Nebraska kicks off its 133rd football season on Saturday when the Huskers take on the Northwestern Wildcats at the Aer Lingus Classic at Aviva Stadium in Dublin, Ireland. Saturday's season opener will be the 1,358th game in Nebraska football history but only the second played on foreign soil.

The only other international game in Husker history was Nebraska's victory over Kansas State at the 1992 Coca-Cola Classic in Tokyo, Japan. One year later, Wisconsin defeated Michigan State at the 1993 Coca-Cola Classic in Tokyo, which to date is the only Big Ten Conference game played outside of the United States. Saturday's game marks the earliest date of a conference matchup in Big Ten history.

Head Coach Scott Frost begins his fifth season at his alma mater in 2022, while Saturday's contest will mark Pat Fitzgerald's 200th game as Northwestern's head coach. Nebraska won last year's matchup in Lincoln 56-7, scoring its most points ever in a Big Ten Conference game and posting its largest margin of victory (49 points) in a Big Ten game and in any conference game since 2001.

Before last year's Husker win, each of the previous four meetings between Nebraska and Northwestern had been decided by one score, including back-to-back overtime wins for the Wildcats in 2017 and 2018. Overall, eight of the first 11 Big Ten meetings between the two programs have been one-score games.

Nebraska returns 46 letterwinners from last year's team, bringing back five full-time defensive starters and four offensive starters plus nine other players (seven on offense and two on defense) who started multiple games in 2021. The Huskers have bolstered their roster with the addition of 44 newcomers, including 22 transfers, 18 of whom have previous playing experience at the FBS or FCS level.

THIS WEEK'S NUMBERS

Saturday's game between Nebraska and Northwestern is the earliest date of a conference game in Big Ten history. The previous earliest date of a Big Ten Conference game came last season when Nebraska traveled to Illinois on Aug. 28.

The Aer Lingus Classic will mark just the second international conference matchup in Big Ten history. The only other Big Ten game played on foreign soil was Wisconsin's 41-20 win over Michigan State on Dec. 5, 1993, at the Coca-Cola Classic in Tokyo, Japan.

Six of the first 11 Big Ten Conference matchups between Nebraska and Northwestern have been decided by three or fewer points (2011, 2012, 2013, 2015, 2017, 2019). The Huskers and Wildcats have also had two overtime contests in the past five matchups.

SERIES HISTORY: NEBRASKAVS. NORTHWESTERN

Saturday's matchup between Nebraska and Northwestern will be the 16th all-time between the two schools, with Nebraska holding a 9-6 series advantage. The Huskers are 6-5 against the Wildcats since Nebraska joined the Big Ten and the series has a history of close games.

- Nebraska won last year's meeting 56-7 in Lincoln, posting its highest point total and largest margin of victory in a Big Ten Conference game. Overall, last year's meeting marked the Huskers' largest margin of victory in any conference game since a 59-0 win at Baylor during the 2001 Big 12 season.
- Despite last year's lopsided score, eight of the 11 meetings since Nebraska joined the Big Ten have been decided by eight or fewer points, including four of the past five games. Northwestern is 5-3 in those eight one-score games, as each of the Wildcats' five conference victories over Nebraska have come by eight or fewer points and by an average of 4.6 points, including two overtime wins.
- The schools met four times prior to Nebraska joining the Big Ten, with the Huskers holding a 3-1 edge in those matchups. Nebraska defeated Northwestern, 66-17, in the 2000 Alamo Bowl, a Husker record for points scored in a bowl game.

