THE START OF A NEW SERIES

- Tuesday's match up with Grand Canyon will be the first time that the programs will have met on the soccer field.
- Tech has never played a squad from the state of Arizona.

NON CONFERENCE GAME BREAKS UP TOUGH OPENING ACC SLATE

- The game against the Lopes comes in between big time ACC games.
- On Friday night, the Hokies fell at home to No. 18 North Carolina in the first conference game of 2019. After taking the lead in the 23rd minute, Tech conceded twice in the next 10 minutes and the Heels added a third goal in the second half to seal the result.
- This Friday, Tech will travel to Louisville for another tough test against the Cardinals. Tech leads that all-time series 10-1-4, but have not beaten Louisville as a member of the ACC.

STRICKLER CONTINUES TO FIND THE NET

- Junior forward Kristo Strickler has tallied goals in consecutive games for the fifth time in his career.
- The captain ranks T-4 in the league with those four goals and is T-7 in total points with nine, adding one assist on the season.
- For his career, the Hilliard, Ohio native has 17 goals and six assists for 40 points.

FRESHMEN MAKING HUGE IMPACT ON THE HOKIES

- The Hokies have started two freshmen all season long so far, Daniel Pereira in midfield and Nick Blacklock up front.
- Pereira has impressed, controlling the midfield and finding teammates in dangerous areas with both feet. At the JMU Invitational against Loyola, he scored a sensational goal from about 25-yards out, a one-touch effort that found the far post.
- Blacklock has found a rhythm on the wings, leading the Hokies in assists with three so far. That mark is T-4 most in the ACC.
- He provided two assists in the Hokies' win over Hofstra.

4-0 START FOR THE FIFTH TIME

- Tech's 4-0 start to the season was the best opening stretch since 2016, a year that saw the squad advance all the way to the Elite Eight of the NCAA tournament.
- The program has started five seasons 4-0; 1997, 2001, 2006, 2016 and now 2019.
- No Tech team has ever reached the 5-0 mark.

VIRGINIA TECH BY THE NUMBERS

3 - Consecutive trips to the postseason for the program. A fourth in 2019 would be a program record. The Hokies previously made three straight trips from (2005-07).

3 - The program has three consecutive seasons of 10-plus wins, for the eighth time in program history.

5 - NCAA tournament wins by the senior class of Nico Quashie, Will Mejia, Brendan Moyers and James Kasak as well as 2018 graduate Rory Slevin. That total is the most in school history.

30 - Goals scored in 2018 by returning players of the team's 35 (86%). Junior Kristo Strickler (10), senior Nico Quashie (6) and junior Jon Ingason (4) were the leading scorers a season ago and all return.

34 - Win total for the past three seasons, the fourth highest total in a three-year span for the program (37 wins from 96-99, 35 wins from 01-03 and 05-07).

100 - Head coach Mike Brizendine reached 100 career victories with Tech's 3-1 victory over UC Santa Barbara in the second match of the 2019 season.

PROGRAM MAKES DEBUT ON ACC NETWORK

- The match up with the Tar Heels will be the first time that the Hokies will be seen on the ACC Network.
- All seven of the Hokies' home games in 2019 will be broadcast on the network in some capacity, highlighted by the September 27th matchup with Boston College on the linear network. That match will kickoff at 1 p.m.
- Tech is slated to also appear on ACC Network Extra when they travel to Clemson, Pitt and Duke.

100 COLLEGIATE WINS

- With Sunday's 3-1 triumph over UC Santa Barbara, Tech head coach Mike Brizendine tallied his 100th collegiate win.
- In 11 seasons with the Hokies, he has accumulated 73 victories and has three straight seasons with 10 or more wins.

2019 KICKED OFF OUT WEST

- Virginia Tech came home 2-0 from a west coast trip against LMU and UC Santa Barbara.
- Tech had five different goal scorers for their five tallies, including forcing an own goal from the Gauchos.
- Three Hokies made their debuts, Daniel Pereira, Nick Blacklock and Jacob Labovitz. All three made significant impacts as Pereira played all 180 minutes in midfield, Blacklock provided the assist on the game winner against LMU and Labovitz scored an insurance goal against UC Santa Barbara.

