HUSKERS CLOSE FIVE-GAME HOME STAND WITH EAGLES

- The Nebraska women's basketball team wraps up its five-game season-opening home stand by playing host to North Carolina Central on Saturday afternoon at Pinnacle Bank Arena.
- Tip-off between the Huskers (4-0) and the Eagles (0-3) is set for Noon (CT), with live video provided for B1G+ subscribers with UNL students Grant Hansen and Hailey Ryerson on the call. The Huskers Radio Network call of Matt Coatney and Jeff Griesch can be heard in Lincoln on B107.3 FM and CD 105.9 FM in Omaha. The free audio can be heard on Huskers.com and the Huskers App.
- Nebraska has opened its home stand with a 4-0 record, including a 67-62 win over in-state rival Creighton at Pinnacle Bank Arena on Wednesday night.
- All-Big Ten guard Sam Haiby (Moorhead, Minn.) helped the Big Red close out the win with 13 of her team-high 15 points in the second half. She added five rebounds, five assists and three steals, while sinking the game-clinching free throws with 5.4 seconds left. Haiby is averaging 9.8 points, 3.8 rebounds and a team-high 4.8 assists through four games.
- All-Big Ten forward Isabelle Bourne (Canberra, Australia) has led the Huskers in scoring through four games, averaging 14.5 points and 5.5 rebounds per game. Bourne produced double figures in each of Nebraska's first three wins, including a career-high 23 points against Alabama A&M (Nov. 14).
- Fellow Australian Jaz Shelley (Moe, Australia) has added double-digit production with 10.5 points while leading the Huskers with 8.3 rebounds per game. The 5-9 point guard is also tied for the team lead with five blocks and has matched Haiby for the team lead with seven steals.
- Alexis Markowski, the 2021 Nebraska High School Player of the Year out of Lincoln Pius X, has played big for the Big Red. The 6-3 freshman is averaging 10.0 points and 5.8 rebounds in less than 15 minutes per game off the bench.
- Nebraska will be gunning for its second five-game winning streak to open a season since 2019-20. The Huskers lead the Big Ten in scoring margin (43.3 ppg), thanks in part to a solid defense that has held opponents to just 29 percent shooting from the field. NU's field goal percentage defense also leads the Big Ten.
- The Big Red also leads the conference in total rebounds (48.5 rpg), while ranking second in scoring (91.3 ppg), assist-to-turnover ratio (1.83) and blocked shots (6.0 bpg).

HUSKER NUGGETS

- Nebraska's 58-point margin of victory over Maine matched the largest margin ever by the Huskers in a season opener, tying a 58-point win (104-46) over Wofford (Nov. 21, 2003).
- NU's 55-point margin in the win over Prairie View A&M gave the Huskers a 113-point combined spread in the first two games - the largest in a pair of season-opening contests in NU history.
- Nebraska's 55-point margin in the win over Alabama A&M marked the first time in school history that NU had produced a 50-plus point spread in three consecutive games.
- The Huskers scored 30 or more third-quarter points in four consecutive regular-season home games before outscoring Creighton 20-19 in the third quarter Wednesday. Prior to the streak Nebraska had never scored 30 points in the third.
- Nine different Huskers have scored in double figures through the season's first four games. Isabelle Bourne, Sam Haiby and true freshman Alexis Markowski are the only Huskers who have scored in double digits in more than one contest.
- Nebraska leads the Big Ten in scoring margin (43.3 ppg), field goal percentage defense (.290), and total rebounds (48.5 ppg). The Huskers also rank second in the league in scoring (91.3 ppg), assist-to-turnover ratio (1.83) and blocked shots (6.0 bpg).
- Sam Haiby is the 35th 1,000-point scorer in Husker history and has increased her career total to 1,078 to rank No. 29 all time at NU. She needs just seven points to match former teammate Kate Cain at No. 28 (1,085) and 11 points to catch Nafeesah Brown at No. 27 (1,089).

SCOUTING THE NORTH CAROLINA CENTRAL EAGLES

- Coach Trisha Stafford-Odom brings her fifth North Carolina Central team into the 2021-22 season. The Eagles come to Lincoln with an 0-3 record after taking a 66-37 loss to Virginia Commonwealth at home in Durham, N.C., on Wednesday night.
- North Carolina Central opened the season with a 73-56 loss at Illinois (Nov. 9), before suffering an 80-66 loss at Appalachian State in Boone, N.C. (Nov. 14).
- Starting forward Tianna Carter has been a leader early for the Eagles. The 6-1 redshirt sophomore from Tucson, Ariz., leads the team in scoring (8.7 ppg) and rebounding (7.7 rpg). The transfer played 13 games for UNLV last season.
- Fellow starting forward Ashlyn Lockard got off to a strong start, averaging 12.0 points and 7.5 rebounds while hitting 61.5 percent of her field goal attempts against Illinois and Appalachian State. However, the 6-2 senior from Tracy, Calif., was held scoreless by VCU. She averages 8.0 points and 7.0 rebounds on the year while adding three assists, five steals and two blocks.
- On the perimeter, the Eagles are led by Necole Hope. The 5-10 senior guard is averaging 8.3 points and 5.7 rebounds. Hope started 13 games for the Eagles last year after transferring from East Carolina.
- Sophomore point guard Paris McBride, a product of prep power Riverdale Baptist, has pitched in 3.7 points, 3.7 rebounds and a team-leading 2.7 assists. Redshirt junior Kira Lowery, who was an NJCAA All-American at Dyersburg State before spending the 2020-21 season as a part-time starter at Auburn, has contributed 3.3 points and 2.7 rebounds.
- Hope, Lowery and McBride all started NC Central's first two games, before giving way to Diamond Thomas, Nia Ford and Madalyn Anderson in the starting five against VCU. Anderson leads the Eagles with three three-pointers (3-11), while Ford (2-7) and Thomas (2-14) have both added a pair.
- As a team, North Carolina Central is averaging 53 points per contest while shooting 28.7 percent from the floor. The Eagles are also hitting just 18.0 percent (9-50) of their three-point shots.
- In an abbreviated 2020-21 season, North Carolina Central struggled to a 4-12 overall record. It came after the Eagles posted an NCCU NCAA Division I-best 13 victories in 2019-20. NC Central also went 9-7 in the MEAC, its best conference mark since rejoining the league in 2011-12.

HUSKERS HOLD OFF CREIGHTON, 67-62

- Sam Haiby scored 13 of her team-high 15 points in the second half to help Nebraska withstand a fourth-quarter Creighton rally, as the Huskers secured a 67-62 women's basketball win over the Bluejays on Wednesday night at Pinnacle Bank Arena.
- Haiby added two rebounds, three assists and two steals in the second half to help Nebraska build a 16-point second-half lead before hanging on for the five-point victory to snap Creighton's five-game winning streak in the series and improve to 4-0 on the young season. Creighton slipped to 1-2 with a pair of narrow road losses.
- Haiby's final two points came at the free throw line with 5.4 seconds left to seal the win, as the All-Big Ten guard scored seven of Nebraska's 14 points in the final period.
- Nebraska held on despite going just 2-for-14 from the field and 10-of-17 from the line in the fourth.
- For the game, Nebraska hit 32.3 percent (20-62) of its shots from the field, including 5-of-20 threes, while connecting on 22-of-31 free throws. The Big Red played outstanding defense throughout, holding Creighton to 32.8 percent shooting (21-64) including 5-of-19 from long range. The Huskers, who led from nearly start-to-finish, outscored Creighton 22-15 at the free throw line and won the turnover battle against the Jays, 17-11, despite full-court pressure from CU for much of the second half.
- True freshman Alexis Markowski, the 2021 Nebraska High School Player of the Year, fueled a first-half Husker surge that allowed the Big Red to take a 33-20 lead to halftime. Nebraska outscored the Jays 22-10 in the second quarter with six big points coming from Markowski. The 6-3 center added four rebounds and a blocked shot in just over 12 meaningful minutes in the game off the bench.
- Creighton came out of the locker room with a 6-0 run to start the third quarter to cut the lead to 33-26, but Markowski answered with five straight points in a 44-second span to quickly put the Big Red back up by double digits at 38-26. Moments later, freshman Kendall Coley pushed the Husker margin to 41-26 with a three-pointer. Although Coley finished with three points, three rebounds, two blocks and a steal, she wreaked havoc on the defensive end throughout the night to help Nebraska quiet the Jays.
- Nebraska maintained its double-figure edge throughout the rest of the third quarter, claiming its biggest margin on a Haiby shot late in the quarter to make it 53-37.
- In a rough and tumble fourth quarter, the two teams combined to hit just 9-of-34 field goal attempts. Creighton finished the night with 27 fouls, while Nebraska was called for 23 in the game.
- Ashley Scoggin contributed nine points on a trio of three-pointers, while Bella Cravens pitched in nine more for the Huskers. Isabelle Bourne managed five points and seven rebounds, while Ruby Porter, Allison Weidner and Jaz Shelley each contributed four points. Shelley also grabbed a teamhigh nine rebounds from her point guard spot while dishing out three assists. Freshman Kendall Moriarty rounded out Nebraska's scoring with a key three-pointer in the first half to help the Huskers take control of the game.
- Carly Bachelor led Creighton with 17 points and 11 rebounds to lead all players in both categories. Morgan Maly added 16 points with a trio of three-pointers off the bench for CU, while Tatum Rembao contributed 12 points and seven rebounds. Emma Ronsiek put up nine points and eight rebounds inside, while Molly Mogensen rounded out the CU scorers with eight points and six rebounds.

HUSKER HISTORY OF HOME-OPENING SUCCESS

- Nebraska owns a history of season-opening success on the Huskers' home court. NU improved to 45-3 in home season openers with a 108-50 victory over defending America East Conference regular-season champion Maine on Nov. 9, 2021.
- NU is 8-1 at Pinnacle Bank Arena in season openers, including a win over Alabama A&M (Nov. 6, 2019). The lone loss came on Nov. 7, 2018, with an 83-77 setback to Drake. In the first regular-season game in the history of Pinnacle Bank Arena, Nebraska powered its way to a 77-49 win over UCLA on Nov. 8, 2013.
- Nebraska's only season-opening home losses have come to Drake (2018), South Dakota State (Nov. 19, 2005) and Kansas (Nov. 21, 1980).
- Nebraska has been strong in its first four home games every season. In fact, NU is 166-25 (.869) over 48 seasons in its first four home contests, including 41-7 in Game No. 2.
 - Nebraska is 39-9 in Game No. 3 and 42-6 in Game No. 4.

NEBRASKA STREAKS

- Sam Haiby has scored in 88 of 90 games in her Husker career. She has scored at least two points in 53 consecutive games for Nebraska, dating back to being held scoreless by USC at the South Point Shootout on Nov. 29, 2019. The Huskers won that game 67-54. She was also held scoreless in a 70-69 loss at Wisconsin on Jan. 27, 2018.
- The Huskers have knocked down at least one three in 402 straight games dating back to a loss at UTEP on Dec. 20, 2008. Nebraska has hit at least two three-pointers in 281 consecutive games.
- Nebraska had hit seven or more three-pointers in 11 consecutive games, including four games with double-digit threes made during that stretch, before being held to five threes against Creighton.
- The Huskers had scored 70 or more points in eight consecutive games dating back to a 73-63 loss at Minnesota on Feb. 24, 2021, before being held to 67 in the win over Creighton on Wednesday.