BRIEF RECAPS OF CLOSE GAMES IN THE SERIES

- Northwestern 21, Nebraska 13 (Nov. 7, 2020): After Northwestern drove 80 yards for a touchdown on its opening possession, the Huskers shut out the Wildcats the rest of the first half to take a 13-7 lead into the locker room. But Northwestern shut out Nebraska 14-0 in the second half. Trailing by eight, Nebraska drove to the Wildcat 14-yard line on its final drive, but Luke McCaffrey's fourth-down pass was broken up in the end zone with one second remaining.
- Nebraska 13, Northwestern 10 (Oct. 5, 2019): Although Northwestern never led, the Wildcats
 tied the game at 10-10 with 11:20 to play in the third quarter. Neither team would score again
 until the final snap of the game. Northwestern drove into Husker territory with just over a minute
 remaining, but Lamar Jackson intercepted an Aidan Smith pass, and Nebraska drove 42 yards in six
 plays covering one minute to set up Lane McCallum's game-winning, walk-off 24-yard field goal.
- Northwestern 34, Nebraska 31 in OT (Oct. 13, 2018): Nebraska nearly handed Northwestern its only Big Ten West loss of the 2018 season, but the Huskers were unable to hold a 10-point lead with less than three minutes remaining. Trailing 31-21, Northwestern got a field goal to pull within seven with 2:27 remaining in regulation. After Nebraska went 3-and-out and took just 24 seconds off the clock, the Wildcats drove 99 yards in eight plays to score the game-tying touchdown with 12 seconds remaining. Nebraska then threw an interception on its overtime possession, and Northwestern won the game on a walk-off 37-yard field goal from Drew Luckenbaugh.
- Northwestern 31, Nebraska 24 in OT (Nov. 4, 2017): Northwestern ended the 2017 season with an eight-game winning streak which included an NCAA-record three consecutive overtime wins, the final of which came against Nebraska. The Huskers used a 10-0 third quarter to build a 24-17 lead, but Clayton Thorson tied the game on a touchdown run with 5:32 remaining in regulation. Thorson then gave the Wildcats the lead with a one-yard touchdown run on the first overtime series. Nebraska failed to score on its overtime drive, as a fourth-down pass was broken up.
- Northwestern 30, Nebraska 28 (Oct. 24, 2015): In a back-and-forth game that featured five lead changes, Northwestern held on during an eventful fourth quarter. The Wildcats led 20-19 entering the final period, but Nebraska took a 22-20 lead just five seconds into the quarter. Northwestern answered with 10 straight points to build a 30-22 lead before a Tommy Armstrong Jr. three-yard touchdown run. Trailing 30-28, Nebraska failed on its two-point conversion attempt, and Northwestern picked up three first downs on its ensuing possession to run out the game's final 4:18.
- Nebraska 27, Northwestern 24 (Nov. 2, 2013): Northwestern led 21-7 less than 20 minutes into the game, but the Huskers scored a single touchdown in both the third and fourth quarter to tie the score and set the stage for a dramatic final two minutes. With the game tied at 21, a Northwestern interception gave the Wildcats a 1st-and-goal situation with 2:25 remaining. Northwestern had to settle for a go-ahead field goal, and the Huskers got the ball back trailing 24-21 with 1:14 remaining. Nebraska converted a 4th-and-15 to keep its comeback hopes alive, and then on the game's final play, Ron Kellogg III found Jordan Westerkamp on a 49-yard Hail Mary as time expired.
- Nebraska 29, Northwestern 28 (Oct. 20, 2012): Northwestern scored a single touchdown in all four quarters, including a final touchdown that gave the Wildcats a 28-16 lead with 8:31 remaining. But Nebraska drove 80 yards for a touchdown in just 2:36 on its ensuing possession to cut the lead to 28-23. The Blackshirts then held the Wildcats to a 3-and-out, giving Nebraska the ball back with 4:10 to play. The Huskers covered 76 yards for the go-ahead touchdown with 2:08 remaining, but the game was not over. Northwestern began its next drive on its own 25-yard line and drove to the Husker 36-yard line, but the Wildcats' potential go-ahead 53-yard field goal with 1:10 left missed wide right.

NOTING LAST YEAR'S GAME

- Nebraska's 49-point margin of victory tied its largest ever in the Northwestern series. It also marked Nebraska's largest margin of victory in a Big Ten Conference game and was its largest in any conference game since 2001.
- The 56-point outburst was Nebraska's highest scoring game under Scott Frost and the Huskers' highest point total since 2013.
- Nebraska finished with 427 rushing yards for its second-highest total in a Big Ten Conference game, and the most in any game since 2014.
- Nebraska totaled 657 yards of offense, marking its second 600-yard game of the 2021 season and sixth 600-yard game under Scott Frost. Northwestern had not allowed a 600-yard offensive output since 2005.
- Running back Jaquez Yant rushed 13 times for 127 yards after entering the game with five career carries for 25 yards.
- True freshman offensive tackle Teddy Prochazka made his first career start at left tackle. He was just the second true freshman to ever start at left tackle for Nebraska and only the seventh true freshman offensive lineman to start a game for the Huskers.

HUSKER HISTORY IN SEASON OPENERS

Nebraska has an impressive history in season openers. The Huskers have won 98 of their 132 season openers, winning their first game more than 76 percent of the time while posting a 98-29-5 record.

