four times, including No. 5 Louisville (Nov. 29), Michigan (Dec. 28), No. 12 Iowa (Feb. 25) and at the Big Ten Tournament against Purdue (March 7). She added 11 points in a win at Northwestern (Feb. 21) and 11 at No. 7 Maryland (Feb. 14).

BEFORE NEBRASKA

Haiby was ranked as the No. 122 player in the country by Prospects Nation and the No. 125

player in the nation by Blue Star. She was also ranked as the No. 28 guard in the country by ESPN. She overcame an early season knee injury as a senior to average 25.1 points, 7.1 rebounds and 5.3 assists per game, including a monstrous 46-point performance in a 54-49 win over White Bear Lake on Dec. 10, 2017. It followed a 45-point effort in a win over Brainerd on Nov. 28. Haiby finished her high school career with more than 2,000 points. As a junior, she averaged 22.1 points, 7.6 rebounds, 4.4 assists and 4.1 steals, including a huge 44-point performance against Fargo Shanley on Jan. 17, 2017.

Haiby was also a starting outfielder and pitcher on Moorhead High School's baseball team in the spring of 2017. She was the first pitcher to ever throw a pitch in U.S. Bank Stadium in Minneapolis, taking the mound for the Spuds against the Sartell Sabres. She also became the first female in history to pitch a scoreless inning in a Minnesota High School boys baseball game in the spring of 2017.

surgery to repair cartilage damage in her right knee.

She opened her sophomore season with 13 points, including a career-high-tying three three-pointers in a win over Saint Mary's (Nov. 10), but missed the remainder of the year after suffering a torn ACL. Cayton did not play the rest of the season.

Cayton earned an honorable-mention selection to the Pac-12 All-Freshman Team by starting 13 games for California. For the season, she averaged 5.6 points, 2.5 rebounds, 2.1 assists and 1.0 steal per contest for the Bears. She finished second on the team in steals (34) and third in assists (73).

Cayton started each of the last 12 games of the season for Cal, beginning with a career-high 18 points in a win over No. 13 UCLA. She had 11 of her 18 points in the first quarter against the Bruins, and tied her career high with three three-pointers.

MiCole Cayton hopes to put knee injuries behind her after choosing to transfer following her graduation from California. The 5-9 guard from Stockton, Calif., originally signed with the Huskers out of high school as part of a top-15 national recruiting class in November 2015.

In the midst of a coaching change at Nebraska, Cayton chose to stay closer to home at Cal and was an All-Pac-12 Freshman honorable-mention choice in 2016-17. She started 13 games as a freshman, including the last 12 games of the season for the Bears. That stretch of starts began with a career-high 18 points in a win over No. 13 UCLA and ended in the second round of the NCAA Tournament at Baylor.

"MiCole has an infectious competitive spirit and drive to be her very best," Nebraska Coach Amy Williams said. "Her high energy and passion along with her experience as a collegiate athlete make her a great fit for our program."

BEFORE NEBRASKA

As a senior at Grand Island Northwest, Brown averaged 17.5 points, 4.0 rebounds, 3.3 assists and 2.0 steals to lead the team to the Class B state tournament.

The 5-8 guard earned second-team Super-State honors from the Lincoln Journal Star and second-team All-Nebraska accolades from the Omaha World-Herald. Brown was a first-team Class B pick for the second straight year.

Grand Island Northwest was eliminated with a 48-47 triple-overtime loss to Crete in the state semifinals. Brown scored 19 points and had four assists in the loss.

Porter produced the best game of her young Husker career with nine points on a career-high three three-pointers to help Nebraska to a road win at No. 23 Michigan State (Jan. 10). Porter opened and closed the second quarter with three-pointers, then hit a huge three in the fourth quarter to start Nebraska's rally from a five-point fourth-quarter deficit to a 68-64 win. She added two rebounds and two assists in the victory.

Porter made her collegiate debut in Nebraska's 90-61 win over Oral Roberts (Dec. 4) by producing three points, three rebounds, an assist and a steal. She added two points, three rebounds and two assists in a win over Idaho State (Dec. 6).

She made her Big Ten Conference debut with three points on her first career three-pointer to go along with two rebounds and two assists in a career-high 22 minutes off the bench in a win over Illinois (Dec. 10).

SOPHOMORE

(EASTERN WASHINGTON, 2019-20)

An honorable-mention All-Big Sky selection as a sophomore at Eastern Washington, Cravens averaged 10.4 points and a Big Sky-leading 8.5 rebounds per game while appearing in 28 games with 26 starts.

She ranked 92nd nationally in rebounding average. Cravens produced six double-doubles on the season, including a career-high 28 points and 10 rebounds in just 20 minutes of action against Northern Arizona (Feb. 22). She hit 10-of-12 field goals against NAU just two days after going 8-for-8 from the field against Sacramento State (Feb. 18).

She had 18 points and 15 rebounds against Portland State (Feb. 15) and 20 points, career highs of 16 rebounds and five steals, along with a season-high four blocks against Southern Utah (Feb. 27).