NEBRASKA NUMBERS TO WATCH

- Point guard Jaz Shelley has led Nebraska in rebounding for three consecutive games and owns 33 total rebounds in 95 minutes on the season. As a freshman at Oregon in 2019-20, the 5-9 Shelley grabbed 33 rebounds over 33 games the entire season (584 minutes).
- Jaz Shelley needs one blocked shot to match her previous career total (6) in two seasons (55 games, 12 starts) at Oregon. Shelley also needs nine rebounds to match the 33-game total from her freshman season at Oregon in 2019-20.
- Nebraska carries a collective 84-to-46 (1.83-to-1) assist-to-turnover ratio through four games. Sam Haiby leads the Huskers with a 19-to-3 assist-to-turnover ratio while Jaz Shelley owns a 17-to-4 ratio. True freshman Allison Weidner has performed at a similar level with a 13-to-4 ratio, while Ruby Porter carries an 8-to-2 ratio.

MARGINAL DIFFERENCES

- Nebraska enters the NC Central game with a combined four-game victory margin of 173 points the second-largest of any four-game stretch in school history, trailing only the 177-point margin through the first four games of 2015-16. That stretch included North Carolina Central in the third game (88-47).
- The largest combined five-game scoring margin in school history came in 1978-79 when the Huskers defeated Missouri Western, Cal State Fullerton, Wichita State, Wayne State and South Dakota State

by a combined 178 points in Games 9-13 (Dec. 8-30, 1978). That stretch included three non-Division I opponents (Missouri Western, Wayne State, South Dakota State).

• The greatest six-game scoring margin in school history came with a combined 189-point edge in Games 3-8 (Dec. 5-28) for Nebraska's 1992-93 team that advanced to the second round of the NCAA Tournament and featured Wade Trophy winner Karen Jennings. That six-game stretch included wins over Northwestern, Illinois, Howard, Eastern Washington, Creighton and James Madison.

HIGHLIGHTING THE 2021-22 HUSKERS

- Nebraska returns five starters and 10 letterwinners from its 2020-21 team that advanced to the round of 16 in the Postseason WNIT after knocking off five top-25 opponents during the regular season. The Huskers finished with a 13-13 overall record that included a 9-10 Big Ten mark.
- Nebraska's top two returning players are second-team All-Big Ten guard Sam Haiby (Moorhead, Minn.) and honorable-mention All-Big Ten forward Isabelle Bourne (Canberra, Australia).
- Haiby was the only Big Ten player to rank among the conference's top 15 in scoring (11th, 16.8) ppg), rebounding (15th, 6.8 rpg) and assists (8th, 4.4 apg) in 2020-21.
- Bourne showed her versatility in a breakout 2020-21 season, averaging 13.6 points, 7.5 rebounds and 2.5 assists. One of the top power forwards in the Big Ten, Bourne also started games on the wing when the Huskers were short-handed because of injuries midway through the 2020-21 season.
- The Big Red do not expect to be short-handed again in 2021-22. Ashley Scoggin (Dallas, Ore.) returns to the backcourt after starting every game in her first year at Nebraska. She averaged 8.5 points and 2.3 assists while leading Nebraska with 43 three-pointers.
- Bella Cravens (Laie, Hawaii) also returns to the starting five after averaging 6.4 points and a team-best 7.6 rebounds as one of the Big Ten's most athletic post defenders.
- Ruby Porter (Adelaide, Australia) also returns for her second season at Nebraska after making 11 starts a year ago. She averaged 4.7 points and 2.4 rebounds despite being limited by injuries.
- Other returning letterwinners for Nebraska include Trinity Brady, Whitney Brown, MiCole Cayton, Annika Stewart and 2021 early enrollee Kendall Coley.
- Coley was also part of the 2020-21 signing class that includes Nebraska high school stars Alexis Markowski and Allison Weidner, that was ranked among the top 25 in the nation. Kendally Moriarty adds another true freshman who was ranked among the top 100 players nationally and was the first commit to Nebraska's signing class. **Tatiana Popa**, a 6-5 center, rounds out the group of freshman.
- Nebraska's collection of six newcomers also got a significant boost with the addition of Oregon transfer and Australian National Team point guard **Jaz Shelley** in April of 2021. Shelley was the only collegiate player on the Australian National Team that won bronze at the 2021 Asia Cup in Amman, Jordan, in October. She helped Oregon to the NCAA Sweet Sixteen in 2021.

TRANSFER SHELLEY ADDS TALENT, EXPERIENCE

- Australian National Team guard Jaz Shelley joined the Huskers for the 2021-22 season, after completing the NCAA transfer process in mid-April. The 5-9 guard from Moe (pronounced MO-ee), Australia, spent two seasons at Oregon and has three seasons of eligibility at Nebraska.
- Shelley is one of three members of the Australian National Program on the 2021-22 Nebraska roster, joining Isabelle Bourne and Ruby Porter. Bourne and Shelley were teammates for Australia's silver medal-winning Gems at the 2019 FIBA U19 World Championships.
- Shelley was the only collegiate player for Australia at the 2021 Asia Cup in Amman, Jordan. She earned a bronze medal in early October.
- Shelley erupted for her first career double-double with game highs of 22 points and a career-high 11 rebounds, three assists, two steals and a career-high-matching two blocks in Nebraska's win over Prairie View A&M (Nov. 11).
- She made her regular-season Husker debut with eight points, five assists, two steals and a career-high two blocks in
- a win over Maine (Nov. 9). • Shelley added eight points, a career-high 12 rebounds
- and a career-high-tying six assists in the win over Alabama A&M (Nov. 14). • Through four games, Shelley ranks second among the Huskers in scoring (10.5 ppg) and assists
- (4.3 ap), while leading the team in rebounding (8.3 rpg), steals (1.7 spg) and blocks (1.3 bpg). Shelley played in 22 of 24 games for the Ducks with 11 starts in 2021-22. She missed Oregon's
- first two NCAA Tournament games because of injury before competing against No. 8 Louisville in the NCAA Sweet Sixteen. She had an assist and a steal in five minutes against the Cardinals.
- In 2021-22, Shelley averaged 4.0 points, 1.7 rebounds and 1.9 assists. She scored in double figures three times, including a season-high 13 points on 5-of-8 shooting in a win over USC (Jan. 1, 2021) when she also tied a career high with five assists. She added 11 points in wins over Utah (Dec. 6, 2020) and Washington State (Dec. 21, 2020).
- Shelley appeared in all 33 games for Oregon as a true freshman in 2019-20, helping the Ducks to Pac-12 regular-season and tournament titles. She averaged 6.3 points, 1.5 assists and 1.0 rebound while hitting 42 percent of her threes.
- In her only start as a freshman, Shelley finished with 32 points while setting the Oregon singlegame record by going 10-for-14 from three-point range in a win over UC Riverside (Dec. 16, 2019).



(#1) Jaz Shelley, 5-9, Guard

Her 10 threes tied for the second-best total in NCAA Division I in 2019-20, and she was named the Pac-12 Freshman of the Week following her performance.

• She scored double figures six times, including 17 points on 5-of-8 three-point shooting at Long Beach State. She added 14 points (4-for-4 3FG) in a win over Arizona State (Feb. 9, 2020), and had 10 points on 4-of-5 shooting in a Pac-12 Tournament win over Utah (March 6, 2020).

BOURNE EARNS BIG TEN, NATIONAL RECOGNITION

- A Nebraska captain last season alongside Sam Haiby and graduated senior Kate Cain, **Isabelle Bourne** put together a breakout second year at Nebraska in 2020-21. The 6-2 forward from Canberra, Australia averaged 13.6 points and 7.5 rebounds to go with 2.5 assists to earn honorable-mention All-Big Ten recognition.
- Early this season, Bourne is leading the Huskers with 14.5 points per game while hitting 58.1 percent of her shots from the field including 33.3 percent of her three-pointers.
- She put up a career-high 23 points on 10-of-12 shooting from the field in the win over Alabama A&M (Nov. 14). She added six rebounds in 21 minutes against the Bulldogs.
- She opened 2021-22 with a game-high 17 points on 7-of-10 shooting in just 16 minutes in a victory over Maine (Nov. 9).
- The only Husker to score in double figures in each of the first three games in 2021-22, Bourne added 13 points on 6-of-10 shooting in a win over Prairie View A&M (Nov. 11).
- Bourne produced the best week of her career last season by averaging 21.5 points and 14.0 rebounds in wins over No. 24 Northwestern (Feb. 17) and Penn State (Feb. 21) to not only be named the Big Ten Player of the Week but the College Sports Madness National Player of the Week (Feb. 22).



(#34) Isabelle Bourne, 6-2, Forward

- She was also named one of 20 semifinalists for the NCAA Division I International Player of the Year by World Exposure Report News Services.
- Bourne ranked 24th in the Big Ten in scoring and 11th in rebounding. She notched five double-doubles, including a career-high-tying 22 points to go with 11 rebounds in the win over Penn State (Feb. 21). She had three straight double-doubles, including 21 points and a career-high 17 rebounds at Northwestern (Feb. 17).
- She missed four games last season with an ankle injury suffered in the final minute of Nebraska's win at Michigan State (Jan. 10).
- In addition to playing her true power forward position in 2020-21, Bourne also spent time on the wing as Nebraska struggled to overcome injuries in the backcourt to several players, including Trinity Brady, MiCole Cayton, Nailah Dillard and Ruby Porter.

HAIBY HITS FOR BIG NUMBERS IN BIG GAMES

- Sam Haiby produced 10 20-point scoring efforts in 2020-21, including a career-high 33 points in a Big Ten-opening win over Illinois (Dec. 10). Haiby added a 28-point effort against lowa (Feb. 11), and 27 points and nine boards in a two-point loss at then-No. 15 and unbeaten Michigan (Jan. 7). She notched 24 points, nine rebounds and six assists against No. 7 Maryland (March 11) and game highs with 24 points and five assists in a win over Wisconsin (Jan. 28). She had 22 points in a win at Illinois (Jan. 25). She also put up 25 points against Minnesota (Jan. 19), before getting 22 against the Golden Gophers (Feb. 24). She had 20 points, six rebounds and four assists against Colorado in the WNIT (March 20).
- Haiby notched the first three double-doubles of her career in consecutive games against No. 23 Michigan State (11 points, 12 rebounds, Jan. 10), No. 15 Ohio State (11 points, 10 assists, Jan. 16) and Minnesota (25 points, 12 rebounds).
- Haiby made and attempted (120-147) more free throws over 26 games in 2020-21 than through 30 games as a starter in 2019-20 (62-81). She also had nearly double the number of offensive rebounds (49) than she had in 2019-20 (28) despite playing four fewer games.



(#4) Sam Haiby, 5-9, Guard

- Haiby has produced double-figure points 54 times as a Husker, including 15 points, five rebounds, five assists and three steals in a win over Creighton (Nov. 17) and 10 points in a season-opening win over Maine (Nov. 9). She had 21 double-figure efforts in 2020-21, including 12 20-point games. She had 16 double-figure performances in 2019-20 and 15 as a freshman in 2018-19.
- Haiby earned four spots on the Big Ten Weekly Honor Roll (Dec. 14, Jan. 4, Jan. 11, Jan. 25) and was the College Sports Madness Big Ten Player of the Week (Jan. 4) after leading Nebraska to a pair of wins over No. 15 Northwestern (Dec. 31) and Rutgers (Jan. 3). She averaged 17.5 points, 6.5 rebounds and 5.0 assists in those two low-scoring, one-possession wins for the Huskers.