- Nebraska is 32-4 in its first game of the season dating back to 1986.
- The Huskers are opening a season away from home for the third straight year, the only three times this century that Nebraska has played its season opener away from Lincoln. NU is beginning a season at a neutral site for the first time since the fourth-ranked Huskers shut out No. 24 West Virginia, 31-0, on Aug. 28, 2004 at the Kickoff Classic in East Rutherford, N.J., to begin a 13-0 national championship season.
- Nebraska is 11-3 when it opens the season against a conference opponent. The Huskers are facing a conference foe in the season opener for just the fifth time since 1950, but Saturday marks the third consecutive year that Nebraska begins the season with a Big Ten Conference game.

NEBRASKA NEARLY PERFECT IN AUGUST

Saturday's game will mark the 16th August game in the history of Nebraska football. The Huskers have lost just once in the month, bringing a 14-1 record into the contest with Northwestern.

- Nebraska is not only 14-1 all-time in the month of August, but the average score of those 14 games has been 39-16. The Huskers are 7-1 in August when facing a current Power Five Conference opponent, with the average score of those six contests being 34-12.
- In the history of Nebraska football, Saturday's contest will mark the earliest date of a conference game in Husker history. Overall, the Aug. 27 date is the third-earliest date ever for a Nebraska season opener.
- Saturday's game is officially dubbed the "Aer Lingus Classic", marking the first time Nebraska has opened a season by playing in a "Classic" since kicking off the 2002 season at home against Arizona State in the Black Coaches Association Classic.

SATURDAY'S MATCHUP A RARITY IN BIG TEN CONFERENCE

Saturday's season opener between Nebraska and Northwestern in Dublin, Ireland, is a rarity for the Big Ten Conference for two reasons: the date and the location.

- Saturday's game marks the earliest date of a conference game in Big Ten history. Including this year, there have been only six conference matchups in August in the history of the Big Ten Conference, and Nebraska has played in two of those six contests.
- Saturday's game also marks only the second Big Ten Conference game played on foreign soil. The only other international conference game in Big Ten history came in 1993, when Wisconsin defeated Michigan State 41-20 at the Coca-Cola Classic in Tokyo, Japan. The previous year, Nebraska picked up a Big Eight Conference victory over Kansas State in the 1992 Coca-Cola Classic in Tokyo.
- Saturday will also mark just the second time a Big Ten team has played in Europe. Penn State entered this season as the only Big Ten team to play a game in Europe, as the Nittany Lions defeated UCF, 26-24, on Aug. 30, 2014, in Dublin, Ireland. That game was played at Croke Park and not Aviva Stadium, the home of Saturday's Nebraska-Northwestern matchup.
- According to available research, Saturday's game will be just the 14th FBS conference game
 played on foreign soil in college football history. The Nebraska-Northwestern contest will also
 mark just the second FBS conference matchup ever played in Europe, along with the 2016 Aer
 Lingus Classic in Dublin between ACC foes Georgia Tech and Boston College.

FROST SET FOR FIFTH SEASON

Scott Frost is set for his fifth season at Nebraska in 2022. The consensus 2017 national coach of the year, Frost is 34-36 in six seasons as a head coach.

- Nineteen of Frost's 29 losses at Nebraska (66 percent) have been by a touchdown or less, including 11 by five or fewer points.
- Nebraska was 3-9 in 2021, but the Huskers outscored their opponents by 63 points on the season.
 Despite the 3-9 record, the average score of a Husker game in 2021 was 28-23 in Nebraska's favor.
- All nine Nebraska losses in 2021 were by single digits, including eight by a touchdown or less.
 The Huskers played a school-record six games against ranked opponents during the 2021 regular
 season. Nebraska lost to those six ranked foes all ranked in the top 20 by an average of just
 6.0 points per game.
- In 15 seasons as a full-time assistant or head coach, Frost's teams have posted a 137-54 record. He has coached in two national championship games, won seven conference titles and coached 10 teams that earned a final top-15 ranking.

FROST AS A HEAD COACH

FIVE NEW ADDITIONS TO HUSKER STAFF

Nebraska's coaching staff features five new faces this fall. New to the staff are offensive coordinator **Mark Whipple**, running backs coach **Bryan Applewhite**, special teams coordinator **Bill Busch**, wide receivers coach **Mickey Joseph** and offensive line coach **Donovan Raiola**.

