## HUSKERS OPEN REGULAR SEASON WITH MAVERICKS

The Nebraska women's basketball team tips off its 2022-23 regular season by taking on Omaha on Monday, Nov. 7 in Lincoln. Tip-off between the Huskers and Mavericks at Pinnacle Bank Arena is set for Noon. The game follows Nebraska's annual Life Skills Sportsmanship Pep Rally, which will welcome more than 2,000 middle grades students from around the state, beginning at 9:30 a.m. Doors to Pinnacle Bank Arena will open at 11 a.m.

A live video stream of the game will be available to subscribers of B1G+, while fans can listen to the call of Matt Coatney and Jeff Griesch on the Huskers Radio Network (B107.3 FM in Lincoln, and ESPN 590 AM in Omaha) and on the Huskers App and Huskers.com. It will be Coatney and Griesch's 700th game together as the broadcast team for Nebraska women's basketball.

Tickets for the game are available through the Nebraska Athletic Ticket Office at Huskers.com or by calling 1-800-8-BIG-RED.

Nebraska enters 2022-23 ranked No. 22 in both Associated Press and USA Today/WBCA Top 25 preseason rankings.

The Huskers will be led on the court by 2022 second-team All-Big Ten selections **Jaz Shelley** and **Alexis Markowski** along with three-year captain and two-time honorable-mention All-Big Ten choice **Isabelle Bourne**. Shelley, one of 20 candidates for the 2023 Ann Meyers Drysdale Award presented to the nation's best shooting guard, was also a Big Ten All-Defensive Team selection by the league media. Markowski, one of 20 candidates for the 2023 Lisa Leslie Award presented to the nation's top center, was the 2022 Big Ten Freshman of the Year and a preseason first-team All-Big Ten choice.

The Huskers were set to return five starters from their 2022 NCAA Tournament team that finished 24-9 overall and 11-7 in the Big Ten, but graduate guard **Sam Haiby** suffered a knee injury in a September workout. Haiby's injury was originally feared to be season-ending, but when she went in for surgery Oct. 27, it was determined that the damage was far less significant than originally expected and she could return to the court this season. No timeline for her return has been set.

Haiby, a 5-9 guard from Moorhead, Minn., is the only player in Husker history to achieve the combined career milestones of 1,000 points (1,381), 500 rebounds (532) and 400 assists (414).

The temporary absence of Haiby could lead to a faster path to maturity for sophomore **Allison Weidner**. The 5-10 guard from Humphrey, Neb., started nine games last season, including NU's final eight contests. In her nine starts, she averaged 9.3 points, 4.4 rebounds and 3.0 assists per game.

Newcomer **Maddie Krull** could play a significant role. The 5-9 guard from Omaha spent two seasons starting all 60 games for a pair of NCAA Tournament teams at South Dakota. In 2021-22, the

**HUSKER NUGGETS**

- Nebraska opens the 2022-23 campaign at No. 22 in the AP Preseason Top 25, its first AP Preseason ranking since 2014.
- The Huskers closed 2021-22 at No. 23 in the NET rankings. NU finished No. 10 nationally in scoring offense (77.8 ppg), No. 12 in assists per game (17.4 apg), No. 13 in assist-to-turnover ratio (1.24), No. 18 in scoring margin (+13.5 ppg), No. 20 in three-point field goal percentage (.357) and No. 21 in three-pointers made per game (8.5).
- Nebraska has hit 10 or more threes 12 times in the last 40 games, including nine times in 2021-22. NU hit a Big Ten Tournament-record 15-of-32 threes against Illinois (March 3), 14-of-28 threes against NC Central (Nov. 20), 14-of-30 at Iowa (Jan. 16), 12-of-29 vs. Drake (Dec. 19), 11-of-20 vs. Purdue (Jan. 30), 11-of-22 vs. Prairie View A&M (Nov. 11), 10-of-19 at San Diego (Nov. 27), 10-of-21 against Minnesota (Feb. 20) and 10-of-28 at Wake Forest (Dec. 1).
- Through the first 20 seasons with the three-point shot in women's basketball (1988-2007), Nebraska hit 10 threes in a game just six times (591 games).
- The Huskers have hit at least one three in 431 straight games dating back to a loss at UTEP on Dec. 20, 2008. Nebraska has hit at least two three-pointers in 310 consecutive games.
- The 2021-22 season marked the first time NU reached 100 points in three games during the same season.
- The Huskers scored 30 or more in a quarter six times in 2021-22. In the previous six years combined, NU produced nine 30-point periods.

Millard South grad helped USD to the NCAA Sweet Sixteen after winning Summit League regular-season and tournament titles. She was a member of the 2021 Summit League All-Newcomer Team.

- Nebraska is also excited for the return of fourth-year guard **Trinity Brady**. The 5-11 junior started the first two games of 2020-21 before suffering an ankle injury that kept her out for the rest of the season. She missed all of 2021-22 with injuries.

- The Huskers also return experienced contributors **Annika Stewart**, **Kendall Coley** and **Kendall Moriarty**, while welcoming **Nailah Dillard** to the court. Dillard has missed two seasons with injuries.

**OPENER WITH OMAHA FEATURES LIFE SKILLS PEP RALLY**

- Nebraska's regular-season opener with Omaha is set for Monday, Nov. 7 at noon, and will include the annual Life Skills Sportsmanship Pep Rally.

- The 2022 Nebraska Life Skills Sportsmanship Pep Rally, which is co-sponsored by the Nebraska High School Hall of Fame, features positive messages from Husker student-athletes, coaches and athletic administrators. This year, the Huskers are expecting more than 2,000 students and more than 200 accompanying staff members from 42 schools across the state of Nebraska.

- The 2022 opener marks the fourth time (2013, 2019, 2021) that Pinnacle Bank Arena and Nebraska women's basketball have teamed with the Nebraska High School Hall of Fame to host the Pep Rally for 6th through 8th grade students. The students and accompanying staff are provided complimentary water from Pepsi and pizza from Nebraska Athletics.

- The Sportsmanship Pep Rally is scheduled to begin at 9:30 a.m. on the main court at Pinnacle Bank Arena and features messages from Nebraska Head Coach Amy Williams and Husker women's basketball players Jaz Shelley and Maddie Krull, along with appearances by Huskers Travis Vokolek (Football), Passmore Mudundulu and Mikey Hoffer (Track & Field), Ally Batenhorst and Lexi Rodriguez (Volleyball), Mya Felder and Sydney Gray (Softball) and a special performances by Champions Forever/Spintacular. The Sportsmanship Pep Rally is expected to conclude at 10:45 a.m.

- Valentine Middle School students will be making the longest journey to Lincoln, nearly five hours and just over 300 miles, while Chambers students will travel nearly 190 miles to the Star City for the Sportsmanship Pep Rally. A strong representation of Northeast, Southeast and Central Nebraska community schools will also be on hand.

- As of Nov. 1, Nebraska had sold 3,541 tickets for the game with Omaha, which will be added to the 2,459 students (2,233) and accompanying staff members (226), which could push official attendance to 6,000 for the opener.

- The largest opening day crowd (9,750) in school history came with the first game ever at Pinnacle Bank Arena against UCLA on Nov. 8, 2013. The No. 2 opening-day crowd came with 5,584 fans in the first season opener in the history of the Devaney Center on Nov. 9, 2012 (North Carolina A&T).

- The previous largest crowd associated with the Nebraska Life Skills Sportsmanship Pep Rally at Pinnacle Bank Arena came with 5,250 for the opener against Alabama A&M on Nov. 6, 2019, which was the third-largest opening day crowd in Nebraska women's basketball history.

- Last season, with the first game in the return of fans after COVID-19, the Sportsmanship Pep Rally game against Maine attracted 4,476 fans.

**SCOUTING THE OMAHA MAVERICKS**

- Third-year head coach Carrie Banks brings Omaha to Lincoln to battle the Huskers. Banks is very familiar with the Big Ten Conference. She spent four seasons as an assistant coach at Ohio State under Kevin McGuff (2016-2020) after spending three seasons (2013-16) at Northwestern under Head Coach Joe McKeown.