HUSKERS KNOCKED OFF TOP TEAMS IN 2020-21

- During the regular season, Nebraska posted five wins over AP Top 25 opponents the secondhighest total in the Big Ten, trailing only No. 7 Maryland. Nebraska defeated No. 15 Ohio State and swept No. 15/24 Northwestern, while adding wins over No. 23 Michigan State and Rutgers.
- Nebraska was one of only eight Big Ten teams to record more than one win over a top-25 opponent during the regular season.
- Nebraska's five regular-season wins over AP Top 25 teams trailed only No. 7 Maryland among Big Ten teams. The Terrapins went 8-2 against foes ranked at any point in the 2020-21 AP Poll, while Nebraska went 5-5. Iowa (5-9) was the only other Big Ten team with more than four wins.
- The Huskers' win over No. 15 Ohio State (Jan. 16) was one of three wins over an unbeaten and AP No. 15 team in 2020-21 (Northwestern, 4-0; Michigan, 7-0; Ohio State, 7-0).
- Nebraska was 5-5 against AP Top 25 teams (ranked at any point this season) including 4-4 against AP Top 25 teams at game time, with wins over No. 15 Northwestern, No. 15 Ohio State, at No. 23 Michigan State and at No. 24 Northwestern, and losses at No. 15 Indiana, at No. 15 Michigan, to No. 7 Maryland (March 11) and No. 9 Maryland (Feb. 14).

2020 TRANSFERS IN STARTING ROLES FOR HUSKERS

- Junior Bella Cravens was a force as a starter in Big Ten play in 2020-21. The 6-3 forward from Laie, Hawaii, ranked seventh in conference play-only with 8.1 rebounds per game to go with 6.8 points. She notched her first Nebraska double-double with a season-high 13 points and 11 rebounds in a win over Wisconsin (Jan. 28). She had a career-high-tying 16 rebounds in the win over Illinois (Dec. 10). She added 14 huge boards in the win over No. 15 Ohio State (Jan. 16) and 14 more off the bench in a WNIT win over UT Martin (March 19). She grabbed 13 boards in the win over Rutgers (Jan. 3) and had nine points, nine rebounds and three blocks in the win at No. 23 Michigan State (Jan. 10).
- Cravens opened 2021-22 by tying her Nebraska career high with 13 points, while adding a game-high eight rebounds in a win over Maine (Nov. 9). She hit 5-of-6 shots from the field.
- She closed 2020-21 with 10 points and eight rebounds against Colorado (March 20) in the round of 16 in the Postseason WNIT.
- Cravens missed three straight games (at No. 24 Northwestern, Feb. 17; Penn State, Feb. 21; at Minnesota, Feb. 24) with an ankle injury suffered in the first half against Iowa (Feb. 11).
- Cravens spent her first two seasons at Eastern Washington. She led the Big Sky Conference in rebounding (8.5 rpg) last year and was an honorable-mention All-Big Sky selection.
- · Ashley Scoggin stepped into a major role in her first year as a Husker. The redshirt sophomore started all 26 games, averaging 8.5 points while leading NU with 43 made threes. She scored a career-high 18 points in the win over Penn State (Feb. 21), before adding 17 points to close the regular season at Iowa (March 6). She had 16 points against Minnesota (Jan. 19), Purdue and Idaho State. She added 14 points against No. 7 Maryland in the Big Ten Tournament (March 11).
- Scoggin scored double figures 13 times, including eight times in the final 12 games. She matched Isabelle Bourne for team-high scoring honors in Nebraska's WNIT opening-round win over UT Martin (March 19).
- Scoggin was named one of 10 finalists for the NCAA Division I Junior College Transfer of the Year by World Exposure Report News Service.
- The transfer from Salt Lake City CC spent her first year on the court in 2019-20 after missing four straight seasons because of knee injuries, beginning with her senior year of high school in 2015-16. In 2019-20, she earned NJCAA All-Region 18 honors after leading the Bruins to the Region 18 title.
 - Scoggin enters her second sophomore season at Nebraska at age 23.

2020-21 FRESHMEN LAY SOLID FOUNDATION

- Freshman Ruby Porter (Adelaide, Australia) started five straight games in place of Isabelle Bourne (Jan. 16-Feb. 4) before joining Bourne in the starting five for the first time against No. 9 Maryland (Feb. 14). Porter made six straight starts in place of Bella Cravens before being forced to the sideline against No. 7 Maryland (March 11) after suffering a slight knee injury in a Big Ten Tournament win over Minnesota (March 10). Porter did not play in the WNIT.
- Porter had a career-high 19 points against Maryland before adding eight points and four rebounds in the 71-64 victory over the Wildcats. Porter had back-to-back double-figure scoring efforts in wins over Illinois (11, Jan. 25) and Wisconsin (12, Jan. 28). Porter also scored nine off the bench on a trio of threes in NU's road win at No. 23 Michigan State (Jan. 10).
- Annika Stewart was the most productive Husker freshman in 2020-21, averaging 6.4 points and 3.0 rebounds. She had back-to-back double-figure efforts in wins over Illinois (12, Jan. 25) and Wisconsin (13, Jan. 28), before adding a third double-digit effort in a four-game span with 12 points on 5-of-6 shooting at Rutgers (Feb. 7).
- The 6-3 forward from Minneapolis set the Nebraska freshman three-point field goal percentage record (.446, 29-65). She buried three threes, including back-to-back threes in a one-minute span in the fourth quarter to give Nebraska the lead for good at Illinois. She added three more threes and 13 points at Minnesota (Feb. 24). She also hit 3-of-4 threes to finish with 11 points in 11 minutes against Colorado in the WNIT (March 20).
- Stewart notched nine double-figure scoring efforts, including a career-high 15 points in nine minutes in the win over Idaho State (Dec. 6) and 10 points in seven minutes in a win over Penn State (Feb. 21).

- Whitney Brown proved herself as a fearless competitor in 26 games. The 5-8 walk-on from Grand Island, Neb., erupted for a career-high 14 points on 4-of-8 three-point shooting in a career-high 28 minutes as the game's second-leading scorer in the win over No. 15 Ohio State (Jan. 16). She added 12 points on 4-of-7 three-point shooting and matched her career high with five rebounds while playing 28 minutes in her first career start in a WNIT win over UT Martin (March 19).
- Brown averaged 3.2 points per game and carried Nebraska's best assist-to-turnover ratio (2.3-to-1), while ranking third on the team with 13 steals. She had a career-high six assists in Nebraska's win over Minnesota (March 10).

CAYTON RETURNS TO COURT. FINISHES STRONG

- After 26 months away from competition, **MiCole Cayton** made her Husker debut memorable in Nebraska's 57-53 road win at Illinois (Jan. 25).
- Cayton, who was cleared for her first full-court, full-contact practice at Nebraska on Jan. 22, played 19 minutes off the bench and made a crucial play in crunch time to help the Huskers to victory.
- With less than 15 seconds left and NU clinging to a 54-53 lead, Cayton stole the ball at halfcourt from Illinois guard J-Naya Ephraim after she received an inbounds pass. Ephraim fouled Cayton to prevent a layup, and Cayton made 1-of-2 free throws to give NU a 55-53 lead with 10.7 seconds left.
- It was Cayton's first steal as a Husker, but she also drew a pair of offensive fouls on the Illini in the game and finished 3-of-4 at the free throw line.
 - It marked Cayton's first game since playing for California against San Diego on Nov. 24, 2018.
- Cayton produced her first double-figure scoring performance as a Husker with 10 points in the WNIT opening-round win over UT Martin (March 19). She added six points on 2-for-2 three-point shooting against Colorado (March 20). She averaged 2.7 points and 1.1 assists on the season.

COLEY JOINED HUSKERS AS 2021 EARLY ENROLLEE

- After playing its second straight game (Ohio State, Minnesota) and its fourth of 2020-21 (Indiana, Purdue) with just seven active players (six scholarship and walk-on Whitney Brown), the Nebraska roster got a boost with the addition of freshman early enrollee **Kendall Coley.** The 6-2 wing was cleared for full participation on Jan. 21 and practiced for the first time Jan. 22, 2021.
- She was in uniform at Illinois (Jan. 25) but did not play. Coley saw her first college game action with two minutes in a win over Wisconsin (Jan. 28).
- Coley played 10 minutes and scored her first points while also recording a rebound and notching her first career assist and blocked shot against No. 9 Maryland (Feb. 14). She added three points, two rebounds and a block in a win over Penn State (Feb. 21). She hit a pair of three-pointers to finish with six points at Minnesota (Feb. 24) and hit two more threes during Nebraska's decisive 18-3 first-half surge in a win over the Golden Gophers at the Big Ten Tournament (March 10).
- Coley graduated from St. Louis Park High School in Minneapolis on Jan. 14, 2021. She was ranked as a top 50 recruit nationally by All-Star Girls Report (36), Prospects Nation (39) and ESPN (49).
- Coley committed to Nebraska in April of 2020 after averaging 15.5 points, 7.4 rebounds and 3.7 assists as a junior at St. Louis Park High School.
- Kendall's older sister, Chase, was a four-year letterwinner at Iowa (2015-18) and started all 32 games for the Hawkeyes as a senior in 2017-18.

NEBRASKA'S 2021 CLASS RANKED NO. 21 BY ESPN

- Nebraska Coach Amy Williams received National Letters of Intent from five talented players on Nov. 11, as the Huskers earned a No. 21 national ranking for its incoming class of 2021 from ESPN.
- Nebraska's impressive group includes two players ranked among the top 100 in the ESPN individual rankings, led by the versatile **Kendall Coley** (No. 49) and Nebraska high school standout **Allison Weidner** (No. 80) at the national level. Lincoln native **Alexis Markowski** was the Gatorade and MaxPreps Nebraska high school player of the yea in 2021, while Illinois prep star **Kendall Moriarity** and **Tatiana Popa** fortify a strong five-player class.
- Four members of the Husker class were ranked among the top 100 in the country by at least one ranking service, and all five have been mentioned among the top 275.

KENDALL COLEY, 6-2, F/G, MINNEAPOLIS, MINN. (ST. LOUIS PARK)

- **Kendall Coley** became the first signee to join the Husker roster, coming to Nebraska as an early enrollee on Jan. 17. She was on the bench but not cleared to play for a home game against Minnesota (Jan. 19). She participated in her first practice as a Husker on Jan. 21, 2021
- Coley came to Nebraska as the top-ranked player among a top 25 recruiting class for the Huskers and Coach Amy Williams. Coley, a 6-2 wing from Minneapolis, Minn., was ranked as one of the top 50 players in the nation by All-Star Girls Report (36), Prospects Nation (39) and ESPN Hoopgurlz (49) in 2021, while adding a No. 52 ranking from Blue Star.
- Coley, who committed to Nebraska in April of 2020, averaged 15.5 points, 7.4 rebounds and 3.7 assists as a junior at St. Louis Park High School.

ALEXIS MARKOWSKI, 6-3, C/F, LINCOLN, NEB. (LINCOLN PIUS X)

• Alexis Markowski joined Allison Weidner as the top high school players in the state of Nebraska in 2021. Markowski was a two-time first-team All-Nebraska and Super-State center while leading Lincoln Pius X to back-to-back Class A state titles in 2020 and 2021. As a senior, she was the state's No. 3 scorer (23.3 ppg) and No. 2 rebounder (13.0 rpg) across all classes on her way to Nebraska Gatorade and MaxPreps State Player of the Year honors. She averaged 23.7 points and 19.3 rebounds in three

state tournament wins for the Thunderbolts, who finished 25-0 in the MaxPreps national top 25.