During that four-game stretch (Feb. 15-27), Cravens averaged 20.8 points, 12.0 rebounds, 2.8 assists, 2.3 blocks and 1.8 steals while hitting 69.6 percent (32-46) of her field goal attempts.

For the season, she scored in double figures 14 times, including two 20-point efforts, while grabbing 10 or more rebounds on 10 occasions.

Cravens ranked fifth in the Big Sky and 66th nationally with 1.7 blocks per game. She totaled 96 blocks in two seasons at Eastern Washington, which ranked ninth on the school career charts.

Bella Cravens has started each of the last eight games for Nebraska in her first season as a Husker. The 6-3 junior transfer earned honorable-mention All-Big Sky recognition as a sophomore at Eastern Washington.

Through 10 games, Cravens is averaging 6.5 points, 7.6 rebounds, 1.3 assists and 1.3 blocks, including a career-high-tying 16 rebounds in her first Husker start in a Big Ten win over Illinois (Dec. 10). She added a Nebraska-best 12 points at No. 15 Indiana (Dec. 20), before getting 10 points at No. 15 Michigan (Jan. 7). She pitched in nine points, nine rebounds, three assists and three blocks in a win at No. 23 Michigan State (Jan. 10).

6-3 Freshman Forward Minneapolis, Minnesota (Wayzata)

Through 10 games, Stewart is averaging 5.5 points and 3.5 rebounds while hitting eight three-pointers.

BEFORE NEBRASKA

Stewart averaged approximately 20.0 points, 8.1 rebounds and 1.8 assists while hitting 65.6 percent of her two-point field goal attempts, 41.5 percent (39-94) of her threes and 89.5 percent (51-57) of her free throws as a senior.

She led Wayzata to a 24-5 record with three of its losses coming to national No. 1 Hopkins. In the third meeting, Stewart finished with 27 points in the 6-4A sectional championship game against Hopkins and Gatorade National High School Player of the Year Paige Bueckers.

Stewart averaged 12.2 points and 7.0 rebounds as a junior for 26-3 Wayzata, while earning All-Lake Conference and All-Metro honors. She produced 10.0 points and 6.0 rebounds per game as a sophomore for the 25-3 Trojans to earn All-Lake Conference honors in her first season at the school. She played her eighth grade and freshman seasons in North Dakota at Minot's Bishop Ryan High School, before her family moved to Minneapolis. Wayzata was the No. 2 ranked team in Class 4A in Minnesota in both 2018 and 2019.

Stewart gives the Huskers a versatile forward with a strong post game and the ability to shoot the three. Stewart enjoyed a strong senior season at Wayzata, averaging 25 points over her final 12 games of the season to earn first-team Class 4A All-State accolades.

In her collegiate debut, Stewart got off to an impressive start with 12 points, seven rebounds, an assist, a block and two steals in 16 minutes of action in a 90-61 win over Oral Roberts (Dec. 4). Stewart hit her first five shots, including a pair of three-pointers, against the Golden Eagles to help shoot Nebraska to victory.

SENIOR (2020-21)

Kate Cain returns for her fourth season as a Husker and her first year as a graduate student at Nebraska. An honorable-mention All-Big Ten selection last year and a two-time Big Ten All-Defensive choice, Cain has been projected as a second-round pick in the 2021 WNBA Draft. She already owns Nebraska career (305) and season (101) blocked shot records. She has climbed to No. 6 in Big Ten history in career blocks.

Cain has opened her senior season by averaging 8.0 points, 5.8 rebounds and 2.5 blocks, including her 13th career double-double with 14 points, 11 boards and six blocks in a win over Oral Roberts (Dec. 4). She had a season-high 15 points at Creighton (Dec. 14).

JUNIOR (2019-20)

The greatest shot-blocker in Nebraska history, Cain set a Husker season record with 101 blocks in 2019-20. The 6-5 center from

She started NU's last 31 games and was a four-time Big Ten Freshman of the Week. She produced the first points (22), rebounds (14) and blocks (11) triple-double in school history against Florida Atlantic (Dec. 19).

She had five double-doubles, including 14 points and 20 rebounds in a win over Penn State (Feb. 22). Her 20 rebounds tied for sixth-best in Husker history, helping NU post a plus-29 rebound margin against Penn State - the largest against a conference foe in Husker history.

Cain had double-doubles against Drake (19 pts., 14 reb.), Arkansas Pine-Bluff (16 pts., 11 reb.) and Arkansas (12 pts., 10 reb.).

PERSONAL

The daughter of Tim and Alison Cain, Katherine (Kate) was born May 18, 1999. Kate's father graduated as the all-time leading scorer (1,872 points) at Manhattan College. He was a two-time honorable-mention All-American by The Sporting News. Kate's mother, Alison (Martinsky), had 1,071 points, 734 rebounds and 268 blocks at Fairfield.

Kate's older brother, John, is a 6-10 left-handed pitcher in the LA Angels organization. He signed a free agent contract in June of 2019 and played with the Burlington Bees and AZL Angels during the summer.