- Omaha must replace the loss of its leading scorer and rebounder from a year ago, Mariah Murdie. The 6-3 forward averaged 10.7 points and 6.7 rebounds while playing a team-high 690 minutes over 26 games (25 starts) last season, but chose to shift her attention to volleyball for the Mavs this year.

- The Mavs also lost 6-0 forward Josie Filer (6.7 ppg, 6.1 rpg; transfer to UIC), 5-6 guard Natalie Bartle (6.4 ppg, 3.0 rpg; transfer to Finlandia) and 5-5 guard Alexis Pratt (6.3 ppg, 2.9 rpg; transfer to University of St. Thomas), who ranked second on the team with 686 minutes played while leading the team with 2.3 assists per game. Part-time starter and 5-10 guard Sophie Johnston (3.5 ppg, 1.3 rpg) and 5-8 guard Lauren Frost (3.2 ppg, 1.7 rpg; transfer to Central Missouri) are also gone.

- Omaha returns four starters from last year's squad that finished 7-19 overall and 3-14 in the Summit League. Graduate center Elena Pilakouta (Nicosia, Cyprus) is Omaha's top returning player, averaging 9.8 points and 4.6 rebounds per game.

- Sophomore guard Grace Cave (Weeping Water) returns the most production in the backcourt after averaging 7.4 points and 2.8 rebounds as a freshman. Cave led UNO with 23 three-pointers (.319) on the season while ranking second on the squad in assists (1.9 apg) and steals (1.3 spg).

- Junior Katie Keitges started 20 games for the Mavs last season, the most by a returning player to this year's team. Keitges, a 5-8 guard from Knoxville, Iowa, averaged 4.5 points, 1.9 rebounds, while ranking second on the team with 20 made threes (.323) on the season.

- Senior Sam Mitchell rounds out Omaha's returning starters after averaging 5.9 points over 17 games with 11 starts. Mitchell knocked down 19 threes (.284) last season. The 5-6 guard from Downers Grove, Ill., spent her first two seasons at UAB before transferring to Omaha prior to last season.

- Omaha also returns sophomores Kennedi Grant (4.2 ppg, 2.2 rpg) and Morgann Gardner (1.5 ppg, 1.4 rpg) who both saw significant playing time off the bench a year ago.

- The Mavs are hoping for instant impacts to the lineup being made by transfers Deanay Watson

and Aaliyah Stanley. Watson, a 5-10 graduate guard, spent the last two seasons at Southeast Missouri State. Last season, Watson averaged 10.9 points and 5.6 rebounds while starting 27 of 29 games for the Redhawks. She hit better than 50 percent of her shots from the field, including 48 percent (12-25) of her three-pointers, but SEMO finished 6-23 overall and 2-16 in the Ohio Valley.

- Stanley, a 5-6 senior guard from Boynton Beach, Fla., began her career at Eastern Michigan, averaging 12.4 points, 3.3 rebounds, 1.1 assists and 1.2 steals over 18 games as a freshman in 2019-20. She transferred to Florida Gulf Coast and averaged 9.6 points per game as a sophomore. She knocked down 51 threes (.381) and nearly 85 percent of her free throws. She also claimed a spot on the 2021 ASUN All-Tournament Team by averaging 15.5 points per game over three games. Last season, she played in just 14 games at FGCU and averaged just 8.5 minutes per game. She averaged 3.1 points and hit just 8-of-33 three-point attempts (.242).

- In addition to its two NCAA Division I transfers, the Mavs add a trio of junior college transfers. Russians Ana and Polina Nikulochkina were all-conference guards at Tallahassee (Fla.) Community College last season, averaging in double figures. Polina hit nearly 40 percent of her threes last season, while Ana knocked down better than 30 percent of her long-range attempts. The Nikulochkinas both spent their full high school careers at West Oaks Academy in Orlando.

- Jaylen Townsend adds a third junior college recruit for the Mavs. A native of Edwardsville, Ill., Townsend was an NJCAA Division II Second-Team All-American by World Exposure Report after averaging 12.3 points per game. She helped Johnson County (Kan.) CC to a fifth-place finish in the NJCAA DII Tournament with a 34-2 overall record in 2021-22, after leading JCCC to a runner-up NJCAA DII finish in 2020-21. She hit nearly 40 percent of her threes last season. She averaged nearly 15 points per game as a freshman at Johnson County CC.

- The Mavericks add a pair of true freshmen in Eviyon Richardson and Brooklyn Smith. Richardson is a 5-10 forward from Iowa City, while Smith is a 6-2 freshman center from Waterloo, Iowa.

## NEBRASKA VS. OMAHA SERIES HISTORY

- Nebraska leads the all-time series with Omaha, 16-9, including a 66-58 win at Pinnacle Bank Arena on Nov. 22, 2016, in what was Amy Williams' fourth game as head coach of the Huskers. The game is the only meeting between the schools as Division I opponents. Nebraska rolled to an 80-44 win over the Division II Mavericks on Nov. 26, 2010. UNO announced its intentions to move up to NCAA Division I in March of 2011.

- Last season, Nebraska competed against Omaha in a closed scrimmage at Pinnacle Bank Arena prior to exhibition play.

## MARKOWSKI NAMED TO LISA LESLIE AWARD WATCH LIST

- Nebraska center **Alexis Markowski** was honored as one of 20 candidates nationally on the 2023 Lisa Leslie Award Watch List, announced Oct. 21. Markowski is the only sophomore on the 20-player preseason list.

- The Lisa Leslie Award, presented by the Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame and the Women's Basketball Coaches Association (WBCA), honors the nation's top center in NCAA Division I women's basketball. It is named after three-time All-American and 1994 National Player of the Year Lisa Leslie, who was inducted into the Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame in 2015.

- Markowski made an instant impact in her first season at Nebraska in 2021-22. The 6-2 center out of Lincoln Pius X High School was the Big Ten Freshman of the Year and earned second-team All-Big Ten honors after averaging 12.8 points and a team-best 8.0 rebounds. Markowski, who came off the

bench early in the season before taking over a starting role, was an eight-time Big Ten Freshman of the Week and the USBWA National Freshman of the Week (Jan. 11, 2022).

- Nebraska's Offensive MVP last season, Markowski was a Preseason First-Team All-Big Ten selection prior to the start of the 2022-23 campaign. She helped the Huskers to a 24-9 overall record and a trip to the Big Ten Tournament semifinals a year ago, after averaging team bests of 15.6 points and 8.6 rebounds in Big Ten Conference play. She also hit 54 percent of her shots from the field, including 53.6 percent of her three-point attempts, during league action in 2021-22.

- The Lisa Leslie Award Watch List features several Big Ten posts, including Iowa's Monika Czinano and Indiana's Mackenzie Holmes. Markowski is also scheduled to go head-to-head against Leslie Award Watch List members Jessika Carter from Mississippi State and Elizabeth Kitley from Virginia Tech during the 2022-23 regular season.

- A national committee of top college basketball personnel determined the watch list of 20 candidates for the Lisa Leslie Award. In late January, the watch list of 20 players for the 2023 Lisa Leslie Award will be narrowed to 10, and in late February a final list of five candidates will be selected. In March, the five finalists will be presented to Leslie and the Hall of Fame selection committee with a winner being selected.

**SHELLEY NAMED TO MEYERS DRYSDALE WATCH LIST**

- Nebraska guard Jaz Shelley was honored as one of 20 candidates nationally on the 2023 Ann Meyers Drysdale Award Watch List, announced Oct. 18.

- The Ann Meyers Drysdale Award, presented by the Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame and the Women's Basketball Coaches Association (WBCA), honors the nation's top shooting guard in NCAA Division I women's basketball. It is named after the first player, male or female, selected to an All-America team in four straight college seasons (UCLA, 1975-78).

- In her first season at Nebraska in 2021-22, Shelley made one of the greatest impacts of any Big Ten newcomer, earning second-team All-Big Ten honors and a spot on the Big Ten All-Defensive Team. One of the nation's top long-range shooters, Shelley set the Nebraska record and tied the Big Ten Tournament record by connecting on nine three-pointers in NU's second-round tournament win over Illinois in Indianapolis on March 3, 2022. She finished with a career-high 32 points against the Fighting Illini.