- Markowski broke her own Pius X season records by scoring 582 points and pulling down 325 rebounds as a senior. As a junior she set those records with 560 points and 315 rebounds to be named the honorary captain of the Class A All-State teams. She also set the Pius X career scoring record (1,484 points) previously held by former Husker Maddie Simon.
- As a junior, Markowski tied former Husker Athletics Hall of Famer Maurtice Ivy's Class A state tournament scoring record with 80 points. Markowski added 71 points and 58 rebounds (23.7 ppg, 19.3 rpg) as a senior in the state tournament. She notched three double-doubles in Pius X state tournament wins, including a massive 30-point, 27-rebound performance in a semifinal win over Omaha Central before getting 27 points and 19 rebounds in a championship game win over Fremont. She opened with 14 points and 12 boards in a low-scoring 40-20 win over Millard North.
- Markowski was ranked No. 76 in the 2021 class by World Exposure, which also slots international players among its rankings.
- Markowski totaled 1,484 points and 867 rebounds in 76 games (19.5 ppg, 11.4 rpg) over just three seasons at Pius X. She missed her entire freshman season (2017-18) with a foot injury.
 - She was also a second-team Class A all-state selection in volleyball in the fall of 2020.

ALLISON WEIDNER, 5-10, G, HUMPHREY, NEB. (HUMPHREY ST. FRANCIS)

- Allison Weidner joined Alexis Markowski as two of the top basketball players the state of Nebraska has produced in recent years. Weidner was ranked as the No. 80 player on the ESPN Hoopgurlz Top 100. She was also a first-team Super-State selection and earned first-team Class D2 all-state honors in both basketball and volleyball for the Humphrey St. Francis Flyers as a junior in 2019-20. A member of the Class D2 All-Decade Team.
- Weidner led the state of Nebraska in scoring (25.0 ppg) and assists (6.4 apg) while ranking second in steals (6.4 spg) while leading Humphrey St. Francis to the state title as a senior. She also averaged 7.0 rebounds per contest for the Flyers. She scored 71 points in three state tournament games.
- As a junior in 2019-20, Weidner averaged 25.2 points, 6.1 rebounds, 6.5 assists and a whopping 7.3 steals per game to power St. Francis to a Class D2 runner-up finish. She scored a tournament-high 83 points in three games.
- Weidner finished her four years of high school basketball with 2,282 points, 741 assists and 629 steals. Her point total was the third-best in Nebraska state girls basketball history across all classes.
- She averaged 19.7 points, 5.7 rebounds, 6.3 assists and 5.9 steals as a sophomore, while averaging 14.5 points, 4.1 rebounds, 7.9 assists and 3.7 steals as a freshman in 2017-18 for the Flyers.
 - Weidner was also an eight-time gold medalist at the state track and field championships.

KENDALL MORIARITY, 6-1, G. WHEATON, ILL. (BENET ACADEMY)

- The first commit to Nebraska's class, **Kendall Moriarity** announced her decision in November of 2019. Moriarity was ranked among the top 100 players in the country by Prospects Nation (74), All-Star Girls Report (100) and Prep Girls Hoops (100) entering her senior season at Benet Academy in Lisle, Ill. She was also ranked as high as the No. 12 guard prospect in the country by Prospects Nation.
- The 6-1 Moriarity hit 43.1 percent of her three-pointers while also leading Benet Academy in steals and deflections as a junior 2019-20. She led her high school team to a No. 1 ranking in Illinois and a No. 23 team rank nationally at one point as a junior. In 2019, Moriarity was invited to the USA 16U National Team trials, advancing to the top 68.
- "Kendall was our first commit in the 2021 class, and she fits perfectly into all aspects of our program," Williams said. "She is a long, tough, gritty player with great versatility. She is a talented scorer, but her willingness to do all the dirty work on the court is what separates her. She is a great teammate and will lay it on the line for her team to win."

TATIANA POPA, 6-5, C/F, PARKERSBURG, W. VA. (BREWSTER ACADEMY)

- Tatiana Popa comes to Nebraska as a four-star recruit before entering her senior season at Brewster Academy. She closed her junior year at Parkersburg High School in West Virginia. She previously played at IMG Academy and Montverde Academy (2018-19) in Florida. She also competed at Quince Orchard High School in Maryland as a freshman in 2017-18. The 6-5 center/forward was ranked as the No. 263 overall player in the nation by All-Star Girls Report.
- Popa's father, Constantin, was a second-round NBA Draft choice of the Los Angeles Clippers in 1995 after playing basketball collegiately at the University of Miami. He is a member of the Miami Sports Hall of Fame, and played professionally overseas in Israel.

NEBRASKA'S HISTORY OF HOME SUCCESS

- The Huskers are 482-167 (.743) all-time at home, including 218-71 (.754) over the last 18-plus seasons.
 - Nebraska is 4-0 at Pinnacle Bank Arena in 2021-22, after posting an 8-3 mark at home last season.
- NU went 13-4 on its home court in 2019-20, the 15th time the Huskers have posted double-figure home victory totals in the last 18 seasons.
- The Huskers were 15-4 at Pinnacle Bank Arena in 2015-16 after going 12-3 (13-3 at home) in 2014-15. The Huskers are 93-37 (.715) all-time at Pinnacle Bank Arena since the building opened for the 2013-14 campaign. The Big Red went 16-2 at home in 2013-14, suffering their only Big Ten loss to Purdue, 77-75, on Jan. 19, 2014. NU's 16 home wins in 2013-14 tied the school record for single-season home victories.
- The Huskers played the first regular-season game in arena history against USA Today No. 25 UCLA (Nov. 8, 2013) and rolled to a 77-49 win over the Bruins. NU's first win over an AP Top 25 team came with a 76-56 win over No. 24 Michigan State on Feb. 8, 2014. The Huskers added their first-ever win over an AP Top 10 team at the arena with a 94-74 victory over No. 8 Penn State on Feb. 24, 2014.

- NU won its first Big Ten home game at Pinnacle Bank Arena with a 66-65 thriller over Northwestern Jan. 2, 2014, before an 88-85 win over Minnesota on Jan. 16, 2014, marked the first overtime game.
 - NU suffered its first loss at the arena to Washington State (76-72) on Nov. 30, 2013.
- The Huskers are 45-3 all-time in home season openers, following a 108-50 win over Maine on Nov. 9, 2021. Nebraska has won 15 of its last 16 season openers.
- Nebraska played in the Devaney Center from 1976-77 through 2012-13, and added one appearance at Devaney against Utah on Nov. 23, 2014. The Huskers own a 389-130 record at the Devaney Center, including 146-88 (.624) mark in conference play.

HUSKERS RADIO NETWORK COVERS WORLD

The Huskers Radio Network is in its first season of producing and marketing the live broadcasts of Nebraska women's basketball in 2021-22, but play-by-play announcer Matt Coatney and color commentator Jeff Griesch team up for their 21st season as the Husker broadcast team.

The Huskers Radio Network will carry every game, home and away, around the world for free on Huskers.com, marking the 21st year that all of Nebraska's women's basketball games have been free and available to fans. In addition to carrying every women's basketball game free on Huskers.com, the Huskers Radio Network flagship stations B107.3 FM-KBBK (Lincoln) and ESPN 590 AM-KXSP (Omaha) provide strong signals for Husker women's basketball. When a network conflict occurs in Omaha, the Huskers also can be heard on CD105.9 FM-KKCD. 880-AM-KRVN (Lexington) also provides a huge AM signal statewide in central Nebraska, while more than 20 stations carry the Huskers Radio Network's women's basketball coverage across the state and the Midwest.

Inside Pinnacle Bank Arena, fans can access the direct radio call of the game at 87.7 FM.

NEBRASKA POSTS 16TH STRAIGHT PERFECT GSR

In the eyes of the NCAA's Division I Graduation Success Rate (GSR), the Husker women's basketball program has been perfect for 16 consecutive years. Nebraska is the only program among the 14 Big Ten Conference schools to accomplish the perfect score for 16 straight seasons.

The NCAA announced the release of its annual Graduation Success Rate report Nov. 17, 2020, and Nebraska was a national leader in women's basketball for the 16th straight season, dating back to the initial public tracking of the GSR since 2004-05.

The Nebraska women's basketball program joins the Husker women's tennis and volleyball programs as Husker teams that have produced perfect 100 percent rates each of the last 16 years.

Nebraska was one of just 28 teams in the 64-team field of the 2018 NCAA Tournament to also boast a 100 percent Graduation Success Rate.

Overall, the Nebraska Athletic Department produced a record-high GSR for the eighth consecutive year, reaching 94 percent. Nebraska's GSR ranked No. 2 among the 14 Big Ten Conference programs. A total of 13 Husker programs recorded perfect 100 percent GSR scores, including men's and women's basketball, volleyball, softball, soccer, men's and women's gymnastics, swimming and diving, men's and women's golf, men's and women's tennis and rifle.

NEBRASKA OVERTIME FACTS

- Nebraska is 23-25 all-time in overtime games, including 12-12 at home, 8-10 in true road games and 3-3 on neutral courts in overtime.
- The Huskers, who did not play an overtime game in 2020-21, were 1-2 in overtime games in 2019-20 following an 80-74 OT loss to Ohio State (Feb. 2). It was Nebraska's second overtime loss in Big Ten play, joining a 78-70 OT loss at Michigan State (Dec. 31, 2019). The Huskers opened road action with a 90-85 OT win at Missouri (Nov. 10, 2019).
- The 2019-20 season marked the first time that Nebraska played three overtime games in the same season since 2011-12 - NU's first season in the Big Ten. In 2011-12, the Huskers played a total of seven OT periods in those three games.
 - Nebraska has never played four overtime games in the same season.
- Nebraska's lone overtime game of 2018-19 also came in the Huskers' first road game of the season, but NU suffered an 87-84 double-overtime loss at Washington State (Nov. 16, 2019). It marked the second straight season that Nebraska played a multi-overtime game (also at Drake, Dec. 9, 2017).
- The Huskers went 1-1 in overtime in 2017-18, including a 69-64 overtime loss to No. 23 Michigan at Pinnacle Bank Arena (Jan. 13). The Huskers won their first overtime game of 2017-18 with an 89-85 double-overtime win at Drake (Dec. 9).
- Nebraska was 1-1 in overtime in 2016-17, including a 76-74 win over Michigan State at Pinnacle Bank Arena to close the regular season (Feb. 26, 2017). The Huskers lost 79-69 in OT to Minnesota at the arena (Feb. 4, 2017).
 - The Huskers are 3-5 in overtime games under Coach Amy Williams.
 - Nebraska is 2-3 in overtime games at Pinnacle Bank Arena.
- Nebraska is 5-2 in multi-overtime games with its most recent loss coming in the 87-84 2OT setback at Washington State (Nov. 16, 2018) in Pullman. NU's only other loss in a multi-overtime game came to Purdue in the 2012 Big Ten Championship Game, 74-70 in double-overtime.
- The Huskers defeated Minnesota 88-85 in overtime on Jan. 16, 2014. It marked the first overtime game in the history of Pinnacle Bank Arena. Nebraska's first overtime game in the history of the Bob Devaney Sports Center also came against Minnesota - a 68-67 win for the Huskers on Dec. 30, 1977.
- The Huskers have played 15 all-time overtime games against Big Ten opponents and own a 5-10 record. NU is 4-7 against Big Ten opponents in OT since joining the conference in 2011-12.
- Nebraska played its fourth OT game in 73 meetings with Missouri in a 90-85 OT win at Mizzou Arena (Nov. 10, 2019). All four OT games against the Tigers were settled in a single overtime period.
 - · Nebraska's next most frequent overtime opponents are Big Ten foes Purdue, Minnesota and

Wisconsin. The Huskers and Purdue have played three overtime games in 14 all-time meetings. NU's six total overtimes against Purdue are the most against any team in school history.