- Whipple is a 40-year coaching veteran who has won 137 games as a collegiate head coach, including the 1998 Division I-AA (now FCS) national championship. The offensive coordinator at Pittsburgh the past three seasons, Whipple helped the Panthers to the 2021 ACC title. Pitt had the Johnny Unitas Golden Arm Award winner (Kenny Pickett) and the Biletnikoff Award winner (Jordan Addison) last season.
- Applewhite came to Nebraska after two seasons as the running backs coach at TCU. He helped
 the Horned Frogs rank in the top 30 nationally in rushing in both 2020 and 2021. In Applewhite's
 final season, two TCU running backs posted yards-per-carry averages that ranked among the top
 five marks in school history.
- Busch owns more than 30 seasons of collegiate experience, and he is in his third coaching stint
 at Nebraska after serving as a Husker graduate assistant in the 1990s and as the special teams
 coordinator from 2004 to 2007. Before working as a defensive analyst for Nebraska in 2021,
 Busch coached the safeties for three seasons at LSU from 2018 to 2020, helping the Tigers to
 the 2019 national title.
- Joseph, a former Husker quarterback, joined the Nebraska staff after spending five seasons at LSU. With the Tigers, Joseph coached 2019 Biletnikoff Award winner Ja'Marr Chase and developed four wide receivers who were selected in the first or second round of the NFL Draft. Joseph also served as LSU's assistant head coach in 2020 and 2021, and he is Nebraska's associate head coach and passing game coordinator in 2022.
- Raiola is the younger brother of former Husker All-America center Dominic Raiola. Donovan came
 to Nebraska after spending the past three seasons as the assistant offensive line coach for the
 Chicago Bears, helping the Bears to a pair of playoff appearances. Raiola, who boasts previous
 collegiate coaching experience at Notre Dame, was a three-time All-Big Ten offensive lineman
 at Wisconsin
- Three of the new assistants bring a national championship pedigree to the Husker staff. Busch
 and Joseph were both members of LSU's 2019 national championship team, while Whipple
 helped Pitt to an ACC championship last season, and he won an FCS national championship as
 the head coach of Massachusetts.
- With the additions of Whipple and Joseph, members of Nebraska's 2022 staff have coached two of the last three Biletnikoff Award winners as the nation's top wide receiver.
- Of the five returning assistants on Frost's staff, four have been with Frost in each of his seven seasons as a collegiate head coach (Erik Chinander, Sean Beckton, Travis Fisher and Barrett Ruud). Mike Dawson has served on Frost's staff for a total of six seasons.

TRANSFERS ADD EXPERIENCE TO NEBRASKA ROSTER

Since the end of last season, Nebraska added 22 transfers to its roster, bringing talent and experience to the team.

- Of the 22 transfers, 18 have previous playing experience at an FBS or FCS program. That includes 11 players with playing experience at a Power Five program.
- The Huskers' 18 first-year transfers with FBS or FCS experience have combined for 368 games played and 184 starts in their careers. By comparison, Nebraska's 107 returning players have a total of 259 career starts between them.

SEVERAL TRANSFERS EXPECTED TO MAKE IMMEDIATE IMPACT

Nebraska's roster features 17 first-year Huskers who have previous FBS or FCS experience. Those additions are expected to bolster the Huskers' roster, and several transfers are poised to make an immediate impact in their first season in Lincoln.