BRIZENDINE NAMES CAPTAINS: INGASON, HAUGLI, STRICKLER

- For the second consecutive season, defender Jon Ingason will be called upon to lead the Hokies. The Iceland native, scored four goals in 2018, all from set pieces, three of which turning out to be game winning tallies. He has been on the ACC Academic Honor Roll in both of his seasons in Blacksburg.
- Sivert Haugli, a 6-foot-5 central midfielder has also been called upon in 2019. In his freshman season in 2018, Haugli started in all 20 of his appearances mostly in the midfield, but also filling in at center back on occasion.
- The third captain in 2019 is Kristo Strickler, a junior from Hilliard, Ohio.

STRICKLER ON PRESEASON ACC WATCH LIST

- Junior forward Kristo Strickler was placed on the preseason ACC Watch List announced by the conference.
- He led the Hokies with 10 goals and 24 points in 2018, scoring four game winners.
- Strickler spent his summer training with the Dayton Dutch Lions as well as competing for a spot on the Philippines national team.

POSTSEASON SUCCESS

- The Hokies are just one of 12 programs to reach each of the last three NCAA tournaments. The other teams are; Pacific, Colgate, Maryland, North Carolina, Virginia, Notre Dame, Louisville, Washington, Indiana, Akron, and Wake Forest.

HEAD COACH MIKE BRIZENDINE



In his 11 years at the helm of the Virginia Tech program, Coach Brizendine has worked to return the Hokies to the top of the Atlantic Coast Conference. Each of the last two seasons, Brizendine's squads have hosted NCAA Tournament games, advancing to the Elite Eight in 2016 and concluding another successful season in the Second Round in 2017.

In 2017, Tech made its second consecutive appearance to the NCAA Tournament, advancing past Air Force 2-0 in the First Round. Along the way the Hokies had historic victories over Creighton, handing the Blue Jays their first home loss on opening night since 1995 and beating No. 1 Notre Dame thanks to two goals from Marcelo Acuna. The Hokies had two student-athletes make First Team All-ACC members for the first time in program history, Acuna and goalkeeper Ben Lundgaard.

Lundgaard, who was selected in the 2018 MLS SuperDraft by the Columbus Crew with the 22nd pick in the First Round, became the sixth Hokie Brizendine has trained that has gone on to be drafted in MLS.

The 2016 season marked a resurgence of the Tech soccer program, winning six straight games to open the season en route to a No. 15 ranking. After opening the season by upsetting No. 18 Ohio State and No. 24 Georgetown, the Hokies would end the season 10-1-3 against non-league opponents. The Hokies compiled their best ACC record in Brizendine's tenure, finishing 3-4-1 to earn the nine seed in the ACC Tournament. Tech's four losses all came against programs ranked in the top-10; tenth-ranked Syracuse, seventh-ranked Clemson, third-ranked UNC and top-ranked Notre Dame. The team earned an at-large bid to the NCAA tournament, the program's first in a decade, opening with a 1-0 victory over East Tennessee State. The Hokies then went on to defeat Charlotte and Indiana, advancing to the Elite Eight. The program ended the season ranked eighth nationally.

Brizendine was named the 2016 VaSID Coach of the Year with junior Marcelo Acuna earning third-team All-America honors. Senior Juan Pablo Saavedra joined an elite group of former Hokies when he was drafted by FC Toronto in the 2016 MLS Draft.

Brizendine has coached 22 players that have gone on to play professional soccer, as well as six MLS draftees. After taking over a program facing significant recruiting restrictions and coming off a four-win season, his leadership has returned Virginia Tech to one of the most competitive programs in the nation.

After serving 10 years as a collegiate assistant coach, including five at Virginia Tech, Brizendine finally got his opportunity lead his own program when former AD Jim Weaver promoted him to the head coach on June 11, 2009.

During the 2015 season, Brizendine's team won five games, including an upset against then-No. 10 Xavier. Sophomore Merlin Baus led the team, tallying 15 points. At the conclusion of the season, Ricardo John signed with the professional team Central F.C. in his native country of Trinidad and Tobago.

In 2014, Brizendine's young squad produced seven wins, including victories over Wake Forest, NC State, SIUE and UNCG. Freshman Ricardo John, who tallied 11 points, was named all-conference and all-region. Underclassmen scored all 19 goals and freshman keeper Ben Lundgaard recorded six shutouts in seeing nearly 75 percent of the minutes in goal.