- The Huskers also have played three overtime games against Minnesota (24 games), including two of the five overtime games in Pinnacle Bank Arena history.
 - In 18 all-time games with Wisconsin the Huskers have played three overtime contests.
- Nebraska has never played back-to-back overtime games at home. The Huskers have played back-to-back overtime games only once in school history, an 83-81 loss to Texas A&M in College Station on Dec. 30, 1985, before returning to Lincoln for an 80-75 win over Eastern Kentucky at the Devaney Center on Jan. 2, 1986.

NEBRASKA ATTENDANCE FIGURES

- Nebraska ranked No. 20 nationally in average home attendance (4,397 fans per game) over 17 regular-season games at Pinnacle Bank Arena in 2019-20. It marked an increase of 296 fans per game compared to the 2018-19 season, when the Huskers ranked No. 22 nationally (4,101).
- The Huskers have ranked among the top 25 nationally in attendance for 11 consecutive seasons (does not include 2020-21).
- Nebraska has ranked among the top 25 nationally in average home attendance in each of its first seven seasons inside Pinnacle Bank Arena.
- The Huskers opened the 2019-20 season with 5,250 fans at Pinnacle Bank Arena for a Wednesday, noon tip against Alabama A&M on Nov. 6. Nebraska hosted a Life Skills Sportsmanship Pep Rally prior to the game, which included nearly 2,000 students and sponsors from 27 school districts around the Cornhusker State. It was the third-largest opening day crowd in Husker history.
- In 115 all-time home games at Pinnacle Bank Arena, the Huskers own an 81-34 record (.704 winning percentage) while averaging 5,058 fans per game (581,612 total fans/115 games).
- Nebraska attracted a Pinnacle Bank Arena non-conference record crowd of 9,750 to open its stay in the arena with a win over UCLA on Nov. 8, 2013.
- Nebraska set its all-time single-game record with a sellout crowd of 13,595 fans against Missouri at the Devaney Center on Feb. 27, 2010. NU drew 10 straight crowds of more than 10,000 fans at the Devaney Center in 2009-10.
- Nebraska produced its top attendance season in school history by ranking No. 7 nationally with a record 7,390 fans per game at the Bob Devaney Sports Center in 2009-10. The Huskers went 16-0 at the Devaney Center on their way to a perfect 29-0 record, a Big 12 title and a No. 1 seed in the NCAA Tournament.

HAKE SIGNS WITH HUSKERS FOR 2022-23

- Nebraska Head Coach Amy Williams announced the signing of Collin Hake (pronounced CAL-in HAKE), one of the top players in the state of Minnesota, to join the Husker women's basketball program for the 2022-23 season.
- Hake, a senior at Chanhassen High School in 2021-22, signed her National Letter of Intent to join the Huskers on the opening day of the signing period on Wednesday, Nov. 10. Hake originally made her commitment to join the Huskers in July of 2020.
- "We could not be more excited to make things official today by signing Callin Hake to her Letter of Intent," Williams said. "She is going to be a versatile guard that can bring a lot of things to our team on the basketball court. I love that she is committed to playing hard on both ends of the court. Not only is Callin the perfect fit for us on the court, but she fits our family. She is not afraid to work and understands how to be a great teammate."
- Hake enters her senior season at Chanhassen within striking distance of 2,000 career points. The 5-8 guard from Victoria, Minn., has scored 1,633 points, grabbed 442 rebounds and grabbed 147 steals in her high school career.
- Chanhassen's all-time leading scorer, Hake was ranked as the No. 7 player in Minnesota and ranked as the No. 64 player in the nation by Prep Girls Hoops. She was also rated as the No. 98 player in the country by Jr. All-Star National Rankings. She was invited to the U16 Team USA tryouts in Colorado Springs.
- A three-time All-Metro West Conference selection for the Storm, Hake is also a three-time Chanhassen team most valuable player. Hake averaged 21.5 points per game during a junior season that was shortened by the COVID-19 pandemic in Minnesota. She averaged 22.2 points per game as a sophomore and 20.4 points per contest as a freshman at Class 4A Chanhassen.
- Hake has spent six years competing for the UAA Minnesota Fury, helping the team to a national runner-up finish. She was a first-team Minnesota AAU all-state selection in 2021.
- "I chose Nebraska because of the endless opportunities the University has to offer, the coaching staff and their visions and goals, and the tight bond the girls have on and off the court," Hake said. "Also, getting to play in the best conference and go out and battle every single night is something I have always wanted to do.'
- Hake plans to major in marketing at Nebraska. She is the DECA President at Chanhassen High School, a two-year National Honor Society member and a four-year Key Club member.

Game Highlights: Nebraska erupted for one of the best season-opening efforts in school history with a 108-50 victory over Maine at Pinnacle Bank Arena. Nebraska's 108-point performance marked the first time the Huskers reached the century mark under Coach Amy Williams and the first time overall since Nov. 15, 2014. The point total tied for the ninth highest in school history and the third-best total in a season-opening game for the Big Red. The 58-point victory margin tied the largest for the Huskers in a season opener and the seventh-largest spread in any game in NU history. Nebraska raced to a 28-8 first-quarter lead and extended the margin to 52-26 against the defending America East Conference regular-season champion Black Bears at the half. Nebraska outscoed Maine 30-9 in the third. NU's 61.2 field goal percentage was the 11th-best in any game in school history. The Huskers committed just six turnovers while dishing out 26 assists and outrebounded the Black Bears 43-20.

Game Highlights: Nebraska recorded back-to-back 100-point games for the second time in school history, running to a 102-47 win over Prairie View A&M. Game Highlights: Nebraska used a 25-0 firstquarter run and an 18-0 third-quarter run to earn an 88-33 win over Alabama A&M at Pinnacle Bank Arena. Isabelle Bourne scored 16 of her game-high 23 points in Nebraska's 25-0 first-quarter spurt that allowed the Huskers to take a 25-4 lead to the second quarter. Alabama A&M, coached by former Husker Margaret Richards, rallied in the second to outscore Nebraska 15-9 and cut NU's edge to 34-19 at the half. But an 18-0 burst by the Big Red early in the third quarter fueled a 30-10 third period to push the margin to 64-29. Nebraska's defense locked down again in the fourth quarter, outscoring the Bulldogs 20-4 to close out the win. NU's 33 points allowed tied for for the ninth fewest by an opponent in Husker history and just the second time since 1977 that an opponent scored less than 35 points.

Game Highlights: Sam Haiby scored 13 of her team-high 15 points in the second half to help Nebraska hold off a fourth-quarter rally by Creighton in a 67-62 win over the Bluejays at Pinnacle Bank Arena. Haiby, who added five rebounds, five assists and three steals, sealed Nebraska's first win over Creighton under Coach Amy Williams by knocking down a pair of free throws with 5.4 seconds left for the game's final points. The Huskers, who snapped a five-game losing streak in the series with the Jays, led 33-20 at halftime and built the margin to 16 points late in the third quarter before Creighton clawed away at the lead in the fourth. The Jays turned the game into a scrum in the final 12 minutes in an effort to create more possessions and overcome Nebraska's suffocating halfcourt defense. The two teams combined for 32 fouls and two offsetting technicals during that span, and the Huskers prevailed at the free throw line, outscoring CU 22-15 at the stripe.

REDSHIRT SOPHOMORE (2021-22)

Ashley Scoggin has her second season as a starter at Nebraska off to a strong start, averaging 9.0 points, 1.8 rebounds, 3.5 assists and 1.3 steals in just over 22 minutes per game. Scoggin is shooting 52 percent from the field and a sizzling 61.5 percent from three-point range while hitting both of her free throws.

The 23-year-old from Dallas, Ore., opened the season with 12 points and a career-high six assists in a win over Maine (Nov. 9).

REDSHIRT SOPHOMORE (2020-21)

Scoggin earned starts in all 26 games for Nebraska and averaged 8.5 points, 2.1 rebounds and 2.3 assists in 31 minutes per game.

In the victory over Penn State (Feb. 21), Scoggin poured in a career-high 18 points while adding a season-best five assists. She had a 17-point, four-assist effort at lowa (March 6) when she played a career-high 39 minutes.

Scoggin, who produced double figures 13 times, including eight times in the final 12 games, scored 16 each against Minnesota (Jan. 19), Purdue (Dec. 23) and Idaho State (Dec. 6). She added 14 points against No. 7 Maryland (March 11) in the Big Ten Tournament, when she also tied her career high with four threes.

Scoggin scored 13 points in a Postseason WNIT win over UT Martin (March 19).

She scored 11 points in Nebraska's win over No. 15 Northwestern (Dec. 31) before adding 10 points and a career-high five rebounds to complete the season sweep of the Wildcats (Feb. 17). She scored 11 points in a win over Rutgers (Jan. 3), and sank two free throws with 12 seconds left to seal the win. Scoggin added

eight points, including seven in the first quarter, to go along with four assists to help the Huskers win at No. 23 Michigan State (Jan. 10). She had seven points and a career-high five boards in a win over No. 15 Ohio State (Jan. 16).

REDSHIRT FRESHMAN (SALT LAKE CITY CC, 2019-20)

Scoggin averaged 10.0 points, 5.2 rebounds, 2.1 assists and 1.3 steals per game as a redshirt freshman for Salt Lake City CC in 2019-20. She helped lead the 20-7 Bruins to the NJCAA Region 18 title and a share of the Scenic West Athletic Conference championship. Scoggin, who hit nearly 40 percent of her three-point attempts and almost 95 percent of her free throws, earned first-team All-Region 18 honors and was a member of the Region 18 All-Tournament team.

Scoggin's strength and fitness level increased throughout 2019-20 at Salt Lake City CC. At Utah State Eastern on Feb. 22, Scoggin played 40 minutes. She was also a regular double-figure scorer down the stretch for the Bruins. Early in the year, she erupted for a season-high 22 points while knocking down 6-of-9 threes in a win over Eastern Wyoming (Nov. 29). Her play earned her conference player-of-the-week honors.

Scoggin was slowed at the start of the season after undergoing a minor meniscus repair on her knee in September of 2019.

FRESHMAN (SALT LAKE CITY CC, 2018-19)

Scoggin enrolled at Salt Lake City CC prior to the 2017-18 season. She suffered a torn ACL in her right knee on July 13, 2017, and redshirted during the 2017-18 season.

In 2018-19, Scoggin continued to feel discomfort in her right knee and underwent another ACL surgery in November of 2018.

HIGH SCHOOL

Scoggin suffered a torn ACL in left knee in the summer of 2015, prior to her senior season at Westview High School in Portland, Ore. The

SOPHOMORE (2021-22)

Australian National Team guard Jaz Shelley joined the Nebraska women's basketball team for the 2021-22 season, after completing the NCAA transfer process in mid-April.

Shelley has been a difference-maker early for the Big Red, ranking second on the team in scoring (10.5 ppg), while leading the Huskers in rebounding (8.3 rpg), steals (1.8 spg) and blocked shots (1.3 bpg) through four games. She also ranks second on the squad with 4.3 assists. She produced her first career double-

double with 22 points and 11 rebounds in the win over Prairie View A&M (Nov. 11), when she connected on 6-of-9 three-pointers. She added eight points and a career-high 12 rebounds to go with a career-high-tying six assists in a win over Alabama A&M (Nov. 14).