- On defense, Nebraska added six transfers with FBS or FCS experience. The Huskers' five FBS transfers all came from Power Five programs, including two from Alabama and one each from Arizona State, TCU and Texas Tech.
- Edge Ochaun Mathis enters the 2022 season ranked 10th among all active FBS players with 30.5 career tackles for loss. A two-time All-Big 12 selection at TCU, On3 ranked Mathis as the most impactful edge transfer in the country for the 2022 season, while ESPN ranked him as the No. 7 newcomer in the country. Mathis was one of 85 players nationally named to the watch list for the Bronko Nagurski Trophy, which is presented annually to the National Defensive Player of the Year.
- On the defensive line, the Huskers added fellow Power Five transfers Devin Drew and Stephon Wynn Jr. Drew, who did not arrive in Lincoln until the second week of August, played in 23 games and started 12 contests in two seasons at Texas Tech, finishing with 55 tackles. Wynn spent four seasons at Alabama and made 16 tackles over 21 games.
- A pair of transfers could also figure into the secondary. Omar Brown started 29 games at Northern Iowa, totaling 140 tackles with 13 pass breakups and eight interceptions in his Panther career. He was the FCS Defensive Freshman of the Year and an All-American in the 2019 season. Tommi Hill played in 11 games as a freshman at Arizona State in 2021, finishing with nine tackles.
- On offense, Nebraska added eight transfers with FBS or FCS experience. Six of the Huskers' seven transfers with previous FBS game experience came from Power Five programs, including quarterbacks who started for Florida State and Texas.
- Texas transfer Casey Thompson played in 19 games with 10 starts as a Longhorn. He completed nearly 64 percent of his passes at Texas, throwing for 2,422 yards and 30 touchdowns. As a member of the Johnny Unitas Golden Arm Award watch list in 2021, he threw for 2,113 yards and 24 touchdowns. ESPN ranked Thompson as the nation's 15th-best newcomer for the 2022 season.
- Chubba Purdy transferred to Nebraska from Florida State. Purdy played in three games with one start for the Seminoles as a true freshman in 2020 before redshirting in 2021. He has thrown for 219 yards and two touchdowns in his career with 19 carries for 57 yards.
- · Nebraska added a pair of transfers to bolster the offensive line in Kevin Williams Jr. and Hunter Anthony. Williams appeared in 22 career games with 19 starts at FCS Northern Colorado, while Anthony played in 23 career games with five starts at Oklahoma State.
- Junior college transfer **Anthony Grant** will figure prominently in Nebraska's running back rotation. Grant, who began his career at Florida State playing in 12 games in 2018, ran for 2,549 yards in junior college and was the 2021 National Offensive Player of the Year.
- A trio of FBS transfers have been added to the Huskers' receivers room. Isaiah Garcia-Castaneda played in 12 games with seven starts in two seasons at New Mexico State, catching 42 passes for 639 yards and four touchdowns. Trey Palmer transferred to Nebraska from LSU, where he played in 28 games with five starts and caught 41 passes for 458 yards and three touchdowns. He's also a proven returner which helped land him a spot on the 2022 Paul Hornung Award watch list. Marcus Washington played in 31 games with eight starts at Texas and caught 25 passes for 366 yards and three touchdowns.
- On special teams, Nebraska is likely to have FCS transfer starters at both punter and place-kicker and an FCS transfer is likely to figure into the Huskers' long-snapping duties.
- At place-kicker, Timmy Bleekrode joined the roster as an FCS transfer from Furman, where he was 15-of-18 on field goals last season.
- At punter, Brian Buschini is a first-year FCS transfer from Montana. Buschini was the 2021 FCS Punter of the Year. He ranked third nationally with an average of 46.0 yards per punt last season, and Buschini placed 30 of his 69 punts inside the opponent's 20-yard line. Buschini was named to the preseason watch list for the 2022 Ray Guy Award in July.
- Georgetown transfer Brady Weas is one of the leading contenders to be the long snapper on Nebraska's punt unit.

A LOOK AT WHAT NEBRASKA RETURNS ON DEFENSE

On defense, Nebraska returns five players who started every game last season and two other defenders who started four contests for a unit that allowed Nebraska's fewest points per game (22.7) since 2010. The Huskers must replace six starters lost from last season, all of whom earned at least honorable-mention All-Big Ten accolades in 2021.

- On the defensive line, **Ty Robinson** is the veteran of a group bolstered by transfers. The only defensive lineman to start a game for the Huskers, Robinson has appeared in 20 career games with 11 starts, totaling 44 tackles, 6.0 tackles for loss and 2.0 sacks.
- Behind Robinson, **Nash Hutmacher** (12 games) and **Colton Feist** (8) are the only other defensive linemen who have played in more than two games at Nebraska.
- At the edge spot, NU returns team captains **Garrett Nelson** and **Caleb Tannor**, the two players with the most experience in a Husker uniform. Nelson has played in 31 career games with 20 starts, and he led Nebraska with 11.5 tackles for loss and 5.0 sacks last season. Tannor, who has played in 44 games with 22 starts as a Husker, also had a productive 2021 season, finishing with career highs of 33 tackles and 5.5 TFLs while adding 2.0 sacks and three breakups.
- Blaise Gunnerson emerged late last season as an option at edge, earning significant playing time in the final two games and totaling two tackles and a half TFL.
- At linebacker, Nebraska returns one of the top duos in the nation in Luke Reimer and captain Nick Henrich. Both Reimer and Henrich ranked in the top 50 nationally last season in tackles, as Nebraska was one of only five FBS programs - and two Power Five teams - to have two players rank in the top 50 in tackles. Reimer (108) and Henrich (99) combined for 207 tackles last season.
- Chris Kolarevic and Isaac Gifford are two of the top candidates for playing time at nickel. Kolarevic has played in 28 games in his collegiate career with 15 starts, playing in all 12 games and recording 27 tackles as a linebacker in his first season at Nebraska last year. Gifford has played in 20 games in his Husker career, making an impact as a special teams standout and as a safety.
- At cornerback, Quinton Newsome and Braxton Clark are the most experienced returners.
 Newsome has played in 30 games with 13 starts as a Husker. He started all 12 games in 2021
 and had 57 tackles with four breakups. Clark also played in all 12 games last season, and he has
 appeared in 28 games with one start in his career.
- Myles Farmer is the only player on the roster who has started a game at safety for Nebraska. Farmer has played in 21 games with five starts the past three seasons. He is Nebraska's active leader with three career interceptions. Noa Pola-Gates has appeared in 18 games in a Nebraska uniform. Marques Buford Jr. is also in the mix at safety after he was a special teams standout in 2021, playing in all 12 games as a freshman.