- Over the final six games of 2021-22, Shelley averaged 19.5 points and 4.0 made threes per game.

- For the season, Shelley hit 40.6 percent (82-202) of her three-pointers on her way to averaging a team-best 13.1 points per game. She also led the Big Red in assists (5.0 apg), steals (1.8 spg) and blocked shots (0.9 bpg), while adding 6.3 rebounds per game. Shelley helped the Huskers to a 24-9 overall record that included a trip to the 2022 NCAA Tournament after advancing to the Big Ten Tournament semifinals.

- Along the way, the 5-9 guard from Moe, Australia notched six double-doubles, including just the fourth triple-double in Nebraska history with 14 points, 10 rebounds and 10 assists in a win over North Carolina Central on Nov. 21, 2021.

- The Ann Meyers Drysdale Award Watch List is loaded with Big Ten shooting guards, which creates the possibility of Shelley going head-to-head against other candidates in as many as seven games during the 2022-23 regular season. Other shooting guard watch list candidates on Nebraska's schedule include Leigha Brown (Michigan, Dec. 28, Lincoln; Feb. 12, Ann Arbor), Diamond Miller (Maryland, Dec. 4, College Park; Jan. 22, Lincoln), Sara Scalia (Jan. 1, Indiana, Bloomington) and Taylor Mikesell (Ohio State, Jan. 24, Lincoln). Shelley's first match-up against another Meyers Drysdale Award candidate comes against Virginia Tech's Ashley Owusu in the ACC/Big Ten Challenge in Blacksburg on Dec. 1. Owusu was the 2021 Ann Meyers Drysdale Award winner as a guard at Maryland.

- A national committee of top college basketball personnel determined the watch list of 20 candidates for the Ann Meyers Drysdale Award. In late January, the watch list of 20 players for the 2023 Ann Meyers Drysdale Award will be narrowed to 10, and in late February a final list of five candidates will be selected. In March, the five finalists will be presented to Meyers Drysdale and the Hall of Fame selection committee with a winner being selected.

- The winner of the 2023 Ann Meyers Drysdale Award will be presented along with the other four members of the Women's Starting Five, including the Nancy Lieberman Award (Point Guard), Cheryl Miller Award (Small Forward), Katrina McClain Award (Power Forward) and the Lisa Leslie Award (Center).

## HUSKERS SHUT DOWN ICHABODS IN EXHIBITION

- **Alexis Markowski** produced a double-double with 18 points and 10 rebounds, while fellow post **Isabelle Bourne** pitched in 12 points and eight boards, as Nebraska worked its way to a 70-27 exhibition women's basketball win over Washburn at Pinnacle Bank Arena on Sunday, Oct. 30.
- Markowski, a preseason first-team All-Big Ten choice, hit 7-of-10 shots from the field for the game, including 5-of-7 in the first half. In the second period, she went on a 9-0 run in a 2:16 stretch to turn a 21-11 Nebraska lead into a 30-11 advantage. Bourne extended the NU run with her second three-pointer of the game before adding another basket to help the Huskers cap an 18-0 second-quarter run. That Big Red surge allowed Nebraska to take a 42-13 lead to halftime.
- Bourne (3) and Markowski (2) also combined for five of Nebraska's seven blocked shots on the day, while both added steals.
- Sophomore **Annika Stewart** pitched in nine points off the bench for the Big Red, as the Huskers outscored the IChabods 38-14 in the paint.
- In the backcourt, sophomore **Kendall Moriarty** scored seven points while adding three rebounds and three assists. **Allison Weidner** contributed six points and six rebounds, while **Maddie Krull** added six points of her own on a pair of three-pointers.
- All-Big Ten guard **Jaz Shelley** managed four points and a game-high four assists in just 23 minutes, while Trinity Brady added five points, four boards and two assists. Freshman **Callin Hake** rounded out the scoring for Nebraska with three points to go along with six rebounds and a pair of assists in just 15 minutes. **Kendall Coley** also contributed three rebounds, two assists and two steals.
- As a team, Nebraska hit 41.5 percent (27-65) of its shots from the field, including 8-of-23 three-pointers (.348). The Huskers held Washburn to just 17.8 percent (8-45) shooting, including just 1-of-16 three-pointers. Aubree Dewey led the IChabods with eight points, while freshman Gabi Artis pitched in seven points.
- Nebraska controlled the boards, 49-33, and won the turnover battle, 21-10.

## HUSKERS COMPETE IN CLOSED SCRIMMAGE WITH UMKC

- **Isabelle Bourne** led four Huskers in double figures with a game-high 20 points, while **Jaz Shelley** added a double-double with 15 points and a game-high 11 assists as Nebraska worked its way to an 87-60 win over Kansas City in a closed scrimmage at Pinnacle Bank Arena on Saturday, Oct. 22.
- **Allison Weidner**, who added a strong effort with 14 points, four rebounds and four assists, put up a strong second quarter, while **Annika Stewart** came off the bench to round out the Huskers in double digits with 11 points and eight rebounds, including a strong fourth quarter.
- **Alexis Markowski** threatened a double-double of her own with seven points and a game-high nine rebounds, while **Trinity Brady** returned to action for the first time since Dec. 6, 2020, to score eight points on perfect 3-for-3 shooting in a start. **Nailah Dillard** also made her first appearance in a Nebraska uniform since transferring to the Huskers prior to the 2020-21 season. She managed three points and a rebound.
- As a team, Nebraska hit 51.6 percent (32-62) of its shots from the field against a scrappy, hard-working Kansas City squad led by first-year head coach Dionnah Jackson-Durrett. The Huskers also knocked down 9-of-25 threes (.360), and out-rebounded the Roos, 49-32.

## NEBRASKA'S 2022 ALL-BIG TEN HONORS

- **Alexis Markowski** (Lincoln, Neb.) captured Big Ten Freshman-of-the-Year honors from both the conference coaches and media when the league announced its annual awards on March 1. Markowski was also the only unanimous choice on the coaches' five-player Big Ten All-Freshman Team, while claiming second-team All-Big Ten honors from both the coaches and media. An eight-time Big Ten Freshman of the Week, Markowski averaged a double-double each of the final five weeks of the regular season.
- **Jaz Shelley** (Moe, Australia) joined Markowski on the All-Big Ten Second Team by both the coaches and media. The 5-9 guard was the only player in the Big Ten to rank among the top 20 in the league in all five major statistical categories - scoring (16th), rebounding (15th), assists (5th), steals (T5th) and blocks (13th). Shelley was one of five players on the media's Big Ten All-Defensive Team.
- **Isabelle Bourne** (Canberra, Australia) joined Sam Haiby on the coaches' honorable-mention All-Big Ten team. The 6-2 forward was also an honorable-mention choice in 2020-21. Bourne surged down the stretch in 2021-22, averaging 13.2 points and 4.6 rebounds over the final 13 games.
- **Sam Haiby** (Moorhead, Minn.) claimed All-Big Ten accolades for the second time by earning honorable-mention recognition from the coaches and media. A second-team All-Big Ten choice in 2020-21, Haiby continued to prove herself as one of the most versatile guards in the league, averaging 11.0 points, 4.5 rebounds and 3.9 assists in her fourth season. She is the first Husker in history to achieve the combined career milestones of 1,000 points (1,381), 500 rebounds (532) and 400 assists (414).

## 2021-22 BIG RED DOMINANT AT PINNACLE BANK ARENA

- Nebraska tied a school record by winning 16 home games at Pinnacle Bank Arena in 2021-22. The Huskers finished 16-1, matching the 1997-98 (16-0), 2009-10 (16-0) and 2013-14 (16-2) teams for most home wins. Coach **Amy Williams** was a senior guard on Nebraska's 1997-98 team coached by 2022 Women's Basketball Hall of Fame inductee Paul Sanderford.
- Nebraska's 16 home wins matched UNLV for the most regular-season home wins in NCAA Division I women's basketball in 2021-22.
- The Huskers didn't just win at home, they won big, posting the largest home combined cumulative margin of victory in school history despite losing a game to Big Ten co-champion Iowa (Jan. 9). The

2021-22 Huskers produced a total victory margin of 429 points (25.2 ppg). The 2009-10 Huskers that earned a No. 1 seed in the NCAA Tournament and finished No. 3 in the AP final regular-season poll won their 16 games by a total of 388 points (24.3 ppg).