The 5-9 guard from Moe (pronounced MOee), Australia, spent two seasons at Oregon and will have three seasons of eligibility at Nebraska.

Shelley is one of three members of the Australian National Program on the 2021-22 Nebraska roster, joining Isabelle Bourne and Ruby Porter. Bourne and Shelley were teammates for Áustralia's Gems at the 2019 FIBA U19 World Championships that took silver after sending a showdown with Team USA into overtime.

Shelley was the only collegiate player for Australia at the 2021 Asia Cup in Amman, Jordan. She earned a bronze medal in October.

SOPHOMORE (OREGON, 2020-21)

In her second season at Oregon in 2020-21, Shelley played in 22 of 24 games for the Ducks with 11 starts. She missed Oregon's first

two NCAA Tournament games because of injury before competing against No. 8 Louisville in the NCAA Sweet Sixteen. She had an assist and a steal in five minutes against the Cardinals.

For the season, Shelley averaged 4.0 points, 1.7 rebounds and 1.9 assists. She scored in double figures three times, including a seasonhigh 13 points on 5-of-8 shooting in a win over UŠC (Jan. 1, 2021) when she also tied a thencareer high with five assists. She added 11 points in wins over Utah (Dec. 6, 2020) and Washington State (Dec. 21, 2020).

FRESHMAN (OREGON, 2019-20)

Shelley appeared in all 33 games for Oregon as a true freshman in 2019-20, helping the Ducks to Pac-12 regular-season and tournament titles. She averaged 6.3 points, 1.5 assists and 1.0 rebound while hitting 42 percent of her threes.

In her only start as a freshman, Shelley finished with 32 points while setting the Oregon single-game record by going 10-for-14 from three-point range in a win over UC Riverside (Dec. 16, 2019). Her 10 threes tied for the second-best total in NCAA Division I in 2019-20, and she was named the Pac-12 Freshman of the Week following her performance.

She scored double figures six times, including 17 points on 5-of-8 three-point shooting at Long Beach State. She added 14 points while going 4-for-4 from long range in a win over Arizona State (Feb. 9, 2020), and had 10 points on 4-of-5 shooting in a Pac-12 Tournament win over Utah (March 6, 2020).

HIGH SCHOOL

Shelley was chosen to the 23-player Australian Senior National Team (Opals) in 2020. She played for the Australian National program at the 2017 FIBA U19 Women's World Cup, averaging 10.6 points and 3.6 assists, including a tournament-best 26 points on 9-of-18 shooting with five three-pointers in a win over Russia. Trinity Brady has not played for the Huskers through the first three games of 2021-22.

SOPHOMORE (2020-21)

Brady opened her second season at Nebraska as a starter, but an ankle injury suffered in the final minute of a win over Big Sky champion Idaho State (Dec. 6) sidelined her for the rest of the season. Brady averaged 8.5 points, 5.0 rebounds and 2.0 steals in two wins as a starter, but missed the final 24 games of the year.

The 5-11 guard from Indianapolis produced the best game of her career in Nebraska's 90-61 season-opening win over Oral Roberts (Dec. 4). She erupted for a career-high 15 points while adding a career-best five rebounds in the first start of her college career. She hit 5-of-7 shots from the field and all three of her three-point attempts against the Golden Eagles.

She added five more rebounds while setting a career high with four steals against Idaho State.

FRESHMAN (2019-20)

Brady brought strength and versatility to Nebraska's backcourt as a freshman. One of the top high school players in Indiana in 2017-18, Brady completed her prep career at Hamilton Heights Christian Academy in Tennessee.

She missed Nebraska's first 10 games as part of the concussion protocol, before making her regular-season debut in the win over Manhattan (Dec. 22). She played in 17 consecutive games before missing the final three games with tendonitis.

Brady played strong defense while recording two points, four rebounds, an assist and a block

in 16 minutes off the bench against the Jaspers. She hit the first three-pointer of her career and added two assists and her first career steal in the win over Iowa (Dec. 28). Brady's three gave Nebraska a 30-27 second-quarter lead, and the Huskers led the rest of the way.

She sparked a 10-0 first-quarter run at Michigan State with two points, two steals and two rebounds to help Nebraska lead for much of the game against the Spartans before falling in OT on New Year's Eve in East Lansing.

Brady scored a career-high seven points and knocked down a career-best two threes while adding two rebounds in nine minutes off the bench at Rutgers (Jan. 12).

She scored five points in a 10-0 secondquarter run that sparked Nebraska in a rally from a 25-point first-half deficit against No. 18 Indiana (Feb. 9). The Huskers eventually tied the game in the fourth quarter.

Brady scored eight points and had eight rebounds in an exhibition win over Rogers State (Nov. 2). An opponent fell on Brady inside the paint late in the game, contacting her head and shoulder area.

BEFORE NEBRASKA

The final piece of Nebraska's three-player recruiting class, Brady came to Nebraska after completing her senior season at Hamilton Heights Christian Academy in Chattanooga, Tenn. She was ranked as the No. 106 player overall in the 2019 class by Prospects Nation.

The Lady Hawks finished the season No. 18 in the final USA Today Super 25 rankings with a 22-3 overall record. Hamilton Heights Christian Academy fell to Riverdale Baptist in the NACA Championships.

Brady competed for Lawrence North High School in Indianapolis her first three seasons.

As a junior, Brady averaged 21.0 points, 8.5 rebounds and 4.0 assists to earn a spot on the

Allison Weidner (pronounced WIDEner) joins Alexis Markowski as two of the top basketball players the state of Nebraska has produced in recent years.

Weidner is off to a solid start as a Husker, averaging 6.8 points, 4.5 rebounds and 3.3 assists in nearly 17 minutes per game.

She made her Husker debut with nine points, four rebounds and two assists in a season-opening win over Maine (Nov. 9), before adding 11 points, eight rebounds, five assists, a block and a steal against Prairie View A&M (Nov. 11).

Weidner was ranked as the No. 80 player on the ESPN Hoopgurlz Top 100. She was also a two-time first-team Super-State and All-Nebraska selection and earned first-team Class D2 all-state honors in both basketball and volleyball for the Humphrey St. Francis Flyers her junior and senior seasons.

A member of the Class D2 All-Decade Team, Weidner was also an eight-time gold medalist at the Nebraska state track and field meet. Following her remarkable high school career, she was named the Lincoln Journal Star Nebraska Girls Athlete of the Year across all sports in 2021.

HIGH SCHOOL

One of the top small-school players in Nebraska history, Weidner finished her four-year high school career with 2,282 points, 741 assists and 629 steals. Her career point total ranked No. 3 across all classes in Nebraska girls basketball

history, while she became just the 13th player in state history to score 2,000 career points. The star from Humphrey St. Francis High School was a four-time first-team Class D2 All-State selection for Coach Bryan Reichmuth. A first-team all-class, all-state pick by both the Omaha World-Herald and the Lincoln Journal Star as both a junior and senior, Weidner led the state in scoring with 25.0 points per game as a senior, while also leading the state with 6.4 assists per game. Her 6.4 steals per game also ranked second in the state across all classes, while she added 7.0 rebounds per contest. Weidner scored 71 points over three state tournament wins to lead Humphrey St. Francis to the state title.

As a junior, Weidner averaged 25.2 points, 6.1 rebounds, 6.5 assists and a whopping 7.3 steals per game as a junior in 2020. She also led the Flyers to a state runner-up finish while earning a spot on the Class D2 All-Tournament team. She scored a state tournament-best 83 points over three games as a junior. She led St. Francis to a Class D2 state runner-up finish as a freshman and claimed her first all-tournament hold as a sonhomore in 2019.

As a junior in 2020, Weidner nearly notched a quadruple-double with 28 points, 10 assists, 10 steals and 9 rebounds against Elkhorn Valley. She also produced a triple-double with 29 points, 12 rebounds and 10 steals against Fullerton. In the 2020 state tournament, she erupted for a careerhigh 39 points against Mullen. She also had 38 points against Howells/Dodge.

She led the state in assists in 2018 and 2019, while leading the state in steals in 2019.

She guided the Humphrey St. Francis back to the state tournament as a senior in 2020.

Sam Haiby (pronounced HY-bee) has her fourth season at Nebraska off to a solid start, averaging 9.8 points, 3.8 rebounds while leading the team in assists (4.8 apg) and steals (1.8 spg). Haiby scored 13 of her team-high 15 points after halftime to help the Huskers hold on for a 67-62 win over Creighton (Nov. 17).

The returning second-team All-Big Ten guard from Moorhead, Minn., ranks No. 29 in Husker history with 1,078 points. She needs seven points to catch Kate Cain at No. 28 (1,085) and 11 points to match Nafeesah Brown at No. 27 (1,089).

JUNIOR (2020-21)

Haiby earned second-team All-Big Ten honors by averaging team bests of 16.8 points, 4.4 assists and 1.2 steals while adding 6.8 rebounds. She had a career-high 33 points to go with nine rebounds and four assists in a win over Illinois (Dec. 10). Haiby added 28 points against lowa (Feb. 11) and 27 points, nine rebounds and three assists at No. 15 Michigan (Jan. 7).

She scored in double figures 21 times, including 10 20-point games and three double-doubles. Haiby had 25 points and a career-high

12 boards against Minnesota (Jan. 19). She had 24 points, nine rebounds and six assists against No. 7 Maryland (March 11), becoming the 35th 1,000-point scorer in Husker history.

She had 24 points in a win over Wisconsin (Jan. 28), 22 at Illinois (Jan. 25) and Minnesota (Feb. 24), and 20 against Rutgers (Feb. 7) and Colorado (March 20). Her first career double-double came with 11 points and a career-high 12 boards in a win at No. 23 Michigan State (Jan. 10), before getting 11 points and a career-high 10 assists to go with eight rebounds in a win over No. 15 Ohio State (Jan. 16). She had 19 points and the game-winner as time expired in a 65-63 win over No. 15 Northwestern (Dec. 31). Her shot was ESPN's Top Play.

SOPHOMORE (2019-20)

Haiby ranked second in scoring (10.0 ppg) and assists (3.3 apg) while leading Nebraska in steals (1.5 spg) in 2019-20. She had a season-high 28 points in a 90-85 OT win at Missouri (Nov. 10). Her three-pointer with three seconds left sent the game to OT. She added the final field goal and two free throws with 13.3 seconds left in OT to seal the win.

Haiby added 20 points, five rebounds and four steals in a win over ORU (Dec. 14). She had 19 points at Michigan State (Dec. 31). Haiby pitched in 18 points and three threes in a win over Michigan (Jan. 19). She added 17 points and a season-high eight rebounds in a win over No. 24 Minnesota (Jan. 4). Haiby also had 17 points against Creighton (Nov. 24). She had 11 points, a season-high seven assists and three steals in a win over Wisconsin (Jan. 9). She added 11 points, six rebounds and a career-high five steals in the sweep of the Badgers (Jan. 25).

Haiby was NU's No. 2 scorer, averaging 10.0 points, 3.0 rebounds and 2.6 assists off the bench. She scored double figures 15 times, including a season-high 20 points at Washington State (Nov. 16). She had her best Big Ten effort with 17 points against Indiana (Feb. 3). She also had 17 at Creighton (Dec. 2). She was the Big Ten Freshman of the Week after averaging 15.0 points at Purdue (Jan. 31) and Indiana (Feb. 3).