REIMER & HENRICH AMONG NATION'S TOP TACKLING DUOS

Nebraska returns its top two tacklers from last season in linebackers **Luke Reimer** and **Nick Henrich**. Reimer led Nebraska with 108 tackles, while Henrich was second with 99 tackles.

- Reimer and Henrich combined for 207 tackles in 2021. The 207 tackles rank as the sixth-highest returning total by two FBS teammates from the 2021 season.
- This season, Reimer and Henrich aim to become the first pair of Husker teammates to each have 100 tackles in a season since Barrett Ruud (149) and Demorrio Williams (128) in 2003.
- Reimer has totaled at least 10 tackles in six of his 17 career starts (35 percent), while Henrich has recorded four games with double-figure tackles in four of his 13 starts (31 percent).
- Reimer had 19 tackles against Purdue last year, a Nebraska record in a Big Ten Conference game.
- Reimer, a member of the 2022 Butkus and Bednarik Award watch lists, ranked in the top 30
 nationally last season in tackles per game (23rd, 9.1) and forced fumbles per game (29th, 0.3).

A LOOK AT WHAT NEBRASKA RETURNS ON OFFENSE

Nebraska returns four regular starters on offense and 13 other players who made at least one start last season. The Huskers must replace three starting offensive linemen from the 2021 season, four of their five leading receivers and their four-year starting quarterback.

- Nebraska averaged 447.6 yards of offense per game last season, ranking 20th nationally in that category. The No. 20 total offense ranking was the program's highest since the 2008 season (12th).
- Up front, Turner Corcoran (11) and Bryce Benhart (10) return after combining for 21 starts last season. Ethan Piper and Trent Hixson are also back with 24 career starts between them. Teddy Prochazka returns after starting two of the first seven games at left tackle as a true freshman last season before a season-ending injury. Brant Banks started at Illinois last year. Nouredin Nouili made seven starts last year but will miss the 2022 season.
- In the backfield, **Rahmir Johnson** started seven games last fall and was the leading rusher among running backs with 495 yards. Overall, Nebraska brings back three of its four most productive running backs from 2021, as Johnson, **Jaquez Yant** and **Gabe Ervin Jr.** combined for 913 rushing yards last season.
- At wideout, NU returns three receivers who started multiple games last year including Omar Manning (7 starts), Wyatt Liewer (4) and Oliver Martin (3). That trio combined for 574 receiving yards in 2021. Brody Belt and Alante Brown have each started one game in their careers.
- Veteran tight end and team captain **Travis Vokolek**, who has played in 36 career games, is back after catching 11 passes for 127 yards last season behind Big Ten Tight End of the Year Austin Allen. **Chancellor Brewington** and **Chris Hickman** also return at the tight end spot. Brewington played in 10 games and caught three passes in his first season at Nebraska in 2021, and he has appeared in 31 games with 19 starts in his collegiate career. Hickman has played in 15 games with Nebraska, and he caught three passes for 90 yards last season.
- At quarterback, Nebraska must replace Adrian Martinez, the program's all-time leader in total
 offense. Logan Smothers started Nebraska's final game last season against No. 17 Iowa and
 completed 16-of-22 passes for 198 yards while rushing for 64 yards and two touchdowns in his
 first career start.