- Nebraska delivered double-digit margins in 15 of 16 home wins, including wins over top-10 Michigan (79-58) and Indiana (72-57) teams, with only Creighton falling by single digits (67-62).
- The Huskers also ranked No. 14 nationally in total attendance (76,317) and 18th in average home attendance (4,489).

## NEBRASKA BY THE NUMBERS

• Nebraska's **three wins over top-10 opponents in 2021-22** marked just the second time in school history the Huskers posted multiple wins over top-10 teams in the same season, joining the 2009-10 campaign when NU also recorded three top-10 victories.

• The Huskers ranked among the **top 25 teams nationally** in 10 statistical categories, including scoring offense (10th, 77.8), assists per game (12th, 17.4 apg), assists (13th, 574), assist-to-turnover ratio (13th, 1.24), three-point field goals made (15th, 279), scoring margin (18th, +13.5 ppg), three-point field goal percentage (20th, .357), three-point field goals made per game (21st, 8.5 pg), total rebounds (24th, 1,380) and rebounds per game (24th, 41.8 rpg). The Big Red also ranked 26th in three-point field goal attempts (781), 27th in field goal percentage (.445), 28th in defensive rebounds per game (28.7 rpg) and 35th in rebound margin (+6.3 rpg).

• **Nebraska led the Big Ten** in field goal percentage defense (.385), three-point field goals made per game (8.5) and team rebounding average (41.8 rpg), while ranking second in the Big Ten in scoring margin (+13.5 ppg), three-point field goal percentage defense (.278), offensive rebounds (13.1 rpg), defensive rebounds (28.7 rpg), assists (17.4 apg) and assist-to-turnover ratio (1.24).

• Nebraska's 2,568 points in 2021-22 marked the No. 3 total in school history trailing only 2,801 (1979-80, 40 games) and 2,632 (2009-10). NU's 77.8 points per game marked its highest scoring average since 1987-88 (82.4 ppg).

• Nebraska's minus-21 foul disparity (28-7) at Iowa (Jan. 16, 2022) marked the largest foul differential in program history (by NU or opponent) in 1,461 games over 48 seasons. It marked the first time in history that a Husker team held a negative foul differential of greater than 17. In NU's other 32 games in 2021-22, the Huskers posted a positive foul differential of +1.5 per game.

• **NU hit a school-record 279 threes** in 2021-22, surpassing the previous mark of 250 (2017-18).

## MARKOWSKI 2022 BIG TEN FRESHMAN OF THE YEAR

• **Alexis Markowski** made her mark in her first season with her hometown Huskers, capturing the 2022 Big Ten Freshman-of-the-Year award. Markowski led Nebraska in rebounding (8.0 rpg) while ranking second on the team in scoring (12.8 ppg).

• An eight-time Big Ten Freshman of the Week, Markowski increased her production to 15.4 points, 9.1 rebounds and 1.2 steals over the final 20 games of 2021-22 as a starter. The 6-2 forward/center hit 50.9 percent (110-216) from the field and 50 percent (19-38) from three-point range as a starter.

• Markowski captured six of the final eight Big Ten Freshman-of-the-Week awards and was named the USBWA Tamika Catchings National Freshman of the Week (Jan. 11).

• Markowski was the only freshman from a Power Five conference to average 12.0 points and 6.0 rebounds per game in 2021-22. Her 265 rebounds led all Power Five freshmen, while her 421 points ranked No. 3 among Power Five freshmen.

• Markowski's numbers compared favorably to the freshman campaigns of the three best forwards in Husker history, including 1993 Wade Trophy winner and first-team All-American Karen Jennings (13.4 ppg, 6.6 rpg, 1989-90); 2010 first-team All-American Kelsey Griffin (13.3 ppg, 6.0 rpg, 2005-06) and 2014 first-team All-American Jordan Hooper (14.6 ppg, 6.6 rpg, 2010-11).

## SHELLEY SHINES AT NBA SUMMIT

• **Jaz Shelley** was one of just 15 student-athletes from around the nation invited to attend the inaugural NBA Student-Athlete Summit during Summer League action in Las Vegas (July 12-15, 2022).

• Shelley spent the week participating in panel discussions, networking sessions and behind-the-scenes tours of the NBA Summer League. Shelley, a 22-year-old sports media and communication major at Nebraska, was the only active student-athlete from the Big Ten Conference to attend the event, which is a branch of the NBA's SALA platform - an events and media company that brings together a diverse group of accomplished leaders from across a wide variety of industries.

• "It was an incredible experience. I was fortunate to hear from and communicate with some very highly decorated professionals affiliated with the NBA. It was an intense two days with speaking events, networking conventions and watching NBA games, but it was so much fun. It really opened my eyes to a whole new world of sport," Shelley said. "The summit helped me narrow down my options for a career outside of basketball. I was able to pick the brains of the people working in my dream jobs, which helped me soak up so much more knowledge and insight. I hope to build on those connections I made in Las Vegas and continue to make steps in the direction of my career after basketball."

• The focus of the NBA Student-Athlete Summit is to bring the best and brightest college women's basketball players who aspire to work in sports together in order to connect with NBA team and league executives along with broadcast partners who are interested in filling future roles across their organizations.

## NEBRASKA'S HISTORY OF HOME SUCCESS

- The Huskers are 494-168 (.746) all-time at home.
- Nebraska tied the school record for home victories by going 16-1 at Pinnacle Bank Arena in 2021-22, the 16th time the Huskers have posted double-figure home victory totals in the last 19 seasons.
- The Huskers were 15-4 at Pinnacle Bank Arena in 2015-16 after going 12-3 (13-3 at home) in 2014-15. The Huskers are 105-38 (.734) all-time at PBA since the building opened in 2013-14. The Big Red went 16-2 at home in 2013-14, suffering their only Big Ten loss to Purdue, 77-75, on Jan. 19, 2014. NU's 16 home wins in 2013-14 tied the school record for single-season home victories.
- The Huskers played the first regular-season game in arena history against USA Today No. 25 UCLA (Nov. 8, 2013) and rolled to a 77-49 win over the Bruins. NU's first win over an AP Top 25 team came with a 76-56 win over No. 24 Michigan State on Feb. 8, 2014. The Huskers added their first-ever win over an AP Top 10 team at the arena with a 94-74 victory over No. 8 Penn State on Feb. 24, 2014.
- NU won its first Big Ten home game at Pinnacle Bank Arena with a 66-65 thriller over Northwestern Jan. 2, 2014, before an 88-85 win over Minnesota on Jan. 16, 2014, marked the first overtime game.
- NU suffered its first loss at the arena to Washington State (76-72) on Nov. 30, 2013.
- The Huskers are 45-3 all-time in home season openers, following a 108-50 win over Maine on Nov. 9, 2021. Nebraska has won 15 of its last 16 season openers.
- Nebraska played in the Devaney Center from 1976-77 through 2012-13, and added one appearance at Devaney against Utah on Nov. 23, 2014. The Huskers own a 389-130 record at the Devaney Center, including 146-88 (.624) mark in conference play.