The 2013 season saw a school-record three players either drafted into the MLS or sign professional contracts following the season. The Hokies also earned eight points in ACC play, the most since 2007, behind five ties and an upset victory over No. 17 Syracuse. Under Brizendine's direction, the Hokie defense only allowed 23 goals all season, the lowest total allowed since 2005, as well as the second first-team All-ACC selection in school history.

Brizendine's 2012 team earned the most wins in a season (seven) for the program since 2007. On Nov. 5, 2012, in College Park, Md., the Hokies scored three unanswered goals to top NC State in the first round of the Atlantic Coast Conference tournament, capturing only the second victory for the team in the tournament since the school joined the conference in 2004.

Under Brizendine's guidance, the Hokies have also had a great deal of success in the classroom. His teams earned the NSCAA Team Academic Award six times (2010-14, 2016-17). The award honors teams with a cumulative grade-point average of 3.0 or higher.

As an assistant under former coach Oliver Weiss, Brizendine played an integral role in helping the Hokies make it to the College Cup for the first time in the program's history. For his contributions, he was recognized as the NSCAA's Atlantic Region Assistant Coach of the Year in 2007.

Brizendine joined the Hokie staff after a successful stint with Bridgewater (Va.) College, a Division III program that participates in the Old Dominion Athletic Conference (ODAC). After assisting both the men's and women's programs at Bridgewater in 2000, he became the head men's coach from 2001 to 2003, guiding the team from non-competitive status to a full-fledged Division III program. Brizendine led Bridgewater to its two best single-season records – 12-6 in 2003 and 11-7 in 2002 – for a 23-13 mark over two seasons and a .639 winning percentage. For this significant turnaround, his peers named him ODAC Coach of the Year in 2003.

Prior to his time at Bridgewater College, he was an assistant coach at Ferrum College for the men's soccer team in 1999.

He has also been active guiding and encouraging kids in youth soccer programs throughout his coaching career.

Brizendine graduated from James Madison University in 1999 and earned his Master of Education from Virginia Tech in 2005.

As a player, he lettered four seasons at James Madison University from 1995-98 and ended his career sixth in all-time scoring for the Dukes. He earned all-conference and all-region recognition during his four-year career. He also played professionally with the Roanoke Wrath (1999) and the Northern Virginia Royals (2000 and 2001) of the Division 3 league.

Brizendine and wife Lucy, reside in Blacksburg, with their three daughters, Sloane, Reece and Millie.

THOMPSON FIELD, THE HOME OF THE HOKIES



Thompson Field serves as the home of the Virginia Tech men's and women's soccer teams as well as the lacrosse team. Located in the center of the Virginia Tech athletics complex, the facility ranks as one of the finest for both soccer and lacrosse in the Atlantic Coast Conference.

Located across from Lane Stadium, the Hokies' football home, and adjacent to Tech Softball Park, Thompson Field was completed in the fall of 2003 and dedicated in 2008 in the name of Sandra D. Thompson, a longtime supporter of women's athletics at Virginia Tech.

The field is a bluegrass playing surface and measures approximately 75 by 120 yards. It is equipped with an underground irrigation system and a drainage system that allows for it to be ready for play quickly following rainstorms. The complex also features a wireless scoreboard, and a permanent Hubbell lighting system allows for night games.

The athletics department has made improvements gradually since the venue opened in 2003. In 2005, workers completed a new restroom facility for the field, and during the summer of 2008, a new game operations center was erected atop the stadium above the fans. The approximately 900-square foot facility includes two broadcast booths for both home team and visiting team radio broadcasts. The center also has two covered areas devoted to broadcasting and/or videographers' cameras, and there is a large working area for media members covering the Hokies.

The climate-controlled facility also contains a state-of-the-art sound system and Ethernet capability. The Internet-ready facility allows Tech's official athletics website, hokiesports.com, to originate live audio broadcasts and live stats of the Hokies' matches from the press box. Above the grandstand is a wired camera deck.

Between each team's bench area is the Sandy D. Thompson Press Box. Formerly the press operations center for the field, the facility is now used as a halftime room for game officials and as an auxiliary area for press and game operations.

Thompson Field, which has been expanded since it was opened, now features approximately 2,028 bench-back seats, where each fan has an unobstructed view of the playing surface. Spacious area around the field allows for nearly 1,500 more fans to watch games.

A video board was installed in the spring of 2019 and will debut for the soccer programs in the fall of 2019.

With the ACC Network's launch in August of 2019, the field has been equipped with new lights to better showcase the field not only in-venue but on television.