HUSKER ROSTER FEATURES 26 COLLEGE GRADUATES

One thing Nebraska returns on both offense and defense is dedicated student-athletes as a total of 26 Huskers - including grad transfers - will play the 2022 season as college graduates.

- According to preliminary research by the National Football Foundation, Nebraska has the most college graduates on its roster of any FBS program.
- This marks the second straight season that Nebraska has had at least 20 graduates on its active roster, as the Huskers had 20 players who played as graduate students during the 2021 season.

HOME OF THE HUSKERS



Memorial Stadium's history dates nearly 100 years. In the fall of 1922, a drive for \$430,000 in stadium construction funds was undertaken by faculty, students, alumni and friends of the University.

The stadium was named Memorial Stadium to honor all Nebraskans who served in the Civil and Spanish-American Wars; the 751 Nebraskans who died in World War I; the 3,839 in World War II; the 225 in Korea; the 422 in Vietnam; and those in Iraq.

Construction was completed in a few more than 90 working days and Memorial Stadium was dedicated on Oct. 20, 1923, at the Homecoming game in which Nebraska was held to a scoreless tie by Kansas.

The field at Memorial Stadium was named Tom Osborne Field - after the Huskers' legendary Hall-of-Fame coach - in 1998, one year after Osborne's retirement following 25 years and 255 victories as head coach.

2022 NEBRASKA SEASON NOTEBOOK

SCHEDULE NOTES

- Nebraska is scheduled to play three games against opponents who were ranked in the final AP poll of the 2021 season. The Huskers take on Oklahoma (10th) on Sept. 17, Michigan (3rd) on Nov. 12 and Iowa (23rd) on Nov. 25. Michigan (8th) and Oklahoma (9th) each appeared in the 2022 preseason
- In addition to the three ranked opponents from last season, Nebraska will face Wisconsin, Minnesota and Purdue, who were all among the top four teams receiving votes outside of the top 25.
- Nebraska is also scheduled to play seven games against opponents who played in a bowl game last season.

COACHING STAFF NOTES

- Scott Frost is in his seventh season as a head coach and fifth year at Nebraska. Frost is one of four former Husker players to return to the Nebraska sideline as head coach, and he is one of 21 FBS head coaches coaching at his alma mater in 2022.
- Nebraska's staff also includes former Huskers Mickey Joseph (1998-2001) and Barrett Ruud (2001-04), while **Donovan Raiola** is the younger brother of former Husker All-America center Dominic Raiola.
- Frost is one of only four FBS head coaches to win a national title as a player. Frost was a two-time national champion as a Husker (1995 & 1997).
- Frost's teams have been ranked in the top 15 in 10 of his first 15 seasons as a full-time coach. Of those 10 seasons, Frost's teams have posted eight top-10 rankings and six top-five rankings.
- Frost and four of his assistant coaches are in their seventh consecutive season working together, including two seasons at UCF.
- Nebraska added five new coaches to its staff in 2022, including four to the offensive staff. Mark Whipple (offensive coordinator), Bryan Applewhite (running backs), Mickey Joseph (wide receivers) and Donovan Raiola (offensive line) are all in their first season at Nebraska, while Bill Busch is the Huskers' special teams coordinator after being an analyst in 2021.
- Nebraska has two coaches on its staff who have been named national head coach of the year. Scott Frost was the consensus choice as the 2017 National Coach of the Year, while Mark Whipple was the 1988 Division I-AA (now FCS) National Coach of the Year after leading UMass to a national title.
- Whipple was also a semifinalist for the Broyles Award in 2021, an award presented annually to the nation's top assistant coach. In addition to Whipple, Erik Chinander is a two-time nominee for the Broyles Award (2016 & 2021), while Bill Busch was named the National Defensive Backs Coach of the Year in 2012 at Utah State.

Offensively, Northwestern returns its top three running backs from last season, including 1,000-yard rusher Evan Hull. The Wildcats also return Cam Porter, who was on the preseason Doak Walker Award watch list last year before suffering a season-ending injury in fall camp.

In the passing game, Ryan Hilinski returns after starting five games at quarterback in 2021, when he completed 54 percent of his passes and threw for a team-high 978

yards. Northwestern lost its leading receiver from last year but the Wildcats return their next four most productive receivers who combined for 88 catches and 1,130 receiving yards in 2021.