## HUSKERS RADIO NETWORK COVERS WORLD

- The Huskers Radio Network is in its second season of producing and marketing the live broadcasts of Nebraska women's basketball in 2022-23, but play-by-play announcer Matt Coatney and color commentator Jeff Griesch team up for their 22nd season as the Husker broadcast team.
- Nebraska's regular-season opener with Omaha is expected to be Coatney and Griesch's 700th women's basketball broadcast together.
- The Huskers Radio Network will carry every game, home and away, around the world for free on Huskers.com, marking the 22nd year that all of Nebraska's women's basketball games have been free and available to fans. In addition to carrying every women's basketball game free on Huskers.com, the Huskers Radio Network flagship stations B107.3 FM-KBBK (Lincoln) and ESPN 590 AM-KXSP (Omaha) provide strong signals for Husker women's basketball. When a network conflict occurs in Omaha, the Huskers also can be heard on CD105.9 FM-KKCD. 880-AM-KRVN (Lexington) also provides a huge AM signal statewide in central Nebraska, while more than 20 stations carry the Huskers Radio Network's women's basketball coverage across the state and the Midwest.
- Inside Pinnacle Bank Arena, fans can access the direct radio call of the game at 87.7 FM.

## NEBRASKA POSTS 17TH STRAIGHT PERFECT GSR

- In the eyes of the NCAA's Division I Graduation Success Rate (GSR), the Husker women's basketball program has been perfect for 17 consecutive years. Nebraska is the only program among the 14 Big Ten Conference schools to accomplish the perfect score for 17 straight seasons.
- The NCAA announced the release of its annual Graduation Success Rate report Dec. 2, 2021, and Nebraska was a national leader in women's basketball for the 17th straight season, dating back to the initial public tracking of the GSR since 2004-05.
- The Nebraska women's basketball program joins the Husker women's tennis and volleyball programs as Husker teams that have produced perfect 100 percent rates each of the last 17 years.
- Overall, the Nebraska Athletic Department produced a record-high GSR for the 11th consecutive year, reaching 95 percent.
- Nebraska continues to lead NCAA Division I in Academic All-Americans across all sports (348) and NCAA Today Top Ten Award winners (18). More than 100 Huskers have also earned NCAA Postgraduate Scholarships in history.

## NEBRASKA OVERTIME FACTS

- Nebraska is 23-25 all-time in overtime games, including 12-12 at home, 8-10 in true road games and 3-3 on neutral courts in overtime.
- The Huskers, who did not play an overtime game in 2020-21, were 1-2 in overtime games in 2019-20 following an 80-74 OT loss to Ohio State (Feb. 2). It was Nebraska's second overtime loss in Big Ten play, joining a 78-70 OT loss at Michigan State (Dec. 31, 2019). The Huskers opened road action with a 90-85 OT win at Missouri (Nov. 10, 2019).
- The 2019-20 season marked the first time that Nebraska played three overtime games in the same season since 2011-12 - NU's first season in the Big Ten. In 2011-12, the Huskers played a total of seven OT periods in those three games.
- Nebraska has never played four overtime games in the same season.
- Nebraska's lone overtime game of 2018-19 also came in the Huskers' first road game of the season, but NU suffered an 87-84 double-overtime loss at Washington State (Nov. 16, 2019). It marked the second straight season that Nebraska played a multi-overtime game (also at Drake, Dec. 9, 2017).

- The Huskers went 1-1 in overtime in 2017-18, including a 69-64 overtime loss to No. 23 Michigan at Pinnacle Bank Arena (Jan. 13). The Huskers won their first overtime game of 2017-18 with an 89-85 double-overtime win at Drake (Dec. 9).

- Nebraska was 1-1 in overtime in 2016-17, including a 76-74 win over Michigan State at Pinnacle Bank Arena to close the regular season (Feb. 26, 2017). The Huskers lost 79-69 in OT to Minnesota at the arena (Feb. 4, 2017).

- The Huskers are 3-5 in overtime games under Coach Amy Williams.

- Nebraska is 2-3 in overtime games at Pinnacle Bank Arena.

- Nebraska is 5-2 in multi-overtime games with its most recent loss coming in the 87-84 2OT setback at Washington State (Nov. 16, 2018) in Pullman. NU's only other loss in a multi-overtime game came to Purdue in the 2012 Big Ten Championship Game, 74-70 in double-overtime.

- The Huskers defeated Minnesota 88-85 in overtime on Jan. 16, 2014. It marked the first overtime game in the history of Pinnacle Bank Arena. Nebraska's first overtime game in the history of the Bob Devaney Sports Center also came against Minnesota - a 68-67 win for the Huskers on Dec. 30, 1977.

- The Huskers have played 15 all-time overtime games against Big Ten opponents and own a 5-10 record. NU is 4-7 against Big Ten opponents in OT since joining the conference in 2011-12.

- Nebraska played its fourth OT game in 73 meetings with Missouri in a 90-85 OT win at Mizzou Arena (Nov. 10, 2019). All four OT games against the Tigers were settled in a single overtime period.

- Nebraska's next most frequent overtime opponents are Big Ten foes Purdue, Minnesota and Wisconsin. The Huskers and Purdue have played three overtime games in 14 all-time meetings. NU's six total overtimes against Purdue are the most against any team in school history.

- The Huskers also have played three overtime games against Minnesota (24 games), including two of the five overtime games in Pinnacle Bank Arena history.

- In 18 all-time games with Wisconsin the Huskers have played three overtime contests.

- Nebraska has never played back-to-back overtime games at home. The Huskers have played back-to-back overtime games only once in school history, an 83-81 loss to Texas A&M in College Station on Dec. 30, 1985, before returning to Lincoln for an 80-75 win over Eastern Kentucky at the Devaney Center on Jan. 2, 1986.

**NEBRASKA ATTENDANCE FIGURES**

- Nebraska finished No. 14 nationally in total home attendance (76,317) while ranking 18th in NCAA Division I women's basketball in average home attendance (4,489). Nebraska's 16 home regular-season wins (16-1) at Pinnacle Bank Arena also led the nation in 2021-22.

- Nebraska ranked No. 20 nationally in average home attendance (4,397 fans per game) over 17 regular-season games at Pinnacle Bank Arena in 2019-20. It marked an increase of 296 fans per game compared to the 2018-19 season, when the Huskers ranked No. 22 nationally (4,101).

- The Huskers have ranked among the top 25 nationally in attendance for 12 consecutive seasons (not including 2020-21 when no fans were allowed at Pinnacle Bank Arena).

- In 143 all-time home games at Pinnacle Bank Arena, the Huskers own a 105-38 record (.734 winning percentage).

- In 132 games with attendance allowed (excludes games during COVID pandemic in 2020-21), the Huskers have averaged 4,984 fans per game (657,929 total fans/132 games).

- Nebraska attracted a Pinnacle Bank Arena non-conference record crowd of 9,750 to open its stay in the arena with a win over UCLA on Nov. 8, 2013.

- Nebraska set its all-time single-game record with a sellout crowd of 13,595 fans against Missouri at the Devaney Center on Feb. 27, 2010. NU drew 10 straight crowds of more than 10,000 fans at the Devaney Center in 2009-10.

- Nebraska produced its top attendance season in school history by ranking No. 7 nationally with a record 7,390 fans per game at the Bob Devaney Sports Center in 2009-10. The Huskers went 16-0 at the Devaney Center on their way to a perfect 29-0 record, a Big 12 title and a No. 1 seed in the NCAA Tournament.

A second-team All-Big Ten selection and a member of the media's Big Ten All-Defensive Team, Jaz Shelley was the only player in the Big Ten to rank among the top 20 in the conference in scoring, rebounding, assists, steals and blocked shots in 2021-22. The 5-9 point guard from Moe, Australia led Nebraska in scoring (13.1 ppg), assists (5.0 apg), steals (1.8 spg) and blocks (0.9 bpg), while ranking second on the squad in rebounding (6.3 rpg). She notched a triple-double with 14 points, 10 rebounds and 10 assists in just 20 minutes in a win over North Carolina Central (Nov. 20). She set the Nebraska school record and tied the Big Ten Tournament record by draining nine three-pointers in a win over Illinois (March 3) when she erupted for a career-high 32 points. She also struck for 30 points on 6-of-7 three-point shooting while adding seven rebounds and a career-high four blocks in a win over Drexel (Nov. 26).