She closed the regular season with 16 points in a win at Penn State (March 2). Haiby also had 16 in a win over No. 23 Minnesota (Jan. 20) and added 16 more at Arkansas (Dec. 18). She had 14 points at No. 24 Miami and led NU with 13 vs. Drake (Nov. 7). She had 13 in a win at Purdue

BEFORE NEBRASKA

Haiby was ranked as the No. 122 player in the country by Prospects Nation and the No. 125 player in the nation by Blue Star. She was also ranked as the No. 28 guard in the country by ESPN. She overcame an early season knee injury as a senior to average 25.1 points, 7.1 rebounds and 5.3 assists per game, including a monstrous 46-point performance in a 54-49 win over White Bear Lake on Dec. 10, 2017. It followed a 45-point effort in a win over Brainerd on Nov. 28. Haiby finished her high school career with more than 2,000 points.

Haiby was also a starting outfielder and pitcher on Moorhead High School's baseball team in the spring of 2017. She was the first pitcher to ever throw a pitch in U.S. Bank Stadium in Minneapolis, taking the mound for the Spuds against the Sartell Sabres. She is the first female in history to pitch a scoreless inning in a Minnesota High School boys baseball game.

GRADUATE/REDSHIRT JUNIOR (2021-22)

MiCole (pronounced MY-coal) Cayton made her first appearance of the season in Nebraska's win over Alabama A&M (Nov. 14). Cayton was held out with an ankle injury in NU's first two games of 2021-22.

GRADUATE/REDSHIRT JUNIOR (2020-21)

Cayton overcame multiple knee injuries to help the Huskers late in the season. The 5-9 graduate transfer guard from Stockton, Calif., originally signed with the Huskers out of high school as part of a top-15 national recruiting class in November 2015.

In the midst of a coaching change at Nebraska, Cayton stayed closer to home at Cal and was an All-Pac-12 Freshman honorablemention choice in 2016-17. She made four total appearances over the next three years at Cal because of knee injuries.

Cayton missed Nebraska's first 12 games of 2021-22 while recovering from offseason knee surgery but was cleared for full-court, full-contact practice for the first time at Nebraska on Jan. 22.

She played her first as a Husker in a win at Illinois (Jan. 25). Cayton played 19 minutes off the bench and made a key steal with 11 seconds left. She went 3-for-4 at the free throw line to help seal the win. It was Cayton's first game since Nov. 24, 2018 (at San Diego).

Cayton scored a Nebraska career-best 10 points by hitting 4-of-6 shots from the field in a win over UT Martin in the opening round of the Postseason WNIT (March 19). The following night she added six points on a pair of three-pointers against Colorado (March 20).

MICOLE CAYTON

5-9 Graduate/Redshirt Junior Guard Stockton, Calif. (St. Mary's/California)

Cayton had four assists in a win over Wisconsin (Jan. 28). She added four assists and two steals at Penn State (Feb. 4).

Cayton scored six points and hit 4-of-6 free throws at Rutgers (Feb. 7). She added two more assists against the Scarlet Knights. She pitched in five points and her first three as a Husker against lowa (Feb. 11), before adding four points and an assist in a win over Penn State (Feb. 21).

(CALIFORNIA, 2017-20)

Cayton missed the entire 2019-20 season with a knee injury. She earned her bachelor's degree from California in May of 2020.

As a redshirt sophomore in 2018-19, Cayton returned to the court for eight minutes in a debut against Pacific (Nov. 18), before playing two minutes against Tulane (Nov. 23) and scoring her only points of the season in a win at San Diego (Nov. 24). She played three total games in her third year before undergoing surgery to repair cartilage damage in her right knee.

As a sophomore, she opened with 13 points, including a career-high three three-pointers in a win over Saint Mary's (Nov. 10), but missed the rest of the year after suffering a torn ACL.

Cayton earned an honorable-mention selection to the Pac-12 All-Freshman Team by starting 13 games for California. For the season, she averaged 5.6 points, 2.5 rebounds, 2.1 assists and 1.0 steal per contest for the Bears. She finished second on the team in steals (34) and third in assists (73).

Cayton started each of Cal's last 12 games, beginning with a career-high 18 points in a win over No. 13 UCLA. She had 11 of her 18 points in the first quarter against the Bruins, and tied her career high with three three-pointers.

In the first round of the Pac-12 Tournament, Cayton had 12 points, four rebounds and three steals in a win over USC (March 1). She also had nine points, including a pair of free throws with 8.8 seconds left to seal Cal's win over Oregon (Feb. 24).

She scored in double figures six times as a freshman, including 13 points against CSU Bakersfield (Nov. 20), going 5-for-7 from the field and a perfect 3-for-3 from three-point range.

Whitney Brown has her second season at Nebraska off to a solid start, averaging 4.3 points in just over nine minutes per game. She has hit 66.7 percent (4-6) of her shots from the floor, including 3-of-4 three-pointers, and both of her free throw attempts.

FRESHMAN (2020-21)

Brown stayed in state to join the Huskers as a preferred walk-on as a freshman in 2020-21. The 5-9 guard from Grand Island played in all 26 games, including her first career start in place of an injured Ruby Porter in an opening-round Postseason WNIT win over UT Martin (March 19). Brown tied her career high with four threes versus the Skyhawks and tied another career best with five boards. She finished with 12 points.

Brown averaged 3.2 points, 1.4 rebounds and 1.0 assist. She also produced NU's best assist-to-turnover ratio (2.3-to-1).

She had her best game with a career-high 14 points including a career-best four threes in a 63-55 win over No. 15 Ohio State (Jan. 16). Brown, who played a career-high 28 minutes while helping the Huskers overcome the absence of second-leading scorer and rebounder Isabelle Bourne, was the second-leading scorer in the game with the previously unbeaten Buckeyes.

She added nine points on 3-of-4 three-point shooting at Penn State (Feb. 4), after scoring six points on back-to-back third-quarter threes in a win over Wisconsin (Jan. 28). She added five points and a career-high five rebounds (all

offensive) against Minnesota (Jan. 19).

Brown played a big role with six points and three rebounds in Nebraska's win over No. 15 Northwestern (Dec. 31) on her birthday. She also had six points and three boards at No. 15 Indiana (Dec. 20). She had three points and a career-high three assists to help the Huskers knock off No. 23 Michigan State (Jan. 10). Brown scored Nebraska's final point at the free throw line to help seal the 68-64 win over the Spartans.

Brown enjoyed a strong debut with five points and a career-high four steals in a 90-61 season-opening victory over Oral Roberts (Dec. 4). She added five more points, two rebounds and two assists in a win over Illinois in Nebraska's Big Ten opener (Dec. 10).

In Nebraska's Big Ten Tournament win over Minnesota (March 10), Brown dished out a careerhigh six assists while adding four rebounds.

She contributed a big three-pointer and a key steal to go along with two assists in Nebraska's win over Rutgers (Jan. 3). Brown added five points, two assists and her first career blocked shot at Rutgers (Feb. 7).

BEFORE NEBRASKA

As a senior at Grand Island Northwest, Brown averaged 17.5 points, 4.0 rebounds, 3.3 assists and 2.0 steals to lead the team to the Class B state tournament.

She earned second-team Super-State honors from the Lincoln Journal Star and second-team All-Nebraska accolades from the Omaha World-Herald. Brown was a first-team Class B pick for the second straight year.

Grand Island Northwest was eliminated with a 48-47 triple-overtime loss to Crete in the state semifinals. Brown scored 19 points and had four assists in the loss.

Brown averaged 16.9 points, 3.3 rebounds, 2.7 assists and 2.9 steals per game in leading Grand Island Northwest to the 2019 Nebraska Class B State Championship. She averaged 21.0 points per game in three state tournament wins for the Vikings, including a 23-point effort in the Class B state championship game against Crete.

Her performance as a junior earned her a spot on the Omaha World-Herald's All-Nebraska First Team, while adding honors on the Lincoln

FRESHMAN (2021-22)

Ruby Porter continues to be a valuable contributor for the Big Red in her second season at Nebraska. One of three members of the Australian National program on the Husker roster, joining Isabelle Bourne and Jaz Shelley, Porter is averaging 4.8 points, 1.5 rebounds and 2.0 assists in 2021-22.

Porter opened with season bests of seven points, three rebounds and four assists in 18 minutes off the bench in a win over Maine (Nov. 9).

FRESHMAN (2020-21)

Porter was Nebraska's first signee across any sport in the fall of 2019, but the last Husker women's basketball player to arrive on campus in August of 2020 because of COVID-19 travel restrictions.

She averaged 4.7 points, 2.2 rebounds and 1.4 assists while playing 21 games. She started 11 times, but missed five games with injuries.

The 5-10 guard from Adelaide, Australia, erupted for a career-best 19 points against No. 9 Maryland (Feb. 14) for her third double-figure scoring effort of the season. She followed with eight points and four rebounds in a win at No. 24 Northwestern (Feb. 17).

She produced back-to-back double-digit efforts in wins over Illinois (Jan. 25) and Wisconsin (Jan. 28). She capped the week with 12 points and two steals against the Badgers. It followed her first career double-figure scoring effort with 11 points and a career-high-matching three threes against the Illini (Jan. 25).

Porter hit three threes in a nine-point effort off the bench in a road win at No. 23 Michigan State (Jan. 10). She opened and closed the second quarter with threes, then hit a huge triple in the fourth quarter to start Nebraska's rally from

a five-point deficit to a 68-64 win.

She tied her career best with three threes while also tying career highs for assists (4) and steals (2) at Iowa (March 6). She played a careerhigh 32 minutes against the Hawkeyes.

Porter started five straight games (Jan. 16-Feb. 4) in place of fellow Australian Isabelle Bourne (ankle injury). She started six games in place of an injured Bella Cravens (ankle) late in the year, before suffering a knee sprain of her own midway through Nebraska's Big Ten Tournament win over Minnesota (March 10).

Porter did not play against Maryland in the Big Ten Tournament or in NU's Postseason WNIT contests with UT Martin and Colorado.

Porter made her collegiate debut in NU's 90-61 win over Oral Roberts (Dec. 4). She had three points, three rebounds, an assist and a steal. She added two points, three rebounds and two assists in a win over Idaho State (Dec. 6).

She made her Big Ten Conference debut with three points on her first career three-pointer to go along with two rebounds and two assists in a career-high 22 minutes off the bench in a win over Illinois (Dec. 10).

Porter added a three-pointer in the first quarter in Nebraska's upset of No. 15 Northwestern (Dec. 31).

She suffered an ankle injury in the first half of a loss at Creighton (Dec. 14) and did not play at No. 15 Indiana (Dec. 20) or Purdue (Dec. 23).

BEFORE NEBRASKA

One of the most talented players in Australia's class of 2020, Porter was a member of the Australian U18 3x3 National Team that competed in the Youth Olympics in Argentina in October 2018, before winning the Asia Cup in the summer of 2019. She also competed at the 2018 World Championships in Minsk, Belarus as part of the Australian U17 National Team (Sapphires).

JUNIOR (2021-22)

Bella Cravens continues to be a solid starter in her second season at Nebraska. The fourth-year college player is averaging 8.5 points, 5.8 rebounds, 1.8 assists, 1.3 blocks and 1.0 steal while helping the Huskers to four straight wins to open the year. She opened with 13 points and eight rebounds in a win over Maine (Nov. 9). Cravens hit 5-of-6 shots from the field and 3-of-4 free throws against the defending America East Conference champions. She added nine points in a win over Creighton (Nov. 17).