Defensively, Northwestern must replace Chris Bergin, who led the nation with 141 tackles last season, which were 52 more tackles than any other Wildcat. Bryce Gallagher is Northwestern's top returning tackler after he made 89 stops in 2021, while Adetomiwa Adebawore is back after leading the Wildcats with 8.5 tackles for loss and 4.5 sacks last season.

Pat Fitzgerald is in his 17th season at Northwestern and will coach his 200th game on Saturday. He owns a 109-90 career record with the Wildcats and is the second-longest tenured Big Ten head coach.

Before taking over as head coach of his alma mater Northwestern in 2006, Fitzgerald was a Wildcat assistant from 2001 to 2005. Previously, he coached at Idaho (2000), Colorado (1999) and Maryland (1998).

In his first 16 years as a head coach, Fitzgerald has taken the Wildcats to 10 bowl games and two Big Ten Championship games. Although Northwestern was just 3-9 in 2021, Fitzgerald has guided the Wildcats to two of the last four Big Ten West championships.

HEAD COACH SCOTT FROST



HISTORIC TURNAROUND AT UCF

At UCF, Frost produced the greatest two-year turnaround in college football history, inheriting an 0-12 team and leading the Knights to a 13-0 record just two years later.

- In his first season in 2016, Frost made history as the only first-time head coach in FBS history to make a bowl game with a team that was winless the previous season.
- UCF tied for the national lead with a six-win improvement from the 2015 to 2016 season.
 The Knights then ranked third nationally after improving by seven wins from the 2016 to 2017 season.
- The Knights' seven-win improvement from 2016 to 2017 ranked 11th in NCAA history and marked just the second time ever a bowl team improved by more than six wins the next season.
- UCF was the American Athletic Conference and Peach Bowl champions and was the only FBS team to go undefeated in 2017.
- Frost called UCF's plays, orchestrating the greatest two-year offensive turnaround in NCAA history. The Knights went from last to fifth in total offense, improving their output by more than 260 yards per game. UCF also went from third-to-last to first in scoring offense, improving by nearly 35 points per

FROST LED UCF TO 13-0 SEASON

In his second year as a head coach, Scott Frost guided UCF to a 13-0 record in 2017, when the Knights were the nation's only undefeated team.

- Frost was the fourth coach in FBS history to post a 13-0 record or better in either his first or second season as a head coach. Among that quartet, Frost is the only coach who inherited a team that won fewer than five games, as UCF went 0-12 the year before Frost's arrival.
- Frost is one of only five active FBS head coaches who has posted a 13-0 season or better, joining Jimbo Fisher, Nick Saban, Dabo Swinney and Kyle Whittingham.
- Frost also led Nebraska to a 13-0 record and a national title as the Huskers' starting quarterback in 1997. Frost was the first person in NCAA history to be part of a 13-0 season as both a player and a head coach.

NATIONAL COACH OF THE YEAR

Frost was the consensus choice as the 2017 national coach of the year, earning the honor from at least eight different organizations.

- Frost won the 2017 Paul "Bear" Bryant Award as the national coach of the year. Frost, Chris Petersen (2006 & 2009, Boise State) and Luke Fickell (2021, Cincinnati) are the only coaches in the 36-year history of the award to win the honor while coaching a team outside of a Power Five Conference.
- Frost was also the AP Coach of the Year, becoming the sixth coach to win the award in his first or second season as a head coach.

FROST A TOP OFFENSIVE COACH

For each of the last 13 years, Scott Frost has either been an offensive assistant, offensive coordinator or head coach who calls the offensive plays. During that time, he has consistently proven to be one of the nation's finest offensive coaches.

- In 13 seasons coaching offense, Frost has worked with eight units that finished in the top 10 nationally in scoring, including seven that ranked in the top five.
- Frost has also been a part of seven teams that ranked in the top 10 nationally in total offense the past 13 seasons.

FROST A PROVEN WINNER

Frost is a proven winner. In his 15-year full-time coaching career, Frost's teams have combined for a 137-54 record.

- Frost has averaged more than nine wins per year and been a part of seven 12-win teams.
- He has won seven conference titles in 15 years.
- Frost has coached in two national title games and his teams have finished with a top-10 ranking eight times in the past 15 years.
- In two seasons as UCF's head coach, the Knights were the nation's most improved team in 2016 and were the only FBS team to go undefeated in 2017.
- As a Husker quarterback, Frost was a two-time national champion who helped Nebraska to a 36-2 record, including a 24-2 mark as a starter.
- Frost is one of four active head coaches who won a national title as a player and is the only coach who won multiple national titles.