**Game Highlights:** Alexis Markowski notched a double-double with 18 points and 10 rebounds, while Isabelle Bourne contributed 12 points and eight boards as Nebraska powered its way to a 70-27 win over NCAA Division II Washburn in an exhibition game at Pinnacle Bank Arena. Markowski (9) and Bourne (5) combined for 14 points in a decisive 18-0 Nebraska run midway through the second quarter that put the game out of reach. The duo combined for 23 points in the first half, helping the Huskers build a 42-13 halftime lead. A scrappy Washburn team continued to fight hard in the second half, holding the Huskers to just 28 points after halftime. But Nebraska continued to play solid defense, holding the Ichabods to just 14 in the final 20 minutes. The Huskers held Washburn to just 17.8 percent shooting from the field, including 1-for-16 from three-point range for the game. The Big Red also limited Washburn to just two assists, while forcing 21 turnovers. Nebraska dished out 20 assists on its 27 made baskets while committing just 10 turnovers on the afternoon. All 10 Huskers who played in the game recorded at least one assist and one rebound.

## JUNIOR (2022-23)

Australian National Team member Jaz Shelley returns for her second season as a Husker. The 5-9 guard from Moe, Australia (pronounced MO-ee) will hunt for All-Big Ten honors while helping the Huskers pursue a second straight NCAA Tournament bid.

A second-team All-Big Ten selection in 2021-22, Shelley was honored as one of 20 shooting guards nationally on the Ann Meyers Drysdale Award Watch List.

## SOPHOMORE (2021-22)

Shelley led Nebraska in scoring (13.1 ppg), assists (5.0 apg), steals (1.8 spg) and blocks (0.9 bpg) while ranking second in rebounding (6.3 rpg). She was the only Big Ten player to rank among the top 20 in all five statistical categories in 2021-22.

She erupted for a career-high 32 points (11-16 FG) with a Nebraska and Big Ten Tournament record-tying nine threes in a win over Illinois (March 3). She added seven assists. It was her second 30-point and fifth 20-point performance of the season.

Shelley poured in 30 points in a 65-53 win over Drexel (Nov. 26). She added seven boards and a career-high four blocks. She added 16 points and a

career-high four steals in a win at San Diego (Nov. 27).

Shelley had 21 points and five threes at Illinois (Feb. 12). She scored 20 in a road win at Wisconsin (Feb. 23) and led NU with 18 points, six rebounds and six assists in a win at Wake Forest (Dec. 1). She closed Big Ten play with 17 points in a win over Northwestern (Feb. 27). She added 15 points, five assists, four rebounds, three blocks and three steals in a win at Minnesota (Dec. 6) and 17 points in a win over Indiana State (Dec. 11).

Shelley produced her first triple-double with 14 points, 10 rebounds and 10 assists in just 20 minutes in a win over NC Central (Nov. 20). She had her first career double-double with 22 points and 11 boards against Prairie View A&M (Nov. 11), when she connected on 6-of-9 threes. Shelley added points-rebounds double-doubles vs. Wyoming (12-11), No. 8 Michigan (12-12) and No. 22 Iowa (14-11).

Shelley had a double-double with 12 points and a career-high-tying 12 boards in a 79-58 win over No. 8 Michigan (Jan. 4), before getting a double-double with 12 rebounds and 11 assists in a win over Penn State (Feb. 3). She also had 15 points and nine rebounds at No. 6 Indiana (Jan. 13).

The 5-9 guard from Moe (pronounced MO-ee), Australia, spent two seasons at Oregon. Shelley and Husker teammate Isabelle Bourne were teammates for the silver-medal winning Gems at the 2019 FIBA U19 World Championships.

## SOPHOMORE (OREGON, 2020-21)

Shelley played 22 games with 11 starts. She missed Oregon's first two NCAA Tourney games with injury before facing No. 8 Louisville. She had an assist and a steal in five minutes.

Shelley averaged 4.0 points, 1.7 rebounds and 1.9 assists. She had a season-high 13 points in a win over USC (Jan. 1) when she tied a then-career high with five assists. She added 11 points vs. Utah (Dec. 6) and Washington State (Dec. 21).

## FRESHMAN (OREGON, 2019-20)

Shelley averaged 6.3 points, 1.5 assists and 1.0 rebound over 33 games to help Oregon to a pair of Pac-12 titles. In her only start, Shelley had 32 points and set the Oregon record by going 10-for-14 from three-point range in a win over UC Riverside (Dec. 16, 2019). She was the Pac-12 Freshman of the Week. She scored double figures six times, including 17 points (5-8 3FG) at Long Beach State. She added 14 points (4-4 3FG) in a win over Arizona State (Feb. 9), and had 10 points in a Pac-12 Tourney win over Utah (March 6).

Australia won gold at the 2016 FIBA U17 World Championship for the first time in history. She also played for Australia at the 2016 FIBA U18 Oceania Championship and the 2015 FIBA U16 Oceania Championship.

## PERSONAL

The daughter of Phil and Carolyn (Caz) Shelley, Jaz has a sister, Sam, and two brothers, Luke and Austin. Jaz was born May 13, 2000.

Both her parents played basketball competitively in Australia and Jaz's father was her shooting coach. Her older brother, Luke, played basketball at NCAA Div. II Kentucky Wesleyan, where he was a senior in 2013-14. Her younger brother, Austin, is a freshman guard at West Texas A&M in 2021-22.

An advertising and public relations major, Shelley earned spots on the Nebraska Scholar-Athlete Honor Roll in the fall and spring semesters of 2021-22. She was also a member of the 2022 Tom Osborne Citizenship Team. She was the only active player from the Big Ten to attend the NBA Student-Athlete Summit in July of 2022.

### JUNIOR (2022-23)

Trinity Brady hopes to return to the court for the Huskers after missing all of the 2021-22 season and all but the first two games of 2020-21 with injuries.

Brady enjoyed a strong summer of consistent training and earned starts in Nebraska's closed scrimmage against UMKC (Oct. 22) and an exhibition win over Washburn (Oct. 30).

Brady is an outstanding communicator, a consistent shooter, an efficient player and a solid rebounder.

### SOPHOMORE (2021-22)

Brady redshirted in 2021-22.

### SOPHOMORE (2020-21)

Brady opened her second season at Nebraska as a starter, but an ankle injury suffered in the final minute of a win over Big Sky champion Idaho State (Dec. 6) sidelined her for the rest of the season. Brady averaged 8.5 points, 5.0 rebounds and 2.0 steals in two wins as a starter, but missed the final 24 games of the year.

The 5-11 guard from Indianapolis produced the best game of her career in Nebraska's 90-61 season-opening win over Oral Roberts (Dec. 4). She erupted for a career-high 15 points while adding a career-best five rebounds in the first start of her college career. She hit 5-of-7 shots from the field and all three of her three-point attempts against the Golden Eagles.

She added five more rebounds while setting a career high with four steals against Idaho State.

### FRESHMAN (2019-20)

Brady brought strength and versatility to Nebraska's backcourt as a freshman. One of the top high school players in Indiana in 2017-18, Brady completed her prep career at Hamilton Heights Christian Academy in Tennessee.

She missed Nebraska's first 10 games as part of the concussion protocol, before making her regular-season debut in the win over Manhattan (Dec. 22). She played in 17 consecutive games before missing the final three games with tendonitis.

Brady played strong defense while recording two points, four rebounds, an assist and a block in 16 minutes off the bench against the Jaspers. She hit the first three-pointer of her career and added two assists and her first career steal in the win over Iowa (Dec. 28). Brady's three gave Nebraska a 30-27 second-quarter lead, and the Huskers led the rest of the way.

She sparked a 10-0 first-quarter run at Michigan State with two points, two steals and two rebounds to help Nebraska lead for much of the game against the Spartans before falling in OT on New Year's Eve in East Lansing.

Brady scored a career-high seven points and knocked down a career-best two threes while adding two rebounds in nine minutes off the bench at Rutgers (Jan. 12).

She scored five points in a 10-0 second-quarter run that sparked Nebraska in a rally from a 25-point first-half deficit against No. 18 Indiana (Feb. 9). The Huskers eventually tied the game in the fourth quarter.

Brady scored eight points and had eight rebounds in an exhibition win over Rogers State (Nov. 2). An opponent fell on Brady inside the paint late in the game, contacting her head and shoulder area.