Kate also has a younger brother, Chris.

Kate, a management major, was a Big Ten Distinguished Scholar and an academic All-Big Ten selection in 2019 and 2020.

a career-high 29 minutes against the Wolverines. She finished the season with four double-figure scoring efforts - all against Big Ten foes.

Bourne had 13 points, three blocks and two steals in 27 minutes against Ohio State (Feb. 2). She notched her first career double-digit scoring game with 11 points and a career-high eight rebounds in NU's win over Wisconsin (Jan. 9). She added 11 points and four rebounds in 15 minutes in a win over Penn State (Feb. 13).

Bourne had nine points and a career-high matching eight boards at Rutgers (Jan. 12).

Bourne opened Big Ten play with eight points and seven rebounds to go with a career-high two three-pointers in a win over Iowa (Dec. 28).

She also played a strong role inside with six points, seven rebounds and two blocks in a win over Duke (Dec. 4). She added six points and seven more rebounds vs. Manhattan (Dec. 22).

Bourne had eight points, six rebounds and two assists in a win over USC (Nov. 29). She added eight points, five boards and two blocks in a win at Wisconsin (Jan. 25).

Bourne also had eight points, six rebounds and a block in a win over Morgan State (Nov. 14). She added seven points on 2-of-3 shooting including her first career three-pointer, while adding three boards vs. Creighton (Nov. 24).

She had five points and three rebounds in a win over Michigan (Jan. 19). Bourne added four points and five rebounds in a win over SIUE (Nov. 17), before getting four points, four boards, two assists and two steals against Southern (Nov. 20).

Bourne has extensive international experience. She had an impressive summer with the Australian U19 National Team. Bourne was a key in Australia's silver medal at the FIBA U19 World Cup, averaging 8.4 points, 5.1 rebounds and 1.1 assists in 23.1 minutes per game over seven contests for the Gems.

Australia went 5-2 at the World Cup with both losses to the USA U19 team, including an overtime setback in the gold medal game.

The Australian U19 National Team entered the tournament ranked No. 7 in the world, but came up just short of the gold medal, falling 74-70 in overtime to the United States. Bourne averaged 8.4 points, 5.1 rebounds and 1.1 assists in 23.1 minutes per game for the Gems.

In 2017, Bourne led Australia's U17 team to gold at the Oceania Championship in Guam by averaging 19 points, 9.8 rebounds and 2.6 assists to claim a spot on the all-tournament team. She was also the MVP of the 2017 FIBA Under-18 Asia Cup 3-on-3 tournament in Mongolia, leading her team to another gold medal. Bourne was also named to the Gems squad for the 2018 FIBA Under-18 Asian Championships.

Bourne trained at the Australian Institute of Sport and Basketball Australia's Centre of Excellence under Coach Kristen Veal. She was also a developmental player in the University of Canberra Capitals program.

Her older sister, Callie, is a junior guard at Idaho State, and her oldest sister, Emma, also plays in the Canberra Capitals Academy. Her father, Trent, played Australian Football, while her mother, Ann, was a basketball player.

Isabelle Bourne is making big contributions in her first season as a Husker starter. The 6-2 sophomore from Canberra, Australia is averaging 14.0 points, 7.3 rebounds, 2.2 assists and 1.1 blocks while seeing time at power forward and on the wing. She produced career highs of 22 points and four assists to go along with seven rebounds at Purdue (Dec. 23). She opened Big Ten play with a then-career-high 21 points to go along with eight boards in Nebraska's win over Illinois (Dec. 10).

Bourne contributed 18 points, seven rebounds and three assists in Nebraska's 68-64 win at No. 23 Michigan State (Jan. 10). She began the season with 14 points and nine rebounds in a win over Oral Roberts (Dec. 4). She added three assists, three blocks and a steal against ORU. She had team highs with 16 points and six rebounds at No. 15 Indiana (Dec. 20), before notching her first career double-double with 11 points and 10 boards in a win over No. 15 Northwestern (Dec. 31). She added a second straight double-double with 11 points and a career-high 12 rebounds in a win over Rutgers (Jan. 3).

Haiby scored six points in Nebraska's decisive 13-0 run in a span of just 2:56, that turned a 67-63 deficit with 3:34 left into the biggest lead of the game for either team at 76-67 with 38 seconds left. Haiby hit 9-of-17 shots from the field and 14-of-16 free throws, including 11-of-11 in the second half. Haiby added nine rebounds, four assists and two steals. Isabelle Bourne added a career-high 21 points, including eight of Nebraska's first 10 points in the fourth quarter. Bourne added eight boards and two steals. Bella Cravens also came up big by tying her collegiate career high with 16 rebounds while making her first start as a Husker. Cravens yanked down 12 boards in the second half alone to help the Huskers to a 47-35 rebound edge over an Illini team that entered the game with a plus-11 average rebound margin. Jada Peebles led Illinois with 16 points and five assists, while Eva Rubin and Solape Amusan each had 13 points.