Cravens has hit 56.5 percent of her shots from the field on the season, including her first career three-pointer in the win over Alabama A&M (Nov. 14).

JUNIOR (2020-21)

Cravens started 17 games in her first season for Nebraska after transferring from Eastern Washington. The 6-3 forward averaged 6.4 points, 7.6 rebounds, 1.3 assists and 1.1 blocks for the Huskers. She played 23 games, missing three contests in late-February with an ankle injury. She suffered the injury early in a loss to lowa (Feb. 11), and missed games (Feb. 17-24).

Cravens closed the year by averaging 8.5 points and 11.0 rebounds in two Postseason WNIT games. She had seven points and a gamehigh 14 rebounds in a win over UT Martin (March 19), before adding 10 points, eight boards, three assists and two blocks against Colorado (March 20). It was her fifth double-figure scoring game. She added six double-figure rebound games.

She produced her first Husker double-double with a season-high 13 points to go with 11 rebounds in a win over Wisconsin (Jan. 28).

Cravens pulled down a career-high-tying 16 boards in her first Husker start in a Big Ten win

over Illinois (Dec. 10). She added 14 boards in a win over No. 15 Ohio State (Jan. 16). She also had 13 rebounds in a win over Rutgers (Jan. 3). She had 10 rebounds at Purdue (Dec. 23).

Cravens had 12 points at No. 15 Indiana (Dec. 20) and 12 more against lowa (Feb. 11). She got 10 points at No. 15 Michigan (Jan. 7) and pitched in nine points, nine rebounds, three assists and three blocks in a win at No. 23 Michigan State (Jan. 10). She had six points, eight rebounds and three assists in a win over No. 15 Northwestern (Dec. 31).

SOPHOMORE (EASTERN WASHINGTON, 2019-20)

An honorable-mention All-Big Sky pick as a sophomore at Eastern Washington, Cravens averaged 10.4 points and a Big Sky-best 8.5 rebounds while playing 28 games with 26 starts. She ranked 92nd nationally in rebounding

She ranked 92nd nationally in rebounding average. Cravens produced six double-doubles, including a career-high 28 points and 10 rebounds in 20 minutes against Northern Arizona (Feb. 22). She hit 10-of-12 field goals against NAU just two days after going 8-for-8 against Sacramento State (Feb. 18).

She had 18 points and 15 rebounds against Portland State (Feb. 15) and 20 points, career highs of 16 rebounds and five steals, along with a season-high four blocks against Southern Utah (Feb. 27)

During that four-game stretch (Feb. 15-27), Cravens averaged 20.8 points, 12.0 rebounds, 2.8 assists, 2.3 blocks and 1.8 steals while hitting 69.6 percent (32-46) of her field goal attempts.

She scored double figures 14 times, including two 20-point efforts, while grabbing 10 or more rebounds on 10 occasions.

Cravens ranked fifth in the Big Sky and 66th nationally with 1.7 blocks per game. She totaled 96 blocks in two seasons at Eastern Washington, which ranked ninth on the school career charts.

She earned second-team Illinois Class 4A all-state honors for the second straight season in 2021, after leading Benet to a fourth consecutive ESCC league title. Annika (pronounced AH-nick-ah) Stewart, continues to be a key contributor in her second season at Nebraska. The 6-3 forward is averaging 5.3 points and 2.8 rebounds in just under 10 minutes per game off the bench, while helping the Huskers to a perfect 4-0 start.

Stewart opened the year with 12 points and five rebounds in a win over defending America East Conference regular-season champion Maine (Nov. 9). She added six points and four boards in a win over Alabama A&M (Nov. 14).

FRESHMAN (2020-21)

Stewart was the first commitment in Nebraska's signing class, making her intentions known on July 31, 2019.

As a true freshman, she shattered the Nebraska freshman record for three-point field goal percentage (.446). She hit at least one three in each of NU's last nine games, while sinking 60.9 percent (14-23) of her long-range attempts during that stretch.

Stewart played in all 26 games and averaged 6.4 points and 3.0 rebounds in 2020-21. She produced double figures nine times, including a career-high 15 points in just nine minutes in a win over NCAA Tournament-qualifier Idaho State (Dec. 6).

She capped her season with 11 points on 3-of-4 three-point shooting against Colorado in the Postseason WNIT in Memphis (March 20).

Stewart had 13 points on 5-of-6 shooting at Minnesota (Feb. 24) and 10 points on 4-of-5 shooting in a win over Penn State (Feb. 21).

In her collegiate debut, Stewart had 12 points, seven rebounds, an assist, a block and two steals in 16 minutes in a win over Oral Roberts (Dec. 4). She hit her first five shots, including a pair of threes, against the Golden Eagles.

ANNIKA STEWART

6-3 Freshman Forward Minneapolis, Minnesota (Wayzata)

Stewart finished with 13 points, five rebounds, two assists and a block in a win over Wisconsin (Jan. 28), after pumping in 12 points on a career-high three threes at Illinois (Jan. 25). Stewart hit back-to-back threes in a one-minute span midway through the fourth quarter to give the Big Red the lead for good.

Stewart scored 12 points on 5-of-6 shooting, including 2-of-3 threes at Rutgers (Feb. 7). She had 10 points and six boards at Creighton (Dec. 14). She supplied seven big points off the bench including a clutch fourth-quarter three-pointer in NU's upset of No. 15 Northwestern (Dec. 31).

She added a solid game with eight points and six rebounds in a Postseason WNIT win over UT Martin (March 19).

BEFORE NEBRASKA

Stewart averaged approximately 20.0 points, 8.1 rebounds and 1.8 assists while hitting 65.6 percent of her two-point field goal attempts, 41.5 percent (39-94) of her threes and 89.5 percent (51-57) of her free throws as a senior.

She led Wayzata to a 24-5 record with three of its losses coming to national No. 1 Hopkins. In the third meeting, Stewart finished with 27 points in the 6-4A sectional championship game against Hopkins and Gatorade National High School Player of the Year Paige Bueckers.

Over the final 12 games of 2019-20, Stewart turned up her production to 25 points per contest. She opened the 4A playoffs with 27 points in a win over Armstrong, before erupting for a season-high 36 points in a sectional semifinal win over St. Louis Park and future Husker teammate Kendall Coley. Wayzata finished with a final No. 3 ranking in the state.

Stewart earned first-team Class 4A All-State honors, while also earning first-team All-Lake Conference honors. She was also All-Metro.

Stewart averaged 12.2 points and 7.0 rebounds as a junior for 26-3 Wayzata, while earning All-Lake Conference and All-Metro honors. She produced 10.0 points and 6.0 rebounds per game as a sophomore for the 25-3 Trojans to earn All-Lake Conference honors in her first season at the school. She played her eighth grade and freshman seasons in North Dakota

Kendall Coley has her second season at Nebraska off to a strong start, averaging 5.5 points and 3.8 rebounds in 16 minutes per game off the bench. Coley, who enrolled early at Nebraska in January of 2021 after signing with the Huskers in November of 2020, put up career highs with 10 points and seven rebounds in a career-high 19 minutes in a win over Prairie View A&M (Nov. 11).

Bourne notched her third straight doubledouble with a season-high-tying 22 points to go with 11 rebounds in a win over Penn State

She added a double-double with 11 points and a 12 rebounds in a win over Rutgers (Jan. 3).

FRESHMAN (2019-20)

Bourne averaged 5.9 points and 4.4 rebounds while playing in all 30 games. She closed the year with season highs of 16 points and five blocks against Michigan in the Big Ten Tournament (March 5). She added six rebounds, an assist and a steal in 29 minutes against the Wolverines.

She finished the season with four doublefigure scoring efforts - all against Big Ten foes.

Bourne had seven points on 2-of-3 shooting including her first career three-pointer, while adding three boards vs. Creighton (Nov. 24).

Bourne was also named to the Gems squad for the 2018 FIBA Under-18 Asian Championships. Bourne trained at the Australian Institute of Sport and Basketball Australia's Centre of Excellence.

The daughter of Trent and Ann Bourne, Isabelle has an older sister, Callie, who is a guard at Idaho State. Her oldest sister, Emma, also plays in the Canberra Capitals Academy. Callie, a 5-9 guard, averaged 10.0 points and a team-best 8.5 rebound to go along with 3.2 assists over 26 games as a junior at Idaho State in 2020-21, helping the Bengals to the NCAA Tournament.

A communication studies major, Bourne was a Big Ten Distinguished Scholar and earned Academic All-Big Ten honors in 2021. She is also a four-time Nebraska Scholar-Athlete Honor Roll selection. She was a member of the Tom Osborne Citizenship Team in 2020.

Alexis Markowski got her college career off to a solid start by averaging 10.0 points and 5.8 rebounds in 15 minutes per game off the bench while helping Nebraska to a 4-0 start. The 6-3 forward/center out of Lincoln Pius X High School established a career high with 14 points in a win over Prairie View A&M (Nov. 11).

She added 11 big points and four rebounds in just 12 minutes in Nebraska's win over Creighton (Nov. 17). Markowski opened her career with eight points and a career-high seven rebounds in a win over Maine (Nov. 9).

She also had seven points and six rebounds in a win over Alabama A&M.

HIGH SCHOOL

Markowski was named the Nebraska Gatorade State High School Girls Basketball Player of the Year after averaging 23.3 points, 13 rebounds and two blocked shots per game while leading Lincoln Pius X to a second straight Class A state championship in 2021. She was also named the MaxPreps Nebraska Player of the Year after averaging 23.7 points and 19.3 rebounds in three state tournament wins for the Thunderbolts. Lincoln Pius X finished 25-0 and was ranked in the MaxPreps final national top 25. Markowski scored 30 or more points on

Markowski scored 30 or more points on four occasions as a senior, including a careerhigh and Pius X school-record 42 points in a win over Fremont on Jan. 2, 2021. She was also the state's most dominant rebounder, racking up 16 double-doubles and pulling down 20 or more boards on four occasions. In Pius X's Class A state semifinal win over Omaha Central,

Markowski carried the Bolts with 30 points and a season-high 27 rebounds in a 47-38 win. She added 27 points and 19 rebounds in a state championship game win over Fremont the next day.

Also regarded as the top player in Nebraska's largest class in 2019-20 after averaging 21.5 points and 12.1 rebounds per game as a junior, Markowski tied the Nebraska Class A State Tournament scoring record with 80 points over three games to lead Lincoln Pius X to the 2020 state championship. Her performance earned her a second straight appearance on the Class A All-Tournament team, and she was also named the honorary captain of the Omaha World-Herald All-Nebraska and Lincoln Journal Star Super-State teams.

Markowski finished her career with school records of 1,484 and 867 rebounds over 76 varsity games (19.5 ppg, 11.4 rpg). She missed her entire freshman season (2017-18) with a foot injury. The previous Pius X career scoring record was held by former Husker Maddie Simon.

Markowski set the Lincoln Pius X singleseason record with 560 points as a junior, smashing the previous mark (474) held by Simon. Markowski broke her own record with 582 points as a senior, while adding a school-record 325 rebounds, surpassing her 315 boards in 2019-20.

As a sophomore in 2018-19, Markowski earned a spot on the Class A All-Tournament team after leading Pius X to the state semifinals. She averaged 13.7 points and 9.1 rebounds per game, while also setting the school's single-season blocked shot record with 47.

Markowski finished with 10 career 30-point games. She was also a three-time, first-team All-Heartland Athletic Conference selection.

She competed for the Nebraska Lasers in club basketball for her coach and father, former Husker men's basketball player, Andy Markowski,