### BEFORE NEBRASKA

The final piece of Nebraska's three-player recruiting class, Brady came to Nebraska after completing her senior season at Hamilton Heights Christian Academy in Chattanooga, Tenn. She was ranked as the No. 106 player overall in the 2019 class by Prospects Nation.

The Lady Hawks finished the season No. 18 in the final USA Today Super 25 rankings with a

three rebounds, five assists and a block. She added eight points at Maryland (Feb. 6).

Weidner had nine points in a win over Maine (Nov. 9), before adding 11 points, eight rebounds and five assists against Prairie View A&M (Nov. 11). She added eight points, eight rebounds and eight assists in a win over NC Central (Nov. 20). She had 10 points, five boards, three assists and two steals in a win over Drake (Dec. 19).

Weidner had seven points in a win over No. 8 Michigan (Jan. 4), before adding nine points against No. 22 Iowa (Jan. 9).

### HIGH SCHOOL

Weidner finished her high school career with 2,282 points, 741 assists and 629 steals. Her point total ranked No. 3 in Nebraska history, while she became just the 13th player in the state to score 2,000 points. The star from Humphrey St. Francis was a four-time first-team Class D2 All-State pick for Coach Bryan Reichmuth. A first-team all-class, all-state choice by the Omaha World-Herald and the Lincoln Journal Star as a junior and senior, Weidner led the state in scoring (25.0 ppg) and assists (6.4 apg) while ranking second in steals (6.4 spg). She added 7.0 rebounds. Weidner scored 71 points over three state tournament wins to lead Humphrey St. Francis to the title.

As a junior, Weidner averaged 25.2 points, 6.1 rebounds, 6.5 assists and 7.3 steals. She led the Flyers to a state runner-up finish as a Class D2 All-Tournament team choice. She scored a state tournament-best 83 points over three games as a junior. She led St. Francis to a Class D2 state runner-up finish as a freshman and claimed her first all-tournament honor. Weidner also guided the Flyers to a state bid as a sophomore in 2019.

As a junior in 2020, Weidner nearly notched a quadruple-double with 28 points, 10 assists, 10 steals and 9 rebounds against Elkhorn Valley. She had a triple-double with 29 points, 12 rebounds and 10 steals against Fullerton. In the 2020 state tournament, she had a career-high 39 points against Mullen. She also had 38 points against Howells/Dodge. She led the state in assists in 2018 and 2019, and in steals in 2019.

Weidner was also a first-team all-stater in volleyball while leading St. Francis to a state

Haiby scored 10 of her 13 points in the fourth quarter to rally NU to a 70-67 win at Minnesota (Dec. 6). She had 10 points, six rebounds, four assists and three steals in a 79-58 win over No. 8 Michigan (Jan. 4). She ranks No. 8 in assists (414) and No. 15 on NU's all-time scoring list (1,381) and is the only Husker in history to achieve the combined career milestones of 1,000 points, 500 rebounds (532) and 400 assists.

### JUNIOR (2020-21)

Haiby was second-team All-Big Ten with team bests of 16.8 points, 4.4 assists and 1.2 steals while adding 6.8 rebounds. She had a career-high 33 points to go with nine boards in a win over Illinois (Dec. 10) and had 28 points against Iowa (Feb. 11). She had 27 points and nine rebounds at No. 15 Michigan (Jan. 7). She scored in double figures 21 times, including 10 20-point games and three double-doubles. Haiby had 25 points and a career-high 12 boards against Minnesota (Jan. 19). She had 24 points, nine rebounds and six assists against No. 7 Maryland (March 11), becoming the 35th Husker to score 1,000 points.

She had 24 points against Wisconsin (Jan. 28), 22 at Illinois (Jan. 25) and Minnesota (Feb. 24), and 20 against Rutgers (Feb. 7) and Colorado (March 20). She got her first double-double with 11 points and a career-high 12 boards in a win at No. 23 Michigan State (Jan. 10). She had 11 points, a career-high 10 assists and eight boards in a win over No. 15 Ohio State (Jan. 16). She had 19 points and the game-winner as time expired in a 65-63 win over No. 15 Northwestern (Dec. 31). Her shot was ESPN's Top Play.

### SOPHOMORE (2019-20)

Haiby was ranked second in scoring (10.0 ppg) and assists (3.3 apg) and led NU in steals (1.5 spg). She had a season-high 28 points in a 90-85 OT win at Missouri (Nov. 10). Haiby had 20 points, five rebounds

### GRADUATE (2022-23)

Sam Haiby (pronounced HY-bee) suffered a knee injury on Sept. 12, which was originally thought to be season ending. However, after undergoing surgery on Oct. 27, Haiby's prognosis was upgraded significantly, and she is expected to return to the court this season. No timeline for her return has been set.

### SENIOR (2021-22)

Haiby averaged 11.0 points, 4.5 rebounds, 3.9 assists and 1.4 steals in her fourth season at Nebraska. She had a season-high 20 points to go with six rebounds and three steals against Gonzaga in the NCAA Tournament (March 18). She added 19 points and a career-high six steals at Michigan State (Dec. 30) and 18 points against No. 22 Iowa (Jan. 9).

Haiby led NU with 16 points, including nine in the fourth period, in a win over No. 10 Michigan (March 4). She added 15 points and eight boards against No. 12 Iowa (March 5). Haiby scored 10 of her 14 points in the fourth quarter to lead NU to a win over No. 5 Indiana (Feb. 14). She added 14 points, six rebounds and five assists in a win over Minnesota (Feb. 20).

She scored 13 of her 15 points after halftime to help NU to a 67-62 win over Creighton (Nov. 17). She added 15 points in a 64-56 win at San Diego (Nov. 27) and had 15 more in an 89-68 run past Drake (Dec. 19).

### FRESHMAN (2022-23)

One of the top players in talent-rich Minnesota in 2021-22, Callin Hake (pronounced CAL-in HAKE), joins the Nebraska women's basketball program for the 2022-23 season. The 5-8 guard from Victoria, Minn., scored more than 2,000 points and pulled down more than 500 rebounds in her four-year career at Chanhassen High School.

As a senior, Hake averaged 22.2 points per game and finished her career as Chanhassen's all-time leading scorer and rebounder. Hake was ranked as the No. 7 player in Minnesota and No. 64 player in the nation by Prep Girls Hoops. She was also rated as the No. 98 player in the country by Jr. All-Star National Rankings. She was invited to the U16 Team USA tryouts in Colorado Springs.

Hake signed her National Letter of Intent to join the Huskers on the opening day of the signing period on Nov. 10, 2021. Hake originally made her commitment to join the Huskers in July of 2020.

"Callin is a versatile guard that can bring a lot of things to our team on the basketball court," Nebraska Coach Amy Williams said. "I love that she is committed to playing hard on both ends of the court. Not only is Callin the perfect fit for us on the court, but she fits our family. She is not afraid to work and understands how to be a great teammate."

### HIGH SCHOOL

A four-time first-team All-Metro West Conference selection for the Storm, Hake was

also a four-time Chanhassen team most valuable player. She captured Metro West Player-of-the-Year honors as a senior in 2021-22 after averaging 22.2 points per game. She became Chanhassen's first career 2,000-point scorer after a 26-point, 12-rebound performance against Cooper on Jan. 31, 2022. That performance followed a then-career-high and Chanhassen-record 37-point effort in a win over Waconia (Jan. 30). She topped that mark with 38 points in a win over New Prague (Feb. 18).

A McDonald's All-America Midwest nominee, Hake earned honorable-mention All-Metro accolades from the Minneapolis Star-Tribune as a senior. She was also named to the Metro West Conference All-Defensive Team before capping her high school career by playing in the Minnesota Girls Basketball Coaches Association All-Star Series. She claimed the MGBCA Three-Point Championship by draining 14 three-pointers in 45 seconds.

As a junior in a COVID-shortened 2020-21 season, Hake averaged 21.5 points per game. She averaged 22.2 points per game as a sophomore and 20.4 points per contest as a freshman at Class 4A Chanhassen.

She entered her junior season with high school career totals of 1,633 points, 442 rebounds, 147 steals and 120 assists. She added 599 points as a senior to finish with 2,232 career points.

She hit 43.1 percent of her three-pointers while also leading Benet Academy in steals and deflections as a junior 2019-20. She led Benet to a No. 1 ranking in Illinois and a No. 23 team rank nationally at one point as a junior. In 2019, Moriarty was invited to the USA 16U National Team trials, advancing to the top 68.

6-3 Sophomore Forward Plymouth, Minnesota (Wayzata)

## FRESHMAN (2020-21)

As a true freshman, Stewart shattered the Nebraska freshman record for three-point field goal percentage (.446). She sank at least one three in each of NU's last nine games, hitting 14-of-23 (.609) during the stretch.

She played in all 26 games and averaged 6.4 points and 3.0 rebounds with nine games in double figures, including a season-high 15 points in nine minutes in a win over NCAA Tournament-qualifier Idaho State (Dec. 6).

She capped her season with 11 points on 3-of-4 three-point shooting against Colorado in the Postseason WNIT in Memphis (March 20).

Stewart had 13 points on 5-of-6 shooting at Minnesota (Feb. 24) and 10 points on 4-of-5 shooting in a win over Penn State (Feb. 21).

In her debut, Stewart had 12 points, seven rebounds, an assist, a block and two steals in 16 minutes in a win over Oral Roberts (Dec. 4). She hit her first five shots, including a pair of threes.

Stewart finished with 13 points, five rebounds, two assists and a block in a win over Wisconsin (Jan. 28), after pumping in 12 points on a career-high three threes at Illinois (Jan. 25). Stewart hit two threes in a one-minute span in the fourth quarter to give NU the lead for good.

Stewart scored 12 points at Rutgers (Feb. 7). She had 10 points and six boards at Creighton (Dec. 14). She had seven points, including a fourth-quarter three in a win over No. 15 Northwestern (Dec. 31). She added eight points and six boards in a Postseason WNIT win over UT Martin (March 19).

## BEFORE NEBRASKA

Stewart averaged 20.0 points and 8.1 rebounds while hitting 65.6 percent of her two-point field goal attempts, 41.5 percent (39-94) of her threes and 89.5 percent (51-57) of her free throws as a senior. She led Wayzata to a 24-5 record with three of its losses coming to national No. 1 Hopkins. In the third meeting, Stewart had 27 points in the 6-4A sectional championship game against Hopkins and Gatorade National High School Player of the Year Paige Bueckers.

Over the final 12 games, Stewart averaged 25 points. She opened the 4A playoffs with 27 points in a win over Armstrong, before scoring a season-high 36 points in a semifinal win over St. Louis Park and Husker teammate Kendall Coley. Wayzata finished No. 3 in the state.

Coley came to Nebraska as the top-ranked player in a top-25 recruiting class for the Huskers. Kendall Coley enters her third season at Nebraska planning to make a greater impact for the Huskers. One of the top recruits in the nation in the Class of 2021, Coley enrolled early at Nebraska (January 2021) because of disruptions to the high school season in Minnesota caused by the pandemic.

After beginning her career on the wing in 2020-21, Coley made the move to power forward last season to provide depth behind All-Big Ten teammate Isabelle Bourne. While Coley gained the experience at power forward, she will likely add depth and versatility in a hybrid role on the perimeter in 2022-23.

### FRESHMAN (2021-22)

Coley was a contributor in her second season at Nebraska, averaging 2.4 points and 1.7 rebounds over 27 games in 2021-22. Coley put up career highs of 11 points, seven rebounds and two blocked shots in a win over North Carolina Central (Nov. 20).

She produced her first career double-figure scoring effort with 10 points and seven rebounds in a career-high 19 minutes in a win over Prairie View A&M (Nov. 11). She added eight big points to go with two rebounds, an assist and a block in NU's 86-60 win at Wake Forest in the Big Ten/ACC Challenge (Dec. 1). Coley had seven points on perfect shooting to go along with two rebounds and a steal in NU's 79-58 win over No. 8 Michigan (Jan. 4).

She opened the season with six points, a rebound and an assist in a win over Maine (Nov.

Markowski posted six 20-point games including 22 in a Big Ten Tournament win over Illinois (March 3), and had six double-doubles.

She had 16 points and 12 rebounds in a win over Northwestern (Feb. 27). She had 10 points and a career-high 15 rebounds in a win over No. 5 Indiana (Feb. 14). She had 23 points and 15 boards at No. 21 Ohio State (Feb. 10). Markowski had her first career 20-point game and seven rebounds in a 79-58 win over No. 8 Michigan in her first career start (Jan. 4). She added 23 points and seven boards at Penn State (Feb. 17). She had 15 points and nine boards in a win over Minnesota (Feb. 20) and 14 points and eight boards vs. No. 22 Iowa (Jan. 9).

She erupted for a career-high 27 points on 10-of-12 shooting (6-of-7 3FG) at Iowa (Jan. 16). Her effort included 16 first-quarter points as she outscored the Hawkeyes 16-14 to help NU to a 30-14 lead. She had 23 points, including 20 in the second half, in a win over Purdue (Jan. 30).

Markowski notched her first double-double with 17 points and 10 boards off the bench in a run past Indiana State (Dec. 11). She added a second straight double-double with 15 points and 10 rebounds in a win over Drake (Dec. 19).

She had 15 points in a win over Wisconsin (Jan. 27) and 14 in a win over Prairie View A&M (Nov. 11). She added 11 points in 12 minutes in a win over Creighton (Nov. 17) and had 11 points and six boards at Michigan State (Dec. 30).

## HIGH SCHOOL

Markowski was the Nebraska Gatorade and MaxPreps State High School Player of the Year after averaging 23.3 points, 13 rebounds and two blocks while leading Lincoln Pius X to a second straight Class A state title in 2021. A member of the Summit League All-Newcomer Team as a true freshman at South Dakota, Krull helped the Coyotes win the Summit League Tournament title and advance to the 2021 NCAA Tournament.

One of five Coyotes to play in all 25 games, she became the first freshman starter at USD since 2016. She ranked fourth on the team by averaging 9.2 points per game, while adding 3.8 rebounds and 2.4 assists per game.

She scored in double figures 13 times, including her first career 20-point game with 20 points in a win over North Dakota State (Feb. 27). She also put up 15 points on three other occasions during Summit League action.

The Millard South High School graduate started all 60 games of her career at USD, helping the Coyotes to a pair of Summit League titles and two trips to the NCAA Tournament.

Krull's tenacity and intelligence should fit in well with Nebraska's experienced backcourt.

## FRESHMAN (SOUTH DAKOTA, 2021-22)

Krull started all 35 games for a South Dakota team that advanced to the NCAA Sweet Sixteen. For the season, Krull averaged 6.8 points, 4.0 rebounds, 2.1 assists and 1.3 steals in 31.5 minutes per game.

A tough, talented and versatile guard all over the court, Krull had 13 points, three rebounds and four assists while playing the full 40 minutes in USD's first-round NCAA Tournament victory over Ole Miss.

She added six points, seven rebounds, two assists and three steals to help the Coyotes to a 61-47 upset of No. 7 Baylor (March 20) to advance to propel them to the Sweet Sixteen.

As a freshman, Mendelson averaged 8.0 points, 5.6 rebounds, 0.7 assists, 0.3 steals and 1.6 blocks per game.

She was a three-time letterwinner in volleyball and passed the 1,000 career kills milestone in two and a half years. In 2021, Mendelson totaled 407 kills on .294 hitting with 59 aces and earned third-team AVCA All-America and first-team All-Region 1 honors. She was the Utah Gatorade High School Player of the Year.

As a sophomore, Mendelson was an outside hitter who helped Fremont to third place at the state tournament and a Region 1 championship. She had 417 kills on .312 hitting and earned 6A first-team all-state recognition by the Deseret News, Region 1 Most Valuable Player and All-Area MVP by the Standard-Examiner for the second straight year.
